



#### Tenacious Teacher

There's a little bulldog attitude in Jim Winkelman, and for a guy who spends his days interpreting Federal Aviation Administration regulations, that's a good thing. As Alaska Airlines' Director of Regulatory Compliance, Jim makes sure the airline and its pilots adhere to the safety and operational regulations that impact nearly every decision pilots make.

Jim is a tenacious researcher with a need for answers. He's a born teacher who believes that the pilots need first to understand how a regulation came about in order to fully apply it.

"I do have a passion for asking a 'why' question," he says, noting that FAA officials he works with have come to expect repeated calls from Jim as soon as they release a new regulation or update.

"Jim's great gift is his ability to take a lot of regulatory material and boil it down to something our pilots will understand," says Vice President, Flight Operations Gary Beck. "He's reluctant to let anything go until he's satisfied that he has the best, simplest answer." Oddly enough, part of what makes Jim so good at what he does is a learning disability, a form of dyslexia. He reads slowly, with difficulty recognizing some characters and confusing others, but as he works through a piece of reading, he breaks the text down into its most-basic concepts—distilling bullet points perfect for teaching others. He has a reputation for an almost encyclopedic understanding of regulations. Pilots have gone out of their way to try to stump Jim on regulation details, but with little success.

Jim got his first taste of flying in 1974 as a high school graduation present in New Orleans. When his family moved to Seattle later that year, Jim signed up for lessons at a local airfield. It wasn't long before he had a job servicing planes based there. He worked his way through pilot certifications and obtained a job with a Piper Aircraft dealer, delivering brand-new planes from the Florida manufacturing plant to Seattle.

Jim soon started his own business, an aviation ground school for a wide range

of pilot ratings, teaching everything from aeronautical theory to navigation and meteorology. Jim had five Alaska pilots working part-time for him, and in 1989 one suggested that Jim interview for a position as an instructor at Alaska. It turns out a number of the pilots he met during the interview process had been in his classes at some point. He was on the job at Alaska within the week.

In the 1980s, Jim served on the original board of directors of the National Association of Flight Instructors. He also chairs the FAA's national Operations Specifications Working Group.

"I'm trying to make regulations work better, not go away," Jim notes.

Jim is considered unselfish, compassionate and positive. He's a father of two, involved in church and community, and willing to offer a caring ear and good counsel for those in need.

"Jim is a unique blend of spirit, resourcefulness, integrity, professionalism and caring," says Alaska Captain Dave Strelinger.—Paul Frichtl



#### EFFORTS TO SAVE A HAWAI'I LANDMARK GAIN GROUND

A visitor strolling along O'ahu's Kaimana Beach on a Friday evening might hear the surprising sound of bagpipes—and be led

by the music to a significant monument to Hawai'i history: the nearby Waikiki War Memorial Natatorium (shown above). Built to honor more than 10,000 World War I servicemen from Hawai'i, the natatorium is a combination memorial and saltwater swimming pool (the pool is currently closed to the public). From its opening in 1927 to the pool's closure in 1979, the natatorium was



a gathering place for Hawai'i residents, and it once hosted celebrities such as swimmer-actress Esther Williams and Olympic gold medalist and actor Johnny Weissmuller.

In recent years, the local nonprofit Friends of the Natatorium has been

building support for full restoration of the pool. The National Trust for Historic Preservation named the site a National Treasure in 2014, and restoration proponents are optimistic that the landmark can be a thriving center of activity for future generations—one that also honors the past. 



#### **Genetics Pioneer**

UW researcher continues to seek cancer's underlying triggers By Diane Mapes

Like most research labs, it's not glamorous. Outside the door there are biohazard stickers, a standing freezer, a faded child's drawing and an old drugstore rack full of postcards from students in far-flung places.

Inside, there are workbenches, test tubes, researchers in white coats and a small office bursting with binders, books, and Latin American folk art. There is also one very driven scientist, Mary-Claire King, the University of Washington professor and genetics researcher who's made groundbreaking discoveries in hereditary breast cancer. King has won major awards for her contributions to biology, medicine and human rights, and was portrayed by Oscar-winner Helen Hunt in the film *Decoding Annie Parker*.

At 67, King is unquestionably among the most famous geneticists. She pushed boundaries (and buttons) with her 1973 UC Berkeley dissertation that showed humans and chimpanzees are 99 percent

genetically identical, then went on to painstakingly prove that a predisposition for breast cancer could be passed from one generation to the next by locating the BRCA1 gene—known for harboring mutations like the one carried by Angelina Jolie—years before the mapping of human DNA.



Annie Parker (left) was the subject of Mary-Claire King's pioneering genetics research, for which the scientist was awarded a Lasker Foundation prize. King's University of Washington facility is a research lab and learning venue for the geneticist's younger helpers—the next generation of scientists who will further advance her ideas.

"It took 17 years to find it," says King. "Now it would take weeks. It's amazing what the Human Genome Project allows one to do."

Warm, energetic and as brilliant as her glacier-blue eyes, King runs her own lab, tucked into the labyrinth of the UW Health Sciences complex where, for the past 20 years, she's been teasing out the genetic puzzle of inherited cancers, supported by money from the National Institutes of Health and private foundations. She continues to win acclaim, most recently a 2014 Lasker Award (often a

precursor to a Nobel). The Lasker,

King clearly has a soft spot for family—she's renowned for her genetics work reuniting the "disappeared

children" of Argentina with their loved ones, and her grown daughter helps rescue abandoned animals in California. The researcher is thus determined to keep hereditary breast cancer from cutting a swath through even more families than it already has, and she's campaigning for all



women over 30 to be tested for BRCA mutations so they can take preventive measures.

Because of smaller families, paternally inherited mutations or other considerations, half the women with BRCA mutations don't have a family history of breast and ovarian cancers and don't know they're at risk.

"It's a radical idea, but you'd save many lives," she argues. "Every time you find a BRCA1 or 2 mutation after a woman has developed cancer, that's a missed opportunity to have prevented that cancer."

King's life outside the lab includes chamber music concerts, English murder mysteries and her love of Seattle's green spaces. But these pastimes definitely take a backseat to the grueling, not-so-glamorous business of saving lives. And we're all better for it.



# EL GAUCHO, THE QUINN T. ESSENTIAL STEAKHOUSE By Quinn Travis

After extensive research, an intrepid food critic finally settles on **EL GAUCHO** AS THE ULTIMATE STEAKHOUSE.

FOR SOME TIME NOW, I have been patiently and secretly visiting every self-proclaimed or ravely reviewed "top shelf steakhouse" in the major market cities: New York, Chicago and San Francisco. Restaurants like The Palm, Chicago Chop House, Gene & Georgetti's, Smith & Wollensky, Angelo and Maxie's, Ben Benson's Steak House, and so on.

In fact, I'm writing this at Angelo and Maxie's in Manhattan as I sit outdoors in 85-degree weather at 8 o'clock at night. Why? Well, I love a good steak, and quite frankly there are so many steakhouses and so many claims and readers polls, I thought it was high time for me to do some sleuth work. Exactly, how does Seattle fare in this category? Is it in the big leagues?

First off, there are so many steakhouses in Seattle it's mind-boggling. Local favorites like Daniel's Broiler, Metropolitan Grill, Brooklyn Seafood Steak & Oyster House and El Gaucho, and big invading chains, like Morton's and Ruth's Chris all compete in the market replete with a zillion other restaurants that claim to have the best steaks around. So if you feel like a great steak, where do you go to really impress a business client and cement the deal?

### THE ULTIMATE STEAK

Last November, a colleague and I were having dinner, and the owner of the steakhouse (whom we know) came up and proudly proclaimed that we were in luck. They had just secured a deal with an elite distributor, the Tarpoff Packing Co. of Granite City, IL (a third-generation family-owned packing plant where each steer is hand selected by owner John Tarpoff), for exclusive restaurant rights, and that night was the premiere of the new beef. This owner claimed it was the best custom 28-Day Dry-Aged Certified Angus Beefs Prime, tender and lean, that he had ever tasted. (By the way, only .05 percent of beef sold in this country

is Certified Angus.) This came as a mild quake to me, since I felt the steaks were already superior at this establishment. The man is

Paul Mackay, and the steakhouse is El Gaucho. I must confess, Paul was not blowing smoke.

### A SUPER-HIP CIGAR ROOM

First-time visitors to the El Gaucho are immediately hit by its distinctive atmosphere. Nondescript on the outside and dimly lit and well appointed on the inside, El Gaucho is a perfect representation of what my worldly brother-in-law architect Ron Rea terms a "swank 1940s New York nightclub." Yes, even the baby grand piano man is here, playing it live. The restaurant screams style, quality, and fashion—right at you, but not in your face.

Stunning details include curved walls, terraced seating, big booths, tables, a stylish bar, wood trim galore, a marble floor, three small private dining rooms (two of which are wine cellars, too), a 16-foot ceiling, and no windows. Further, there's the ultra-retro Pampas Room downstairs that can accommodate up to 200 guests and has a full dance floor and stage.

A super-hip cigar room, with whisper-quiet ceiling vents that whisk away the stogie fumes, has a freshness that would impress an air quality specialist. If you didn't venture into that part of the restaurant, you simply would not know that there is a cigar room. Absolutely no cigar odors permeate the main dining area. Yet with that huge cigar vault, El Gaucho is the place for many sports celebrities, business leaders, and politicians who like an occasional cigar.

### ALWAYS ON, EVERY NIGHT

Here are the main reasons why I think this is the best steakhouse in Seattle, and yes, even beyond Seattle. There is no excuse for an off night.

In this business, you must be on every night—without exception. There are three main areas where restaurants rise or fall. El Gaucho excels at all three.

First, good food means fresh, well-prepared, well-presented, well-sized portions, with variety and creativity. Second, the environment must have an ambiance that enhances the dining experience. Third, service

must be exemplary—neither too invisible nor too intrusive. Service is one area where El Gaucho rules hands down. The wait staff are so knowledgeable, so polite and gracious, so attentive to detail, so professional in dress and demeanor, that I can only commend Paul for creating and sustaining such a fine, rare, unique atmosphere. No other restaurant comes close. That includes all the big guns, both here and in the other major markets.

"Let's sum it all up this way.
I've been to El Gaucho at
least eight times in the past
year or so, and I've never
been disappointed."

I frequent the other high-end steakhouses in town and beyond, and they are good, some perhaps even great, but I have had off evenings at these restaurants. Plus El Gaucho's steaks are, shall we say, a cut above—more tender, more flavorful. Furthermore, they could teach advanced grad school courses on service and etiquette. And the ambiance, while classy, successfully avoids the pretentious, stuffy mode.

So having dined at many of the best steak-houses in the country, let me answer my earlier question: Are we in the big leagues? Seattle is not only in the big leagues with El Gaucho, we're like the Ichiro-fueled Seattle Mariners—we are on top of the heap. Chicago, New York—my apologies. El Gaucho is the definitive steakhouse in this country.





# Fitness Inspirations

Tips for refreshing an exercise routine By Heidi Mills



fter more than 20 years as a competitive amateur tennis player, Diann Smith wanted to supplement her sprints on the court with a new athletic activity. So, she decided to take to the water.

Smith, 46, and two of her friends signed up for an adult learn-to-row class at the Pocock Rowing Center in Seattle. She had been intrigued by the graceful shells gliding on the waters of Lake Union and Portage Bay and thought the smooth rowing stroke might be a good counterbalance to the high-impact movements that are part of tennis.

To her delight, she found that adding rowing to her regular workout not only complemented tennis but also provided a secondary outlet for her competitive, perfectionist nature. Mastering the rowing stroke challenged her both technically and physically, and she discovered a pure love for starting her mornings on the lake.

"It's really therapeutic for me to be on the water," Smith says. "[I] live in this beautiful area, and I wanted to be able to take greater advantage of it."

Whether you are a lifelong athlete such as Smith or a reluctant gym visitor who feels the need for a change, a new exercise program can inspire you to get back in the gym and stay in shape.

Fitness experts say changing an exercise routine can prove beneficial for both casual exercisers and serious athletes. New movements exert different muscles, enabling people to keep improving their physical fitness. "We become finetuned through muscle adaptation to execute the same move without the same effort," says Andrea Metcalf, a Chicago-based fitness trainer and lifestyle expert who also works with the online community Womensforum.com. "We need to change the workout or intensity to keep seeing results."

For many people, a new workout routine also prevents mental fatigue. Repeating the same activity week after week can lead to loss of motivation.

However, with so many workout options available, deciding which new athletic activity to try can be a daunting task. Metcalf suggests asking friends for suggestions, and then sampling a new group or class with them. You can also do research online to find out what is popular, or watch YouTube videos to see different exercise classes.

