"REMEMBER THE SABBATH DAY TO KEEP IT HOLY" TEXT OF SERMON BY REV. DARLINGTON

Sabbath Observance And It's Results Is Ably Handled In Sermon By Pastor Of The Congregational Church Should Be Read By Everyone.

Text Exodus 20th chapter, 8th verse. Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.

The name of God stands for Himself and for that which He has revealed of Himself, not for our thoughts about Him. Every person who claims to be intelligent should possess sufficient reason and wisdom to know, that God's name stands for Himself, and it is to Him that our reverence is due.

This command that regulates the sacredness of the Sabbath is of Divine origin, and should be revered and obeyed rather than questioned and transgressed by an uncultured and depraved humanity. Every command that God has given for the guidance of mankind, carries with it the essence of a positive nature, and when obeyed leads humanity in the light of higher ideals, a stronger personality, and prepares the human race for the higher joys and pleasures in which the creator meant that man should enter into.

Church going and abstaining from all forms of recreation and pleasure seeking on the Sabbath is by no means a sign or proof in itself that we keep holy the Sabbath day.

In order to degrade we must abstract virtue, and in order to debase we must make unholy the Sabbath day we must perform some act of unrighteousness, or commit sin. There is only one way in which it is possible to destroy the holiness of the Sabbath and that one way is to transgress God's law, for the true sign of the moral and divine law is sin.

The promise attached to the command to keep holy the Sabbath, is a promise of prolonged national stability. Every nation that has lowered the standard of her morality, and bowed in submission to the lower elements of a depraved manhood has fallen into the gulf of uselessness, to be devoured by the lusts of their own sinfulness. God says "They that honor me I will honor, and they that despise me shall be lightly esteemed."

Shall we who are American Citizens, cradled in the influence and spirit of the Puritan fathers consent to lower the bars of our American institutions,

and violate all moral and religious sacredness pertaining to the holiness of our Christian Sabbath by fostering that which is unholy and degrading in its very nature? We don't want to forget our mission as a Christian Nation, which is to spread an influence and power that elevate, so to lower the moral standard is too degenerate. In things essential we must have unity. In things doubtful, Liberty. In all things charity.

We may make the Sabbath unholy by being too narrow and dogmatic, as well as being too wide. Please don't swing to the extreme either way, but use good judgement and common sense and always remember that nothing but the transgression of God's law is sin, and nothing but sin can make the Sabbath unholy. Jesus as the Mediator, declared Himself to be the Lord of the Sabbath, and proved Himself to be so by turning what the Jews made a curse into a blessing. He asserted the true glory of the Sabbath day in asserting the "mystery of His own relation to God and to his creatures."

If I was called upon to preach a sermon to the whole population of Key West City, and my text was, "The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath" Mark 2:27, these would be my outlines.

1. All positive laws must yield to man's moral and physical necessities, etc.

2. The law as a formal common element may be broken, yet its spirit may be honored, etc.

3. There is a relation of life to positive laws. There is also a relation to moral law, which is higher and more exacting, etc.

In the third chapter of Mark, Christ teaches that in all ages circumstances have arisen which have necessitated a violation of literal sabbatism. David ate the show-bread, and the Priests profaned the temple, and yet were guiltless.

A COMMUNICATION.

As I have been in Key West quite a time, I feel led to thank the people for their help financially and otherwise. But oh, what a dreadful need there is of real aggressive, self-denying Christianity.

My heart almost bleeds as I see the poor men that have worked for months on the F. E. C. come down here and no place for them to go, they have to go somewhere to get out of the hot rays of the sun. They finally go to the saloon and there they stop, till some human vulture seeing their half-drunken condition, takes them by the arm to some quiet corner, perhaps dopes him, or gets into a quarrel with him, knocks him down and takes everything away from him, and the poor fellow finds himself in court without money and therefore has to serve his time. Now there is a remedy for these things. While it is impossible to stop every-

thing of this kind, we could stop some. I as a Salvation Army Officer have been stopped by scores of the men and asked if I have got a place for them to rest and have a bath and a cheap room, the same as the Salvation Army has got in other towns. And I have to sorrowfully say NO to their inquiry. I have put several men up in the tabernacle, I have also directed them to other places, but they have refused to go saying that they prefer the Salvation Army as they know them in other cities, these are several good christian citizens.

