MEXICO DEPORTS AMERICANS

AMERICAN MILLIONAIRES DEPORTED FROM MEXICO WITHOUT FORMALITY OF A TRIAL

Abraham and Joseph B. Ratner Were Thrown Into a Mexican Jail and Held Incommunicado—Now On Board Steamer Morro Castle To New York

FRIENDS DID NOT HEAR OF THEM UNTIL FAR AT SEA

Madero Government Deported Them Unceremoniously—Were Given No Trial Whatsoever—This Incident May Mean War Between United States and Mexico

Havana, May 10.—Abraham Z. Ratner, president and general manager, and Joseph B. Ratner, treasurer, of the Tampico News Company of Mexico, are on board the steamship Morro Castle on route to New York. The Tampico News Company, Inc., is capitalized at one million dollars, all paid in practically all of which is American capital. The Messrs. Ratner were seized by the Madero government on May first and were deported from Mexico on May second. They were thrown in a Mexican jail and were not given the benefit of a trial. They were seized by police of the City of Mexico on the supposition that they were furnishing guns and ammunition to Mexican rebels. The Ratners have resided in Mexico for the past thirteen years and were highly respected by all the Mexicans. They were known to the Madero government and with whom they came in contact. They were the pioneers in the mail order business in the Mexican republic. After being thrown into jail by police of the City of Mexico they were kept incommunicado, and no friends, relatives or lawyers were allowed to learn of their whereabouts. Nothing was heard of them until they were one hundred and twenty-five miles at sea on board the steamer Carcovado bound for Havana. They were unceremoniously deported by the Madero government without the slightest chance to prove their innocence of the charge made against them. The Messrs. Ratner refuse to make any statement as yet but declare that upon their arrival in New York they will make a statement as to the real reasons of their deportation which will be sensational. The deportation of these men may strain relations between the United States and Mexico to the breaking point.

GIBBONS OUT FOR GOVERNOR

CROMWELL GIBBONS AGAINST TRAMMELL FOR GOVERNOR

In Telegram to The Journal Last Night Col. Gibbons Announces That He Will Fight Trammell for the Democratic Nomination for Governor

MOST SENSATIONAL MOVE OF GUBERNATORIAL CAMPAIGN

Gibbons Is Starting Out To Overcome The Almost Impossible Lead of Fifteen Thousand Votes Now Held By Trammell—Will Make Fierce Fight For Nomination

The following surprising telegram was received by The Journal last night:

Key West, Fla.,

W. H. Milton has announced his withdrawal from the second primary. J. W. Watson also says he will not be a candidate. Cromwell Gibbons to make fight for the nomination.

(Signed) CHAS. B. WHEELER.

There were many here who believed that Milton, the man entitled to the race, realizing the almost impossible task of overcoming Trammell's great lead. Since Gibbons dropped to fourth place in the race, however, it was not thought he would dream of opposing Trammell, even if all other candidates should withdraw. That this is what will happen, though is shown by the above telegram. Chas. B. Wheeler has been Gibbons' main adviser in his campaign, and it now appears that Mr. Wheeler will assume active charge of Col. Gibbons' campaign before the second primary.

Col. Gibbons' determination to make the race against Trammell may have a great effect on the political situation in Monroe county. When it was learned here that Trammell and Milton were the two high men, practically all of the support in this county which would have gone to Gibbons, had he been second man, switched to Trammell. Whether this support will switch back again to Gibbons now is a debatable question. As the general sentiment here is that no one of Trammell's four opponents would have any show against him in the second primary. The political situation in this county is like to very much resemble the chameleon.

HAVANA STRIKE NOT OVER

GREAT STRIKE IN HAVANA HAS NOT ENDED IS SPREADING MORE RAPIDLY THAN EVER

A Temporary Agreement Was Reached With Dock Laborers But They Struck Again Two Hours After They Started to Work—Business at Standstill

LABORERS ON SEWERS WENT ON STRIKE YESTERDAY

Passengers Arriving on the Mascotte Last Night Stated That All Of The Strikers Had Quit Work Again In Sympathy With Firemen Of Steamship Lines

Havana, May 10.—Several thousand more workmen joined the strike movement yesterday, both in Havana and in other places on the island. Unless President Gomez's arbitration board reaches an agreement today the strike leaders say they will call out every union in the republic. Every establishment in Regla closed down yesterday with the sole exception of the shipyards and foundry of Krajewski and Peasant. They promised last night to walk out tomorrow if a settlement of the harbor strike is not reached.