"When people choose a new workout, they have to make sure the routine fits into their life schedule," says Josh Fitchitt, senior director of fitness at PRO Sports Club, which has facilities in Bellevue, Redmond and Seattle, Washington. "It is really important that they choose something they can commit to on a regular basis."

To truly commit to a new workout requires

finding the right type of exercise that fits your personality type and that you would most enjoy.

"The best exercise is the one you will keep doing," Metcalf says. "The one that doesn't feel like exercise."

A personality assessment can be useful even when narrowing gym classes to sample. If clients tell Chris Freytag, a Minneapolis, Minnesota—based group fitness instructor, certified personal trainer and founder of GetHealthyU.com, that they love to dance, she'll steer them to Zumba classes. "Think about what you want to do that is active and also fun for you," Freytag says.

The following are ideas for workouts that should appeal to a range of athletic abilities, interests and personality types.

### Join an Indoor Climbing Gym

■ Who should consider it: Puzzle solvers who like a social environment.



■ Who should steer clear: Those fearful of heights.

■ The workout: A full-body exercise, including the core muscles, arms, hands and legs.

Most major cities offer climbing gyms, with facilities that have ropes and harnesses for safety. Many locations also offer bouldering gyms, in which

participants climb to lesser heights without ropes, relying on mats to pad falls.

Chris Potts, co-owner of the Seattle Bouldering Project and the soon-to-open Austin Bouldering Project, says indoor gyms provide a safe and accessible way to climb on a regular basis when

logistics or weather don't allow treks to the outdoors.

### Find a U.S. Masters Swimming Group

■ Who should consider it: Swimmers (18 and older)

of all ability levels seeking inspiration from a team and coach.

- Who should steer clear: Anyone who doesn't like being in water or participating in organized group workouts.
- The workout: Swimming provides a cardio challenge and a full-body workout.

while others swim for the camaraderie or motivation. "If you're going to get up in the dark and cold to jump in the pool, it's much more fun to do that with a group of like-minded people than all alone," says Tawnee Prazak, a Laguna Beach, California—based endurance and wellness coach, and host of the podcast Endurance Planet.

### Prepare for a Marathon or Triathlon

- Who should consider it: Social people who want to support a good cause and train for a distance event.
- Who should steer clear: Those who hate running or group meetups.
- The workout: Endurance training.

Many charities and nonprofit groups help create running teams to train for a marathon or other races and also to raise money for their cause. Team In Training, a program of The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society, which is one of the preferred charity partners for Rock 'n' Roll Marathon Series across the country, organizes groups to prepare for marathon, half-marathon and triathlon events.

Participants typically meet with team members for training sessions once a week. Many groups plan their own supplemental workouts on additional days. Those who don't want to or can't make group training sessions can sign up for Team In Training Your Way, which includes online coaching and a mobile

training app for phones or electronic devices.

Go Trail Running

- Who should consider it: Runners who are bored with the monotony of pavement pounding.
- Who should steer clear: Those easily injured by high-impact sports.
- The workout: Trail running provides the same cardio challenge as road running, with the added benefit of improving balance and better

For runners seeking workouts that are more varied than road running, consider taking to the trails. Due to the terrain, runners may incorporate uphill running or walking, which adds variety to the muscular workout. Navigating rocks and roots

requires agility and balance. "For me, it is mostly the escape I get from being directly engaged in nature in a way you just can't achieve on roads," says Adam Chase, a trail runner in Boulder, Colorado, and president of the American Trail Running Association.

### Try CrossFit

- Who should consider it: Those looking to combine both strength and cardio exercises.
- Who should steer clear: Those who don't like to sweat or are not comfortable with intense exercises.
- *The workout*: A regularly changing workout that includes cardio and all of the major muscle groups.

The popularity of CrossFit programs has expanded greatly in the last decade. Workouts vary and typically involve a combination of strength and cardio exercises. An example would be that participants do a series of rowing sprints, pull-ups, and kettlebell swings.



Upower, which serves underprivileged youth, says the workouts always change and are based on functional movements.

"There's a stereotype that CrossFit is only for the young and strong, but I think it's for anyone who is interested in building strength, in cardio stamina and in having a good time," Moseley says.

### Join a Sports Team

- Who should consider it: Athletes who like competition and a team environment.
- Who should steer clear: Solo exercisers and those who don't enjoy team sports.
- The workout: It varies by sport, but team sports often require running, agility and hand-eye coordination.

People who think of going to the gym as a chore and who would rather turn a workout into a game should consider signing up for a sports team. Most cities offer a wide range of leagues that often include everything from soccer to softball to Ultimate Frisbee. The leagues often have divisions for different competitive levels, age groups and genders.

### **Experiment with Barre**

- Who should consider it: Those seeking a strength workout inspired by dance.
- Who should steer clear: Devotees of endurance and cardio workouts or anyone not comfortable with the exercise's dance element.
- The workout: Barre incorporates ballet work with yoga and Pilatesinspired moves, providing a total-body exercise.

Barre classes, a fitness trend that's gained popularity during the past five years, typically enlist small-muscle movements and isometric holds to build strength. The workout is inspired by ballet, and much of the routine takes place at a traditional dance barre (a stationary handrail, such as that used in ballet). "I love that barre classes blend the grace of ballet work with challenging, yet doable isometric exercises," says

### Take an Indoor-Cycling Class

- Who should consider it: People who want a cardio workout in a group environment.
- Who should steer clear: Anyone who doesn't like endurance exercises or extensive cardio exercises.
- The workout: Mainly cardio, legs and lower body, with some conditioning for the arms and upper body.

"An absolute beginner can ride next to a world-class triathlete, and both can walk out of the [cycling] class and say, 'Hot dang! That was worth my time!' "

Given the independent nature of being on your own bike, indoor-cycling classes draw a wide range of participants. Roland Roth, a cycling instructor and an American College of Sports Medicine Certified Personal Trainer, suggests asking friends and acquaintances for recommendations on indoor-cycling instructors, as class formats and teachers tend to vary widely. Cyclists can seek out specialty studios, such as Flywheel Sports, which is in many cities across the country. It offers more cycling gadgets and a stadium-style atmosphere.

"I love that it's self-paced," Roth says of an indoor-cycling class. "An absolute beginner can ride next to a world-class triathlete, and both can walk out of the class and say, 'Hot dang! That was worth my time!' "

# Wellsprings of Wellness

Fitness is no luxury, but destination spas are By Marlene Goldman



itness is serious business: Strength, cardiovascular capacity, nutrition, flexibility, mental and spiritual equilibrium. So here I am hanging in a hammock in a classic cocoon position, swinging gently like an infant in a cradle.


Rock-a-bye, baby: Really, how serious is this? Very. I'm at Tucson's famous Canyon Ranch spa for five days of wellness activities, and my experience in "Aerial Yoga" is just one episode in a tally of eight fitness classes, one guided meditation, two health and healing lectures, one massage, a half-day hike, a trufflemaking demo, and a journey to the center of my soul. Throw in consultations to measure my body type and general health, and I am officially bingeing on wellness.

And, despite the stereotypes attached to the term "spa," my Canyon Ranch sojourn exemplifies a new reality: Today's destination spa resorts offer equal measures of fitness and relaxation—and both enhance wellness in different ways.

The aerial yoga epitomizes the modern spa experience. I'm half expecting a hanging trapeze or some other Cirque du Soleil–like contraption. Instead, there are silk Nicaraguan-style hammocks suspended from the ceiling with mats placed underneath. We half-dozen participants will combine mat work with the hammocks as an intro to what is also known as antigravity yoga. Following some warm-up floor postures, it's playtime. Our first aerial posture is a lunge with one leg through the silk swing, the other foot still on terra firma, mostly for us to practice trusting the hammocks to hold us up.

We continue with gentle backbends and forward planks with our legs straight and toes barely touching the floor, using the hammocks around our torsos to support our weight. I feel my core muscles engage, yet without the strain on my joints and muscles from holding earthbound postures for an extended time. Once we are comfortable, we play with full backbends and inversions, completely dangling from the hammock. These zero compression exercises create space between each vertebra and release stress and tension from the lower back. For our finale, we nest ourselves in the hammocks and gently swing, the optimal relaxation pose.

Exotic as it all sounds, such experiences are commonplace at today's destination spas. Roughly 100 such U.S. resorts cater to those who realize that good

health and longevity lie in their own hands.

The number of people coming to that conclusion translates to big business. California research group SRI International reports that the global spa and wellness industry was worth \$3.4 trillion in 2013, while the spa industry alone generated \$94 billion in 2013, according to a Global Spa and Wellness Economy Monitor report, up from \$60 billion in 2007.

By definition, a destination spa is designed to promote a healthy lifestyle for spa-goers with a



comprehensive program that includes spa services, fitness activities, wellness education, healthful cuisine and special-interest programming, according to the International Spa Association (ISPA).

"There are many benefits of a spa experience-ISPA has been conducting industry research for 15 years and consistently the top reason why men and women visit a spa worldwide is to learn how to manage their stress," says Lynne McNees, president of ISPA. "The first step is quieting the chaos that surrounds us and taking a moment to pause, and spas allow us to do just that."

Fittingly, then, I start my Canyon Ranch stay with a 20-minute meditation. Our guide directs us to focus on different parts of our body, awakening the senses slowly. We are reminded that if the mind wanders, to gently nudge it back to the breath.

Taking my quiet mind and tingling body to one of the gym rooms, I next choose Fierce! Tabata Workout, boot camp-style interval training that includes jumping jacks, sprints, sidesteps, high jumps, and other heart-pumping bursts of energy.

Like many of the visitors I meet, I am intent on trying as many different experiences at the ranch as I can squeeze in. The remainder of my day I alternate between body-intensive classes and balanced activities for mind and body. On the list is everything from Aqua Zumba, trying my best dance moves underwater, to the aerial yoga.

I wrap up with an insightful lecture from Canyon Ranch's integrative medical expert Param Dedhia, MD, about boosting brain power. "What is good for the heart is good for the brain," Dedhia says, noting that mental acuity improves by using all our senses and by expressing joy, whether it be through food, dance, art or exercise.

Canyon Ranch is not without its indulgences. Sore from a day of jumps, squats, arm strengthening and core work, I slip off to the spa for an 8o-minute "Muscle Melt for Road Warriors" massage, including warm pouches filled with herbs and jointloosening Thai massage techniques.

I also tend to my spiritual side with a Soul Journey experience at the new Spiritual Wellness Center building, led by director of spirituality Julie Haber, M. Div. This is a bigger challenge for me, as inner discovery demands more homework than a core conditioning class, but Haber assures us the potential benefits are beyond what I can comprehend.

"At Canyon Ranch, we see spirituality and creativity as the next chapter in the evolution of holistic wellness," says Mel Zuckerman, Canyon Ranch founder.

At dinner I join a communal table and meet a 70-something couple from Pittsburgh here for the 15th time. Many staff physicians and therapists have been at Canyon Ranch 20 years or more, drawing repeat visitors who have more of a relationship with the spa's practitioners than with health care personnel back home.

While destination spas concentrate on wellness, resort spas, which focus more on leisure and pampering, are continually adding wellness programming to entice a clientele that seeks both.

Sanctuary on Camelback Mountain near Phoenix is more like a spa resort with its luxury casitas, upscale restaurant







called Elements, and Asian-inspired Sanctuary Spa, replete with a small Zen meditation garden.

Heeding Dr. Dedhia's advice about joy, I indulge in a 90-minute Natural Facelift facial and dine sumptuously, without the calorie count menus found at Canyon Ranch.

While Sanctuary does specialize in pampering, it also offers Satori Wellness Retreats, multi-day packages with activities custom-designed by a personal

trainer. The trainer then contacts participants after their stay to help motivate them to continue their fitness regimes.

From my home base in San Francisco, it's a short journey to the North Bay's Cavallo Point Lodge & Spa, set on the former army post Fort Baker just below the Golden Gate Bridge in Marin. Cavallo Point also offers monthly lectures on topics such as stress management, yoga and other health retreats, and integrative medicine packages. Cavallo's Healing Arts Center features a meditation pool and treatments that range from physical to spiritual, such as a bamboo scrub or a 90-minute shamanic journey. I am told I may not see results for a while, but this will be life-changing.

Whether that comes to pass, or whether I maintain any specific inspiration from my spa visits, is not the key question. What counts is time carved out to stimulate my body and mind with new practices and ideas—the balance between nourish and nurture that I have a hard time finding back home.

A ceremony in the Islands is a happy marriage of marvelous locations and expert wedding services.



"Jamie went in with her wedding dress. Everyone got in a circle around us and congratulated us," Sascha says, the



underfoot, and lush foliage and flowers framing the boundless blue of the ocean and the glistening green of the mountains. With professional wedding planners providing most of the detail work beforehand, destination weddings here are a piece of cake. Marriage ceremonies in Hawai'i promise beauty, meaning and sensory richness.

