

Conservation Comments:

William Clark: In 1995 re-created drawer slides because original too worn. He used aluminum angle stock screwed to the drawer sides. Also replaced beaded molding and refinished.

David Bayne: The repairs are unusual but seem reversible. Chest receives a lot of sun on the side facing the window and there is damage to the finish. Vulnerable to handling and damage from traffic in a and out of bathroom.

Recommendations:

Entire chest should be checked for additional loose moldings. Light control needs to be established on window and

William Clark: Both chairs were received in numerous pieces from Reinham (sp.?) Hall. They were reconstructed and then cleaned in thinners before being refinished with shellac and wax. The work took place in the late 1980's. There is a lot of inactive worm damage.
