Revolt in Cuba a Spasmodic Uprising of Restless Negroes

Cuban Government Says it Will Suppress the Rebellion by One Crushing Blow

CUBAN TROOPS ASSEMBLED IN 15 MINUTES

Cuba Central Railroad Station Raided--Veterans Are Loyal to the Government--Zayas Offers Presi- dent Gomez His Unconditional Support

Havana, May 22.—While small bands of negroes are reported to be arming themselves in various portions of the island, the uprising is generally regarded as a spasmodic affair and it is believed that the government will suppress the trouble makers within a very short time.

Indecisive Fights.
Four fights were reported by Secretary Laredo Bru of the department of government, last night as having taken place in Santa Clara province. The results are not definitely known but they are reported to have been indecisive. No casualties were given. The government forces in all the fights were in command of Captain Iglesias, while the negroes in three of the engagements, were under Colonel Pacheco. In the four fights the negroes were under Colonel Armenteros, who was reported yesterday afternoon to have been killed. Last night's reports indicate that he is still alive.

Captain Iglesias said that the negroes would flee as fast as he could overtake them. They would fire one volley and run, he said.

Fight With Estenoz.
Captain Perez of the rural guard fought General Estenoz's band last night. Two guards were wounded. It is not known if there were losses on the side of the negroes. Captain Castillo was reported at two o'clock this morning with eighty men close behind General Yvonet.

Situation in Oriente.
The situation in Oriente province is considered more serious than in any other place. The reports from that section vary greatly. Secretary Laredo Bru of the department of government stated last night that 140 was the maximum number of men out there. A cablegram received last night stated that there were 2,000 men out in Oriente. Other information received indicates that considerably less than 1,000 negroes are scattered in many bands from Santiago and Guantanamo.

The largest band in the Oriente is under the joint command of Generals Yvonet and Estenoz. They are reported to be massed at San Jose farm, which is the property of Yvonet.

Negro Gang Surprised.
A Santiago telegram received last night stated that the rural guard surprised a camp of negroes Monday night capturing its two leaders.

Mayor Wants Arms.
The mayor of Guantanamo has asked the governor of Oriente province to supply him with 100 rifles in order that he may arm private

citizens to defend the city.

Serious in Cienfuegos.

A telegram from Cienfuegos states the situation in that district is considered serious. Numerous bands of negroes are reported to be stealing horses despite the efforts of the rural guards to run them down. A band took possession of the Cuban Central railroad (English corporation) station at Santisimo Trinidad, breaking all the telegraph instruments and carrying off two cans of kerosene. The telegraph wires have been cut between Cienfuegos and Sagua.

Country Stores Looted.
A Holguin telegram states that Abdon Respal, chief of the Independent Colored party in that section, has gone out with 15 negroes and that various country stores have been looted of provisions, saddles and arms. The negroes cut the wires between Holguin and Aguado.

Disarm Rural Guards?
A Cienfuegos telegram reports the rumor that a band of forty negroes surprised the rural guard post at Ariza, seizing the arms and ammunition of the guards and then disappearing.

Beaupre Canard.
Several newspapers printed reports yesterday afternoon that Arthur M. Beaupre, the American minister, had offered the Cuban government the use of 2,000 marines stationed at the Guantanamo naval station. General Montague stated at midnight this morning that there was no truth in the report.

Zayas Offers Services.
Dr. Alfredo Zayas, vice-president of the republic, called on President Gomez yesterday and expressed his indignation at the attempt on the stability of the republic. He offered the president his unconditional support.

Veterans Are Loyal.
The veteran's association is considered to be absolutely loyal to the government. General Nunez and other prominent veterans have assured President Gomez that they condemn the uprising and are disposed to take the field if necessary to preserve the republic. In several localities veterans have organized and gone in pursuit of negro bands.

Foreign Property Attacked.
A body of negroes are reported to have taken possession of the stores of the Juraguá mines of the Spanish-American Iron Company yesterday, stealing all the supplies. Complaint was immediately made to Arthur M. Beaupre, the American minister.

He is not decided as yet as to his plans, except that he will give up the manufacturing business for the time at least. He will still make his home in Tampa.—Tampa Tribune.

MIAMI MAN WILL BUILD A FOUR-STORY HOTEL

Frank Gallat Will Build \$35,000 Structure With Fifty Rooms

Plans have been received by Mr. Frank Gallat for a four-story hotel which he will build on 9th street and the river.

