L'ENGLE, SHEATS AND ROOSEVELT WIN, PROBABLY HANDSOME MAJORITY

Toomer Made Great Gains But Cannot "Head" of Victorious L'Engle-Crawford Leading Mathews

ALL UNDERWOOD DELEGATES WERE ELECTED

Returns Received Are Sufficient to Show That Sheats Is Nominated--Race Between Frank Clark and Hilburn to Close too Forecast the Winner

Jacksonville, May 28.—(11.50 p. m.) Returns received so far from all over the State show that W. H. Sheats is nomination over his opponent W. M. Holloway, for State Superintendent of Schools.

All the Underwood delegates to the National Convention have been elected by good majorities.

W. M. Toomer has made great gains over the vote he polled in the first primary, but they are probably not sufficient to overcome Claude L'Engle's lead.

For National Committeeman, Crawford is leading Mathews with the final result somewhat in doubt.

The closest race in the state is that between Frank Clark and S. J. Hilburn for Congressman from the second Congressional district. The race between these two men is so close that the returns do not even furnish an indication of the result.

The election in Key West passed off very quietly there being but one contest for local office. Hubert T. Roberts was nominated for Supervisor of Registration over his opponent Frank Cates.

\$5,000 REWARD FOR CAPTURE OF ALLEN

Effort Will Be Made To Have Government Offer This Amount

Greenville, N. C., May 28.—With a view to making the price on Sinda Allen's head a sufficient incentive to cause a renewal of efforts towards his capture an effort will be made by officials of the United States District Court here to have the government offer a supplemental reward of \$5,000 for the capture of the leader of the band of Virginia outlaws who shot up the Carroll County Court, and for which crime Floyd Allen is now under sentence of death.

Sinda Allen is under a \$5,000 bond to appear at the regular term of United States District Court, which convenes here next Monday.

The \$5,000 bond is signed by Sinda and Floyd Allen and three other Carroll county men. When it is declared forfeited it is said District Attorney Holton will recommend that it be offered by the government as a reward. This recommendation, it is said, will also have the approval of Judge Boyd.

WAITERS TO STRIKE DURING CONVENTION

G. O. P. Delegates In Chicago May Have a Hungry Time of It

Chicago, May 28.—Rumors were in circulation among various branches of the Waiters' Union here last night that a demand was to be made for an increase in wages before the Republican national convention here, and that if it was not forthcoming a strike would be called during convention week.

UNITED STATES HAS NO INTENTION OF INTERVENING IN CUBA AT PRESENT

President Gomez of Cuba Sends Message to Leading New York Papers Giving True Condition of Affairs As They Now Exist in Island Republic

MANY EXAGGERATED REPORTS HAVE BEEN SENT OUT

State Department Does Not Believe the Situation in Cuba Warrants Intervention And Believes Cuban Government Can Put Down The Uprising

Washington, May 28.—The state department emphatically declared today that the present Cuban situation would not make an American intervention necessary.

The state department also stated that it is expected that no more American ships or marines would be ordered out in view of the possible danger of protecting the lives and property of Americans in Cuba.

Moreover, declared the state department, both it and the administration were anxious to adhere closely to the terms of the Platt Amendment. Even in case of serious interference with American interests efforts would first be made to settle Cuban affairs by diplomatic negotiations and pacific means.

Havana, May 28.—The negro uprising remained quiet yesterday, only a few minor skirmishes being reported. The Estenoz gangs are being kept busy keeping out the way of the Cuban troops, who have the situation in hand.

President Gomez issued a signed statement today addressed to several New York papers, in which he reviewed the situation. The statement was as follows:

"I can inform you that there are armed negroes only in nine municipal districts in Oriente province. The rest of the island enjoys complete peace. Trains are running, the telegraph and telephone wires are undisturbed, work is being done in the country districts and sugar mills which have the cane are grinding, and the alarm which was at first felt now only remains in a few places.

"I have not used any extraordinary measures. I have proceeded with an energy and efficacy which I doubt could be surpassed. In the six days since the movement began I have succeeded in reducing it to one part of Oriente and I have sent more than 3,000 regular troops and will continue to send them.

