FIRST THROUGH TRAIN ARRIVED AT 10.43 A.M.

Henry M. Flagler Realizes
Dream of Railroad to
Key West.

THE CONGRESSIONAL SPECIAL FOLLOWS.

President's Personal Representative, Foreign Diplomats, High Army and Navy Officials, and other Distinguished Official Guests Make First Trip on the Over-Sea Railroad.

With the roar of bursting bombs, the playing of bands, the shrill screeches of whistles, the cheering of thousands of people and the waving of countless American flags, the first through train over the Over-Sea railway, bearing Henry M. Flagler and officials of the F. E. C. Railway arrived at Key West at 10:43 o'clock this morning.

The arrival of this train marked the culmination of the dreams of the greatest friend all Florida has ever had and it marked the starting of a new era for Key West. It was without a doubt, the most important event in the history of this Island City and one which will be always considered as a red letter day in the chronicle of its events.

The Flagler special was closely followed by the solid Pullman train bearing the congressional delegation, foreign diplomats, high army and navy officers and other distinguished guests.

Another section of the train bearing members of the Chattanooga Board of Trade and prominent business men of that city, together with a delegation from Jacksonville and Miami formed a part of the important arrivals.

The Children's Chorus.

One of the features of the welcome to Mr. Flagler was the children's chorus, composed of hundreds of children who, when the special pulled up to the station, sang patriotic airs and waved small American flags.

After Mr. Flagler had left the train, he was escorted to the front of the stand containing the children and showered with American Beauty roses. The entire program was carried out without a single incident to mar it and many were the favorable comments made by the official party.

The idea of the children's chorus originated with A. H. McInnis and he has been untiring in his efforts to organize the children and arrange plans for the demonstration. He has been ably assisted in the work by Professor Kerns, who directed the chorus during the rehearsals and at the station this morning. Both Mr. McInnis and Professor Kerns were ably assisted by the teachers of the Sunday Schools, who were in the stand with the children.

The Testimonial.

The first official event on the program after the arrival of the train was the presentation, by Hon. George W. Allen, to Mr. Flagler, of

the handsome and valuable testimonial of the citizens of Key West in appreciation of the building of the railroad.

Mr. Allen made a few remarks appropriate to the occasion which were responded to in kind by Mr. Flagler.

Many People Present.

The crowd which witnessed the arrival of the first train to Key West, was probably the largest that has ever assembled in this city and it was orderly and good humored.

As early as 6 o'clock this morning the people began making their way to Trumbo and by the time the train arrived, every available spot on the grounds was occupied and the section around the depot was jammed with humanity.

The 30th Company, C.A.C., the Key West Guards and the Naval Militia were at the station and assisted in keeping the crowds from going too close to the train. The Boy Scouts guarded the chorus stand. The Light Guard Band and the Cuban military band were in attendance and played several selections before and at the time of the arrival of the trains.

After the call of the Mayor and reception committee at the train, the distinguished guests were taken to Celebration headquarters, where a public reception was held, after which they had luncheon at the Jefferson.

This afternoon a reception in their honor is being held by Rear Admiral Lucien Young, U. S. N., at the Naval Station.

Governor Gilchrist and his staff are expected this afternoon.

The Mayor's Reception.

The reception at the residence of Mayor J. N. Fogarty will be held tonight from 7:30 until 9 o'clock.

This will be a public reception by the chief executive of the city of Key West to its citizens and in consequence, no invitations have been issued for the reason that the people of the city are to be the guests of the Mayor.

The Cuban Artillery Band will be at the station and will play selections during the reception.

Reception and Ball.

The official reception and ball will take place at the Marine Barracks tonight.

U. S. BATTLESHIPS ARE NOW IN THE HARBOR

Three ships of the Fifth Division of the North Atlantic Fleet, under command of Rear Admiral Bradley A. Fiske, are now in the harbor.

The Washington flag ship and the North Carolina arrived yesterday afternoon and the Birmingham came in early this morning.

The arrival of these big fighting craft to take part in the Celebration is of the greatest importance to this port for the reason that the two cruisers, North Carolina and Washington, draw 28 feet of water each and are the deepest draught vessels that have ever been brought into this harbor.

