Suits at Chambers Touching the Local Option Bill.

A case will soon be argued before Judge Baker, which, in view of its general significance, and the widespread interest attached to the liquor question by all classes, for or against, throughout the State, will make its result to be looked for, with more than usual interest. It is the initial case to prove or disprove the legality of the Local Option act, and settle the question as to whether those who desire to sell liquor can not do so simply by paying the old tax of \$450 to the Collector of Revenue, with the Clerk's fee of twenty five cents.

J. H. Harbridge, Esq., as attorney for Chas. G. Elliott of this city, has filed a petition for a mandamus to compel the Collector of Revenue for Duval county, M. J. Brown, to issue him a license for the sale of liquors on his complying with the revenue laws, which provides for the payment of \$450 to the Collector and twenty-five cents to the clerk (old revenue law).

The petition sets forth further that the bill (local option) as published, never passed the Legislature; that the bill which was enrolled and signed by the Governor is not the bill that it passed the House and Senate; that an important amendment to section 2 was left off, though said amendment had been adopted by both House and Senate.

The alternative writ has been issued and is in the hands of the Sheriff. It directs the Collector of Revenue to show cause, on the 15th inst., why the writ should not be absolute. Florida Herald.

By the President of the United States.

EXECUTIVE ORDER.

Whereas it has been brought to the notice of the President of the United States that many persons holding civil offices by appointment from him, or otherwise, under the constitution and laws of the United States, while holding such Federal positions, except offices under the authority of the States and Territories in which they reside, or of municipal corporations, under the charters and ordinances of such corporations, thereby assuming the duties of the State, Territorial or municipal office at the same time that they are charged with the duties of the civil office held under Federal authority; and whereas it is believed that, with few exceptions, the holding of two such offices by the same person is incompatible with a due and faithful discharge of the duties of either office; that it frequently gives rise to great inconvenience, and often results in detriment to the public service; and, moreover, is not in harmony with the genius of the Government;

In view of the premises, therefore, the President has deemed it proper, thus and hereby to give public notice that from and after the 4th day of March, A. D. 1873, (except as herein specified) persons holding any Federal civil office by appointment under the constitution and laws of the United States will be expected, while holding such office, not to accept or hold any office under any State or Territorial government, or under the charter or ordinance of any municipal corporation; and further, that the acceptance or continued holding of any such State, Territorial or municipal office, whether elective or by appointment, by any person holding civil office, as aforesaid, under the Government of the United States, other than Federal offices under the constitution of the United States, will be deemed a vacation of the Federal office held by such person, and will be taken to be, and will be treated as a resignation by such Federal officer of his commission or appointment in the service of the United States.

The offices of justices of the peace, of notaries public, and of commissioners to take the acknowledgment of deeds, of bail, or to administer oaths, shall not be deemed within the purview of this order, and are excepted from its operation, and may be held by Federal officers. The appointment of deputy marshals of the United States may be conferred upon sheriffs or deputy sheriffs, and deputy postmasters, the emoluments of whose office do not exceed six hundred dollars per annum, are also excepted from the operations of this order, and may accept and hold appointments under State, Territorial or municipal authority, provided the same be found not to interfere with the discharge of their duties as postmasters. Heads of departments and other officers of the Government who have the appointment of subordinate officers are required to take notice of this order, and to see to the enforcement of its provisions and terms within the sphere of their respective departments or offices, and as relates to the several persons holding appointments under them respectively.

The above order has never been revoked or modified in any way and is therefore in full force and effect at the present time, notwithstanding the fact that it is ignored in the most barefaced, shameful manner by Federal office holders at this place.

We call upon Hon. Dennis Egan, Collector of Internal Revenue for the district of Florida for an explanation as to why he permits Hon. George W. Allen of this city to hold the office of Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue while at the same time holding the office of State Senator in positive violation of the aforesaid executive order. We also call upon Col. F. N. Wicker, Collector of Customs for this port and district, for a like explanation as to the appointment of Hon. William McClintock to the position of Impost Clerk in the Custom House at this port, well knowing that the said McClintock was, at the time of his appointment, and is now, holding and exercising the office of Mayor of this city.

We ask why the acceptance or continued holding of the State and municipal offices by Messrs. Allen and McClintock is not deemed a vacation of the Federal offices held by them and treated as a resignation of their commissions or appointments in the service of the United States in accordance with the plain provisions of the President's order.

