MIAMI IS BUILDING UP VERY RAPIDLY

Five Story Building to be Started There Within Few Days

Miami, July 24.—Still another five story building is to be begun in Miami within the next few days, or to be accurate, just as soon as a cement mixer can be had. It is being built by W. S. Witham, the Atlanta capitalist, who is at the head of a chain of banks through the South. Plans drawn by H. H. Mundy show a splendid building of architectural beauty with particular attention paid to light and air.

The new building is to be located on the east side of Avenue D, between Eleventh and Twelfth streets, and will be of reinforced concrete, with every modern convenience obtainable. A fast hydraulic elevator will be a feature and both the elevator shaft and stairway will be enclosed in fire proof materials with underwriters' doors leading from the shaft to the halls.

On the north will be the Board of Trade building, and on the south the block that is to be erected by the Dade County Security company, each of these two companies joining in on the erection of party walls. Mr. Witham will not give his own name to the block, but it will be known as the Lawyers' Building, as it is the intention to devote the four upper floors to offices exclusively, that they will be made so attractive that the best class of tenants will be secured.

The front of the building will be largely of Lake Helen buff brick, the lower floor will be wholly of plate glass and projecting from the second floor will be a green tile marquee that will be the handsomest thing of the kind of which Miami can boast. The store room on the first floor will be 25x90. Only the delay in getting the materials prevents the work from starting immediately. The estimated cost of the new block is \$25,000.

ANTI-SALOON INTERESTS WON VICTORY IN SENATE

Committee Reported Favorably on Bill to Give Dry States Power

Washington, July 24.—The anti-saloon interests won a victory before the senate judiciary committee today when a favorable report was authorized on a bill giving "dry" states the power to intercept liquor shipments from "wet" territory.

The bill, if passed, would revise the Wilson law to meet the decisions of the supreme court and make liquor interstate commerce subject to the laws of a single state upon the arrival within its boundaries and before delivery to consignee.

POLICE WOMAN MAKES HER FIRST ARREST

Baltimore's First Woman Cop Causes Arrest of Two "Mashers"

Baltimore, Md., July 24.—Mary S. Harvey, the policewoman appointed several weeks ago, made her first arrests when she directed two detectives to take into custody a couple of mashers she had trailed through the streets.

The men gave the names of Henry D. Walls of Washington and Martin M. Smith of Philadelphia. They were charged with obstructing the free passage of persons on the streets and to avoid spending a night in a cell each lost \$101.45, the maximum fine, as collateral for their appearance today, but they did not show up.

When the case was called Policewoman Harvey testified she saw the men accost two girls. She interfered and told the men to let the girls alone. They wanted to know what she had to do with it and started to walk off with the girls.

Mrs. Harvey followed them and at the next corner halted the two head-quarters men who did the strong arm work.

LORIMER GETS KNOCKOUT PUNCH IN THE WINDY CITY

Chicago, July 24.—William Lorimer was deposed as a member of the republican county general committee.

This was the final blow in the elimination of Lorimerism from the party machinery in Cook county, in which organization he had been more or less prominent for years. At times he ruled it absolutely. In recent years since Governor Dineen and his friends obtained control of the party machinery the Lorimer element has been recognized and shared in the distribution of the patronage.

FINEST ELKS HOME IN STATE FOR MIAMI

Will be 50 Feet Wide and 3 Times as Long—All for Hello Bills

Miami July 24.—Work on the new home for Miami Lodge No. 948 Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks—the finest Elks' home in the state of Florida—will begin within a few days. The contract for the new structure will be let either today or tomorrow, the new building to be complete in every particular before December 1. Bids were opened several days ago.

The new Elks' home will be erected at the corner of Twelfth street and Avenue A, the building to face the Royal Palm Park directly across the street. The location is but a few rods from the boulevard and from the bay, and local Elks believe they have secured for their new home the very best location in the entire city of Miami for a building of the character of which they propose to build. The lot has a frontage of 50 feet on Twelfth street and 150 feet on Avenue A and the building will cover practically the entire lot.

