PRESIDENT GOMEZ WANTS MARTIAL LAW ESTABLISHED IN HIS COUNTRY

Asks Cuban Congress to Pass Law Authorizing Action to Prevent Trouble

AN OUTRAGED WOMAN SCHOOL TEACHER DIES

General Estenoz Claims to Have Hanged Perpetrator of the Crime—it is Rumored That a Negro Uprising is Planned in the City of Havana

Havana, June 4.—Practically the only real development in the Cuban situation yesterday was a special message sent to the senate in the afternoon by President Gomez in which he asked for enactment of a law granting him authority to suspend the constitutional guarantees in any or all parts of the republic when in his judgment such action might become necessary in the present negro uprising.

The message was received without comment and referred to the committee on laws for action. The senate meets again tomorrow when the committee will probably render its report. It is probable that favorable action will be recommended and the president will be empowered to suspend the guarantees as requested. There was no session of the lower house yesterday as no quorum was present.

Rapid Campaign.

The suspension of the constitutional guarantees is equivalent to the declaration of martial law. It is not understood that the president has any intention of its immediate application in any part of the republic other than the affected district in Oriente province, although he desires the authority to act immediately should it become necessary in other provinces. The message was significant, perhaps, in speaking of the necessity of "terminating the armed revolution in a rapid campaign."

The president's action was commended in some quarters yesterday with the more or less insistent but intangible rumors that there was danger of an uprising in the city of Havana. The police are taking the fullest precautions against surprise and reiterate their assurance that there is no danger. The rumors seem to be based chiefly on the reports that the hardware stores have had an unusual call for knives from negro customers, and the absence from their accustomed haunts of some members of the race.

Police Reports.

The only known confirmation of such a movement among Havana negroes was conveyed in a report by Lieutenant Carlos Garcia Sierra, of the Havana police force, to Captain Pacheco yesterday that he had confidential information that a number of Havana negroes who planned to join the Estenoz uprising had been held in meetings in a stable belonging to the department of public works in Figueras street.

The Alleged Signal.

The signal for the beginning of the

uprising, he said, was to be the setting fire to the stable. Lieutenant Sierra gave Captain Pacheco the names of several negroes who he claimed were in the plot.

Reports concerning the same negroes were made to Captain Pacheco by Policeman Antonio Jimenez and Ignacio Herrera. Orders were given for the arrest of the suspected men and four were taken into custody. Their homes were searched but nothing incriminating was found. They were sent to the vivac pending further investigation.

President's Message.

President Gomez's message asking for authority to suspend the guarantees follows:

"The grave disturbance of order which threatens the peace of the nation obliges me to ask the honorable congress, in fulfillment of the provisions of the constitution, that the legislative power, with its customary intelligence and appreciating the situation through which the republic is passing, pass a law authorizing me to suspend the constitutional guarantees in all of the national territory or in any part of the same."

"As an enemy of extreme measures I have tried to suffocate the present seditious movement without asking congress to pass the law which I now seek, but the necessity of terminating the armed insurrection in a rapid campaign, avoiding international complications and saving the cause of order and of civilization, obliges me to go to the legislative bodies to obtain from them the measure which I will know how to make use of with the same moderation that characterizes all of my acts."

La Maya Burning.

The United States attaches little importance to the burning of La Maya by the insurgents, according to a statement made yesterday by Secretaries Sangnily and Laredo Bru. The American government, they said, regarded the burning as only an incident likely to happen in any armed uprising.

Teacher Succumbs.

Miss Concepcion Urena, the 23-year-old school teacher who was attacked by seven negroes near San Luis several days ago, has died from her injuries in a hospital at Santiago de Cuba, according to dispatches received from the capital of Oriente yesterday.

Miss Urena had charge of a country school near San Luis, and was attacked as she was on her way home. Estenoz, the negro leader, declared that he had hanged the men guilty of the outrage.

Baltimore, Md., June 4.—With the removal from Washington to this city next week of the national headquarters of the various candidates for the Democratic Presidential nomination, the real activities of the contest will center here.

Headquarters to be moved here are those of Governor Woodrow Wilson, Speaker Champ Clark, Governor Judson Harmon and Mr. Oscar W. Underwood.

Secretary Urey Woodson of the National Committee, is expected in the city this week to open headquarters. The meeting of the National Committee will be held in the Fifth Regiment Armory and the Belvidere Hotel.

The committee will have few, if any contests to pass upon, its chief work will be to select the temporary officers of the convention and approve arrangements that have been made at the armory.