This order was promulgated by one of the ablest of Republican administrations for the observance of its officers and employees, but the lax manner in which it has been enforced by the former and complied with by the latter induces the belief of insincerity on the part of the then, as well as subsequent administrations, or a downright disregard and disrespect on the part of its officials.

If the administration was then and is now sincere we invite proof of its sincerity by causing a due compliance with the order referred to.

Will Messrs. Allen and McClintock resign one of the two offices held by them, or will they wait until given the grand bounce by direction of higher authority?

It is due to Mr. McClintock, however, to say that at the time of his election as Mayor of Key West, he was not holding any Federal position, his appointment in the Customs service being of comparatively recent date. Not so, however, in the case of Mr. Allen. He held the office of Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue at the time, and used it for the purpose of securing his nomination and election as State Senator, and that, too, against the regular nominees of his party for that office, being, as we believe, encouraged in his course by Hon. Dennis Egan, Collector of Internal Revenue at Jacksonville.

The attention of the Hon. Secretary of the Treasury, as also the Hon. Commissioner of Internal Revenue is respectfully invited to a subject, which, in our opinion, is of sufficient moment to warrant immediate action on the part of the Washington authorities. We are not of those who join in the silly twaddle of "turn the rascals out," but we do say most emphatically that Federal office holders who are guilty of ignoring the orders of the Chief Magistrate of the United States should be turned out, and the sooner the better.

Since the above was written we hear that Mayor McClintock's resignation, which we stated had been tendered last week, has been accepted by the Board of Aldermen. Mr. McClintock by this act shows his regard for the above order and proves himself conversant with the orders bearing upon the subject.

Political Echoes From the Country.

Editor Democrat:—Now in these quiet summer days, what better time is there for Democrats to consult over matter of future policy and agree upon the selection of individuals as standard bearers in the contest to come. The discussions which are sought to be created in both the Republican and Democrat parties, by the so-called Independent movement is having the happy effect of purifying both. In the former by the drawing off of the remnant of that pestiferous element of carpet baggers which was thrown into obscurity by Democratic success in 1876, and the latter by the stampede of chronic office seekers and disappointed demagogues. The alchemy with which this class has entered into the new departure has caused reflecting men of both parties to utterly lose faith in the honesty of purpose of the leaders in it, and to regard the whole movement in its true light—that of a wild hunt after office.

It is a well known fact that there is a large conservative element in the State who affiliate with the Republican party in national politics, but having cast their fortunes with us, vote with the Democrats in all matters of State policy. It behooves the Democratic party therefore to choose men of tried ability and integrity as candidates for the higher offices of State, and whose name presents itself in a fair light as an example of devotion to the interests of the State or a noble faith in the integrity of the Democratic party than that of Governor F. Dawson. Elected Governor at a time when the pecuniary affairs of the State were in utter confusion and bankruptcy stared us in the face as the result of former misrule, by his great financial ability, and with a lessened taxation, he actually brought light out of darkness, and to-day by his labors, Florida stands equal to any Southern State in a financial point of view.

By common consent the office of Lieutenant Governor is conceded to South Florida and the selection will doubtless be made from among the many talented young Democrats, of which we can boast. Among these may be mentioned the Hon. Chas. Dougherty, of Volusia, late speaker of the Assembly over which he presided with great dignity and impartiality. An eloquent debater either at the bar or on the hustings, every indication points to him as a great leader in the future.

Hon. J. B. Egan, of Dade is another able worker in the cause of progressive Democracy. A native of North Carolina and educated at the North, he is free from those prejudices which sectional pride is so apt to generate. Aside from being an accomplished parliamentarian, which peculiarly fits him for the position, the talent and activity of purpose exhibited by him in the interest of his section during the one session that he occupied a seat in the Legislature is apparent upon the Journal and many citizens of South Florida will not soon forget the services rendered them in the face of legal and political complications which would have intimidated a weaker man in relieving their homes of incumbrances entailed upon them in the dark days of reconstruction.

The names of other good men and true might be mentioned but there will suffice for the present, as the suggestions herein made are simply thrown out thus early as matter for reflection among Democrats with a view to harmonize organization and ultimate triumph at the polls. And unity is all that is needed to accomplish this. As we say in the country, "a long pull and a strong pull and a pull altogether" is the only thing wanted to carry the State by an overwhelming majority.
