Many of the cities over the country
are offering through their Boards of
Trade, prizes for the best catch phrase
to be applied to their town. Here we
have one already and one so good that
other towns are trying to take it away
from us.
"The Cigar City," that's a bang-up
logan, one that does not exaggerate
and one that if persistently hammered
into the public consciousness is bound
to go a long way toward making Key
West known as it should be, as
"The Cigar City."

Following is the article referred to:
Some men have the faculty of com-
pressing into ten words a fuller mean-
ing than most can place less clearly in
a hundred. The chap who first wrote
that immortal phrase, "You press the
button, we do the rest," did more for
amateur photography than anyone else,
except perhaps the man who made the
camera. Ever since then there has
been a tremendous appreciation of the
value of a catch-phrase to describe
an advantage or a business policy or
otherwise to standardize an article
of a whole line of goods.

In the last few weeks there was in
New York a contest for several thou-
sand dollars in cash prizes, to furnish
the best phrases for a list of goods to
be advertised on an electric sign.
Some of the winning phrases are as
follows: for an alarm clock, "The
clock for rising you get me;" for a
brand of codfish, "a delicious treat in
place of meat;" for an adding machine,
you can bank on it—many banks do;"
for a photograph, "all we as is a hear-
ing;" for scales, "the right way to
weigh right."

The selling value of a picturequely
original name that catches public at-
tention is well shown in the rubber tire
market. It is said that naming a stock
automobile tire the "no-run-out tire"
has resulted in increasing its sales
600 per cent over the time when it
was not known by this name, only two
years ago. Naturally such a name vir-
tualizes an advertisement by telling the
buyer in three words that here is just
what he wants.—The New Idea.

PANAMA CANAL IS ABSOLUTELY SOLID

A Test of the Great Ditch
Will Be Made on June
14 of This Year

Mr. E. Davidson, whose home is in
Pittsburgh, where he is engaged in the
sand and gravel business, was at the
Jefferson last night. He is just from
Canal Zone. In company with Col.
Seibert, one of the government engi-
neers, Mr. Davidson made a trip over
the Canal. He spoke interestingly
last night from our demonstration
of this latest and greatest wonder of the
world. The Culbreth Cut and the Gatun
locks naturally attracted his atten-
tion, as also the locks on the Pacific
end. The amount of concrete used in
their construction is incalculable, and
as a result, all danger of caving-in
which some cities have feared, is elimi-
nated.

"Perhaps," said Mr. Davidson, "the
best example I can give you of the
colossal strength characteristic of this
canal, is that the two lock gates at
Gatun weigh 600 tons each. The
were made in my home town, Pitts-
burgh, by the McChesney-Marshall
Construction Co. We went over the route
in an observation car and marvelled at
the almost infinite amount of concrete
used, especially in the Culbreth Cut.
I can't for the life of me see how the
walls of any part of the Canal can burst
when at places they consist of concrete
several feet thick. Col. Seibert told us
that a portion of the Canal will be tes-
ted on June 14 next when a boat will
be sent through. It is a work the mag-
nitude of which will not be duplicated
in a long time, and perhaps never
surpassed."

HOME FOR THE DOWN AND OUTS RUN HERE

A. J. Willis Attempting to
Care for the Fallen In
Practical Way

There is an institution in this city
which merits support from the public.
It is called the Shelter Lodging House
and it is located at 204 Eaton street.
As the name denotes it is a place where
men who, temporarily, are "down and
out" may find a shelter, a bite to eat
and a cheering word from Mr. Willis
the proprietor. He has had vast ex-
perience in picking up men and put-
ting them on their feet. Hundreds of
rehabilitated men "found themselves"
owing to the assistance rendered by
Mr. Willis when he was doing similar
work in New Orleans, Tampa, Pensacola,
Jacksonville, Charleston, Savannah
and Norfolk. The press of those cities
lauded his work and he has the satisfac-
tion of knowing that scores of men
were mere hulks of humanity, slothful
and jettison on the tide of life, are now
respectable citizens. That is his mis-
sion in Key West. Instead of giving
money to men who in a great many
cases are liable to spend it for liquor
instead of for food, the public should
send them to the Shelter Lodging
House where for a trifling sum they
may obtain lodging, a lunch and possi-
bly employment. Mr. Willis endeavor-
s to make the work pay its way, but
it is up-hill work. With a little co-
operation on the part of the citizens
of Key West this refuge may be made
to solve the problem of the unemploy-
ed.