ITALIANS PLOT TO KILL WHILE IN JAIL

Are Seeking Vengeance on Men Who Were Instrumental in Sending Them

New York, June 4.—Behind the bars of the federal prison at Atlanta several members of the Lupo Morelio gang of counterfeiters and murderers have hatched a plot to assassinate William J. Flynn, chief of the local division of the secret service, who ran the counterfeiters to bay, and George W. Ray, of the United States District Court, who sentenced the coiners to terms of from fifteen to thirty years at hard labor.

One of the Sicilians told the plot, which was hatched last December when two Sicilians who visited Ignazio Lupa, known as "the Wolf," were told to kill the secret service chief.

Even while the trial of this gang of counterfeiters was going on, Judge Ray received a threat of death at his home in Chenango County, in a letter which read:

"If Lupo, Morelio and their companions are not liberated, you will die like a dog. We have killed better men than you, Smith and Flynn."

The Smith referred to was Abel I. Smith, the assistant United States attorney who prosecuted the counterfeiters.

ALLEN ESCAPES THE ELECTRIC CHAIR

After Deliberating Two Hours Jury Finds Him Guilty in 2nd Degree

Wytheville, Va., June 4.—After deliberating two hours and a half, the jury in the trial of Claude Swanson Allen this afternoon found him guilty of murder in the second degree for the killing of Judge Thornton L. Massie. They recommended that his punishment be fixed at fifteen years in the State penitentiary at Richmond.

Sentence was suspended in order that the prisoner may testify in the trial of others charged with shooting up the Carroll County Court on March 14 last, when five persons were killed by the Allen clan.

Four other indictments against Claude Allen are pending, on any one of which he may be found guilty of first degree murder. The prosecution, taking advantage of this fact, sprung a surprise on the defense when it announced that it would next go into the trial of Claude Allen for the murder of Sheriff Lewis Webb. The defense raised objection to this, and the objection will be argued and passed upon when court reconvenes July 1.

STRIKE SITUATION IN LONDON SERIOUS

110,000 Workers Are Idle And Starvation Threatens Them Now

London, June 4.—It was estimated this morning that 110,000 transport workers and dockmen are idle in greater London.

The employers deny these figures, declaring that they have more men employed today than Saturday. There seems little doubt of the correctness of the figures, however. The union pickets are active in preventing the employment of strikebreakers.

There is already much suffering among the strikers, many of whom are threatened with starvation unless a speedy settlement is reached.

CONGRESS WILL WORK VERY HARD THIS WEEK

A Few Senators Still Hoping for Adjournment Before Convention

Washington, June 4.—The appropriation bills will be passed, tariff revision fight continued, the Lorimer case debated and other legislation discussed in congress this week.

A few senators still believe there is a bare chance of adjournment this month. The house chemical tariff revision bill is pending in the senate this week.

24 HOUR CLOCKS IN FRANCE AFTER NOW

50'clock Will be 17 O'clock in Gay Paree From This Time on

Paris, June 4.—Beginning at midnight, the hour of the day will be numbered from 1 to 24, from midnight to midnight, on all French railroads and in the postal and telegraphic services.

Timetables for all the roads under the new scheme have been printed and instead of 5 p. m., for instance, the number seventeen is used, while 11 p. m. becomes 23 o'clock, and so on. Postmarks on all mail matter will be similarly registered hereafter. This will do away with the necessity for the use of a. m. and p. m.

It is believed that the system will be generally adopted in Paris and throughout France and the demand for "twenty-four hour" clocks is widespread.

STATE DEPARTMENT TAKES DARKER VIEW

Does Not Believe Situation in Cuba as Bright as is Painted

Washington, June 4th.—A distinct improvement in the conditions in the neighborhood of Daiquiri, Cuba, is reported to the State Department today from New York headquarters of the iron company, whose plant was threatened by the insurgents.

The State Department, however, has no advices of its own. The fact that the gunboat Paducah, which was expected to sail from Daiquiri Sunday morning for Santiago to look into a threatening situation at El Cobre, where there are a large American interests, has not quit Daiquiri, is regarded as an indication that Commander Mitchell does not believe conditions would be safe without a warship there.

There is a lack of encouragement, however, in reports from other points in Cuba. The consuls, while not reporting any actual uprisings, indicate the existence of unrest.

FOREIGNERS FLEE FROM TROUBLE ZONE

One Province in Mexico is Almost Depopulated by War Scare

Chihuahua, Mex., June 4.—Out of a normal foreign population of at least 2,000, this city contains exactly 106 foreign residents today. Of the 1,000 Americans who ordinarily live here, only 35 men and 12 women remain. An official census issued today shows that fear of an attack on the rebel city by the advancing federalists has practically depopulated the town. Thirty thousand people inhabit Chihuahua in time of peace, but today less than 20,000 are here and the exodus is daily growing larger.

