HON. J. M. CHENEY OF ORLANDO WILL SUCCEED J. W. LOCKE

Practically Settled by Semi-Official Statement That
President Taft Will Appoint Mr. Cheney--Ap-
pointment Goes to Senate Within Two Weeks

Jacksonville, Fla., July 13.—Speculation as to the probable successor of Judge James W. Locke as Judge of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Florida, whose resignation was announced Wednesday, has been practically settled by the semi-official statement that the President has decided to appoint to the vacancy Hon. John M. Cheney, of Orlando, at present District Attorney in Judge Locke's district.

It understood that President Taft announced his decision in the matter several weeks ago and based his decision on the statement that Col. Cheney seemed to be the choice of the majority of the Republican organization in Florida as well as of a number of influential outside agencies.

Much interest was felt in the appointment because of the prominence of the several applicants. Among these are Hon. M. B. Macfarlane, at present Collector of Customs at Tampa, Hon. E. R. Gunby, former collector and for years a prominent Republican in Florida. Hon. William Hunter, a leading attorney of Tampa, and Judge Call, of the Circuit Court for the Jacksonville circuit. Mr. Cheney's candidacy was not so pronounced as that of the other gentlemen and much surprise is expressed here incident to the disclosure that he has been practically determined upon by the President for the high position.

Mr. Cheney has been an organization Republican in Florida for years. He was appointed district attorney to succeed J. N. Stripling, of Jacksonville, and has made a good record in that office. Among the considerations which hit him, said, prompted the President to his selection, are his high qualifications as a lawyer and the esteem in which he is held by both democratic and republican acquaintances through the State of Florida and the country at large.

The appointment, it is expected, will go to the senate within the next two weeks.

STATE CONVENTION IN OCALA JULY 27

Progressives Plan to Send
3 Democratic and 3 Re-
publican Delegates

Jacksonville, Fla., July 13.—A call for a convention to be held at Ocala, Fla., July 27, has been made by H. L. Anderson, provisional committee man, appointed by the Roosevelt national committee. The convention at Ocala will elect six delegates and six alternates to represent the state of Florida in the Chicago convention to be held August 5.

The convention will also nominate electors, candidates for congress and state officers, as well as a state committee. Mr. Anderson who signed the call as provisional committee man, stated to a reporter that in his opinion the Ocala convention would elect three republican delegates and three democrats to represent the state of Florida in the Chicago convention and that the candidates for state offices and electors as well as the candidates for congress nominated by the new party, will make a vigorous canvass and a strong fight during the coming campaign.

THE TORRENS SYSTEM OF LAND REGISTRATION

The Torrens System of land registration has begun to attract the attention of Florida real estate men, attorneys and others, and the need of a system similar to the one introduced into Australia by Sir Richard Robert Torrens, in 1858, or one founded upon that system, has begun to be felt. This system of land registration should appeal, not only to the real estate men and the attorneys of the state, but it should make its strongest appeal to the property holders of the commonwealth—owners of land, whether their holdings be large or small, for they are the ones most directly interested in the workings of the system.

The writer of this article has spent considerable time, studying the Torrens system, as it has been adopted in the different states of the union, and in January, 1911, while a member of the house of representatives of South Carolina, introduced the first bill, providing for a modified form of the system in that state.

No New Dream.

The Torrens System is no new dream, but as stated above, introduced into Australia fifty-four years ago and worked very successfully; in fact, so successfully that it has been adopted, in more or less modified form, by several other states in this and other countries. Massachusetts, Illinois, California, Oregon, Minnesota, Colorado, and Virginia were, I believe, the first states to take the matter of adopting the system under serious consideration, and soon after numbers of other lawmaking bodies, Arkansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Iowa, Georgia, Maine, Michigan, Mississippi, Montana, New York, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Texas, Washington, West Virginia, have all had the matter up before their legislative bodies, and have either adopted the system, or there is some prospect of its being adopted by each of them. The system has been introduced into Hawaii and the Philippine Islands, and Porto Rico has taken steps to secure its adoption.

Favoring the System.