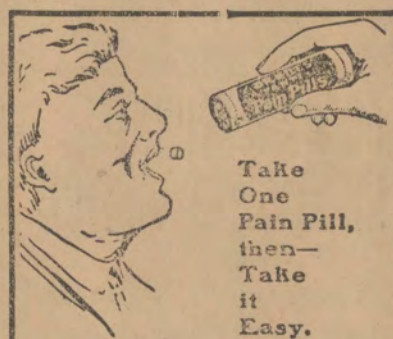

EGYPT'S MUMMIFIED MONKEYS

Some Specimens of the Hideous Objects Found in the Tomb of Amenhotep II.

Boston, Mass.—It is no strange thing for a man to have household pets chosen from among the numberless forms of life in the animal world, but his attachment is seldom so great as to result in the preservation of their bodies after death, as was done by some of the ancient rulers of Egypt.

Possibly the man of today who erects a monument to mark the last resting place of his pet dog would gladly follow in the footsteps of the Egyptian by preserving the remains

of various other pets, if he knew how. It is much better that he does not possess this knowledge. For one thing, the country would be more or less littered up with animal mummies, and we have about all the junk we can consistently care for as it is.

When Amenophis, or Amenhotep II., succeeded his father, Thothmes III., on the throne of Egypt in 1814 B. C., he was destined to a short reign. It was a lively one, however, for he took Nineveh by assault and conquered the Ethiopians. Some writers even identify him with Menmon, who fought in the Trojan war. One would scarcely expect so active a warrior to spend much of his time in fondling pets about the palace, yet this King was very fond of monkeys and enjoyed having many of them around him during his reign of about a dozen years. This has been proven in recent years by the finding in his tomb of their mummified remains.

Other curious contents of the tomb were mummified ducks and chickens, but it is not likely these were considered as pets by this old-time ruler. These latter were preserved in wooden vessels, carved to represent the bird they contained in this old tomb, the oldest finds in this old tomb, however, was a vessel containing honey, which had retained its delicious flavor all these thousands of years since Amenhotep II. himself was laid away amid such strange surroundings.

A look at the picture, showing some of his companions, impels one to wonder if the King's slumber was ever broken by any strange or fantastic dreams.

PINES RELICS OF DIM PAST

There Are Now but Two Small Groves of the Torrey Species in the World.

San Diego, Cal.—Possibly no other tree that grows has so small a geographic range as the Torrey pine. There are but two small groves of this species of pine in the world. One is about 15 miles north of San Diego, Cal., and the other is on Santa Rosa group. It is evident that the Torrey pine, like the giant redwoods of the Sierras and the Monterey cypress, is a relic of a past geological epoch.

The grove north of San Diego is the largest of the two that still exist. Here the trees are found close to the ocean, on a rugged and inhospitable coast, where they are swept alternate-

ly by the westerly winds off the Pacific, and by hot blasts from the deserts in the interior. Probably it is owing to this situation that the trees are dwarfed in size, and that most of them are grotesque and fantastic in shape.

When planted in favorable regions, the Torrey pines grow tall and straight, and grow very rapidly. They are of little value for the purpose of the lumberman, and are not often planted except for shade and ornamental purposes.

Dies of a Broken Heart.

Hempstead, L. I.—Extreme grief over the tragic fate of her little girl caused Mrs. Kate Bleowski to die of a broken heart. Last week the little one was fatally burned at a bonfire in front of her home here and as she was carried into the house the mother collapsed. She remained in a semi-conscious condition until her death. The attending physician says that her death was due solely to a broken heart.

CONTRACTS ARE WEAK

Deals With Players Have No Legal Standing.

Owners Usually Show Willingness to Compromise When Suit is Threatened Backed by Money and Influential Friends.

