IMPORTANT POINTS TO BE CONSIDERED

A Merchant May Make His Advertising Profitable Or Unprofitable

(By the Ad. Man)

There are many things on this beautiful Tuesday morning far more exciting and interesting than the question of newspaper advertising and the benefits to be derived from a judiciously waged campaign.

The Cigar City has within its midst several hundred people who are really in need of help—they are reported to be suffering for lack of food, and the people of the city have interested themselves to a most creditable degree in the caring for these former laborers who are now out of employment and consequently out of bread.

The Panama canal is within a year of being completed and Key West is interested to a very marked degree in the completion of what some are pleased to term the "big ditch."

The sponge sales for last week amounted to more than fifteen thousand dollars, thus proving beyond the shadow of a doubt that the once great sponge industry of this city is fast regaining its old hold, and that before very long Key West will be once again the great sponge center that it used to be.

The paving work on the streets here, and especially on Duval street, has really begun to take some shape of recognition, and it can now be seen that before very much longer the streets will be what the towns desires them to be.

The news despatches tell us that the mob who committed murder in such form in Jacksonville last Sunday morning, was caught during the past week. A mob was formed about the jail and it looked for a time as if there was going to be a lynching, but the cooler heads of the city prevailed and the lynching was averted.

An anti-American outburst met Secretary Knox in Nicaragua on the night of March the 5th and as a result fifty prominent participants were arrested and lodged in jail, there to remain until Secretary Knox leaves Nicaragua. Among the number arrested were the editorial staffs of two prominent Nicaraguan newspapers.

More troops from the United States and from Great Britain were sent to China last week. A British missionary was killed during the past week by the Chinese rioters.

Congressman Clark calls Governor Grist a "pin-head" governor, in the course of a speech in the congressional hall last week, and is loudly applauded as he resumes his seat.

The Maine is to be blown up and sunk probably tomorrow for the second time. This time, with the honors of war.

There are indeed many things that are more exciting and interesting than the subject referred to in the first paragraph of this article, but then the fact remains, nevertheless, that the subject of newspaper advertising, when conducted along right lines, should interest the business element of this the southernmost city of our great republic.

NORTH CAROLINA AND BIRMINGHAM WILL ATTEND AT BURIAL OF BATTLESHIP MAINE

Big Cruisers Now In The Harbor Will Proceed To Havana To Tow The Remains Of Ill-Fated Ship To Sea—Will Make Search For Other Bodies.

The U. S. Cruiser North Carolina, Capt. Marsh and Birmingham, Capt. Hughes, which have been here since Saturday coaling will probably leave today or tomorrow for Havana.

They are detailed to tow the hulk of the Maine out of Havana harbor to deep water, where they will turn their batteries on her and send her to the bottom. The present plan is to have the burial at sea at sundown on Friday of this week. However, before this final work of destruction starts, a thorough search of the hulk will be made by expert divers, because, in the opinion of the Navy Department it is possible that many bodies of her ill-fated crew still remain in water tight compartments. If any bodies are recovered, according to an officer who is in close accord with Washington, they will be sent to Arlington Cemetery and interred with appropriate ceremony.

The crews of the North Carolina and Birmingham—many of them at least—are of the opinion that quite a number of bodies still remain in the battered and mud plastered hulk of what was once the first-class battleship Maine, and they—as well as the people of the United States, from Key West to Androsgoe, and from aristocratic Newport to plebeian Kern City, insist that the bones of those sailor lads be given a burial commensurate with their patriotism.

During the coaling operations here on Saturday, a member of the North Carolina's crew had his hand drawn between the wire ropes of a winch so as to pull out the tendons. He fainted from pain and was taken on board the ship where he received proper medical attention.

TARPON SPRINGS IS AGAIN FIRE SWEEP

Nine Buildings Burned Causing A Loss Of Approximately \$25,000

Tarpon Springs, Mar. 11.—A defective fire in Montout's bakery, at the bridge, on the river, caught and destroyed nine buildings, including stores, renting rooms and restaurants, besides three little bunk houses Saturday morning at 3:15 o'clock. Much of the property was lost; the water supply was meager and little help was given. The buildings were partly insured. The burnt district will be rebuilt quickly. About \$25,000 will cover the damage.

