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NATIONAL DEFENSE DAY.

By official declaration, and by what seems to be almost unanimous popular approval, July Fourth of each year is set apart to be observed as our National Defense Day.

The idea grew out of the fact that when this country was called into the World War, it was found in an almost totally unprepared condition. The thought came to some, and met wide approval, that one day in the year should be used as a general gathering of the able bodied men of the country in order that it might be seen just what the normal volunteer man-power might be.

Defense Day observance is not obligatory; it is rather an appeal to the wisdom and the patriotism of the people. It is not, says the United States high officials, in any sense to be, nor to be considered, a mustering of strength to show the world the nation's power. It is to be considered, and is so intended, only to show the manhood of the country, and every citizen as well, that our country is always to be thought of, and is to be uppermost in mind.

Key West will observe National Defense Day somewhat, perhaps, more intensely than many other cities. Naturally this should be, for Key West is the country's great southern base of defense for the army, and the navy, the coast guard, marine and submarine departments.

Citizens of Key West are patriotic. They will turn out today with the army, the navy, the marines, the coast guard and revenue branches of the service, joining in as citizens and as members of various organizations, military and civic.

The day will be generally observed, even the merchants closing for a good part of the time.

Naturally it will be a twin observance, for the Nation's birthday is celebrated on the same date. Every club and every organization is prepared this morning to make its best appearance, and to help fill the citizenship of this community with high and lofty ideals of patriotism, love of country, and preparedness when called on, and the equally as great thing of meeting each other face to face as brothers under one flag which is dear to all.

It was a brave little nation that was born on the Fourth of July, 1776—it is a brave nation that we have in 1925.

Let us make the day, annually, one on which we pledge anew our allegiance to the flag and to one another in the protection of that flag.

THE CHILDREN'S MILK FUND.

The Key West Woman's Club, after a quite thorough investigation, has written The Morning Call that "many children here go to school with little or no breakfast and some have only a piece of dry bread for lunch, or their noonday meal."

Following this discovery the Woman's Club is placing labeled milk bottles in the stores and restaurants, cigar and cold drink stands, requesting the public to be charitable and drop in their pennies, a nickel, dime or more, to help swell the fund with which to purchase fresh sweet milk for these children.

The note from the club to The Morning Call says that reports will be made in the Key West papers rendering an account of the money received for this necessity sponsored by the club. It also states that the club members will gratefully receive personal donations or monthly contributions for the milk fund.

It is well known that an underfed child cannot grow into that mental, moral and physical perfection which marks the normal adult of this country.

It is beyond thought that Key West business men and women would knowingly permit the condition found by the Woman's Club to continue after its being revealed to them.

All religions teach that it is more blessed to give than to receive; and even the man without religious inclination will fight to see a child given fair play.

Let us come to the rescue of this condition discovered; not in the spirit of cold charity, as when Sir Launfal threw his gold to the beggar at the gate, when he started out in the wonderful June to seek the Holy Grail; but in that of the heart-softened old man returning from his quest in bleak December's snow who came down from his horse to share his last crust with the beggar, and found in him the Christ Himself, who said:

"Who giveth himself with his alms
Feeds three:
Himself, his hungering guest—
And ME."

AS A REMINDER.

About a year ago, if we recall correctly, one of the leading Miami papers doubted the wisdom of Dade county appropriating any more bond money to build roads connecting Dade county's roads with those in adjoining counties, because Dade had built the Tamiami Trail west to the Lee county line upon the assurance that Lee county would complete its part at the same time.

The "doubt" was expressed in connection with the request that Dade build down to meet the Over-Sea Highway which Monroe county had voted \$300,000 to build on Key Largo and for the causeway and bridge across Barnes sound to the mainland. However, the Dade county commissioners appropriated a certain sum from the next bond issue that was voted and started the work down from Florida City to the water.

This is just to remind Dade county, and those who doubted the wisdom of the cooperation, that Monroe county has practically finished its part, both on the island of Key Largo and the bridge across Barnes Sound. Monroe county will be ready for driving across the island and sound by the first of September at the latest, unless the sports fishermen of Miami succeed in delaying the work by their insistence that a draw bridge across Steamboat Creek shall take the place of the bridge the war department authorized and gave permit for without protest or opposition from Miami.

