TROUBLE LOOMS LARGE

City of Mexico, Feb. 1.—Six hundred troops are making ready to go to Juarez where malcontents have overturned the municipal government. Last night there was rioting in which eight people were killed despite President Madero's declaration that the disturbance is purely local.

TO WORK TOGETHER

Paris, Feb. 1.—The parliamentary committee which has been forging for effective establishments of a French protectorate over Morocco, reported today in favor of the most complete collaboration with the existing Moroccan government.

DEMOCRATS TO CAUCUS

Washington, Feb. 1.—House Democrats will caucus February 7 on the proposed investigation of the "money trust."

Chairman Henry, author of the resolution to create a select committee of seven to take up the combined investigations pending, circulated a petition for caucus and secured the necessary twenty-five names.

The opponents of the investigation will seek to refer it to the standing committee on banking and currency.

The House Democrats undoubtedly will have a special caucus to rescind their action in cutting out all appropriations for battleships this year.

The general feeling is that at least one battleship will be allowed.

DARROW MAY HAVE BEEN INDICTED BY FRANKLIN

Detective Thought to Have Confessed to Grand Jury Resulting in Lawyer's Arrest

Los Angeles, Cal., Feb. 1.—Whether the indictment returned against Clarence S. Darrow, the Chicago attorney, by the county grand jury was based on an alleged confession to that body by Bert H. Franklin, former McNamara defense detective, charged with jury bribing, probably will not be definitely known until the case comes to trial.

County attorneys refused to disclose the source of their information.

Soon after the indictment against Darrow for alleged corruption of jurors in the McNamara case was returned rumors were prevalent that Franklin had told all he knew of the alleged jury bribing to the grand jury.

BLOOD WAS TRANSFUSED

Nashville, Tenn., Feb. 1.—Finding nothing else would save the life of Tom Noonan, the young man shot by a policeman Saturday night, Dr. W. M. McCabe, of the city hospital, transfused in his veins more than a pint of blood from his brother, Andrew Noonan. It is thought Tom Noonan's life was saved by the operation, which was performed in the history of the hospital.

MAY MEAN WAR

Algeiras, Feb. 1.—The Spanish armed cruiser Cataluna suddenly departed for Vigo presumably on account of trouble in Portugal.

MAKE THEM MOVE

Owing to the chaotic condition of the crossing at Duval and Green streets, some fine acrobatic stunts are now given daily by pedestrians not accustomed to jumping over five bar gates.

MILITARY AVIATOR INJURED

Tripoli, Feb. 1.—Captain Mante, Italian Military Aviator, was seriously injured while throwing bombs from an aeroplane into the Turkish encampment near Tobruk.

DENIES FORTIFYING

London, Feb. 1.—The British Foreign Office denies officially that they are fortifying the Fanning Islands in the South Pacific.

J. W. LOCKE COMPLETES FORTY YEARS AS JUDGE

Service Record Held by Distinguished Incumbent of Bench

Judge James William Locke, who presides over the United States Court for the Southern District of Florida and has the distinction of being the oldest judge from point of service on the Federal bench, completed forty years of service with the court at the close of business yesterday afternoon. Thursday morning Judge Locke entered upon his forty-first year as a Federal jurist.

He was appointed to the bench, February 1, 1872, by President Ulysses S. Grant, and has made a remarkable record, not only in length of service but for the uniform fairness of his decisions. Judge Locke is greatly beloved by members of the bar, generally, as he is noted for his kindness in dealing with offenders.

"Judge Locke is of English descent, his first ancestor who came to America being John Locke, who left England for the colonies about 1628, and settled at Locke's Neck, N. H. He was active in the early Colonial and Indian Wars, and held a commission as captain. He was finally slain by the Indians while reaping in his field on August 26, 1626. Judge Locke's ancestors on both his father's and his mother's sides, fought in the War of the Revolution, his great-grandfather having been present at the battle of Bunker Hill and fighting throughout the war."

