What the Press Has to Say About It. From a typographical standpoint the book is pleasing, but its literary quality is vastly more pleasing. To anyone, the perusal of this book would prove most interesting. How much more so than to one who was born on this island, who grew up among the scenes which Mr. Browne's pen describes, who bears blood relationship to many of the people to whom the historian refers.

To the younger generation who have not paid much attention to this city's history, Mr. Browne's history will come as a sort of revelation.—Key West Morning Journal.

Mr. Browne is one of those masters whose motto is "Dulce cum ulere," whilst bearing in mind to state facts and avoid fiction, calling a spade a spade, nevertheless he couches his phrases in elegant and rhetorical fashion.

His anecdotes and wrecking episodes are well told and fascinating. The chapter containing the "History of the East Coast Railway" is a work by itself.

Space is inadequate to quote here some of the salient episodes in subsequent chapters, some of which are brimful with witty and humorous narratives. The book promises to be the "vade mecum" in every Key West household, and a guide book to the student of history of his native city.—Dr. Samuel A. Binion.

Hon. Jefferson B. Browne has written a history of Key West. It is entitled "Key West, the Old and the New" and is an accurate and interesting account of the Island City's past performances and possibilities. We envy Key West. A citizen like Mr. Browne is worth as much to a city as a railroad.—Pensacola News.

To the Honorable Jefferson B. Browne, The Journal is indebted for a most excellent book, "Key West, the Old and the New," of which Mr. Browne is the author. It is an able description of the southernmost city of the United States, its history and its possibilities told in the inimitable style of Mr. Browne. 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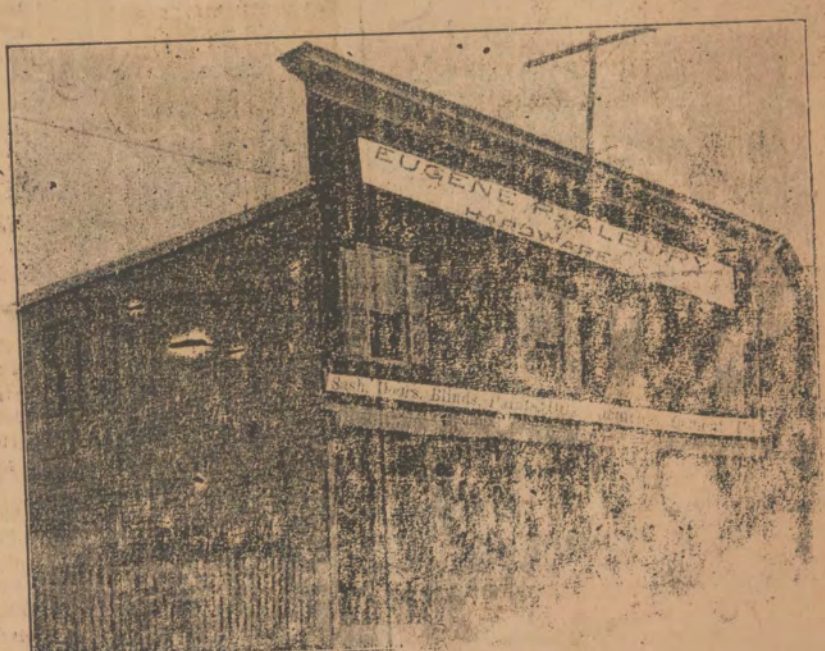