The Fairmont Orchid, an oceanfront resort on Hawai'i Island's Kohala Coast, is a traditional wedding setting with spectacular options, including the Turtle Pointe Gazebo, on a black- and white-coral shore;

Coconut Grove, a sandy oceanfront ideal for tiki torches; and the Courtyard Lanai, overlooking an immense lawn and pool with the ocean beyond. It's where Jen Marvin, a Los Angeles advertising account executive, and Nick Wilson, a sales and operations manager, wed in September 2014.

"If we'd had our wedding locally, I would have seen each person for a minute or two each. A destination wedding allowed us to spend quality time with our guests—and we could have fun with them before the wedding," says Jen.

before the wedding, and engaged in a full roster of group activities. "I put together an itinerary with activities that gave people many chances to see us before the wedding day," says Jen.

"Both my business partner and I are native Hawaiian," observes Keane Akao, co-owner of Perfectly Planned Hawai'i, which manages all aspects of luxury gay weddings, and planned the Cordes-Teichman nuptials. "My family has been here more than seven generations; my mother's family is from Maui, and my dad's family is from the Big Island."

Akao and his business partner believe in bringing the Hawaiian culture to the forefront to create an authentic experience for their clients—and they do so carefully, in a culturally appropriate way. "The most important thing for my family is the tradition of leis," says Akao. "We are very selective in whom we use as our lei vendors, how we present our leis to our guests, and the type of lei, based on the situation.


"One of the things we do for our clients is provide each of the grooms or brides with a Ni'ihau necklace as a token of our appreciation," he adds. It's a generous token. The tiny shells are harvested by hand on Ni'ihau, the small, private island that's off-limits to all but native Hawaiians and a few others who live there in a self-sustaining society. The shells are gathered by master crafters, who weave intricate, unique necklaces that have become valuable collector's items.

For the March 2014 wedding between Andrew and Brian, Akao

chose maile leis. The shiny-leaved native Hawaiian plant has been used in leis since the earliest times in Hawai'i; they symbolize respect and honor, and are used for ceremonial occasions.

These are the leis that were draped around the necks of the two grooms as they said their vows aboard a sailboat off Diamond Head, as the orange ball of the sun melted into the ocean. Both have lived near the water all their lives; Brian grew up in Galveston and is deeply involved with his family business, a maritime company. After interviewing the couple, Akao suggested a nautical theme for the wedding.

"Several Hawaiian traditions added to our experience," says Brian. "We threw overboard an offering of a wrapped ti leaf filled with yellow roses—for the Yellow Rose of Texas—in honor of my family members who had passed away. It paid homage to my family," says Brian. Afterward, an Episcopal priest joined Akao in








offering a native Hawaiian chant asking blessings for the union.

When Andrew and Brian were pronounced married, the friendfilled sailboat erupted in applause. Then something completely unexpected happened. The two grooms lifted flutes of their favorite champagne to toast each other and, as if on cue, whales breached, leaping out of the water alongside the boat.

"It was really magical—it was over the top for what was already over the top for us," marvels Brian.

Couples planning their nuptials in Hawai'i have numerous options to select among in terms of locale. Many choose to marry at hotels or resorts; this makes it easy for couples, since on-staff wedding planners or catering managers are highly experienced in planning all the details. With a plethora of spectacular outdoor locales, there are many other options as well, though. The Hawaiian Islands are home to some of the world's most beautiful places, from sand or lava rock beaches to parks and gardens, from verdant uplands burgeoning with tropical foliage to carefully groomed golf courses overlooking the ocean. Each island has its own winsome

With its vast distances and dramatically different landscapes, from the lush, tropical east side to the sunny beaches of the west side, the Big Island offers many choices of locales for weddings. The primary resort areas include Kailua-Kona, the Kohala Coast and Keauhou.

Mauna Lani Bay Hotel occupies a headland along one of the area's most protected, beautiful golden sand beaches. The hotel offers wedding services for parties ranging in size from a dozen participants to more than 200—one of the major advantages of a large-scale resort.

Luxury and pampering are synonymous with many weddings, and one of the most elegant locales for weddings on Maui, the Wailea area's Fairmont Kea Lani, just opened a new, 9,000-square-foot spa, Willow Stream, that's popular with brides and their wedding parties. The property itself features all suites and villas, affording couples and their bridal parties lots of additional room and privacy.

Nearby, Andaz Maui at Wailea Resort is a 15-acre beachfront property with a sleek, contemporary look. The resort's wedding planner works with couples to create ceremonies that suit their personalities, whether artsy, elegant or playful. Among the settings available are the Laule'a Lawn and the Nohea Lawn, both overlooking Mokapu Beach and the sparkling Pacific.

On West Maui's Kā'anapali Coast, the Hyatt Regency Maui Resort and Spa features no fewer than a half-dozen outdoor wedding locales, four of them in gardens, ranging from the intimate Oriental Gardens, overlooking the Swan Court Lagoon and surrounded by waterfalls; to Statue Gardens, with ocean views; to

Napili Gardens, just a few yards away from the beach.

Many brides and grooms select private accommodations for their weddings; historic homes provide unparalleled atmosphere for celebrations. Filled with classic details, and with a broad veranda and sweeping oceanfront lawn, the 1922 Olowalu Plantation House, in Lahaina, is a picturesque setting for weddings. The house has a kitchen that a caterer can utilize, and there are numerous options for reception arrangements, from an open-air tent on the lawn to a stage for dancing under the stars.

Another grand historic home is an atmospheric location for weddings on Kaua'i. The 1935 Tudor-style Kilohana Plantation mansion, once the family home at the center of a 26,000-acre sugar farm, is a dramatic feature of a setting that has become very popular for marriage ceremonies. The home's Mahikō Lounge, with its Arts and Crafts styling, creates an atmosphere of classic elegance; Gaylord's Courtyard is ideal for receptions; and a vast lawn offers plenty of space for large weddings.

Kaua'i's Na 'Āina Kai Botanical Gardens, contained within a private estate, offers a wide array of picture-perfect wedding sites. Intimate nooks filled with a lush abundance of tropical plants and flowers are perfect for smaller weddings,







## **Promised Waters**

Southcentral Alaska easily fulfills an angler's dreams By Ken Marsh

e'd found the fish, finally, after a brief downstream search, and now, even as I released another Dolly Varden char—this one a 3-pound chunk with a steel-bright back and flashing, pink-spotted sides—my old friend Geoff Hobson laughed and shouted nearby. His fly rod bowed against a leaping rainbow trout nearly as long as his arm.

Set in a valley cut through a pitching sea of mountain peaks, our Kenai Peninsula stream was far removed from the Douglas firs and misty river bottoms of Geoff's southern British Columbia home. Gushing clear and snowmelt-cold from a notch in the center of the Kenai

Mountains range, this stream wound through the valley, whirling around deadfalls and forming dark pools to bear the headwaters of Alaska's legendary Kenai River. Standing knee-deep in the middle of it all, catching and releasing more fish than we cared to count, was an undeniable rush. Even better was seeing the day come together and watching my friend live out his longheld dream of an Alaska fly-fishing tour.

When anglers consider fishing in Alaska, many envision moments and settings like these. For some, making it all come true can be as simple as booking a week at one of the state's remote wilderness lodges. Big, beautiful fish are all but guaranteed, along with scenic landscapes and gourmet food. Such deluxe accommodations—complete with hardworking guides and daily fly-outs to trout- and salmonfishing waters unmatched anywhere—are a oncein-a-lifetime opportunity for many anglers.

For anglers on more-modest budgets, the heart of the Alaska fishing dream beats not in




frills, but in the currents of the state's countless streams. Living the dream requires little more than planning, imagination—and a place to start. For that, Southcentral Alaska, with its metropolitan Anchorage hub and highway networks providing access to waters north and south, is the perfect place. From the streams and lakes of the Susitna Valley to the north of the city to the famous fisheries of the Kenai Peninsula, the region glitters with easily reached angling gems.

Novelist John Steinbeck observed more than half a century ago that "we do not take a trip; a trip takes us." And so our travels would take Geoff and me fishing to the Kenai Peninsula, south of Anchorage, where char and trout at times struck nonstop, though not before we drove some 100 miles north from my home in Anchorage to sample a Susitna Valley creek I've known for many years and had visited only a month before.

The Susitna Valley in summertime is a verdant country where trout and salmon streams

spring eternal from the Talkeetna Mountains to drain into the swift, glacial Susitna River. On their westward dashes to the mighty Su, these creeks are bridged by the George Parks Highway, which runs north-south, connecting Southcentral Alaska to the Interior. Stream access from the highway is generally available and easy and the fishing good from June through October.

On my earlier trip, I'd discovered rainbow trout lurking among schools of pre-spawn king salmon. Waiting for eggs to drop, hungry rainbows follow inbound salmon much as wolves shadow migrating caribou herds. Finding trout that day was as

easy as locating the kings that glowed in the pools like brick-red shadows. The fishing was superb.

As we drove north, I told Geoff how I'd spent the afternoon working upstream, wading and casting, sometimes busting through boreal jungles of ferns, alders and spiny wild-rose tangles to reach the next open bar. I'd seen no other anglers, and within a half-mile of the road all signs of humanity had vanished. It was the perfect Alaska fishing venue, tempered by the possibility that the next alder thicket might hold the grizzly responsible for the set of dinner platesize tracks I'd crossed in the sand (as always, I'd

worn holstered on my chest a canister of pepper spray, just in case). Each pool held its share of larger fish tore off in the current, forcing me to

> with scarlet-striped sides freckled with leopardlike spots. Those trout and the day I'd had catching them matched anything an angler might expect from a far-flung Southwest Alaska river.

Geoff was impressed, and for a while we drove on in silence. Ahead, beyond the centerline and over a horizon of rolling, spruce-forested hills, Mount McKinley, known as Denali in Alaska, loomed crisp and

snow-white against a cloudless blue sky. The air crackled with great expectations.

Unfortunately, as we would soon discover, times had changed. And I should have known. Call it Trout Anglers' Axiom No. 1: Find the

for waters that appear promising, but that require extra time and effort to reach. One example close to Anchorage is Symphony Lake, known for big grayling. From the Chugach State Park trailhead, the trail weaves for 5 miles through spruce forests and alpine meadows to



Campgrounds and lodging are available at or near all of these fisheries.

food source and you'll find the fish. In Alaska, winter is never far away, so trout, char and grayling feed opportunistically and ravenously to store fat against the coming months of scarcity. For these fish, nothing adds weight and provides energy more efficiently than high-protein salmon eggs.

In the Susitna Valley, king salmon begin

settling over spawning beds in late June, drawing trout, grayling and, in streams such as Clear Creek and the Talkeetna River, Dolly Varden char. Later, chum salmon, pinks and coho arrive, and as summer wanes, good fishing is found behind them. On the Kenai Peninsula, sockeye salmon arriving in mid-June through mid-August feed big rainbows and Dollys well into fall.

This piscine preference for salmon eggs explains why Southcentral Alaska fly fishers often rattle when we walk. It's because most of us fish largely with beads, which we carry in our fly vests or fanny packs in small, compartmentalized boxes. Available in many sizes and colors, beads closely resemble salmon eggs, and the proper size and color on a given day can be wickedly effective, perfectly imitating the salmon eggs spilling out of redds (salmon "nests") and tumbling downstream.

Of course, all the beads in the world won't catch fish that aren't present. Which brings us back to Trout Anglers' Axiom No. 1: Find the food



source and you'll find the fish. The trick is in locating the salmon. Sometimes that's easy. Other times it requires a detective's mind and a heck of a lot of hiking.

Few sleep more soundly than worn-out fishermen, and when Geoff and I eased into our Susitna Valley stream early on our second morning, it was as if we'd stepped back into a dream. We'd spent a comfortable night at the Talkeetna Alaskan Lodge, and overnight temperatures had fallen into the upper 30s. Now the water steamed, and the forests were veiled in mist. From the top of a high bank, we spotted fish immediately: first the coho, as we'd hoped, and predictably among them, the rainbow trout.

This was in contrast to the afternoon before, when we'd fished miles upstream, as I had a month earlier, and found nothing. Framed by cottonwoods and neck-high ferns, the river, that old tannic beauty, had looked at first glance the same as it had in July. Translucent and amber as bourbon on ice, it had hustled over cobblestones the size of bowling balls, and we'd rigged our rods under a high, warm sun, unaware that a key dynamic had changed.

