Just our way of thinking; and we are in hopes to see him renominated. What do our subscribers in Manatee county say to this? Let us hear from some of you.

The prospects for a Democratic victory in this county is none of the best, and the men who attempt to run for the Senate and Assembly will have to carry a terrible burden upon their shoulders. There is more dissatisfaction here than we were aware of and the feeling grows every day; and instead of it being met and the objections explained, some of the members of the party are seemingly trying to make the party more odious in the third ward—the stronghold of the Democracy in this county. We know that it takes a good deal of candor for a Democratic paper to say this, but we have been warning some would-be leaders that the ultimate results of some of their schemes could cause defeat, and instead of mending their ways they go on angering the voters. We have strong doubts of the Democracy of some of the men who claim fealty to the party, and who were benefited by Bloxham's election. In the event of this county again sending negroes to represent us at Tallahassee, and the present prospects are more than fair for it, the State at large will wish to know who is responsible for Monroe county's disgrace?

The time is approaching for the election of a Senator and Representatives, to represent us in the next State Legislature, and some move, no doubt, will soon be made to bring before the Democratic party the names of persons suitable for the offices. Although we have no suggestion to make as yet, as to who would be the right candidates, yet we would impress on the minds of the party the necessity of nominating strong candidates; for much apathy is shown by our third ward voters, and considerable hard work will be necessary to bring them out on the day of election.

A Cruise to Havana.

On last Saturday being tempted by the comfortable looks of the Alabama and the promise of fine weather, we packed our valise and stepped aboard the good ship, for a cruise to Havana and return. The flattering outlook was in no way marred, the trip was delightful in every way. She left Key West at 6. a. m., the Gulf was smooth and the steamer had scarcely a perceptible motion, at daylight next morning we were at the Moro; a pilot was taken aboard and within half an hour the Custom House officer had come aboard, examined the necessary papers, and the ship was made fast to the wharves at Regia, a small town just opposite Havana; from here, ferry-boats make regular trips every few minutes to Havana. Landing with a number of other passengers we crossed the bay and then took a carriage for the "Hotel Passage."

As a matter of course, we only had American money, but we soon found that the Havaneese took kindly to any "change." It was immaterial to them so it was money and enough of it; the amount was the only important item. As a matter of news we will say that you need not be afraid that you will swindle any body by not giving them enough; they are all modest and do not mind telling you (?) when you pay them too much (?). At the hotel we found very fine accommodations, nothing to complain of so long as you had some one near you who could jabber Spanish, if you did not "divil a thing" could you get to eat except Spanish dishes of which fully half was garlic, the balance a mystery fully as impenetrable as the secrets of the Moro Castle. Havana seemed a rich and prosperous city; if the war of the Revolution injured it in any way it is imperceptible to a casual observer. Doubtless the great estates have been seriously injured, but not so the City. One of the finest drives, in fact we have never before seen such a well laid out, picturesque and captivating street, avenue or boulevard, as the grand drive of this City nor one with a more numerous train of dashing equipages. Everything here betokens wealth and luxury; gaiety and splendor. The Cubans, like the French, are a "loving people. One of the principal differences between it and American cities is the fact that on Sunday they keep the front door of their stores open and sell goods openly—here they keep their back doors ajar and sell slyly, pharisaical-like, at the same time uttering a prayer, or saying "I only sell when necessarily compelled." In another thing the Havaneese are more honest than the Americans, they go to theatres, bull fights, &c., on the Sabbath; here they wish they could. Those that attend church in Havana are diametrically opposed to the larger portion of the congregation in the States. Their beggars go to show their rags and solicit alms, here the rich go to show their "rags" and solicit admiration or excite envy. With the government officials red tape and much money means everything. The great difference between them and some of Uncle Sam's servants is the fact that there they rob the citizens with impunity, here they rob the Government. A difference, it is true, but the Havaneese have the advantage, they know the exact individual who gets it, and what for, here it is done in a mysterious way, and is well kept from public gaze. There they know their officials are dishonest, here we believe ours are honest, they being smart enough to hide their fraud.