Later Reports. Havana, May 10.—The harbor strike is over but engineers and railroad firemen and in some cases the whole crews on some of the Cuban boats are still out. Men working on the sewers in the Vedado went on strike today. A temporary agreement in the harbor strike was reached last night and apparently will lead the way to a settlement. The strikers claim a victory. Rumor Last Night. Passengers arriving on the steamship Mascotte last night reported that the dock laborers along the Havana waterfront went to work yesterday morning unloading the Ward liner Saratoga and loading the pineapple boats, but that about two hours after they had begun work, the firemen on the Herrera steamship line struck for recognition of their union and the dock laborers went out on strike again in sympathy. This report could not be verified from Havana last night, but arriving passengers stated it as a fact.

This troop have rifles ordered which correspond closely to those used by the militia, except that they do not fire ball cartridges and are considerably lighter.

"I'M BEING HIT" SHRIEKS OUT PRESIDENT TAFT

Says Teddy Is Not Only Hitting Him But Is Hitting Below The Belt

Portsmouth, O., May 10.—"I'm up against a wall and I'm being hit!" shouted President Taft in a speech here this morning. "Not only am I being hit, but I'm being hit below the belt and I'm here to fight!" The crowd yelled its delight at the president's bellicose utterances. "When I am charged with being under the influence of intoxicants I have the right to fight back and defend my good name and the good name of my administration," continued Mr. Taft.

The president did not name Colonel Roosevelt in connection with what he said to say, but the inference was that he was belting the colonel.

DIET AND HEALTH HINTS

IS ANIMAL EXPERIENCE A SAFE GUIDE?

"Is it true that those animals that eat flesh are more vigorous and enduring than the vegetable eaters, and is animal experience a safe guide for man?" a reader asks. Most of our knowledge of physiology has been obtained by experiments upon animals—and humane vivisection, properly restricted, is just as justifiable as dental or surgical work, properly restricted—and as the general principles of nutrition apply throughout the animal kingdom, comparative physiology is helpful as a guide in nutrition. No animal is more efficient, mentally and physically, within the scope of its advancement, than the gorilla, man's nearest relative among the lower animals, and Huxley says ("Man's Place in Nature") that the gorilla is strictly frugivorous. The elephant is not less vigorous or less intelligent than the lion. One writer advocating vegetarianism, says that the dog suffers much from cancer and lives a short life because of his flesh diet; another says his life is cut short by eating cereals. Flesh is the natural food of the dog and he is probably injured by a mixed diet as much as man, and is more subject to cancer than any other animal, but he is affected by unnatural living otherwise, especially by lack of sufficient exercise. We have much to learn from animals, but careful, unprejudiced, correct reasoning is necessary.

MUSHROOMS.

Frequent cases of poisoning from eating mushrooms, fresh and canned, are reported. There are more than 5,000 varieties of mushroom, only a few of which are edible. Some poisonous varieties resemble the edible so closely that it is not safe for one unacquainted with their distinguishing features to eat them as they may be found in the fields. Since the mushroom has been cultivated extensively for canning it can be found in the grocery stores. There is no special nutritive quality in the mushroom to warrant the risk and expense of using it. A normal appetite never craves such food.

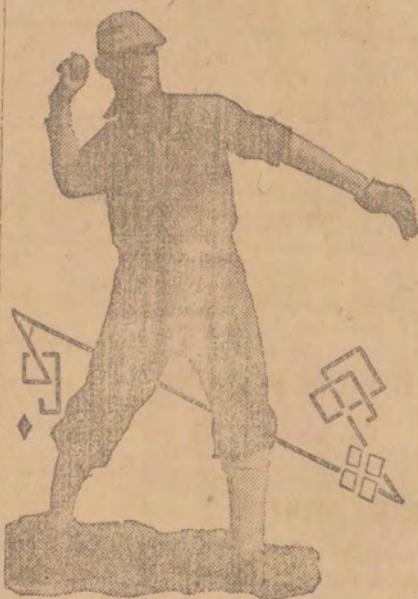
I do not remember that I ever saw a great play. I forget them. It is a waste of time for me to remember them. I remember all the rotten ones I see and the players remember all the great ones. I tell them about the rotten ones when they tell me about the good ones, and that keeps us on even terms.

I believe the greatest play, from many standpoints, that I ever saw, was one I made myself. All the time I was a pitcher I was sincerely of the opinion that outfielders were stealing money when they took pay for playing out there, and I wanted to get out there and prove it to them.

