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
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

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
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# **10 WEEKS TO YOUR BEST YOU!**

- Podrá relajarse con estilo en nuestra sala de espera VIP en Nueva York/JFK



# WHAT'S NEW: TIMBERS SPONSORSHIP EXTENDED

# **WINE FLIES MORE FREELY**

Alaska Mileage Plan members can now check a case of wine for free on domestic flights from 29 cities in the American West, through the expanded Wine Flies Free program.

The program applies for Alaska Airlines, Horizon Air and SkyWest flights from participating destinations across the wine regions of California, Idaho, Oregon and Washington state.

Wines must be packed and sealed for transport in a protective shipping container. Flyers add a valid Mileage Plan number to their reservations to



It offers a seamless travel experience for guests across the two airlines. JAL is selling tickets for the new codeshare flights for travel after May 20.

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National Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C., you know how spectacular it is-a place filled with history and exhibits that not only educate and entertain, but inspire.

Over the course of the past century, aviation has played a prominent role in the American experience, and commercial aviation is a large part of the Smithsonian presence on the National Mall, where the National Air and Space Museum receives 7 million visits each year.

Over the next several years, the Smithsonian will be remodeling the museum's flagship building, which includes the "America by Air" gallery, one of the three main halls. From large aircraft to smaller artifacts—such as uniforms, models and engines—the gallery traces the history of commercial aviation in the United States, from the early efforts to form airlines only a decade after Kitty Hawk to the commercial challenges and technical sophistication of the 21st century jet age.

Noting a shared passion for innovation and

constant improvement, Alaska Airlines recently announced that it is donating \$1.5 million in support of the museum remodel, as part of Alaska's own focus on youth and education.

"Alaska Airlines is committed to working in our communities to introduce young people especially those most at risk—to job opportunities in aviation and beyond, to set them up for success in future career options," says Diana Birkett Rakow, vice president of external relations. "We are honored to support one of the world's premier education centers and a national treasure as it gears up to inspire future aviators around the country and around the world.

"For Alaska Airlines guests traveling to our nation's capital," Birkett Rakow says, "you can go see your favorite airline playing a part in our nation's history."

The contribution by Alaska and other airlines will support the reimagining of the hall, and the airlines will be recognized at the new entrance. The gallery is scheduled to close mid-2018, with the newly renovated gallery reopening sometime in 2021.

"The generous contribution by Alaska Airlines and other airlines not only signals a commitment to the storied history of air travel, but to inspiring young people to pursue careers in aviation and engineering," says Gen. J.R. "Jack" Dailey, the John and Adrienne Mars Director of the National Air and Space Museum. "These gifts help launch the museum on a trajectory to realizing the transformation of this important place."

The Smithsonian project joins an array of organizations that Alaska Air Group partners with to connect young people with opportunities, including The Museum of Flight in Seattle, The Road Map Project, the Alaska Native Science and Engineering Program, the Alaska Challenger Center for Space Science Technology, the United Negro College Fund, the Technology Access Foundation and others.

Through such programs, Alaska plans to positively impact 100,000 youths by 2020. ₹



# INSPIRING A NEW **GENERATION**

)) In early February, more than 100 Washington state middle-school students gathered at Seattle's Museum of Flight and built robots out of machine parts. They asked an Alaska Airlines pilot questions about her job, created whirligigs, launched straw rockets and acted as detectives on a history scavenger hunt.

The students were part of the Michael P. Anderson Memorial Aerospace Program, named in honor of the Spokane native and payload commander of the 2003 Space Shuttle Columbia flight that failed on re-entry.

For the past nine years, students-in sixth through eighth grades—have participated in Michael P. Anderson Day at the museum. The special day is one of six events offered by the aerospace program, and inspires students to pursue science and technology fields—and maybe even become astronauts.

Anderson, who was African-American, traveled throughout the country, speaking at schools and encouraging students to follow their dreams. He emphasized the importance of dedication, hard work and a commitment to achieve goals.

The free program is open to all Washington state sixth- through eighth-graders, and promotes science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) disciplines. No qualifications are required, beyond a parent's permission.

The program continues Anderson's legacy of working to inspire underserved children of color, who are encouraged to apply. As a result, kids realize that when it comes to their dreams, "the sky's the limit," says former Alaska Airlines pilot Ronald Limes, chairperson of the Anderson program.

A tireless advocate, Limes travels around the state, speaking about the program at schools and at community groups. In 2017, more than 280 Washington state children, from a variety of backgrounds and ethnicities, registered for the program.



Offering a combination of online learning and in-person experiences, the program utilizes professional mentors, including Alaska Airlines pilots, military pilots, mechanical engineers, airline dispatchers, flight attendants and rocket scientists. Mentors build positive relationships with the children, sharing their personal stories and achievements and teaching them a few things along the way.

"The kids are learning, but we trick them, because they're having fun," Limes says.

The program entails short online assignments that are interspersed with different activities. A sample project includes reading a guest speaker's biography and answering questions about his or her accomplishments. Mentors grade work and provide feedback.

Hands-on events include Anderson Day, which, this year, featured U.S. Air Force Pilot Maj. Kristofer W. Duckett, who talked about the experience of flying an ultra high-altitude U-2 jet. There is also a female-focused Women Fly Day; an Alaska Airlines Aviation Day, which includes the opportunity to experience a

Boeing 737 flight simulator and hear guest astronauts speak; and the Aviation Learning Center Lab (in which students "fly" a simulator between Boeing Field in Seattle and Paine Field in Everett). Another program is Eagles Aviation Camp, where kids take to Puget Sound skies in real planes.

The final event is a visit to the indoor skydiving center iFly in Tukwila, a reward for students who completed all online assignments on time.

The program is supported by Alaska with a donation-matching contribution plan that has raised more than \$150,000.

Students interested in taking part must sign up during the registration window between August and November. The program runs from February through July, annually.

# ON THE WINGS OF EAGLES


>> In 1949, the world was recovering from World War II. Jewish refugees living in small, often unwelcome communities throughout the world were looking to start over in the newly created state of Israel, but the process of getting there was not easy.

For about 49,000 largely nomadic Jews living in Yemen, help would come from an unlikely place: Alaska Airlines. After acquiring war-surplus DC-4 and C-46 aircraft, Alaska Airlines President James Wooten was looking for creative ways to utilize the new fleet. In 1948 he chartered aircraft for the Berlin Airlift, and in the following year, he agreed to

a mission called On Wings of Eagles that would transport Yemenite Jews to Israel; he saw it as a humanitarian obligation.

Many of the passengers had never flown before, and they were hesitant. Yet by the end of 1950, the airline had made more than 430 flights.

Pilot Warren Metzger and flight attendant Marian Liscomb were among those who flew the missions. You can read about the airlift in a new book written by their daughter, Darragh Metzger, called Alaska Over Israel: Operation Magic Carpet, the Men and Women Who Made It Fly, and the Little Airline That Could. ズ

# **DUMPLINGS RULE** THE WORLD

International food traditions have diverse takes on doughy delicacies

>>> Here's a question: When somebody says to you, "Let's go out for dumplings," what is your response? Mine is: Absolutely.

My only problem is where to begin. Dumplings are a broad category that spans many international borders and ethnic areas. Maybe you hear "dumpling" and think to yourself, I would love a trip to Chinatown for dim sum. Or maybe your first thought is of Polish pierogies filled with prunes or apricots. How about fragrant, soft Tibetan steamed-bread tingmo, or crispy, porky Japanese gyoza?

Americans in my grandparents' generation were adept at making chicken-dumpling casseroles, or-as in my grandma's case—Granny Smith apple dumplings filled with a sweet, delicious date butter and topped with cinnamon sauce. Just the smell of this type of dumpling transports me right back to Grandma's aromatic kitchen.

One of the perks of my job is that I don't actually need to decide among dumplings—I choose them all. My restaurant group hosts Dumpling Fest this month at our Palace Ballroom event space in downtown Seattle—the second-annual event is on March 11. In any given year, this festival might feature pork-and-kimchi-filled Korean-style mandu, Chinese barbecued-pork bao, hat-shaped Italian cappelletti, pastrycrusted Argentinian beef empanadas and/or thinly doughed Russian pelmeni. We invite restaurateurs from all over the city to come and show off their distinctive dough manipulations in styles from every corner of the world.

You can group dumplings by their county, region or culture of origin. But I also group dumplings into two broad categories: those with fillings, and straight-up dough dumplings that have no fillings.

Wrapped dumplings, which are steamed, pan-fried, baked or all of the above, are easy to individualize after

you've settled on your favorite outer-dough style. By this I mean that the filling can be customized to your taste just by changing the seasonings. Maybe you don't love ginger, so you use garlic and lemongrass instead. Pork and shrimp made into a filling is delicious, but if you are allergic to shrimp, just use the pork, or maybe substitute chicken.

My go-to wrapped dumpling is the humble wonton. There are probably as many varieties of this dumpling as you can imagine, but I stick to the classic Cantonese version served in a soup of a chicken broth dotted with chunks of baby bok choy, flecks of green onions, often a sliver or two of char siu (Chinese barbecued pork) and noodles. Typically, noodle companies make a thinly rolled wheat wrapper that comes in squares or rounds about 3 inches in diameter

specifically for wrapping dumplings. I buy the thinnest ones for delicate wontons and the thicker versions for hearty potstickers. My daughter, Loretta, and I used to make virtual boatloads of wontons, because once you start, you don't want to stop! Our wonton forcemeat stuffing would begin with raw ground pork. We would add minced shallot, garlic, ginger and cilantro. To this we would add a dash of sesame oil, and soy sauce and chile paste to round out the flavor profile.

I like to add a tablespoon or so of rice flour or cornstarch to soak up extra juices, but it is not obligatory. Once the filling is prepared, wrap it in the dough and pinch the edges together. After a quick boil, pop the dumplings into a steaming bowl of soup base, and you have it: wonton soup.


With straight-up dough dumplings, you have to be careful. Without the correct moisture-to-starch ratios, your dumplings can melt into a glutinous blob or else be dry as a bone. Italian potato gnocchi are representative dough dumplings. Seems to me they are best when prepared in the simplest way. I bake a couple of russet potatoes, scoop the potato flesh out of the skin while they're still hot, and run it


through a food mill or a potato ricer. I add all-purpose flour and some egg, gently mix it, and then quickly lengthen the dough into 1-inch-thick cigars without overworking the dough (find more-exact recipes online or in my book Tom Douglas' Seattle Kitchen). I cut the rolls into inch-long segments and simmer them gently in a large pot of water. They're done when they float for 20 seconds or so. A simple tomato sauce or sage-Parmesan crema is perfect with these airy little pillows.

When it comes to making dumplings, there is truly a world of options. Yet some will likely have associations for you. Try the ones handed down by your immigrant elders, or the ones developed by you and your kids, or a variation on a dish that you and your sweetie had in a trattoria on your honeymoon in Florence. In doing so, you can make your dumpling memories that much more delightful. Cheers! X

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

#### **AIRPLANE ETIQUETTE**

- )) One of the best parts about air travel is that it brings people from all walks of life together. I've been fortunate to travel all over the world, in the process flying more than 2 million miles, so I've seen pretty much everything when it comes to passenger behavior. Here are my do's and don'ts to help everyone be a courteous and considerate passenger.
- Be aware of boarding procedures. Instead of crowding the boarding area, stand back and wait until your boarding time is called. Good strategies for getting on the plane early include finding out which rows board first and taking that into account when making seat selections or purchasing a premium-class seat.
- When boarding, make sure you take your backpack or shoulder bags in your hands in front of you. That way, you leave space for other passengers who are boarding, and you avoid accidentally bumping into aisle-seat passengers with your bag as you make your way to your seat.
- Put your bag in the overhead bin wheels out and place your smaller bag underneath your seat (if you're sitting in the bulkhead, all bags go up in the bin). If you're wearing a winter coat or jacket, wait until the end of boarding before you put it in the overhead bin, since it can easily fit into the remaining space.
- When I take my seat, I always smile and say hello to my seatmate. If you don't want to talk, for whatever reason, consider putting on earphones before taking your seat. This helps give the hint that you don't want to talk.



That said, I've met some of the most interesting people when flying, so keep an open mind about a little friendly chitchat with your neighbor.

- If you want to sleep, reserve a window seat in advance so that you're not disturbed when the others in your row get up to use the restroom.
- Be kind about the armrests. It's an unwritten rule that the passenger in the middle seat gets both of the center armrests.
- When listening to music, playing video games or watching movies, wear earbuds and keep the volume low-not only to save your ears but also so you don't disturb those around you.
- I used to date a flight attendant, and I know how hard they work and how passengers sometimes take their problems out on them, so I'm always extra nice to them. I usually bring them chocolates to let them know they're appreciated.

Most of all, just be genuinely friendly to the flight attendants—it will make your flight that much better.

If you bring your own food onboard, make sure that the odors aren't going to offend

others on the plane. Also be sure not to bring anything that could trigger your seatmates' allergies, such as peanuts.

- Before I fly, I always shower, slather on an extra layer of deodorant and wear clean clothes. If you prefer to wear strong perfumes, apply them after arrival at your destination. And remember not to treat an airplane like it's your own personal living space.
- Don't pretend your dog is a service animal if it's really not. That would be doing a disservice to the bona fide ones and the people who need them.
- Upon landing, wait until it's your row's turn to deplane. It helps everyone disembark more easily if you do it in an orderly fashion, rather than rushing to the front.

It's not that difficult to be a great passenger, and if you board with a good attitude and an open mind, who knows, you might disembark with a new friend and some good karma. 🛪

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

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#### TOWERING ART

>>> Smithsonian Institution photographer Carolyn J. Russo was on the runway at New York's LaGuardia Airport when she noticed the air traffic control tower. With its round windows and cream-colored smooth concrete texture, the tower reminded Russo of Swiss cheese. Struck by the unique aesthetic, Russo was inspired to look more closely at control towers around the world—and she discovered that many are works of art, beautiful structures welcoming people to new cities. 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#### **A QUEST** TO BEAT ALS

)) ALS is no joke. But the opening shot of Augie, a documentary about fitness leader Augie Nieto, shows the 13-year survivor of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (also known as Lou Gehrig's disease) smiling mischievously as an electronic voice reads an off-color joke that Nieto has laboriously typed by way of his foot-operated trackball mouse.

That expression says plenty: I'm still here. I'm not giving up. And naughty jokes just crack me up.

Director James Keach, who also produced Walk the Line, the 2005 film about Johnny Cash, and directed Glen Campbell: I'll Be Me, a 2014 documentary about the late singer's struggle with Alzheimer's disease, explains Augie's surprising opener.