From what I have been able to learn, there seems to be a healthy sentiment in its favor, among those who know what it would really mean to the property holders of the state, were it adopted by the Florida legislature. The great mass of the people know nothing of the system, however, and until they have been shown its advantages and disadvantages, it is a disadvantage it has, there will not be much chance of the legislature of this state considering the matter seriously. The people's representatives are, as a rule, slow to adopt radical changes, striking at the very roots of customs long established, unless there is a popular demand for such action. And while the changes which the Torrens system would bring about are radical, yet our most conservative thinkers, once they know what the system really means, are not slow to advocate its adoption.

The Objects of the System.

The objects of the system are, in the main, as follows: To clear titles, which when once cleared, shall hold for all time and against every one; to register the titles found to be clear; to require every subsequent transfer and every mortgage and proceeding of any kind that may affect the title in question, to be registered upon the original certificate of title, which original certificate would never go out of the clerk's office, and also to require every such transfer, mortgage, or proceeding to be registered upon a duplicate certificate, which duplicate certificate would be given to the owner or owners of the land or lands so registered. As a consequence, every one might know for a certainty the true state of the title at any time.

Saves Property Holders Money.

Have you ever stopped to think of the immense amount of money that is paid out every year by Florida land owners for examination and reexamination of titles to land whose titles are really known to be good? If not suppose you do so. And then

taken into consideration the fact that the same thing is repeated year after year; every time a piece of land changes hands, or every time it is placed as security for a loan, the title has to be examined anew. Under the Torrens system this trouble and expense would be eliminated.

A Supposed Case.

The supposition I shall make really does happen, or I might say similar cases really do happen every day in the year:

Suppose that a tract of land, consisting of one hundred or more acres was cut up into 100 lots and sold, each lot to a different individual; even if the land had been in the possession of one family for a century or more, and the titles were known to be good, every one of the one hundred individuals would have to be satisfied by a lawyer's examination that the titles were absolutely good, before they invested their money for the same. Then suppose that during the next ten years every one of the one hundred lots was resold, the men into whose hands they fell would have the titles examined again, to make certain that they were clear. That same thing goes on year after year, and has been going on for a century and longer, and the really surprising thing about it all is that it isn't necessary. The Torrens system would make all this examination and reexamination absolutely unnecessary and uncalled for.

Land as a Security For Loans.

Suppose that you own the most valuable piece of land in Monroe county, worth at the least figure, fifty thousand dollars, and you want to borrow ten thousand dollars on that piece of property. You need the money and you need it today. You go to the bank to secure the loan and you find that you will have to wait until the bank has its attorney look up the title. But you need the money, today, and you are placing fifty thousand dollars worth of real estate up for a loan of one fifth of that amount! That makes no difference—you have to wait until the bank's attorney has examined a title that both you and he knows is good, and when it is over you have to pay an attorney for doing the work. Under the Torrens system you could borrow money on your registered certificate of title, as easily and as quickly as you now can on stocks or recognized commercial value. And under the Torrens system your discount rate would not be increased by even a nominal attorney's fee.

The Small Land Holder.

The small land holder, the man who owns a small farm or a medium priced city lot, would derive as much or more benefit from the introduction of the Torrens system into Florida, than would any other class of property holders. When he places his property as security for a loan, he pays an even higher rate of interest, attorney's fee included, than does the larger holder of property.

How It Works.

A title is examined officially once, and only once. The findings of the examination are confirmed by order of the court of land registration, which would be established, were the system adopted. That ends any question as to the title; you are given a duplicate certificate, the original being kept always in the office of the clerk of the court of land registration, and this certificate of title guarantees to all the world that you have title of title, to the lands described in the certificate—as, for example, a life estate, or a fee simple, in whole or in part, free from encumbrances or subject to such encumbrances as are mentioned in the certificate.

Your certificate of title shows always its true state and condition, and you can handle it in much the same way that you handle your stock certificates. There's no "looking up the title," for it is always plain to every one.

With our real estate placed on the same footing with our personalty, several millions of dollars would be added to the working capital of the state, and we can only

DOCK STRIKE IN HAVANA COST PINEAPPLE GROWERS FORTUNES

Crop In Cuba This Year Was Largest in Years But
Growers Were Practically Ruined on Account of
Fruit Being Tied up on the Wharves

conjecture as to the good that would result.

