This tooled leather western saddle and set of spurs was made in the early 20th century by D. E. Walker. David E. Walker founded the Visalia Stock Saddle Company in 1870 in Visalia, California. It later moved to San Francisco by 1879.

The saddle exemplifies a style that would have been used by cowboys in the frontier West. W. R. Coe purchased a property from "Buffalo Bill" Cody in Cody, Wyoming in 1910. The Coe's ranch was part of the roughly 200,000 acres that they owned out West. Mr. Coe acquired many horses in Wyoming and brought several back to Long Island for training for sport.