MORE STARS FOR NAVAL FLAG

The navy department has issued a general order of flags used in the naval service to have two additional stars added, making forty-eight in all. The stars are to be arranged in six rows of eight each with the corresponding stars of each row in a vertical line. This design was recommended by the joint army and navy board and has the approval of President Taft. None of the new flags will be flown, however, until July 4 next.

STEAM YACHT IN PORT.

The handsome steam yacht Isis arrived in port yesterday afternoon. On board are some leading New York financiers. The Isis is 180 feet long, 25 feet wide with a gross tonnage of 377. She carries a crew of 32 men and is one of the largest yachts that has visited this port during the winter.

SAILORS PLAY SOME BALL.

The ball team from the cruiser North Carolina has added two scalps to their belt since arriving here. Sunday afternoon they were guilty of slaughtering the soldiers team, the score being 28 to 0. It was a horrible massacre. Yesterday afternoon they crossed bats with Keeley's Sluggers, a fast bunch. The game resulted in a victory for the North Carolina team by a score of 6 to 4. The sailors have a very fast team.

GIBSON BROTHERS AWARDED \$2500

U. S. Court of Appeals Reversed Decision of U. S. District Court.

A decision of interest here was rendered by March 5 by the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans.

In March 1910, the Gibson Brothers brought suit in the U. S. District Court for \$2500 for the loss of their schooner Emma Elza, which was lost while under charter to the Manetto Company. The Gibsons were represented by Mr. Jefferson B. Browne and Hon. Wm. H. Malone, Jr. and the Manetto Company by Mr. G. R. Patterson. On the trial of the cause Judge Locke dismissed the libel and refused any compensation. The case was appealed and was argued by Mr. Browne on February 19 at New Orleans. The Manetto Company was represented in New Orleans by Mr. Leoni, of the firm of Denegre and Blair. Last Tuesday the court handed down its decision, reversing Judge Locke and awarding the Gibsons \$2500 and all costs.

"Glad to see you again, Steve," went on Moore. "And say, Steve, just go forward to the jib halliards and hoist that jib."

Sure enough, Steve's ghost hoisted the jib, and coming back, touched his hat, cried "All's well," and vanished. But the other day the ghost got on Moore's nerves, for if there is one thing that the mate is afraid of it is a black cat, and next to that two black cats, and Steve's ghost appeared to Moore with a black cat on each shoulder.

Moore went to Captain Foote.

"See here, cap'n," said he, "I'm through. Ghosts is my middle name, but black cats don't go."

WOMAN IS VISITED BY "DEAD" SISTER

Mrs. John Harding Sees Ghosts When Katie McLean Appears Before Window.

WRONG BODY BURIED

Interment Without Identification of Girl Killed in Accident Leads to Melodrama When She Visits Relative for Social Cup of Tea.

Chicago.—Mrs. John Harding, having been one of the sorrowing relatives who attended the funeral of Mrs. Katherine McLean and saw the body lowered into its grave at Mount Carmel cemetery, naturally was surprised the other morning when Mrs. Katherine McLean rapped on a window at her residence at 9 West Fifty-first street and called through the pane: "Well, sister, how are you?"

Surprised, in fact, is scarcely the word to describe Mrs. Harding's emotion. When Mrs. McLean opened the door and walked in she found her sister crouched behind a table with a face as pale as a sheet, muttering incoherencies about ghosts, banshees and other spirits. It required time and persuasion to induce Mrs. Harding to abandon the protecting table and sit down and be sociable.

"Why, sister," said Mrs. Harding at last, "we thought you were dead!"

"Well, I ain't," retorted Mrs. McLean.

"But, Katie, we buried you."

"Now, Annie," said Mrs. McLean with asperity, "if you're going to talk foolishness I'm going to pack right out of this house and march back to my work. I came out here for a sociable cup of tea and you sit there with a face the color of a platter and try to tell me I'm a ghost. I've no time for such silliness."

"Katie," said Mrs. Harding, solemnly, "as sure as I'm a living woman

your body lies out in its grave at Mount Carmel. We buried you December 27 and a grand funeral it was, too."

"Well, then," replied Mrs. McLean, "you've buried the wrong woman, for I'm no more dead and buried than you are, and I don't thank you for the aspersions. A grand funeral, did you say? Well, you've had your grand funeral for nothing. I can tell you, for I've made up my mind to stay above ground many a day."

