Music Lovers Of Key West
Were Out In Force To
Hear The Great Violinist

DELIGHTFUL MUSICAL TREAT

Prof. Mohn Says Key West
Musical History Dates From
February Twenty Second

"The man that hath not music in his soul
Is fit for treason, stratagems and spoils."

The violin recital given by Maud Powell at the Hargrove Institute Auditorium last night was a complete success.

Professor Mohn is always happy in his introductions, but he was never nearer to the truth than when introducing Madame Powell to the large and appreciative audience last night. He said: "I suppose I can say without contradiction that the commercial birth of Key West dates from January 22, 1912, when Mr. Engler's great work was completed. With just the same emphasis I say that Key West's artistic life commences on February 22, 1912, when the greatest living violinist comes to our city to delight us."

There were in that audience devotees of music, who had heard Kubelik and Josef Hoffman, in cities far from here, coax heavenly strains from rare old violins with pedigrees of several centuries. But it is doubtful if those masters of the bow gave them more genuine pleasure than did the artist who held them spellbound for eight hours last night.

Madame Powell's eulogies would fill a fair sized library, but no lover of harmony would say they are too far-fetched or beyond the mark. The spontaneous and from the heart, and could only emanate from such as have music in their souls. Madame Powell will go away with the happy assurance that she held captive one southernmost city of the United States.

Her versatility is wonderful. At one moment, in a veritable riot of melody, she bears the soul aloft to the empyrean; at another, by the magic of her touch, you are among the Ozarks with the simple strains of the Arkansas Traveller ringing in your ears. "From grave to gay, from lively to severe," her bow touches the whole gamut of human emotions. She is as much at home in the rendition of difficult theme and amid the multifarious variations of the Kreutzer Sonata, as she is when interpreting the arias of Gracioso's Faust, or the more simple strains of Moore's immortal melodies.

It is said, and said with truth, that every artist loves his art with a passion beyond words. The least observant person can see that Madame Powell's first love is her violin, and it is natural that she should, for she evokes from these few strings "A concordance of sweet sounds" whose beauty the most comprehensive vocabulary can describe but faintly.

Nor should her able accompanist on the piano, Mr. Waldemar Lichowsky be forgotten. He is also an artist with a versatility not inferior to that of Madame Powell herself. His rendition of Grieg's Wedding Music was superb.

As Professor Mohn said, February 22 is Key West's birthday from the viewpoint of art.

LEGAL EXECUTION MARS INSURANCE

Death At Hands Of The Law Kills Insurance Says The Supreme Court

Washington, Feb. 22.—Death by the hand of the law voids all life insurance policies of the criminal. The supreme court so held this week in the fight of the children of James S. McQue, former mayor of Charlottesville, Va., who was executed for the murder of his wife in 1905. A policy for \$15,000 was carried by McQue in the Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company, of Wisconsin.

The United States circuit court of appeals for the fourth circuit held that the policy was made in Wisconsin, and under the Wisconsin laws was not annulled by execution on the gallows. The supreme court today held that the policy was not to go into effect until the payment of the premium which was made in Virginia, and therefore that the policy was made in Virginia and was not governed by Wisconsin laws.

After reviewing the cases in the federal courts of Virginia, the court announced that this public policy, in both federal and state courts, is that death by death by the law should void life insurance.

As Mess Boy And Made
A Mess Of The Job

Time 1:30 Wednesday afternoon. Place corner Greene and Whitehead street. Temperature about 75 in the shade. He was standing there apparently lost, wearing an overcoat which touched his shoe tops, with two portly volumes under one arm and something wrapped in a newspaper under the other. He reminded one of the ghetto portion of New York, with his decided Hebraic features. He looked lonely, and he was lonely, for he had just come off the Concho after a trip that was anything but comfortable.