The Torrens system, under any of the modified forms adopted by the several states, enables the state to collect her taxes promptly, and under this system no man's land would be sold for taxes without his knowledge.

A man who has given the subject much more thought and study than I have been able to do, gives as his opinion that the Torrens system would "lessen the cost of transactions in real estate, stimulate and enlarge the market, and thus increase values," and says further that "when a poor man buys a home, he will get a good title to it, and no one will ever be able to take it away from him."

A Cold Business Proposition.

The matter, considered in the right light is simply a business proposition. Our real estate is by far much more valuable than our personal property, and yet we have it so hampered that it is by far harder to handle. Under the present system, no one will buy or lend you money on your land, without being absolutely certain that your title is good. The same titles are examined and reexamined, and always you have to pay the bill. Just think of the enormous amount of money that is spent every year for abstracts of titles to lands, and in the great majority of instances, it is spent by those who are least able to bear the burden. Under the Torrens system, the state would examine your title once, and that would be your title's final examination. Upon the surrender, if your title proved good, of your deed or title, the state would issue to you a certificate of title, and that certificate of title would show upon its face the true condition of your holdings. And once your title was declared good, the most conservative banker in the state would accept your certificate of title as readily as he would accept the stock of recognized commercial value that you hold.

State Guarantees Title.

Under the Torrens system the state guarantees the titles registered. It should: "It is the duty of the state to grant good titles to her citizens, and to enable them to keep their titles good, under the just administration of equitable land laws."

Havana, July 13.—Cuba's 1912 pineapple harvest, already though larger than that of last year by 40,000 crates, resulted in large losses to the grower and the shipper. Some houses which make a special business of buying and shipping pineapples were so hard hit that it will require two good seasons for them to recover.

STRIKE DID DAMAGE.

The cause of the failure of the pineapple crop to give the results this year that it has formerly, was due largely to the stevedore strike which started at the beginning of the shipping season and continued just long enough to accumulate so many pineapples here that when the fruit began moving the American markets were glutted and caused the bottom to drop out of prices.

CROP 900,000 CRATES.

The 1912 crop for the shipping season, which is during the months of May and June, amounted this year to 900,000 crates, an increase of more than 40,000 crates over last year. In May of this year there were shipped 560,000 crates as against 507,164 crates last year. The shipments in June this year were 340,000 crates as against 349,184.

PRICES STARTED WELL.

The prices this year were extremely good at the beginning of the season or until Havana dumped nearly a hundred thousand crates into New Orleans, New York, Mobile and Chicago within three days, and followed these shipments immediately with other heavy ones. The market never recovered from those shipments. Persons who had shipped their pineapples after they had remained on the wharves for several days on account of the strike would have done better to have given them away in Havana or have dumped them overboard. Shippers in some instances, failed to get sufficient returns on those shipments to pay the transportation and packing charges, while the grower who shipped his own fruit was a still heavier loser. The shipments which accumulated during the strike beat prices so low that they never recovered.

"BULL MOOSE" WILL MAKE GIANT SWING

Roosevelt Getting Ready
for Greatest Speaking
Tour Yet Attempted

Oyster Bay, July 13.—It was announced here tonight that starting within two weeks Theodore Roosevelt would probably begin one of the greatest "swings around the circle" which has ever characterized an American presidential campaign.

Colonel Roosevelt plans to visit nearly every state in the union and to occupy with the tour practically every minute between the day of departure and election day next November.

It is likely that Mr. Roosevelt will be present at the national convention of his party, the National conservatives, to be held in Chicago on August 5, but this is not certain.

He is busily engaged in mapping out his itinerary and preparing speeches for the giant swing. The latter will call upon the common people of the country to flock to his standard that the cost of living may be lowered and the tariff bars protecting the "interests" torn down.

GAMBLING AND ITS VICTIMS

In discussing the evil of any particular thing, illustrations are often given as to what happened to Jones or Smith or someone else in a distant city. In discussing the evil effect of gambling in Key West, and its depressing influence on the entire community, it is not necessary to go away from home to find cases which illustrate exactly the ultimate end of the gambler. You, Mr. Reader, or Mrs. Reader, just think back over the people you have known in years past. Did you ever know any of them to go wrong on account of their mania for gambling? Hasn't there been one or more of your acquaintances in time past who has sacrificed everything he had to the gaming table, even his honor? We venture to say that you have known of many such instances. Men once well off, with all the comforts of life and most of the luxuries to say nothing of a brilliant future before them, have sacrificed EVERYTHING on the altar of gambling and have dropped to the bottom rung of the ladder. This is not an exaggerated statement. It is an absolute statement of fact. Such cases have come under the personal observation of most of us.

