DIET AND HEALTH
HINTS

EGGS, MEAT AND MILK
SHOULD NOT BE EATEN
TOGETHER BY CON-
SUMPTIVES.

Dr. David R. Lyman holds that eggs are not necessary in the diet of the tuberculous patient. This we think should be apparent from the fact that there is nothing in eggs which can not be obtained better in the average case from milk, which, however, should not be taken in its sweet form, in which the curd of cow's milk is extremely indigestible for the adult. The whole milk should be converted into buttermilk, in which the curd is so broken up as to be much more easily digested. The purpose in feeding the tuberculous person is to furnish the amount of fat, albumen and carbohydrate that can be assimilated, in the form requiring the expenditure of the least energy for digestion and assimilation, and with the least risk of leaving an indigestible and unassimilable remnant, especially of eggs, meat or milk. Albumen uncoagulated by high temperature as in uncooked eggs, milk and raw meat, is much more easily assimilated than beef fat or of pork or roasted peanuts, but the mixture of eggs and milk with beefsteak or even bread, as is customary in the ordinary feeding of the tuberculous, is a violation of a fundamental principle of the monodiet and is counter to the suggestion in the circular of information on the feeding of the tuberculous issued by the State of Illinois—that as far as possible those foods should be eaten at the same meal that digest in about the same time.

FEEDING IN TUBERCULOSIS.

Dr. John R. Murlin, professor of Physiology at Cornell University, says that the theory of stuffing in tuberculosis has been exploded. "It should be borne in mind," he says in the official organ of the Society for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, "that diminution in the supply of gastric juice, and consequently reduction of digestive ability, is common among consumptives. Therefore the enfeebled stomach should not be overburdened with more food than it can take care of. Disregard of this fact brings about much of the digestive and intestinal trouble of the tuberculous individual." Dr. Murlin contends that a consumptive will do well and gain weight on three pints of whole milk, eight ounces of cream, five ounces of milk sugar, six eggs and two slices of buttered toast, as a ration for each twenty-four hours. I have frequently emphasized the belief in these hints that the commonly accepted theory in regard to feeding in sickness in general and in tuberculosis in particular, is wrong. Any food taken above what the body can utilize results in the waste—and if milk or eggs fail to digest or if the quantity is excessive, the injury is greater than from vegetable foods. Dr. David R. Lyman of Wallingford and Dr. Paul B. Johnson of Washington, D. C., in addition to others whom I have quoted, hold that the stuffing theory is wrong. Both agree that the average person eats too much. The quantity of food that a consumptive should take varies as does the quantity required by the normal person and any such advice as can be given in this way must be adapted to the case by the physician.

FIREMEN STILL ON
STRIKE IN HAVANAFerries Not In Action—
Herrera Line Refused to
Re-employ Strikers

Havana, May 11.—Havana's harbor strike is not entirely over. The stevedores and launchmen, who began it, went back to work yesterday, but the firemen and sailors' union, whose members are mostly employed on coastwise steamers and harbor tugs, are still out. They include the employees on the Regla and Casa Blanca ferries. They assert that they were not provided for in the basis of arbitration arranged between the representatives of the stevedores and the corporations.

The firemen have drafted a list of demands on the shipowners which the latter say they cannot grant. The demands provide that the owners must employ only union men, and must not discharge employees without the consent of the union.

TRAFFIC TIED UP.

The attitude of the firemen and sailors effectively tied up all steam traffic in the bay yesterday. Fourteen coastwise steamers and tugs remained inactive. The ferry boats, with the exception of the Fessler of the old United Railways ferry, did not run, and the Fessler made only a few trips before the union succeeded in inducing its crew to quit.

BATTLE IN MEXICO
RAGING FIERCELYSkirmishes at Tlahualilo
Rapidly Develop Into
Desperate Fight

Escalon, Mexico, May 11.—The main body of the Mexican rebels under General Orozco and the federal army under General Huerta fought all day today near Tlahualilo without decisive result.