An attempted description of the city would be out of place, as we would be powerless to improve upon what have already been written, and a repetition is monotonous. Among the newspaper fraternity we had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Santiago L. Spencer, editor and proprietor of the Havana Weekly Report, the only English paper published in any of the Spanish speaking countries of North or South America; and besides it is the oldest paper of any kind published in Cuba, being founded by Mr. Spencer's father in 1822; besides this English sheet, he is editor and proprietor of the leading Spanish daily of Havana, the Boletín Commercial. Mr. Spencer was born in Cuba but is of American parentage. The force of the man is clearly shown by his energy in running two newspapers in Havana, making each a financial success. We should judge that a man who has done this for as many years as he, especially under the odious press censorship and the many other trials and annoyances, is one that would have won fame and honors in other lands.

Capt. J. B. Belt is another character of Havana. He is a Virginian by birth, but has lived here so long that he is a veritable Dago, so far as speech and custom is concerned. We hardly know how American captains &c., could well get along, or cattle shippers, without this same Belt. He is universally respected by those who know him. Dr. Burgess is the man more generally known to American visitors and to English speaking people of all classes who visit this Island.

Many and many are the lives that have been saved, and many are the distant homes made happy by the skill of this pleasant Doctor and the most courteous of gentlemen. The store of Mr. J. Gonzales, Ship Chandler, is the headquarters for cattle men and American seamen. He is deservedly popular with all of these. On Monday evening, after two most pleasant days, we left Havana and within nine hours were on the wharf in Key West, quite a short trip when one takes in consideration the difference in country, people and customs of Cuba and the United States. This is a trip that every tourist to Florida should make; and if the ease with which one could go was plainly shown and advertising done in a proper way, thousands would come on this coast, where tens now come. So much for a trip to the "Queen of the Antilles."

Important Florida News.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The Court party at Key West are beginning to learn that it is dangerous to feel around such a political buzz saw as Colonel Frank Wicker while it is in motion. I am credibly informed that the special Treasury Agent sent down there to investigate the charges against the Colonel has made a searching examination into the matter, and that his report, fully exonerating Wicker, will reach here by the first of next week, the fact being already in possession of the Treasury Department.

PATTERSON IN HOT WATER.

I have information which warrants me in saying that United States District Attorney Patterson has got himself into hot water in this matter. In replying to a communication from the Department of Justice asking the particulars of the indictment of the Deputy Collector and revenue boatmen at Tampa, and his connection therewith, he wrote that he knew nothing about it until the foreman of the grand jury requested that subpoenas be issued for the employees. At the time of the receipt of his letter the Department was in possession of information that he had assured the boatmen they need not be uneasy as they were not the party the indictments were designed to reach, and the Attorney General at once addressed another letter to Patterson, in which he was informed of that fact, was reminded that his action savored of malice toward the Collector at Key West, and was directed to make further report of all the facts in the premises.

I am assured that evidence is at hand to convince the Department that Patterson has practiced deception towards his superior officer in this matter, and I am much mistaken if he does not find that Attorney-General Brewster is not a man who can be trifled with.

MARSHAL WILLIAMS AND JUDGE LOCKE. It is an open secret here that United States Marshal Peter Williams holds his office by a slight tenure, and that Judge Locke himself is not entirely secure in his high office.

THE COLLECTORS. You may set it down as a fixed fact that Col. Wicker will be renominated for Collector at Key West at no distant day; that Collector Howell will succeed himself as Collector at Fernandina; that Mr. James Currie, of Cedar Keys, will be appointed a special agent of the Treasury Department; and that Mr. Tarble, of Pensacola, will be nominated for Collector of that port in a few days.

DEPUTY COLLECTOR ALLEN. It is also a current rumor here that Deputy Collector of Internal Revenue George W. Allen's resignation may be "handed in to him" at any time.

ED. DEMOCRAT.—Mr. Wm. M. Tunno, of Savannah Ga., is here in the interest of the New York, Florida and Cuba R. R.; a scheme which appears to be of immense magnitude, and one which, if carried out, will contribute largely in the development of the resources of South Florida.

Mr. T. appears to be a gentleman of extensive information and speaks very encouragingly of the future of South Florida. The syndicate which he represents, design building a R. R. direct from New York to the most eligible point on the Gulf coast, possibly to Key West, connecting with a line of first class steamers to the Island of Cuba. He is the forerunner of those to follow, taking a view of the country through which the road is to pass, and seems to be very favorably impressed with the situation. Your writer taken occasion to ask his opinion about the drainage scheme now in operation. He said he had the most implicit confidence in the success of the enterprise; that he was personally acquainted with many of those engaged in it, and that in point of ability, integrity, he believed them to be head and shoulders above most of the organizations hitherto inaugurated to carry out similar enterprises; that it was no wild-cat scheme, and that there need be no fears as to its ultimate success; that he was very sorry to hear, frequently, remarks made of a disparaging nature. Mr. Tunno also expressed much faith in other roads which are contemplated. He believed that the resources of Florida, especially South Florida, which are now dormant and hidden, would soon induce enterprise and capital as to guarantee a steady effort to develop them, and that within the next decade this vernal Peninsula would be really the garden spot of America. So note it.

