away. Both articles note that the Hamley family lived for a time in the Little White Schoolhouse, known as the birthplace of the Republican Party.

This former one-room Ripon school building was turned into a home for a while, however, the claim of the Hamley family living in the school could not be substantiated.

Lester Hamley (1889-1963) and John Hamley (1896-1937), J.J.'s sons, joined the family business. The company stayed in the Hamley family until approximately 1980, when John David "Dave" Hamley (1916-2005), the last in the line of family successors, retired and sold the business.

Hamley & Co. is still found at the same location in Pendleton, Ore. Its website states that "Hamley Saddle Makers continues to create beautiful and functional pieces of saddle-Hamley name. Hamley & Co. also carries custom-fitted hats, horse tack, clothing, boots and a large collection of hand wrought jewelry."