"Augie has a wicked sense of humor, so my first instinct was, let's start with a joke. It lets the audience know it's OK to laugh. It's OK to enjoy this man."

Nieto was 47 when he was diagnosed in March 2005. He was 10 years into his second marriage and nearly three decades into a fabulously successful career in the fitness industry, an industry he helped launch while still in college by marketing and distributing the Lifecycle. As president of Life Fitness, and with a loving wife, four kids, and a beachfront home in Corona del Mar, California, Nieto had it all.

Now, Nieto says his purpose in life has veered from being successful to being significant. He even co-wrote a 2007 book, Augie's Quest: One Man's Journey from Success to Significance, to help spread that message.

ALS is a disease that attacks nerve cells that control voluntary muscles. Muscle function gradually declines, while mental function is unchanged. Through the computer he operates with his toes, Nieto demonstrates that his mind rarely rests. In fact, he is working constantly to fight the disease that usually robs its victims of life within three to five years.

One year after Nieto was diagnosed, he and his wife, Lynne, launched a fundraising initiative called Augie's Quest, which has raised more than \$60 million. The 13th-annual BASH, an auction hosted by Augie's Quest to raise funds for ALS, will be held March 23 in San Diego, and once again Lynne Nieto expects to look out into the sea of faces and recognize people who were once her husband's fiercest business competitors.

"I can remember walking with Augie through trade shows," Lynne recalls, "and it was like they had lightning bolts coming out of their eyes at each other. But they are the same ones who today are supporting us. The fitness industry has really rallied behind us."

Meanwhile, she says, Augie Nieto is bringing people together to work toward a common goal. "He's taking his entrepreneurial background and applying it to a disease and approaching it as if it is a business."

He also has taken on the chairman-

ship of the ALS Therapy Development Institute, a nonprofit biotech research facility in Cambridge, Massachusetts, whose work is supported by Augie's Quest funds.

Lynne Nieto says she hopes the film Augie (available March 20 on iTunes and Amazon) helps raise awareness of ALS. "It's not incurable," she says. "It's just underfunded." ⊀



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


From start to finish, my Singapore visit is full of color, culture and cuisine that creates one of the best trips of my life.



Big D's downtown is a center for arts and culture

#### >> Everything is big in downtown Dallas.

The center of the nation's fourth-largest metropolitan area is a bustling business community with first-rate shopping.

It is also home to top entertainment venues, one of the largest contiguous urban arts districts in the nation and dining that ranges from haute to homestyle.

From Dallas Love Field Airport, it is a 5-mile trip to the George W. Bush Presidential Center, located on the campus of Southern Methodist University. The center has a presidential museum, which is full of items from Bush's time as president, including artifacts from the September 11 terrorist attack and also a replica of the Oval Office.

As you travel from the Bush Center into downtown Dallas, a striking skyline emerges, including iconic buildings such as the ballshaped Reunion Tower and the modernist skyscraper Fountain Place. Among these giants, architectural gems appear, including the Perot Museum of Nature and Science in Victory Park. Designed by award-winning architect Thom Mayne, the distinct cubelike structure stands 14 stories tall.

Inside, you'll find an immersive and interactive environment with many hands-on exhibits and attractions. Through May 6, visit the "Journey to Space" exhibit, which allows visi-

tors to experience the tight quarters inside of an orbiting space station.

From the museum, it's a half-mile walk to the Nasher Sculpture Center in the Dallas Arts District. The Nasher houses one of the finest collections of modern and contemporary sculptures in the world.

Works by artists such as Calder, Matisse, Miró and Rodin are on display at the center, which also has a lush outdoor garden.

One of the great green achievements in the evolution of downtown Dallas is Klyde Warren Park, which borders the Arts District. The 5.2-acre park sits on a deck that covers a downtown freeway. Park activities include Zumba classes and music Thursdays.

If you're looking for legendary Texas shopping, head to the Main Street District and visit the Neiman Marcus flagship store. For classic cowboy boots and other Western wear, travel

a half-mile to Wild Bill's Western Store on North Market Street.

All that shopping can build up an appetite. For some of the best steaks in the city, visit Dakota's Steakhouse on Akard Street. Located 18 feet below street grade, the restaurant boasts an outdoor patio with a waterfall. For some of the city's best barbecue, travel to Pecan Lodge in the Deep Ellum District and order the pitmaster sandwich, with beef brisket, pulled pork and homemade sausage, topped with slaw, barbecue sauce and fresh sliced jalapeños.

Top off your day with a pint from Deep Ellum Brewing Co., famous for its Dallas Blonde Ale, and drop by Trees, a music venue known as a great place to see up-and-coming bands. In downtown, House of Blues is the place to catch established stars such as George Clinton, and also the stars of the future. \*

#### LAID-BACK LORETO

>>> Snugged between the Sierra de la Giganta range and the island-studded Sea of Cortés, the easygoing town of Loreto glows with a leisurely charm and preserves its rich cultural history as well as its abundant natural beauty.

Starting in the 1600s, Loreto reigned as the political and religious capital of Baja, after Spanish Jesuit missionaries chose this location to establish the first European settlement in the Californias.

In the 1800s, the state capital moved south to La Paz, and Loreto settled into being a quiet seaside fishing community. It has maintained much of its small-town feel today—yet with modernizations.

In the latter half of the 20th century, a major period of development brought to the area paved roads, an airport, a marina and elegant resort accommodations for travelers seeking to explore local attractions—both historical and contemporary.


Practically anyone in town can point you to the Misión de Nuestra Señora de Loreto Conchó, founded in 1697 by Father Juan María de Salvatierra. The current building dates to 1752, built with bricks brought there as ballast in sailing ships. From this starting point—which some consider "the mother of all missions"—dozens of missions were eventually created that extend northward into present-day California. The Museo de las Misiones de Baja California, which adjoins the mission, has displays about regional culture and the El Camino Real (the Royal Road) of the Californias—the historical route of the missionaries.

Just outside the mission, meticulously pruned fig trees arch over a stone walkway (Paseo Salvatierra) lined with shops and vendors selling hammocks, pottery and other wares. Follow this passageway to the traditional town square Plaza Cívica Loreto, which is flanked by historical buildings that house

Loreto's city hall, tourism office and other places of business.

Traditional Mexican dishes, as well as margaritas with fresh-squeezed fruit, draw visitors to nearby open-air establishments such as Restaurante Orlando's. For seafood with a sea view, head east a few blocks to the waterfront, where Mediterraneo, Los Mandiles and other casual dining spots celebrate the region's rich fishery. Try local specialties such as grilled dorado, almejas chocolatas (chocolate clams) and simple-yet-sublime fish tacos.

Follow your meal with a seaside stroll. Fishing and whale-watching excursions depart from the town's marina, where a lifelike statue of sea lions makes a great photo op. Along the waterfront promenade—the *malecón*—some benches face east toward Isla del Carmen, while others look west toward copper-colored mountains. Loreto may no longer be a colonial capital, but its scenery will always be a star. \*\*

#### **PADDLING THE SEA OF CORTÉS**

#### >> Adventurers from John Steinbeck to

Jacques Cousteau have marveled at the marine life that thrives in the Sea of Cortés, the extended inlet of brilliantly blue water between mainland Mexico and the Baja peninsula. Rich as a rainforest, the sea is home to one of the world's most remarkable arrays of whales and other marine mammals. It harbors nearly 900 fish species, too, many of them found nowhere else in the world. More than once, this region has been called the Mexican Galapagos for its biodiversity (and it even has the blue-footed boobies found in the Galapagos Islands).

Locals in Loreto—the jumping-off point for many Sea of Cortés adventures—have long known that their beloved waters are special. In the 1990s, they led a citizens drive to create Mexico's Bahía de Loreto National Park, protecting more than a half-million acres of water, along with the five large islands offshore. In 2005, UNESCO proclaimed this park, along

with additional islands and coastal areas in the Sea of Cortés, a World Heritage site.

The marine preserve is a dream destination for sea kayaking, and paddling is the most intimate way to explore the area's magical mix of desert and ocean. In a low-slung boat, you become almost one with the sea, in a world where dolphins cruise by in rowdy pods, and mobula rays sometimes leap from the water and sail through the air. Humpback, gray and fin whales, as well as whale sharks. provide other dramatic sights in the Sea of Cortés' protected waters.

Outfitters such as Sea Kayak Baja Mexico lead a variety of expeditions from their bases in Loreto. For those new to paddling, a five-plus-hour tour transports kayakers and kayaks by motorized panga to the sheltered

waters near Isla Coronado. With the dip of a paddle, you slide silently along the island's shoreline, past nesting seabirds and sea lions hauled out in the sun. Grab a snorkel and mask to check out underwater wildlife such as tropical fish swirling through warm, translucent water.

Multiday trips, adjusted to guests with more experience and ability, venture to

> more-distant shores for reservedin-advance camping on secluded island beaches.

For a side trip, you can hike up a rocky bluff among spiny organ pipe cactuses. Or you may be fortunate enough to enjoy a visit by a mighty blue

whale, with a torrent of sea water cascading off its fluke.

Evening brings its own show, when the sky blooms orange and the water's surface shines like hammered copper. ⊀

#### MASTERFUL MELTS

>>> Raclette, a traditional Swiss meltedcheese dish, has an unmistakable scent. Alternately described as "nutty" or "musty," it wafts around any restaurant or market that serves it.

In 2009, the intriguing aroma drew David Pyle to Kappacasein, a stand that serves the dish at London's Borough Market. (Though the dish is traditionally made with raclette cheese, Kappacasein uses a similar cheese, Ogleshield.)

Seven years later, Pyle and his partner,
Beth Ringland, started Fire and Scrape, a
similar stand that visits markets, events and
pop-up dinners in Seattle. Half-wheels of
raclette cheese, which is traditionally used for
the dish, are heated in an imported, specialized
grill. Then, as its name implies (the word
raclette comes from the French racler, "to
scrape"), the oozing delicacy gets scraped
down over local steamed potatoes, vegetables
or fresh bread. "It's like a waterfall of cheese,"
Ringland says of the dish, which has recently

gained popularity around the U.S.—with the food website Eater calling it a "melted cheese renaissance of sorts."

That renaissance also includes the Mexican dish queso fundido. At Ortega's, A Mexican Bistro, in San Diego, the queso fundido, made with baked Oaxaca cheese, comes in an oversized skillet, dressed to the nines with chorizo, chiles and caramelized onions, and sprinkled with even more cheese. Diners spoon the melted dish onto flour and corn tortillas.

Like raclette, the dish needs to be eaten quickly, while the cheese retains its languid viscosity and enticing aroma—though queso fundido doesn't have the distinctive pungent scent of raclette.

"It's about the experience," says Ringland of why raclette producers around the U.S. are seeing unprecedented growth and why melted cheese dishes show up on restaurant menus everywhere. "Cheese is no longer just under plastic wrap," she says, alluding to both the unmissable scent and the aesthetic appeal of raclette preparation, calling it "food theater."

While Pyle and Ringland started with traditional pairings for the cheese—potatoes and cornichons—customers soon began asking them to use it with foods from other vendors. The duo has scraped raclette onto naan, slices of apple pie and even tamales—perhaps an unintentional nod to the other current star in the art of melting, queso fundido.

#### A CULTURED PAIR

#### By Brad Japhe

>> In the handbook of gourmet food-anddrink pairings, cheese and wine commonly share top billing. But despite centuries of tradition, modern gourmets are exploring another liquid as cheese's chosen suitor: beer. As it turns out, beer is as versatile as its grapebased counterpart.

"I always remind myself that beer and cheese belong together, because they came from the same place," says Jim Koch, brewer and founder of The Boston Beer Company, makers of Samuel Adams brews. "Beer is made out of grain, and cows are fed with grain. Both products are the end form of grain."

Beyond this bond, beer and cheese are both characterized by diverse ranges of flavor and styles. So, no matter what specific taste you're looking to highlight in one, you can find a way to complement or contrast it with the other. How do you know which way to go? "At the extreme ends of flavor, you want to contrast,"

Koch advises. "Stuff in the middle that's more subtle, you want to complement."

As an example, he points to a bold chocolate stout, elements he'd contrast with a smooth and creamy Brie. "With an IPA, I'd want a big flavorful cheese, maybe slightly acidic," he recommends. "That would take me to an aged cheddar." A powerful blue is also a sensible choice here, he says.

Samuel Adams' flagship Boston Lager, on the other hand, offers quiet maltiness and a touch of caramel. You'd want to complement these notes with a similarly subdued cheese, such as an aged Gouda or a lighter Gruyère.

As a general rule, beers with higher alcohol content work best with bolder, sharper curds. Tangy styles from goat milk, such as chèvre, find their pairing in wheat beers, saisons and even some mellower sour selections.

Ultimately, these are merely guidelines. The only way to fully explore the preferences of

your own palate is through experimentation, with one caveat: Never line up milder beers alongside the stinky stuff. "You'd certainly want to avoid a Stella or a Corona with a Liederkranz or a Limburger," Koch warns. "The cheese would just overwhelm the beer."

Even then, it's hard to complain. Unless, of course, you'd prefer some whine with that cheese. \*

Timberline Lodge & Ski Area: Located near the top of Mount Hood, 55 miles east of Portland, Timberline is the only resort in North America open virtually year-round for snow sports. Historic Timberline Lodge is also a great place to stay and explore.

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



### MARCH MADNESS

### >> The NCAA Division I Men's Basketball

Championship was launched in 1939, with the University of Oregon taking the national crown amid seven other competitors.

While the championship had a slow start, today the event, commonly known as March Madness, is arguably America's most popular sports tournament. This year, 68 teams will compete to reach the Division I Men's Final Four in San Antonio, and then to come out victorious with the national title.

From the four games starting March 13 this

year that decide the 16th seeds in each of the tournament's four divisions, through to the title game on April 2, the event creates more than just excitement. It's also a financial bonanza. The NCAA has a 14-year, \$10 billion contract for the broadcasting rights. The tournament is expected to earn broadcasters more than \$1 billion in advertising revenue.

Widespread parity has made this year's tournament more difficult than usual to predict. Still, it appears that Michigan State, Villanova and Virginia may have a slight edge. ズ

The following are a few facts about the tournament; some of which may help fans do better with their brackets this year.



- The tournament was first known as "March Madness" in 1982, when announcer Brent Musburger, who had heard the term in reference to the Illinois state prep basketball tournament, decided to use it during an NCAA game broadcast. The rights to the term eventually had to be settled in court.
- Since the field expanded to 64 teams in 1985, only once have all four regional No. 1 seeds made it to the Final Four (2008). Also, a 16th seed has never upset a No. 1 seed.
- If you're looking for upsets, check out the games that feature No. 5 seeds vs. No. 12 seeds. In the last five tournaments, No. 12s have won nine of 20 such games (45 percent).



