THE HAVANA PLAGUE SITUATION SEEMS TO BE WELL IN HAND

It is Thought Now That the One Patient in Hospital May Recover

NO NEW CASES REPORTED

Sanitary Authorities Clean City Thoroughly and Kill Many Rats

(From Tuesday's Havana Post) Vicente Mendes, the Spaniard who is suffering from Havana's one case of bubonic plague, was reported much better yesterday afternoon, and last night he was without fever. No other cases have been found. One suspected case was reported in Santa Clara, but on investigation it was found to be another disease.

Partial Quarantine. Only a partial quarantine has been declared by the United States, and that is against persons who have lived in the infected area. The United States government through the marine hospital service has notified all steamship companies here that they must not sell tickets to the United States without the purchaser showing a certificate from the representative of the United States marine hospital service, who requires an affidavit that the purchaser has not lived in that section of Havana from which the reported case of plague was taken. Any person who has lived in the suspected district is required to go to Triscornia and remain there for seven days before sailing for an American port.

Sanitary Census. The department of sanitation is preparing a sanitary census of persons living in the infected district, and every one figuring in it will be the subject of observation from the department.

Many Units of Serum. The department of sanitation has imported from the United States several thousand units of bubonic plague serum. If the disease should by any possibility begin to spread, the persons who have been exposed to the disease may be made immune with the serum.

Officials Confident. The sanitation officials are jubilant because no more cases have developed. They will not say that more cases will not develop but they are extremely sanguine because there have been no additions to the single case at Las Animas.

Mendez May Recover. Dr. Guiteras, who is giving the plague victim at Las Animas his personal attention, was hopeful last night that he would recover. The condition of the patient was so serious Saturday that little hope was entertained. The fact that he went the greater part of yesterday without fever is now considered extremely hopeful sign.

Many Cases Inspected. The sanitation officials spent a busy day yesterday investigating every case that was reported as suspicious. No patient in any hospital had a suspicious blotch on his skin that a sanitation official was not called to examine it. In not a single instance was there any ground for suspicion.

TEDDY'S PARTY OUT OF LUCK IN OKLAHOMA

Laws of That State Are Peculiar and Roosevelt Men Are Disgruntled

Oklahoma City, Ok., July 9.—Though Oklahoma sent a Roosevelt delegation to the Chicago convention and the Roosevelt men have returned disgruntled over the nomination of William H. Taft and the defeat of Theodore Roosevelt, there is no possible chance for the Roosevelt progressives to put a ticket in the field in Oklahoma under the title of a republican organization. Nor could Oklahoma democrats, dissatisfied in any way with the results at Baltimore, put out a bolting democratic ticket in Oklahoma.

The democratic party in organization in Oklahoma carefully screwed down the lid to prevent the success of a bolting faction when Oklahoma became a state. This fact is not generally known among voters in Oklahoma. And this anti-bolting plan will prevail until the present laws regulating nominations and elections is repealed or modified.

In Oklahoma a candidate for nomination must file as a democrat, a republican, a socialist, or a prohibitionist, or else an independent.

L. C. A. WANTS MILK INSPECTOR HERE

Believes it Essential to the Health of the People of Key West

Editor Journal:

Some time ago the Ladies Civic Association sent a communication to the city council requesting the appointment of a milk inspector. The communication was filed for future reference.

The association is very anxious to hear from this matter and trusts the council will take it up at the next regular meeting.

We understand that the city may not be in position to add such a man to the pay roll at this time, but we believe that if they will investigate the matter they will agree with us that the inspection of the milk we consume is a matter of vital importance.

There is especial danger of tuberculosis germs in cows, and naturally the milk from such cows endangers the lives of all who drink it. Especially susceptible to such milk are the babies and invalids whose diet is principally milk.

We believe a thorough inspection of the dairies in Key West is imperative, and we trust the council will view the matter as we do and take steps in the matter at the next meeting.

UNCLE SAM IS POOR HAS BUT FEW BILLION

Over Three and Half Billions Dollars But Only Half Billion Circulating

Washington, July 9.—The American government and people began the new fiscal year with \$3,640,407,621 of which but \$636,641,021 is in circulation and the balance held in the treasury vaults as the assets of the federal government. This vast volume of real money breaks all records, so far as the treasury statements show, for the winding up of a fiscal year and it surpasses a year ago by \$54,400,000.

Treasury officials, estimating that the population has grown to 95,866,000 up to last Monday, says that a pro rata distribution of this money would give each person \$34.26, or six cents more than a year ago.