The man who has nothing to lose but his weekly wages or salary is even worse off. He must toil all week long in order that his friend (?) who runs a gambling game may live easy without working. If he is a man of family, then his wife and children must live in want in order that some human leech may have the best that can be secured.

Unfortunately, most men cannot be brought to a realization of the proposition they are up against when they "buck" a gambling game. That being the case, they should be saved from themselves, and this can be done by forcing the gambling houses to close their places. Not for a day, or a week, BUT FOR ALL TIME.

We are not so shortsighted as to believe that the lid can be put on so securely that it will be air-tight, but we DO believe that fully seventy-five per cent of the gambling now going on in this city can be stopped and OUGHT to be stopped, a statement which we have no hesitancy in saying is echoed by fully three-fourths of our population.

CLEANLINESS INSURANCE AGAINST PLAGUE.

At this time, when practically every city along the Gulf and Atlantic coasts is cleaning up thoroughly to minimize the chances of an epidemic of plague, Key West should join heartily in the movement. There are some places in this city which are in excellent condition for disease breeding, and they should be attended to at once. It has always been desirable that this be done as a matter of civic cleanliness, but now, since the plague has made its appearance in Porto Rico and Cuba, it becomes imperative, as a matter of self preservation. During the past few days we have read the advice of medical men learned in their profession, local physicians and others, and cleanliness has been one of the points which they have emphasized strongly.

WOMAN'S INFLUENCE IN ELECTIONS

While there is a pronounced movement in various parts of the country to secure for women the right of suffrage, it has long been known that woman has been a powerful factor in the shaping of our government. This is much more noticeable in local elections, and every voter in Key West will concede that the women of this community have in a quiet, but nevertheless forceful manner, impressed their views on those who cast the ballot, and to their influence is directly traceable the results of more than one election.

In elections where the moral betterment of the city is concerned, or where there is a movement for civic improvement, the women of Key West do splendid work. They do not speak to crowds from a platform, but they wage a persistent campaign in their homes, with a large degree of success. The shrewd politician is well aware of the influence of women in elections, and he tries to make himself as acceptable to them as he does to their lesser halves.

THE ULTIMATE END OF THE "TIGHTWAD."

In every city there are men who are known as "tightwads." They accumulate large sums of money, are in a position to make life glad for themselves and for others if they choose, yet they pinch themselves and exist their allotted time without ever having known what life really is.

The Grim Reaper brings all men to a common level. No matter how much money we may have accumulated, how much land we may own, we cannot take a single coin, or an inch of land with us to the grave. We may rush through life with the greed for gold as our master passion. We may put behind us everything which goes to make the world brighter and better, but when the end comes, and Death is the great inevitable, what have we gained? We must lay down everything and pass into the Valley of the Shadow empty handed, without the comforting thought in the last moments of life that we have done our little to make the world a brighter and better place for those who are to come after us.