Many and many are the lives that have been saved, and many are the distant homes made happy by the skill of this pleasant Doctor and the most courteous of gentlemen. The store of Mr. J. Gonzales, Ship Chandler, is the headquarters for cattle men and American seamen. He is deservedly popular with all of these. On Monday evening, after two most pleasant days, we left Havana and within nine hours were on the wharf in Key West, quite a short trip when one takes in consideration the difference in country, people and customs of Cuba and the United States. This is a trip that every tourist to Florida should make; and if the ease with which one could go was plainly shown and advertising done in a proper way, thousands would come on this coast, where tens now come. So much for a trip to the "Queen of the Antilles."

MR. EDITOR: Your article on "Methodism and its future," is before me, and while I do not endorse all its statements, or assent to all its conclusions, I am pleased with the new departure you have taken in Key West Journalism; and hope you will give us frequent editorials on such kindred subjects.

It is not my purpose to criticize or condemn the policy or principles of any church organization; but, as you have been pleased to assert that "it is as much a folly for Calvinist, Baptist, Presbyterian or other protestant churches to picture to themselves that their creed or their church will exercise an overshadowing influence in the church polity of the future," &c., &c., intimating that Methodism is to shape "the church polity of the future," also that one universal church government and policy is a necessary feature of the future—"and following the universal law of the Universe—the survival of the strongest and most aggressive, Methodism will alone remain, the chosen bride of the Immaculate"—permit me to dissent from such views or teachings. Under such a regime what becomes of that priceless boon bequeathed to us by our revolutionary fathers, "freedom to worship God." Such teachings are worthy the Jesuitical Fathers of the Inquisition.

It is not my intention, however, to discuss this question at this time, but will reserve it for the future, and confine myself to the question of the influence Baptist Church polity has contributed towards guiding the destinies of a Continent.

The Baptists of the United States and their history is closely interwoven with that of the United Colonies; and presents evidence of the effectiveness of their church polity in giving tone and character to free government.

The Baptists in conjunction with the Friends, were the first to lift up the standard of Religious Liberty in the United Colonies—for which some of them were imprisoned in Boston jail. The first to found a colony "securing to the people of the State free and full enjoyment of judgement and conscience in matters of religion." In March 1628, O. S., Dr. John Clark, a Baptist minister, with his associates founded the Colony of Rhode Island, and in the same year they organized a Baptist Church at Newport; from that small beginning the Baptists of these U. S. have increased until they numbered in 1881 2,500,000; and if not equal to the Methodists in numerical strength—fifteen million as you assert—they desire to be equal to any in efficiency and spiritual vitality which is in reality the true test of strength. The growth of the Baptist Church is not "phenomenal" but the steady march of "these principles" which two hundred years ago distinguished them from all other churches; and which we believe will eventually distinguish all Christian churches from the World, the Pope and the Devil.

The principles we held then we hold now; viz: The Bible alone authority in the Church of Christ.

The Church of Christ ought to consist only of persons baptised on their profession of their faith.

Each Church a separate and distinct organization, independent of all others.

The officers of the Church, Bishops, Pastors and Deacons.

The ordinances of the Church, Baptism—a figurative expression of the Burial and Resurrection of the Lord; and the Lord's Supper, a perpetual memorial of His death until He comes again.

These are some of the principles and views held by the Baptists alone through many centuries; but now, we are glad to know that some of them are held in common with other churches.

History informs us that less than two hundred years ago, in these United States, men and women were whipped and pilloried as well as imprisoned for daring to advocate such principles.

The Magna Charta of our liberties were obtained for us by the sufferings and heroic struggles of such men as Dr. John Clark, Roger Williams and others, with their lovers of soul liberty the Friends or Quakers. It was the seed of the Kingdom, our Christian Fathers sowed it in prayers and tears and blood, surely this may account for the abundant harvest and ingathering of souls—among a people born to such an inheritance.