The total stock of gold in the United States is \$1,813,499,440. Of this amount \$607,445,193 is in circulation, an increase of \$13,500,000. The country has \$732,163,173 in silver.

FLORIDA ROOSEVELT MEN WILL MEET IN JAX

To Hold Convention in Two Weeks and Name a State Ticket

Jacksonville, July 9.—The supporters of Roosevelt in Florida are planning for a convention to meet here within the next two weeks, according to H. L. Anderson, republican leader.

Many Florida republicans will support the third party movement and Roosevelt's new party. It is said the party will nominate candidates for congress and a candidate for governor as the beginning of the movement for development of the organization.

PUNTA GORDA HERALD TELLS FISH YARN SERIOUSLY

Oscar Conkling of The Miami Herald Will Now Have to go Way Back And Sit Down. Honestly, The Man Who Wrote This Ought to go to Jail

With Miami's natural history museum growing so rapidly there has probably not been time for the corraling of a few porpoises and devil fishes from the waters adjacent to this coast, but perhaps some deal can be made with the young man of Punta Gorda, for the two porpoises which he has succeeded in training to pull a boat—if he recovers them.

The story is told by the Punta Gorda Herald—while the editor was away—and is given here with all credence. Says the Herald:

"Edward Pilcher, a Punta Gorda boy seventeen years old, has succeeded in breaking in a pair of porpoises to harness and training them to haul a boat around as horses are trained to haul wagons.

"Edward lives with his widowed mother in the western part of town near the tide creek, which, beginning near the site of the old cigar factory, debouches into Charlotte Harbor, a few yards east of the abandoned cattle dock. Some six months ago, he was standing on the banks of the creek when a mother porpoise accompanied by two young ones passed up the stream. The idea of capturing the trio at once occurred to him; and so without wasting any time, he hurried down to near the mouth of the creek, where the banks are scarcely eight feet apart, hastily constructed a substantial harleade across the stream. He used the flotsam and jetsam which, in the shape of timbers and other pieces of boat wreckage, had been collected there by the tides for several years past.

Branches of mangrove trees served to close securely all openings in the barricade.

"The work required considerable time and Edward had scarcely finished it when the three porpoises appeared returning to the bay. On coming to the obstruction they seemed surprised and mystified. They swam about it and rooted around and "blowed" and finally swam back up the creek where they apparently consulted on what was best to be done. In a few minutes, they came tearing back with a rush and a noise like a small hurricane and when within seven or eight feet of the barricade, the mother porpoise sprang from the water as if fired from a great gun and rising six feet in the air passed clear over the obstruction and escaped into the bay. The two calves, also made a great leap, but they fell short, struck the barricade and dropped back into their prison. They made repeated efforts to jump out but being unsuccessful in every one finally gave up and became quiet.

"Having thus caged his game young Pilcher set to work to tame and domesticate them. This task required over a month to accomplish. The captives were fed on fish several times a day and were taught the sound of their master's voice and by the end of five weeks they would come at his call and take fish from his hands. A few weeks longer, and they became as gentle as the pet cat of a kind household. Edward could place his hands anywhere on them and fondle them and play with them as with a pair of pet dogs.

"Then another idea occurred to him—to break them into harness and train them to pull or rather haul a boat. Accordingly he fashioned out a set of suitable harness, made of cordage and shrunk leather and dressed them in it. As soon as they became accustomed to it and had learned to obey the reins they were hitched to a small skiff which Edward owned and kept moored in the creek.

It was with much difficulty that all this was done; it took several weeks to get them to fully understand what was wanted and to do their work smoothly and correctly.

"Finally after six months of patient effort, Edward had succeeded in training his porpoise steeds into doing exactly as he wished. They worked beautifully and moved with a swiftness that was thrilling. Every day Edward had grand rides behind

his marine steeds up and down the little creek. They were beauties, each nearly four feet long, and Edward was so proud of them and their performances that he took The Herald man down to see them. The newspaper man was both astonished and delighted by the strange spectacle of two big fish hitched to a skiff and driven by a boy, obedient as trained horses to the lines he held, rushing like speed boats up and down the creek with water foaming behind them and breaking over the bow of the skiff. This, reflected the scribe, will be a great advertisement for Punta Gorda next winter. People will come from all over the world to see these marine racers and their performances and Pilcher will get rich showing them off. In due time The Herald will notify the world of this unique and unparalleled spectacle which is not to be seen anywhere else save here.