When the bridge over Barnes Sound is completed next month how much of Dade county's thirteen miles between Florida City and the point be still unbuilt?

Monroe county undertook this work under the agreement with Dade county that the two county sections should be built at the same time and the road opened on both ends simultaneously.

What has delayed the game in Dade county? Surely, Dade county must have seen by this time, and long before, that it would run no risk of having another "Tamiami Trail" expense and "no where to go from there," in the matter of its thirteen miles of the Dixie Highway south from Florida City.

Speed up, neighbor! We took you at your word and have rushed our part practically to completion. We do not need the bridge over Barnes Sound merely as a fishing pier; we need it to enable our Keys people and your citizens to inter-visit; and to permit the outside world to come in and see how great, in truth, are the Florida Keys.

PROTECTING OUR WILD FLOWERING TREES.

There is no part of Florida richer in its abundant variety of blossoming and ornamental trees, shrubs and palms than Monroe county.

On the mainland there are the greatest and most royal Royal Palms known in the United States; on the mainland and on the Keys are the most magnificent Royal Poincianas and beautiful varieties of the Night Blooming Cereus family, together with rare palms and hard to find tropical blossoming bushes, trees and vines.

It has long been considered the right of any one who fancied them, to take from the woods whatever of plant or flower he pleased. The result is that the forests are fast being stripped and the fields and hammocks denuded of their rare and beautiful plants, bushes and trees by the commercial pirate who gathers, not for the love he has for beauty, but for the few dollars for which he can sell to others.

The last legislature passed a law making it a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 for any one to take any tree, plant, shrub or bush, or any part of them, from the land of another without first having secured the written permission of the owner.

This is a good law, although it will seem harsh to those of other states who have garnered at will the bounteous beauty of spring, summer and autumn glory in field and wood.

The Florida Keys should be preserved, so far as their arboreal beauty is concerned, in their natural state. It should be, as it now is, a violation of law to strip from the land the natural growths of beauty and floral worth which are found on these Keys.

Let the rest of the country strip its trees and denude its marshes of beauty; but let Florida, and especially Monroe county where nature has bestowed so much that is unusual, preserve its natural beauty of tree and plant and vine.

Let us consider Monroe county as a plant and tree sanctuary, even as it should be a bird sanctuary.

The Magna Carta of American Liberty



IN CONGRESS, July 4, 1776

The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America.

When in the course of human events it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a solemn appeal is made to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of their intentions. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed. — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence in the choice of new Governments will surely dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. — But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object, evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Tyranny, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. 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COVELESKIE HURLS MASTERFUL BALL

HE'S A PIRATE BOLD AGAIN

Back in 1901 the Pittsburgh Pirates stepped to the front in the National league to reign supreme for three years.

What a team of stars trotted onto the field in Pirate uniforms every day that first year! The pitching staff included Jess Tannehill, Jack Chestro, Sam Leever and Deacon Phillippe. Handling these famous moundsmen were Chief Zimmer, hero of the bare-hand days, and Jack O'Connor.

And the list of stars didn't stop there. Hans Wagner, the one and only Honus, was just starting on his brilliant career which was to go down in baseball history as one of the most brilliant ever recorded. Kitty Bransfield was an infield mite. Tommy Leach was another man in the inner defense.

And out in left field roamed another star — Fred Clarke. It was his leadership that carried the club to that first pennant. The next year he repeated. The following year he led his stars—almost jumped to the American league, but Clarke carried on. That fall the first of the modern world's series was staged between the Red Sox and Pirates. Clarke had high hopes of winning that series when the Buccaneers won three of the first four games, but the Red Sox nosed them out with a spectacular comeback and won the series with five victories out of the eight games played.

Gave Adams Chance. Six years later Clarke led another team to the flag—a team that introduced Babe Adams to fame. Adams, a rookie, playing his first year with the Smokey City outfit, pitched and won three games in the world's series against the Tigers that fall.