Baseball men frequently have admitted that the form of player's contract in vogue in all the major and minor leagues—under the protection of "organized baseball"—will not stand the test in a court of law for the reason that it contains a ten days' notice of release clause, while the player, under compulsion, must give an option on his services for the following year. In short, the player can be held for an indefinite period at a salary dictated by his employer or he can be discharged in midseason with no chance to collect salary after the expiration of the stipulated ten days, while also he can be sent to any other club which may buy his release without his consent.

In the cases of players who threaten court proceedings and appear to have money and influential friends to help them the magnates usually show a willingness to compromise rather than have the contract torn to shreds in court. But in many cases recalcitrant players have been gradually forced into obscurity after resorting to such methods, so that the rank and file have become resigned to existing conditions rather than get themselves into a peck of trouble.

But contracts signed by managers, as a rule, are different. Many of them are iron-clad, personal contracts with club-owners, having no release clause. Joe Kelley, when manager of the Boston Nationals, was bound by such a contract and was sustained by the late President H. C. Pulliam when the Boston club tried to discard him before the term of the contract expired. Kelley was paid in full, though he was supplanted by another manager. William J. Murray, when managing the Philadelphia Nationals, had an iron-clad contract, but was released, with two years left. He appealed to the National league directors, but could get no satisfaction, so was forced to compromise the matter with his employers, who paid him a lump sum to quit.

The case of Jack Ryan, who has managed the Jersey City team of three years has similar features and is attracting much attention. Ryan has been identified with organized baseball for 22 years and now finds himself in a trying predicament. He intends to have the directors of the Eastern league pass upon his case, and if they decide against him he will appeal to the board of arbitration of the National Association of Minor leagues.

Manager of Lincoln (Neb.) Team Accidentally Shot While Cleaning Small Caliber Rifle.

Robert A. Unglaub, former first baseman of the Washington American league baseball club, was injured accidentally the other day at Griffield, Md., while preparing for a hunt. The ball player, now manager of the Lin-

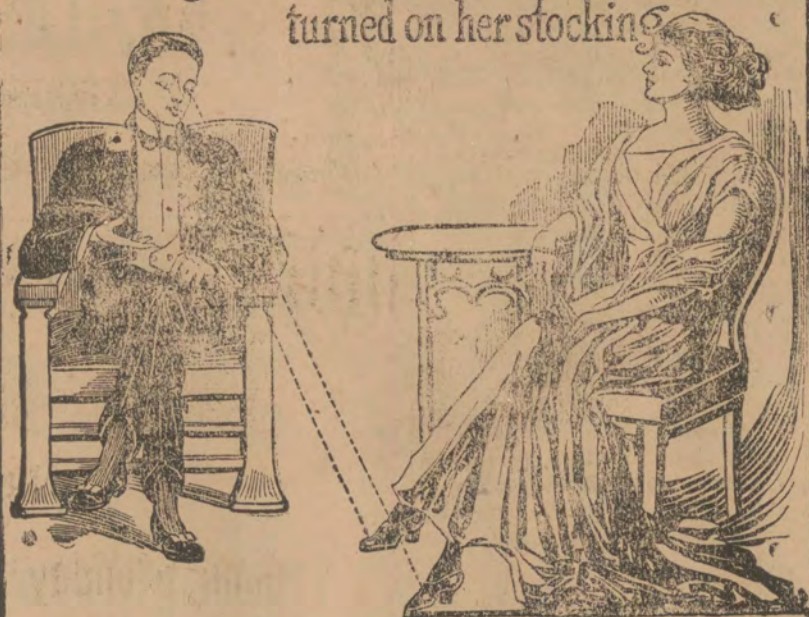

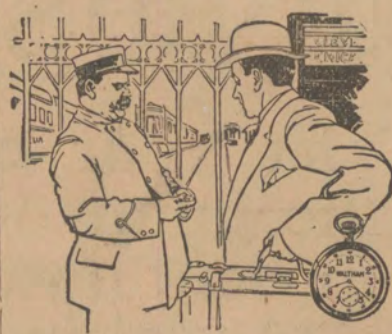
