LADIES CIVIC ASSOCIATION HAS DECLARED WAR AGAINST THE FLIES

Communication Refers to Them as the Common Enemy and Speaks of the Great Risk to the Community by Allowing Them to Breed

In its attempt of making Key West a thoroughly clean and sanitary city, and in its efforts to keep down the spread of contagious diseases, the L. C. A. has issued this appeal to the housekeepers, followed by advice on how to do certain things and why they should be done, in order to rid Key West of its worst enemy, the fly. Our motto is "Clean up and keep clean and be healthy and happy always." A clean city is a healthy city, and the L. C. A. wishes to impress on all housekeepers that health is the civic charge, because the health of a city vitally affects the home.

If garbage or trash is thrown in barrels or cans around your doors uncovered, in a few seconds thousands of flies will surround it. And do you know, Mrs. Housekeeper, that 6,000,000 germs have been washed off the body of one fly, and a single fly lays from 120 to 150 eggs in a batch, and this happens every eight or ten days, so you do not see why we have so many flies?

We must not complain continually of flies and then not try to rid ourselves of them. We must all get busy. We cannot all afford to screen our houses, but we can afford to clean up and keep clean, for that costs nothing.

First of all, wrap up your garbage before you put it in your can or barrel, and cover your can barrel over and put a disinfectant around it. And in your home put a tablespoon of formaldehyde and a little sugar in flat vessels filled with water and this will kill hundreds.

Another cheap and reliable fly poison is bichloride of potash. Dissolve one drachm in two ounces of water and a little sugar and place around in like manner. Either of these fly poisons may be bought at any drug store. Last, but not least, is the sticky fly paper, known to all grocers as Tagglefoot. So you see these are ways to rid ourselves of them and ways to keep ourselves rid of them.

Flies kill more people than wild beasts or snakes, for many of these wild beasts or snakes never get a chance to kill human beings. But any one of the millions of flies to be found in our town will if he gets a chance, kill a whole family with typhoid germs.

Don't heap refuse in your back yard. If you have a stable, clean it and disinfect it daily, for there is where they hatch by the millions. They breed so rapidly that in one summer the children and grandchildren of one pair of flies amount to thousands of millions.

These must be kept from house yards and stables and these kept clean to prevent them from hatching their eggs for flies only hatch in filthy places, because flies are filthy. They are born in filth, walk in filth and then with filth sticking to their heads, bodies and legs, they feed and walk on the foot which has been prepared for us to eat. Bad as filth is, it is not the worst thing that flies carry about, for they swarm about out-houses, drains and sewers which receive millions of germs from sick persons and they pick up typhoid germs and other disease germs.

So, Mrs. Housekeeper, do you not see the necessity of keeping your premises clean? Do not keep dirty water in tubs or buckets, for this is where the mosquito hatches.

We, the L. C. A., have requested to have all fruit and vegetable stands screened as well as beef, turtle and fish markets, and sincerely trust the law will be enforced. We often see watermelons cut and left open and flies swarming around it, so we ask that all food stuffs be screened and kept screened, not left with screens up half the time.

Hoping within the next year to see Key West without a single fly, and we can do it if all work together, here's hoping, L. C. A.

PRES. TAFT WON OUT IN FIRST SKIRMISH

Wins Alabama's Delegates at Large--Teddy is Going to Chicago

Chicago, June 7.—President Taft won first of the contests for seats in the republican national convention, which was heard by the republican national committee when, by unanimous decision, the contest over the six Alabama delegates at large was decided in favor of the Long (Taft) delegation by a unanimous vote.

The argument hinged on the regularity of the Long and Thompson conventions in the first Alabama district cases. The Roosevelt side waived argument as they felt it was futile and the Taft delegates were unanimously seated.

Chicago, Ill., June 8.—The prospect that Theodore Roosevelt might come here next week to personally conduct his campaign held the political attention today to the exclusion of interest in the meeting of the republican national committee in session here to settle 238 or more contests involving delegations to the convention.