"Having thus entertained the scribe and given him materials for a new 'fish story,' Edward told the writer to be down on the city dock at 10 a. m. next day as he would then astonish the people of Punta Gorda and every body else by bringing his porpoises and boat around and showing them off in front of the docks. Promptly at the hour named the scribe was in position on the dock, and gazing toward the mouth of the creek. He did not wait long before he saw Edward, his steeds and the boat come rushing into the open bay. The water was boiling and foaming in front of the boat and dashing high about the bow. The boy who was standing up and holding on to the reins. He and his boat were fairly flying through the water.

"On getting about half a mile out from the shore, boy and porpoises, to the surprise of the spectator, turned down the bay instead of heading for the docks in front of town. The water and spray, foam and fog thrown up by the boat and steeds almost hid the spectacle from sight. In an incredibly short time, the whole outfit so to speak, disappeared from view at or about the black beacon eight miles down the bay.

"What happened was narrated by young Pilcher after he had been rescued by Capt. W. L. M. Demere of the light house service. He said that it took him some time to remove the barricade from the creek after which he passed out easily. As soon, however, as the porpoises got into the open water of the bay, they simply went wild apparently with joy and it was impossible for him to control them. They dashed straight towards the middle of the bay and then turned towards Boca Grande, all the while going with the speed of a torpedo boat. As they approached the black beacon they made straight for it and Pilcher could not turn them from their course. He was making desperate efforts to steer them clear of the beacon, when they dashed under it, one going to one side of an iron piling and one on the other side. Thus the iron pillar came between them and tore their harness to pieces. At the same time the skiff struck the piling and was smashed into splinters. Pilcher was thrown headlong, twenty feet he thinks, clear out from beneath the beacon and into the water. He barely missed striking the piling; had he struck it, he would have been instantly killed. He swam to the beacon, clambered up to the platform and sat there for several hours before being taken off by Capt. Demere who has charge of the harbor lights. While waiting to be taken off he made repeated efforts to call back his porpoises, but they either did not hear him or would not obey him. He believes, however, that they will some time return to the creek, in which they were captured and trained, and then he will recapture them. But, if he ever does recapture them, he says he will never again drive them out into the bay."

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS IN SESSION AS INVESTIGATING COMMITTEE

County Records Being Thoroughly Probed in Search of Irregularities in Reference to Licenses Paid Committee Reports Tonight

STRICT QUARANTINE BEING MAINTAINED

Olivette Brought Neither Passengers Nor Freight From Cuba Last Night

The Olivette arrived last night from Havana, after having been thoroughly fumigated before leaving that port. Beginning yesterday a strict quarantine went into effect in Havana, and from now on passengers will be required to spend seven days at Triscornia Island before they can leave for the United States. This means that for the next seven days at least, the Olivette will bring no passengers from Havana. Just what restrictions will be placed on freight from that port cannot be stated this morning. It may be that freight of a certain nature, that which can be easily fumigated and in which rats cannot conceal themselves, will be allowed to come through.

Dr. S. D. W. Light is taking every precaution at this end of the line, and last night the Olivette was not allowed to come to the dock and all her ports next to the dock were ordered kept closed. Not a member of the crew was allowed to land.

It was stated last night that there is but one case of the plague in Havana, and if this is so, the health authorities may have little trouble in stamping out the disease. In the meantime, every reasonable precaution will be taken.

RAPIDLY ERECTED CHURCH.

BATTLESHIP NEW HAMPSHIRE RAMMED

Fall River Boat Ran Into Warship But is Not Damaged Below Water

New York, July 9.—Groping its way through a dense fog in Narragansett Bay yesterday afternoon the Fall River liner Commonwealth, rammed the United States battleship New Hampshire near the Newport Naval Training Station. Both ships sustained considerable damages, but no fatalities or injuries resulted from the collision.

The Commonwealth's bow was stove in where it rammed the battleship while the New Hampshire's stern was cut about the protective deck. The after compartment was crushed through, the gun and berth decks were smashed and the captain's after cabin and the boiler room beneath were damaged.

Divers reported no damage to the battleship's propellers, its rudder or engines.

AH YING DONATES TO TITANIC MEMORIAL

Says She Earned Her Dollar in Tea Garden and Wants to Help Out

Washington, July 9.—The Woman's "Titanic Memorial" formed to honor the men who died to save women and children, has become one of the biggest institutions in Washington not connected with the government service. The employees of the memorial occupy two suites of the Union Trust building, a half block from the treasury department, and are kept busy eight hours a day acknowledging contributions and tabulating receipts.