- Championship teams, traditionally, cut down the nets as souvenirs. Now, the winning team also gets the option to buy the entire court floor (which is then sometimes auctioned off).
- The tournament can be hazardous to the nation's economic health. According to a 2016 study by the outplacement job firm Challenger, Gray & Christmas, the loss of productivity during just the first week of March Madness has been estimated to cost employers nearly \$4 billion.

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### TRUCKS GET A LIFT

The Ram 1500 and Chevy Silverado have been redesigned to meet more needs

>>> The workhorses of America, full-size pickups, are rapidly becoming leaner and more fuel-efficient. What makes this all the more impressive is that the trucks are providing the same form and function we've come to count on—even adding capabilities. Here are some ways the 2019 models of the Ram 1500, available this spring, and the Chevrolet Silverado, available this fall, are getting the job done.

### **RAM 1500**

Cabin Comfort: The new 12-inch Uconnect touch-screen infotainment system puts a tablet at the center of the dash, and with Harman Kardon audio and active noise cancellation, the interior ambiance is top-notch. Crew cabs offer a clever reclining rear seat, with seat heaters and coolers available.

- **Hybrid Help:** Many versions of the Ram now include eTorque, a simplified hybrid system that essentially takes the place of an alternator, giving the engine an electric-motor boost when needed. Unlike some hybrid systems that are too delicate for the tough stuff, this one actually helps drivability.
- Steel Strong: The Ram's body, frame and box are made mainly of steel, but between a high-strength-steel frame and some use of aluminum and composites elsewhere, Ram has cut about 225 pounds off of last year's models.
- Smooth Hauler: A taller bed adds space and helps aerodynamics, while handy RamBox storage compartments now have their lids integrated into the side of the bed. Available air suspension helps smooth out the drive with or without cargo.



### **CHEVY SILVERADO**

- What's Inside: While the cabin's dimensions haven't grown by much, crew cab models have larger rear doors and 3 inches more rear legroom than previous models. Heated seats and rear-seat climate-control vents keep back-seat passengers comfortable.
- Running on One Cylinder: Dynamic Fuel Management can run the V-8 engine on as little as one cylinder—or any variation of cylinders. And an available 10-speed automatic transmission helps raise the bar for performance and fuel economy.
- Weight Watcher: The "mixed materials" philosophy for the Silverado—also used in the Corvette—chooses materials that optimize weight, safety and durability. Hinged parts, such as the hood and doors, are aluminum for weight savings, while the body is steel. The net result is a weight loss of nearly 450 pounds.
- **Expansion Plan:** The redesigned cargo bed is deeper, nearly 7 inches wider and has up to 23 percent more cargo volume compared to previous models. Chevy also included 21 tie-downs in the cargo bed, 12 of which can hold 500 pounds each. Some





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


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Here are adventures on each island that can be experienced by every member of the family. These activities are sure to create special memories that will last a lifetime.

## 'ahu

Few Hawai'i activities are more iconic than surfing on O'ahu's fabled North Shore.

Hans Hedemann Surf School, located at Turtle Bay Resort, operates surfing lessons, usually at Kuilima Point, on the hotel's property. In fact, the hotel is so close to the action, you can enjoy a drink at The Point, Turtle Bay's poolside bar, while watching surfers slicing through the waves only yards from the hotel's patio.

Inside the bay, the break can be perfect for beginners, with a section of gentle, rolling swells that are easy to catch on longboards during spring, summer and fall. It is generally a safe location for kids and beginners to learn the basics of surfing. However, large winter swells that occasionally hit this reef should be reserved for experts. When the waves get too large, instructors use another protected bay at the resort that is safe for beginners.

"The biggest concern people have is that the waves will be too big and dangerous," says Matt Maletta, an avid surfer and the school's operations

manager at Turtle Bay Resort. "But we only take them to safe locations."

The Ohana (family) lesson is the best option for first-timers, multigenerational groups and families. The two-hour lessons include everything you need to surf—reef-walker shoes, rash-guard shirts and a surfboard. You even get photos of you surfing and a souvenir T-shirt or hat to take home.

The private classes start with basic water safety lessons on the beach before paddling out with lifeguard-trained and CPR-certified instructors. And you don't need to be a guest at the hotel to book a lesson.

Catching your first wave, feeling the power of the ocean as you ride a wall of water toward shore, will be one of those experiences that you'll savor for years—and that is sure to lure you back to these islands in the future. After your surfing lesson, travel the 5 miles to the Banzai Pipeline Beach on O'ahu's North Shore to watch expert surfers take on the barrel waves. From October to April, the waves can reach up to 30 feet tall.

"Surfing is Hawai'i's gift to the world, and people want to experience that," Maletta says. "It's the ultimate thrill, and where better to do it than in Hawai'i, where the tradition started?"

Another North Shore attraction is touring the Waimea Valley, one of Oʻahu's few remaining intact  $\alpha hupua'a$  (ancient Hawaiian land divisions). The lush valley is owned by a nonprofit Native-run entity and has botanical gardens with more than 5,000 varieties of tropical plants and a 45-foot-tall waterfall.


A special event in the valley is the Moon Walk, in which you hike through the verdant lands under the glow of a full moon. Park staff lead the walks, which begin at 7:30 p.m. on full-moon nights from April to October. The paths are paved and parking is free. Arrive earlier and have dinner at the Proud Peacock restaurant, which offers a buffet that includes Waialua-grown beet salad, miso eggplant, steak, chicken and liliko'i cheesecake.

An adventure of a different kind is in the town of Kapolei in southwest Oʻahu. The Coral Crater Adventure Park is a 35-acre outdoor playground with six ziplines, off-road ATV trails and an Adventure Tower with an 18-element aerial challenge course that kids as young as 6 can tackle. Kids must be at least 4 to use the climbing wall.

The park also has sunset cruises, with snorkeling, a sunset bonfire and a small petting zoo. On Saturday nights, it hosts the Zombie Apocalypse Mission, a video-game-style adventure in which participants gear up and jump into ATVs and onto ziplines to save a zombie-infested village.

A short distance east of Coral Crater is where you'll find a train ride that offers a unique and historical way to explore southwest O'ahu. The railway line was restored by the Hawaiian Railway







Society, and on weekends, the nonprofit gives rides in modified U.S. Army flatcars pulled by a restored diesel-electric locomotive.

From the late 1800s to the mid-1950s, trains transported workers, equipment and agricultural goods all around the island. O'ahu Railway & Land Co., one of the island's main rail carriers, operated these tracks until 1947.

The Hawaiian Railway Society restored 6.5 miles of the track and in 1976 started offering 90-minute narrated rides through this oft-missed stretch of shoreline, through residential Kapolei, across the resort town of Ko Olina and past the majestic Wai'anae Mountains.

Every second Sunday of the month, you can book a seat on Parlor Car 64, built in 1900 for the Oʻahu Railway founder Benjamin Dillingham. This was his personal coach, equipped with a pantry, bathroom and large observation platform. Queen Lili'uokalani, the last monarch of Hawai'i, was a guest aboard this 14-seat car.

The most popular rides on this historic line are the 3 p.m. Saturday and Sunday trips, which offer stops at the Two Scoops Ice Cream Parlor at Ko Olina for servings of its tasty treats.

One of the best ways to experience the natural beauty of Maui is by hiking. The island boasts an array of trails, from the easy strolls through 'Īao Valley State Monument in West Maui to the challenging 8.6-mile trek along Kaupō Trail in Haleakalā National Park.


There are also dozens of state trails on the island that are easily accessible and great for families. Waihe'e Ridge Trail is a steep path that goes up the windward slope of West Maui, with views of the rainforest valley, Haleakalā and the 270-foot Makamaka'ole Falls in the distance. Trails through the Polipoli Springs State Recreation Area in Kula take you through groves of cypress, cedar and pine trees, with some views of other parts of Maui, as well as Kahoʻolawe, Molokini and Lānaʻi islands on clear days.

If you want to know what trees you're walking past, or the legends behind the mountains you see in the distance, choose a guided tour. Hike Maui has been offering guided hikes on the Valley Isle for more than 35 years, from a short 1-mile walk through a rainforest to an all-day trip with a van

tour of the Hāna Highway and a trek through a bamboo forest on the Pipiwai Trail in the Hāna area, which culminates at a 400-foot-tall waterfall. Hike Maui also has an outing in which you kayak along Maui's rugged coastline, snorkel in areas with Hawaiian green sea turtles and hike through a rainforest to a waterfall.

"We think hiking is the best way to experience all that Maui has to offer," says Heidi Pool, general manager at Hike Maui. "When hiking on Maui, you are immersed in natural surroundings that arouse the senses."

The most popular guided hike is the East Maui Waterfalls & Rainforest Hike, in which you follow two streams through a verdant area—past banana and coffee trees and patches of fragrant yellow ginger-to several waterfalls, the tallest of which is 40 feet. Hike Maui is the only tour operator with permission to access two of the more spectacular falls along this trail, which runs through private property. "Maui has something for everyone in 727 square miles," Pool says.

One of the island's most fascinating experiences is to explore the undersea world with Atlantis Submarines. The service offers tours, including a 1.5-hour trip from Lahaina to the Carthaginian II, a whaling ship resting on the ocean floor, about 97 feet down. The steel-hulled, two-masted schooner is part of an artificial reef about a half-mile off Lahaina's harbor, in a location specifically chosen for its lack of coral reefs and marine life.

Today, the Carthaginian II is frequented by sting rays, yellow tangs, eels, parrotfish, and an array of other marine species. Atlantis takes you right to the sunken ship in its 48-seat submarine, with minimal impact to the environment—and no scuba training required for you.

Back on land, Maui is a great location to learn about the state's rich paniolo (Hawaiian cowboy) culture with a horseback ride at Piiholo Ranch, a large property in Makawao on the slopes of Haleakalā. This family-owned ranch boasts more than 800 acres of riding trails, and a two-hour private horseback ride takes you up hillside pastures, through fragrant eucalyptus forests, and among native koa and 'ōhi'a lehua trees, with stunning views of the ocean.

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Experience Hawai'i Island in exciting ways aboard Paradise Helicopters, with trips that range from flying along the coastline, right, to taking a tour of the latest lava flow, below. A Hawaii Forest & Trail guide, below right, explains the island's fascinating environment.





the endangered nēnē (Hawaiian goose), or an 'apapane, a species of Hawaiian honeycreeper bird endemic to Hawai'i.

You can even be a cowboy on Tuesdays and Thursdays and help round up the cattle and move them to new pastures. After a couple of hours of cattle work, you'll finish the day with a picnic lunch back at the ranch.

# Hawai'i Island

Measuring more than 4,000 square miles, Hawai'i Island is the largest of Hawai'i's eight main islands. In fact, it is nearly twice the size of all the other islands combined.

Such size has led to great variety. The island has active volcanoes, lush valleys and black-sand beaches. It's nearly impossible to see all of these splendors in one day.

Unless you're in a helicopter. Paradise Helicop-

ters specializes in tours over the best of Hawai'i Island, from flying over Kona's Coffee District and past cascading waterfalls to a stop at a koa forest along the Hāmākua Coast so you can plant a legacy tree and to help make sure the carbon from your ride is offset. Paradise also offers various opportunities to see the island's flowing lava from above, and the Volcano by Air & Land Tour stops at a gorgeous black-sand beach, as well.

Another form of aerial fun in Maui can be found at the Kohala Zip & Dip Adventure with Hawaii Forest & Trail. This all-day tour in Kohala combines three hours of ziplining in a private nature preserve with a relaxing hike to a swimming pool beneath a cascading waterfall.

Start by zipping along nine lines and walking across five sky bridges with gorgeous views of the forest. Experienced guides share their knowledge about the area's natural and cultural history.

Finish the day with a stroll to a secluded water-

fall, a dip in a swimming hole and a picnic with a view. This tour packs plenty of adventures into a single day. "One of the most common pieces of feedback we get from parents of teens is, "This is the longest I have seen my children not look at

their cellphones in a long time," says Jason Cohn, who handles sales and marketing for Hawaii Forest & Trail.

What makes this adventure particularly appealing for families is that it's fun and educational.

"We believe nature is the best teacher, and Hawai'i's landscape is loaded with really captivating stories and lessons," says Rob Pacheco, president and founder of the program. "Our guests have fun, make lifetime memories and take post-worthy selfies. But the most impactful things they take home are new understandings about themselves, about Hawai'i and about our world."

A different kind of up-close view of nature is experienced when you swim with one of the largest fish in the ocean—at night. Fair Wind Cruises features night snorkels with manta rays, considered by some travel experts to be one of the "Top 10 things to do in your lifetime."

The eco-responsible tour is for those 7 and older and begins at Keauhou Pier, just after sunset. The



5-minute boat ride into the bay takes you to a spot about 75 yards offshore where these gentle giants congregate in Keauhou Bay.

Don snorkel gear and fins, jump into the ocean and then wait for giant manta rays to appear. The fish can have wingspans reaching up to 20 feet. It's a thrilling experience. You need some snorkeling experience to take part in the night swim. Fair Wind advises that if you are unsure of your snorkeling abilities to begin with a day snorkeling trip.



You may feel silly wearing a hard hat and a headlamp with a swimsuit, but you'll need all three when you go tubing down a sugar plantation irrigation canal on the former Līhu'e Plantation.

Kauai Backcountry Adventures offers innertube tours of this system of tunnels and canals, all excavated by hand in the 1870s. You slide down small falls and through long, dark tunnels—hence



the headlamps-at a pace that varies from lazy river to moderately fast-moving current. The relatively warm water flows down from Mount Wai'ale'ale, one of the world's wettest peaks.

Backcountry has exclusive access to the former plantation land's 17,000 acres. The experience of cruising down canals, through beautiful farmland, is appropriate for family members ages 5 and up.

Guides from Kauai Backcountry Adventures lead a tour group down tunnels and canals on the former Līhu'e Plantation.













Another must-see attraction on Kaua'i is exploring the wild and rugged Nāpali Coast. Book a trip with Kauai Sea Tours, from cruises along the coastline on the 60-foot Lucky Lady catamaran to adventures on 24-foot rigid-hull rafts, much like those used by the U.S. Navy SEALs.

Licensed captains and experienced crews take passengers through sea caves and under waterfalls (when possible), with some raft cruises stopping to snorkel and have a picnic onboard.

It's not uncommon to see spinner dolphins or green sea turtles swimming in the waters off Kaua'i's coast. Learn about the history and cultural significance of the area, while experiencing the island's spectacular beauty.