Roosevelt's Great Popularity Appears to Have Swept New Jersey for Him and Put Taft Out

RETURNS SHOW WOODROW WILSON WINNER

Taft Supporters Refuse to Concede Colonel Roosevelt's Victory--Early Returns Are From Cities and Roosevelt Was Stronger in Country

Trenton, N. J., May 28.—Early returns from the presidential preference primary held in New Jersey today show that Col. Roosevelt is leading Taft and indications are that he will win the State. Woodrow Wilson, the Democratic candidate appears to be an easy winner.

The fight between Roosevelt and Taft in this State has been very bitter and both candidates covered the state thoroughly in their speech making tours. Taft partisans tonight claim that the early returns are not a true indication of the final result, but Roosevelt followers claim that New Jersey is following the example of Ohio and that early returns in this State foretell the final result just as certainly as they did in Ohio.

Roosevelt enthusiasts here declare that the nomination of Roosevelt is now an absolute certainty and that Taft is no longer a factor.

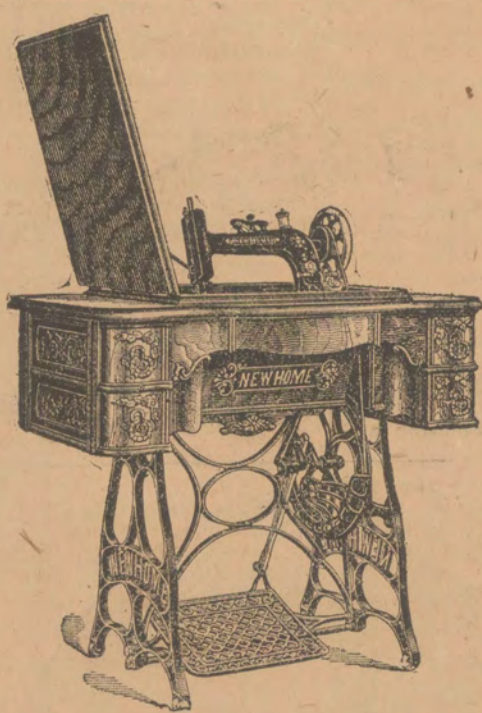

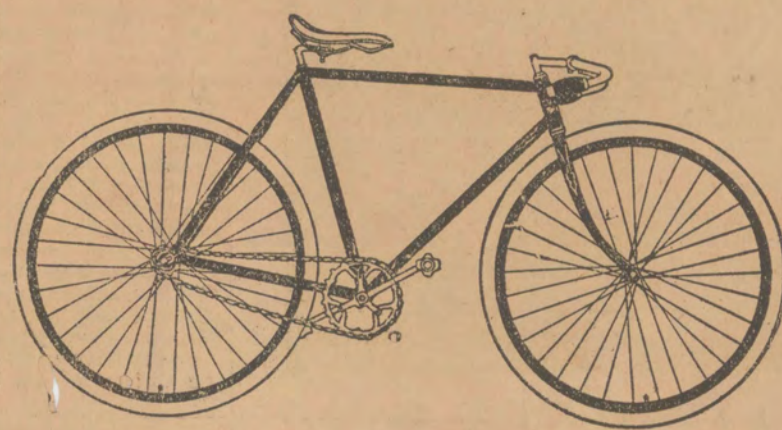

Article 1.
The name of this corporation shall be "Taylor and Company, Inc.," and its principal place of business shall be in the city of Key West, county of Monroe, state of Florida, but it may establish branches in other places in the United States, or foreign countries, whenever and wherever deemed necessary or expedient.