Couriers who reached here tonight from the scene of operations report that the skirmishes are rapidly developing into a desperate battle. The outcome of the revolution will probably depend upon the outcome.

PRELIMINARY REPULSE.

El Paso, May 11.—According to direct wire dispatches from the scene of action between Escalon and Torreón, the Mexican federalists under General Huerta repulsed the advance guard of the Orozco rebels in the preliminary skirmishes yesterday.

Sharp skirmishing is again in progress today in preparation for what is expected to be the decisive battle of the revolution. The two armies comprise nearly 15,000 men, almost evenly divided, the federalists having a slight advantage in numbers and equipment.

CLAUDE L'ENGLE
REPLIES TO TOOMERCandidate for Congress-
man at Large Says Toomer
"Did" Mail Letter

In last Sunday's Times-Union I printed a copy of a letter that the candidate of the full pocket-book wrote, as king of the turpentine men of Florida to send him eighty thousand dollars for his campaign and telling them that he was making the fight for the benefit of the turpentine industry.

In Monday's Times-Union Col. Toomer replied confessing that he dictated the letter but denying that he sent it out.

In last Tuesday's Times-Union I replied to Col. Toomer's attempted defense and to some false and ridiculous charges he made against me.

Not a word further was heard from this race track lobbyist till self-confessed briber whom the full pocket-book has put up, and is putting up for.

Inasmuch as Toomer is repeating his false and libelous letter in other newspapers, I will print my answer to it, so that the people will know the truth despite Col. Toomer's attempt to deceive them.

Here is my reply which appeared the day after Toomer's letter, which he does not answer, and which he does not refer to in his advertisements carrying his letter, appearing in other newspapers.

TO THE PEOPLE OF FLORIDA:

In a letter addressed to me dated May 6, which I received today and which was printed in the Times-Union yesterday (May 6), Col. Toomer says that he never signed or sent out the letter to the turpentine men which I, in my advertisement in Sunday's Times-Union (May 5), said that he sent out, and the Colonel calls on me to either admit that the letter I published was a forgery, or prove it, or retire from the race, I do not have to prove the letter, because Col. Toomer admits it in his letter printed in the Times-Union in these words:

"You quoted an incomplete, unsigned, undelivered and stolen form of a letter which I dictated intending to mail it to some of my friends."

Notice that Col. Toomer does not deny that he sent out a revision of this same letter which he says he destroyed but one of which reached me.

In my advertisement in last Sunday's Times-Union (May 5), I denied Col. Toomer to deny the authenticity of this letter. In the language quoted above Col. Toomer has admitted it. Therefore, I do not have to prove it. If there was no impropriety in dictating this letter, why this sudden determination on the part of the Colonel not to send this letter out and why so much care in its destruction?

As to how I got the letter: Col. Toomer says he did not send out any of these letters.

One surely did go out, because a person got it and gave it to me. I neither stole it, nor forged it, nor misrepresented it, but I got it in a perfectly fair, honorable, proper, open and above board way. For obvious reasons I will not at this time give the name of the person who gave it to me and expose that person to the attack of the full pocket-

book, because I pledged myself not to do so, in order to get the use of it.

The people of Florida need no assurance from me that this letter is straight goods and that I got it in a proper manner. They heard charges like this made when I printed some copies of telegrams when I had my fight on with Peter Knight. I told at the proper time how I got the telegrams, and I will tell at the proper time how I got this letter.

It makes no difference right now how I got it, except that I got it in an honorable, proper, open and aboveboard way. Col. Toomer admits writing the letter, which admission proves his previous statements that he is the candidate for no particular business interest to be false.

If he did not send all of the letters out, it was not because he did not want to appeal to these people, but because he was afraid I would find it out, and the result showed that his fears were well placed, because I did find it out just like I find out a good many other things against the best interests of the people of Florida and people wonder how I do it.