Besides the Americans here there are 26 British subjects, of whom 12 are women and 33 Germans, of whom 8 are women.

NEW YORK TIMES SPEAKS OF SITUATION IN CUBA

Prominent Metropolitan Paper Says it is Question of Race Supremacy

New York, June 4.—The New York Times commenting on the Cuban situation says:

"Observers seem to be of the opinion that the long truce between the races has been broken at last and that hereafter the relations between the two races in Cuba will have to be on about the same basis as they are elsewhere, with the superiority, the political and social, of one or the other clearly and permanently recognized. One race or the other must govern Cuba—and it will not be the black race."

TWO GERMAN AVIATORS DASHED TO THEIR DEATH

Monoplane Plunged While on Big Circuit and Occupants Killed

Bremen, Germany, June 4.—Albert Buchstatter, one of the best known German aviators, and his passenger, Lieutenant Steele, of the German army, were killed today when their monoplane plunged on the northwestern aviation circuit of 425 miles.

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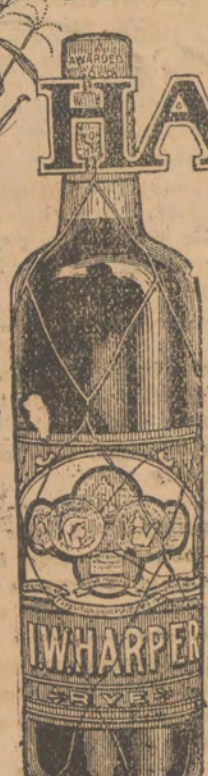

WEAKEST AGAINST STRONGEST.

(From The Times-Union.)

Some of the Wilson papers are claiming that as Roosevelt will probably be the Republican nominee Wilson should be put up against him. Their logic is fearfully and wonderfully made.

Why do they think that Roosevelt will win the Republican nomination? Evidently because he has shown great strength with the Republican masses. In the large majority of the states where primaries were held he has won. We cannot understand the reasoning that leads to the conclusion that he should be opposed by the Democrat who has lost in nearly all the states in which primaries have been held.

Take the states east of the Mississippi. In the Massachusetts primary Roosevelt was defeated by the slenderest margin. Woodrow Wilson was defeated two to one. Both won in New Jersey, but New Jersey is Woodrow Wilson's state. In Maryland Roosevelt won and Woodrow Wilson lost. In Ohio Roosevelt won by a large majority. Woodrow Wilson lost by a large majority. Ohio is Harmon's home state but it is also Tatt's. In Illinois Roosevelt won by a large majority. By a still larger portion of the votes Wilson lost. In Wisconsin Roosevelt lost and Wilson won.

Wilson also lost overwhelmingly in Georgia, Florida and Mississippi where the Republicans held no primaries.

West of the Mississippi the same story is told. Roosevelt and Wilson won in Minnesota and lost in North Dakota. Roosevelt won in Kansas, California and Nebraska. Wilson lost in all three. Roosevelt and Wilson won in Oregon and Wilson in Texas.

So here is the record of the two as shown in primaries. Roosevelt carried New Jersey, Maryland, Ohio, Illinois, Kansas, Nebraska, Oregon and California, states with 225 votes in all and lost Massachusetts, Wisconsin, and North Dakota—72 votes—a net advantage for Roosevelt of 153 votes.

Wilson won in New Jersey, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Oregon and Texas—states having 136 votes—and lost in Massachusetts, Maryland, Georgia, Florida, Mississippi, Ohio, Illinois, North Dakota, Kansas, Nebraska and California—states with 312 votes—a net disadvantage of 176 votes.

This includes only states that have held presidential preference primaries which may be taken as an indication of the popularity of the candidates with the masses of the respective parties. Judged by the votes of the primaries the Woodrow Wilson papers wish to put up the most unpopular Democrat against the most popular Republican. We could understand the motive of Republican papers in advocating such a course. We cannot understand the motive of Democratic papers in doing so.

It is an old saying that the Democrats can always be relied upon to do the wrong thing at the critical time. This has been true during the greater part of the party's history. It is not house since Underwood has been leader. The old propensity of the party transferred to the Republicans. We half of whose delegates have been elected in opposition to Wilson, will elect him. It would be worse than folly. It would be nothing short of insanity.

Every Cloud has its silver lining. This cheering statement is passed along for the benefit of defeated Candidates and others.

The fact that President Gomez of Cuba has asked authority to enforce martial law on the island lends rather a serious aspect to the situation.

DIET AND HEALTH HINTS

FOOD VS. MEDICINE.