Article 2.
The general nature of the business or businesses to be transacted by said corporation shall be to buy, sell and convey, purchase, acquire, hold, charter, lease, mortgage, hypothecate, repair, remodel, rebuild and otherwise own, manage and dispose of wharves and wharf property, warehouses, docks, tanks and storage facilities of every kind, steamships, sailing vessels and other floating property and other real and personal property including chattels and choses in action; to dispatch, load, unload, disburse and act as agent for all kinds of vessels but not to use the said means of transportation for the purpose of doing the business of a common carrier, and to receive profits and tolls therefrom; to issue storage and warehouse receipts; to do a general sponge business in all of its branches; to conduct and carry on a general brokerage, shipping and commission business in and about any and all of the matters and things herein, including a custom-house brokerage business; to handle, care for, receive and dispose of consignments of vessels and any other personal property, to conduct a wholesale and retail coal, water, lumber, naval stores and general merchandise business; to buy, sell, own, mortgage, lease, and pledge lands within the State of Florida or elsewhere; to advance and loan money upon securities of land, personal property, commercial paper, steamships, sailing vessels, cargoes, materials from vessels and upon other floating property; to act as broker, factor or agent in the purchase, sale, management and disposition of real estate in the State of Florida and elsewhere; to take and hold real and personal estates in trust, to borrow money and secure the same and to secure moneys otherwise owing by mortgages, deeds, bonds or other obligations therefor; to improve real estate by building, constructing thereon or removing thereto stores, residences, warehouses, docks, wharves, mills, factories or structures of any kind whatsoever; to have such improvements constructed by contract, or to make and erect them otherwise and to purchase or manufacture all material therefor and market the surplus; to issue bonds or other obligations of the corporation in payment of property purchased or acquired by it, or for any other lawful object in or

USES OF BUTTERMILK.

Buttermilk, according to some authorities, is the cure-all for nearly all diseases. It is certainly a wholesome drink and is agreeable to most palates.

Buttermilk Pie.—To a cupful of buttermilk add two tablespoonfuls of flour and half a cupful of sugar; mix the flour and sugar together, add a beaten egg and a flavoring of lemon extract. Bake in a crust without a cover.

Buttermilk Sweet Cake.—Add a tablespoonful of molasses to a cup of buttermilk, a teaspoonful of soda and three tablespoonfuls of melted lard. Beat an egg and add to the mixture, with spices to taste and flour enough to make a soft dough. Bake in a loaf and cover with a brown sugar frosting.

Steamed Brown Bread.—Take a cupful each of rye meal, Indian meal and graham flour, two cupfuls of buttermilk, three quarters of a teaspoon of soda, one teaspoonful of salt and three-quarters of a cup of molasses. Mix all ingredients together, pour into buttered baking powder cans and steam for three hours. Dry off in the oven, removing the covers from the cans.

Corn Muffins.—Put two cupfuls of cornmeal into a basin, add a cupful of flour, half a cup of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter and one beaten egg. Add two cupfuls of buttermilk, in which a teaspoon of soda has been dissolved. Mix and put into muffin pans to bake.

Johnny Cake.—Take two cups of buttermilk, one cup of cornmeal, one cup of flour, one-half cup of sugar, two teaspoonfuls of soda and half a teaspoonful of salt. Add the milk to the meal and soak for an hour; add sugar, soda and salt, mix with the flour and pour out in a shallow greased baking pan. Bake in a quick oven.

When it is necessary to keep ice in a sickroom, place a flannel cloth over a bowl and tie it securely. Lay the ice in the flannel and cover with another piece. The drip will fall into the bowl and the ice will last for several hours.

ONE EGG WORTH \$1,500

An egg of the great auk, or garofowl, a bird now extinct, was sold at auction in London for a sum equivalent to \$1,500. Not all great auk's eggs are alike. In length they vary from four and one-eighth inches to five inches. The greater number found have a white ground, but others are of various shades of buff. In some cases the markings are spots, shown in blotches or lines.

It is said that no living auk has been seen since 1844. The birds were exterminated by the ruthless traffic in their eggs and skins, although their numbers were greatly reduced by their wholesale slaughter for food. Many misconceptions have survived as to the great auk, which for years has been regarded as a sort of fabled bird, like the roc or the dodo. In size the creature did not differ much from the tame goose, and its title of "great" was given to it distinguish it from the smaller, or razor billed auk. The most remarkable characteristic of the great auk was its inability to fly. Its wings were scarcely more than fins, which aided the bird in swimming.