In this Times-Union letter of Monday, May 6, the Colonel asks me to tell him of the public services that I talk so noisily about performing. My modesty does not permit me to answer this part of the Colonel's letter. I let the Legislature of the State of Florida answer me. Here is the answer:

The House of the Florida House of Representatives, 1909, contains this resolution: House Resolution No. 144:

Whereas, Claude L'Engle has manifested a deep interest in all matters of legislation pertaining to the public welfare during the session of the Legislature of 1909; and

Whereas, The said Claude L'Engle did, during the early part of the present session of the legislature, tender the use of the people's lobby to the members of the legislature, together with all data and information contained therein touching questions of public moment and importance and

Whereas, The members of this house have accepted the use of said people's lobby during this session of the legislature; and

Whereas, The said Claude L'Engle has patriotically given his time and talents to the editing and publishing of "The Sun," which has redounded to the benefit of the people now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the house of representatives, hereby express its thanks and appreciation of the services rendered by the said Claude L'Engle.

Mr. Richbourg moved adoption of the resolution. Which was agreed to.

In this same letter, Col. Toomer also says that I sold for a short time the office of State Printer and drew from the public treasury more than \$25,000 in excess of what my successor drew for the same services, covering a corresponding period. Col. Toomer herein displays his ignorance about public matters in Florida. He should have known that the report of the State Comptroller contains the amount spent for public printing and that this report shows that in 1910, when my successor had the public printing, the State paid out upwards of 2,000 more for the public printing than it did in 1908 when I had the State printing contract, and that these years are corresponding periods, the increase paid to my successor being accounted for by the natural increase of the volume of the public printing.

In the same letter, Col. Toomer said that my appointment as State

Printer was given me by Gov. Broward and being the ingrate that I am, I turned upon him inexcusably and bit the hand of my benefactor. Again Col. Toomer displays his gross ignorance of public matters. If he had been informed, he would have known that the State printing is not given out by the governor. It is let to the lowest bidder by the Board of State Institutions composed of seven men of which the governor is one.

He certainly was not numbered among Governor Broward's friends or he would have known that Gov. Broward stated publicly that he owed his election to the United States Senate to the work that I did in that campaign. Gov. Broward told me this himself three or four days after the second primary. Gov. Broward's friends today are working for my election because they know this to be true. I never turned on my benefactor, because Broward had nothing to do with giving me the State printing contract or anything else. My relations with Gov. Broward were simply these: When he thought that I was right, he stood behind me; when I thought he was right, I stood behind him. When we differed, he expressed himself in opposition to me, and I did the same. We were friends for thirty years before he died, notwithstanding the few times that there was an honest difference of opinion between us about public matters, sometimes publicly expressed.

I do not know whether I have won out in the first primary over all my opponents or whether I will lack enough votes to make a second primary possible. I do know that Col. Toomer and all those putting him up and putting up for him cannot beat me in the second primary, if his friends should give him enough money to make the contest.

I have been beating the full pocketbook for six years. I will beat it worse this time than ever, because I have got the people of Florida behind me now.

All I want my friends to do is to stand fast until they see that I will have to make a second race, and then to move forward and make this victory a crushing one that will put into the full pocketbook that will take them ten years to recover from.

Now as you, Mr. Toomer, I cannot afford to pay a dollar an hour for more Times-Union space to contend with you further; so, if there will be a second primary, I hereby challenge you to meet me on the public platform at such places that we can immediately name in an itinerary. We will then and there discuss records and platforms because we are widely at issue on all public policies and the people can then determine the truth. I want you to face the people with me in as many places as possible.

The GREATEST PLAY I EVER SAW AS TOLD TO Hugh S. Fullerton

By EDWARD REULBACH.

Pitcher Chicago Cubs, and Who for
Three Successive Years Was the
Leading Pitcher of the Na-
tional League.

Joe Tinker and John Kling made the greatest play I ever saw on any baseball field. For accuracy, quickness and smartness I never saw anything like it. I have seen them pull off the same play, but never so brilliantly as on that day nor in such a tight position.

