HOW PRESIDENTIAL FIGHT NOW STANDS

The Fight for Delegates In Both Parties Goes Merry On

Those interested in the great fight now in progress in both great parties for the presidential nomination will be interested in the following figures which are up to date, including the results in the primaries Tuesday in Florida, Georgia and Massachusetts, but not including the delegates won by Clark in Massachusetts. The way the delegates stand is:

Republican: Taft, 435; Roosevelt, 225; LaFollette, 36; Cummins, 10; unclassified, 4. Elected to date, 710.
Total number of delegates in the Republican National Convention, 1,073.
Needed to nominate (majority), 540.
Needed to give Taft a majority, 105.
Needed to give Roosevelt a majority, 315.
Yet to be elected, 363.
Democratic: Clark, 149; Wilson, 106; Underwood, 64; Marshall, 30; Burke, 10; Harmon, 6; unclassified, 101. Elected to date, 466.
Total number of delegates in the Democratic National Convention, 1,094.
Needed to nominate (two-thirds), 729.
Yet to be elected, 628.

IDENTIFICATION OF TITANIC DEAD SLOW

About 190 Bodies Unidentified Will Probably Be Buried In Halifax

Halifax, May 1.—The work of identifying the Titanic unidentified dead is almost as difficult as their recovery from the Atlantic. To date, not a single passenger who perished had been added to the list of identified, and the number of nameless is as much an enigma as when brought to shore. Trunkets and belts give suggestions for names of others, most of whom were of the ship's company.

As nearly all of the bodies for which relatives came here have been turned over to them, it seems likely that a majority of the 190 bodies brought in by the Mackay-Bennett, many of them unidentified, will be buried in Halifax.

20TH OF MAY CUBA'S TENTH MILESTONE

Tenth Anniversary Will No Doubt Be Fittingly Celebrated Here

The twentieth of May will mark the tenth milestone in the birth of the Cuban Republic. On that day, ten years ago, the Cuban Republic was launched and admitted into the family of nations and all parental restraint of Uncle Sam removed. The Cuban population of Key West will make the day one of rejoicing and signs of their felicitation. No definite plans for the day have been made here as yet, but doubtless the various organizations will shortly take the matter up and arrange an appropriate program. While no definite plans have been made yet, the tenth anniversary of the Cuban Republic will not be slighted and the people of Key West may look forward to a big day on the 20th of May.

GOVERNMENT AFTER THE WHITE SLAVERS

Over Six Hundred Agents Will Operate In Every State In Union

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Attorney General Wickham today appointed Stanley W. Finch, of the Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice special commissioner to suppress the white slave traffic. Mr. Finch will begin a vigorous campaign in every State in the Union for the extermination of the vice. He will operate with societies and individuals interested to wipe out the traffic by a systematic and comprehensive plan of investigation and prosecution and by placing agents in every State in the Union. About six hundred special officers will be employed in this active campaign.

A vigorous investigation of conditions in Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, North Carolina and the District of Columbia has already been started.

"A DISEASED LIAR" -HENRY WATTERSON

The Doughty Kentucky Colonel in his wrath becomes Very Personal

Louisville, Ky., May 2.—The feud between former Governor J. C. W. Beckham, who has espoused the cause of Woodrow Wilson in Kentucky, and Henry Watterson, has reached the stage of personalities. Under the heading, "A Diseased Liar" and "The culmination of a coarse, blackguard and illiterate blather," the Courier-Journal this morning prints an attack on Watterson made by Beckham in another paper yesterday afternoon commenting by way of introduction to what Beckham said:

"The following rigamarole of dirt, malevolence and lying was yesterday put forth by the most infamous member of the firm of Haly, Beckham and Company."

Accompanying the article was an editorial by Mr. Watterson in the same vein.

The attack on Mr. Watterson by former Governor Beckham is no less severe, charging him with "deliberate and wilful falsehood," "being devoid of all sense and honor and wanting in every instinct of a gentleman."