Admiral Fiske, in addition to bringing his ships here and adding to the interest in the Celebration, has done Key West a great service in demonstrating the fact that deep draught vessels can be brought into the inner harbor with safety.

A complete dinner set consisting of more than 160 hand-painted pieces, by Mrs. Clara Fielas-Pintado is deserving of highest praise, as are also the collections of handsome china articles by Mesdames S. In one of the exhibition rooms can be seen the pennant of the U. S. S. Maine, which was found in the harbor of Havana on the morning following the catastrophe of February 15, 1898. It was presented to the Convent Museum in 1900, by Captain P. L. Cosgrove, of the U. S. S. Mangrove. It is 39 feet in length and has thirteen stars.

CUBAN GUN BOAT HATUEY IS IN PORT

Given Ovation By the People Upon Her Arrival Yesterday.

The Cuban gunboat Hatuey, which will represent the Cuban government at the Celebration, arrived in port yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock and was given an ovation by the Cuban population of Key West.

Crowds of people had been lining the water front from early morning and when the warship steamed up the harbor, cheers of approval and greeting rose from thousands of throats. Proudly the vessel steamed past the admiring crowds and came to anchor off Curry's dock.

Cuban Consul A. D. Carrasco went aboard in the quarantine launch and when it returned it had as passengers, the personal representative of President Gomez, Colonel Jose Marti, son of the famous patriot and martyr, and Captains Varona and Whitmarsh. The officers were met at Curry's dock by Mayor J. N. Fogarty and his aides, Major Sam J. Wolf, N.G.P., and Lieutenant Commander N. B. Rhoads, F. N. M.

The mayor welcomed the distinguished visitors to Key West and to the shores of Florida and extended the courtesies of the city to them. They were then taken in carriages to San Carlos and the procession assumed the proportions of a triumphal entry. Headed by the Welles Cornet Band, the procession, which was composed of Cuban Societies and school children, marched up Duval street amid the cheers of the spectators.

Upon arrival at San Carlos, the officers were escorted to the stage where they were again welcomed by Sr. Carrasco, with a hearty speech. He was followed by several other prominent Cubans who spoke highly of Colonel Marti and his brother officers. Glowing tributes were paid to the distinguished father of Colonel Marti by all of the speakers.

Mayor Fogarty then welcomed the visitors again and extended all courtesies.

On board the warship was the famous Cuban Artillery band consisting of 61 men, under command of Captain Varona. This is one of the finest organizations of its kind in the world and is one of the greatest attractions of the Celebration.

ADMIRAL SINGER HERE.

A distinguished guest who is an old friend of Key West is Rear Admiral Frederic Singer, U. S. Navy, retired, who served here as inspector of the 7th Lighthouse district about ten years ago.

He has been chief intelligence officer of the Navy and was the executive officer of the Raleigh in the battle of Manila Bay under Dewey.

Admiral Singer is an official guest of the committee and his many friends here will be delighted to see him again.

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A WELCOME TO ALL.

Key West today extends a cordial welcome to all her visitors and will do her best to show her appreciation of their coming to assist in celebrating the greatest event in our history.

To Mr. Flagler we not only extend a hearty welcome, but we extend also our sincere assurances of profound and lasting gratitude.

We have with us today several hundred distinguished guests, any one of whom would be entitled to special courtesies if coming alone, so that it may readily be seen that we will be unable to pay each the attentions we would desire.

We are going to do our very best, however, for the comfort of all our visitors and we trust that the remoteness of our location and the size of the town will be taken into consideration by them, in order that too much may not be expected.

Key West is today the most talked of city in the United States and every citizen should do all in his power to cause our visitors to carry with them pleasant impressions of their stay among us.

CAPTAIN J. ED. O'BRIEN.

Among the candidates who will be with us during the Celebration, perhaps none is better or more favorably known to the people of Key West than Captain J. Ed. O'Brien, who is in the race for congressman at large, and who has been in the city for several days.

Captain O'Brien was born in Key West in October, 1856, and therefore most naturally feels a deep interest in all that pertains to his native town.

He worked early in life at brass finishing and attended night school, afterwards working as a carpenter and joiner for \$10 a month.

While living in Pensacola he became an apprentice in the bar pilot business and after four years became a bar pilot and organized the Pensacola Pilots' Association. He later organized the Florida Pilots' Association and became its first president.