The play was made in the fall of 1908, in the last series the Cubs played in the east, at Brooklyn. The team was fighting both New York and Pittsburg for the championship, and it looked as if we had to win every game in order to win the pennant. The pitchers had been working hard, and every point had to be figured. Chance was trying to save up pitchers as much as possible in order to pitch them against teams before which they were known to be effective. He had a series of five games to play in Cincinnati before going home, and wanted to save Brown and Overall to work against the Reds; so he sent me in to pitch two games in one afternoon with Brooklyn, a team against which I always had been successful.

I shut them out the first game and they were giving us a hard battle for the second. We had a run the advantage of them—that is, we had one and they had none late in the game, when two men in succession got on the bases, Hummel, a clever base runner on second, and I believe Lumley at bat, a dangerous hitter and a clever bunter—that is, reliable. Kling signalled me for a fast ball close to Lum's shoulders, and expecting him to bunt I determined to put everything I had on that ball and make it jump so he either would miss it or punt it into the air. The ball went right across his shoulders and he missed it an inch. As the ball touched his hands Kling threw. I never saw a more perfect throw. The ball went within a foot of my head and honestly I could hear it cut the air, it was travelling so fast. I whirled to see what was happening, and for an



instant it looked as if second base was not covered and that the ball would go on to center field. It was cutting the heart of second base—four feet high—thrown perfectly over the bag. Hummel was not more than eight feet up the line, and had stopped when he saw Lumley miss the ball. He threw his head around to see what Tinker was doing, and for a fraction of a second lost sight of Kling, evidently not realizing Johnny had thrown. Joe was standing still, and I don't think he even made a move to cover second base until the ball was on its way. Then he covered the bag at a dead run and met the ball right at the bag. He had gained the jump on Hummel and his body and legs were between the runner and the bag, so that although Hummel leaped and slid, he was blocked, and the ball was on him in an instant.

Owens, a new umpire, was working on the bases, and I was afraid he would lose that decision, but he was squatted right over the bag watching and when he waved Hummel out I felt confident we would win. The next man went out, and the next made a base hit. If the play had not been made and Lumley had laid down the sacrifice, that hit would have brought home two runs. As it was they did not score and the play enabled me to shut them out for the second time in the afternoon. I think they got five hits in the two games, yet they would have beaten us but for that grand piece of inside work. The play saved us the pennant, for if we had lost that game both New York and Pittsburg would have beaten us out at the finish.

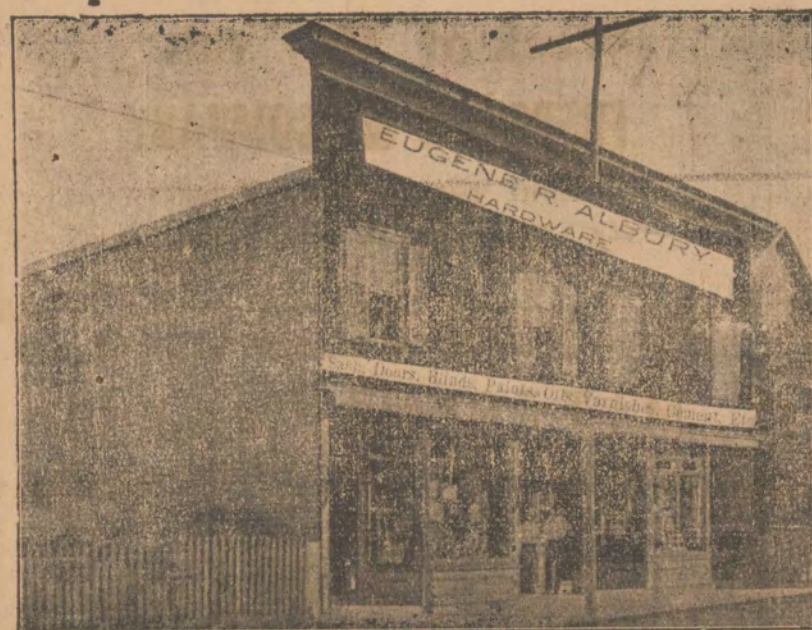