BLUE LETTER LAWS ANNOYING TO BISHOP

No Wine Can Go Into Oklahoma For Use in Administering Sacrament

Muskogee, Okla., July 9.—A ban of federal law forbidding the shipment of liquor into old Indian Territory also excludes the carrying of wine by railroad companies for sacramental purposes in churches. Wine is so essential in the eucharist in the Roman Catholic church that Father Joseph Van Hulse, priest of the Church of the Assumption at Muskogee, finds himself driven to an embarrassing extremity in procuring this symbolic representation of the blood of Christ.

"If the railroad companies finally are forbidden to bring in sacrament wine," said Father Van Hulse, "I shall be compelled to go personally to Missouri or Arkansas and get it."

"What if you should be arrested?" he was asked.

"That I could not prevent," he replied. "In this matter the law of the church would control me. Wine is fundamentally necessary in worship in my church."

PROHIBITION PARTY JEALOUS OF TEDDY

Say He is Trying to "Swipe" Their Name of "Progressives"

Atlantic City N. J. July 9.—Maintaining that the prohibition party is the original progressive party, a determined effort will be made to change the party's name at the national convention which opens here Wednesday.

Though the party to be formed next month in Chicago is being referred to as the "progressive party" the prohibitionists point to the fact that the new organization has not been christened and that they are entitled to the new name if they choose to take it.

"The name 'prohibition party' is an unfortunate one for us," said Charles R. Jones, chairman of the national committee. "It is not a progressive name and does not truly reflect the party's character. We are progressive in all things. Of course our basic principle is the suppression of the liquor traffic, but even 'prohibition' does not fully express that."

"We expect to deal carefully and progressively with all the big political issues of the time. The name progressive was suggested several years ago, and our official newspaper now contains the word 'progressive' in its title."

"We do not believe a third party headed by Mr. Roosevelt will have any effect upon our cause in the next campaign. Our people know that Mr. Roosevelt is not at all in sympathy with our movement."

REPLYING TO A CORRESPONDENT.

If our friend who sent us a letter yesterday will write the other letter which he says is to follow, we think it will be much better, and we will hold the one we have until the other one is received.

MUCH TO BE DONE HERE YET.

A government commercial agent stated to us that Key West impressed him as having done much, but as having much yet to do. It is generally conceded that there is much to do, and we can only accomplish that "much" by a get-together spirit.

This gentleman remarked that he always expected much from the commercial bodies, and while it is to be regretted that the local chamber of commerce has not been very active for some little time, this is a good time to call a special meeting for the purpose of organizing a membership campaign. Not a poor, weak effort, but a dashing, enthusiastic campaign which will carry everything before it and make the Key West chamber of commerce at least the third in size in the state. This could be accomplished by organizing the members into squads, giving certain territory to each squad and in this way a friendly rivalry among the various squads would result and a large membership rolled up.

The plan of another city might be adopted and a dollar dinner given to which every member of the chamber of commerce and every man who cared to be invited. Each man would pay for his own plate, and the benefit to be derived from such a dinner would lie in the fact that our business men would "get together" and many new members enrolled.

To be a strong, aggressive, effective organization, the chamber of commerce must greatly increase its membership and bring in as many "live wires" as is possible.

DESTROY THE ROOT OF EVIL.

A few months ago a loving husband and father left home to bring his train to Key West. He bade his wife and children, those dependent upon him, good-bye, with never a thought that he was saying his last farewell.

On a bright and beautiful Sabbath morn, scarcely before the sun had dried away the morning dew, this husband and father was MURDERED. And MURDER in this case meant not only the taking of a human LIFE, but it also meant taking the bread from helpless children, breaking the heart of a loyal wife and robbing a yet unborn child of the protection of a father.

The law has taken its course and sentence has been passed on the man at whose door lies all this misery. But can anything be done to repay this widow and these orphans for their loss?

As long as such places as that in which this murder was committed are allowed to run, as long as possible death traps await the feet of the unwary, just so long will crime thrive and grow and fill our jails and cemeteries. Just so long will the number of widows and orphans be increased.

The law gives neither vengeance nor satisfaction to the widow and orphan, for they have been deprived of something which it is beyond human agency to replace—the love and care of a husband and father. And YOU, young woman, may be aroused from your peaceful slumbers at some time to hear the crushing news that you are a widow, and that your little one is an orphan. And YOU, the father of boys, may be told that your son has met a violent death in some vile place where crime breeds in all its viciousness.