The building is to be of concrete, and will cost about \$35,000. Mr. Gallat says that no expense will be spared to make it the best equipped hotel on the coast. There will be at least 50 rooms on the four floors. A spacious lobby will occupy a part of what may be termed the second story and the first story is set a couple of feet below the surface, like a shallow basement.—Miami Metropolis.

One Of The Largest
Sponge Seen For Some
Time Sold Yesterday

Sponge sales in the local market yesterday were very close to the four thousand dollars again. Some fine lots of wool sponge were sold and brought fancy prices. One of the notable sales of the day was a single wool sponge of very fine quality and of large dimensions, purchased by E. J. Arapian for \$8.29. This is quite a fancy price for one sponge. Another large one was bought by John Roberts for \$6.29.

While sales of sponge this week have not been large as compared with other weeks this season, they have been what might be termed fair. A bid of \$221 was made on one lot of sponge yesterday but the owner refused to sell at that price. The same lot had been offered the day before and a bid of \$200 refused. This lot will probably be placed on the market again today.

PROPOSITION FROM EASTERN CORPORATION TO BUILD MODERN HOTEL ON SOUTH BEACH

Want Enough Additional Land Besides Six Lots Offered By E. A. Waddell To Make A Full City Block
—Committee Will Take The Matter Up

GEO. L. McDONALD APPOINTED PORT STATISTICIAN

Key West Harbor Commercial Statistics Will Be Compiled
For Use Of District Engineer Offices—Business Of
This Port Growing Very Fast

A number of enthusiastic citizens responded to the call for a special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last night and a large amount of business was transacted.

The meeting was called for the purpose of employing a statistician to get up commercial statistics of the harbor, which is gotten up annually for the ports of district engineer offices for action of engineer boards, for the board of engineers to get up commercial statistics of the merits and importance of certain harbor improvements. Engineer Geo. L. McDonald was given the appointment.

The proposition of a large Eastern corporation to build a modern hotel on South Beach, provided enough land was added to the six lots already offered by E. A. Waddell to make a full city block, was then taken up, and a committee appointed to investigate the purchase of the necessary land.

The movement for a modern hotel on South Beach was started a few

months ago by Mr. E. A. Waddell. Mr. Waddell announced in a half-page advertisement in The Journal that he would donate a certain area of land on South Beach for this purpose to any party or parties who would guarantee to erect a modern hotel thereon. This liberal proposition excited considerable interest locally, and the proposition last night from the Eastern corporation indicates that the offer also interested others. The request for a full city block indicates that the parties who contemplate the erection of this hotel would build an even larger and finer hotel than was hoped for at this time. It is not thought that any serious difficulty will be encountered in arranging to donate the area of land asked.

Dr. Wm. R. Warren and Mr. Geo. E. Brown gave interesting and instructive talks on the business before the meeting. The attendance last night was much larger than usual which indicates an awakening interest on the part of members.

ROOSEVELT, HARMON WINNERS IN OHIO

Taft, Republican, Loses
Home State—Harmon,
Democrat, Wins

Cincinnati, May 22.—More complete returns tonight do not indicate that the final results of the primaries held in this State yesterday will be changed. There is hardly any question but what Roosevelt has carried Ohio by a large majority over President Taft, although Taft supporters cling to the hope that a final count will show something different.

Governor Harmon appears to have won out over Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey, but the latter has polled a large vote.

Roosevelt followers are indulging in joyous celebrations over the victory of their candidate and they refuse to concede even a faint possibility of the final count being more favorable to President Taft.

PRUSSIAN PRINCE INSTANTLY KILLED

In Automobile Accident
While on Way to Fun-
eral of King Fredrick

Friesack, Prussia, May 22.—Prince George Wilhelm, eldest son of the Duke of Cumberland, was instantly killed in an automobile accident in the highway near here yesterday. Prince George's chamberlain, the Count von Greve, was also killed.

The two men left Berlin early in the morning for Hamburg on their way to Copenhagen to attend the funeral on Friday of King Fredrick, who was the uncle of the prince.

JENNINGS MAY LOSE HIS JOB AS TIGERS MANAGER

American League Officials
Charge Him With Encourag-
ing Strikers

Philadelphia, May 22.—Hugh Jennings, it is stated, will lose his job as manager of the Detroit Tigers on account of his attitude during the recent strike of his players. He is charged with having been too slack with his men and encouraging rather than discouraging them in their defiance of the league rules.