Publicity is to govern the committee's deliberations upon the contests. This was decided yesterday and Senator Dixon declares that it was a Roosevelt victory.

WOODROW WILSON MAKES SOME GAINS

Gets Entire Minnesota Delegation and 8 from North Carolina

Duluth, Minn., June 8.—Woodrow Wilson will have the entire Minnesota delegation of 24 votes to the Baltimore convention, as was voted by the state convention.

The followers of Clark tried to stampede the convention for Bryan, to get an untried delegation but their efforts were fruitless.

Raleigh, N. C., June 8.—Eight Woodrow Wilson men were elected as delegates at large to the national convention at Baltimore, by the democratic state convention after an all night convention.

Although the delegates were not instructed, the convention endorsed Wilson and elected his supporters.

Wilson was expected to return to Havana and give himself up. The young man is said to be the son of a well-to-do Cuban merchant in Tampa.—Havana Post.

TROUBLE IN HAVANA THAT OCCURED YESTERDAY

Small Sized Riot Started At Regla Between Negroes And Whites--Lynching Was Threatened for a Time At Regla--Whites Barricade Houses

Havana, June 8.—A shooting affray between whites and negroes in which two negroes were wounded at Regla last night, the near lynching yesterday morning of a negro who had shot at a white man and the expulsion from the veterans' association of all negroes concerned in the present uprising were the features of the Havana situation yesterday. The government up to a late hour last night had not found the band which is said to have fired on the Toledo sugar mill early yesterday morning.

The fighting at Regla took place about 9 o'clock last evening and there are two versions of the affair. One is that there were a number of white men gathered in a cafe near the wharf and that a group of negroes gathered outside began jeering and insulting the white men, who began the shooting. The negroes replied with revolvers. The other report is that the negroes fired first.

Regla in an Uproar. Most of the 10,000 inhabitants of Regla immediately became excited. Houses and cafes quickly barred their doors. Some men are said to have run to the roofs of their houses and started shooting at negroes in the streets.

Negroes Dispersed. The group of negroes who are said to have brought on the conflict quickly dispersed, leaving the two wounded men behind. One negro was shot through the stomach and will probably die. The other was shot in the leg and will recover.

Laredo Bru on the Scene. Secretary Laredo Bru of the department of government was in his office when the news of the shooting was telephoned to him. He immediately entered his automobile and

caught the first ferry boat for Regla. Mr. Aguirre of the police department also rushed to Regla. They assisted materially in restoring calm to the excited people.

Veterans Indignant. The Association of Veterans held a secret meeting last night and after a long discussion voted to expel from the association every veteran who is known to be connected with the present uprising. Generals Estenoz and Yvonet are denounced as traitors to their country.

Veterans to the Front. A vote of confidence was given to President Nuñez, who was instructed to visit President Gomez and offer the services of the veterans in Oriente. They are anxious to take the field against the negroes.

Have 1,200 For Duty. President Nuñez said that he could enlist for the service a force of not less than 1,200 men. These forces will be speedily organized and expect to leave for the front as quickly as the arms which have been asked from the United States are received.

Near Lynching in Regla. A near lynching occurred in Regla yesterday morning when Miguel Forcade, a negro, shot at and missed Joaquin Dizon, a white man. A large crowd chased Forcade through the village crying "lynch him!" and probably only the timely arrival of the police saved the man. Forcade and Dizon have been friends for a long time but they got into a dispute over the race question.

A Phantom Ship. A sharp lookout was maintained along the coast of Cuba yesterday in an effort to find the mysterious ship reported off Marianao Thursday night. No trace of the vessel was found.