He served four years in the Florida Senate, being chairman of the committee on navigation and a leading member of the committee on labor. He was a delegate to the Democratic national convention in 1896 and voted for the nomination of Bryan and Sewell.

He was elected president of the American Pilots' Association and has successfully defended the pilots' interests at the national capital since 1896, also aiding all other representatives of labor in their efforts before Congress.

Captain O'Brien is in close touch with all the members of both houses and it is said that he is one of the best acquainted and highly respected men in Washington.

He has many staunch friends in Monroe County who predict that he will easily carry the county in the first primary.

WHO PAYS NOW.

The Tampa Tribune, commenting upon the leading plank in Hon. A. M. C. Russell's platform, says:

"Free school books may be all right, and the slogan sounds well for campaign purposes, but remember, the tax payers will have to pay for them, just the same."

We would respectfully ask, if the taxpayers are not paying for school books now under the "pay book" system? It is admitted that they will pay for them under the "free book" system.

It is not a question whether the taxpayers pay for the books, for they do under either system. In the pay book counties, the school book tax is paid to the bookseller, in the free book counties to the Tax Collector.

It is a question solely of economy and good public policy. The free book system materially lessens the tax and distributes the burden more equally and equitably among all the taxpayers.

The pay book system places the cost of the book at the highest figure, which is the individual purchase price, while the free book system gets the book at the lowest cost, which is the wholesale price. The pay book system gives but a short life to the book, the free book system more than doubles its life, and keeps it in constant use until worn out.

The average annual cost of books under the free book system, as we are informed by County Superintendent W. A. Thaxton, is between sixty and sixty-five cents. The lowest first cost under state uniformity, (which would prevail under the free book system), of a set of second grade books is eighty cents, eighth grade \$3.64 which is as high as the grades of state uniformity go. Last year according to Superintendent

Thaxton's official report the average cost for that year for the entire twelve grades was (49c) forty-nine cents per enrolled pupil. Enrolled pupils only are provided with books under the free book system.

Under the free book system the books are paid for by the entire taxable values of the county, which include railroads, telephones, telegraphs, phosphate mines, turpentine farms, etc.

Under the pay book system those only are required to pay for the books who are least able to do so, the resident population who send to school. As the resident population alone gives additional values to the undeveloped or intrinsic values of a county, all values so dependent upon it should contribute their share to maintaining law and order and the general well being of the resident population. One of the greatest means to this end is popular education. And the strongest promoter of popular education is the free school book system. Hon. J. C. Law, tax collector of Hernando county, is authority for the statement that three-fourths of the taxes, (which include the school tax, of which the free book tax is a part,) are paid by non-residents, railroads and other corporations. Therefore, according to his estimate, which we think is conservative, the resident taxpayers pay only one-fourth of the 49 cents per capita enrollment, cost of school books in Hernando county last year. Is it right? Yes, it is right. The resident population of a county makes the property values and sustains the law and order of the county. Therefore the county values are justly taxed to sustain the public institutions and conveniences that make a resident population possible, such as courts, roads, and schools. The latter are made largely more effective by free books.

One or two years ago a prominent citizen of Brooksville sent his child to a public school in Tallahassee for one year. He says the school books for his child cost him more proportionately than free books and salary of teachers combined for that year in the public school tax. The value of his property and the amount of his taxes are not small.

The free book system pays handsomely in Hernando county, has paid for twenty years, and pays more now than it ever did before because the county owns more books than it ever did. And it will pay as well in every county in the State as it has done in Hernando county.

Under the free book system the taxpayers pay for the books as they do under the pay book system but not half as much. OVER-SEA CELEBRATION GUIDE TO KEY WEST.

ADVICE TO VISITORS.
(By John A. Macdonald.)

Get an F. E. C. Folder with small map of the city, and study it.
Secure a copy of the Special Edition of the Key West Citizen at the Citizen Office, News Stands, or at Room 6, Island City National Bank. This contains a history of Key West, portraits and biographical sketches of many of the leading citizens, a great many views of the city and much interesting reading concerning the industries, etc.

Obtain an introduction from some responsible citizen known to the Commanding Officer, and get permission to visit Fort Taylor and all the fortifications.