"Judge Locke was born at Wilmington, Vt., October 30, 1837. His father was William Sherbourne Locke, a noted minister, who was connected with the Methodist Episcopal Conference during a period extending over sixty years. His mother was Caroline Webb, of Tibbets. He received a good education, first attending the public schools and then going through the High School at Manchester, N. H., and Wesleyan Academy at Stanstead, Canada. He began his public life as a teacher in the schools of Manchester, N. H., at the same time studying law in the office of Hon. William Stark, from 1856 to 1860. He had entered upon the practice of his profession and was meeting with success when the war broke out, and he was appointed on the United States Ship Dale in June 1861.

"His services brought him to Florida in 1862 and in 1863 he was transferred to the United States naval station at Key West and served there as chief clerk until the close of the war. When he was mustered out of the service he immediately located at Key West and entered upon the practice of his profession, in which he was in every way successful; being associated in practice with the late Hon. Stephen S. Mallory, the senior.

"He was at various times county superintendent of education for Monroe County, clerk of the United States courts and United States commissioner. He was appointed county judge of Monroe County in 1868, and elected to the State Senate in 1870.

"He was appointed United States District Judge for the Southern District of Florida February 1, 1872, recommendations for such appointment having been signed by every member of the bar of his district, without regard to political affiliation, and he continued to make his home at Key West until the duties of his court required his removal to Jacksonville in 1894.

"Even a hurried glance at his career on the bench will reveal the fact that there has been a great diversity of cases before him. It is believed that he has been called upon to decide more salvage litigation than any other judge in the country. One of his rulings fixed the status of the disposition of the proceeds of unclaimed derelict property in favor of the salvor as against the United States.

"Numerous filibustering cases have also been tried by him, and his court doubtless holds the record here again. Among others may be mentioned the Honduran cases of the steamships, 'General Sherman' and the 'City of Mexico' and the Spanish-Cuban cases of the 'Shavers' and the 'Three Friends' and the 'Dauntless,' which were quite notorious just prior to our war with Spain.

"During the Spanish-American War Judge Locke was called upon to adjudicate all the prize cases which occurred except two. These, as well as the regular line of practice before him in both the Circuit and District Courts, have called for close application and careful research along various lines."

MURDERERS ARE THICK IN CHINA DURING TROUBLE

Inhabitants of Manchuria Want Russia and Japan to Intervene

Peking, Feb. 1.—Mukden police are systematically raiding homes of prominent men suspected of sympathizing with the revolutionary party, assassinating them and carrying off their wives and daughters, according to a letter from a missionary in that city received here. Consular reports confirm the accounts of scores of murders nightly.

The letter of the missionary continues: "Whole armies of mounted robbers are plundering travelers along the roads leading into Harbin. These brigands hold the rich for ransom, which has to be paid either in guns and ammunition or in money. They torture and kill their victims if the ransom is not forthcoming. The law-abiding Chinese of the vicinity are praying for the intervention of the Japanese in Southern Manchuria and of the Russians in the north."

OVERCOATS IN DEMAND

For Key West, last night was really chilly. Overcoats were conspicuous by their presence. Nor were they confined to local residents. Visitors from Northern States said they were surprised to find that this island, so many hundred miles below the frost limit, could have given them even the suspicion of chilliness. But all the same they were thankful they were not a Medicine Hat, Alta., 36 below zero.

DROWNED IN SUGAR WATER

Donaldsonville, La., Feb. 1.—Augustin LeBlanc, hostler on a sugar plantation, committed suicide yesterday by drowning in a sugar kettle in a novel and deliberate manner. LeBlanc placed a plank across the kettle, tied his feet together, attaching a rope to the top ring of a fence, so when he dived off his feet would be held near the surface of the water in the kettle. He then tied his hands in front of his body as best he could and tumbled off backwards into four feet of water.

BRITISH BARON DEAD

London, Feb. 1.—Baron Stanmore died here today at his 84th year. He was one of the most prominent British colonialists having the post of Lieutenant-Governor or Governor of a large number of British colonies, including New Brunswick, Trinidad, Mauritius, Fiji, New Zealand and Ceylon. He was a prolific author and was a member of the House of Lords, although he took very little part in politics.

RAILROAD MAN GONE

New York, Feb. 1.—Edwin Hawley, one of the most prominent railway magnates in America, died this morning from nervous indigestion.

MANY DROWNED

Hamburg, Feb. 1.—A tug loaded with workmen, in collision with a freighter on the Rhine this morning, capsized. Every soul on board the tug was drowned.