Now Clarke is back on the job with the Pirates and fans are wondering if his presence bespeaks another pennant—or a row of them. Clarke was signed recently to act as assistant to the president, Barney Dreyfuss. His chief duty will be to act as aide de camp to Bill McKechnie, pilot.

It is one of the few cases in baseball, too, where such a move would not be looked upon as an effort to "ease out" the manager. McKechnie is popular in Pittsburgh. During the opening weeks of the season when the team failed to hit its expected stride, there was no criticism of Bill's methods. The team was going good when Clarke joined it. The feeling is that Clarke, working harmoniously with McKechnie, will bolster the weak spots in the team's play and help build up a second defense that will be ready for emergency duty.

Clarke is another example of the born baseball man who can't quit the game.

When he stepped out as pilot some time after the 1909 campaign Clarke felt the urge to become a gentleman farmer. He was tired of the hustle and bustle of towns. He

thought he had seen enough baseball. But after a year or two he found himself returning to Pittsburgh once in a while to see the Pirates in action.

First few times he sat in the grandstands. But that didn't give him the real kick. He found his way to the bench and more often watched the game from that vantage point — where he could be right in the game. For a couple of

years he had been unofficial aide to McKechnie and the Pirate leader was glad to have his help. Now he's back officially. And happy.

Clarke stands out as one of the best outfielders the game produced. During the years that he led the Pirates to their four flags and through the intervening campaigns he held to a brilliant pace afield and at bat.

SPORTS DONE BROWN

None of the broken bones reported among the league ball players are in the head. Which is a sales boost for ivory.

Give this bird Gene Tunney credit for having considerable confidence in Gene Tunney.

Here are a few of his views on Jack Dempsey and his ability—expressed while announcing the fact that he, Gene, would rather meet the world's heavyweight champion than anybody else.

"Dempsey can't use a straight left or a straight right.

"Gibbons is a cleverer boxer than Dempsey and I licked Gibbons at long range.

"Dempsey couldn't stop Gibbons with his alleged murderous infighting. He can't stop me.

"Dempsey never uses an uppercut. I'll whip him with a straight right and a right uppercut.

"I can lick any man that comes to me and Dempsey comes to his opponent.

"Dempsey parks his brains in the dressing room."

Boys, look that list of cracks over. That's the proper spirit for an up and coming aspirant for any crown.

But some of the alleged shortcomings of the champion must be weighed a trifle more seriously by

Mr. Tunney if he wishes to avoid a catastrophe.

Dempsey seldom employs a straight left or right. The blows do not fit in to his style of fighting. This fact, however, hasn't handicapped him noticeably in his rise to fame. A straight left or right sends your opponent back—away from you. Dempsey prefers close range fighting.

Then why should he shove his man out of range with the blows named?

Georges Carpentier was a cleverer boxer than Dempsey—a cleverer boxer than Tunney—in fact one of the most scientific men the ring has ever known. You—and Gene—will recall what happened to Carp. Dempsey didn't stop Gibbons with the short body blows that spelled the end for scores of others. But the question as to how hard Dempsey tried is still a much muted one.

Dempsey doesn't go in for uppercuts. For one very valid reason. Dempsey knows that the man who delivers an uppercut—if he fails to drop his man—lays himself wide open. Shadow box for a second. Let go an uppercut and note what a pretty target your right or left side, as the case may be, leaves for an opponent. If Tunney ever turns loose an uppercut on Dempsey that fails to connect Tunney's seconds may well be ready for the towel.

Dempsey comes to his opponent, true enough. But he has a way of

making you think, instead, that you are coming at him. About the time you think the champ is giving ground, he is giving you a short left to the heart and a right to the jaw. Ask Jess Willard.

As for parking his brains in the dressing room. Dempsey can't do that. His fighting brains are in his maulers. He is the greatest natural fighter the modern game, at least, has known. He fights by instinct. No one ever left his instinct lying around.

Outside of those few little discrepancies Tunney has a good line on Dempsey.