The new Elks' home will be built for the exclusive use of Elks and the Elks who occupy the entire structure, no part of it to be for rent, the revenues of the lodge being sufficient to keep up the expense which the new home will entail upon the organization.

PUSSY FOOT POLITICS DON'T GO WITH TEDDY

Chicago, July 24.—Senator Dixon of Nevada, who managed Theodore Roosevelt's campaign for the republican nomination for president, and who next to Roosevelt, is the most prominent figure in the proposed new third party, declared today that there must be a full third party ticket in this state, with all of the candidates favorable to Roosevelt. Dixon said it would be folly for the colonel to attempt to run merely for the electoral vote, because that would "only be a moral protest and not a campaign."

"Pussy-foot politics won't go these days," added the senator.

CITY HEALTH DEPT. TO WAGE WAR ON RATS

Communication From City Health Officer Emphasizes Importance of War

Key West, Fla., July 16, 1912.

To the Citizens of Key West: At a special meeting of the city council, held yesterday, this office was authorized to start a crusade on rats and mice, and a bonus of five cents will be paid for each rat delivered, dead or alive, to the city jailer at the city jail, and one cent for each mouse. Bubonic plague made its appearance in our neighboring city, Havana, Cuba, recently and while no undue apprehension need be felt about the matter, at this time, yet it is imperative that we as a community begin a city-wide movement to free the community of rats at once.

Plague epidemics follow the usual shipping channels and it is customary for the rat population of a place to become afflicted with this disease for months before human cases develop. Even at this date it is possible that we may have infected rats in our community.

The disease is contracted by inoculation through the bites of fleas from plague infected rats and one case of rat plague is infinitely more dangerous to a community than many human cases.

Plague can only gain a foothold where there are rats and by destroying these pests we can become immune to this dreaded scourge.

There is no "best" way for killing rats and mice; the various rat poisons sold by druggists and stores in general, are all effective when used according to directions.

Trapping should be resorted to and the cat, the rat's natural enemy, should not be forgotten.

It should be remembered that rats will at once quit your premises if the kitchen refuse is kept in closed receptacles and no food left accessible to them.

The seaports from Boston to Galveston have all started killing rats and Key West, having more frequent communication with Havana than any of them, should certainly not delay this urgent work.

Washington, July 24.—The famous apple tree under which Gen. Robert E. Lee surrendered to General Grant, and which was long since carried away piece by piece by souvenir hunters, will be replaced by a tree to be planted by Gov. Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey. The farm on which the tree stood is owned by Col. George A. Ames, U. S. A., who has invited Governor Wilson to plant a tree on the spot formerly occupied by the historic apple tree. Wilson has accepted the invitation.

IRISH MOB DESTROYS LARGE SANATORIUM

Dublin, Ireland, July 24.—A nearly completed tuberculosis sanatorium under construction at Lucan, near Dublin, under the auspices of Lady Aberdeen and the Woman's National Health Association, was demolished today by irate dwellers in the vicinity.

A great mob armed with ropes and pickaxes first tore off the roof and then threw down the walls, leaving nothing but a heap of debris.

WOMEN WEAR SOX? WHY OF COURSE, WHY NOT?

Washington, July 24.—According to a dispatch from St. Louis women are wearing half hose instead of the stockings that come up.

JOHN L. SULLIVAN NOW JUST A PLAIN FARMER

New York, July 24.—Comparatively few people know that John L. Sullivan is a farmer. All this time has been spent superintending the work on his property and raising fine farm products and live stock.

Detroit, Mich., July 24.—William Jennings Bryan is preparing an answer to Theodore Roosevelt's claim that the democratic platform is a reactionary document and that if Woodrow Wilson is a real progressive he must resign as candidate on it.

"But the reply is a little too long to explain in a railroad station," said the Commoner as he walked through the union station shortly after noon to a motor car that was to whisk him to Mount Clemens.

"It will be made public within a few days. In it I will answer in detail Colonel Roosevelt's last Outlook editorial."

