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BURIAL OF WAINE A GREAT PICTURE

Solemn And Impressive Ceremony In Moving Pictures At The Monroe.

465a Florida—Tampa Bay—Old Tampa Bay—Beacon established—Buoy discontinued, March 23.

Surprise Bank Beacon, established in 1-1/2 fathoms of water on the station formerly occupied by Surprise Bank Buoy, 2. 3d., nun, which was then discontinued. Beacon is a single iron-cased pile, about 16 feet high, with triangular, horizontally slatted daymark, all painted red. (No. 14, daymark).

465. Florida—West Coast—Anclote Keys Light Station—Characteristic of light to be changed, and intensity increased, about May 7, 1912, by changing light from flashing red to flashing white, and illuminant from oil to incandescent oil vapor, increasing the intensity of the flashing light from about 4,800 to about 133,000 candlepower, and of the partial eclipse from about 760 to about 5,600 candlepower. The present light is flashing red every 30 sec.; after the change it will be flashing white every 30 sec., with partial eclipse.

From Bangor to Los Angeles, and from Tacoma to Key West, millions of fans have been waiting breathlessly since yesterday to learn the outcome of the first day's games in the big leagues. The New York Giants fairly slaughtered Brooklyn in a six inning game, the final score being 18 to 3 in favor of the Giants.

The worlds champions Philadelphia Athletics began the season right by winning from Washington, score, Washington 2; Philadelphia 4. Boston put one over on New York thudly, score, Boston 5 New York 3. Chicago White Sox beat St. Louis Browns, score, Chicago 6; St. Louis 2.

The Cleveland Naps beat the Detroit Tigers as follows, score, Cleveland 3; Detroit 2.

A Safety Device.
The housewife who has had to choose between a good maid with a dizzy head or uncleaned windows on the outside will welcome a new mop for just such purposes. It is provided with a handle, in which it works at right angles, and can be manipulated on the outside of a window without putting as much as a hand over the sash.

It may be harder to get the exact amount of polish produced by perching perilously on a narrow ledge, but with practice glass can be kept clear without risk to the cleaner.

For Luncheon.
Take a pound of bread dough and mix into it a tablespoonful of shortening, two tablespoonfuls of sugar; roll out into a thin sheet; cut in two and spread one-half with a cupful of currants, half a cupful of raisins, half an ounce each of lemon and citron peel, chopped fine. Cover with the other half, press down with rolling pin and then cut in rounds or diamonds; brush with white of egg. Let stand half an hour; then bake in a hot oven for fifteen minutes.

Mulled Buttermilk.
Make sure that the buttermilk is fresh. Put a pint of the milk in a double boiler and stir it constantly until it reaches the boiling point. Add the yolk of an egg beaten to a stiff froth and take from the fire immediately. This will be found an excellent drink for feverish patients, allaying both thirst and hunger.

Grape Conserve.
Two quarts grape juice, boil ½ hour, add equal amount heated sugar and 6 oranges (cut off white) remove seeds, cut in small pieces the yellow of the orange. Use navel oranges and that will save removing seeds; 1 pound seeded raisins cut in halves. Boil until the consistency of jelly.

Eggs With Sauce.
Six neatly poached eggs, six squares of buttered toast, a few drops of anchovy sauce, half a pint of white sauce, two ounces of tarragon and chervil leaves, parsley, chives and watercress. Wash the leaves carefully, then pound them together in a mortar, adding to them a few drops of anchovy sauce. Next rub the mixture through a sieve, and add to it the white sauce, stirring it over the fire till both are well mixed. Arrange each egg on a piece of toast and pour a little sauce over. Serve them neatly arranged on a hot dish.

Roly-Poly.
Roll half a pound of short pastry into a round about a quarter of an inch thick. Spread over it a layer of jam, leaving a margin all around. Wet this edge slightly and then roll the pudding up. Press the edges tightly. Then place the roly-poly in a floured baking tin and bake thirty minutes. Serve hot with a hard sauce seasoned with sherry or brandy.

WAR LIKENED UNTO BASEBALL

Baron d'Estournelles de Constant Favours Umpires to Settle International Disputes.

That disputes between nations should be settled by an umpire as disputes between rival American baseball teams are settled, was the keynote of an address delivered by Baron d'Estournelles de Constant, the French statesman, before the students of the University of Minnesota the other day.

Baron de Constant spoke of the wastefulness and destructiveness of war.

"You have your great American baseball," the baron said. "When you have troubles and disputes you do not start boxing with each other. Though sometimes they almost end in fights, self-control and discipline prevail and the matter is settled. Why not do the same in war?"