ORANGEMEN PROTEST

Belfast, Feb. 1.—More than 75,000 Irish Presbyterians today demonstrated vigorously their opposition to Home Rule.

APOSTOLIC DELEGATE APPOINTED

Rome, Italy, Feb. 1.—The Pope today appointed Giovanni Banzano, as Apostolic Delegate to the United States as successor to Cardinal Falconio. Banzano was rector of the College of the Propaganda of the Faith.

MORGAN'S TREASURES COMING

New York, Feb. 1.—According to the Times London museums have been enriched long enough by the art treasures assembled there by J. P. Morgan. The shipment of Mr. Morgan's collection to this country was deferred because of the high tariff on antiques. This was recently abolished. It is not likely that any thought of the inheritance tax which would be levied in the event of his death on his pictures, tapestries, bronzes and pottery, has ever troubled Mr. Morgan. Naturally he always intended to bring his collections to this country. They will be here soon, and our Museums will be the richer and England's the poorer for the change.

STEEL TRUST DIVIDENDS EXPECTED TO BE SMALL

Present Period of Uncertainty Will Have Depressing Effect Upon Company's Earnings

New York, Feb. 1.—Directors of the United States Steel Corporation today declared the regular quarterly dividend of 1 1-4 per cent on the common stock. The regular quarterly dividend of 1 3-4 per cent was declared on the preferred stock.

New York, Feb. 1.—Directors of the United States Steel Corporation met today to take action on the preferred and common dividends and receive the report for the fourth quarter of 1911, which will be issued after the meeting. That the regular quarterly dividend of 1 1-4 per cent will be declared on the common stock is practically certain.

Unusual interest attaches to the exhibit of earnings for the last year. The steel and iron industry, as is well known, is passing through a period of much uncertainty, and most finished products are selling at the lowest prices in its history. The report will show a decline in earnings for December compared with the month immediately preceding.

Estimates of the corporation's earnings for the last year of 1911 range from \$22,000,000 to \$25,000,000, with here and there some less favorable forecasts.

HE RINGDITS IN MISSOURI

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 1.—Nineteen cases of cerebro spinal meningitis have been reported to the health authorities of the two Kansas cities since the first of January. One death here early today recorded the eighth fatality from the disease.

Seven cases are now under treatment at the general hospital in this city.

HARMON'S NAME GOES ON

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 1.—The name of Judson Harmon, of Ohio, as a Presidential candidate was filed here, while that of William J. Bryan, was withdrawn.

WILLIAM ST. PAVING WILL HAVE TO WAIT

Bids for City Supplies not Opened by Council Because not Specific

A regular meeting of the City Council was held last night at the City Hall, a full Board being present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Cemetery Committee called attention to the use of the City Cemetery as a thoroughfare. The matter was referred to the Mayor with recommendations that Special Officer Lem Baker be instructed to put a stop to this.

The Water Works Committee reported a request from Norberg Thompson that the city water main be extended from Eton to Caroline on William street. The compliance of the request and the purchase of seven additional hydrants passed unanimously.

The Council's attention was called to the fact that the Jefferson Hotel and the new Reynolds' building had not complied with the city ordinance regarding connections to the water main. The clerk was instructed to notify them that unless the ordinance was immediately complied with, water would be shut off.

The special committee on sand for sidewalks reported that Mr. Copeland had submitted three samples of sand to Mr. Hazellhurst, the city engineer, and were now waiting for a report from him.

The ordinance relative to closing Caroline, Francis, James and White streets, and granting the F. E. C. Ry., certain rights and privileges was passed and adopted. Mr. Patterson in behalf of the company thanked the Council for the rapidity in complying with the company's request.

A petition was read from the citizens on William street petitioning the Council to pave William street continuing on Windsor Lane to the Cemetery. Owing to the lack of funds the Council was unable to take any immediate action. A referendum on the Board of Public Works to be held in obedience.

Reports of the disreputable condition of certain sections of Elgin, Catherine and Florida streets were made, and the Board of Public Works were instructed to attend to this matter.