HEIR TO MILLIONS TRAILED TO CHINA

Grandson of Founder of Mott Iron Works Shipped as Steward

Hong Kong, China, July 24.—Hector Fuller, once a war correspondent, who has for weeks been trailing J. Lawrence Mott, 3d, heir to the millions left by his grandfather, founder of the Mott Iron Works of New York, overtook young Mott here today. Fuller was engaged at a high salary as a kind of guardian for Mott, but the latter gave him the slip and shipped from New York as a steward on the tramp steamship Indradeo, bound for China, on May 18. On the same ship there sailed an actress, wife of a wealthy Long Island man. She had booked as stewardess and Mott as steward to evade the anti-passenger carrying laws.

The former war correspondent gave chase and arrived at successive ports in the Mediterranean, the Red Sea and the Indian ocean only a few hours behind his quarry. It is uncertain, however, what he can do with his man now that he has caught him. Mott says he is going to settle in Japan.

TWENTY-FIVE CHINAMEN BACK TO PIG TAIL LAND

New Orleans, July 24.—Toy Joy, a Chinese girl 22 years old, who was recently rescued in New York, after her nominal husband is said to have sold her for \$3,000 is being taken to San Francisco, whence she will be sent back to her parents in China. She arrived here today, accompanied by United States Marshal Thomas J. Alcott of Trenton, and Miss Banta, principal of a school for Chinese at Long Branch, N. J. Mr. Alcott had in charge five Chinamen who are being deported. The party, joined by Chief Deputy Wolf, with nine Chinamen from Chicago and other western points, left today for the coast. Other Chinamen who are to be picked up in Texas will bring the total number up to 25 by the time San Francisco is reached.

PEOPLE OF UNITED STATES BEATEN OUT OF \$120,000,000

Washington, July 24.—One hundred and twenty million dollars was fraudulently secured from the American people during the last fiscal year by swindlers who operated largely through the United States mails according to a report to Postmaster General Hitchcock. This was an increase of approximately \$50,000,000 over the previous year.

Of those who are alleged to have operated the fraudulent schemes 1,063 were arrested by postoffice inspectors. They included persons in all walks of life, merchants and mechanics, politicians and professional men, paupers and millionaires.

During the year, which ended June 30, last, 452 persons were convicted and sentenced and 571 cases are awaiting final disposition.

Dr. Maloney Says There is an Imperative Need For Action—Right Now

To The Morning Journal:

Of the many rats examined in Havana, none have been found infected with plague. This proves to even a deaf and dumb man that there must be some other source of infection or else the first rats that contracted the disease either conveyed immunity to the balance of the rats, or appointed some wise rat doctor who, wiser than the doctors of the present day, was able to vaccinate or infect them against the plague.

The plague does not mean to Cuba what it does to Key West. Cuba is a country of vast resources and great wealth. On the other hand, Key West depends almost solely upon one industry. If we get infected here we will be more completely bottled up than was Cervera's fleet, and the National Government will have to take care of us.

Under houses and back yards are reeking with filth. Toilets are poisoning the ozone of our lovely nights. Garbage barrels stand for days with their myriads of magots and their later developed flies. Make every man, woman and child a policeman or a sanitary officer to report dirty yards, uncollected garbage, etc. It concerns us all. Our very bread and butter depends on it.

If necessary, let us further bond the city or the county and raise subscriptions among the people, even a bolito game if necessary, anything to acquire the money to get the wherewithal to clean up. If we can't afford to do it, let us make an appeal to congress. It is a matter that concerns the whole United States. Congress spends thousands in the Philippines, in Cuba; rushes distress-relieving ships across the ocean to floating and earthquake stricken cities. Why not here if we cannot afford it? If we can afford it, let us clean our own house.

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INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.

LESSON FOR AUGUST 18.

THE RULER'S DAUGHTER.

LESSON TEXT—Mark 5:21-43.
GOLDEN TEXT—"And taking the child by the hand he saith unto her, Talitha cumi; which is, being interpreted, Damsel, I say unto thee, arise." Mark 5:41.