To starch black lawns boil two quarts of wheat bran in six quarts of water for thirty-five minutes. Let it cool and then strain. No soap is necessary where this is used, as it both cleanses and stiffens.

A good way to wash bottles or vinegar cruets is to put crushed eggshells and warm soapy water together in then and shake well. This will clean the glass well and will not scratch it.

To protect your rolling pin and board in absolute cleanliness is to make coverings for them of unbleached muslin, having drawing strings and loops sufficiently strong to hold them when the bags are hung up.

A loaf of bread will keep fresh much longer if placed in a covered stone crock. Wrap in a large cloth to exclude air and keep the crock in a cool place. It is nicer than a tin vessel and much better than keeping the bread in a refrigerator.

To preserve unused yolk of eggs put the yolks in a cup or basin, drop a piece of kitchen paper into cold water, and place over the top of cup or basin. This will prevent the yolks from getting hard and they will keep for days.

UTILIZING THE SOILED SHOE

Days of Usefulness May Be Extended if Article Is Not Too Far Gone.

Here are a couple of hints for the girl whose dress allowance has to go a long way:

White kid shoes which are too soiled to wear and which are still of a good shape may be renewed for evening wear by painting them with gold paint. Do this carefully and smoothly and the shoes will look like new.

In some cases, even soiled satin slippers may be successfully treated in this way.

White kid shoes may also be dyed a fast black by applying the following mixture to them: Five cents' worth of gallic acid and five cents' worth of sulphate of iron.

Put the sulphate of iron in just as much water as is required to dissolve it, no more, and apply this to the shoes. Let it dry, then dissolve the gallic acid in a very little water and apply this. When dry the shoes should be a good black color. Great care must be taken in using these chemicals, and after they have been used the surplus quantity should be thrown away.

CARVING THE TURKEY

SHARP KNIFE NECESSARY TO SKILLFUL PERFORMANCE.

Then If You Have a Large Platter and Follow These Instructions the Bird Will Be Neatly Separated.

Some are born carvers, some—after painful effort—achieve carving, and some—unfortunate few—have carving thrust upon them. In order to become skillful in the art, it is of the first importance to have a sharp knife.

Daniel Webster, so the story goes, once undertook to carve the turkey at an old-fashioned New England Thanksgiving dinner. The knife was dull as the traditional doe, and the bird proved refractory, giving the great man more trouble than one of his celebrated campaign speeches. Finally, after an especially desperate effort to cut through the hide of the troublesome fowl, the knife slipped, and the bird turned a complete somersault and landed in the lap of a lady who sat next the famous man. But even after this effort Mr. Webster never turned a hair.

"Madam, I'll trouble you for that turkey," said he, and went at the turkey again with might and main.

But we are not all born with the plumb of the great orator, so it is as well to take the precaution to have the knife sharp. The turkey should always be served on a platter large enough to hold the different joints as they are carved. It should be placed on the table with the breast to the left of the carver, who commences operations by first getting a firm grip on the fowl by sticking the carving fork deep down through the upper part of the breast bone. Now, holding the fork securely in the left hand, take the knife in the right and remove the legs and the second joint together by passing the knife around the joint next the body. Then take off the wings in the same manner, and disjoint them, cutting through the ligaments.

Before carving more from the turkey it is well to separate the leg and cut it into two pieces. After this the breast of the turkey can be carved in thin, delicate slices, with the knife held flat against the breastbone and faced away from the carver. Then the point of the knife can be inserted under the wishbone, and it can be lifted, pressed backward and removed.

Good carvers now turn the turkey slightly, and without removing the carving knife, cut the shoulder blades from the under side of the carcass. Each "helping" should contain a piece of both white and dark meat and a generous spoonful of dressing.

HONEY IS VERY WHOLESOME

Real Value So Out of Proportion to Cost It Should Be on Every Table.

Most suburbanites would keep a few hives of bees if honey values were better understood. Even when the honey must be purchased its real value is so out of proportion to its cost that it should be included among the everyday necessities.

Comparatively few housewives use honey as a substitute for sugar in baking, but managers of large bakeries, always on the alert to find the best and most economical ingredients to use in their productions, value it at its true worth, and use it in making their choicest products, because it provides a variety of flavor. It produces lighter and finer cakes, and those in which it is used have superior keeping qualities.