"Aha," said Mrs. Harding, seeing a great light, "buried the wrong woman! Now, there's something in that!"

She sat a moment in silence. Then, with a burst of tears, she fell upon her sister's neck.

As a matter of fact the body that lies out in the Harding lot at Mount Carmel cemetery is not that of Mrs. McLean, but of some other woman who much resembles her. The woman was struck by a street car at Fifty-first and State streets and died in five minutes. Before she expired she whispered to the policeman who picked her up that her name was Katie McLean. The police learned that Patrolman Harding of their station had a sister-in-law named Katie McLean and by some process of reasoning arrived at the conclusion that she was the woman killed.

Mrs. Harding was notified of the death and went to an undertaking establishment where an attendant advised her for her own peace of mind not to look at the dead woman's face, because it had been mutilated. She went away, therefore, without even lifting the sheet under which the body lay, and began the preparations for the funeral. In due course the funeral was held and the body buried.

Meanwhile Mrs. McLean, who is employed at a hotel, kept on with her work. Knowing nothing of the funeral she knew of no urgent reason for going to see her sister. The other day, however, surprised at her sister's long silence, she went out to visit her.

Now the Hardings propose to disinter the body about which centered "the grand funeral."

EXPLORING DEAD SEA

Scientists Sounding Waters of Oldest Known Lake.

Motives of Expedition Said to Be Purely Scientific—No Elements of Commercialism Entering Into Ultimate Object.

Jerusalem.—An expedition, the purpose of which is thoroughly to explore the Dead sea and its environs under the leadership of Dr. Bruhl of the University of Berlin, has just arrived from Europe and continued to the scene of its future operations.

The motives of the expedition, so it is emphatically averred by Dr. Bruhl, are purely scientific, with absolutely no elements of commercialism entering into its ultimate object.

The work of exploration will consist in the major part of sounding the depth of various sections of the lake as well as analyzing the complex composition of its waters, studying its shores, investigating the nature of the different minerals that are said to abound in that region, exploring, as far as is possible, the channels of the many rivers and hot water streams, apart from the Jordan, which flow into the sea from both the eastern and western mountain ranges that hem its shore, examining and classifying the varieties of fish that exist in large numbers only in the extreme southeastern section of the lake, which consists mainly of shallows and marshes.

It must be remembered in this connection that the lake has always been firmly maintained by those who visited the Dead sea and wrote treatises about it long ago that no fish of any kind can make their habitat in any part of it, and this long established belief was disproved only recently by a pleasure party of Americans, long resident in the country, who visited the southern end of the lake and discovered fish.

So it remains for the members of the German expedition to arrive at the causes, which undoubtedly must

be due to varying conditions of chemical composition of the water that make it possible for fish to live in certain sections of the lake and not in others; and, in short, to find out everything about this strange body of water from scientific standpoints that is worth knowing.

What ultimate political or commercial motives, if any, underlie the surface of the enterprise time only can show.

This is by no means the first attempt made to explore the Dead sea region. Lieut. W. F. Lynch of the American navy, as early as the year 1848 spent considerable time in research and exploration of that region at the expense of the American government and at great risk to his person.

Despite the hardships, Lieutenant Lynch was fairly successful in taking measurements as well as soundings of different parts of the lake. According to the lieutenant's narrative, the lake measures some 46 miles from north to south and from 6 to 12 miles east and west. Its total surface area was therefore computed to be 250 square miles. Its greatest depth was 1,300 feet at its northern end, and its shallowest part being at its southern extremity, varies from 5 to 15 feet only.

The lake's depression below the sea level is 1,312 feet and a tropical climate makes its temperature almost unbearable during certain seasons of the year.

Crying Baby Is "Exhibit A." Buffalo, N. Y.—A crying baby was offered in evidence, and after much argument between opposing counsel was marked for identification as "Exhibit A" in a case brought up in the city court here. The action is for \$1,000 damages, and the baby is produced as the principal evidence for the plaintiff.

"I desire to offer this infant in evidence," was the announcement of one of the attorneys as a woman came behind the rail bearing a bundle in her arms. The attorney for the defense promptly objected.

"Nobody ever heard of such a proceeding," he said.