The kings had spawned and died out since my previous visit, but I knew that subsequent successions of salmon would have entered the creek-pinks, chums, and now, in late summer, coho. We'd watched for salmon as we hiked upstream, finding very few early on, and, eventually, none at all. For a while, as we'd cast to empty pools and eddies previously so vibrant with big, lively fish, I'd wondered what had happened. Several fishless hours later, I'd realized the clues were obvious. In fact, they paved the stream bottom: Those large cobbles formed suitable spawning habitat for big king salmon, but the smaller coho required finer gravel, prevalent several miles downstream.

Tired and disappointed, we'd admitted defeat and turned around; dinner and

ice-cold beer, locally brewed, waited in nearby Talkeetna. That evening, relaxed and enjoying a spectacular view of the sun setting over Denali, we'd sat in the lodge dining room and come up with a new plan, one that had taken us now to the lower reaches of our George Parks Highway stream.


In the cool silence of that misty morning, we waded into the shallows and started casting. For a moment, the previous day's frustration hung heavy around us. Then, over the melody of the current gurgling around my thighs, I heard a shout and looked up to see Geoff holding


his fly rod high. Out front, a fish leaped once, twice, before surging deep into a steaming pool.

Geoff beamed. Easygoing and already enjoying his time in Alaska, his experience with that first fish—a modest 16-inch trout that reflected the water, forests and morning sunrays now filtering through the fog—marked the fulfillment of a promise. We would catch more fish that day, and much bigger ones, too—trout and fresh coho—along with many, many others in the days to come, but few would be more memorable than that icebreaker rainbow, the first act of a dream come true.

Our last stream flowed before us like a living canvas. The Kenai Mountains reflected crisply in its pools, and spawning sockeye salmon—scores of them all scarlet, green-headed and hook-nosed—appeared to float like zeppelins above painterly images of alpine valleys. At







the edge of the scene, Geoff knelt and grinned, holding in his hands yet another pink-spotted char, dripping, alive and big enough to seem unreal.

"This is what I came for," he muttered, his voice soft and reverent.

He'd made the same announcement several times over the last few days, while catching rainbows in the Susitna Valley, and later, along Turnagain Arm, as we'd traveled Kenai Peninsula—bound down the Seward Highway with perhaps 100 brilliant-white beluga whales—some shadowed by dark-colored calves—porpoising in the murky waters just a stone's throw from the road.

We'd spent a day in a drift boat piloted by my friend Robert Begich of Soldotna, floating and fishing a prime 5-mile-long stretch of the upper Kenai River. That morning had started cool, gray and spitting rain, but those famous emeraldgreen waters hadn't disappointed us. We'd caught fish all day long—rainbow trout the size of sea-run steelhead and Dolly Varden weighing up to 6 pounds—from the moment Robert had slid the boat into the river at Sportsman's Landing until darkness found us just upstream of Jim's Landing, still playing big char and laughing out loud.

Now, on our final day on the little stream where the char, trout and salmon hung among the reflections of mountains, Geoff lowered his fish into the water and gently let it go. Awash in golden sunshine, he paused and watched as the char vanished into the pool. Then he stood up, smiling, framed by those magnificent mountains, the stream sparkling at his feet, delighted to be living the dream.

## **Treasured Sightings**

Alaska's bears fascinate visitors to the Great Land By Eric Lucas

Bears are made of the same dust as we."—John Muir

Mist shifts subtly along the ridges, woods and shores of Windham Bay, Alaska.

As we kayak slowly across the water, the low clouds swirl around us, painting platinum shadows. The late summer morning in Southeast Alaska is calm and quiet, with the whole scene set in blunt green and gray—except for a large, conspicuous black rock along the bay's north shore. On closer scrutiny, the rock turns out to be a 6-foot, 500-pound bear that seems to be inspecting seaweed exposed at low tide. I point the "rock" out to my companion, Alaskan Dream Cruises guide Emily Herman. She takes a look and nods. It's

a quintessential Alaska moment, treasured by visitors and residents. It's the type of experience that never grows old or mundane.

"Doesn't seem like he's noticed us." I


"Doesn't seem like he's noticed us," I observe. Emily gives me the same look Game of Thrones character Ygritte often renders with her now-famous quote for Southlanders like me: You know nothing, Jon Snow.

Of course the bear has noticed us. Alaska bears are aware of almost everything, especially people nearby, and humans in Alaska remain alert for bears much of the time.


The two species, 735,000 people and about 133,000 bears, share the Great Land in a unique natural dance in which both sides are aware of each other, a cognizance that includes the fact that we are both predators near the top of the ecological chart.

In the broad spectrum of life on this planet, we humans and the *Ursus* genus are more alike than might be apparent at first glance.

We are both omnivores, willing to eat a great variety of foods—and we both cultivate opinions



A grizzly bear forages in Denali National Park & Preserve, as Mount McKinley rises in the distance.




about our meals. (More on that in a minute.) We are travelers, wandering far across the earth and colonizing new ground.


We give birth to live, helpless babies (the biological term is *altricial*), raise our young for a quarter to a half of our lifespans, have little patience for interference with our ways and are regarded with distinct caution by most other animals. We stand tall, tussle among ourselves and seek shelter from winter's cold.

Bears are so often personified that The Walt Disney Company a decade ago produced two films that centered on a human-bear transformation fable, titled *Brother Bear*. American society celebrates Yogi Bear, Smokey Bear and teddy bears. This utterly wild animal has gained such anthropological importance that Alaska author Kim Heacox devoted a full page to the mythical and linguistic currency of bears in his marvelous memoir of life at Glacier Bay, *The Only Kayak*.

"We speak of that which is bearable and unbearable," Heacox writes. "In acts of restraint and abstinence we speak of forbearance. ... We bear witness, bear our young, and bear glad tidings. We see in bears a little too much of ourselves and take that familiarity as a threat on one hand, a consolation on the other. In moments of grace we regard bears as ... creatures from a spiritual dimension far richer and more ancient than our own."

Talk to Heacox about bears and his eyes brighten with delight. Our fascination with bears,



Heacox says, comes from "the way a bear moves through his world. A better explanation than that remains, at least to me, an ineluctable mystery."

I myself share a personal characteristic with Alaska's bears: a preference for one salmon over another. Mine is sockeye over king. Biologist Troy Hamon tells me he has observed bears choosing silver salmon over sockeye in spawning streams.

Further, bears are widely known to prefer certain parts of a salmon—the belly, say—just as one diner may choose filet mignon and another rib-eye. Come to think of it, I favor the belly of

"Some might argue that one salmon is just in better condition than another—the sockeyes may have been in the river three weeks, while the silvers just arrived—but it does seem to go beyond that," observes Hamon, a fisheries biologist by training who has spent decades

observing bears and salmon. He is also the chief of resource management at several national parks, including Katmai, which is home to a large bear population.

"Interesting to think of bears having opinions about the dinner menu, but some seem to have exactly that," Hamon says with a chuckle.




#### THE BEAR FACTS

- >> Alaska has large populations of all three North American types of bears:
- >>> Black bear (Ursus americanus): The continent's most common bear by far, there are an estimated 1 million black bears, ranging from Mexico to the Arctic. Alaska has a population of about 100,000. Mature bears can weigh up to 600 pounds.
- >>> Brown bear (Ursus arctos): The interior grizzly males can weigh up to 800 pounds and the females about 450 pounds. The larger coastal brown males reach 900 pounds and females can reach 600 pounds. Isolated groups can be much larger. There are about 200,000 browns in the world. Alaska has about 30,000.
- >> Polar bear (Ursus maritimus): Found only in the Arctic, males can weigh up to 1,200 pounds and the females up to 650 pounds. Their total population is estimated at 25,000, with Alaska being home to about 3,000. —E.L.

known as Pack Creek, on Admiralty Island, southwest of Juneau. Human visitors, who are rigorously trained by wildlife managers, follow guides along a precise path to a safe lookout point (a rise on a gravel bar near the creek). Here, immense coastal brown bears can be seen all around the gravel bar catching and devouring salmon. Visitors may be within 20 feet of a 600-pound mother bear with cubs; the latter glance idly at their human observers, while we watchers savor the excitement of the moment.

At Pack Creek, seven decades of interspecies acculturation has created a unique place where the planet's dominant primate and one of the world's largest land predators commingle peaceably. Longtime guides say mother bears somehow pass along to their cubs "information" about the long-standing treaty between bears and people here.

You might also spy a bear on a nearby slope while you're riding a bus along the Denali Park Road in Alaska's interior, causing the bus passengers to crowd around the windows, cameras and cellphones clicking. Or, you might be among the hundreds of thousands of visitors each year who tour the boardwalk on the Mendenhall Glacier, near Juneau, and watch about a dozen bears feast on the summer run of sockeye salmon and the fall run of silver salmon.

The only other large Alaska animal

that is as popular as the bear is probably the moose. However, these impressive ungulates still don't quite hold the public's imagination in the same way.


Like many people involved with bears, Alaska Department of Fish and Game Information Officer Riley Woodford has developed his own fascination with our ursine neighbors.

"Alaska has some of the best bear habitat in the world. It's one of the best places to be curious about bears, so that's what I am," says Woodford. "I just like to go up to Mendenhall Glacier and watch bears being bears."

The black bear my guide, Herman, and I are watching at Windham Bay continues to search for a meal. Paddles at rest, we drift about 50 yards offshore. Our "sighting" encompasses barely five minutes, then the bear wanders down the shoreline. We don't follow because, well, bears can swim really fast. It is just an ordinary, everyday black bear sighting. Except, no sighting of a bear is an experience to which you'd apply any humdrum adjective. Consider that while I came north almost 1,000 miles to this moment, in a way, so did the black bear.

The species was not found in the interior of Alaska until about 8,000 years ago, when a path through the glaciers opened from the Idaho Panhandle at the end of the last ice age. Black bears worked their way north, and today there are an estimated 100,000 black bears in Alaska, making them the most populous bear species in the state. Meanwhile, brown bears came to Alaska from Asia about 50,000 years ago and are closely related to brown bears in Siberia and other parts of Asia.

The origins of the bears remains a debated issue in scientific circles. There is evidence that black and brown bears share a common ancestor and split into distinct species first. Later, polar bears diverged from brown bears. However, estimates on when browns and polars separated vary from less than 500,000 to



more than 4 million years ago. Now, diminishing Arctic ice may bring browns and polars closer together. Biologists have already recorded a few cases of brown-polar hybrids in Arctic Canada.

By contrast, on Kodiak Island, a group of brown bears have been isolated from other brown bears for more than 12,000 years and have evolved into what may be the world's largest members of the species. The 3,000 bears in Kodiak National Wildlife Refuge can reach 10 feet tall and weigh 1,500

pounds. The largest known Kodiak weighed 2,500 pounds. Such a find only adds to the legends that surround these creatures.

"Every native culture in North America has myths and legends about the bear, many of them tributes to wisdom and strength," writes Heacox. " 'The bear is good to talk with,' say the Yup'ik Eskimos. 'If the bear wanted to speak with you, all it needed to do was remove its mask and there beneath was a human.' "

That day on Alaska's Windham Bay was my most personal encounter with a bear. I don't recall the animal removing its mask or speaking with us, Yup'ik style.

Yet, this brief encounter has become as distinct in my memory as almost any other moment in my life.



## Spokane Essentials

#### TOP SITES IN THE LILAC CITY By Cheryl-Anne Millsap

When my husband changed jobs and we moved our family to Spokane in 1999, the shift was about more than a career change. Like many others who make their way to the Inland Northwest, we came here to experience a particular way of life—drawn by the location and landscape, by the tall ponderosa pines that grow on the hills and plains, by the rolling wheat fields and undulating terrain of the nearby Palouse, by the city's proximity to beautiful public lands. After more than a decade of living in the area, we still appreciate the city's attractions and the allure of the lands around it. Whether you're visiting the area for the first time or reconnecting with a place you love, there are many sights to see. The following are a few that speak to the essence of Spokane.



#### Spokane River Centennial Trail


This 37.5-mile paved track begins west of Spokane, in the town of Nine Mile Falls. It follows along the river through Spokane's downtown and, eventually, to the Washington/Idaho state line, where it meets the North Idaho Centennial Trail. The trail attracts everyone

from lunch-hour runners and walkers to daylong bicyclists, as well as a few cross-country skiers in winter. To me, a perfect day includes packing lunch, pedaling the Centennial trails to Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, lingering over a picnic at Lake Coeur d'Alene, and biking back to Spokane in the afternoon.



## Riverfront Park

The park at the center of it all provides a good introduction to the modern history of the Lilac City. Riverfront Park straddles the Spokane River and forms a boundary between north and south neighborhoods. The park was the result of a monumental reclamation effort to create the city's site for Expo '74, and it has become a vital 100-acre urban green space. Pedestrian paths crisscross the river over footbridges. The area that surrounds the iconic Clock Tower—the only building remaining from a 1900s train station—has become a popular picnic spot and concert venue. Families flock to the historic Looff Carrousel in summer and enjoy the Ice Palace skating rink in winter. Spokane was born around the river, the place where Native tribes gathered and fished. Today Riverfront Park sits at the heart of the thriving urban area that was, in 2014, named one of USA Today's "10 Best Riverfront Cities."