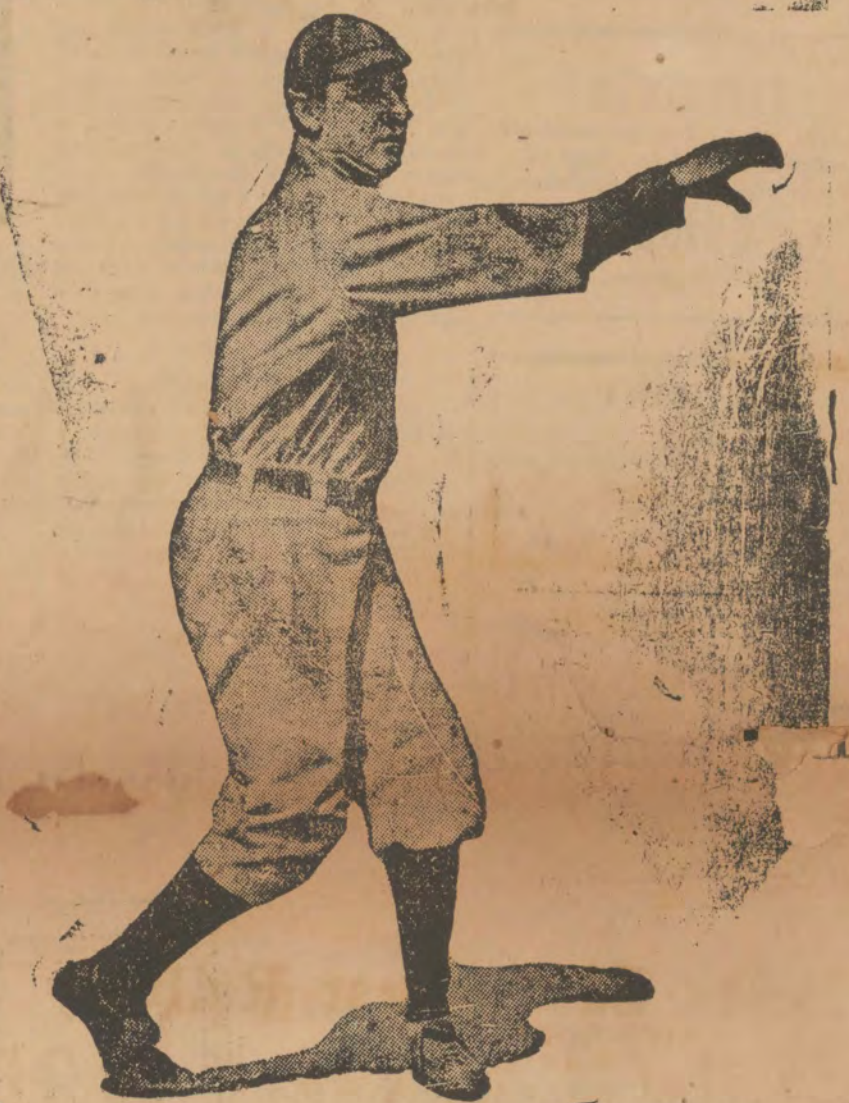
Honey is in the fat, heat and energy producing class of foods.

Many people who do not keep bees and a few that do consider honey a luxury, when it is freely used it will save enough of either butter or sugar to much more than equal its cost. For example: Have a pitcher of strained honey at hand and as each cake is taken from the griddle pour honey over it and fold like an omelet. The result will be cakes that will be "simply delicious" without the use of butter—and every housewife knows that hot cakes call for a great deal of butter when that is used.

Honey has greater sweetening power than sugar and less is needed. In a sponge cake that would call for a cupful of sugar three-fourths of a cupful of honey is sufficient. To make such a cake beat the three-fourths of a cupful of honey with the yolks of three eggs, beat in one cupful of flour, a little at a time, then add four table-spoonful of hot water, and lastly fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the three eggs, with any flavoring desired.

Smothered Eggs.

Poach four eggs by breaking into a saucepan half-filled with boiling salted water; let them remain until yolks are hard, then remove with perforated skimmer; cut each egg in half with a sharp knife, keep on hot platter while you prepare the following sauce:

One pint of gravy from roast or boiled meat, or one pint of soup; add one chopped onion, salt and pepper to season, two table-spoonfuls of butter in which has been well mixed one even table-spoonful of flour; bring all to boiling point, simmer five minutes and pour over eggs; serve hot.

This is a delicious way to serve eggs, as four eggs will make a good breakfast dish for five or six people. It is cheap as well.

Brownie Salad.

Boil eggs hard, when cold remove shells and cut off small ends about one-third down. With a small spoon scoop out the yolks, wash, add chopped olives, salad oil, salt and pepper. Then refill the cavities with the same. Replace the ends which have been cut off, moistening with uncooked white of egg to cause to adhere. Set aside a short time to dry, then with a toothpick which has been dipped in grape juice, melted chocolate or some other material, draw eyes, mouth and necktie, and buttons down lower part to indicate waistcoat. (A small water-color brush is better, of course, if you chance to have one.) Use toothpicks for arms and legs, or, if you prefer, the toothpicks can be concealed by small carrots or green bean pods. Drape a leaf of lettuce around the shoulders for a cape. The end of a cucumber hollowed out will serve for a cap.