INTERVENTION MAY BE ORDERED IN CUBA BY UNITED STATES TOMORROW

It Is Claimed That Taft's Note To President Gomez Gave Latter Until Yesterday To Begin An Active And Aggressive Campaign Against Rebels

FLEITAS TO MANAGE MONROE THEATRE

Will Take Charge of New Theatre Tomorrow Also Keeps San Carlos

A deal was closed yesterday morning, whereby Mr. Frank Fleitas, the successful manager of San Carlos, will come into control of the big new Monroe theatre tomorrow morning. Mr. Carbonell having leased the Monroe to Mr. Fleitas. The Monroe is decidedly the most attractive theater in the city, and doubtless under Mr. Fleitas' management will draw the big crowds that it has always drawn. There will be hundreds of people in the city who will regret to learn that Mr. Carbonell will no longer be connected with the active management of the Monroe, but under Mr. Fleitas' management it will give the patrons as good bills as can be produced in any other theater, and will doubtless vie with Mr. Fleitas' other house, San Carlos, in the big crowds that flock to San Carlos night after night. The bill for this week at the Monroe is especially attractive, and doubtless Mr. Fleitas will have a big week to start off with. Mr. Carbonell will go into other business at an early date.

Infantry First. The first troops to be sent to Cuba will be composed principally of infantry, although they may later be reinforced by cavalry, which could sweep the island, leaving stationary forces to guard plantations.

At Moment's Notice. In the meantime troops will be made ready to depart on a moment's notice. Future developments in Cuba will demonstrate whether or not American soldiers shall again land in its territory.

Prepare Transports. The United States army transports Kilpatrick, McClellan, Sumner and Meade, which are now laying idle with scant crews, will be recruited to their full strength at once. Troops will probably embark at Savannah and Newport News.

Military Expedition. Washington, June 8.—The general staff of the army issued orders today in preparation for the dispatch of a military expedition to Cuba. Five thousand soldiers will go in the first expedition.

Four Transports Ready. Four army transports now at Newport News have been ordered to take on provisions and other supplies. Orders have been sent to Forts Porter, Niagara, Governor's Island and two Georgia posts to get troops in readiness at once, fully equipped and provisioned, that they may embark at an instant's notice when called.

Proclamation Ready. The state department is ready to direct intervention in Cuba whenever developments warrant the action. President Taft's proclamation depends entirely on the demonstration by Cuba of its ability to handle the insurrection.

Wireless Corps. A signal corps company of 100 mounted men equipped with wireless for transmitting messages from the field to battlefields or headquarters was ordered today to hold itself in readiness for a possible voyage to Cuba.

Havana, June 8.—The Cuban house of representatives passed yesterday the senate bill conceding a credit of \$1,000,000 to President Gomez with which to put down the Estenoz uprising. The measure was passed without discussion, there being no opposition.

The bill authorizes the president to take up to \$1,000,000 from any available public funds for the purpose of enlisting and equipping as many men as may be necessary to put down the uprising. It was introduced in the senate on Wednesday and passed without discussion.

This is the bill which President Gomez told the Washington government that he was waiting to have passed before starting a nation-wide movement to put down the Oriente uprising.

Ferrara Given Leave. The house next considered the request for a leave of absence for Speaker Ferrara, "to attend to private affairs." He was granted fifteen days. Speaker Ferrara sailed for the United States on the Miami yesterday morning.

WITHERSPOON HEADS MEDICAL ASS'N. Atlantic City, June 8.—Dr. John Witherspoon, of Nashville, was elected president of the American Medical Association today. Minneapolis, Minn., gets the next convention.

EVERGLADES INQUIRY DRAWING TO A CLOSE

Report of J. O. Wright, State Drainage Engineer is Heard

Washington, June 6.—The house probe of the department of agriculture's transactions concerning the Everglades of Florida and the swamp land near Lake Mattamuskeet, N. C., is nearing the end.

The supplemental testimony of J. O. Wright, state drainage engineer of Florida, and a former government employe, was heard today. He reiterated that none of the officials of the department had participated in any of the commissions he had drawn on land deals.

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NATIONAL POLITICS.

As the Democratic and Republican National conventions are to meet within a very short time it is but natural that there should be considerable speculation all over the country as to the outcome of these two great meetings. The writer is not a politician and he is frank to confess that what he knows about national politics is not at all likely to interfere with the condition of his health. However, as a rank outsider, we have watched the presidential situation with no small degree of interest and we have formed a few opinions. While they may not display any great political acumen, they are at least honest opinions and we pass them on for what they are worth.