Wm. H. Shaw, by his attorney W. Hunt Harris, filed a libel yesterday in the U. S. District court for pilotage fees against the Cuban Steamship Julian Alonzo, claiming pilotage in the sum of \$304, due. The vessel gave bond in the sum of \$650 and released. G. Bowne Patterson is representing the vessel.

GREAT DOCK STRIKE AGAIN THREATENS

One Hundred Thousand
Men May Walk Out in
London Account One Man

London, May 22.—Another great dock strike is threatening in England. Five thousand lightermen are already out and 100,000 other workmen may join the movement today. The 5,000 lightermen struck yesterday because of a dispute which followed an attempt to force a single recalcitrant to join their union. Less the dispute is settled tomorrow, 100,000 transport workers will also strike.

The picture opens with an Indian war dance, in which hundreds of Sioux Indians take part. Two prospectors are then shown lost in the desert. Night falls, and a band of Indians come skulking along. After the camp is asleep they cautiously make their way to the animals and rustle them off. The thundering hoofs awake the emigrants, and when they see what has occurred wild excitement prevails. Anticipating an attack, a volunteer is called for to ride to the settlement for help. All look to the boastful Drake, but he declines the mission in an agony of fear. Myers looks at him disdainfully, and announces that he will undertake the dangerous ride.

One of the few remaining horses is quickly saddled and Myers gallops forth. His trail is taken up by a couple of Indians and a sensational running fight takes place in which Myers kill his pursuers.

In full war paint, mounted on ponies, a couple hundred Indians swoop down on the camp. Circling round and round, in an immense circle, the Redskins fire at the emigrants, huddled behind the wagons. The Democrats of Florida haven't yet finished with the presidential question. They have told the delegates to the Baltimore convention what they want them to do and now a lot of delegates remain to be elected. The people should elect delegates who want to do what they are told to do.

Of course any decent man elected as a delegate would obey the instructions of the people who elected him up to a certain point. But the people of Florida declared for Underwood absolutely and unequivocally and they should elect as delegates, not men who will vote for Underwood with regret because they are ordered to but men who will vote for him gladly because they wanted to even before they were told.

Underwood is not a first ballot candidate. He never expected to be first or even second on the first ballot. In the beginning he didn't expect to come as high as third though from the beginning he had strong hopes of being the nominee. It is now certain that he will be as high as third on the first ballot and it is not improbable that he will be second.

Whoever the Republicans may nominate Underwood is the logical Democratic candidate and we believe he has a stronger chance than any other man of securing the nomination. But it largely depends on the feelings of the men who go to Baltimore to represent him.

So if we wish to see Underwood nominated, if we wish to see his matchless leadership continued, if we wish to see his policies enacted into legislation, we wish to see a Southern man president of a thoroughly united nation we must send to Baltimore delegates who will work for Underwood as well as vote for him.

In the first primary the ballot was so long that many of the voters did not remember which candidates favored Underwood and which opposed him. It is shorter this time and there is little room for mistake. For the position of delegates at large Dr. E. S. Crill, Frank Harris, Edwin D. Lambricht and B. S. Williams are the Underwood candidates. Hunt Harris and Adrian P. Jordan are the Underwood candidates from the First district and B. C. Abernathy and Robert E. Davis from the Second. Put this list out and memorize it so that you will know what you are doing when you go to vote next Tuesday.

OMELETS IN PAPER BAG.

The process of folding an omelet is solved when cooked in a paper bag, as the bag is well greased and the egg mixture poured in and the bag laid on the rack; in five minutes lower the heat a little and cook fifteen minutes.

Any variation may be made, adding chopped chicken, ham, parsley or fruits as desired. When the omelet is cooked in a paper bag it is well to carry it, bag and all, on a platter to the table, and serve from the bag.

A Plain Omelet.—Beat very light three eggs, separating the yolks from the whites. Add to the yolks a tablespoon of flour. Melt a teaspoonful of baking powder and a quarter of a teaspoon of salt. Melt a teaspoonful of butter in a bit of milk, beat it gradually into the yolks. The milk must be hot; then fold in the stiffly-beaten whites of the eggs. Pour into a buttered bag and bake fifteen minutes.