I don't remember exactly what the matter was, but one day in New York about half of Anson's players failed to show up and we had to patch up a club to play the Giants. I yelled for a chance to play center field, and Jimmy Callahan went to second base. We pitchers decided to give the regulars a treat and show them how they ought to play their positions.

We had the game won. Along in the third inning I went chasing back, stuck up one hand and speared a line drive, and you can imagine what I said to those outfielders when I came back to the bench, telling them how soft it was for them. I think we had two runs to the good in the eighth inning when New York got the bases full with only one man out and set the stage for me to make my most wonderful play. The crowd was out on the field back of the ropes, and they began to get wild, expecting the Giants to beat us out. The batter, I think it was Van Halteren, hit a nice soft, easy fly about half way between me and second base.

It was then I made the play, which I considered the headiest play I ever

saw. I started to trot in to catch that ball, and Callahan started to come out at top speed. I heard him coming and yelled three or four times to him that I had it, but I could hear him still pounding along at top speed. The runners all held their bases, knowing that with my arm I could throw out the man at the plate after catching the ball. Well—I didn't catch it. I backed up a bit, muffed it, and it rolled perhaps five feet back of me, and all the runners started to move up at top speed. I thought I could get up the ball and shoot to second base in time to force out the runner coming from first, so I turned, grabbed the ball and cut loose for second at full speed. Callahan's head was in the way not ten feet from me. I hit him squarely on the top of the head, the ball shot off his head down under the ropes between third base and the left fielder, four runs scored and we were beaten.

You could hear Anson praising that play clear to Chicago, and I dodged the bench until the game was over. The play ended my career as an outfielder and changed my opinions regarding playing other positions.

THRILLING FIGHT AT SHILOH

As Both Sides Began Firing Panic Stricken Bull and White Dog Seen Running Across Field.

On Sunday morning, April 6, 1862, we were called to arms and hurried to the front at Shiloh. Over the brow of a low hill I could see a rebel flag slowly advancing, writes T. J. Maxwell of the California Soldiers' Home in the National Tribune. Both sides began firing, the rebels all the time advancing. Between the lines I saw a panic-stricken bull and a white dog. After a regular hail storm of lead I looked around, and not a man could be seen except the dead and wounded. I ran back to lower ground, and the shot again passed over me. My brother came to me, and said we must hurry or the cavalry would capture us.

We found the regiment, and were taken to support a battery of one piece which was having a duel with a rebel gun. The swing and lead horses had been shot down; then a solid shot took both of the wheelers. An officer rode up near the gun, dismounted and threw the rein around a sapling. He had no sooner done this when a shot passed through his horse. Had he been in the saddle both his legs would have been cut off. The next shot raked the gun. The boys cast off the prolong, dragged the piece a few rods to the left, and in about half an hour had silenced the rebel gun.

Morning came, and we were taken to the edge of a meadow. In front from the top of a low wooded hill a battery was firing on us. Some of the solid shot would reach our ranks. We crossed the meadow to attack, threw down the fence, and soon were a struggling mob, trying to climb through the thick brush and saplings. Those who got near the top saw the infantry suddenly rise and aim, then dropped to earth as a volley passed over them. The officer in command saw that it would be a slaughter pen and quickly ordered a retreat.

We made a left wheel, and marched a short distance through open timber to level ground, and opened fire. I was standing a few paces from a large tree. My gun barrel was hot, and I had but two or three cartridges left. Facing us was a rebel brigade or division. To the left it extended a quarter of a mile. Off to my right the timber covered them. All this time musket balls were flying past me and throwing up dust at my feet. I think 10 or 15 men were firing at will, and I turned to see whom they were shooting at, but there was no one but myself in sight. I went back to the rear, and soon came to a line of infantry firing. I passed through the line. They said not a word to me nor I to them. I came to a pool of water, and my reflection showed my face streaked with powder, smoke and dust. My lips were

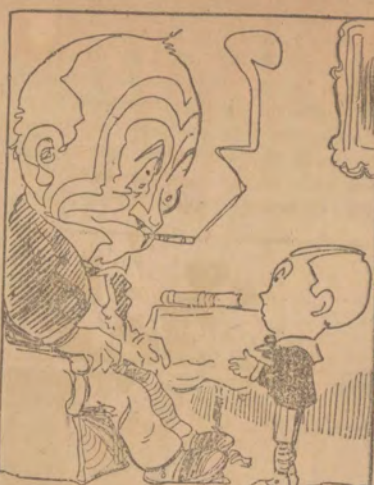

Advertising Talks.