"I contend that it is perfectly proper to have the child marked for identification," contended the plaintiff's lawyer.

The argument continued for several minutes, the baby holding his own in the noise-making. Finally the court settled the dispute by directing the stenographer to mark the exhibit.

WOODROW WILSON
GREAT DEMOCRAT

Judge Stringer of Illinois Recognizes Him as the Logical Leader of the Party.

IS FITTED FOR WHITE HOUSE

Statesman, Scholar and Proved Practical Executive, New Jersey Statesman Would Be Ideal Occupant of the Presidential Chair.

BY LAWRENCE B. STRINGER.
Democratic Candidate For the U. S. Senate From Illinois Against Lorimer.

Before meeting Gov. Wilson, I was somewhat predisposed in his favor, from having read many of his productions and having admired the great comprehensive grasp of economic situations which pervades all of his political utterances and writings.

Still while predisposed in his favor, until I had personally met and conversed with him, I was not convinced of his availability as a candidate for President.

Since meeting Gov. Wilson, however, all doubt in that regard, in my own mind, has been removed. Gov. Wilson is presidential timber of the exact kind and quality required at the present time. To begin with he is an intellectual giant, with a broad comprehensive grasp of every public situation. Throughout the east, he is universally regarded as the brainiest American living today. Even in private conversation, his intellectuality scintillates in every sentence he utters. He has a logical and analytical mind. His language is simple, easily understood, yet definite, incisive and convincing. He has been a student of political economy since his boyhood, has written varied books upon the subject and is conceded to be the highest authority upon theories of government in the country today. While our presidents have generally been men of patriotic impulses, honest and conscientious, still few of them have been great intellectually. Thomas Jefferson was an exception to this rule. Woodrow Wilson, if elected president, by reason of his instincts, characteristics, training, fearlessness, patriotism, faith in the people and extraordinary intellectuality would indeed be a second Thomas Jefferson.

Ideal Chief Executive of State. As governor of New Jersey, he has given that state a practical business administration, so conceded by all. He has shown himself to be peculiarly fitted for the executive office along the most practical lines. In meeting him, you are impressed with this fact. The schoolmaster is not in the least in evidence. He is plain, matter of fact, and his conversation is not pedantic or pedagogic, but direct, forceful and earnest.

Above all he is a man of the people. He was born with no silver spoon in his mouth. He is not a man of means or wealth. He is easily approachable. No dignity hedges him about. He resides in a very modest home at Princeton. On knocking at his door, no servant, liveried or otherwise, met us at the portals. It was the governor himself who opened the door for us, welcomed us in, took our hats and wraps and laid them aside, ushered us into his library, made us feel at home and talked to us neighbors who had dropped in for a casual call. There are no frills nor furbelows about him. He is essentially Jeffersonian. As governor of New Jersey, he has fought for the plain people and they love him. In doing so, he has antagonized the interests. He knows it, but doesn't care. He has faith in the people and takes them into his confidence.

Sense of Duty Supreme.

I also found him to be a man of positive convictions with the courage of the same. He is fearless in his expressions of opinions. If they do not agree with your opinion, he is sorry, but he does not trim his views to conform with yours. His sense of duty is supreme. He would not change his views, unless convinced that he was wrong, even though it made him president. He is not a trimmer. He is not a politician, but is a statesman, in all that word implies. He abhors machine politics and machine methods. He does nothing behind closed doors. Everything with him is in the open and he has no political or public secrets. What he says to you, he is willing the world should know. He is the soul of integrity and honor and he stands today as the one great champion of progressive ideas of government in state and nation. If elected president, no machine leaders, bosses or fractions, will control or influence him. His sense of duty alone will actuate him.

Altogether I was exceedingly well impressed with Gov. Wilson as a man, as a statesman, as an executive and as a possible, if not a probable, future president. He seems to combine in one personality, great intellectuality, simplicity, modesty, fearlessness in the discharge of duty, sterling character, honesty of motive, effectiveness, executive ability, energy, enthusiasm, rugged honesty, practicality and Jeffersonian democracy. And what more what more would anyone want?

DELEHANTY TO RETIRE

Veteran Baseball Player Wants to Be Policeman.

Story Circulated in Cleveland That Second Baseman of Detroit Tigers Took Examination for Job on Police Force.