Kauai Sea Tours features three-to five-hour whale-watching tours on Kaua'i's south shore and a four-hour sunset dinner cruise that includes a ride past the dazzling Nāpali cliffs as


the captain entertains and educates guests about the area's history and folklore.

Some dinner cruises also include stops at waterfalls, sea caves and pristine beaches, with a chance to snorkel and play in the water. A buffet dinner is served and later the sun sets as the ship heads back to port.

The island of Kaua'i has many other locations






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where you can marvel at nature's handiwork. Among them is Waimea Canyon on the island's west side. Often referred to as "The Grand Canyon of the Pacific," the canyon is, indeed, grand, stretching 14 miles and measuring a mile wide and more than 3,600 feet deep. From various lookout points on the way to Kōke'e State Park, you can marvel at the stunning vistas of the canyon's crested buttes, rugged crags and deep valley gorges, with Waipo'o Falls in the distance.

If you want to get closer to the action, take a 3-mile hike to Waipo'o, an 800-foot cascading waterfall. The hike will take you through rainforests, beside an 'awapuhi ginger-lined stream and along the canyon rim to a beautiful pool just above the falls.

However, due to possible flash floods, hikers are advised not to swim in the pool.

Or consider the more challenging Awa'awapuhi Trail, a 3-mile hike that starts at an elevation of 4,120 feet in Kōke'e State Park and descends to the valley ridge of Nu'alolo at about 2,500 feet.

You can hike the trail on your own, or you can book a guided tour with many outfitters, including Hike Kauai with Me, a small operation that specializes in trips through Waimea Canyon.

The trail has amazing views of fluted ridges and sheer pali (cliffs) into Awa'awapuhi and Nu'alolo valleys and continues down through a rainforest and into a dry wilderness area rich with native

plants, trees and birds, including the endangered 'elepaio (monarch flycatcher).

No matter what island you visit, Hawai'i offers one of the most beautiful settings in the world to experience an adventure that is just right for the whole family. Next time you are in the Aloha State, be ready to create exciting memories you will always cherish. ⊀

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"We have a game trail running under the house," Paul says, describing how architect Tom Kundig "bridged" the residence over the trail to allow animals to travel between the mountains and the river. "We see deer, bobcats, wild turkeys and, of course, moose." On that particular autumn day, the moose caught its own reflection in the dining room window and, mistaking it for a rival animal, started to approach with agitated interest. "I just reached over, pushed a button, and a set of exterior shades came down. The reflection disappeared, and the moose went on his way."

A small but thoughtful detail, the shades, when drawn, block out 97 percent of the outside light, but the material's transparency allows the family to take in valley, mountain, forest, river and city views. As part of Kundig's design plan, the upper portion of the structure (which contains a spacious master suite) is more private, while the lower level (which consists of the kitchen, dining and living areas) is more transparent, with glass on three sides.

"The main driver in my work is always context," Kundig says. "I think it's important not to compete with the landscape—built or natural—and to acknowledge the place of architecture within the larger context."

It's an approach that Paul's family appreciates throughout the year. "In

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

summer, we see the most beautiful sunsets," Paul says, "and in winter, when the weather turns cold, it's like being inside a snow globe." Kundig also added a pool, outdoor kitchen and fireplace, as the homeowners entertain often.

"Our house has become a bit of a hub for family and friends," Paul says. "On a summer weekend we'll spend half the day in the pool, then cook dinner, drink wine and watch the deer go by. When you're in a location like this, how can you not take advantage of it?"

Such is the sentiment among homeowners. As people lead ever busier lives, and space is at more of a premium, homeowners are turning to architects and designers to help connect their interior and exterior spaces in a seamless, easy-to-use way. And we're no longer talking about an open sliding door and some patio furniture.

"We are really seeing a blurring of the lines between the kitchen, living room and outdoor spaces," says Dean Jones, principal and owner of Seattle-based Realogics Sotheby's International Realty. Jones has worked in the luxury real estate market for more than 25 years, and has seen increased interest from clients in better utilizing outdoor space—not just as a separate entity, but as an extension of the main living quarters.

"Essentially, you have all of this extra square footage around the house, so why not use it? An outdoor kitchen or dining area is a disruption to the status quo of our daily lives. Areas like this create social opportunities—you're providing an environment for people to relax and enjoy each

other's company, and it's not just the same old meatloaf at the kitchen table on a Tuesday night."

While it's no surprise that those in consistently warm climates are tailoring their spaces to take advantage of sunny days and warm nights, homeowners in the Pacific Northwest also are embracing the indoor/outdoor lifestyle. As Jones notes, "What people often forget during the winter months is that this region is spectacular in the summer. When that sun comes out, it's even more important for people to take advantage of the time outside, because there are only so many months to enjoy it."

Below are some of the current trends in indoor/ outdoor integration, and input from industry experts about making it easier than ever to enjoy the space around you.

### Dining Alfresco

For Robin Milne, general manager of Park City, Utah's Promontory Club—a private luxury-home community—answering email and enjoying a cup of coffee next to her family's outdoor fire feature is a regular morning occurrence.

"Yes, I'm working, but I'm also outside, enjoying beautiful nature views and fresh air," she notes. "Given how busy and mobile people are today, there are two things we're noticing about how they are adapting their properties. First, people don't want to be stuck in home offices. They want more flexibility for how and when they work. The other big request we're seeing is catering kitchens and outdoor dining setups." For anyone who loves to throw parties but dislikes being stuck inside while



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the guests are gathered out back, an outdoor kitchen can be a welcome problem-solver. Architects and designers are finding ways to integrate appliances with plumbing, gas and electric needs as permanent fixtures in an outdoor area.

"People really like built-in barbecue stations with sinks and storage that complement the seating area," says Marc Rousso, president of JayMarc Homes, a Seattle company that builds custom and luxury homes. A high-end outdoor kitchen isn't cheap, but it's a solid investment that should increase resale value if the client decides to put the house on the market in the future. "We often use Lynx, Wolf and U-Line outdoor appliances, so there's a range in price," Rousso says, noting that "a rough estimate would be \$10,000 to \$20,000."

Aside from barbecues and stoves, Milne says she's noticed specialty items such as icemakers and wine coolers finding their way into the alfresco culinary scene. "Anything that makes it easier for the hosts to join the party is always popular."


### Room Extension

If you don't have the ability to extend your walls, consider knocking them out instead. Opening-glass-wall systems have become an increasingly common way to simulate the addition of square

footage without undergoing an extensive construction project. These walls, created by popular brands such as NanaWall, easily slide or fold open to create an open-air experience and connect a room in your house to the space outside.

If you're interested in a higher-end option, a custom sliding wall system is an Olson Kundig specialty. Phil Turner, the firm's resident "gizmologist," works closely with Olson Kundig architects to create these specialized features. Turner has worked with the firm for over 20 years, dreaming up creations such as a 300-pound window wall that opens with the easy turn of a salvaged irrigation pump wheel, and a hydropowered 14-foot-by-25-foot counterweighted 6-ton office skylight.

Even multifamily residences are embracing the "more glass" trend. At Fifteen Twenty-One Second Avenue, a 143-unit luxury tower in the heart of downtown Seattle, developers did away with traditional balconies, adopting "glass rooms" instead. Each glass-enclosed area has a folding window system at railing height that provides the ability to transform the solariumlike space into an open-air environment. These innovative additions allow residents to enjoy expansive views year-round, while staying cozy and dry in the winter and letting in fresh air during the warmer, drier months.



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### ≡ Real Estate

To the south at Danzante Bay, a premium resort near Loreto on Mexico's Baja Peninsula, contemporary residences are found in various settings. For instance, one home is in the secluded on-site canyon; another is situated on beachfront property; and one is tucked into the Sierra de la Giganta mountains. Luxury villas designed by Arizona-based architect Kevin B. Howard have a contemporary Baja style, with double-height ceilings and expansive walls of glass that open to stunning views.

"It's drawing off the Polynesian sensibility of the lanai as part of the home, as a place of gathering," says Dean Jones of Realogics Sotheby's International Realty.

### Maximizing Square Footage

Space seems to be at a premium in all types of homes these days, including in apartment and condo buildings. While high-end complexes are often located in or near cities replete with cultural activities, easy transportation and stellar restaurants, the trade-off can be less access to outdoor space. In response, many developers are opting to forego individual unit balconies, instead offering residents ample shared amenities such as rooftop decks, dog runs, gyms and communal spaces with outdoor kitchens.

"We're seeing the elimination of classic penthouses where only a fortunate few can enjoy lots of space and city views," says Jones. "Developers are looking to spread the value of that top level across 300 or 400 units and give all their tenants access to the space."


He notes that the anticipated Nexus, a 41-story condominium high-rise slated to open in Seattle in 2019, includes the Sky Parlor: a

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covered exterior living room with landscaped lounge areas, a fire pit and an outdoor media screen.

At the Gridiron Condos in Seattle, a project by award-winning local developer Kevin Daniels, the design team drew aesthetic inspiration from the surrounding historic Pioneer Square neighborhood and Puget Sound just blocks away.

"We were responding to the building's context in the neighborhood," says Jennie Gruss, interior designer for the project, which retains the 102-year-old restored Johnson Plumbing Building as its base. "There was a focus on the connection to the waterfront, which was a huge driving factor in the design of the building, as well as little details throughout."

A rooftop amenity space features breathtaking views of Elliott Bay, while the carpet tiles in washes of blue, green and gray mimic the ever-changing waters outside. The rooftop has a glassed-in fitness room with cardio machines and weights, so you can watch the sun rise or set while you work out.

Scott Brewer, the vice president of construction at Continental Properties, a real estate development firm in Bellevue, Washington, says he's noticed a shift in the ways tenants are using communal space.

"We used to put in a lot of swimming pools, but people weren't using them as much," he says. "Fireplaces, amenity rooms that allow tenants to mingle and meet new people, and rooftop decks are some of our top features now."

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
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


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Most companies need a new office space at some point, and real estate experts have a lot of insight to share about relocating—especially in the bull markets that many cities in the western United States are experiencing right now. Pros say there are many ways companies can maximize opportunities when leasing new spaces during the current boom. Here are some of their tips.

# Be Patient

Finding the right office space is a little like finding the perfect partner: You know you'll get there eventually, but it can take time—and the journey may be riddled with challenges along the way.

Gregory Steinhauer, president of American Life Inc., the developer that opened the 18-story Hawk Tower building in Seattle's Stadium District in February, says the process should begin months or more in advance of when you hope to sign a lease

on a new space, often with some forecasting to determine the extent to which your company will need to expand or contract.

"Developers like us usually work two to four years in advance, so it's a good idea for companies to think that far ahead, too," Steinhauer says.
"You can't control a market, but you can control your approach."

# Be Open to Submarkets

When it comes to real estate, company officials may benefit from keeping an open mind about what are known as submarkets—finely defined neighborhoods that are near high-demand areas.

Take the Los Angeles area, for instance. Santa Monica and Century City are two of the hottest neighborhoods in the region right now. But brokers report there are deals to be had in Culver City, El Segundo and other areas that are nearby. In some

# Take Amenities into Account

As important as location can be in selecting new office space, companies

should not ignore the amenities that each potential space offers. At some buildings, the package might include a state-of-the-art fitness center and on-site dry cleaning. At others, the most significant amenity might be proximity to public transportation—especially if yours is a workforce that relies heavily on not taking a car.

Owen Rice, executive vice president at Hughes Marino, a broker in Seattle, says that in many cases, amenities are as critical to a lease decision as the price per square foot.

"You want a space that's going to accommodate

cases, per-foot rents could be half as much in these peripheral markets.

"Per-square-foot savings can still be found, but in emerging submarkets—particularly those on the West Coast—it's getting more and more difficult," says Kip Spencer, director of leasing and marketing for Seco Development, a real estate developer in the Puget Sound area. Spencer's company is developing Southport, a major business park situated on the south shore of Lake Washington in Renton, about 10 miles south of Seattle. "Different submarkets have different dynamics to them," he says.



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the type of people you're trying to attract," he says.

Dario Svidler, senior vice president of Pacific Union International, adds that he always advises clients to evaluate office space by where their people can walk to eat. "You can have the nicest office building in the city, but if employees have nowhere to walk to, they're going to be unhappy," he says.

# Lean on a Team

Finding and contracting new office space doesn't have to be something companies do on their own. Experts say one way to engender the best deal is for companies to put together an all-star advisory team to guide them every step of the way.

In most cases, this team should comprise at the very least a broker, an architect and a workplace strategist.

According to Ryan Harding, executive managing director at Newmark Knight Frank, a broker in Los Angeles, advisory teams first should help companies evaluate how many square feet they'll need. In some cases, he notes, this process could help target less space, not more.

"You might think, 'We have 20,000 feet now, and we're adding 30 people, so we'll need 26,000 feet,' but that might not necessarily be what you

really need," he says. "The right team will get involved and help a company get a realistic sense of what's up. You don't want to bite off more than you can chew."

# Codify Flexibility

Landlords often try to lock tenants into long-term lease deals to guarantee income for the duration of a lease. Real estate experts advise against entering into these longer contracts.

There are two main reasons for preserving flexibility in contract negotiations: The market could change, and a company's situation could change.

Rice, from Hughes Marino, says that as an alternative to long-term transactions, companies should place importance on maintaining flexibility through specific provisions in their lease documents.

Of course, companies should also be sure to read every line of a lease, and be aware that restructuring complicated facets—such as restoration clauses, subleasing clauses and landlord fees—has become standard.

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


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# Paths to Wellness

→ At the start of the year, you were in the exercise groove. You were fired up and feeling good while you fulfilled that resolution. But now it's March, and after being sidelined by an illness, work deadline or other event, you've lost your giddyup. Roadblocks are universal, so how do we maintain that eye of the tiger to keep going after our goals?

Staying positive and having a plan are keys, says Josh Fitchitt, a trainer at PRO Sports Club in Bellevue, Washington, east of Seattle. "Especially if it's a long-term goal, it can be that much harder to stay on plan, so consistency is ultimately what's going to get you there."

As a trainer, my job is to identify each client's unique health goals, pinpoint the barriers and create a fitness plan to get them exactly where they want to go. Whether clients are just starting to work out or have been training for years, maintaining motivation is what gets results.

I met with three fit folks to understand their biggest challenges when trying to stay healthy. Here are their experiences and some strategies that will help them reach their goals, even when motivation wavers.

→ With two kids, a demanding job at a large homegoods company and a busy travel schedule, Liz, 40, is basically Superwoman in a human body. She grew up as an athlete playing sports such as lacrosse and soccer. Now she channels her love of movement and competitive spirit into group fitness classes.