Chicken Omelet.—When preparing the omelet and using chicken, add a little more flour to the eggs, then just before putting into the bag fold in a cupful of minced chicken, seasoned with onion juice or celery. For ham omelet leave out half the amount of flour, and if the ham is salt, all of the salt. Water may be used instead of milk, adding more butter. Grind the ham and season to taste with a pinch of sugar. Put the ham in before folding in the whites. Mix and cook fifteen minutes in a well-buttered bag in a hot oven at first.

Spanish Omelet.—Chop very fine one stalk of celery, a green pepper scalded in boiling water, one small onion, one large tomato, salt, pepper and a dash of Worcestershire sauce. Mix well and cook until tender in a little butter. Make a six-egg omelet for this amount of seasoning, and cook as above.

An omelet is a dish that may be served at any meal, and is especially good for breakfast and luncheon dish.

A STUDY OF DESSERTS.

There are about seven types of desserts and all varieties come under one of the types. By changing the flavor one may have a variety of desserts with little study in preparation. Monotony is the one bugbear of every cook. If a certain kind of pudding is served once a month, there will never be an occasion to tire of the sameness.

A custard is one type which may be varied by different flavors, browning the sugar makes a delicious flavoring for a custard. Melt the sugar after browning by adding the silk; stir until dissolved, then beat in the eggs and put in a hot water. A grating of nutmeg and vanilla is good flavoring for a baked custard.

Bread puddings are another type, and may be varied in flavor by the addition of fresh or dried fruit, spices or chocolate. The foundation for all such puddings is the same: a pint of milk, two eggs, a cup of bread cut in cubes and a half cup of sugar. Stir occasionally while cooking, flavor with chocolate, a square or two, and serve with cream.

The steamed pudding is another type. This may be a simple batter and fresh fruits may be added in layers and steamed; if in cups fifteen to twenty minutes; if in a larger mold the time for steaming will be longer. The sauce for a plain pudding with fresh fruit is always cream, but when spice, chocolate and other flavors are used the following sauce is better:

Take two eggs, separate the whites from the yolks, and beat well. Add a fourth of a cup of sugar and vanilla to taste. Serve uncooked, mixing the whites lightly, not to lose the air beaten in.

A dish of peaches or pears with bread and butter is a good dessert, but when one wants to place out the can of peaches and make them serve more, a dessert called Peach Snow-drift may be served, which may be served with whipped cream and the juice of the peaches. Cook together a cup of milk, two tablespoonfuls of flour; cool and fold in the whites of four eggs beaten stiff. Pour over peaches or pears and serve from the dish.

ARTICLE 2.
The general nature of the business or businesses to be transacted by said corporation shall be to buy, sell and convey, purchase, acquire, hold, charter, lease, mortgage, hypothecate, repair, remodel, rebuild and otherwise own, manage, and dispose of wharves and wharf property, warehouses, docks, tanks and storage facilities of wharves and steamships, sailing vessels and other floating property and other real and personal property including chattels and choses in action; to dispatch, load, unload, disburse and act as agent for all kinds of vessels but not to use the said means of transportation for the purpose of doing the business of a common carrier, and to receive profits and tolls therefrom; to insure storage and warehouse receipts; to do a general sponge business in all its branches to conduct and carry on a general brokerage, shipping and commission business in and about Key West and all the matters and things herein, including a custom house brokerage business; to handle, care for, receive and dispose of consignments of vessels and any other personal property; to conduct a wholesale and retail coal, water, lumber, naval stores, and general merchandise business; to buy, sell, own, mortgage, lease, and pledge lands within the State of Florida or elsewhere; to advance and loan money upon securities of land, personal property, commercial paper, steamships, sailing vessels, cargoes, materials from vessels and upon other floating agent in the purchase, sale, management and disposition of real estate in the State of Florida and elsewhere; to take and hold real and personal estate in trust, to borrow money and secure the same and to secure moneys otherwise owing by mortgages, deeds, bonds, or other obligations therefor; to improve real estate by building, constructing thereon or removing therefrom stores, residences, warehouses, docks, wharves, mills, factories or structures of any kind whatsoever; to have such improvements constructed by contract or to make and erect them otherwise and to purchase or manufacture all material therefor and market the surplus; to issue bonds or other obligations of the corporation in payment of property purchased or acquired by it or for any other lawful object in or about this business; to act as attorney in fact, agent, broker or factor for any person, firm or corporation in any part of the world and generally to do any or all acts and things which may be beneficial or profitable to the corporation or which may be necessary and expedient to accomplish the objects and purposes of the corporation and to do any and all things usual or incident to corporations organized under the laws of the State of Florida.