Dr. F. Magendie, the celebrated French physician, says, in one of his published lectures: "When I was chief physician at Hotel Dieu hospital, Paris, some 3,500 patients passed through my hands during a year. Before my term expired I tried the experiment of giving one-half of the patients that were then present no medicine at all; the rest the usual medical treatment. The former were given, instead, only what is known as 'food and simple remedies,' and, to my unbounded surprise, they all got well—not a single death; while among those receiving medical treatment the customary number of deaths occurred. A second trial yielded a like result, and I was converted. Ever since I have given but little medicine to my patients." This is the practice of modern sanitariums now, and especially of the tuberculosis sanitariums, in which food is the essential treatment. While it is not probable that medicines will be entirely eliminated, diet will be the chief means of cure in all cases in the future, as it now is in diabetes, rheumatism, consumption, Bright's disease and others.

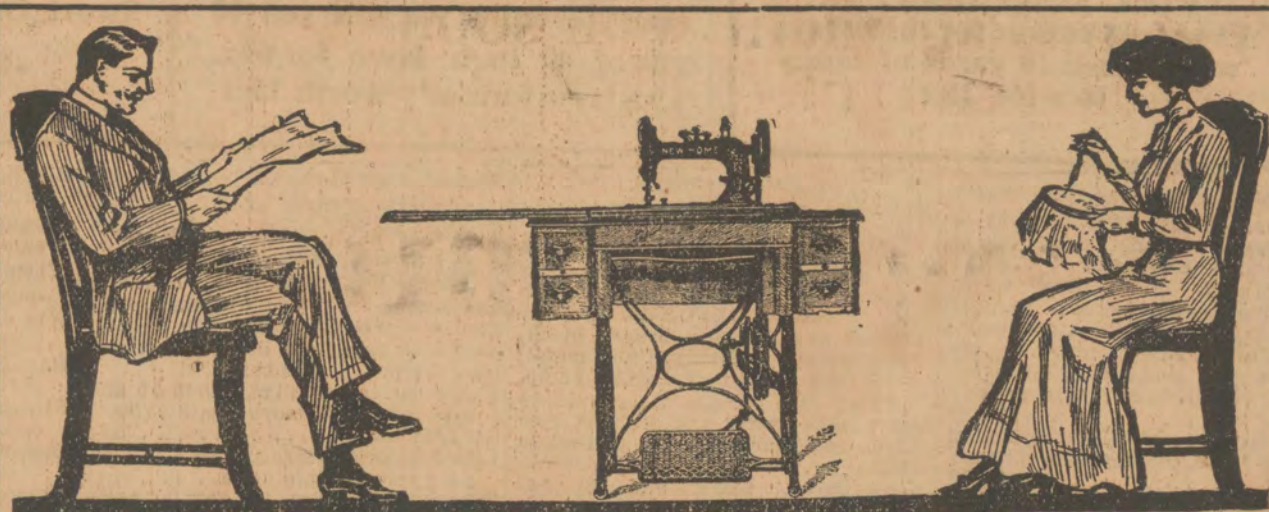

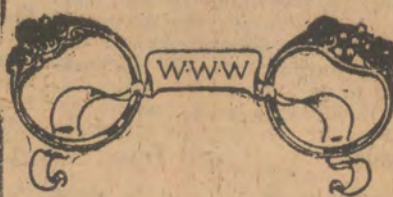

DIET AND HEALTH HINTS

By DR. T. J. ALLEN
Food Specialist

EGGS, MEAT AND MILK SHOULD NOT BE EATEN TOGETHER BY CONSUMPTIVES.

Dr. David R. Lyman holds that eggs are not necessary in the diet of the tuberculous patient. This we think should be apparent from the fact that there is nothing in eggs which can not be obtained better in the average case from milk, which, however, should not be taken in its sweet form, in which the curd of cow's milk is extremely indigestible for the adult. The whole milk should be converted into buttermilk, in which the curd is so broken up as to be much more easily digested. The purpose in feeding the tubercular person is to furnish the amount of fat, albumen and carbohydrate that can be assimilated, in the form requiring the expenditure of the least energy for digestion and assimilation, and with the least risk of leaving an indigestible and unassimilable remnant, especially of eggs, meat or milk. Albumen uncoagulated by high temperature as in uncooked eggs, milk and raw meat, is much more easily assimilated than that of bread or baked beans or boiled or fried eggs, and the fat of eggs and milk is much more easily assimilated than beef fat or of pork or roasted peanuts, but the mixture of eggs and milk with beefsteak or even bread, as is customary in the ordinary feeding of the tuberculous, is a violation of a fundamental principle of the monodiet and is counter to the suggestion in the circular of information on the feeding of the tuberculous issued by the State of Illinois—that as far as possible these foods should be eaten at the same meal that digest in about the same time.