STARS AND STRIPES SUFFERED INSULT

At May Day Socialist meeting in N. Y.—"Tear That Dirty Rag Down"

New York, May 2.—The Stars and Stripes were torn down and trampled under foot and a red flag substituted during a fierce fight at a May Day meeting of the Socialist party and affiliated unions in Union Square Park late yesterday. That serious panic did not ensue is believed to have been due to the fact that thousands of persons on the outskirts of the crowd did not know what the trouble was. Responsibility for the tearing down of the flag is disclaimed by the Socialists, who assert that members of the Industrial Workers of the World committed the act. The Socialist representatives on the platform appear to have done their best to protect the national colors.

The trouble started at the conclusion of a parade of 8,000 men and women, who gathered at the park for speech-making. Red banners, emblems of Socialism, already adorned the speakers' platform, and the band was playing the "Marseillaise" when the Stars and Stripes were carried to the stand as the first speaker was about to be introduced. Instantly there was the wildest excitement.

"Take that dirty rag down!" went up a cry from the crowd. But those on the platform held their ground and some with cooler heads tried to quiet the tumult that had broken out.

"We don't recognize that flag," cried a man in front as he tried to reach the platform.

That cry was taken up by others, a number of whom fought their way to the platform. Those on the platform tried to protect the flag and a fist fight ensued, in which a lone policeman was the only officer who figured. His club knocked three men down. Several men were tossed bodily over the platform rail into the crowd. Bloody faces were numerous.

The Relation Of Money To Votes

Some time before the first primary the Jacksonville Metropolis, if we remember rightly asked how much apiece Semple's votes were going to cost. Well, we'll tell you: they cost just thirty-four cents each. As a matter of interest we will go a little further into this matter and show the relation of money to votes. Gibbons spent \$9,974 in his campaign according to the statement he filed. Now suppose Semple had spent that much on his campaign (supposing he had that amount to spend), what would have been the result? It would have been back to the woods for all the other candidates because Semple would have won out in the first primary. At thirty-four cents a vote he would have polled 29,335 votes. 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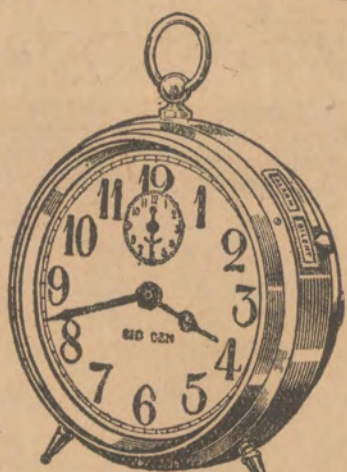

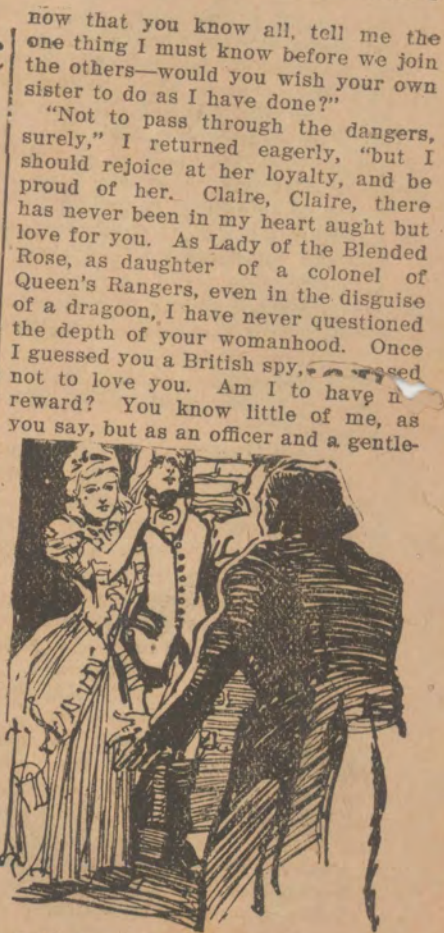
