Kesiches opened Ripon's first large nursing home in 1964

Ripon opened a municipally run and funded hospital in 1936. By the 1960s, it was evident that some type of facility was needed for those senior citizens that no longer could live alone in their homes.

In late 1962, the City Council started studying the need for a nursing home in Ripon.

An October 1962 Ripon Commonwealth Press stated, "There are some persons in the local hospital who are able to get around but can't live alone, who should be in a nursing home. The Ripon hospital is crowded most of the time and is needed for patients who require medical care. Markesan has had its home in operation for about a year and it is filled at all times."

In February 1963, the Ripon Commonwealth Press reported that subcommittees had been formed to look into opening a "home for the aged and chronically ill."

The committees toured area nursing home facilities, conducted studies and gathered local thoughts and data.

The facilities committee studied

three possibilities. The first was to add a nursing home onto the present Ripon Memorial Hospital.

At that time, the hospital was located at 935 Newbury St., where Newbury Place Apartment thes are today. The second option the committee looked into was the possibility of converting the hospital into a nursing home THIS ADVERTISEMENT IN the July and constructing a new hospital. The third choice studied was building a nursing home in a different area than the hospital.

The only nursing facility in Ripon at that time was owned by Dorothy Jantz (1920-2009), who operated the facility at 604 South Grove Ave. Jantz opened her nursing home in 1956, was licensed by the state, had two part-time employees and took care of up to nine elderly female

In July 1964, Emil Kesich Sr. 1995) and Irene Martyka Kesich (1921-2019) from Milwaukee opened a 58-bed nursing home at 50 Wolverton Ave. just west of Eureka Street. It was named the "Parkview Nursing Home" as the facility had a view to the west of Murray Park.

The Kesiches were the owners and administrator; Frieda Keso (1907-2003), a retired Air Force nurse, was

the supervisor of nurses; and Emil Kesich Jr. (1943-1996) was an administrative assistant.

In addition, a staff of five included one licensed practical nurse, two nurses aids, one cook and a housekeeper.

An August 1964 Commonwealth *Press* described the building by saying, "The décor is light and modern and the little touches than can mean so much to older, infirm people are present, including central air conditioning, hand rails on all corridors, an elevator, devices for assistance in taking baths, etc."

Emil Kesich Sr. noted in the Com-

monwealth Press that "A recreation program will be provided and expanded as we develop. For instance, we are in the process of making plans for gardens for residents in the rear of the building for next spring or summer." A recreation area was planned for the basement "for developing hobbies and interests of residents and providing therapy for their physical well-being."

Daily visiting home at 50 Wolverton Ave. Ripon hours were 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., however and this was the first large nursing no children under 16 were allowed in the residential

wings of the building. Residents were only able to visit with their grandchildren in the lobby.

The Kesichs owned Parkview Nursing Home for 25 years before retiring

Irene Kesich's obituary read, "Built from the ground up, Emil's expertise in construction and Irene's creative designs guided the formation of Parkview beginning with the fan-shaped structure that allowed expansion to 177 beds at the time of their retirement. Receiving many accolades over the years, Parkview's contribution to education in the areas of healthcare and everpresent kindness, compassionate and respectful 'care with love' techniques performed by their treasured staff were

recognized and adopted throughout based residential facilities and nursing the state of Wisconsin and nationally."

Today, Parkview Nursing Home is known as "Whispering Pines Nursing & Rehab," which is part of Eden Senior Care. It offers skilled nursing and assisted-living facilities along with post-acute rehabilitation and long-term
