WOMAN'S RIGHTS ADVOCATE NEAR END

Dr. Mary Walker is Critically Ill in New York Hospital.

New York, March 17.—Dr. Mary E. Walker, widely known as advocate of woman's rights and dress reform, in which she set the example by wearing male attire, is in the Presbyterian hospital here and reported tonight to be desperately ill with bronchitis.

She is an octogenarian, and came here last night to lecture, but was taken from the train to the hospital. She was the first woman physician in the world to hold a commission as an assistant army surgeon, to which she was promoted after services as a nurse on civil war battlefields.

The Maine Monument.

Havens, March 18.—The month-end, which the government of Cuba will raise to the memory of the American sailors who perished in the battleship Maine has been decided on by Secretary Babe of the department of public works. The monument will rise from the center of eight large flower beds. The pedestal will be of granite. Thirty pillars will surround it. On the pedestal will rest the old turret and two ten-inch guns, which the Maine formerly carried. President Gomez will ask congress to vote the money for it.

The pillars will contain the history of the Maine. There will be allegorical inscriptions representing scenes of the life of the Maine from the time she was launched until her burial at sea. In the allegories there will be no mention of the primary cause of the disaster or anything, calculated to arouse ill-feeling.

REAL ESTATE TROUBLES.

Berlin, March 18.—Masten and Morse, one of the largest and most prominent real estate firms in Germany are said to be financially embarrassed. Conservative estimates are to the effect that the firm's liabilities amount to \$3000,000.

TO START FISH HOUSE.

J. J. Hope of Tarpon Springs, who for some years has had a crew of five men fishing for mackerel, returned to Tarpon Springs yesterday. Although Mr. Hope has done very well—especially since the advent of the Railroad, he does not intend to resume mackerel fishing. He thinks there is a good chance for him in a wholesale fish business in Key West, Miami and Fort Pierce fish merchants are getting rich off their receipts from New York shipments, and Mr. Hope expects to do as well in the Cigar City.

The Key West waters are famous the world over for their wonderful variety of finny denizens—almost all of which are edible. The Fort Pierce and Miami fish men have been sending north Spanish mackerel chiefly, and Mr. Hope does not see why in addition to mackerel, the teeming millions of New York and its neighboring cities should not be made acquainted with our groupers, grunts and porgies, our delicious red snappers, yellow tails and tarbot. He will not go into the shipping business until September. During the late fall and winter months the question of being can be met squarely and undauntedly. During the summer months, the expense he says is too great.

Mr. Hope, by name and nature, will throw into his experiment the optimism and energy needed to make it successful—in other words—to make it pay.

ENGLAND'S PREMIER MEANS BUSINESS

Determined to Have Miners' Minimum Wage Bill Passed.

London, March 18.—Premier Asquith gave out the statement today that the government will introduce the miners' minimum wage bill tomorrow. The Premier will, moreover, ask the leader of the House of Commons to make every effort toward having the bill voted on early, and the entire business relating to this wage scale disposed of by Thursday at the latest. He will insist that the bill be ready for action by the House of Lords on Friday, and in shape to receive the King's signature by Saturday.

Algiers, La, March 18.—Twenty-five men were injured when a locomotive boiler exploded in the Southern Pacific shops here today.

Bohize, Tripoli, March 18.—Ten Turks were killed today by bombs dropped from aeroplanes operated by Italians. The aeroplanes apparently dropped the bombs with the greatest ease and at any time desired.

COL. CROMWELL GIBBONS Candidate For GOVERNOR OF FLORIDA

The voters of Florida are called upon to decide many grave issues at the spring primaries. It is my desire that every man shall know exactly where I stand on these questions. I hope to be able to address gatherings in all the principal communities. Those whom I cannot reach personally must be touched through the columns of the local newspapers. Those whom I will meet personally will be in better position to judge for themselves from having read and considered my platform. With this in view, I have prepared a short synopsis of the sixteen cardinal reforms and principles embodied in my platform for publication in every newspaper of the state. I ask the people of Florida to make me their governor as the measure of their approval of my stand on these questions:

PLATFORM.

First—Extended and increased powers to the Railroad Commission, which will insure the utmost rights for the shippers and which will guarantee proper and equitable rates.

Second—The convict lease system of Florida is a brutalizing one. I am in favor of its abolishment and the placing of the convicts on the public highways of the State. Florida needs more good roads, and I believe that they can be best secured by working our convicts thereon. Also the State has no right to profit by the misfortunes of its citizens. The actual labor to maintain the support of the convict is all the State is entitled to. Any profit should be set aside for the benefit of the family of the convict. Because we should punish the criminal is no reason why his family should suffer. On the contrary they should be protected and supported by the labor of the convict and thus the State will be relieved of the possibility of the family being a public charge.

Third—To re-establish the rule of the people and to meet conditions that confront us today, I am in favor of the initiative, referendum and recall.

