FIVE REACHED POLE

Further Information From Explorer Amundsen.

London, March 13.—Additional details from Capt. Amundsen today regarding his dash to the South Pole indicate that perhaps five other expeditions also reached the pole. Amundsen declares that the weather was ideal for fast travelling and that little or no hardships were encountered.

All of the dogs killed on the last stage of the journey south were eaten by the party. The explorer declares that they were fat and of fine flavor. Eleven dogs were not killed and are still aboard the Fram. They will be taken to Norway to share honors with the men of the discovering party.

Amundsen reiterates his intention of making a trip round Cape Horn and up the Pacific through the Bering Sea and the Northwest Passage after a month's lecturing tour in Australia.

JACK TARS HAVE SOUVENIR CRAZE

Just Like Their More
Fashionable Sisters At the
Million Dollar Hotels

We have most of us heard that the fashionable hotels of every large city and resort lose large sums of money annually owing to the activity of souvenir hunters. The manager of one well known hotel in New York stated recently that the value of the spoons, knives, forks, nut picks, ewers, goblets, napkin rings, China cake and fruit plates surreptitiously by guests—in almost every case by the fair sex—from the dining room during preceding year, amounted to over \$40,000. At the big hotels at Tampa Bay, Palm Beach, St. Augustine and other well known Florida resorts the losses similarly sustained by the hotels have been correspondingly large.

It is not so generally known that among the sailor boys of the various battleships are many souvenir hunters also. For instance, one well-known restaurant keeper in Key West, discovered, yesterday, that twelve knives, sixteen forks, some spoons, and several drinking glasses had mysteriously, or rather openly disappeared. Some of the boys, who have developed to high degree, the craze for collecting souvenirs, were seen leaving the restaurant with knives, forks and glasses shyly appearing from bulging pockets. Owing to an unwritten law prevailing in the hotel and restaurant trades the boys were permitted to go back to the North Carolina and the Birmingham bearing their trophies as reminders of their visit to Key West. An hotel or restaurant keeper's path is not altogether strewn with roses.

HARMON STOCK RISES HIGHER EVERY DAY

New York, Texas and Indiana as Well as Ohio for
the Buckeye Governor

Washington, Mar. 13.—While the bottom seems to have virtually dropped out of other Democratic booms that of Judson Harmon seems to be on the increase. Nor is the enthusiasm in this direction from Ohio only. Political strongholds from many other states are firmly of the opinion that Gov. Harmon will be nominated by the Baltimore convention.

This belief is not based upon idle political gossip or speculation; on the contrary it is the consensus of opinion of many of the best known Democratic minds of the United States, men who have the best interests of the country at heart, and who have reached this conclusion only after having weighed carefully all conditions and relative points of the respective candidates that the Ohio governor is possessed of greatest strength. In other words, that Governor Harmon is the one candidate of all others who can carry at election time those big states which are so essential for either of the great parties to be successful and without which defeat would be certain.

The past week has been one of more than ordinary activity in behalf of Gov. Harmon in several sections of the country. Texas Democrats have sounded the tocsin for the Ohioan and National Committeeman R. M. Johnson has declared in the Houston Post, his own paper, that Harmon is the only candidate who can carry New York, Ohio and Indiana.

PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY IN OLD GEORGIA.

Atlanta, March 12.—The democratic electorate of Georgia will express their choice for president of the United States in a presidential primary.

May 1 was the date set for the primary by the state democratic committee. The registration of 1912 will be used as the basis for the voting.

According to the plan adopted the ballots will bear the printed names of Champ Clark, Judson Harmon, Oscar Underwood and Woodrow Wilson.

There will be blank spaces for the names of other candidates preferred by the voters.

However, he got off with a wrenched right limb.

The engineer, Alonzo Borden, had a still closer call than his brother. The engineer when the collapse occurred made a dash to shut off the steam. As he did so the barrel of water for supplying the boiler keeled over in his direction. He had to do some quick thinking. He had not time to make a strong, so he simply rolled backwards into the water, and sustained nothing more serious than an unprepared-for bath. It will take a day to rig up the outfit for work.

WOULD FIGHT UNCLE SAMUEL.

Camaguey, Cuba, March 13.—General Fernandez de Castro, during the assembly of the Independence war veterans, which lasted throughout the night, declared that should the United States attempt another intervention, the veterans of Cuba would fight as they had fought against Spain. He was applauded.

The General Assembly, which convened yesterday, discussed for many hours a resolution to demand an investigation into the sources of the wealth of all the members of the administration, including the President of the republic, and this was finally agreed to.

Rome, March 12.—Three thousand Turks out of an army of thirty-five hundred were annihilated by an army of sheikhs or Idris near Midl recently. All of the Turkish officers were killed. The battle was fought hard by both sides, the Arabs fighting with savage and fanatical hatred of their foes.