The Naval Station and the Army Post are generally open to the public, but it is well worth the trouble to be permitted to see the great Machine Shops at the Naval Station, in charge of Mr. P. J. McMahon. A permit may be necessary.

Get a series of photographic views of the most unique scenes in Key West, they will be an interesting and instructive collection to carry home as a memento.

Do not neglect to visit the cigar factories, the cigar-box factory, and the factory for the production of green turtle soup; the only establishment of its kind in the United States.

See the exhibition of the "Ladies' Civic Association" at the Ruth Hargrove Institute.

Visit the Custom House, the United States Court House and Post Office (in one building) and in the rear are the Coal Station and Light House Establishment, all worth seeing, and adjoining the Naval Station.

There is a good hack service of rubber tired carriages at the lowest prices in the United States. Ten cents to any point in the city inside Division Street, White Street and the Steamship docks; fifteen cents outside, each way; each stop, new fare; special trips with delays are charged as extras.

The hack drivers are courteous and have complete information.

The best private residences are scattered in various parts of the city, Caroline Street, North Beach and South Beach and in every ward.

For Views Over the City.

The Light House tower, the Belvedere of the Jefferson Hotel, the roof of the Island City Bank, the roof garden of the Ruth Hargrove Institute, the Island City Hotel, the City Hall tower, Samuel Roberts (Pilot) store, the tower of Curry's Sons store, the Ice Factory and the observatories of many private residences afford comprehensive views of the city, which no visitor should fail to see. From the Ruth Hargrove Seminary roof garden the whole island is visible and the prospect is very beautiful. The white compact city of about 10,000 people and twenty-two miles of built-up streets, the extensive unoccupied part of the island, the harbor, shipping and Mr. Flagler's improvements are all in plain sight.

The Martello towers built some fifty years ago on the South shore of the island, are very interesting specimens of a class of very costly fortifications now entirely obsolete. One has been remodeled but the other near the east end of the island is almost intact and well worth a visit from the sight seer.

The Government built a railroad and had a locomotive to haul the brick, cement and sand from the harbor to build these towers; so the people of Key West saw a railroad long ago on their own island.

The Key West Cemetery is one of the most interesting in the United States and contains the tombs of many of the distinguished fathers of the city, whose memory has been perpetuated by many beautiful and costly monuments. Many lots are neglected and grown over by the weeds but the greater number are well kept, and the marble welds a link in the genealogy of the oldest Key West families. A great many of the dead were born in the Bahamas.

Many natives of Cuba rest in this foreign soil, and enough from various countries to give the city of the dead, like the living city, a cosmopolitan population.

Many of the victims of the Maine disaster and of several wars are buried here.

The Electric Car Line takes you to White and Angela Streets, near the Barracks, and one block from the cemetery. There are many soldiers' graves also at the Barracks.

The Electric Car Line—about five miles—will give a visitor a pleasant ride over several streets, and out to the new cigar district on Flagler Avenue, where there are some large stone factories, and the Louis Pavillion, a suburban resort.

The wireless station is one of the greatest, and communicates with the Pacific, Panama, San Juan and all points within three thousand miles.

See the ships of war in the harbor, parties can hire launches to inspect the fleet.

Consult the reports at the Observatory of the Weather Bureau to be convinced that Key West has the most equable climate in the United States.

It will pay any visitor to go out a few hours with a Key West fisherman and help catch a few bushels of the different species of fish. He will say he "never went fishing before."

Each fishing boat has a well in which the fish are kept alive till sold, and often contains several varieties at one time, all very beautiful in the water. Dozens of fishing boats at Curry's fish dock.

Take a drive out on Flagler Avenue (County Road) four miles to the east end of the island.

The city limits embrace the whole island, half is not built upon.

Resting seats are provided for pedestrians by the L. C. A. at Corner of Simonton and Eaton Streets, on Duval Street at the "Vogue" (Millinery) and at the rest tent on the Over-Sea White Park.

Don't pay any attention to "knockers." The town has recently obtained a new charter, they have elected the new Council, who have

reappointed the same Board of Public Works, all natives of the city, large property owners, and men who are willing and able to make Key West worthy of her "Uncle Henry."