Jim Delehanty, veteran baseball player and second baseman of the Detroit Tigers, may quit the game after more than a decade of strenuous work on the diamond with various teams to become a policeman at Cleveland, says a special dispatch to the Chicago News. It was announced that Delehanty had taken the examination and had won sixth place on the eligibility list. There are 100 men on the eligible list.

Delehanty walked off with great honors in the physical examination at the Orange avenue bath house and in the mental examination his showing was also far above the average.

Delehanty lives at 11908 Superior avenue, Cleveland, and is a member of the Detroit baseball team. He has been a member of that team for three years and prior to that time he was a Washington player.

The intimation that Delehanty is "all in" recalls the record he made in a game with the Philadelphia Athletics last fall when his terrific batting was the feature. It is as follows:

His first time up saw Del hit the ball at a mile-a-minute gait to left field. In the fourth inning he hit a terrific grass-cutter to Baker. The latter just barely fielded the ball, and when he made a belated throw to first Del scrambled to second. In the fifth inning Del poked a clean hit to center field.

It was in the seventh inning when Delehanty pulled off his greatest hit. This was a line drive to deep right, and although Murphy fielded the ball in a hurry, the pill was hit so hard that

New York.—No better news has come from India in many a long day than the report that an organized movement in the interests of marriage reform is now being pushed forward there with every promise of final success. By final success is meant the abolition of that horrible practice of child marriages, which has brought

about the decadence of so many millions of Hindus.

About three years ago a California girl, Miss Carrie A. Tennant, went to India with the purpose of trying to ameliorate the benighted condition of her sex in the Far East and of pointing the way to a more sane and happy life for them. She did not have any very definite notions as to how she could uplift the native women of India, but she wisely concluded that she must first study the actual social conditions and enlist men of light and leading in her cause before organizing for a practical crusade.

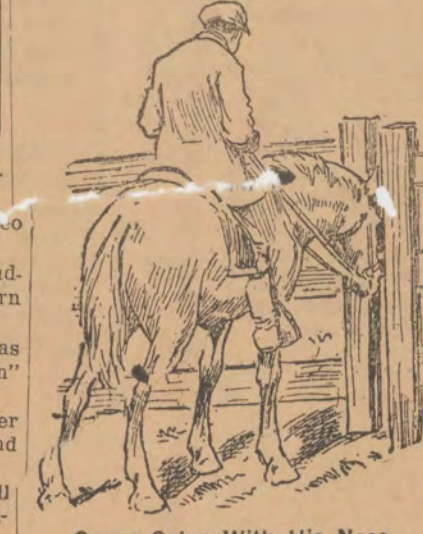
Miss Tennant proceeded to Calcutta, there to take up her work. Quite hopeless seemed her efforts in the earlier stages of her sojourn to gain a hearing from the influential men and women to whom she appealed for support. The natives of India are suspicious of foreigners, and they were inclined to look askance at pretty Miss Tennant when she talked about wanting to help the native women free themselves from the thralldom of their unholy traditions. Meanwhile she was busy with her eyes and her camera, and a picture taken by her is here reproduced.

From a superficial glimpse it would seem that the true regeneration of India lies with her daughters. Certainly, in the scale of nations India cannot rise unless and until her women rise. The stamina of men depends on healthy and intelligent mothers; hence the real foundation of the state is motherhood.

HORSES THAT OPEN GATES

Kansas City Stock Yards Animals Learn the Trick and the Accomplishment Proves a Great Convenience.

Kansas City.—Usually the horse that learns the trick of unlatching a gate uses his knowledge to gain freedom for himself and cause dismay to his owner. At the Kansas City stock yards it is the other way around.

horses learn to unhook and open gates with his nose, and the accomplishment is a great convenience to his driver and helps the horse to hold his job against other equine competition—for draft horses at the stock yards are extremely well treated.

The idea is this. That section of the yards where the most hauling is done is a network of pens and alleys. The alleys must be equipped with frequent gates, swinging either way, to make it possible to handle stock in and out of the pens. A hay wagon in the average day's run must pass through about 150 gates, not counting the ones found open. You may judge for yourself if the process of the driver dismounting, opening the gate, remounting and driving on, repeated that many times, would not consume a large slice of the working day.

Hence the educated horses.