Liz aims to get in five classes a week, but she finds it challenging while having such a packed schedule and traveling 30 percent of the year. However, striking a balance between exercise, work and family is what gives Liz the energy to tackle her to-do list.

"If I don't work out, I don't feel as good, and I don't sleep as well," she says.

Science has shown that our mental performance is directly linked to our exercise routine. So if Liz wants to boost her brainpower, exercise will help get her there. Below are ways Liz can keep exercise a priority and stay on track, even when her schedule is packed or when she is traveling abroad.



### Liz's Motivation:

If Liz wants something done, it's got to be on her calendar. So she schedules workouts as if they were work meetings. ClassPass is a flexible fitness-membership app that lets her find and sign up for classes at different studios in her neighborhood. Signing up ahead of time gives her accountability, because it blocks out that time in her calendar and puts her money where her mouth is. What's worse than missing the post-workout

endorphin rush? Missing a workout and losing the money.

Boredom is Liz's other challenge. To keep her interest piqued and her fitness from plateauing, she needs to mix it up. In San Francisco, where Liz lives, there are plenty of new classes—from bootcamp-inspired workouts to Pilates. Switching up routines challenges muscles in new ways and is the secret to maintaining excitement for exercise when motivation is waning.

### **Liz's Fitness:**

On the road three to four months a year, Liz needs exercises she can take anywhere in the world. She uses workout time to explore the city, and running first thing in the morning is her go-to.

"I get to see the city wake up," she says. In fact, I talked to her after she had just run next to Mayan ruins on Mexico's Yucatán Peninsula. That view would motivate most people to do pretty much any exercise.

### **Liz's Nutrition:**

Seattle-based nutrition specialist Breanne Curran suggests Liz pack healthy options so that she always has a snack when traveling.

Amazing Grass packets take up little space but pack a big punch of vitamins and minerals. Curran suggests dropping one packet in a glass of water early in the morning and repeating that in the afternoon. This is designed to boost Liz's immune system, digestion and energy level.

# Portable fitness with trainer Anna

You can get in a great workout using just your suitcase. Trainer Anna Clausen Williams demonstrates how.

After a five-minute warmup, complete four sets of 10 repetitions of the exercises shown. Rotate through each exercise in a circuit, with little rest in between. Be sure to consult your doctor before beginning a new fitness regimen.

Pushup → Resting your feet on your suitcase makes pushups more challenging.

# Reclaiming fitness

→ After turning 50 and having a health issue, Kim is hitting reset and reclaiming her fitness routine. A transplant to the Pacific Northwest, Kim moved from Washington, D.C., to Seattle because she wanted to be outside more. She has hiked, skied, run races and taken fitness classes. But with starting a demanding job, balancing a family of four, and pursuing volunteer opportunities, exercise took a back seat.

"Exercise centers me and is part of my core identity," says Kim. So losing it felt like losing a piece of herself. She struggles to find a routine that gives her focused goals, and the structure and consistency she wants.

### Kim's Motivation:

Want to get somewhere? You'll need a map. Without a map, we take detours and shortcuts, and before we know it, we are lost. Kim's goal of staying active and feeling healthy is great, but it's too vague to pull her out of a cozy bed and into her sneakers for a jog on the darkest winter days she needs a fitness map that has a clear destination in mind.

"Once we know what the goal is, then we can create a plan and define it in detail," notes Fitchitt of PRO Sports Club.

Here's a WHY goal-setting exercise that Kim can use to get crystal clear on her aspirations.

W—What are your top-three health goals? Be as specific as possible.

H-How are you going to get

there? Break this into monthly,

weekly and daily goals to get you

Y-Why is this so important to you? Take a minute to visualize yourself reaching that goal. How do you feel? What are you doing? What will reaching this goal mean?

### **Kim's Fitness:**

to the bigger goal.

After health trouble, Kim realized exercise was nonnegotiable.

"We think we can drop exercise to make more time, but it really is a losing game," she says.

Exercise is a powerhouse when it comes to disease prevention and antiaging. Lifting weights builds and maintains lean muscle mass, which contributes to a healthy metabolism. Exercise also helps fight everything from heart disease to depression to diabetes.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends 150 minutes of moderate aerobic exercise and two periods of strength training weekly.

### **Kim's Nutrition:**

For Kim, the two most important things she can do are to focus on a healthy satisfying breakfast and to eat a nutritious dinner.

Rather than grabbing a muffin at the coffee shop, Kim should swap it out with a high-quality store-bought muffin, making sure it's high in fiber and low in sugar, such as a Flax4Life muffin. The fiber and protein will keep her

satisfied throughout the morning and help her avoid a midday sugar crash. For added protein, she could top it with almond butter.

With kids at home, quick, easy and nutritious dinners are essential for Kim. Nutrition specialist Curran tells her clients to focus on protein, veggies and healthy fats. For an easy-to-make healthy recipe, see page 118.

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# Pushing the limits

→ Michael is a 34-year-old fitness enthusiast who can be found running, hiking or playing soccer all year round. He and his wife moved from Chicago to Seattle for work, and as a director of marketing he is a 9-to-5 office warrior.

Michael loves to exercise and considers it "an act of meditation." But making time for recovery and reflection is a challenge. "It seems like weeks go by very fast, and I don't take the time to better understand what is working and what isn't," he says.

To maintain motivation, even for the fittest of folks, adding in daily, weekly and monthly reflection is incredibly important. The more fit a person, the faster his body adapts to workouts, so switching it up and continually adding challenge is a must to avoid plateauing and boredom.

### Michael's Motivation:

Reflections give us perspective to see where we can improve and an opportunity to celebrate all we are doing well. As the great Ferris Bueller says, "Life moves pretty fast. If you don't stop and look around once in a while, you could miss it."

Here is a quick reflection exercise that Michael can do while brushing his teeth or before bed.

Take two minutes to recap the day. Think through habits and actions you felt good about and that moved you toward your goals. Give yourself a mental high-five. Then identify areas for improvement or barriers to your goals, and think through how you can do 10 percent better tomorrow.

With this recap, Michael can anticipate potential roadblocks and create contingency plans.

### Michael's Fitness:

Michael does a great job of getting in the CDC's recommended 150 minutes of weekly aerobic exercise, but he is missing strength training in his routine.

Adding in a high-intensity interval strength-training circuit once a week will allow him to build muscle, improve his athletic performance on the soccer field, and help prevent injury in his everyday life.

High-intensity interval training (HIIT) is effective and time efficient because it features bursts of movement in short periods of time. One of my favorite forms of HIIT is Tabata. Developed by a doctor and researcher working with Olympic athletes, Tabata features a work-to-rest ratio of 20 seconds to 10 seconds.

### Michael's Nutrition:

With the amount of exercise Michael is doing, he needs to make sure he is energized.

Before a soccer game or a long bike ride, Michael should focus on eating 60 percent protein and 40 percent carbohydrates. To keep Michael's endurance up and boost his power on the field, nutrition specialist Curran suggests fitness bars that have a moderate mix of carbs and protein.

After a workout, Michael needs a balance of vegetables and protein to help his body recover and build muscle. One of the easiest ways to pack in protein is with a protein shake. Look for brands that are low in sugar and made with high-quality protein.

### Sure to be a HIIT

High-intensity interval training can be efficient and effective. Here's a sample HIIT workout.

Perform each pair of exercises for four minutes, alternating between A and B. Do A at an all-out effort for 20 seconds, rest for 10 seconds. Then do B as hard as you can for 20 seconds, rest for 10 seconds. Return to A and repeat. After four minutes, move on to the next pair of exercises.

(Note, this workout should be challenging, but not painful.)

- 1A) High Knees
- 1B) Squat Jumps
- 2A) Lunge Jumps
- 2B) Mountain Climbers
- 3A) Skaters
- 3B) Pushups


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# Healthy Food, Fast

 Top it all with some cashews and avocado.






# **Nutrition on the Go**

# Wine Country

Russian River Vineyards, Taylor Mountain, Sonoma Plaza / By CAREY SWEET

As I lounge on a comfy overstuffed armchair on the outdoor stone patio of Russian River Vineyards, I enjoy the beautiful views from this fabled winery in the Sonoma County town of Forestville.

Centered around an old family farm that began in the 1890s, the vineyards were first planted here in 1964. Recently, the winery has been lovingly renovated into a gorgeous destination cherished by locals and visitors.

My wine, a 2014 Estate Vineyard Merlot, has a velvety texture and concentrated dark-berry flavors that are kissed with a hint of lavender. The winemaker and winery partner-owner, Giovanni Balistreri, stops by to say hello and explain that the estate's Merlot vines are among the oldest in Sonoma County.

They look the part, with thick, gnarly trunks and roots that dig about 20 feet deep into the land's volcanic soils. Being close to the coast also allows the occasional fog to caress the fruit.

As I savor the wine, my dog sits

at my feet, hoping for nibbles from my cheese plate, with unique cheeses and herb crackers handmade by the winery's on-site chef.

The newly refurbished Russian River property boasts even more places for me to explore. I can relax at two new tasting bars with local art on the walls, and cuddle with the friendly charcoal gray cat, Truffles, that adopted the winery.

There is an outside bar in the back of the surrounding tasting garden, and a picnic area with a view of the estate's grounds.

Visitors can also tour the winery's heritage chicken coop and its

1.25-acre culinary garden full of fruits, vegetables, flowers, herbs and beans.

However, the winery's most interesting tasting lounge is its newest, located inside a rustic building resembling a hop kiln tower that had been used for barrel storage.

The pointy-roofed structure is a luxurious retreat with leather chairs, velvet chaises, antique wood tables and metal trunks. I am also drawn to a huge painting

hanging high on a wall that portrays a bull staring down at me, with bold intensity.

If these weathered wood walls could talk, they would assuredly tell me proud tales of an iconic property reborn to grandeur.

To the east of Sonoma County, over the southern flanks of the Mayacamas Mountains, the equally famous wine center of Napa County boasts hundreds of esteemed wineries. Together, Sonoma and Napa are the heart of California's iconic wine country,

and are home to more than 800 wineries. They are also among the state's leading attractions.



One of wine country's popular attractions is Taylor Mountain Regional Park, which opened to the public in 2014.

The park spans 1,100 acres of paradise in south Santa Rosa. In a salute to the area's agricultural roots, cattle still graze in the area, alongside the hiking, biking and



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horseback riding trails. And I enjoy playing the 18-hole disc golf course that traverses meadows, forested areas and various rock outcroppings.

Sonoma Plaza
Downtown Sonoma's
historic 8-acre plaza, anchored by
the impressive Sonoma City Hall,
is a great place to start a tour of
this town in the center of wine
country.

The plaza, and the surrounding businesses, are a treasure trove of shops, restaurants, art galleries and tasting rooms. The area is also near local wineries, vineyards and farm roads.

To explore the neighborhood, I like to hop on a rental bike from Wine Country Cyclery, about two blocks from the plaza. The shop offers various rental options, including trek, road, tandem and electric bikes.

I pick up a map and ride at my own pace, admiring the many storefronts and the area's historic Mission San Francisco Solano, which was first established in 1824. The town also has military buildings dating back to the 1800s.

One of the community's hidden gems is Mission Bell Farms, which is home to the Castagnasso Clydesdales. The private horse ranch is located about a block from the plaza, and as you ride down the street, you can often see the mighty white-legged draft horses in the ranch paddock.

Alaska Airlines (alaskaair.com) provides regular service to Santa Rosa, California, from cities such as Los Angeles and Seattle.



### More to See

The Art of Patrick Amiot (patrickamiot.com):
Amiot is a local hero in the town of Sebastopol for his whimsical, wacky and delightful sculptures, made from salvaged materials, which are on display in many public places. Stroll down the city's Florence Avenue for a particularly fantastic collection of Amiot's work, which is set in the artist's yard and in the yards of his neighbors.

The creativity and detail are remarkable, with sculptures such as a car salesman with miniature cars for teeth, and the sculpture at right. It features a dog, with a string of sausages trailing from its mouth, fleeing on a bicycle, presumably from the scene of the crime.

Cameo Cinema (cameocinema.com): For an eclectic mix of independent and studio films, I adore this historic 1913 movie palace, located in St. Helena. It has plush velvet love seats and a state-of-the-art sound system. For snacks, we can bring our own bowl to fill with Cameo's buttery popcorn (we get a discount, and reduce landfill waste). The theater also offers pastries, gelato, beer and wine.

Recently, I saw Sophia Loren at

Far Niente (farniente.com), the
spectacular Oakville winery in northern Napa Valley. The Italian movie star
is friends with the owners of this mansion
estate, which has 13 acres of gardens, elaborate
cellars, beautiful salons and 40,000 square feet
of caves. Specializing exclusively in Chardonnay
and Cabernet Sauvignon, the winery, which dates
back to 1885, is on the National Register of
Historic Places.

Frick Winery (frickwinery.com), located outside Geyserville, is one of my favorite wineries in Sonoma County. Specializing in Rhône varietals, the rural destination, part of the Northern Sonoma County Wine Road, beckons with vintages that include Carignane, Cinsault, Counoise, Grenache, Grenache Blanc, Mourvèdre, Syrah and Viognier grapes. You can sample some of Frick's many wine varietals in a quaint cottage at a tasting bar made from an old redwood wine tank.

Sipping extraordinary wines at K. Laz Wine
Collection (klazwine.com) in the Napa Valley town
of Yountville is one of my cherished indulgences.
Kerrin Laz, the former wine director for the gourmet food company Dean & DeLuca, offers about
500 rare and renowned labels, such as Abreu Vineyards, Dana Estates and Screaming Eagle.

The tastings are unique experiences that are by appointment and held in a lavish tasting room that includes a crystal chandelier. Plan to pay \$65 to \$325 per person for tasting six rare and truly special wines that can cost up to \$1,500 per bottle.

Mendocino County (visitmendocino.com), below left, is located along the coast to the north of Sonoma County and is the perfect getaway location. Home to some of the tallest redwoods in the world, the county has hundreds of miles of hiking trails, pristine beaches and a variety of wonderful wineries. The cozy

oped a sizable art community and is a popular location for Hollywood. It was used as the setting for the TV program *Murder, She Wrote* and for films ranging from *East of Eden* to Jim Carrey's *The Majestic*.

Pangloss Cellars Tasting Lounge
(panglosscellars.com) occupies a historical 116-year-old building in the town of
Sonoma. The large and handsomely appointed tasting lounge has rock walls, rustic timber supports and wood floors. It is also accented with vintage armchairs. I like to sit at a private table and relax

over wines paired with generously laden boards of pâté, charcuterie, cheeses and delicacies such as caviar.