We have waited a long time for a railroad and have had unforeseen delays, we have had time enough to be prepared but it has been difficult to convince the majority that there would or could be bridged so soon as we hope our visitors will not judge us harshly. Key West has always presented her worst side to the people who came to her shores, so we ask our visitors to overlook the unfinished conditions of our streets.

Now all is changed, police, prospects, people. We have undertaken to spend a million on our pavements and cement sidewalks and the visitor will soon find Key West the cleanest town in Florida.

We have several maps of the town but none printed of a portable size. If you desire a map on a small scale showing the streets, alleys, blocks and lots numbered, you can get a photograph of John A. Macdonald's map of Key West, at the photographic studio of Mr. Harrison on Duval Street.

Those who are interested in education will find the Convent School, the Ruth Hargrove Institute and the Harris High School well worth a visit.

In looking up these attractions you will find many other features of great interest, that we have not included in this hastily compiled list.

KEY WEST CONTINUES IN THE LIME LIGHT

Third installment of Geo. Byrne's article in the Manufacturers Record: (Continued.)

In the judgement of the keenest business men in the country the opening of the Panama Canal will many times multiply the business now being done between the United States and the countries to the south, as well as bring about a tremendous steamship traffic between the two oceans thus joined together.

Great steamers plying between the canal and the centers of population on the east and west coasts will bring all points from coastal Mexico to Colombia into such intimate relation with the United States that journeys from New York to the canal will become quite as common as from New York to Liverpool. But with those who make these journeys, and all the lesser journeys in between, time will be the most important consideration, and the hours that can be saved by taking rail to or from Key West, as the case may be, will make this the thoroughfare for a large majority of the travelers.

For the past several years the small steamships running three times a week from Knights Key to Havana have carried 15,000 persons annually from the former to the latter place. The completion of the road to this place and the putting in commission passenger steamships of large size and great speed will undoubtedly largely increase that travel, and that increased number will pass this way on the route to the hundred other ports to the south.

Now a large passenger traffic through a given place, even though none of it stops makes a great deal of business and leaves a large amount of money in passing.

In addition to these passing throngs there will unquestionably be a large number of tourists come to enjoy the mild winters and escape from the rigorous chill of their Northern homes. As written before, Mr. Flagler has announced the intention to build a big hotel here, and it is expected by Key Westers that it will be one of the most popular in his entire chain.

The trip over the "ocean-going" railroad will prove an attraction to many, and to others will appeal the novelty of a winter spent on a small coraline island, the home of old romance, the farthest end of the land of enchantment which Florida has long been to those who have not seen it, as well as those who have.

The mails, express and rush freight that will be transferred here and from

the island to railroad must in the course of a very short time become enormous. Lying on the direct route from between Northern and Southern lands, with a harbor so situated that vessels can turn from the roadstead and inside of an hour be discharging cargo at the mighty wharves to be provided by the railroad, Key West enjoys an advantage that neither size nor importance nor effort can overcome in favor of any other South Atlantic port.

With respect to industrial opportunities the outlook is particularly bright, and the citizens evince a determination to take full advantage of them. Knowing the possibilities of the cigarmaking business, they are naturally partial to that, and their first efforts under new conditions will be turned to securing more cigar factories. They think also that there is a good opening here for the manufacture of cigarettes on a large scale. It is thought that the turtle-soup business is susceptible of considerable increase, giving employment to many more people and adding to the general prosperity of the community, and there is no question of a revival in the sponge trade.

As for general fishing, it can be asserted with confidence that it presents opportunities for profit not duplicated elsewhere on the Atlantic coast. All kinds of fish native to Southern waters are found within easy reach of the city, and most of them in the great abundance. The Spanish mackerel, favorite in the markets of the North, and always in demand at good prices, makes its home in these waters in such quantities that it is caught by the ton wherever the effort is properly made. From other places in Florida the mackerel are shipped by thousands of tons annually, but nowhere are they so plentiful as among the keys that lie near Key West. At Miami a number of houses are engaged in shipping mackerel, yet the Miami fishing boats come 150 miles from home to fish within 30 miles of Key West. Here, then, is the natural point for a great fishing business, giving employment to hundreds of fishermen at remunerative wages. It is not the Spanish mackerel alone, however, that offers great possibilities for profitable fishing. The king fish, the baracuda, the red snapper—scores of varieties can be secured by the ton. It has been suggested that such varieties as the king fish would lend themselves readily to canning, and that a paying business might be built up along that line.