This is one of the most beautiful stories of the Bible. It appeals to the loving parents' heart, and charms the attention of every child in the home. The introduction of the woman who touched his garment is referred to by three of the gospel writers and shows us an intensely interesting side light as to the reception accorded Jesus during his Galilean ministry.

The dramatic personae are as follows: First, the father. From his life he is about to lose all the poetry and music of his home.

Second, the child. She was only twelve years old, just on the threshold of Jewish womanhood. It takes no imagination to picture her life up to this time, how it had entwined itself into the heart of the father as well as the other loved ones. The stricken diseased child is yet to be found in the land, that is what makes the picture so vivid. Why this suffering? Why these separations? We cannot reply but our Heavenly Father knows it all, and some day we will read his answer in the glory of his presence.

Third, the woman. Who, where from, nor whether to, we are not told. Only one of that vast throng who had just faith to touch the hem of his garment, and she was made whole.

Calm Dignity of Jesus.

And lastly, the Galilean prophet. One whose response to the cry of need was so instantaneous albeit without haste or fret or unrest. We can, in imagination, see them as they walk along the roadway. Jesus certainly had a meaning in pausing as they are interrupted for we must remember that the woman was healed the moment she touched his garment and before they paused. Having taught the multitude and encouraged the heart of Jairus they reach the home and allowing none but his elect three, Peter, James and John, he enters the house, which is now in a tumult due to the weeping and wailing of the mourners, both the professional and the bereaved. Again we are impressed with the calm dignity of Jesus as he asked them "Why this tumult? The child only sleeps." Their laughing scorn is due to their ignorance of the power of this man, though the record is a strong emphasis upon the fact that the child was really dead.

When he had turned the unbelievers out, Jesus takes the father and mother and the disciples into the death chamber, the occasion was too sacred for the mere manifestation of power before a crowd. Taking the child by the hand, a personal touch, not by proxy, Jesus speaks those wonderful words which form the golden text. Beautiful Love Picture.

Having restored the child to its parents Jesus admonishes them not to publish the news broadcast, evidently as he was not ready to precipitate matters in the minds of the multitude for of a surety he knew that in certain quarters the fact of the cure would be known.

2. The stranger's plea—v. 25-24.

 - (d) Jesus' response.
 - (e) Her confession.
 - (f) Her blessing.
3. The Master's love—v. 35-43.
 - (a) Jesus' knowledge (child not dead in his sight).
 - (b) Delay not mean refusal.
 - (c) The tender resurrection, an answer to faith.
 - (d) The provision for all her needs.

Sorrow brought Jairus to Jesus and sorrow today brings more men to Jesus than perhaps any other one means. Jairus was a ruler of the synagogue and as such had to lay aside his pride and his hostility to make his plea or to accept service of Jesus, and so must we lay aside our pride when we come to the Nazarene, casting ourselves as did Jairus in the dust at his feet, but notice Jesus did not suffer him long to remain in that place.

There are three recorded instances where Jesus raised the dead; this "only daughter," an "only son" of a widow and the "only brother," Lazarus of Mary and Martha. Jesus is saying still to the afflicted and to the fearful, "only believe." He wants us to learn that the tap root of fear is unbelief. His only condition is that we believe. Jesus did not stop to argue with the scornful mourners. Arguments never convince men, but deeds will shut the mouth of the most blatant scooner.

We have in this lesson all the necessary evidence of the Deity of Jesus.

Yuan Knows His China.

President Yuan Shih-kai of the Chinese Republic is still the shrewd, careful, and diplomatic Oriental. A special cable dispatch from Peking describes Yuan's first presidential address and gives quite a pleasant thrill as it describes how the president of China has decided that the new republic must set aside the traditions of the empire and hire foreigners to place the new fiscal policy on a Western foundation.

So far, so good. But the farsightedness of Yuan in taking this apparently bold stand is seen to be largely "policy," for, after all, his new republic cannot get on of the great loan it so sadly needs unless the terms of the bankers making the loan are carried out.

These terms provide for foreign "assistance," to say it diplomatically, in using the money when China receives it. So Yuan, after all, knows what he is about when he hails foreign advice in placing the fiscal scheme of China on a Western foundation.