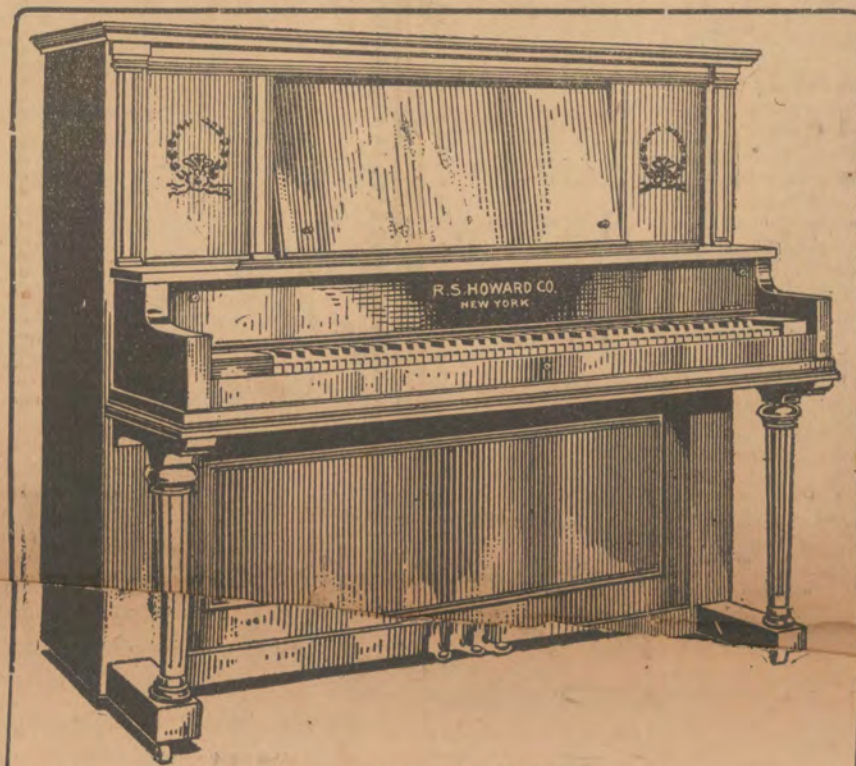

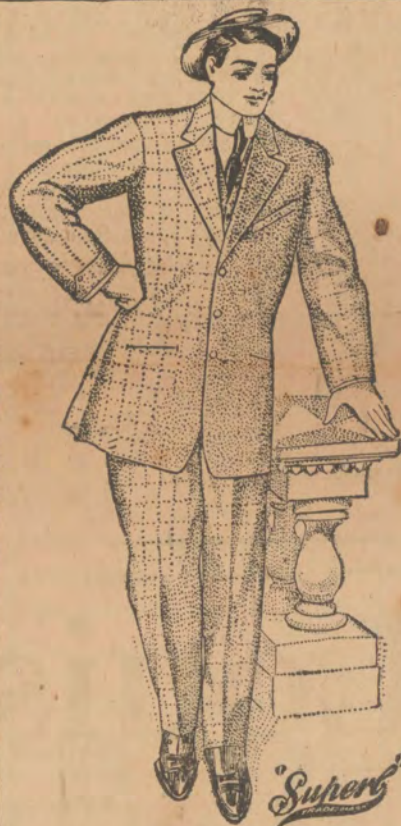

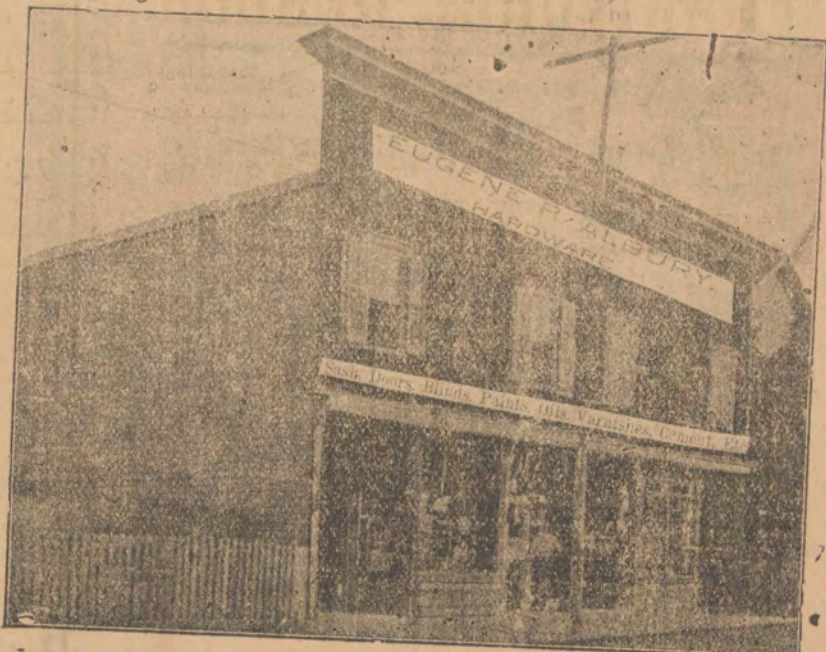