So far as the Republican situation is concerned, we believe that President Taft will receive the nomination of his party. While Mr. Roosevelt has undoubtedly made a great fight, it is almost beyond the bounds of human possibility for him to defeat Mr. Taft. Aside from being entitled to the customary courtesy of a second nomination, Mr. Taft has had at his command the powerful machinery of the administration, a force not to be reckoned with lightly. Furthermore, although his administrative acts have not been performed to the accompaniment of brass bands, it is certain that the country has been governed by less capable presidents in the past. Mr. Taft is not superlative in any light. He is merely a conservative American citizen, whose conservatism is seemingly a little far-fetched on account of his life-long legal training. We are firmly convinced that he will be the nominee of the Republican party for President.

The Democratic situation is somewhat more complicated and we confess our inability to "get a line" on what may happen at the Baltimore convention. We believe it to be rather doubtful whether any one of the avowed candidates for the Democratic nomination will be successful. While we would like to see Mr. Underwood victorious we are unable to figure how this can be brought about. We believe Mr. Harmon will develop greater strength in the convention, after a few ballots have been taken, than is generally anticipated now. We fear, however, that none of the men now mentioned will be able to win the nomination. We fear, further, that a prominent Democrat who has been several times been the dark cloud in what would have otherwise been the bright horizon of the Democracy, will again complicate the situation and will again assist in the defeat of the Democratic party.

The Democratic party has an excellent chance to win with either Underwood or Harmon. If some other is nominated, unless it be a "dark horse" of unsuspected strength, then the party is doomed to the defeat which it has suffered for many years.

THOMAS F. RYAN IS OUT OF SEABOARD AIR LINE

Controlling Block of Stock is Purchased by David Warfield

New York, June 8.—It was announced here tonight that David Warfield, president of the Continental Trust Company of Baltimore had purchased a large block of stock in the Seaboard Air Line railway, whereby the control of the railroad passes to Warfield and the group of financial interests associated with him.

The transfer marks the practical retirement of Thomas F. Ryan from the Seaboard Air Line railway.

OROZCO RECOGNIZES THE MEXICAN CONGRESS

Issues Formal Protest Against Holding of Elections on June Fifteenth

Chihuahua, June 6.—The evident disposition of General Pascual Orozco to treat with the Mexican congress has caused hope that peace may yet be effected in the republic.

Orozco issued a formal protest to the federal congress today against the usual elections being held on June 15. This is taken as a significant indication that Orozco recognizes the legality of congress and that he will listen to a peace proposal if congress recognizes him.

TWO BATTLESHIP BILL PASSED.

Washington, June 8.—The committee on naval affairs reported favorably today the bill providing that the United States shall construct two new battleships in 1912. The success of the measure is considered practically assured.

JIMMIE ELLIS THINKS HE CAN LICK SR. CURLEY

Says he Will be in Pink of Condition When he Crawls Through Ropes

Jimmie Ellis of Philadelphia is passing out the word that when he and Young Curley of Brooklyn tangle up in this city on June 20 there is going to be some boxing exhibition. Ellis concedes the cleverness and gameness of his opponent, but says that he will be amply able to take care of himself and will be in the pink of condition on the night he crawls through the ropes to meet Curley. Ellis is quite a favorite, locally, and the fight fans are of the opinion that a certain Mr. Curley of Brooklyn has a neat little surprise package coming to him. As the twentieth is not far off, it is useless to speculate on the result and the fans might just as well adopt the "show me" attitude in the matter.

NINE SOCIALISTS WERE RETURNED IN GERMANY

Proposed Election Reforms Brought About Great Fight in "Faderland"

Rudolstadt, Germany, June 8.—As a result of today's elections nine Socialists were returned to seats in the landtag.