INB Performing Arts Center Along with Riverfront Park, another legacy of Expo '74 is the former Spokane Opera House, now known as the INB Performing Arts Center. The 2,700-seat hall overlooks the Spokane River and is the site of concerts and live performances by nationally and internationally

known performers. The INB is also the site of Spokane's Best of Broadway series, which brings Broadway shows and other notable productions to the Inland Northwest each year.

\*\*The INB ward will be at the INB March 20–21.



MANITO PARK This is where I take friends and family when they visit. The 90-acre park, with its gardens, trails, ponds and playgrounds, was created in 1904. It quickly became a jewel of the city. Surrounded by wide

boulevards and historic homes, the park draws people of all ages. In summer, the rose garden perfumes the air and is the setting for weddings and family photos. Friends gather at Park Bench Cafe and enjoy live music.



### Cork District

With Spokane's proximity to the premier vineyards of Eastern Washington, it's no surprise that the city has a robust wine industry. The Cork District includes 15 award-winning wineries and tasting rooms, most within walking distance of one another. Annual events include ValenWine (February), Spring Release (May) and Holiday Wine Weekend (November). One of my favorite places to unwind during summer is Barrister Winery's courtyard. Alaska Airlines passengers pay no tasting fees at Cork District venues (and several others in town) when they present, within 48 hours of arrival, their boarding pass with Spokane as the final destination.

River Park Square When the downtown mall, anchored by Nordstrom, was built in 1999, it changed the face of Main Avenue in Spokane. River Park Square is directly across from Riverfront Park and Spokane's landmark Art Deco city hall. Surrounded by urban lofts, restaurants and boutiques, the mall includes upscale shopping and dining, a 20-screen theater, an art gallery, and Mobius Children's Museum, a branch of Mobius Science Center for kids 8 years old and younger.

### Finch Arboretum

The ubiquitous ponderosa pine may be the official tree of the city (as of April 2014), but there are many additional trees to be found in the area, especially at this park. Situated along Highway 90, between the airport and downtown, the Finch Arboretum encompasses 65 acres planted with more than 2,000 labeled trees and plants, and serves as an outdoor classroom that offers seasonal activities. It is an excellent place to wander and reflect.



**Kendall Yards** This contemporary multiuse development that opened in 2010 has brought new life to a former industrial site north of the Spokane River. With the number of single-family homes, apartments, condominiums, small businesses and restaurants growing each year, pedestrianfriendly Kendall Yards offers easy access to the Spokane River Centennial Trail and sweeping views of the city's skyline. My ideal Sunday morning is to order a cup of coffee from the walk-up window at chef Adam Hegsted's Yards Bruncheon to sip while I stroll from Kendall Yards to the spectacular river overlook at the Monroe Street Bridge. **S**



## **Creative Attractions**

ARTS AND CULTURE FLOURISH IN SPOKANE By Linda Hagen Miller

Recently I found myself twirling and laughing through my first-ever square dance. A half-hour before that, I was standing in a circle, holding hands with a bunch of strangers, all of us trying to mimic the dance steps of an energetic young Tibetan man wearing a pumpkin-colored tunic. And before that, I was tapping my toes to Celtic fiddle music. And yet, with more than 100 music and dance performances at the Spokane Folk Festival (spokanefolkfestival.org), I managed to take in only a fraction of the attractions.

The annual fall folk festival is representative of the overall arts-and-culture scene in the Spokane area—it offers a tremendous quantity and variety of options. With more than 1,300 arts businesses employing almost 6,000 people, Spokane County is filled with opportunities. From multicultural events to book fests, museum exhibits, gallery shows and outdoor art walks, the area has many entertaining experiences for residents and for visitors.

On the literary front, Spokane and the Inland Northwest have recently produced and nurtured writers on their way to national prominence. The 2014 PEN/Robert W. Bingham Prize winner Shawn Vestal; *The New York Times* best-selling writer Jess Walter; and award-winning poet, writer and filmmaker Sherman Alexie all have close ties to Spokane and will be featured presenters at this year's

regional literary festival **Get Lit!** (April 20–26; getlitfestival.com).

Since 1998, this literary lollapalooza has brought thousands of readers, writers and poets together to celebrate the printed word. Forty-plus local and national authors will present at Get Lit!, including Vestal, Walter and Alexie, as well as notables such as Walter Kirn, author of *Up in the Air*, the novel that inspired the movie with George Clooney. Walter and Alexie will record an episode of their podcast, *A Tiny Sense of Accomplishment*, at the festival.

From April 18 through July 19, the Northwest Museum of Arts & Culture, in Spokane, will exhibit contemporary art from the Emirates, including Zeinab Al Hashemi's Pearl Tale (2010; above).

Chronicling the region's past and present, Spokane-area museums range from the venerable to the unusual. In Browne's Addition, a five-minute drive west of downtown, you'll find the revered Northwest Museum of Arts & Culture, aka "The MAC" (northwestmuseum.org), which documents regional history and people, and features rotating and traveling art exhibits. The touring exhibition "Past Forward: Contemporary Art from the Emirates," will be at The MAC April 18—July 19. The MAC will celebrate its 100th birthday in January 2016.

Next door, the historic **Campbell House** (northwestmuseum.org/exhibits/
campbell-house) lets visitors tour a preserved Victorian mansion, complete with
creaky floors, dark-paneled rooms and
docents costumed in 19th century styles.

The Spokane Valley Heritage
Museum (valleyheritagecenter.org),
located about 12 miles east of downtown,
is a 4,000-square-foot gem that brings to
life the valley's agricultural history, Native
American heritage and biographies of the
region's best-known residents. For
instance, visitors can learn about brothers

Luke and Chuck Williams, Spokane Valley natives who invented the lighted timeand-temperature signs now seen on office buildings and bank marquees. Visitors can also stand in a replica of a 1930s kitchen and listen to radio broadcasts from the era.

Kids rule at the Mobius museums (mobiusspokane. org). Located in the lower level of River Park Square (the city's premier downtown high-rise shopping hub), Mobius Children's Museum, for children up to age 8, encourages curiosity with dress-up clothes, miniature stores, the chance to pet reptiles and more. At Mobius Science Center, which is across the street (but expected to

move this year to another downtown location), older kids and family members delve into exhibits so fun that the youngsters might not even realize they're learning about subjects such as gravity, dinosaurs and biology.

Spokane's **First Friday** events (downtownspokane.org/first-friday.php), on the other hand, are for grown-ups. Art fans



#### Questions for Jess Walter

Writer Jess Walter is a little like Spokane, the town he calls home: approachable and unpretentious. Yet he has several prestigious awards to his credit: Beautiful Ruins (2012) was a No. 1 New York Times best-seller and Esquire's Book of the Year; The Zero (2006) was a finalist for the National Book Award and the PEN Center Literary Award. Despite the acclaim, Walter has stayed true to his roots in Spokane.

#### Q: Why do you live in Spokane?

A: Originally, I stayed in Spokane for family, but more and more I feel, as a writer, like this is the terrain I'm comfortable coming back to. And Spokane has become such a great, livable city. ... I'm inspired and defined by the place where I grew up, by the natural beauty and the lack of pretense. Spokane is thriving in a way that my friends and I used to wish for. Now my wife and I joke that there are too many great bands, too many literary events, too many restaurants opening. And why can't I find a parking place right in front of the place I want to go? It's a really great place to be 25 now-or 50, for that matter.

#### Q: What's your home office like?

A: My desk is an antique with bookshelves built into the side. I've turned the drawer over to hold a keyboard. We live in a 100-year-old house, and I work in an apartment above the carriage house. My view is pretty great—Mount Spokane and the Spokane River canyon beyond my house, which is like a wildlife freeway deer and coyotes and turkeys and Continued from page S11 Weirdly, the deer have become kind of aggressive. They took over my garden, and now they just stare at me when I walk past them on the way to my office, and one night, during rutting season, a buck protecting his doe sort of advanced on me. It was like being in an M. Night Shyamalan movie.

#### Q: What are you working on now?

A: Sherman Alexie and I do a podcast together (A Tiny Sense of Accomplishment), and we are doing live events this year in New Mexico, in Minneapolis and at Get Lit! in Spokane. I'm working on the next novel and, I suppose, the novel after that. I have a short story coming out in McSweeney's and am working on a couple of others. I don't really plan very well my "next" thing. I just write and hope for the best. —L.H.M.


peruse downtown galleries, restaurants and coffeehouses to view local art and listen to troubadours. With 40 to 50 rotating venues scattered throughout town, you have many options to choose from during this year-round event.

The coolness factor of the arts in Spokane is underlined by the city's **performing-arts scene**. Lending support to up-and-coming local artists, **Terrain** (terrainspokane.com) has grown in the last seven years from a loosely structured, itinerant, once-a-year event to an organization with plans this year (in fall) to open its own permanent brick-and-mortar venue for performing arts and visual arts, with an attached arts market.



The Martin Woldson Theater at The Fox provides an elegant venue for the Spokane Symphony.

You can enjoy Broadway blockbusters at the INB Performing Arts Center (inbpac. com); great concerts, comedy and more at Northern Quest Resort & Casino (northernquest.com); improvised comedy at The Blue Door Theatre (bluedoortheatre.com); professional plays at The Modern Theater (themoderntheater.org); community theater

at the **Spokane Civic Theatre** (spokane-civictheatre.com); the Spokane Symphony at the **Martin Woldson Theater** at **The Fox** (martinwoldsontheater.com); cutting-edge music at **Knitting Factory Concert House-Spokane** (sp.knitting-factory.com); and rock, country and more at **Spokane Arena** (spokanearena.com).

I'm always excited to visit the **public art** downtown in Riverfront Park. Over the years, I have found most of the 20 sculptures spread across the park—part of the **Spokane Sculpture Walk** (a brochure is available at visitspokane.com/art). My favorites are *The Joy of Running Together* and *Garbage-Eating Goat*. The former is made up of 40 life-size steel silhouettes in jogging poses at the west edge of the park; the metal goat delights children near the antique 1909 Looff Carrousel. (Place a scrap of paper beneath the craggy critter's mouth and push a button nearby to have the goat vacuum up the trash!)

To read Spokane/Coeur d'Alene Indian author Sherman Alexie's poem The Place Where Ghosts of Salmon Jump (1995), you can walk the granite spiral where it's carved in concrete overlooking Spokane Falls. The poem tells the legend of the falls' origin.


The Rotary Riverfront Fountain, another popular attraction, sprays gallons of water on giggling kids all summer.

Other nearby statues—of pioneers, a Vietnam veteran, and Spokane astronaut Michael P. Anderson—prompt additional contemplation about the city's history and its vivid arts-and-culture scene. **S**






# Plated and Poured

#### GREAT SPOKANE DINING EXPERIENCES By Adriana Janovich

I'd visited Spokane's Santé Restaurant several times for lunch and cocktails since moving to town about a year ago. But my boyfriend and I had been saving dinner at the sophisticated yet unfussy bistro for a special occasion: my birthday. When the food arrived, we lingered over each morsel—from the amuse-bouche at the start of the meal to the chocolate crémeux with basil ice cream at the end. Three courses and nearly as many hours later, we left happily satisfied, and I vowed not to wait another year before returning for dinner.



The intimate downtown restaurant with French influences is at the forefront of Spokane's burgeoning culinary scene. Dining experiences in the Lilac City are plentiful and wide-ranging. The overall sophistication edges ever upward, and the options are varied—whether you seek a casual meal or a fine-dining experience.

"Visitors and locals want and expect high-level restaurants," says Cheryl Kilday, president and CEO of Visit Spokane, the not-for-profit corporation responsible for the city's destination marketing. "The growth in our culinary scene is not only good for the palate but great for business throughout the region."

Many of the newer establishments emphasize the use of locally grown and raised ingredients—from farm-fresh fruits and vegetables to herbs, honey and meats.

In the case of Santé, more formally known as Santé Restaurant and Charcuterie (santespokane.com; 509-315-4613), the emphasis is on fresh, local, sustainable ingredients and preparations.

"We don't have microwaves. There are no can openers in the house. Nothing comes out of a can, period," says chef Jeremy Hansen, who owns Santé with his wife, Kate. "Everything we put on a plate is made in-house—from our charcuterie and bacon to our soups, crackers, scones, biscuits, breads [and] ice cream."

Tucked inside a historical building and decorated in elegant beige and black, Santé is reminiscent of cafes in Paris. Large windows overlook sidewalk seating and let in an abundance of natural light.