Nearly 1,000 exotic animals, ranging from cheetahs, left, to monkeys and zebras, are located on the 400-acre preserve in the foothills of the Mayacamas Mountains. Owner Peter Lang offers tours of the preserve.

You can also enjoy the South African cuisine at the on-site Savannah Cafe and glamping in posh safari tents that have hardwood floors and private viewing decks. — C.S.





# San Francisco

Fisherman's Wharf, Coastal Trail, Cable Car Museum / BY JO PIAZZA

Standing inside the Musée Mécanique in the Fisherman's Wharf neighborhood, I feel like I've been transported back in time. There are more than 300 vintage items here, from coin-operated pianos to coin-operated antique arcade games, all of which visitors can play. Several items in the collection date to the 1880s, including a praxinoscope device that makes a sequence of still images look like they're moving.

I've brought my most skeptical friend with me, someone who thinks the wharf area caters only to out-of-towners. I direct him toward Laffing Sal, a 6-foot-tall mechanical doll that does exactly what her atypically spelled name

suggests. She laughs at you, cackles really. She's wonderful and terrifying all at once. "You win," my friend tells me. He's also enthralled by the vintage fortune-telling machines, the mechanical musical instruments and the black-and-white-photo booths at this family-owned arcade on Taylor Street.



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handcrafted in Italy, Madame Tussauds San Francisco, Ripley's Believe It or Not! San Francisco, and the Aquarium of the Bayplus phenomenal views of the Golden Gate Bridge, Alcatraz and Angel Island.

I recommend starting a visit at The Buena Vista cafe on Hyde Street-the place where Irish coffee was allegedly perfected in America in the mid-20th century. If you're craving chowder in a sourdough bread bowl, brave the lines at the Blue Mermaid for perhaps the creamiest concoction on the bay.

Grab a bucket of Trish's Mini Donuts for dessert as you stroll down Pier 39 to visit some loud and playful neighborhood residents: the sea lions. Locals and visitors alike can't help but smile at these boisterous beasts of the bay.



From atop a windswept cliff, I gaze at another phenomenal view. To the west, I see humpback whales breaching in the rolling whitecaps of the Pacific Ocean. To the northeast, the Golden Gate Bridge gleams in the sun, and 200 feet beneath me, waves roar against cliffs filled with sea caves and hidden beaches. The 3-mile Lands End Coastal Trail is a perfect urban hike on which to get your heart pumping.

The northwestern corner of the coastal trail descends to the ruins of the once glorious Sutro Baths, a public ocean pool and bathing area built at the end of the 19th century by silver-mining millionaire Adolph Sutro. Ocean tides filled the original seven pools with 1.7 million gallons of water. Today, the land by



the concrete remnants, beneath the iconic Cliff House restaurants, is one of the best places in the city to catch the sunset.

Cable Car Museum "This is the coolest thing I've ever seen." My friend's little girl looks up at me in awe as she stares at the giant wheels of cables that are in the process of lugging many of San Francisco's 40 total cable cars through the city streets.

Most visitors to San Francisco make it a point to ride one of the city's famous cable cars, but few have heard about the Cable Car Museum on Mason Street, which presents a fascinating and exhaustive history of the iconic public-transit system.

The museum is very much a tribute to the historic cars, including riveting information on the 1906 earthquake and its effect on the transit system. But the museum also overlooks machinery being used for cars operating today. People love seeing the inner workings of the system, and watching the cables and motors in constant motion as they move cable cars through the streets. \*

- > 100-foot Spire, evoking the Monterey cypresses that were planted at the Presidio in the late 1800s, can easily be visited by car, or via a 2.7-mile walking loop that combines sections of the Lovers' Lane, Mountain Lake and Upper Ecology trails. Popculture lovers visiting the Presidio will also want to pay tribute to the bronze Yoda statue outside of the Lucasfilm offices east of the Main Post.
- Seward Slides (sfrecpark.org/destination/seward-mini-park): Zoom down one of the two glorious concrete slides at the Seward Mini Park. The slides are about 30 feet long, and the ride (not for tiny tots) is best if you bring a piece of cardboard (old boxes work best) to slide down on. Adults at all children's playgrounds in San Francisco must be accompanied by a child.
- The Wave Organ (exploratorium.edu/visit/wave-organ): Watch ocean waves "play" the 25 PVC-and-concrete organ pipes in this acoustic sound sculpture crafted by artist Peter Richards and stonemason/sculptor George Gonzalez, former artists-in-residence for San Francisco's Exploratorium. The Exploratorium explains that



sound is created by the impact of waves against the pipe ends and the movement of water in and out of the pipes. The organ sculpture resides on a jetty (shown at left) near the Presidio. The jetty also offers a view of Alcatraz. -J.P.



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# Mammoth Lakes

Devils Postpile National Monument, Mono Lake, Horseback Riding / BY BILL FINK

Narrow, gray, hexagon-shaped columns tower 60 feet above me, as if ancient giants placed hundreds of fossilized churros here. But this curious formation, for which Devils Postpile National Monument was named, was actually caused by a basaltic lava flow that contracted and cracked as it cooled, breaking into pillars about 100,000 years ago. The pillars were subsequently carved and shaped by glacial activity.

I've taken a 45-minute Reds Meadow/Devils Postpile Shuttle ride from the base of Mammoth Mountain to the nearly 800-acre national monument, which is typically open from mid-June to sometime in October. After contemplating the columns, located near the ranger station, I fill my water bottle for the 2.5-mile (one way) hike to another popular landmark, 101-foot Rainbow Falls.

Plenty of casual hikers embark on this relatively mellow trek on a wide dirt trail at an elevation of about 7,500 feet. I see families, retired couples and a few backpackers on the path, which periodically offers views of the San Joaquin River. Towering pines provide me-and colorful chirping finches and warblers-with welcome shade spots before the trail arrives at sunbaked open fields.

I hear the thundering rush of Rainbow Falls before I see the 30-foot-wide cascade pounding into a pool below. I alternate between two viewing platforms, hoping for the ultimate Instagrammable shot of rainbow-creating spray.

I revel in this mountain paradise-feeling the power of the falls, viewing the rippling darkturquoise pool, and admiring the bright-green moss covering dark basalt rocks as I bask in the warm sunshine.


Another trail leads about 1.3 miles to Red's Meadow Resort & Pack Station, where you can enjoy a meal at the cafe and board a shuttle back to Mammoth

The resort's cabins and store have also made it a favorite stop for hikers detouring slightly from the nearby John Muir Trail, a 211-mile route that overlaps the Pacific Crest Trail for many miles.



Paddling Mono Lake

After renting my watercraft at Mono Lake Kayak Rentals, I paddle out onto the salty waters of the lake on a sunny spring morning. Sandpipers peck for bugs in the sand on shore, while flocks of California gulls swoop into the waters to breakfast on brine

shrimp before returning to lake islands where they nest. The gulls are among the hundreds of species found in the Mono Basin. Bird-watchers consequently flock to the lake, as well, particularly during the fall migration season.

I marvel at the expanse of around 70 square miles of turquoise waters as I paddle around otherworldly tufa formations that look like stalagmites rising from the lake, which reaches a depth of nearly 160 feet. The water is glass-smooth, undisturbed by fish, which are unable to live in the briny environment. The lake has two times the salt content of the ocean because streams bring minerals into the lake, but there is no outlet to carry minerals away.

Visitors can paddle the lake on a self-guided tour (best in the mornings before the wind kicks up), or sign up for interpretive canoe tours with naturalists from the nonprofit Mono Lake Committee, a citizens group dedicated to protecting the Mono Basin ecosystem.

Horseback Riding

Wranglers with the Mammoth
Lakes Pack Outfit provide mellow
horses for the eight of us riders
who have signed up for the
90-minute ride along Mammoth
Creek to the remnants of a late1920s to early-1930s gold-mining
operation in the Inyo National
Forest. As we ride along the forest
paths, a guide tells us stories


about the ranchers, cattlemen and miners who began traveling this part of the country in the 1800s.


At the Mammoth Consolidated Mine ruins, near the headwaters of the creek, we view the old bunkhouses and cabins, antique machinery and remains of an ore-processing mill—imagining ourselves as the original miners, bringing in supplies for the season. Cast-iron stoves were used for heating; there was no running water; and the miners often had to crack the ice in their washbasins on cold mornings, according to a booklet available from the Mammoth Ranger District.

Mammoth Lakes Pack Outfit offers a variety of rides, which can

range from a 20-minute walkand-lead experience to hourlong,
half-day and full-day rides. Visitors can also enjoy multiday horseback adventures, including a ride
through the 1800s gold-mining
town of Bodie—now the Bodie
State Historic Park. Other popular
multiday options include horse
drives—complete with chuckwagon meals and cowboy entertainment—to move the outfitter's
horses and mules from their
winter to summer pastures, and
vice versa.

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# Fresno

Vineyard Farmer's Market, Mariposa, Tower District / BY LEON KAYE

My friend Janet, visiting from the East Coast, looks around at all the jewel tones of Fresno-area agricultural gems: strawberries still glistening with morning dew; gleaming red cherries; and the last harvests of apples and Asian pears from the Sierra Foothills.

"The colors here will keep me busy on Instagram," she says.

I'm showing off one of my favorite parts of the city, the Vineyard Farmer's Market, open Wednesday afternoons and Saturday mornings year-round, and featuring items grown or produced within two hours of Fresno, which is in the heart of the fertile San Joaquin Valley. Depending on time of year, options at the market range from asparagus and berries to artisanal cheese and chocolate.

Mariposa Well-provisioned with selections from the market, Janet and I head about 75 miles north to the town of Mariposa.

John C. Fremont and Kit Carson discovered the rich Mariposa Vein in this area and opened the first mill to crush ore and extract gold in California, according to the California State Mining and Mineral Museum, which is located about 2 miles south of town.

Janet, an amateur geologist, is in heaven at the museum, which is the official mineral museum of California, and rotates displays of about 350 items from the 13,000 objects in its permanent collection. We gaze at the 13.8-pound Fricot "Nugget," which looks like a bird with its wings spread. Discovered in the mid-1860s, and named for its purchaser, Jules Fricot, it is believed to be the last intact mass of crystalline gold surviving from 19th century California.

We learn more about the California Gold Rush at the Mariposa Museum and History Center, home to relocated historical buildings such as a blacksmith shop. Other Mariposa-area attractions range from the Hideout Saloon to the Yosemite Ziplines and Adventure Ranch. And it's only about a 45-mile drive from Mariposa to Yosemite Valley, so many visitors continue on to the park to explore its wonders.

Tower District l've promised Janet some nightlife on this trip, so we head back to Fresno to enjoy the Tower District, a lively neighborhood named after the Tower Theatre, a 1939 Art Deco structure that was once a movie house. We start the night at Sequoia Brewing Company, relaxing with microbrews such as the light, smooth Sequoia Pale Ale and the Half Dome wheat ale while trying to decide among the multiple choices for entertainment.

In addition to live music at various nightclubs and bars, there's the district's eponymous theater—now the Tower Theatre for the Performing Arts-which hosts prominent touring musicians, comedians and other acts,



while the Good Company Players produces 12 theatrical productions each year. I think Janet may be realizing just how entertaining the Fresno area can be. \*

- Gazebo Gardens (gazebogardens1922.com): Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights year-round, the nursery, founded in 1922, hosts a beer garden with food trucks, and showcases local bands of varying genres.

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
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# San Luis Obispo

A Design Village, Bike Tour, SLO Arts / BY BARBARA BECKLEY

I should have realized this would be no ordinary hike. San Luis Obispo is no ordinary town. The combination of a rich history (which dates back to 1700s Spanish missionary settlement) and youthful modern-day energy from students studying at California Polytechnic State University (Cal Poly) has given the city and surrounding county a personality all its own. SLO, as the locals call it, is artsy, creative, entrepreneurial and above all fun.

A drive of about 3 miles from downtown brings me to the start of the Poly Canyon hike (also called the Design Village hike). I walk rural Poly Canyon Road for about 20 minutes, listening to birdsong and the gurgle of Brizzolara Creek down below. Then, rounding a bend, I come upon a fairy-tale-like valley dotted with weird, wonderful structures.

A stone arch, nearly hidden by trees, marks the entry to the Cal Poly Outdoor Experimental Structures Lab. A nearby sign lists the valley's 25 permanent installations and their student-architect creators from the lab.

Crossing the bridge under the arch, I make my way across grassy slopes. I watch a guy strike a Titanic "King of the World" pose atop the pointy end of a prowlike structure. A young girl climbs on the metal bars of a geodesic dome open to the sky on all sides.

The permanent works are supplemented annually during the Design Village competition (April 20-22 this year) hosted by the

College of Architecture & Environmental Design. Participants create "shelters" tied to an annual theme (this year's is "Balance"), and then inhabit them briefly. These structures are removed afterward.

After perusing the valley's permanent sculptures, I return the way I came. It's a gentle hikemore like a 2.5-mile roundtrip walk. And you'd never know you were on a university campus and just minutes from downtown SLO.



In the town of San Luis Obispo, biking is a way of life. To join the fun and explore the city on two wheels, consider taking the self-guided Historical SLO by Bike tour, along an easy 4.3-mile route that showcases the history of the city's downtown. Sites along the way include the Mission San Luis Obispo de Tolosa, which was founded in 1772.


Also on or near the route: the San Luis Obispo Railroad Museum; 19th century Queen Anne-style homes; and Dallidet Adobe and Gardens, the 1850s home of a French immigrant who was instrumental in founding the Central California wine region.

Many hotels provide bicycles to

guests. You can also rent them at several shops downtown. Pick up a bike trail map at the SLO Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center or download it at bikeslocounty.org.







SLO Arts The downtown SLO Arts District isn't only beautiful; it's also easily walkable. More than 70 pieces of public art line the streets, and the San Luis Obispo Museum of Art, along with private galleries, feature contemporary works.

Enjoy great performances at the San Luis Obispo Repertory Theatre and the Performing Arts Center San Luis Obispo. And catch popular musical groups at the downtown brewpub SLO Brew. \*

Craft Beer: Toast SLO's exciting beer scene. Tour on your own or join Hop On Beer Tours' (hoponbeertours.com) guided trips. Learn more at the downtown visitors center or at sanluisobispovacations.com.

**SLO Wine Country** (slowine.com): Many acclaimed wineries are within a short drive of town. Riboli Family Wines of San Antonio Winery has an excellent

tasting room about 30 miles north in Paso Robles.

Sunset Drive-In (facebook. com/sunsetdrivein): Enjoy one of California's few remaining outdoor drive-in movie theaters. This old-school largescreen venue has a concession stand and shows new releases regularly. -B.B.