The contention in the body over proposed election reforms which were opposed by the socialists resulted in the dissolution of the landtag on March 4.

The reforms provide that the voting strength of the highest taxpayers should be increased. Today's victory at the polls gives the socialists the same strength they had before the dissolution and leaves the situation unchanged.

Shearer admitted that the National City Bank's earnings were forty per cent on a capital of \$25,000,000.

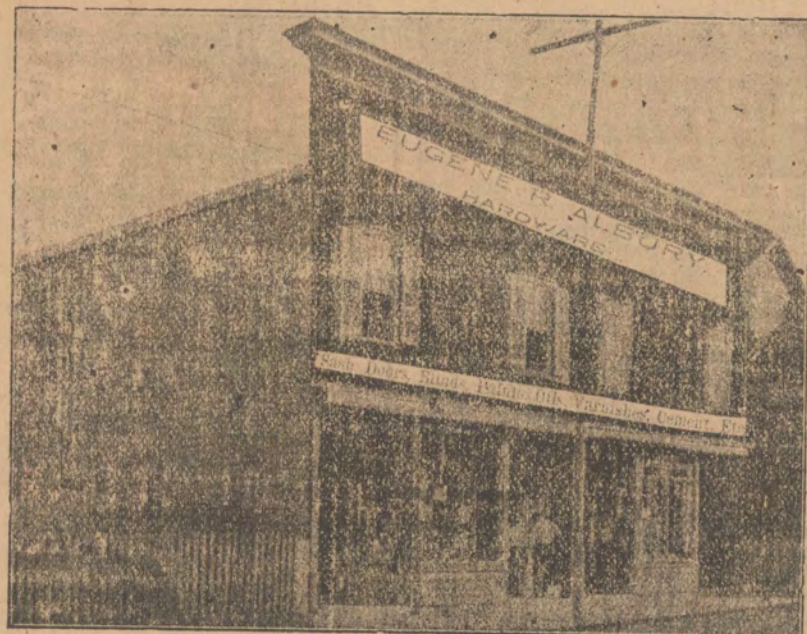

AN AMERICAN ATTORNEY MURDERED IN HONDURAS

Crime Has Been Reported to State Department and Action Will Follow

Washington, June 8.—The American legation at Tegucigalpa, Honduras, reported to the state department today the assassination of Fred P. Shaw, an American attorney.

Mr. Shaw was killed on June 5. His assassin has been arrested and placed in prison. Neither the identity of the criminal nor the motive which actuated him has been learned. Mr. Shaw represented the legal interests of the Chicago Title and Trust Company. He was acting under orders of the United States court for the northern district of Illinois in a case involving the Central American Commercial Company when he was killed.

CIVIC MEDALS FOR BOY SCOUTS.

The common council of Poughkeepsie, New York, has voted to award medals to the boy scouts of that city who qualify in ten different phases of civic knowledge and activities. The common council specified that the boy scout must be able to read a map, give the names of the streets, location of the fire alarm boxes and fire companies, location of public buildings, factories, lines of railroads and steamboat lines touching Poughkeepsie, points of scenic and historic interest, general knowledge of the city government, sources of the water supply, information about the sewage and garbage system. The system of tests was worked out by the Rev. Franklin Elmer, Scoutmaster of Poughkeepsie.

CUBAN BALLPLAYER MAKING GOOD FAST

Marsans will Now Become a Regular Member Of Cincinnati Reds

New York, June 8.—Armando Marsans, the Cuban outfielder, is no longer a substitute player of the Cincinnati Reds, according to Manager O'Day in a statement made by him today. Hank O'Day declared that Marsans had proved his worth clearly and that hereafter he will be a regular player of the Reds. Frank Bancroft, business manager of the Reds and the man to whom Marsans owes his entrance in the big league team, also ratified what had been said by O'Day.

The plan is to bench Mitchell when Bates returns to the game and shift Marsans to right field and let him play there permanently. His heavy batting against every pitcher he faces and his perfect fielding has convinced the officials of the Reds that they can not have a better man in his place.