BY THE AL. MAN.

Suppose you were off on a trip up through the state of Florida and you were to meet numbers of men who did not even know where Key West is—suppose one of the men with whom you came in contact were to ask you the question: "Doesn't Key West belong to Cuba?" What would you begin to think? You would think that Key West needed some advertising more than she needs anything else, wouldn't you?

The above proposition is not merely a hypothetical one. The case supposed actually happened last week, and the merchant who had the experience describes his thoughts on the matter in a somewhat unique manner. He looked at the man and thought, "Well, you are certainly a fool." Later he gave the matter more serious thought and he decided that "Myself, together with the balance of the business men of Key West are the fools—we haven't ADVERTISED our city as we ought to have done."

Now, of course, he was merely stating the matter as strongly as he could, but he actually had the experience related. Key West has got quite a bit of advertising this year, on account of its being linked with the mainland of the United States, but what we need here in this city is a systematic advertising campaign waged through the leading magazines and periodicals of the East and West, for an advertising campaign of that kind would BRING people here who as yet have never dreamed of coming. We want people to come here and invest their money; we want them to bring their families to the island city and here rear their children; we want a substantial class of people brought here to live among us as citizens of the city. And to be perfectly frank, I believe that the year 1912, together with the first part of the year 1913, is a critical period in the city's development. Key West has the greatest opportunity offered her now that she has ever had, and in order that the opportunity may mean the most to her, she must grasp it NOW.

Key West needs a \$100,000 hotel, and Key West SIMPLY MUST HAVE IT. If we do not get the hotel this fall, then where are we going to place the people who come here this winter? We had no place to keep them last winter who came here this spring, and we will not be able to begin to place the thousands who pass through Key West this winter. If we have the hotel which we MUST have, then the people who come to Key West this winter will stay here a few days and will spend their money here—they will look the town over and a good many of them will invest something in the city. BUT, if we do not build the hotel (that same one which we MUST have) then the people who come here will take the first boat to Havana, will shake the dust from their feet as they step off the dock, and wherever they go they will KNOCK the southernmost city of this great republic—and to tell the truth, you can't blame them for doing it. Key West is the nearest American port to Panama, it is located ideally, being situated so as to get both the Atlantic and the Gulf trade, and having been so recently connected with the mainland by rail, she faces an opportunity such as no other city now has held out to her.

Are we going to grasp the opportunity, or are we going to sit idly by and see it gradually but surely slip from our hands? We will answer that question before the first day of June, 1913, and the answer that we give will be final.

I have diverged a little today, and have talked advertising from a wider viewpoint than heretofore, but I felt that these were matters we ought to give our careful and immediate attention. We can make the most of our opportunity if we will try, but we will have to TRY if we are going to make the most of it.

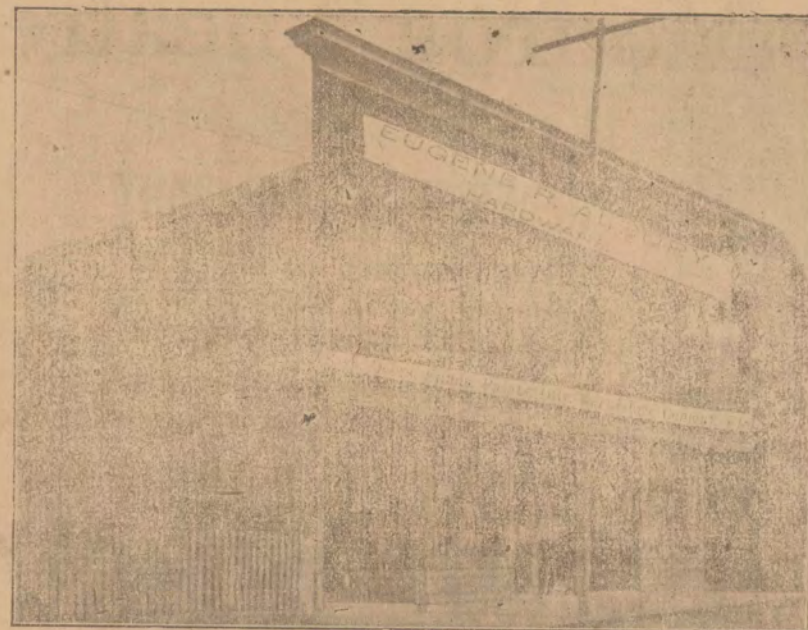