There are fish, poultry and other mains on the menu, but specifics aren't listed, in order to allow for the best of whatever is in



listed on the menu. Almost all of the ingredients are produced locally, says Hansen, who is slated to cook for a week

time in two years.

#### True Brew Masters

It's no accident that Born & Raised IPA bears images of three Spokane landmarks on its label. The Monroe Street Bridge, Riverfront Park Clock Tower and SkyRide gondolas are symbols of the city in which John Bryant and Mark Irvin are proud

The pair partnered in 2012 to put the Lilac City on the map as a destination for craft-beer enthusiasts. They rebranded and expanded Northern Lights Brewing Co., which Spokane native Irvin had started in 1993.

Their No-Li Brewhouse (nolibrewhouse.com, 509-242-2739), the oldest operating brewery in Spokane, remains on the forefront of the thriving local craft-beer movement. Located on the banks of the Spokane River, No-Li is home to a new barrel-aging program, a popular small-batch beer fest, a gastropub and the federally registered Spokane Style of beer.

"It's really a unique thing," says Bryant of the registered style. "All the beer is made here by people who live in Spokane. And all the ingredients come from within a few hours of here."

For Bryant and Irvin, the authenticity of their craft, and their "fib-free ales," is no lie. -A.J.

No-Li Brewhouse is part of the Spokane area's Inland Northwest Ale Trail (inlandnwaletrail.com), which features 27 breweries-up from 16 last year. No-Li brews, along with more than 100 other beers, are also featured at Spokane's Inland Northwest Craft Beer Festival (late September; washingtonbeer.com/inlandnwcraftbeerfestival).



"The great news for everyone—visitors, locals and food lovers—is that Santé's standard for excellence is shared by so many other establishments," says Kilday.

Following are a few more of the exciting food-and-drink choices in Spokane and its surroundings:

At Central Food (eatcentralfood.com; 509-315-8036), chef-owner David Blaine uses herbs and vegetables from the patio garden. He can't source everything from there, so he buys potatoes from Olsen Farms in Colville, north of Spokane, and greens from CasaCano Farms on the city outskirts. Perched on a cliff overlooking the Spokane River, Blaine's restaurant offers spectacular views, along with mains such as Idaho rainbow trout with sage pesto and roasted root vegetables.

In the heart of the historic Browne's Addition neighborhood, Italia Trattoria

- **Veraci** (veracipizza.com/Spokane; 509-389-0029): fire-roasted pizza, views.

(italiatrattoriaspokane.com; 509-459-6000) offers contemporary takes on classic Italian cuisine. Owners Bethe Bowman and Anna Vogel worked for chef Tom Douglas-the renowned Seattle restaurateur who also partners with Alaska Airlines-before starting their own Eastern Washington establishment.

Chef Tony Brown likes to graze. He also gets bored with repetition. So at Ruins (facebook.com/ruins.spokane; 509-443-5606), which opened in August 2014 in an Art Deco diner, Brown offers small plates and changes the menu often.

The downtown, booth-lined Durkin's Liquor Bar (durkinsliquorbar.com; 509-863-9501) serves craft cocktails and small plates, such as roasted bone marrow and Brussels sprouts with bourbon, brown sugar and sriracha sauce. There are 20 beers on tap upstairs, plus four more at a separate bar downstairs.

Exposed brick walls and wrought iron give Casper Fry (casperfry.com; 509-535-0536) an old-time, industrial feel. The restaurant serves Southern-style comfort food year-round, and sources ingredients seasonally from the Thursday Market in the South Perry District (thursdaymarket.org; 509-720-8449), which runs May through October in the adjacent lot.

Tucked inside a renovated 1910 bungalow, Clover (cloverspokane.com; 509-487-2937) serves European-influenced Northwest fare. It was recognized in The People's Best New Bars 2013 contest by Food & Wine magazine.

On Spokane's South Hill, Luna (lunaspokane.com; 509-448-2383) offers charming courtyards for alfresco dining, an on-site vegetable garden, an extensive wine list, and light, French-inspired decor.


In the suburb of Airway Heights, at Masselow's at Northern Quest Resort & Casino (northernquest.com/resort/ dining/masselows; 509-481-6020), operated by the Kalispel Tribe, the modern

stuffed quail and bison rib-eye steak. Sometimes, in spring, Chef Bob Rogers prepares house-made lilac-flavored ice cream.

With so many tempting dishes and fabulous restaurants available and arriving on the area's culinary map, I will have many to choose from on my next birthday. S

hen Francis Luerssen III took over as facility technician at the Flour Mill, the 120-year-old brick building was something of a time capsule. Inside was a mishmash of machinery, old and new, cobbled together since renovations began to make it a retail space for multiple tenants about the time of the world's fair in 1974. Air conditioning units had been jammed in windows, and some were run all winter long. Machine timers were simply broken. Components of the HVAC system hadn't been touched in 30 years.

Luerssen found himself in the middle of it all, and he was prepared to take the aging facility into the 21st century—with some collaborative help from Avista. He had his work cut out for him. But as an ex-Navy man, he was used to getting things in shipshape condition.

Over time, he swapped out traditional lighting for LED and compact fluorescent bulbs, upgrading to T8 lamps and electronic ballasts in the

common areas. He mounted light sensors and timers outside and in the restrooms. Plus he installed insulation, included sealing walls penetrated by pipes with expanding foam and fastening weather stripping to all the entrances.

Luerssen's primary focus, however, was the aging HVAC system. He had to loosen valves and repair damper actuators that were stuck open or closed. He rebuilt steam traps,

some of which appeared to be of original vintage. And he fixed all the machinery timers, many of which had motor controllers set to hand operation vs. auto or had start-stop pins missing from their timer wheels.



When he correctly aligned all the belt-driven machinery, it paid off with a drop in load.

But the biggest energy improvement with the HVAC system came from incorporating an Alerton(R) direct digital control system (DDC). Installed by ATS Inland Northwest of Spokane, the DDC was a \$20,000 investment.

"[The DDC] really helped everything," Luerssen says. "It gives you a lot of control. It also lets me see a problem from a remote computer."

In place of handset thermostats, the building is now ruled by an alwaysthinking, always-monitoring digital brain. The DDC system governs when boilers, pumps and chillers turn on and off. Plus, it regulates hot water temperature between floors. This keeps the easily melted goods of the Chocolate Apothecary at a cool 70 degrees while shoppers in the Kitchen Engine enjoy a comfortable 73 degrees.

The amount of control the DDC allowed was extraordinary but Luerssen asked for more. He upgraded to control the hot water circulating pumps so they would turn off based on temperature, not boiler pressure. Now the DDC raises the boiler water temperature as it gets colder outside instead of running at full temperature all the time.

Another encouraging aspect of the DDC upgrade is the lengthened lifespans of the building's machinery. Fans running 24 hours a day before are now on just half the time. And the boiler, which used to run nine hours a day in winter, runs just four and a half thanks to the DDC controlling the boiler's two separate fan coils.

"It's going to make equipment last longer so you're not going to be spending as many man-hours going in and replacing it," he says.

Electrical upgrades have also made a difference, and much of it came down to simply changing light bulbs. 175-watt metal halides were changed out to 26-watt LEDs. LED lights were also installed in the parking lot.

"It's a better light quality, it's instantaneous and I'm never going

to have to mess with it again. Those have like 35,000 light-hours," says Luerssen. "The amount of energy they saved us is fantastic."

It's costly to upgrade a building. But for many of his upgrades, Luerssen was able to take advantage of rebates from Avista. And the added efficiency should make everything worthwhile.

Luerssen estimates the boiler upgrades alone will result in

significant savings. The Flour Mill's natural gas costs were reduced by 50 percent. Electrical costs were also cut by ten percent, while adding more load to the system. In the end, these savings can be passed on to tenants by the building's property manager, Kiemle and Hagood.

With help from Avista, Luerssen has transformed a leaky old building





cobbled together over the years into a 21st-century facility — the envy of any building owner looking to save some money on energy bills. He says any company can do the same.

Avista gives rebates and incentives for energy-efficiency upgrades to many types of businesses and organizations, from retail stores and restaurants to manufacturing plants and municipalities. The energy company's goal is to better manage the region's growing energy needs by promoting ways for its large customers to use less. Those that have participated so far have not only saved energy, but have seen increased productivity and safety and lowered maintenance costs. Avista thinks it's energy well spent.

## Leadership Perspectives

SPOKANE INDUSTRY LEADERS AND COMMUNITY ICONS SHARE THEIR THOUGHTS By Michael Guilfoil

Spokane is a city that looks back to its past with respect while looking forward to its future with optimism. Many of the citizens who applauded the restoration of the 1914 Davenport Hotel in the 2000s will soon celebrate the opening of the 17-story Davenport Grand Hotel, which will connect to a newly expanded convention center. Locals also take pride in the legacy of Expo '74 and approved funding to upgrade Riverfront Park, the World's Fair site. Preserving the past while preparing for the future requires entrepreneurs and visionaries working in concert. These pages profile some of the trailblazers who are reinventing Spokane even as they honor the city's traditions.

### Walt Worthy

Walt Worthy, who rescued and rejuvenated Spokane's century-old Davenport Hotel, grew up on a Georgia farm "in the back end of beyond," as he likes to say. There were 17 students in his high school graduating class.

After attending Auburn University, Worthy enlisted in the U.S. Air Force. He arrived in Spokane in 1967.

While he was in the military, he also worked at fixing and reselling cars while his wife, Karen, taught first grade. He later launched a construction company specializing in commercial-property development; his playful "Walt Worthy Has Square Feet" banners became ubiquitous.

In 2000, the Worthys purchased the vacant Davenport Hotel—a longtime destination hotel known for its service and refinement—and restored its elegance.

Their latest project—the 716-room
Davenport Grand Hotel near the Spokane
Convention Center—is scheduled to open
this summer.

#### Alaska Airlines Magazine: How has Spokane changed since you arrived almost five decades ago?

Worthy: The turning point was Expo '74. The World's Fair revitalized a former rail yard along the Spokane River, along with much of the central business district.

#### AAM: Why did you take on the formidable challenge of restoring and operating a landmark hotel?

Worthy: I was ready for something different, and saw renovating the Davenport as a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

#### AAM: What has surprised you most about this phase of your career?

Worthy: The phenomenal way the community got behind the project and has supported the hotel ever since.

#### AAM: What can guests anticipate at the new Davenport Grand across town?

Worthy: Much more space-it's a huge building-and a very different decor than our other properties.

#### AAM: What do you consider the community's strengths?

Worthy: The city's greatest and most underutilized asset is the Spokane River. Development along the riverfront could contribute immensely to downtown Spokane's economy.

#### AAM: How do you relax?

Worthy: Strange as it may seem, I enjoy figuring out new projects. Another favorite pastime is visiting restaurants in search of new recipes to offer our guests.

#### Lisa Brown

Lisa Brown is chancellor of Washington State University's 1,500-student Spokane campus, which emphasizes health-sciences education and research. Among other recent developments, WSU is seeking to create the state's second fully accredited, publicly funded medical school, in Spokane.

Prior to joining WSU in 2013, Brown taught economics at Eastern Washington University and organizational leadership at Gonzaga University.

She served two decades in the state legislature. In 2005, she became the first woman Democrat in state history to hold the position of Senate majority leader.

#### AAM: What brought you to Spokane?

Brown: I came here in the '80s to visit friends while finishing my doctorate in economics at the University of Colorado, and I never lived anywhere else. I recognized in Spokane some of the great traits of Boulder, particularly four-season outdoor recreation and an appreciation of the role higher education plays in economic development.

#### AAM: What is WSU Spokane?

Brown: We're a major component of the city's emerging University District. Our 50-acre campus—on a former rail yard just east of downtown—is home to the colleges of nursing, pharmacy and medical sciences.

The campus's local impact is significant. Since 1994, more than \$200 million has been invested in facilities and biomedical-

plan to train our students in team-based health care. The campus will become even more dynamic as WSU works to create Washington's second public medical school to address looming physician shortages in the state.

#### AAM: Besides WSU Spokane, how has the city evolved in recent years?

Brown: Spokane's current generation of leaders focuses more than before on emphasizing Spokane's inherent strengths rather than imitating some other place. ... They would rather stay here, start families and businesses, and define the future.

Neighborhoods like the Perry District, Browne's Addition and Kendall Yards have turned Spokane into a walkable, bikeable, affordable, culturally vibrant place to live.

#### AAM: Do you miss politics?

Brown: Being majority leader was a dream job, but so is being chancellor of WSU Spokane. I work in a stimulating environment with professors doing cutting-edge research and students who want to change the world.