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# Santa Barbara

Cabrillo Bike Path, MOXI, Funk Zone / BY ROB DUNTON

A few leisurely pedals and I'm coasting effortlessly with my wife and two boys along a scenic stretch of the 3.4-mile-long Cabrillo Beachway path, which parallels Santa Barbara's coast from the Andrée Clark Bird Refuge to Leadbetter Beach. From the refuge, where more than 200 bird species have been observed, the path winds past wide sandy beaches, rows of towering palm trees, a vibrant marina, a busy skateboard park, an array of restaurants and the city's 1872 Stearns Wharf.

Cyclists share this path with walkers, runners, inline skaters and people using surreys, Segways and electric bikes. Rentals are available from companies such as Wheel Fun Rentals, Segway of Santa Barbara and Pedego Electric Bikes of Santa Barbara.

I'm lucky to call this oceanside city home, and as our children have grown and become more bicycle and skateboard proficient, our family has enjoyed the Cabrillo path more and more. On any given afternoon, we may cycle past casual soccer matches, drum circles, acrobatic skateboarders, or teens practicing their slackline balance and stunts between some of the nearly 150 palm trees along the beach. Each Sunday, yearround, an extensive craft fair takes place along Cabrillo Boulevard, and in July, free Thursday-night concerts at Chase Palm Park bring the community together for picnics, music and fun.

If we pack along a few towels,



one of our leisurely bike rides can easily morph into a full day at one of the three beaches we pass: East Beach (a great playground and numerous volleyball courts), West Beach (adjacent to Stearns Wharf, which has restaurants, shops, a marine-themed museum and even a palm reader, plus easy access to kayak and boat rentals at the adjacent harbor), and Leadbetter Beach (easy-to-ride body-surfing waves and a cafe).

MOXI Two blocks inland from Stearns Wharf is the new familyfriendly MOXI—whose name is derived from various letters in its formal name: The Wolf Museum of Exploration + Innovation-and which offers 17,000 square feet of interactive exhibits that inspire curiosity, creativity and wonder.

MOXI's playful DNA is apparent in the building's architecture. It looks like a Pixar-inspired sandcastle. Inside, the engaging experiences include a 24-foot-long, 8-foot-tall playable guitar; an innovation workshop; a pinewood-derbylike speed track



(featuring interchangeable car parts and a photo-finish display); and a rooftop Sky Garden, with telescopes and hand-turned water turbines. Our family has an annual pass, and we often bring friends, family and out-of-town guests here—we have a blast every time.

### More to See

- Beach Walks (santabarbaraca.com/?s=beaches): At low tide, you can walk for miles along Santa Barbara's scenic coastline. Just confirm the tide tables in advance, and determine where you plan to exit—e.g., Hendry's Beach—for safety and for planning taxi or ride-share transportation back to your lodgings.
- Old Mission Santa Barbara (santabarbaramission.org): Established in 1786, the mission includes a lovely church with colonial-era art, and a museum with Native American and mission-era artifacts You can self-tour, and docent tours are available on certain days.
- Paddle in Santa Barbara Harbor (paddlesportsca.com): With the blue Pacific at your doorstep, take a closer look by renting kayaks or SUPs at the harbor. Also available are guided kayak adventures (paddlesportsca.com and sbadventureco.com), scuba diving (truthaquatics.net) and whale watching (condorexpress.com).
- Taco Trail (santabarbaraca.com/itinerary/ santa-barbara-taco-trail): The trail includes four great taco spots on Milpas Street, which serve items ranging from carnitas tacos to ceviche campechana (with fresh fish, shrimp and octopus). La Super-Rica Taqueria, known for its unique and flavorful dishes, has attracted celebrity devotees. - R.D.



Funk Zone MOXI is part of the Funk Zone, a three-by-four-block area, tucked between the beach and Highway 101, that showcases the talents of vintners, microbrewers, farm-to-table chefs, surfboard and SUP makers, visual artists and creative retailers. There are different theories about how the area earned its nickname. One holds that the name referred to the funky mix of dilapidated warehouses, surf shops, artists' studios, bars and restaurants that were prevalent in the mid-1990s-very different from the Spanish-style architectural guidelines followed in much of Santa Barbara's core.

My wife and I enjoy keeping up with the new arrivals in this eclec-



tic artisans district. Every time we go, we spot something new. Most recently, it was The Shopkeepers, a stylish store offering a diverse and changing mix of art, clothing, jewelry and assorted gifts. The shop is less than 500 feet from the popular Blue Door, which sells vintage and modern furnishings and accessories. Another time, we found ourselves in the midst of the bimonthly Funk Zone Art Walk. More than a dozen galleries and shops were hosting exhibitions of

contemporary artists.

When we go to the Funk Zone with the kids, we head to Mony's for tacos or Lucky Penny for pizzas. On date


nights, we beeline to Loquita for tapas or to The Lark for sensational cuisine featuring menu items that are locally sourced and responsibly grown.

The Funk Zone also contains a significant portion of the city's Urban Wine Trail. You can sample the premier offerings of around a dozen of the 200-plus wineries in Santa Barbara County. The Santa Barbara Wine Collective alone comprises a group of six area wineries, and the knowledgeable

wine steward or tasting room associate who pours the wines will be happy to wax poetic on each one, from how it was made to the soil in which the grapes were

Anyone with a passion for wine and fine dining could savor the Funk Zone for a whole weekend and still find more to do. In fact, I've lived in Santa Barbara for almost 10 years, and I've hardly scratched the surface of what's available in this ever-changing district. X

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





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# Los Angeles

Backbone Trail, Gamble House, Grammy Museum / BY MATT JAFFE

Ahead of me on the Backbone Trail, I see peaks covered in dense chaparral and canyons filled with sycamores. Ceanothus shrubs adorn the slopes with purple- and creamcolored blossoms, and infuse the air with a lilac sweetness. As I head deeper into the Santa Monica Mountains, I occasionally look south toward the ocean, which the afternoon sun has turned to a shimmering gold.

I'm hiking a section of the trail that crosses 11,501-acre Topanga State Park, mostly located within the Los Angeles city limits, and described as the world's largest wildland in a major city.

Although LA has nearly 4 million residents, and it's part of a metropolitan area where more than 13 million people live, I am enjoying a peaceful hike amid the calls of songbirds.

I accessed the eastern end of the 67-mile Backbone Trail at Will Rogers State Historic Park in Pacific Palisades, a tony section of Los Angeles. After passing the legendary actor/humorist's house (open for tours) and a lawn where fit folks were striking yoga poses in the shade of huge eucalyptus trees, I ascended about a mile on the park's Inspiration Loop Trail to Inspiration Point. The site offers commanding views of Los Angeles and Santa Monica Bay, so most visitors are content to end their hike here and return to the park's lower elevations to enjoy picnics, horseback-riding lessons, trail rides and polo matches.

But for me, the connecting
Backbone route—a federally
designated National Recreation
Trail—always beckons. From the
Inspiration trail, I followed the
Backbone north and then west to
Topanga State Park, with its

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soul-soothing mountain and ocean views. If I continued on the trail, whose final gap was closed in 2016, I'd pass through several more scenic state parks, as well as federal parkland, on my way through the Santa Monica Mountains to the western trailhead at Point Mugu State Park. Post-hike attractions there include several miles of shoreline, complete with dunes and sandy beaches, but since I'm not geared up to trek the remaining 64 miles of Backbone today, I double back toward the Will Rogers trailhead.

About a mile into my return, I come upon a jogger pausing at the bridge that spans a gorge at Topanga State Park's Chicken Ridge. He's fidgeting with his smartphone, working through the playlist, until a song suddenly comes blasting out of his earbuds.

Too perfect: It's California Dreamin'. And while I much prefer the sounds of nature, it's hard to argue with his song selection on a warm day in a lovely part of LA.

The Gamble House Many experts rank LA as one of the world's great cities for architecture, thanks to a rich mix of styles and to metro-area buildings designed by master architects ranging from Frank Lloyd Wright to Frank Gehry.

The Los Angeles Conservancy, a historic-preservation nonprofit, leads a variety of walking tours that explore such styles as Art Deco in downtown LA and Victorian in the Angelino Heights district.

In addition, numerous structures in the Greater Los Angeles area are worth visiting on your own. For instance, in Pasadena, I think the masterpiece is the

National Historic Landmark Gamble House, designed in 1908 by brothers Charles Greene and Henry Greene, for David Gamble and his wife, Mary, after David retired from his family's company: Procter & Gamble.

If, as Goethe said, architecture is frozen music, then The Gamble House is a symphony of light and wood. From the glow of its leaded art-glass entry doors, depicting a stylized tree, to the way sunlight washes over the exquisitely crafted interior of teak, mahogany and maple, the house plays many beautiful notes.


One-hour docent tours provide a great introduction, and for anyone interested in a more detailed look at the house, master woodworker Jim Ipekjian leads monthly three-hour "Details & Joinery" tours that bring alive the building's design and construction.



So you want to be a rock 'n' roll star? Or maybe a hip-hop producer? Just two blocks from Staples Center, downtown LA's premier concert venue, you'll find plenty of inspiration at the Grammy Museum, with four levels of artifacts, interactive displays and tributes to many genres of

The museum is as eclectic and energetic as the industry that it celebrates. For instance, you can play instruments such as the guitar, piano or drums, and try different audio effects.

The Grammy Museum's current exhibit lineup ranges from a look at Katy Perry's fashion

Newport Beach Gondola, Santa Ana Culture, Ballooning in Irvine / By Barbara Beckley

The lyrics of Nessun
Dorma ("None Shall
Sleep") from the opera Turandot
echo under a low bridge as a
gondolier takes my friend David
and me silently over the water.

As we glide toward the setting sun in a shiny, black Venetian gondola, I'm thinking that life doesn't get much better than this. Oh, yes, and we're clinking Champagne flutes in a toast to good times.

No, we're not in Venice, but our journey still feels luxurious and romantic. We are in Newport Beach, coasting through the beautiful canals of Newport Harbor with our guide, Greg Mohr, owner of Gondola Adventures. With a silver ice bucket chilling our Champagne, and chocolate-covered cheesecake and flourless chocolate torte with whipped cream also on board, we have slipped away from the dock on a 60-minute sunset cruise.

Mohr rows in the authentic Venetian style, with a single oar on one side of the stern.

"If you notice, the gondola is crooked," Mohr points out. Sure enough, we can see the bow twists slightly to the right. "Authentic gondolas are intentionally made this way to make them easier to steer with one oar on one side," he explains.

Mohr started his gondola business in 1993, and he prides

himself on sticking to tradition.

Many of his 14 gondolas are imported from Venice, and his straw hats are made by a top Venetian haberdasher. As he sings Italian arias, we discover that Mohr also has an excellent singing voice.

Boaters and passersby wave as we cruise past opulent waterfront homes, restaurants and marinas. Arriving at a bridge, Mohr says it's tradition that couples kiss as they glide under. David and I are just friends, but who's to reject tradition? So with every bridge, we sip our bubbly and exchange friendly smooches as Mohr serenades us. Along the way, we also pause to enjoy the desserts.

"Look, there's a message in a

bottle," Mohr says. Sure enough, a corked bottle (that Mohr released discreetly) floats past. I dip my hand in and retrieve it. Unrolling the parchment note, I read, "Dear Barbara, we are thrilled to have you enjoy your first gondola experience with us. Smooth sailing now and in the New Year." I am totally surprised and very pleased.

"It's a little trick I invented," Mohr explains. "We can do any message. Most often it's proposals and anniversaries, and occasionally, 'I'm sorry."

Lights reflect on the darkened water as we cruise back to the dock. Well-sated with desserts, we toast one more time to the wonderful memories we've made.





# Greater Palm Springs

Architecture and Martinis, The Living Desert, Off-Road Jeep Tour / BY BARBARA BECKLEY

"Palm Springs Midcentury architecture and the celebrity era of the 1950s and '60s went hand in hand," says Kurt Cyr, owner of the architecture-anddesign tour company Palm Springs Mod Squad, as our van turns into the stylish Vista Las Palmas neighborhood. "The celebrities, particularly in the Rat Pack led by Frank Sinatra and Dean Martin, came here to party ... in private," Cyr says. "By a stroke of luck, much of the architectural style of the day featured 'fortress fronts' without windows."

Cyr's Martinis and Mid Century Architecture Tour has barely begun, and already I've learned something new about my favorite architectural style. To prove his point about privacy, we pause at the low-slung, reddish-tan brick fortress front of 432 Hermosa, formerly the Dinah Shore Palm Springs Estate, built by influential Midcentury Modern architect Donald Wexler in 1964.

"Inside, it's all windows, as is former neighbor Kirk Douglas' Wexler-designed home, built in 1954," Cyr says.

With humor, architectural insights and insider stories, Cyr takes us on a 90-minute drive through Palm Springs' celebrity and architectural heyday. I ooh and aah over the jewellike Elvis Honeymoon Hideaway (so called because of Elvis' time there with wife Priscilla in the 1960s). The house, once called the House of Tomorrow or The Robert Alexander Estate, was built in the early 1960s by Alexander Construction Company, which was owned by Robert and George Alexander-important figures in the Palm Springs Midcentury Modern movement.

Cyr points out a clever aspect of the neighborhood's architecture. "The genius of creating one floor plan and making homes look different by changing the orientation relative to the street helped the Alexanders build more than 2,200 homes," Cyr says.

We pass dozens of these homes, now affectionately called "Alexanders," including houses that used to belong to Dean Martin and Marilyn Monroe. Each of them is recognizable as an Alexander by its angled roof with clerestory windows, horizontal stucco fascia and a low stone wall at ground level.

We also pass the ornate estate originally built for George R. Hearst (which echoes some details of his father's Hearst Castle). Cyr comments: "Hollywood Regency style, with Roman statuary and poodle-cut topiaries, was also very in, in the 1960s."

Across North Via Monte Vista, to the east, the buildings are predominantly Spanish Mediterranean villas inside walled gardens. "This is Old Las Palmas, where the stars came in the 1920s and '30s," Cyr says, pointing out the 4-acre "Il Paradiso" estate of Hollywood and Broadway star Ann Miller, and the red-roof-tiled hideaway that was once used by Elizabeth Taylor and Mike Todd.

Frank's Place Restaurant & Lounge (indianwellsresort.com): Enjoy nightly dinner shows at this retro-styled establishment at Indian Wells Resort Hotel. On Fridays and Saturdays, headliner Frank DiSalvo sings and celebrates Great American Songbook standards.