A horrible picture you say, yes, horrible, but TRUE. Not only possible, but PROBABLE. And the only way in which you can prevent the probability of such a horror coming home to YOU, is to enlist yourself against these evils and fight them until they are stamped out. If it is a will of the majority of the people that these hot beds of crime and iniquity be stamped out, they WILL be stamped out, for the will of the majority is stronger than anything this side of Hades.

FLORIDA'S PROGRESS.

There are still many among us who remember the old boast that Florida was the heaven of the fisherman, the hunter and the seeker after health; the state has not lost its attractiveness for these; but such attractions are dwarfed into insignificance in public opinion by its new aspect of a home for the bustling, hustling, active and working components of an average American community. Having achieved first rank as a pleasure resort, as a sanitarium and for its fruits, Florida became widely advertised as the garden of the nation; again the scene changes and the romantic gives place to the activities which are now making the Floridian justify his claim to brotherhood with every other American—the heaven is working into our hearts and changing once more our aims and purposes.—St. Augustine Record.

My lord, the ancient potentate, leisurely ascending in ecclesiastical gown, while conscious of an earthly power reaching even into England, could still fancy he was going up a Jacob's ladder into realms supernal. Saint Louis, with gaze benignly bent toward the aerial escalier de dentelle of the chapel to the left, might well exclaim no royal road could compare with this inspiring and holy way; nor is it difficult to understand a sudden enchantment here, or beyond, that drew to the rock on three pilgrimages that other Louis, more sinner than saint, the eleventh of his name to mount the throne of France.

But those stones, worn in the past by the footsteps of the illustrious and the lowly, were deserted now, and, for the moment, only the moon, which had escaped from the cloud, exercised there the right of way; looking squarely down to efface time's marks and pave with silver from top to bottom the flight of stairs. It played, too, on facades, towers and battlements on either side, and, at the spectacle—the disk directly before him—the Black Seigneur, about to leave the dark and sheltering byway, involuntarily paused. Angels might walk unseen up and down in that effulgence, as, indeed, the old monks stoutly averred was their habit; but a mortal intrusion on the argent way could be fraught only with visibility.

To reach the point he had in mind, however, no choice remained; the steps had to be mounted, and, lowering his head and looking down, deliberately he started. As he proceeded his solitary figure seemed to become more distinct; his presence more obtrusive and his echoing footsteps to resound louder. 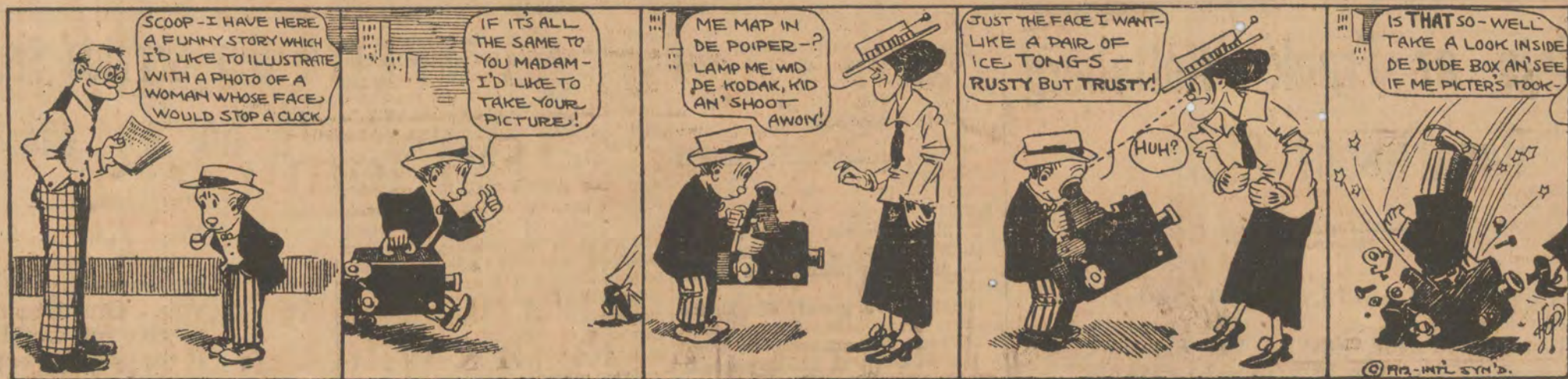