Now, I know that in Key West there are many that could easily donate a lot, where we could put up a place to put these men, also have an emergency room for women, and also have a place to worship in, so we would be able to bless the people spiritually, physically and morally. The Salvation Army in Key West are laboring under great difficulties. Firstly, we are not in a

Lemon Drop Cakes.

One cup sugar, two ounces butter, three eggs, three cups flour, one pound currants or raisins, half teaspoonful salt, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, one cupful milk. Flavor with lemon extract. Cream sugar and butter, then add the eggs, well beaten; then add the milk and flavoring. Have ready the flour, raisins and baking powder, also salt, which should be thoroughly mixed together; then add this to the butter, sugar, etc., and stir slowly until you have it all thoroughly mixed. Drop a teaspoonful at a time on a well greased dripping pan and bake in a quick oven until a nice brown, five to ten minutes.

Peanut Candy.

Prepare the peanuts by shelling a cupful and removing all the brown skins. Put one cup of white sugar into a hot iron frying pan, the bottom of which has been moistened with water, and stir until the sugar is dissolved to keep from scorching. Add the peanuts and turn at once onto a buttered tin. Before entirely cool cut the candy into squares.

Eggless Fruit Cake.

Two cupfuls sugar, two cupfuls buttermilk, one pound seedless raisins chopped fine, four cupfuls flour, one-half cupful butter, one tablespoonful soda dissolved in a little hot water; spices to taste; a cupful of rich preserves of pears or strawberry jam adds to the good fruit taste so well liked by many. Bake in a slow oven.

The Best Cookies.

One-half cup butter, one cup sugar, two eggs well beaten, four table-spoons sour milk, half teaspoon soda, half teaspoon mace, two and a half cups flour. Do not roll. Drop in pan, one spoonful for each cookie.

TO MAKE CODFISH CHOWDER

Delicious Dish That Will Form an Agreeable Change for Jaded Appetites.

Take an eight-pound, very fresh cod; take off the fillets, pare off the skin and cut the meat in squares; put the head, skin and bones in a saucepan with a gallon of white broth, a pint of white wine, pepper, corns, four blades of mace, four cloves, two bay leaves, sprigs of sage and thyme, a handful of parsley and a piece of butter; cover and boil slowly for 40 minutes; then pour the whole into a fine strainer and press gently with a skimmer to extract all the liquid. Chop two large onions, put in a saucepan with an ounce of butter and two ounces of fine chopped salt pork; stir on the fire long enough to evaporate the moisture; add the broth, four large potatoes and four peeled tomatoes, both cut in small squares, four ounces of finely bruised and steeped pilot bread; cover and boil half an hour; add the fish and boil five minutes longer. Skim a little, season highly. Finish with chopped parsley and two ounces of butter; mix carefully, so as not to bruise the fish, and serve.

Dark Tailored Suits.

The tailor suit is without doubt the necessity of the moment, and although these are now to be seen in dark shades, a redeeming touch of color generally relieves the somber effect which they give, while it lles with the milliner to add the crowning of brightness and chic to the toilette.

The pin striped velveteens are frequently to be seen in tailor costumes, but velveteen may be considered rather an expensive material for coats and skirts, as it rubs so easily that it soon assumes a woe-begone appearance—and, surely, nothing looks half so shabby as a worn and tumbled velveteen. For the woman who has many costumes, of course, a frock of this kind is a delightful addition to her wardrobe, although the fact that cheap, ready-made coats and skirts are to be obtained in this material will rather prevent it becoming adopted by those in quest of novelty.

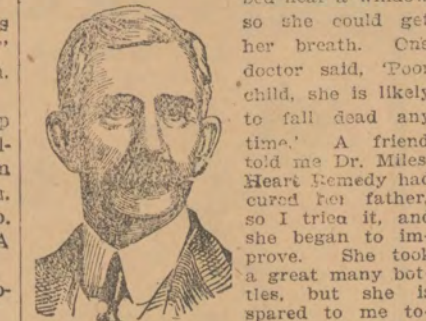