VICTIMS OF WHITE PLAGUE

Long List of Great Men of the World Whose Lives Were Cut Short by Tuberculosis.

Not a few of the world's greatest geniuses in art, science and literature have died from tuberculosis, and on this account certain writers, such as Dr. Arthur Jacobson or Dr. John B. Huber, think that possibly this disease may provide a certain stimulus to the geniuses of an already great man. The following are some of the great men and women of letters mentioned by Dr. Jacobson who have died from tuberculosis: John Milton, John Locke, Alexander Pope, Dr. Samuel Johnson, Sir Walter Scott, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, Goethe, Robert Louis Stevenson, Sidney Lanier, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Voltaire, John Ruskin, Charles Kingsley, Immanuel Kant, Rousseau, E. P. Roe, and Paul Lawrence Dunbar. Among other great men who are reported to have died of tuberculosis may be mentioned Raphael, von Weber, Chopin, Beethoven, Calvin, Cicero and Cecil Rhodes.

People Have Faith in Him.

The democratic candidate for the presidency must be essentially democratic. Such a man is Woodrow Wilson, whose political ascendancy has been accomplished only by reason of the faith the people have in him, and who will carry into the high office no secret bargains with those who manipulate politics for private gain. The democratic candidate must be morally and intellectually fit for the place. Such a man is Woodrow Wilson, whose training enables him to give to the great problems of the day an integrity above question and a mental capacity and a knowledge of public affairs which has probably not been excelled in an executive officer since the days of Jefferson.

In Woodrow Wilson, there is ample evidence of America's ability to develop in each crisis in the nation's affairs a man who is equal to the emergencies of his time. Washington appeared on the scene, when the disaffected colonies needed a strong man and a military genius to lead them to national independence. Jefferson came when the new democracy needed a man to take the reins of the government from the hands of an embryo nobility and restore it to the people. Jackson came when the money power first asserted itself in the control of the American government. Lincoln came when the union was about to break upon the rocks of domestic strife.

The Man for the Occasion.

And now, when greater problems than those which confronted Washington and Jefferson and Jackson and Lincoln demand courage and ability of almost superhuman character; when from the length and breadth of the land there goes up, as in 1860, the prayer, "God give us a man," when plutocracy is enthroned in high places and when the life blood of the country is being sucked by the vampire of big business; when greed and avarice have been substituted for patriotism and justice; when sporadic and half-hearted attempts to right existing wrongs only aggravate them; when the nation demands again the genius of a Washington, the faith in the people of a Jefferson, the courage of a Jackson and the sublime patriotism of a Lincoln—at such a time as this it is like watching the hand of a beneficent destiny to see Woodrow Wilson loom large on the scene of national politics.

Not only the Democratic party, but the nation, too, is blessed that such a man is available for the presidency.

Let George Do It.

Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey, while campaigning strenuously in the interests of the Democratic candidates, came to a small hotel in Sussex County, in the northern section of the State.

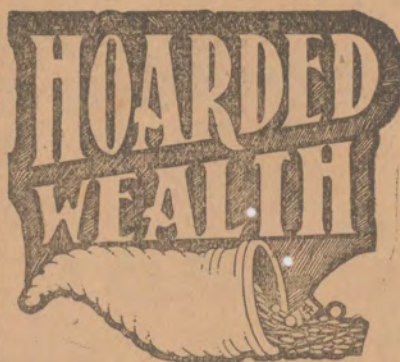

THE TRASH AND GARBAGE PROBLEM.

Just at this time, when a crusade for cleanliness is on, when the necessity for a clean city is realized more than ever, a few remarks concerning the city's scavenger service may not be out of order. The scavenger service is second in importance to no other branch of the city government. A clean city means a healthy city, and unless healthful conditions prevail, our industries must sooner or later suffer the penalty. The health of any community is of paramount importance, and is a matter which should be given first consideration, and an efficient scavenger service usually means a healthy city.