Louis Shapiro that was his name, had decided to leave the noises and the smells, the hustle and bustle—and the cold also—of Avenue A, so he went down to the Mallory dock on the East River and was signed on the Concho's articles as messboy. If I could get a job here I wouldn't mind. I watched my chance to leave the ship, because I suppose they wouldn't let me off if they thought I was going to skip. I'm afraid of the bass and wouldn't go back for anything. No more sea for me."

ST. PETERSBURG REAL ESTATE IS ON THE BOOM

A Visitor In The City Says
That Prices Over There
Are Something Awful

George Hanna of Columbus, O., who is in the wall paper business, got here yesterday from St. Petersburg. This is Mr. Hanna's first visit to Key West, though he has frequently made the trip from Knight's Key to Havana. He can see nothing but prosperity in store for this city, now that we have rail communication with the mainland.

"Real estate values in your town," said Mr. Hanna, "should appreciate rapidly. I don't know if they will ever go sky high like they are in St. Petersburg. There is a tremendous boom on there in real estate. Dirt is selling at prices which in cities of 300,000 or 400,000 would excite comment. Property is selling there in many cases for what I should say is five times its intrinsic value. They are asking \$20,000 for business lots in side streets, which is going some. A friend of mine told me the other day that a two story frame building for which three years ago he refused to buy for \$1750, sold a couple of weeks since for \$25,000. That will give you an example of how inflated prices are there. The town is expanding. Busy enterprising men are plating and putting in concrete side walks, sewers and water five and six miles out in numerous 'additions' and 'subdivisions'. I don't believe much in booms, but I should think that Key West, would from now on, experience a healthy inflation in prices."

JAS. DEPASS WAS FOUND DEAD IN ROOM

Mother Of Unfortunate
Miami Boy Was In Key
West At Time Of Death

Early this morning the dead body of James P. DePass, Jr., a young man well known in Miami, was found in a room at a lodging house on Avenue C near Fourth street, in a badly decomposed condition, the man having apparently been dead for several days.

On finding the body, neighbors telephoned Deputy Sheriff Hendrickson and W. C. McCall, the coroner. A coroner's jury was empaneled, consisting of Messrs. J. P. Neilson, Raymond Dillon, J. W. Harper, J. J. Combs, Jr., M. T. Cann and Eugene Porter, and the case was immediately investigated.

From all testimony given before the jury it appeared that the man had long been in a very bad state of health, suffering from asthma and tuberculosis. He was seen alive on Saturday night last.

The door was broken open this morning and the body was found in a cramped condition, kneeling between the bed and wall, and, as stated, in a very advanced stage of decomposition. It is believed that DePass must have died some time Sunday or early Monday morning.

After a careful consideration of the case, the jury rendered a verdict stating that in their belief death resulted from natural causes.

The deceased was a son of Dr. James P. DePass the well known Methodist minister of Williston, Fla., who died very suddenly in this city on January 30, 1907, while visiting friends.

During the illness of the young man, he was visited by many friends in the city. He occupied a small room in a lodging house at the corner of Avenue C and Fourth street. He was well known, and was a member of the First Methodist church, South, of this city.

The remains are being held for instructions as to funeral arrangements. Mrs. James DePass, mother of the deceased, at Williston, Fla., is now in Key West, and it is probable that she will arrive in the city tomorrow and accompany the remains to the old home at Williston for interment.—Miami Metropolis.

Plaintiff Awarded Damage to the Amount of Five Thousand Dollars

AN APPEAL HAS BEEN TAKEN

Jury Was Out Fifty Minutes
And Brought In Verdict
For Third Of Amount

At 9 a. m. yesterday morning the Circuit Court opened with all officers present.

Judge L. W. Bethel announced that the next case for trial was that of Morris Garfunkel versus Abram Wolkowsky, "Trespass on the case \$15,000."

The jury was sworn and after examination the jury took their seat.

Many witnesses were examined during the day and both sides ceased taking testimony at 2 p. m.