The initiative means that the people shall, by petition or otherwise make their desires known to their lawmaking bodies. The referendum means that all laws passed by lawmaking bodies shall be referred direct to the people before they become operative. At an election called for that purpose the people can vote for or against laws passed by their representative and a majority vote for or against a law adopts it or rejects it. The recall means that at any election, special or regular, the people may by ballot, determine whether or not a public servant whose term has not expired is still acceptable to them; and a majority vote for or against him determines whether or not that servant shall stay in office or be recalled.

Fourth—I favor additional laws for the control of trusts.

Fifth—There should be stringent laws governing all corporations authorized to do business in Florida, thus protecting purchasers of securities offered by such corporations.

Sixth—Florida has suffered greatly through the operations of irresponsible land companies. I, therefore, favor strict laws governing land and colonization companies in order to protect alike the investors and settlers and the reliable dealers.

Seventh—The drainage of the lands known as the Everglades by the State on a safe scientific and business basis that will insure drainage and reclamation; and that the same shall be drained and saved for its people, and not permitted to go into the hands of speculators. If the State is to be responsible for the drainage and reclamation of the swamp and overflowed lands, purchasers of unclaimed lands should be fully advised at the time and should not be sold to prospective settlers until the same have been made permanently inhabitable and tillable.

Eighth—The establishment of an Immigration Bureau for the purpose of developing impartially all sections of the State. Florida possesses a vast territory of inhabitable and tillable lands distributed throughout the State, and I believe it should establish and determine to have an immigration bureau that will aid and assist all sections for the development and colonization of these properties. We should lend our efforts impartially to all sections and protect every honest investor and settler by providing that he receives what is represented when sold to him.

Ninth—The organization of a State tax equalization board by which taxes of the people shall be uniformly regulated and the State shall receive justly its proper returns from all property holders.

Tenth—Amendment of the primary election laws of the State. We should provide for a more thorough publicity of campaign contributions and expenditures, and regulate and limit the amount that legally shall be expended by candidates for office—state and county—and for what purpose said expenditure shall be authorized.

Eleventh—Legislation that will improve and extend our free public school system, providing every opportunity throughout the State for the education of our children.

Twelfth—Continuation of local option and a strict enforcement in every county of the local option laws of the State.

Thirteenth—The increased efficiency of the National Guard and Naval Militia of Florida by State and Municipal aid.

Fourteenth—Legislation extending and increasing the powers of municipal and county governments, thus giving the people absolutely home government.

Fifteenth—The conservation of our natural resources under the control of the State.

Sixteenth—A conservative and progressive but complete administration of the State giving complete publicity at all times of its affairs.

These resolutions cover the issues which are of most interest and importance to our people at this time. My record as a public servant should be sufficient to insure the justice and wisdom of my stand on any question of importance which shall arise later. I have always and consistently been on the side of the people as a whole, as my record will show. I stand for a conservative, business administration of the affairs of the State of Florida. If elected I shall undertake to perform my part of a great work as thoroughly and patiently as if engaged in the management of a vast business enterprise of my own. Under such an administration Florida should move rapidly forward in all lines of progress, and the full measure of prosperity which our diversified resources promise should be realized.

Philadelphia, Mar. 18.—Rear Admiral George Wallace Melville, U. S. N., retired, died at his home near here yesterday of paralysis.

Deceased was commander of the Los Angeles and a noted authority on Arctic exploration, as well as an engineer and authority on naval affairs. He was eighty-two years of age. The interment will be here, Wednesday.

RECORD TOBACCO PRICES.

Louisville, March 18.—All records for thirty years were broken yesterday when one hoghead of burly tobacco brought \$45 a hundred pounds, and another, \$44. Competition among buyers for several firms which were represented by one buyer prior to the dissolution of the tobacco trust, brought about lively bidding.

T. R.'S HAT IS IN THE RING FOR KEEPS

Will Let the Pivotal States Know By Word of Mouth.

Oyster Bay, March 18.—The first information concerning the campaign mapped out by Roosevelt leaders in their conferences in New York, Friday and Saturday, was given out today by Colonel Roosevelt, who said that he had decided to make several speeches in various parts of the country, and would soon make short trips, so arranged that he would be able to speak in the states where the Roosevelt sentiment is believed to be the strongest. None of the speaking dates have been definitely fixed.

WINDING UP THEIR BUSINESS.

Stones Used to Mark Mason and Dixon's Line Were Brought From England.

Pittsburg, Pa.—The name "Mason and Dixon's Line" has been popularly applied to the whole divisory line between free and slave soil, but properly it belongs only to the south boundary of Pennsylvania, surveyed by

Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon, 1763-67.

For over 100 years this line was a "bone of contention," and England finally sent Mason and Dixon to the colonies to make an official survey which was to be final.

At the end of every fifth mile of this line a stone, brought from England, was placed, engraved on one side with the coat of arms of Lord Baltimore, and on the other with those of the Penns; while the intermediate miles were marked by smaller stones, 16 inches square and 18 inches high, bearing a large letter M on one side and P on the other. The line is 280 miles long.