Molded Salmon.

One can salmon, one-half teaspoon salt, one and one-half table-spoonfuls sugar, one-half teaspoon flour, one teaspoon mustard, three-fourths cup scalded milk, one and one-half table-spoonfuls melted butter, yolks of two eggs, one-fourth cup hot vinegar, three-fourths table-spoon granulated gelatine.

Rinse the salmon with hot water and drain thoroughly. Remove the skin and bone and pick the flesh fine with a silver fork. Mix together the salt, sugar, flour and mustard. Pour over it gradually the scalded milk and when mixed return to the double boiler and stir and cook ten minutes. Then add the melted butter, the beaten egg yolks and hot vinegar. Stir while cooking a moment. Then add the gelatine, softened in two table-spoonfuls of cold water. Stir until melted, then add the salmon and turn into molds. When thoroughly chilled serve.

SANITARY WAY OF SWEEPING

Various Methods of Keeping Down the Dust When the Vacuum Cleaner Is Unavailable.

Recently there has been developed a great improvement in housekeeping appliances—the vacuum cleaner. It is not yet perfect, but it contains great promise. This innovation practically "eats the dirt," sucking it into its great tube of a throat, and depositing it in an air-tight receptacle, which may be emptied and cleaned out of doors. If the cleaner is mechanically well constructed and susceptible of easy manipulation, it is a valuable household invention.

Whenever these more effective methods of removing dirt are, for any reason, temporarily impossible, always remember that moisture makes dust not only less harmful, but more manageable. The old-fashioned custom of sprinkling wet tea leaves over the carpet before sweeping was not done for hygienic reasons, but to brighten the colors. It was, however, unintentionally sanitary. Newspapers torn or cut into bits, and thoroughly wet, answer the same purpose and are more easily obtained in the quantity desired. In cases of illness existing in the room to be cleaned, an excellent practice is to saturate these bits of paper with a solution of Platt's chlorides, Electrozone, or a 20 per cent. carbolic solution. Dusting may be accomplished in a sanitary manner by using an oily cloth, or, for some purposes, one moistened with water is better.

Oil is becoming more and more one of the weapons of the sanitarian. By its use the roads in some towns are kept almost free from the dust nuisance, and stagnant and mosquito breeding pools are prevented from contaminating the atmosphere.—Woman's Home Companion.

FEW ABLE MANAGERS

Only Six Qualify as Being Successful Leaders.

So Much Depends on Financial End of Baseball Venture That Any Chief-tain Keeping Team in Lead is Valuable Asset.

What salary is a successful major league baseball manager worth? The question is a common one, and the answer most commonly given is: "All he can get." That is about as near as one can express it in figures.

So much of the financial success of a baseball venture depends upon the showing of the team, which is the concrete representative of the venture, that any manager who can keep a team in the race for the championship of his league is worth a great deal to the baseball promoter.

In these days even a tall-end team is not necessarily a financial loser. If it plays 77 games at home before

crowds made small by lack of interest in its efforts, it must be remembered that the same tall-end team plays 77 games away from home each season and gets on the average a shade better than 40 per cent. of the receipts of the games.

But the big money in baseball is made by the "winners" — the champions and the near champions who are in the race all or most all of the season. Consequently every club owner wants a winner, some of them for sportsmanlike as well as financial reasons; others of them merely for the coin. To get a winning ball team a club owner must get a successful manager. There is no other way. A promoter can spend money with both hands seven days a week for seven years, buying and developing ball players, and never get his team out of eighth place at the end of the season. Unless the club owner has a manager possessed of the peculiar qualifications demanded by the club, he cannot expect a winning team.

If it were possible to corral 12 or 13 stars of the present day into one team, handled by an inexperienced, incompetent manager, that aggregate of stars would stand small chance in a major league pennant race. A clever, brainy manager with a good team of average players is a better investment financially than a lot of managerless stars would be.

The supply of managers is so scarce that those who have made good beyond doubt can command almost any figure they ask for. The practice is becoming more and more common of cutting the manager in on the profits. This can be done either as a stockholder, as in the case of Frank Chance of the Cubs, and Connie Mack, of the Athletics, or by making the manager's contract call for a certain percentage

of the profits in addition to a stated salary, as in the case of Hugh Jennings, of the Detroit club. Taking a glance at the managerial field as it stands today, there appears to be only five major league managers who can be included without qualification in the successful class. They are Frank Chance, Fred Clarke and John McGraw, in the National league, and Connie Mack and Hugh Jennings in the American league.