H. H. Taylor, made the opening argument for the plaintiff, followed by Geo. G. Brooks, who outlined the case for Wolkowsky. Hunt Harris followed with a rather long but convincing argument in which he extolled the virtues of the Jews and spoke about their achievement in mercantile pursuits, the high standing of their eminent statesmen and their remarkable progress since the dawn of civilization.

The jury retired at 3:45 to consider the case and at 4:35 returned with a verdict of \$5,000 for Mr. Garfunkel.

Mr. Brooks then asked the court for permission to file a motion for appeal which the court granted.

Throughout the entire case counsel acted with remarkably impressive consideration, in view of the import and far reaching influence of the case, Court adjourned immediately after the rendition of this verdict and will convene again at 9 a. m. this morning for the trial of the remaining cases on the calendar.

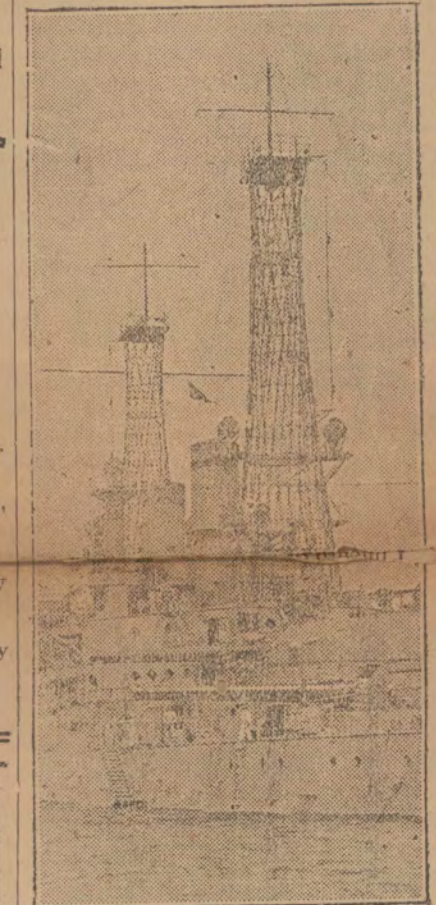
Navy Men Say They Must Be Abandoned.

Practically Indestructible, but Vibration Proves Handicap to Range Finders and Diminishes Accuracy in Gunnery.

Washington.—The skeleton masts on the United States battleships, distinctly a feature of American war craft, are said to be doomed for the scrap heap. There is a great deal of discussion in naval circles over the apparently well-founded report that the navy department intends to abandon the skeleton masts with which all battleships are now equipped because they have not come up to expectations, and from the viewpoint of naval experts are a hindrance and a handicap to efficient marksmanship. The vibration of the mast, due to its slender mechanism, is said to be the chief defect. For this reason the range finder, whose duty it is to pick up the object and communicate the distance to the gun pointers, is unable to do so with the celerity and accuracy that would be demanded in a naval engagement.

When the skeleton mast was introduced on American battleships it was agreed generally a great step had been taken in advance of other nations. It was the belief then, and still is, that the mast is indestructible, which gave the ship in time of action a big advantage, for if the mast could not be shot away the fire control system of the vessel at no time would be threatened.

The position of the range finder is at the top of the mast. He is the pulse of the ship, and mistakes made

by him may mean the destruction of the vessel. Naval experts figured a 12-inch shell would pass through the skeleton mast without destroying it, whereas one shot in the old style hollow steel mast would bring it down and with it the whole fire control system. It was calculated several shots could go through the skeleton masts and it still would stand. But from all indications those who advanced the skeleton mast theory evidently were carried away by their enthusiasm and overlooked the drawback in another direction that would be caused by the vibration of a battleship steaming at full speed.

How much depends upon the range finder can be understood only by men who make a study of fighting at long range, as was pointed out by an expert who says the skeleton masts are a failure. It was expected that when the lattice work masts first made their appearance other nations would be quick to adopt them. It was a surprise to advocates of the new type of mast that this was not done. The skeleton mast is typically an American naval idea, but from all indications the defects now seen by experts here were foreseen by experts in other navies, and the American mast let alone.