## AAM: What's ahead for WSU Spokane?

Brown: We plan to build a health clinic that will house new medical residencies we are developing with community partners, and we

#### **Scott Morris**

Scott Morris heads Spokane-based Avista Corp., which serves about 680,000 electricity and natural gas customers in Eastern Washington, North Idaho, Oregon and Alaska.

Born and raised in Spokane, Morris attended Gonzaga University, where he earned his bachelor's and a master's degree. In addition to being Avista's board chairman and CEO, Morris is vice chairman of Gonzaga University's board of trustees and current chair of the board of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, Seattle branch. He has served two terms as campaign chairman for the Spokane County United Way.



He and his wife, Liz, have four children and two grandchildren.

## AAM: How has your hometown changed during your lifetime?

Morris: Spokane has always been a family-friendly community, but it has become a destination for bicycling, skiing, fishing, hiking and golf, as well as organized events such as Bloomsday.

## AAM: How has Avista evolved since you joined the company?

Morris: We've built on our strengths trust, innovation and collaboration and a culture of engagement. We've taken our commitment to customers, employees, investors and the community to a higher level.

AAM: Last year saw completion of the Avista-funded Huntington Park and City Hall Plaza projects. Soon, Mobius Science Center will move into the annex next to the utility's landmark Post Street Substation.


Morris: Making the community a better place has always been in our DNA, going back to 1904, when we helped preserve Manito Park for future generations.

#### AAM: What goals would you like Spokane to embrace?

He began working at the casino as a tribal gaming inspector before rising to executive director of the Kalispel Tribal Gaming Agency. Haugen became Northern Quest's general manager in 2010.

#### AAM: What are your memories of childhood in Spokane?

Haugen: My family lived on the North Side, when NorthTown Mall was just an open-air plaza. We rode our bikes over there all the time when traffic wasn't nearly as busy as it is now. It's been incredible to watch our community grow and improve, including the revitalization of downtown.

AAM: How has the casino evolved? Haugen: Our facilities have grown from 50,000 square feet to 750,000. When we opened, we provided 300 jobs. Now we employ 1,500. We're now a destination resort with a 250-room hotel, 14 restaurants and lounges, and a world-class spa.

AAM: How has the casino helped?



AAM: What goals should Spokane have?

Haugen: I'd like to see Spokane attract more businesses and industries, which would encourage our younger generation to stay in this area after graduation. We need to cultivate the high-quality workforce and amenities that make Spokane such a great place to work, live and visit. S

# Outdoor Experiences

SPORTS AND RECREATION ABOUND IN THE INLAND NORTHWEST By Derrick Knowles

I grew up near the Spokane River and still live close enough to catch the scent of willow and cottonwood on a spring breeze and to find the occasional caddis fly flitting through our backyard.

The river is a familiar neighbor. Yet the view of the city's spectacular waterfalls from below the cascades, on a section of the Spokane River Centennial Trail that was constructed just last year, is a sight that can cause even locals like me to stop and stare. I often bike this new section of trail just west of downtown Spokane, and I still find myself marveling at the spectacle of the falls each spring, when they are swollen with snowmelt. For many visitors, a trip to Spokane wouldn't be complete without a bike ride or urban hike on this world-class, urban section of the Centennial Trail.

Yet there are plenty of other activities to explore, as well. "People who love the outdoors quickly fall in love with Spokane," says Jeanna Hofmeister, chief marketing officer at Visit Spokane. "You have incredible hiking, cycling, whitewater rafting and deep-powder skiing—all these



things along with an annual average of 260 days of sun."

In fact, Spokane boasts terrific golfing, fly-fishing, mountain biking, whitewater rafting, rowing and paddling, all within city limits. The city also hosts some of the finest sporting events of their kind, including Hoopfest (the largest three-on-three basketball tournament) and the Lilac Bloomsday Run, a Spokane tradition.

#### Biking the Centennial Trail

The Spokane River Centennial Trail, a 37.5-mile paved pathway, follows the course of the Spokane River eastward from the Nine Mile Falls area, through Riverside State Park and through downtown Spokane on to the Washington/ Idaho state line. At that point, the 24-mile

North Idaho Centennial Trail picks up where its Washington counterpart leaves off, continuing east to Coeur d'Alene.

If you head west from Riverfront Park in downtown Spokane, you can explore the newest section of trail. Bike shops such as Spoke 'N Sport (spokensportinc. net) rent road bikes and mountain bikes downtown.

Leaving the park and the falls behind, the trail continues northwestward along the north bank of the river through the Kendall Yards development, with its restaurants and trailside patios. Farther west, city views give way to neighborhood streets overlooking the river, as the trail temporarily merges with the Lilac Bloomsday Run route, including a section on Bloomsday's famous "Doomsday Hill."

From the bottom of Doomsday Hill, cyclists can cross the river and continue northwest along the Centennial Trail through Riverside State Park, the second largest in the Washington State Parks system. Here you can enjoy fantastic river views and miles of smooth riding. With bald eagles and osprey soaring over the pine-filled river gorge, it's easy to forget that you're only minutes from downtown.

#### Mountain Biking in Riverside State Park

Riverside State Park also has terrific opportunities for a more rugged form of biking—via its vast network of mountain-biking singletrack. The easiest way to access this network is at the **Bowl and Pitcher area** of the state park (and fit riders reach the park on the Centennial Trail from downtown even before starting in on their mountain biking).

To mountain-bike here, pick up a trail map from the park's ranger station and choose a well-worn trail, following the twists and turns on narrow ribbons of smooth dirt and through occasional rock gardens. Newcomers should know that



## An Inland Running Icon

Don Kardong, a former Olympic marathon runner and the founder of one of the largest road races in the nation—the Lilac Bloomsday Run—got his start in running while training for high school basketball.

"I found out that I had more talent for running than I did for shooting hoops," says Kardong, now 66. He organized the first Bloomsday Run in 1977, shortly after running in the 1976 Summer Olympics.

Bloomsday brought to Spokane a race model that was becoming popular elsewhere. The idea of bringing elite racers

and citizen runners together in one road race that started and ended in downtown Spokane captured Kardong's imagination: "I thought that was a great concept, and I made that comment to a reporter at the local newspaper. It showed up in head-lines, and that started the ball rolling."

Kardong, who serves as race director, has watched the 12k (7.46-mile) local race become a destination event. Of 49,094 registered racers in 2014—split about 50-50 between runners and walkers—nearly 21,000 were from out of the area.

"Spokane has become more and more accessible for running and other kinds of outdoor recreation over the years," says Kardong. "Spokane is a great city, and its real claim to fame is that it's situated for quick, easy access to a variety of outdoor-recreation opportunities." —D. Knowles



there isn't signage for all of the 50-plus miles of trails in and around the park—which can be a bit disorienting. But with limited elevation gain and mostly non-technical trails, Riverside's novice-friendly cross-country trail system on the edge of a major urban area has few rivals in the Northwest.

Other Great Recreation in or Near Downtown
Many recreation options will help make your next Spokane trips ones to rave about. Heading out on foot from downtown Spokane, walkers can explore the winding paths and bridges with breathtaking views of the Spokane Falls on an urban hike through Riverfront Park and Huntington Park that can range from a few blocks to several miles long.

There are many ways to get out on Spokane's beautiful urban riverfront.

Fly-fishing on the lower river west of downtown is excellent after peak river flows decline in June. Anglers fishing from shore and from rafts may hook trout of lengths up to 20 inches. Try a guided trip with a local fly shop to improve your odds.

On hot summer days, there's perhaps no better way to enjoy the river than rowing, tubing, paddling, paddle-boarding or rafting. Options include the scenic, mellow stretch below the falls; the flatwater section just upriver from downtown that is perfect for paddle-boarding; and the thrilling class III+ whitewater farther downstream of the falls. Several outfitters offer a range of guided trips. In the spring, the Spokane River Rowing Association offers multisession courses for newcomers to learn the sport on calm sections.

For golfers, getting onto a course couldn't be easier. The Spokane region is home to 33 fine public and private golf courses, featuring fairways surrounded by stunning natural beauty.

#### Outside the City


Spokane's proximity to some of the West's finest outdoor destinations makes the city a premier gateway to fantastic skiing, hiking and sightseeing locations. Nearby are the Mt. Spokane Ski & Snowboard Park and 49° North Mountain Resort. The Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, area offers additional recreation opportunities-from mountain biking to hiking, camping, fishing, hunting and more. Spokane is also an excellent launching point for trips to classic destinations such as Schweitzer Mountain Resort, near Sandpoint, Idaho, and Priest Lake, Idaho, in the Selkirk Mountains. Within a drive of about 3 hours is the world-renowned and powder-blessed Kootenay region of British Columbia, with legendary ski resorts and heli-skiing, hut-skiing and cat-skiing operations.

You don't need to leave Spokane to find terrific outdoor opportunities, however; due to the city's great trails, centrally located water sports and spectacular parks, there is plenty to do outdoors without taking a step out of town. **S** 







# Cultural Renaissance

Germany's capital is once again an avant-garde metropolis

"Berlin is the newest city I have come across," opined a keenly observant world traveler whose remark seems as relevant today as it originally was—in 1892, when Mark Twain visited the German capital. The fact a 123-year-old comment remains germane testifies to this 21st century metropolis's ability to reinvent its dynamic character. ■ More than once, in fact. This is vividly evident near the Reichstag, the

twice-rebuilt German Parliament that anchors a district in which construction cranes are everywhere I look. A 5-story train station doubles as transportation hub and boutique gallery center. The historic granite-block parliament building itself is topped by a glistening glass atrium, and the rooftop restaurant is the only such in any world capitol building. Here one can enjoy, by the way, thoroughly modern Germanic cuisine such as braised Wagyu fillet.

It's pretty remarkable for a facility that was largely destroyed by the end of World War II, then rendered useless during a Cold War era in which the city was sundered in two and the capital moved to Bonn. It

returned here shortly after the Berlin Wall fell a quarter-century ago, and the city has been re-establishing its political and cultural leadership ever since. Today, it blends historic character and cultural edginess as well as any city in Europe.

My own visits to Berlin reflect its remarkable transformation from Cold War flash-point to global capital of culture. Sure, I've sampled the popular visitor attractions that focus on the past, such as colorful journeys around the city in antique Trabants, the infamously creaky East German auto-

mobiles that have gained retrochic status. It's no coincidence that this once muchmaligned symbol of collectivism has endured as an ironic icon.

Other reminders of the past are common sights:
The imposing 1791
Brandenburg Gate, which once languished behind the Wall, is now a

hugely popular visitor destination. Close by, the Holocaust Memorial renders silent testament to the Nazi persecution that brutalized Europe; observant visitors might notice the thousands of plaques placed throughout the city marking the residences of Jewish residents who were taken away to Nazi prison camps. A mile away, at Check-

point Charlie, the former border crossing between the Russian-ruled sector of East Berlin and the American-controlled sector in West Berlin has become Berlin's favor-

warehouse converted to a modern art museum in 1975, the museum has seen several renovations over the years, reinventing itself as often as its home city has. The existing museum building, a contemporary structure of right angles made of glass and white concrete, is currently undergoing yet another modernization





#### **AMPELMANN**

Stroll the streets of Berlin and you will encounter the Ampelmann, the uniquely East German figure adorning street crossing signs. The stocky, hat-wearing man was designed by a GDR traffic psychologist just months after the Berlin Wall went up. So popular was he that the little Ampelmann launched his own TV show in 1982, teaching traffic safety to East Berlin's children. Government officials intended to replace the little guy when the Wall came down but East Germans would hear nothing of it, and so he stays, a symbol of Berlin. Visitors will see the little figure on crosswalks as well as on book bags, T-shirts, clocks and even suitcases at Ampelmann shops and a newly opened Ampelmann Restaurant in central Berlin.

effort that will be completed in May.

When it reopens, its emphasis will be on the polarization and tension that many believe is at the very heart of Berlin's force as an artistic hub. On display will be Berlinfocused works such as drawings by Expressionist Benno Berneis; East European avant-garde sculptures; and postwar architectural photographs comparing the city plans of East and West Berlin.

This adventurous modern culture draws both mainstream travelers and leading-edge artists, professionals and designers who consider Berlin a world cultural capital. January and July bring fashionistas for the city's twice-a-year Fashion Week: Who will the next global clothing star be? February draws 20,000 film industry professionals for the annual Berlin International Film Festival, *Berlinale*, with more than 400 screenings, competitions and international premieres such as the high-visibility *Fifty Shades of Grey*.

Also in June, Berlin—a city given UNESCO's honorific "City of Design" in 2005—celebrates innovation at its annual DMY International Design Festival, which fetes the avant-garde in areas as diverse as contemporary reimagination of Slovakian folk furniture and innovation in LCD imaging technology. The city counts 3,700

couture houses; and in late 2014, GoEuro pronounced Berlin the "Most Fun City" based on rankings from travel bloggers, tourism offices and travel websites. Berlin also won GoEuro's award for the world's most affordable beer.