The scavenger service in this city, to begin with, is not modern, is not extended enough to meet the needs of the people, and for this reason is very unsatisfactory. In this climate especially, trash and garbage should be removed from yards every day, as one day's sun not only makes it nauseating, but a menace to health. It frequently happens that trash stands in a yard for several days, and the result is the breeding of a new army of flies, every one a possible and probable carrier of disease. Again, many of the men in charge of the scavenger wagons are in constant fear lest they carry away something in their carts that, under the scavenger contract, they are not "compelled" to. They investigate and deliberate very carefully before removing trash and they very rarely ever put anything in their wagons that they are not obliged to.

As we understand it, there are certain kinds of refuse which these men are not supposed to handle or cart away. That may be all right, but if it is not their business to cart it away, then whose business is it? Is every citizen supposed to look after the disposal of certain kinds of refuse himself? Is he to make private arrangements to get rid of it? Suppose he cannot afford to employ a man to cart it away for him. What then? Has he the privilege to allow it to remain in his yard and decay?

There is no excuse for beating about the bush, especially at this time. All of us, as good citizens, ought just as well face the music now as any other time and acknowledge to ourselves that Key West is a dirty city. That we have the low death rate in the South is due to a Divine Providence which has looked out for us carefully, providing us with all natural advantages for the preservation of good health. It certainly is not due to the citizens of Key West. As a Key Wester, it is very unpleasant for us to have to acknowledge this fact, but practically every one in the city will agree with us that it is plain truth. We could have the CLEANEST CITY IN FLORIDA, if we would.

Key West needs a more modern and a larger sanitary department. Having such a department, there would then be no excuse for dirty yards, and persons whose yards would be found in such condition could properly be summarily hauled up before the courts and fined. A few fines for unsanitary yards would come very near working miracles here, so far as sanitary conditions are concerned.

The Journal is a boosting new paper. As editor of this paper, we have written volumes relating to the many advantages which Key West possesses, and we do not consider that our most enthusiastic boosting was exaggerated. For there is a time for all things, boosting included, and this is not the sanitary department's time for a boost.

GAMBLING DEFILED—

TERRIFIED.

Plague may come, and plague may go, but gambling is still going on in the same old stands and in the same old ways. The human manner in which this unlawful business is carried on is the most astonishing thing in the world to the man who has been brought to respect and obey the law. To such extremes have conditions gone that it is now, not so much a matter of the devil of gambling itself and its injurious effect on the community and its morals, but the open and defiant contempt of the law, and the breaking down of those bulwarks to which we look for protection.

Key West's principal industry today seems to be bolito. The question as to how the cigar industry is getting along is of minor importance as compared to the question: "What number came out at such and such a place?" These are the conditions existing here today. WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO ABOUT IT? We cannot pretend to answer this question for the very simple reason that we cannot. Bolito and all other forms of gambling are violations of the law. That these games are going on daily is no secret. No body is trying to keep these conditions dark, not even the gamblers themselves. So we put this question again, and hope that some reader can enlighten us, WHAT ARE WE GOING TO DO ABOUT IT?

We have been pleased to refer to Key West as a law abiding community. With the exception of the crime of gambling it is, and how in the name of all that is right and decent, this evil is allowed to flourish right under our eyes, in open defiance of all officials, city and county, is more than we can explain. One man bottled it up for a time. Did he have more ability along that line than others? Question!