Now I don't wish to belittle Tunney as a fighter. He and Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo are the outstanding heavies of the game today, at 3 o'clock between the Indians and Regulars. One of these two men, I feel sure, has a good

chance to succeed Dempsey. But the way to the throne doesn't lie through trying to belittle Dempsey's greatness. Much that is said derogatory of Dempsey is turned loose either in the hope of egging him on to re-enter the ring or to talk up interest in some one of the leading contenders for his crown.

There is no reason to date to believe that Dempsey is no longer the greatest man in the heavyweight ranks.

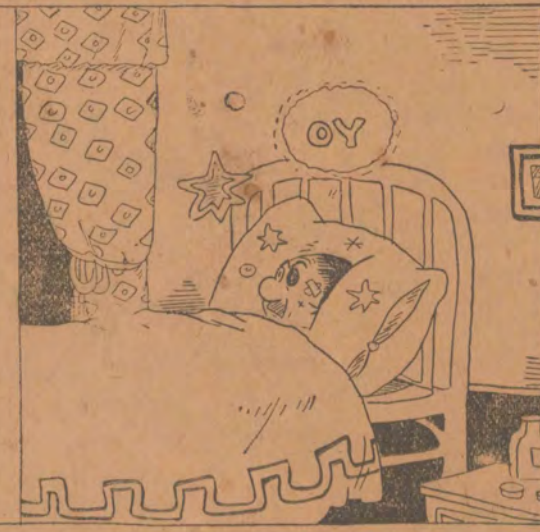
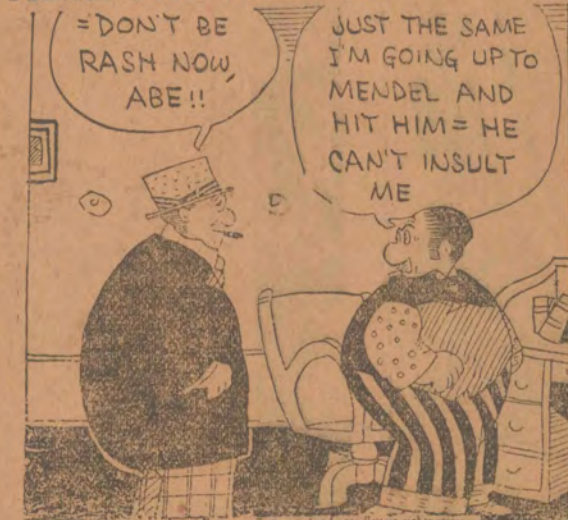

FOURTH OF JULY NOT YET SO SAFE

Fourth of July, safe and sane as it may be planned in many communities, still is a day that stands out for its large number of accidents because of the celebration, according to hospital and police records. The majority of these are among children of school age, girls as well as boys, and in seriousness range all the way from the slight burn to injury or loss of sight and occasionally tetanus.

"The practice among physicians of immediately injecting the antitoxin for tetanus when called to dress the deep jagged or puncture type of wound is undoubtedly responsible for the comparative rarity of this disease," said Dr. Chester T. Brown, associate medical director of the Prudential Insurance company, in calling the attention of parents to the dangers children run in handling fireworks. "However, there is a real danger of tetanus resulting from the wounds caused by the explosion of giant fire crackers or toy pistols. It is in such a deep wound that the tetanus bacillus, which cannot live in air, flourishes. These wounds should never be given merely amateur home treatment. A physician should always be called promptly for tetanus, or lockjaw as it is frequently called, is fatal."

LIGHTNING HITS SEVERAL PLACES

Key West was yesterday afternoon visited by a severe electrical storm and tropical downpour. For over thirty minutes the rain poured in torrents following twenty minutes of more of thunder and lightning. In the short time that the rain fell, the weather bureau office here reported a rainfall of .48 inch.

Lightning, preceding the downpour, struck several places in the city. A large hole was torn in the roof of the house of Mrs. Ella Roberts, at 809 Division street. The bolt struck the ridge of the roof and tore a rent in it which runs about five feet down either side and is a foot or more in width at the widest point.

The flag pole of the city hall was also struck and the base of the pole splintered. The shock of the bolt could be felt throughout the building, and the many people who were in attendance at police court at the time thought that the hall was more seriously damaged.