The bids for city supplies were returned to the bidders unopened, and a committee appointed to draw up a new set of specifications, as it was claimed the former specifications were not specific enough for intelligent bidding. Councilman Curry asked for and received permission to extend the awning on his building on Fout street to the edge of the sidewalk.

The current bills were passed and ordered paid. The meeting then adjourned.

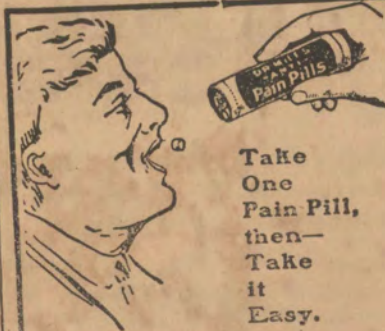

"SUN" FIELD IS HARD

One of the Greatest Problems in Baseball.

Some Clubs In Trying to Protect Players Expose Fans in the Stands
—Left Field in Cleveland is Hardest of Them All.

The hardest position to play in the outfield is the "sun" field, and that is not always the same field, nor are all of them equally difficult.

"Sun" field, by the way, is the ball players' name for the field into which the afternoon sun shines on a direct or almost direct line with the home plate, so that the majority of flies hit to that field come to him out of a blazing background.

At the Polo grounds the left field is the "sun" field, although center field is bothered at certain seasons. At American league park the sun interferes with the right fielder.

What is admitted by all to be the worst in the major leagues is left field in Cleveland, although left field at the Polo grounds in New York is "pretty fierce."

The St. Louis American league grounds have everything else beaten, for both right and center fields are bad "sun" fields whenever the weather is clear. Sometimes even the left fielder there is handicapped, too.

The fan probably wonders why ball parks are not planned so that there will be no "sun" field. That can be done easily enough by making a considerable part of the spectators face the sun, and not only face it, but sit in it most of the game, and that is not comfortable on a hot afternoon.

Detroit and Brooklyn have plants laid out that way and the first base side of the covered stands is no more comfortable than open bleachers in July or August.

Detroit's new plant, now being built, is arranged the other way, because the comfort of the fans is more important to the revenue of the game than the convenience of the outfielders.

It is better to have a fly misjudged occasionally even at the cost of a game than to have a large section of the grandstand shunned by persons unless the place is crowded.

Aside from this sun feature, one would think the outfield positions were alike and equally difficult to play. That is far from the truth.

Each position has its peculiarities, and a man who has played one outfield position for a number of years often may be at sea for a while at any other field.

The greatest difference is between center field and either of the other two positions. As a rule long flies or drives that go to the center fielder are hit almost squarely by the batsman, and consequently have little "English" to make them curve.

The majority of flies hit to right or left field, however, will curve in their flight, and the fielder must remember instinctively to allow for this curve when running to get under the ball.

The fly which a right handed batsman hits into right field will curve in the opposite direction to the fly which a left handed batsman hits into left field, but when a man changes from right to left field he takes the curve instinct along with him and merely has to remember which field he is in.

The center fielder who changes to right or left field must acquire the habit of expecting every fly to curve, unless it is a straight liner "pulled" squarely by the batsman.

There is not as much difference between outfield positions as there is on the infield, but there is enough so that a player is left in his so-called "natural" position unless it is necessary to change him.

The physical requirements in the outfield are speed, accuracy in judging flies and surety of catch. The mental requirements are much the same as in any other department.

The outfielder must study the batsman and learn in which direction certain men usually hit certain kinds of pitching.

Knowing the catchers' signs, so that he will know just what is being pitched each time, is of great help to the "wise" outfielder in guessing the direction a ball will take the instant he hears the crack of the bat.

Any one who has watched the outfield of a good team on the defense has seen great expanses of ground left unguarded at times and may have wondered at it.

"There's a reason" always, and it is simply the fielder or the captain has figured out by the same law of averages which governs insurance premiums that the man at the bat is almost certain not to hit the ball into the territory left uncovered.

Knowledge of what to do with the ball when one gets it also is a prime requisite in the outfield. Many a game has been lost by an unwise throw to the plate or to the wrong base.

The outfielder must take into consideration the speed of the men on bases, the lead they have when he gets the ball and the state of the game. A play that would be wise under some conditions would be the height of folly under others.