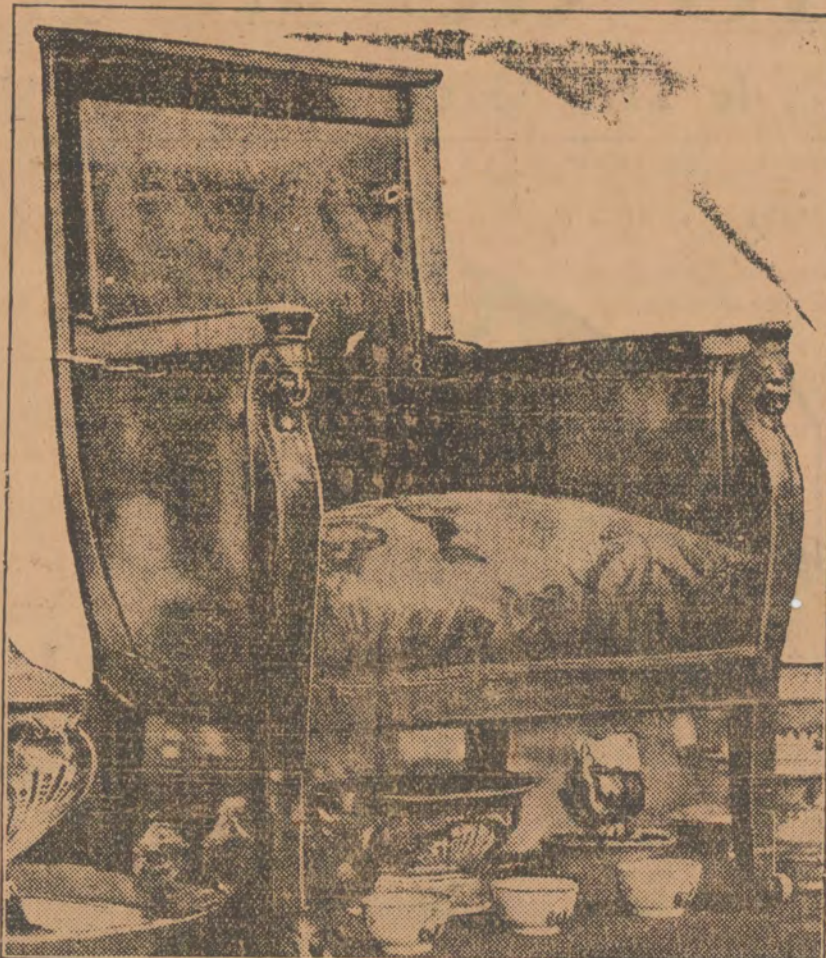

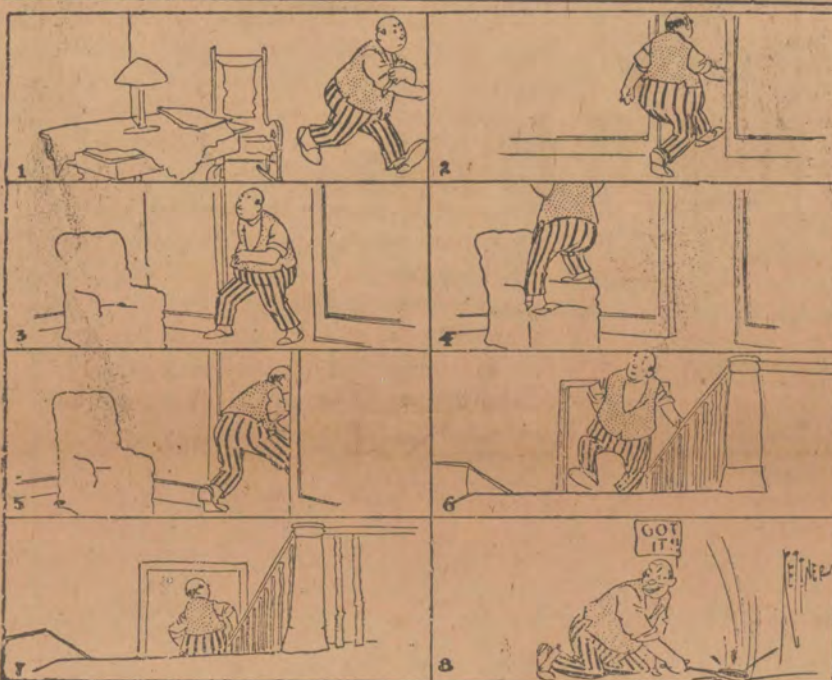

One of the most interesting and valuable discoveries so far recorded in the field of Biblical archaeology has been the recent unearthing at Samaria in northern Palestine of the palace of a Hebrew king, believed to be the "Ivory house" of Ahab. Labels with Hebrew writing, which seem to have been in actual use during the lifetime and perhaps in the households of Omri and Ahab, have also been found, as well as fragments of pottery and other interesting remains. It was in the palace here that Ahab dwelt with Queen Jezebel and where Naboth had his vineyard. Among the ruins many inscriptions have been found containing Biblical names and there is a frequent reference to a vineyard, which is believed may be the vineyard of Naboth. This is the first and only palace of a Hebrew king ever found, and accordingly regarded as unique and of the deepest interest to archaeologists. The picture shows