This was the most severe electrical storm occurring here for some time. While its duration was long, the violence of the electrical display before the rain, and the intensity of the downpour made it the most severe storms for many months.

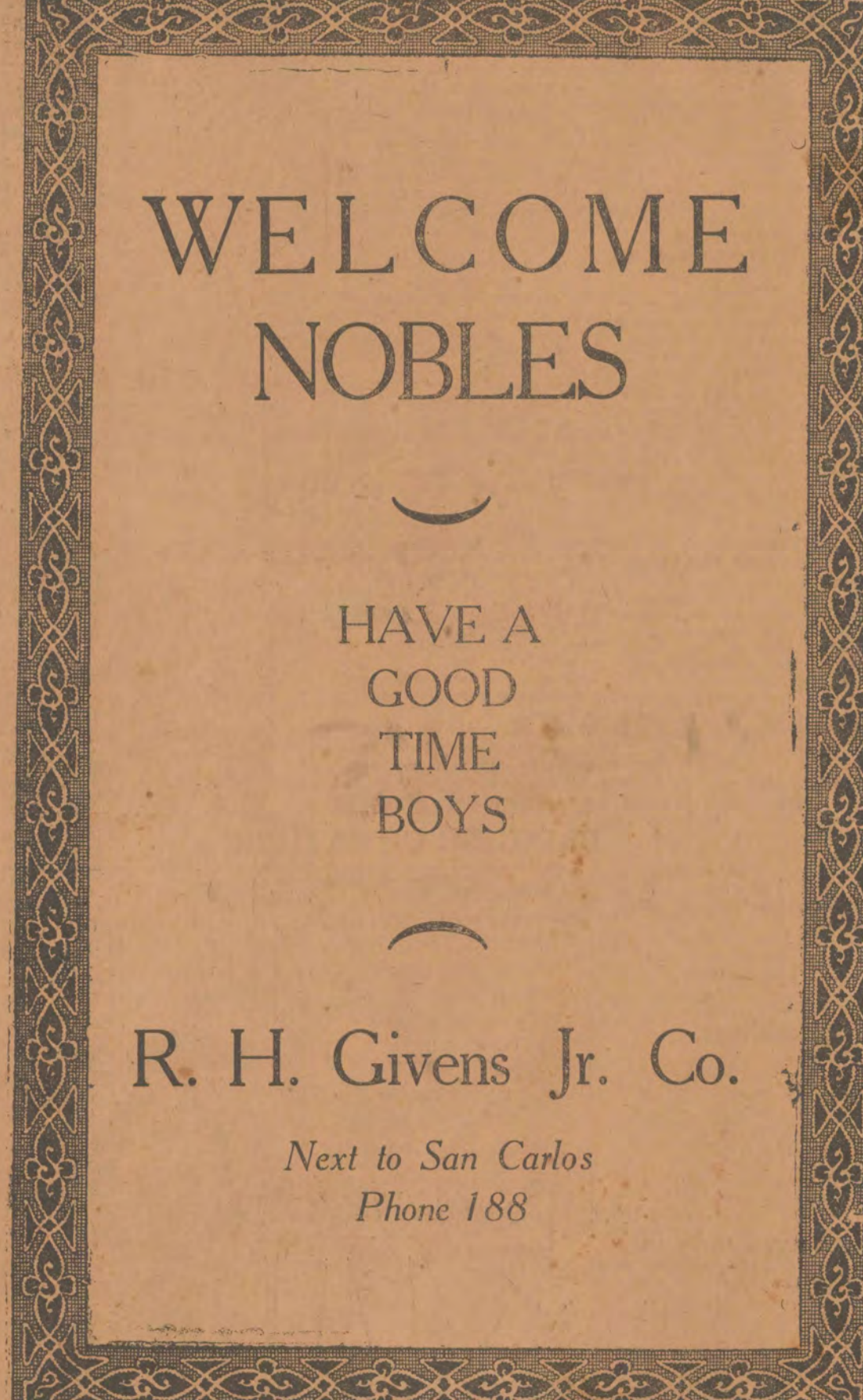