The formation of the National Government is due in a great measure to Thomas Jefferson than to any other man; and it is a historical fact, that, though he was an Episcopalian he was a frequent attendant at the meetings of a Baptist Church in the neighborhood of his house. Elder Andrew Tribble was the Pastor, and on one occasion asked Mr. Jefferson "how he was pleased with our (Baptist) Church government?" Mr. Jefferson replied "that" had struck him much, that he had interested himself in it, and then he said "I have concluded that it is the best plan of government for the American Colonies."

Is it too much to say, that whatever the future may develop, the past evidences, the influence—our principles and form of church government had upon the mind of that eminent Statesman who guided the destinies of a Continent?

Every Baptist Church is a sovereign, democracy—Christ alone their lawgiver and head, receiving the new testament as His fixed, unchangeable law; not to be altered, amended or abrogated, they regard it to be their duty to "go into all the world and preach the Gospel," obey his commands and execute His laws unfettered by any human authority.

It may be said that this form of

Government has no resistive force and must succumb to the strongest and most aggressive—this argument might apply to any government, but the Church of Christ. But this is the form of Government left us by Christ and His Apostles—the only form of church government known to the Apostles. During the first three centuries the churches subsisted in separate independent bodies, without and secular or spiritual power over one another—and from the time of the incorporation of the church with the State by Constantine in the fourth century, to quote President Edwards "In every age of this dark time (of Popery) there appeared particular persons in all parts of Christendom, who bore a testimony against the corruption and tyranny of the church of Rome." God was pleased to grant an uninterrupted succession of many witnesses through the whole time of Britain as well Germany and France, private persons and ministers, and there were members in every age who were persecuted and put to death for this testimony.

We can trace the history of one principle through the palmist days of Catholicism over Christendom. We can trace them by the bloody foot—priests of the martyrs—They have lived the tests of time—they have battled with errors through the centuries—The promise of Him who said, "On this rock I will build my church (has been verified) and the gates of Hell (error) shall not prevail against it."—Has He not also said "Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

Our foreign work will compare favorably with any other mission work. Commenced in 1814; in 68 years we have increased our numbers from one missionary to one thousand three hundred and twenty-two, with an adult church membership of 86,843; 341 schools with 8,660 scholars. Missionary income \$354,466.00. We have missionaries in Burnah, India, China, Japan, Italy, Brazil, Mexico and Africa. Our home missionaries are found among the Indian tribes and scattered throughout the destitute portions of every State and Territory of the Union.

Modern missionary efforts owes its origin to the Baptists of England. Dr. Carey, a Baptist minister of Milton, Eng., with Fuller, Pearce, Ryland, Sutcliffe and others, formed the first missionary society in A. D. 1792—30 years ago. Now there are missionaries in all lands, and Christians of all churches, vie with each other in the work of spreading the Gospel, a generous rivalry existing among all.

The labor and the reward is divided among all christian organizations—Congregationalists, Presbyterians, Baptists, Methodists, Episcopalians, Friends, Lutherans, Reformed, Evangelicals, United Brethren, Disciples, Christians, Tunkers and others—North, South, East and West—Europe and America joins hand and heart in this great work. It is the stone cut out of the mountain without hands, rolling on—and shall continue to roll until the great image is ground to dust—the overturning has commenced and shall never cease, until He comes whose right it is.

There needs no universal church government to meet the Papacy, the word of the Lord declares that "it shall be consumed by the spirit of His mouth." (His pure words translated into all languages) and He will destroy it at the brightness of His coming, even so. Come Lord Jesus, come quickly!—WILLIAM F. WOOD.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA., April 24.—The steamer, City of Sanford, burned about 10 miles below Jacksonville, within 30 feet of the shore and in 3 feet of water. Two ladies and two little children burned, several are drowned. Some of the bodies not recovered up to night of the 25th.

Attempted Murder.

TALLAHASSEE, FLA., April 22, 1882. A tramp printer, named Franky Fitch, connected with the Economist, made a murderous assault to-day on R. Don McLeod, editor of the Land of Flowers, with a 42-calibre revolver. He fired three shots, but none took effect. One of the balls passed through the editor's hat, just grazing his head, and another through his coat. Fitch has been arrested. Much indignation prevails among the people.

—The register of the City Hotel, G. E. Sawyer, proprietor, shows an arrival of about 1200, since the first of October, and the "Sistine House," Capt. Wm. Sirrine, proprietor, has registered about 1500. In addition to the names on the registers, both houses have had numerous guests whose names did not appear on the books. Taking the arrivals of the three hotels, the Sanford House, City Hotel and Sistine House, the number footed up 5,615, and those unregistered, and the guests at the different boarding houses would swell the number of visitors for last season to at least 7,000. This is surely a good record.—Sanford Journal.