Guthrie, Okla.—At sixty-four years of age, W. W. Elam, a farmer living living east of Blanchard, Okla., is the father of his twenty-fourth child, which made its appearance at his home a few days ago. TO KEEP OUT THE DUST

Veil-Like Cloth That Will Relieve Housekeeper of Much Worry and Labor.

There is a perennial joke about the dust gathering on a mantle where the mistress calls the attention of the fact that she "can write her name in it," getting an answer, with the inherent wit, of "how great it must be to have the advantage of an education."

If one were to look further into this it will also be seen that it is necessary for one to become educated to the requirement or remedy that the fact of the dust's presence indicates and that requirement is the excluding of the dust to the best of one's knowledge and ability.

As the wire screen is manufactured to exclude the fly, so is there a veil-like cloth texture of net, though slightly rougher and much cheaper, which can be applied to the use of keeping out the ever present dust to a very great extent.

The low price of this article, which can be purchased at almost any dry-goods store or counter, places it within the reach of practically everyone, and what one thinks of the fearful toll of human life that dust-carried germs are wont to take, there will be no hesitation in applying this as well as any other remedy that may come to our notice during our daily routine. This material can be tacked on the inside of screens and if one resides on a very dusty street it can be doubled for better effect. As it does not exclude the light or air but is effective where the dust is concerned, it will be availed of all the more quickly when it is known that it also precludes the entering of the much-hated malarial mosquito.

Where the dust is extremely heavy in the street it is the best plan to do all the ventilating only from the back of the house and it is seldom that draughts cannot be caused to clean out the air in the veriest cranny-like closet or wardrobe.

DIET FOR DELICATE CHILD

Food That Is Easily Assimilated by Weak Stomach and Gives Sufficient Nourishment.

In caring for a weak child, the important thing is to keep the bowels open. A simple diet is as follows:

Breakfast, dry toast (whole wheat bread preferred) and a coddled egg; don't let the white get hard. Dinner the same, and for supper a glass of skimmed milk with a little hot water in it, with dry toast, just enough to take the chill off the milk, and get it in the proper condition for a weak stomach. For a school lunch or a little variety we give our girl Dutch rusks. This diet is to eliminate the gas and fermentation, and frequently we give a pinch of soda to keep the stomach sweet.

Never allow a day to pass without a movement of the bowels, and whenever the eyes are red or bloodshot or inflamed, resort to high injections; if you don't understand about the latter a trained nurse should be consulted.

Don't allow candy or sweet stuff of any kind to enter the child's weak stomach. The diet given above seems to be what a weak stomach will take care of and seems to be sufficient nourishment. Get strictly fresh eggs and give plenty of fresh air. You will have to watch and learn what is and what is not agreeing with him.

Doctors can assist some, but it is a case of constant care and nursing on your part rather than going to different doctors from time to time. Watch for the red or inflamed eyes, which is a sign of constipation.

Eggs With Sauce.

Six neatly poached eggs, six squares of buttered toast, a few drops of anchovy sauce, half a pint of white sauce, two ounces of tarragon and chervil leaves, parsley, chives and watercress. Wash the leaves carefully, then pound them together in a mortar, adding to them a few drops of anchovy sauce. Next rub the mixture through a sieve, and add to it the white sauce, stirring it over the fire. The oth are well mixed. Arrange each egg on a piece of toast and pour a little sauce over. Serve them neatly arranged on a hot dish.

Roly-Poly.

Roll half a pound of short pastry into a round about a quarter of an inch thick. Spread over it a layer of jam, leaving a margin all around. Wet this edge slightly and then roll the pudding up. Press the edges tightly. Then place the roly-poly in a floured baking tin and bake thirty minutes. Serve hot with a hard sauce seasoned with sherry or brandy.

Leaving "Ring" When Cleaning.

When removing spots from woolen or silk material first brush the dust from the garment, then place the material to be cleaned over a bag made of cheesecloth filled with powdered magnesia, then rub well with rag saturated with gasoline. The magnesia absorbs the gasoline, thus preventing the "ring."—Harper's Bazar.

To Clean Flat Irons.

When starch sticks to the flatiron use a piece of fine wire screening. Place screening upon a paper on the ironing board and pass iron over it. It is much better than scraping iron with a knife. The wax-coated boxes in which crackers are packed make excellent polishers—better than the little blocks of paraffin so generally used.

HAS PLAN TO CONTROL COTTON



Col. Robert M. Thompson, one of the wealthiest residents of Washington, has a plan for controlling and handling the cotton of the southern planters and getting it to the spinners in a very short time. The plan provides for the immediate selling of cotton to the spinners at current prices. Against those sales, purchases for future delivery are to be made on the cotton exchanges of the world. The farmers can call final payment up to January 1, 1914, at the market price.