The situation at Key West with regard to South America suggests that it would be an excellent place for manufacturing the valuable woods in which that country's virgin forests abound into furniture and other finished products for the markets of the North. On some of the nearby keys lignum vitae grows, and also other varieties of timber that could be profitably worked into numerous valuable forms.

MILTON

CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR

Who He Is.

What He Has Done.

William H. Milton, the grandson of Florida's War Governor, was born on a farm in Jackson County, Florida, in 1864, and ploughed, hoed, and tended stock through his boyhood days.

At 14 years of age he was clerking for \$10 a month.

At 16 he was managing a farm and country store for \$20 a month.

At 17 he was surveying for \$30 a month, out of which he saved enough to go to college for two terms.

At 20 he went into business at Marianna on \$300 borrowed capital.

At 21 he was elected Town Clerk and served eight or nine years.

At 24 he was elected to the Legislature, served in the "Yellow Fever" session, and was active in securing the passage of the Health Laws which have freed Florida from yellow fever. He sold his mercantile business in order to give closer attention to his legislative duties in the regular session, where he was instrumental in passing the law disfranchising the negro, in defeating the Railroad lobby's attempt to abolish the Railroad Commission; and on the adjournment of the Legislature he took up the study of law under Judge Francis B. Carter.

At 26 he was employed by Judge Liddon at \$30 a month, and soon after was admitted to the bar. The same year he received an offer from Hon. W. J. Daniel to furnish the money for a banking business, Milton to do the work and take half the profits. In 1890 established the private bank of W. J. Daniel & Co., and is still running the business, though no longer getting half the profits.

At 30 he was appointed Surveyor-General of Florida and as such recommended the drainage and reclamation of the Everglades, which recommendation was "turned down" by the U. S. Land Department.

At 36 he was a candidate for Governor in the Convention of 1900, and was a leader in the advocacy and demand for a primary as being the means of placing the government in the hands of the people.

At 40 was solicited by N. B. Broward and other friends to run for Governor, and offered a campaign fund, but declined, and persuaded Broward to run because he believed his election would be for the best interests of the people.

At 44 he was appointed United States Senator to fill the unexpired term of the brilliant and lamented Will Bryan. His term of service in the Senate was short, but filled with good work for the State. Having allied himself with the progressive Democrats, he voted against the Aldrich Emergency Currency Bill, which was solely in the interest of National Banks and the interests; he procured surveys of New River at Ft. Lauderdale, and for a canal across the State; for inland waterways down the East Coast and up the West Coast and across to the Mississippi, the entire route known as the Mississippi to Atlantic Inland Waterway. The Government is now at work on the first link in the system, the canal connecting Lake Wimlico with St. Andrews Bay. This will be completed next year, and means much for Florida's commercial progress.

At 47 he is a candidate for the office of Governor, and, if the people know their own, he will be

At 49, Governor of Florida.

During all his manhood MILTON has been fighting the battles of the people, with and for the people; has stood by every principle and every candidate that represented the interests of the people, and whenever men were needed to help in the struggle against greed and corruption, he has answered the roll call, and has given freely of his time, his money and his energy in behalf of oppressed humanity.

As the campaign progresses, Mr. Milton will announce his views on public questions, and will tell what he will do when he is elected Governor.

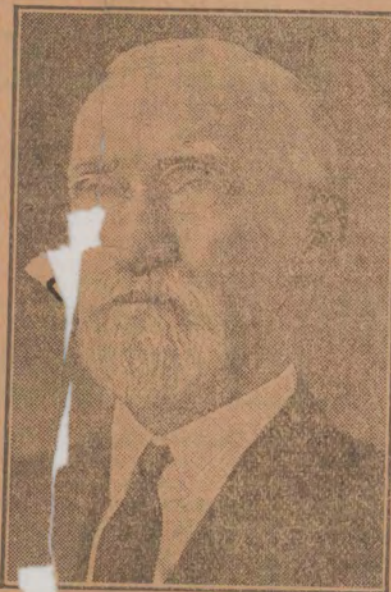


Four Scenes in Mulhall's Wild West Shows at Trumbo Island. Performance at 8 o'clock each night.