Those in favor of the skeleton masts point to the excellent gunnery records made in target practice since their adoption as proof of their success, but the counter argument is advanced that if the range finders were placed on more substantial posts the marksmanship of the navy, increasing in excellence as it has done year by year, would be still better and all records for speed and accuracy would be smashed. The unpopularity of the skeleton masts has been growing steadily. It is said the change is not far off, and any day may see orders issued doing away with what a year or two ago was thought to be great stride forward in naval construction.

Death Follows Alcohol Rub.

WOODROW WILSON GREAT DEMOCRAT

Judge Stringer of Illinois Recognizes Him as the Logical Leader of the Party.

IS FITTED FOR WHITE HOUSE

Statesman, Scholar and Proved Practical Executive, New Jersey Statesman Would Be Ideal Occupant of the Presidential Chair.

Democratic Candidate for the U. S. Senate From Illinois Against Lorimer.

Before meeting Gov. Wilson, I was somewhat predisposed in his favor, from having read many of his productions and having admired the great comprehensive grasp of economic situations which pervades all of his political utterances and writings.

Still while predisposed in his favor, until I had personally met and conversed with him, I was not convinced of his availability as a candidate for President.

Since meeting Gov. Wilson, however, all doubt in that regard, in my own mind, has been removed. Gov. Wilson is presidential timber of the exact kind and quality required at the present time. To begin with he is an intellectual giant, with a broad comprehensive grasp of every public situation. Throughout the east, he is universally regarded as the brainiest American living today. Even in private conversation, his intellectual scintillates in every sentence he utters. He has a logical and analytical mind. His language is simple, easily understood, yet definite, incisive and convincing. He has been a student of political economy since his boyhood, has written varied books upon the subject and is conceded to be the highest authority upon theories of government in the country today. While our presidents have generally been men of patriotic impulses, honest and conscientious, still few of them have been great intellectually. Thomas Jefferson was an exception to this rule. Woodrow Wilson, if elected president, by reason of his instincts, characteristics, training, fearlessness, patriotism, faith in the people and extraordinary intellectuality would indeed be a second Thomas Jefferson.

As governor of New Jersey, he has given that state a practical business administration, so conceded by all. He has shown himself to be peculiarly fitted for the executive office along the most practical lines. In meeting him, you are impressed with this fact. The schoolmaster is not in the least in evidence. He is plain, matter of fact, and his conversation is not pedantic or pedagogue, but direct, forceful and earnest.

Above all he is a man of the people. He was born with no silver spoon in his mouth. He is not a man of means or wealth. He is easily approachable. No dignity hedges him about. He resides in a very modest home at Princeton. On knocking at his door, no servant, liveried or otherwise, met us at the portals. It was the governor himself who opened the door for us, welcomed us in, took our hats and wraps and laid them aside, ushered us into his library, made us feel at home and talked to us neighbors who had dropped in for a casual call. There are no frills nor furbelows about him. He is essentially Jeffersonian. As governor of New Jersey, he has fought for the plain people and they love him. In doing so, he has antagonized the interests. He knows it, but doesn't care. He has faith in the people and takes them into his confidence.

Sense of Duty Supreme.

I also found him to be a man of positive convictions with the courage of the same. He is fearless in his expressions of opinions. If they do not agree with your opinion, he is sorry, but he does not trim his views to conform with yours. His sense of duty is supreme. He would not change his views, unless convinced that he was wrong, even though it made him president. He is not a trimmer. He is not a politician, but a statesman, in all that word implies. What he says to you, he is willing the world should know. He is the soul of integrity and honor and he stands today as the one great champion of progressive ideas of government in state and nation. If elected president, no machine leaders, bosses or factions, will control or influence him. His sense of duty alone will actuate him.

Altogether I was exceedingly well impressed with Gov. Wilson as a man, as a statesman, as an executive and as a possible, if not a probable, future president.