Art museums and galleries pop up across the city, some redesigned, others brand new. On my most recent trip to



#### Berlin, Germany

Berlin I stroll past one of my favorites, the East Side Gallery—actually a massive outdoor mural. An interesting mix of Cold War stodginess and modern edginess unite here at the world's largest open-air art display and the longest surviving stretch of the Berlin Wall. Painted by 118 artists from 21 nations, the vividly colored mural depicts the 1989 fall of the Wall and Germany's reunification a year later. Favorite images include a Trabant bursting through a concrete wall, while in another panel East German General Secretary Erich Honecker and Soviet General Secretary Leonid Brezhnev engage in a passionate, painterly smooch.

Berlin's Kindl Centre for Contemporary Art, which opened last fall, offers year-round opportunities to view modern works within the almost 60,000 square feet of the former Kindl Brewery. Inside the massive concrete Boiler House, where giant vats of barley and malt once steamed, a yellow and red Kitfox aircraft hangs suspended from the concrete ceiling, a series of wall fans spinning the plane. Smaller spaces within the building propel Berlin's creative spirit forward, hosting performances and lectures on topics ranging from experimental music to the future of Berlin's neighborhoods and the art of creating video games.

Berlin's music scene is again at the forefront, too. The Fête de la Musique, which takes place in cities across Germany every year on the summer solstice, includes musical genres ranging from French chanson to jazz, punk, reggae, organ music and "hippie music" on 100 open-air stages in Berlin. August's Pop-Kultur brings concerts and industry gatherings in the area around the city's most popular nightclub, the Berghain.

Classical music reigns during July's Classic Open Air at the elegant Gendarmenmarkt square, a festival featuring opera, classical and jazz performances.

And at Potsdamer Platz, Berlin's entertainment center has reclaimed its 1930s Cabaret-era buzz. In the Jazz Age



this was the centerpiece of Berlin entertainment with buzzing nightclubs; the plaza drew such large crowds that the city installed its first traffic signal at one corner. But once the Wall rose in 1961, the square turned into a largely deserted no man's land.

Today, the huge neon-lit outdoor canopy of the Sony Center dominates the square, shielding restaurant-goers and shoppers from rain and sun. There's little remaining of the wasteland of 25 years ago save a zigzagging cobblestone memorial marker in the pavement, informational displays and a few historical photos of the Berlin Wall. There are also a few lone slabs of surviving Wall. Crowds hurry past them en route to the square's legendary nightlife.

I head for a last dinner in Berlin under the Sony Center's neon canopy, lighting up the nighttime sky in a succession of glowing fuchsia, purple and blue. Live music and the voices of a thousand visitors spill out of the many bars and restaurants. At Lindenbräu I savor roast pork with sauerkraut and potato dumplings, a traditional dinner in a city that has become anything but.

Berlin is fated to be forever becoming, yet never being, observed writer Karl Scheffler in 1910. Today this perfectly expresses the city's ever-evolving, vibrant character.



#### Golf Course

More than any other small-car model line, the Volkswagen Golf has stayed its course. ■ The original Golf, conceived as a more modern replacement for the classic Beetle, originally went on sale for the 1975 model year. And over the 40 years since then, a great many small-car nameplates have come and gone, while the few other continuing nameplates, including the Honda Civic and Toyota Corolla, have

evolved to be quite different than their original concepts.

The Golf, on the other hand (or Rabbit, as it's been called, at times, in the United States), is what it's always been—a rather upright compact hatchback, kept thoroughly modern in its features and details.

While the look and format of the Golf are unmistakably familiar, what's under the hood probably isn't. Volkswagen has decided to embrace nearly the entire breadth of modern powertrain technology. Thinking of a diesel, a high-performance turbo model, or even something you can plug in? It's all in the 2015 lineup.

The base engine in the 2015 Volkswagen Golf is definitely a step more sophisticated than what you get in other costconscious compact cars. For the Golf's bargain entry price of just under \$18,000 (in two-door form, or a bit more as a four-door), you get a turbocharged, direct-injected I.8-liter four-cylinder. It makes 170 horsepower—the same as last year's stan-



Even better, it's smooth and quiet compared to most other smaller four-cylinder engines, and it earns 26 mpg city, 37 highway—that's up to 6 mpg better than the engine it's replacing.

If you're looking for a greener small-car model that emphasizes efficiency, and you're willing to pay a bit more, there are two very different choices in the Golf lineup: the diesel Golf TDI, and the allelectric e-Golf.

The diesel engine is something Volks-wagen has been offering for decades, and the company has arguably engineered and refined it to near perfection. In the 2015 Golf, there's a new version of the familiar 2.0-liter in-line four-cylinder turbo-diesel engine. It has a number of mechanical upgrades that make it not only stronger and more fuel-efficient than its predecessor, but also—with the incorporation of an exhaust after-treatment system—about 40 percent lower in its emissions.

The Golf TDI bucks all the old diesel preconceptions. There's not even a hint of soot or fumes when you start it cold, and it settles to a quiet purr once warmed up. Furthermore, it has a much more immediate response to a press of the accelerator than past diesel engines from VW, and it's quicker revving, which made it quite enjoyable to drive with my test car's six-speed manual gearbox.

And the Golf TDI is more fuel-efficient than ever before—to the tune of 31 mpg city, 42 mpg highway by the official EPA figures, or considerably better based on the 49-mpg average I saw in 275 miles of driving on a route that took me on some suburban errands, then from Portland out to the coast and back.

This entire drive, by the way, was achieved in comfort and quiet, in a car that felt perky and responsive, and that included

an impressive Fender Premium Audio system, heated seats, rain-sensing wipers, a basic but effective Forward Collision Warning system, and adaptive front lighting that helped in corners.

The new 2015 Volkswagen Golf, in base TDI or e-Golf forms, isn't particularly edgy; rather, it's a surprisingly mature, refined small car, with excellent supportive seats, a ride that's firm but controlled and quiet, and quite possibly one of the most precise, best-weighted electric-power steering systems in a front-wheel-drive car.

The Golf has always been on the boxy side for a hatchback, but with the redesigned 2015 version, VW has given the car's silhouette and stance a little more gravitas and elegance without detracting from the Golf's inherent utility.

The interior is surprisingly spacious. Unlike in so many other hatchbacks and sedans today, the roofline doesn't cut downward at the back, and that keeps the back seat useful enough for 6-footers. What's more, seatbacks flip forward, allowing a mostly flat cargo floor and a wide hatchback opening for weekend hauling needs or just stocking up on groceries.

EVEN THOUGH the 2015 model clearly looks like a Golf, every single inch, every contour and nearly every component is different from last year's model. It's the first of many upcoming models from the automaker to use an all-new set of underpinnings. That new platform pushes the wheels farther out to the corners to add space and accommodate the battery packs required by hybrid and electric versions, such as the all-electric e-Golf.

As such, the e-Golf doesn't sacrifice a thing in its packaging or usability—provided you respect its range limitations between charges. With a 24.2-kilowatthour battery pack mounted under the rear floor, powering a 115-horsepower electric motor system, the e-Golf has plenty of pep for around-town use as well

as for short highway jaunts out to the suburbs. It can get to 60 mph in around 10 seconds, or to a top speed of 87 mph.

Driving range, according to official EPA estimates, is 83 miles for the e-Golf-although you're likely to do better than that if you take advantage of this model's Eco and Eco+ efficiency modes. And since those who've previously driven electric cars or hybrids expect less "coasting" than those who are moving from a typical gasoline model, the e-Golf provides three levels of regenerative braking-which affects how aggressively the system recoups energy from coasting and deceleration and stores it back in the battery pack. The e-Golf also uses a heatpump system to help make cabin heating more efficient during cold-weather months, and it has extra underbody aerodynamic panels to add to efficiency.

With a 240-volt wall-mount charger (or the type of commercial charger that's widely publicly available now in most West Coast cities), the e-Golf charges to full in less than four hours. And with the Combined Charging System (CCS) fast-chargers that are being installed in many metro areas, you can bring the battery up to 80 percent in less than 30 minutes.

For now, the e-Golf is available only in California, Oregon and a few other select markets. Although VW hasn't announced what those markets are, I wouldn't be surprised if they include several metro areas with a lot of electric-vehicle "early adopters," such as Seattle and Atlanta. And the e-Golf could be quite a rival to the Nissan Leaf on a national level.

With the new Golf lineup, Volkswagen becomes the first automaker to offer Americans the choice of a diesel or electric version of the same model.


I recently had the opportunity to drive both models—a production TDI and a prototype version of the e-Golf—backto-back, and I confirmed that these are two very different, yet both excellent, ways of addressing green-car needs.



Going purely by energy used, the e-Golf is more efficient. The all-electric Golf is in its sweet spot at city speeds, and for typical American city and suburban commutes. The Golf TDI gets its best mileage when you're moving a bit faster, making the diesel a great pick for longer freeway commutes or highway trips.

EVER SINCE the early 1980s, when the performance-oriented GTI was added to the lineup, there's been a distinct sporty side to the Golf, too. Today's GTI remains the pick for those who want more of an emphasis on the driving experience without giving up any of the Golf's comfort or general usefulness.

The 2015 GTI, officially a separate model, gets a 2.0-liter turbocharged four under the hood, making up to 220 horsepower with an available performance pack that also wraps in brake upgrades and a special electronically controlled limited-slip differential that adds enjoyment in tight corners. Just be aware that the ride is quite a bit firmer than in other Golfs.

And there's actually one model higher now in the lineup. If the GTI is the sportiest Golf, then the Golf R is more of a full-fledged performance car, still based on the Golf. With full-time all-wheel drive, a higher-output version of the turbo four, and even more aggressive tuning for the steering and suspensionplus various other upgrades—the Golf R is ready for track time and can get to 60 mph in as little as 4.9 seconds.

Although there's quite the span in purpose from the efficiency-conscious e-Golf and TDI to the extroverted, athletic GTI and Golf R, all of these models have a common core: They're fun to drive, yet versatile and refined. By staying its course, Volkswagen has nurtured the Golf lineup into whatever you want it to be.

#### A GUIDE FOR AIR TRAVELERS

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and Alaska Airlines have set the following rules and regulations to assure your safety and comfort:

- Your seat belt must be fastened whenever the "FASTEN SEAT BELT" sign is illuminated. Keep your seat belt fastened at all other times in case of undetectable clear-air turbulence.
- Seatbacks and tray tables must be in the upright, locked position during taxi, takeoff and landing.
- All carry-on baggage must be stowed under a seat or in an enclosed overhead bin upon boarding and prior to landing, as directed.
- Please use caution when opening an overhead bin, as items may have shifted.
- Customers are requested to use the lavatory in their assigned cabin and are required to do so on inbound international flights; exceptions may be made for customers with special needs.
- Prior to takeoff and landing, service items provided by Alaska Airlines must be picked up or properly stowed under the seat in front of you, in carry-on luggage that is properly stowed or in an overhead bin.

- Alcohol may not be consumed aboard an aircraft unless it has been provided by a flight attendant. No alcohol may be served to any person who appears to be intoxicated, or who is under 21 years of age.
- During taxi, takeoff and landing, portable electronic devices and headphones may be used. Larger electronic devices such as laptops must be stowed during taxi, takeoff and landing.
- Cellphones may be used while the boarding door is open until advised by your flight attendant that cell service must be turned off. Upon landing, your flight attendant will advise when cell service can be enabled.
- During flight, electronic voice communications of any kind (e.g., cell/VoIP calls) are prohibited.
- Headphones must be worn when using electronic devices such as personal music players, Inflight Entertainment Players, etc.
- Interference with crew members' (including flight attendants') duties is a violation of federal law. Under federal law, no person may assault,

- threaten, intimidate or interfere with crew members in the performance of their duties aboard an aircraft under operation. Penalties for crew interference include fines up to \$11,000, imprisonment or both. An incident report may be filed with the FAA regarding a customer's behavior.
- Smoking, chewing tobacco and electronic cigarette use are not permitted on any Alaska Airlines flight.
- Child-restraint devices must bear the FAA approval sticker.
- Seat-belt extension use is not allowed in exit rows for the safety of all passengers due to the possibility of entanglement by the extensions.
- Alaska Airlines prohibits the use of items that do not meet FAA Regulations or Company regulations. This includes the use of seat-belt extensions not provided by Alaska Airlines, devices that restrict the recline of seats, selfheating meals or beverages, air filters placed on overhead vents and personal air purifying devices.
- Pets must remain in carrier for entire flight. Carrier must be stowed for taxi, takeoff and landing.