Grand Lodge of Florida I. O. G. T. The above Grand Lodge recently held its annual session in Jacksonville. The report of the G. Secy. showed an increase of 6 Lodges and 3 Juvenile Temples, there being 29 Lodges and 11 Juvenile Temples in good standing. The session was the most numerous attended of any, and extended over five days; at the close of which an excursion was given and a grand banquet.

Mr. Artrell offered a resolution endorsing the action of the President in vetoing the Anti-Chinese Bill, which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote, and the G. Secy. was requested to forward a copy of the resolution to President Arthur.

The Riddle of the Sphinx.

We think we know our own faces yet they are in reality less known to us than the countenance of our acquaintances, of our servants, even of our dogs. If any one will stand alone close to a mirror, and look intently at his own reflection for several minutes or longer, the impression produced on his mind will be extraordinary. At first it is nothing but his own well-known, perhaps well-worn face that confronts him. Whatever there may be of novelty in the faces of others there is certainly nothing of it here. So at least he believes, but after a while it grows strange. What do those eyes mean, meeting his own mysteriously and silently? Whose mouth is that?—whose brow? What vague suggestions of something stronger than he is, some dormant force which laughs him to scorn, and lurking behind that mask? In the outline of the features, the curve of the jaw and chin, perhaps he notes a suggested likeness to this or that animal of the lower class—a sign of some brut which he was not conscious he possessed. And then—those strange eyes! They are his own; nothing new; yet in their depths all sorts of mocking meanings seem to rise. More Paine Ejection.

The furor raised by the so-called ejection of Bishop Paine from a train on the F. & J. Railroad, and which the Union has shown was no ejection at all, still creates an excitement among Northern philanthropists. As we understand the case, the Bishop, rather than ride in a first class coach set apart for his color, voluntarily got off and walked. He made a fool of himself and is now raising indignation against the South by a publication of the alleged outrage. The latest on the case is the following associated press dispatch of the 12th instant:

WASHINGTON, April 12.—A delegation of ministers of the African M. E. Church headed by Bishop Brown, accompanied by Frederick Douglass, waited upon Attorney General Brewster to-day, and made complaint against the United States Attorney for the Northern District of Florida for failure to enforce the provisions of the Civil Rights bill. The particular case referred to was that of Bishop Paine who was put off the railroad train at midnight several miles from the nearest station, after having purchased a first-class ticket. It was represented that all applications for legal redress were of no avail. The Attorney-General promised the delegation that the matter should be investigated.

If there is an investigation, which is doubtful, it will bring out the true state of the case, and will result in no benefit to the colored race, especially that portion of it who advance to "meet force with force."—Fernandina Express.

Shipment of Strawberries.

The following is a statement of the shipments of strawberries during the week by Mr. W. H. Pillow: April 18th, to New York, 912 quarts; April 18th, to Boston, 300 quarts; April 21st, to New York, 384 quarts; total, 1,596 quarts. This amount added to the previous shipments, shows a total of 47,727 quarts shipped from this market by Mr. Pillow.—Union.

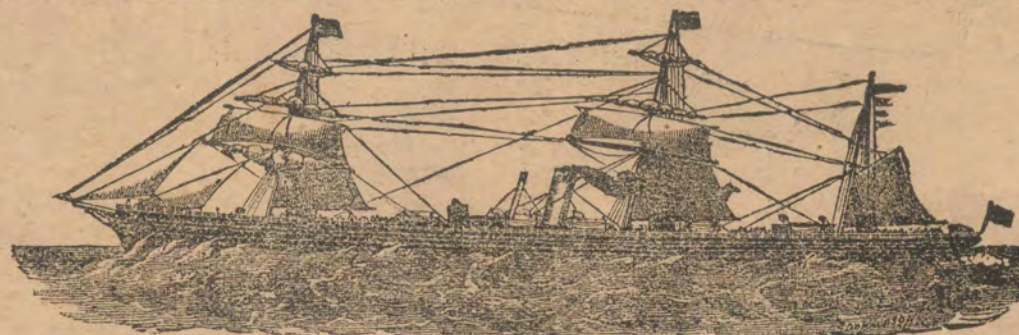