Those who own the machines that the workers use for producing certain articles are all the time storing up more and more profits, and as they are in the minority and the workers compose the vast majority, the workers' proportion of obtainable money must necessarily diminish as fast as the wealth of the capitalist increases. When a panic comes the position of the capitalist is somewhat like that of the monkey who put his hand into a jar of nuts and got his hand so full that he was unable to withdraw it.

The more selfish and grasping the money kings (and humanity at large) will become the oftener we will have times of depression and panics.

Should Not Seek to Acquit Guilty

A lawyer should only seek justice for his clients. By obtaining an acquittal for a guilty man he has defeated justice. Suppose a lawyer knows his client is guilty, and if convicted the sentence must be imprisonment; but he obtains a verdict of acquittal. The client is turned loose on society, and commits other crimes while he ought to have been serving time for the first crime, is not the lawyer partly responsible for his crimes?

The knowledge that they can hire great lawyers to defend them has given encouragement to criminals all over our land. It is true, a lawyer owes a duty to his client, but if he knows the client is guilty he has fully discharged his duty when he has made clear all extenuating circumstances, if any there be, connected with the crime, and has made a plea for as light a sentence as the court can pass for the crime committed.

While the lawyer owes a duty to his client, he also owes a duty to himself, to his profession and to society; he can best discharge these duties by laboring to obtain absolute justice for all.

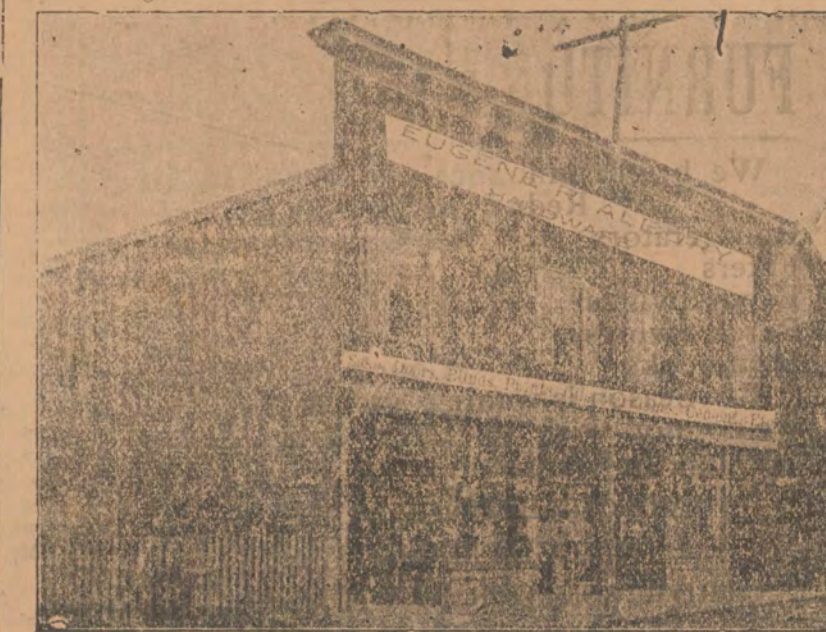

IN THE MARKET

Among the many new preparations which have been introduced on the market to substitute lard and butter for cooking purposes, is Crisco. Crisco is made from a mixture of edible vegetable oils, and contains an animal fat whatever. Its chief advantage over butter and lard for cooking, is that it can be heated at a much higher temperature than either of them, thus cooking the food in a very short time, and preventing grease from soaking in.