Indian Canyons Tribal Ranger-Led Hikes (indian-canyons.com): Learn about the desert through the eyes of the Agua Caliente Band of Cahuilla Indians. Walks depart at 10 A.M. into Palm Canyon and at 1 P.M. into Andreas Canyon, Friday through Sunday. Each hike takes about 1.5 hours and is about 1 mile long.

Palm Springs Aerial Tramway (pstramway.com): Enjoy sweeping valley views from what is touted as the world's largest rotating tram car as it rises to the Mountain Station, which features dining, shopping and more, at an ->

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
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- → elevation of 8,516 feet. From the top, hike among 50-plus miles of trails, including Willow Creek Trail, which reopened in 2017 in Mount San Jacinto State Park.
- Palm Springs Air Museum (palmspringsairmuseum.org): Explore exhibits of more than 50 vintage aircraft. Book a flight in a World War II warbird: the P-51 Mustang fighter plane carries one passenger. The C-47 SkyTrain transport plane carries five.
- Palm Springs Art Museum (psmuseum.org): Enjoy extensive art collections and take a docent-guided tour of Midcentury Modern architect Albert Frey's residence, Frey House II, which is located nearby. Or make a screen print related to the exhibit "Andy Warhol: Prints from the Collections of Jordan D. Schnitzer and His Family Foundation," March 3-May 28.
- Top-Notch Golf: Tee off at SilverRock Resort's Arnold Palmerdesigned 7,239-yard SilverRock Golf Course in La Quinta (silverrock.org) and the Classic Club in Palm Desert (classicclubgolf.com), both of which have stunning natural features and hosted past years' Bob Hope Classics (now known as the CareerBuilder Challenge). You can also enjoy the Clive Clark-designed Celebrity Course and the John Fought-designed Players Course at Indian Wells Golf Resort (indianwellsgolfresort.com), a past host of the PGA's Skins Game. —B.B.

Nearing the tour's end, we visit the Movie Colony East neighborhood to see Frank Sinatra's former home, Twin Palms, designed in 1947 by E. Stewart Williams and known for its piano-shaped pool. Then it's martini time at the Casablanca Lounge at Melvyn's, where the Rat Pack used to gather. Between sips, Cyr explains that the martini was the signature drink of the era for its elegance and sophistication. Capping the tour with a martini was a finishing touch that Sinatra himself would've likely found fitting.

The Living Desert Visitors enjoy wondrous flora and fauna and direct experiences with animals at The Living Desert Zoo and Gardens in Palm Desert. From jaguars to mountain lions to Grevy's zebras, this venue features a variety of species and provides insights about desert organisms. My favorites are the Arabian sand cats, which are said to be the ancestors of domestic cats. Family-friendly attractions include the endangered animalsthemed carousel, camel rides, opportunities to feed giraffes, and to feed nectar to lorikeets inside a large aviary.


New this year, the Total Adventure Package provides access to an unlimited number of visits to feedings and other attractions on the day of purchase.

Off-Road Jeep Tour

Adventurers can take the road less traveled (literally) through the scenic wilderness of Joshua Tree National Park, on the Wilderness Jeep Experience—Pinkham Canyon Trail, offered by ATV Experience. The four-hour excursion features gentle off-roading through Pinkham Canyon at the southern edge of the park, in an area that is rarely traveled. From a natural oasis, the route loops around the rolling hills of the Cottonwood Mountains, where the desert is rich with jumping cholla cactuses, creosote bushes and other indigenous plants—as well as varied geology. The tour is for two to four passengers per Jeep, and you can be picked up and dropped off at resorts. The trip culminates with a view of the entire Coachella Valley. I recommend it as a sunset tour, when the fading sun turns the hills pink, and the lights of the desert's cities twinkle across the valley. ズ

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# San Diego

Birch Aguarium, Downtown Waterfront, Balboa Park / BY DOUG HANSEN

A bronze sculpture depicting a life-size gray whale and calf, breaching out of an outdoor fountain, greets us at the Scripps Institution of Oceanography's Birch Aquarium in the La Jolla area, about 15 miles north of downtown San Diego. The statue reminds us that thousands of gray whales travel along the California coastline each year during their migration between Alaska and Mexico.

Inside the aquarium, my wife, Sharen, and I are fascinated by exhibits featuring nearly 5,000 fish and invertebrates (such as sea stars, sea urchins and jellies).

My favorite exhibit contains leafy sea dragons, which are native to Australia. They can reach nearly 14 inches in length, and they look like seahorses adorned with strands of seaweed. Just as with seahorses, it's the male sea dragons that "get pregnant." The female deposits her eggs on a spongy patch on the underside of the male's tail, with fertilization taking place during the transfer. The male carries the eggs—as many as 300—for six to eight weeks, until they are ready to

During mid-morning leopardshark feedings at an outdoor tank, we can see sharks zooming after chunks of fish, squid and shrimp that have been scattered into the tank, and July through September, we can return to take a morning snorkeling tour with an aquarium naturalist, to see pregnant leopard sharks-considered docile-in



shallow ocean waters off La Jolla's coast. Mid-October through mid-April, ocean experts from the aquarium provide insight and information during Flagship Cruises & Events' whale-watching tours from downtown San Diego.

Today, Sharen and I end our visit at the outdoor tidepool plaza, where kids and adults alike are exclaiming over close-up looks at animals such as hermit crabs, lobsters and sea stars. But for us, the best part of the plaza is the fabulous view of Scripps Pierwhere osprey, among the 500 bird species found in the San Diego area, like to perch-and the dazzling view of the Pacific Ocean. Aqua water transitions to deepblue sea not far from shore, and sunshine lights the horizon where ocean and sky meet in similar cobalt colors.

Just 2 miles north of the aquarium, we enjoy a different but equally fascinating sunlit scene. At the Torrey Pines Gliderport, paragliders and hang gliders with colorful sails leap from the cliffs to soar over the water. Tandem

#### More to See

- Cabrillo National Monument (nps.gov/cabr/ index.htm): Located at the tip of the Point Loma Peninsula, this area provides spectacular views of downtown San Diego, Coronado Island and the ocean. The park also has an 1855 lighthouse, a museum, walking trails and tidepools.
- Legoland California Resort (legoland.com): Located about 35 miles north of San Diego, the Carlsbad amusement park will be debuting new attractions such as the Lego City Deep Sea Adventure Submarine Ride this summer, with a real submarine going underwater amid 2,000 live animals, including stingrays and sharks.
- Maritime Museum (sdmaritime.org): See one of the world's finest collections of histor-



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

flights, as well as lessons, are available.

Next we head back south to the oceanside village of La Jolla. We find ourselves enthralled by a scene that includes rocky coastline, sandy beaches and protected marine reserves. We stroll along a coastal sidewalk above La Jolla Cove, looking down at pelicans, cormorants and barking California sea lions that are hanging out on rocks and a beige beach. Energetic sea lions dart through nearby frothy waves.



The curving cobblestone footpaths of downtown San Diego's Seaport Village—which is located on San Diego Bay and has been called the city's front porch—lead us past a hand-carved 1895 carousel, a balloon artist, and 50 unique shops, with products ranging from wooden toys, handcrafted candles and chimes to nautical decor, magic tricks and kites. (Many afternoons, you can test kites right outside the shop door, if weather conditions allow, before making a final decision.)

Another fun attraction is The Headquarters at Seaport, a former San Diego Police headquarters that now houses shops and restaurants, including one of my favorite Mexican dining spots, Puesto. Its creative takes on tacos include ingredients such as mushrooms, octopus, and even zucchini and cactus.

Special events at Seaport Village range from the annual Spring Busker Festival, March 3-4 this year, to the year-round Sunday Concert Series.

Seaport Village is located near



the south end of the mile-long waterfront Embarcadero, whose attractions also include launching points for harbor and whalewatching excursions; tours of historic ships such as the 1945 USS Midway aircraft carrier; and ferries offering 15-minute rides to Coronado Island. Sharen and I enjoy strolling 1.5-mile Coronado Beach, whose wonderful expanse of soft sand derives its silvery color from mica.

Balboa Park We like to arrive early at the 100-acre San Diego Zooone of the many attractions in famed Balboa Park, just north of downtown San Diego—to ensure we have ample time to explore. I'm captivated by the variety of species among the 3,500 animals. We watch tarantulas crawl and giant Galápagos tortoises lumber. We see hippos yawn, koalas cling to tree branches and knobby-kneed pink flamingos walk in water.

We see bear species-grizzly, polar, Andean and giant pandawith impressive claws, while big graceful cats at the zoo include leopards, jaguars, cheetahs and

- > ical and replica ships and submarines, including the 1863 Star of India, at this "floating museum" on the downtown San Diego waterfront.
- Mission Bay Park (sandiego.org/missionbay): Twenty-seven miles of shoreline, with 19 beaches

and eight designated swimming areas, make this a popular park (right). Rentals are available for numerous types of water activities, and you can also take a self-guided tour of park wildlife preserves.



Old Town (www.parks.

ca.gov/?page\_id=663): Old Town San Diego State Historic Park is the site of one of California's first European settlements, dating to 1769. Located 4 miles from downtown, the park has historical buildings, plus shops, museums and Mexican restaurants. Nearby is Whaley House Museum, built in the 1850s and said to be haunted by several Whaley-family ghosts. - D.H.



lions. We learn that a lion's roar can be heard up to 3 miles away.

I'm also surprised to discover that the zoo's flora is as impressive as its fauna. The 700,000-plus exotic plants include carnivorous American pitchers; intriguing cycads, including species that date to the late Paleozoic era; and flowers ranging from bird-of-paradise to passion vine.

Orchids grow in the indoor Orchid House, which is open for tours the third Friday of each month. Alaska Airlines is a sponsor of the San Diego Zoo and its sister property, the San Diego Zoo Safari Park, about 30 miles north in Escondido.

After our morning at the zoo, we explore some of the other

appealing sites at Balboa Park, which offers visitors a choice of 16 museums, nearly 20 gardens, and landmarks such as the iconic California Tower—featuring multiple architectural styles, from Baroque to Gothic—built for the 1915 Panama-California Exposition.

The park also has an organconcert pavilion, an Imax theater, restaurants, and the House of Pacific Relations International Cottages, founded in 1935 when San Diego hosted the California Pacific International Exposition.

The house's name reflects both fostering peaceful relations and the Pacific Ocean's importance as a travel-by-ship gateway to the world in the early 1900s. The

cultures of more than 30 countries, from Argentina and Austria to Ukraine and the United States, are showcased during open houses on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Each cottage also takes a turn hosting a lawn program, with a spotlight on music, dance, clothing, arts and foods from the country the cottage represents.

We stop to watch happy kids astride a menagerie of animals on the 1910 Balboa Park Carousel, and we visit the Spanish Village Art Center, whose buildings and courtyard were created for the 1935 exposition and evoke a charming village in Spain.

The appealing center now hosts more than 200 artisans, from painters and jewelry de-

signers to glass-blowing artists.

From the art center, we follow a walkway to a promenade where street performers provide varied and mesmerizing entertainment.

A gymnast does spellbinding somersaults over crouched volunteers, and I find it an apt metaphor for my feelings about San Diego: I flipped over it many years ago when I first moved here, and I continue to be captivated by "America's Finest City."

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


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## **PLAY BALL!**

Enjoying fun in the sun at spring training in Arizona

>>> The smell of freshly cut grass fills the air as I listen to the crack of a bat, the sound of baseballs thwacking into leather gloves, shouts of support, chatter among players and among fans.

A coach yells, "Pick it up, you guys, game time's at 1 P.M."

The warm, bright desert sun is climbing above the practice areas outside Sloan Park, the Chicago Cubs' spring training stadium in Mesa, Arizona, about 20 miles east of Phoenix. With a capacity of 15,000 fans, Sloan is the largest spring training park in Major League Baseball. The Cubs' exhibition game with the Seattle Mariners won't start for a couple of hours, but still,

dozens of fans have lined the fences to watch their heroes go about their daily routines.


I'm immersing myself in this annual rite of spring training, a baseball tradition in the Phoenix area since 1947. Spring training has been around since the late 1800s, when teams trained during the preseason at various warm-weather locations. Over the years, they have included Hot Springs, Arkansas; New Orleans; Cuba; and even Hawai'i. Florida has hosted teams for preseason training off and on since 1888. The state's Grapefruit League took off about 1914 and soon became the most popular destination.

Arizona's Cactus League began in earnest when the Cleveland Indians and New York Giants began training here in 1947 to escape the wintry Northeast for a sunny location. Today, the Cactus League is a major annual sports and tourism experience, with 10 stadiums hosting 15 major league teams. Officials estimate the league generates more than \$500 million in economic impact for Arizona.

Taking place from late February through late March, the preseason features almost daily games between the teams. It's a chance for rookies to prove themselves and earn a roster spot, and for veteran players to regain their elite form.

It's also a chance for fans to enjoy winter sun, watch baseball in a beautiful setting, and get up close and personal with the players in a more laid-back and intimate atmosphere than the regular season.

As I enter Sloan Park for the game, it's clear that the crowd is made up of more than just die-hard baseball fans. Families are sitting on blankets and picnicking on the grassy berm that rings the outfield, noshing on snacks they brought with them or bought from the food trucks parked behind the stadium. Kids frolic in a play area, cheerfully oblivious to the game at hand. On the concourse, a mix of local retirees, seasonal snowbirds and

Today's visiting team, the Mariners, play their spring training home games in the Peoria Sports Complex, in the city of Peoria, about 30 miles northwest of Mesa. The Mariners share the facility with the San Diego Padres.

Similar to the Cubs' Sloan Park, the Mariners' park features a grass berm for open seating in the outfield. There are plenty of practice fields, and a close-up viewing experience that includes the chance to meet your favorite player in the "Autograph Alley," a path the players walk to the park.

Peoria Field has plenty of socializing areas and fan amenities, including the Craft Beer Courtyard, with a rotating menu of microbrews. For kids who tire of



long games, the adjacent Peoria Cove playground has a mini baseball field and a splash park where they can cool off.

For true baseball fans, this is not just a weekend getaway; it's paradise. They line the field to grab selfies with players and to have them sign their autographs. The players have more free time to mingle in the relaxed spring training scene. There's an excitement in the air as people spot their favorite players for the first time since last fall.

There is a sense of wonder and anticipation, and of community, as fans who have just met debate the potential of new players and who will make the team.

"Play ball!" yells the umpire as the fans settle into their seats. As the game begins, I'm already planning my next baseball outing. With the Oakland A's playing at Mesa's Hohokam Stadium, the San Francisco Giants at Scottsdale Stadium, and the Los Angeles Dodgers at Camelback Ranch, I'm loaded with options.

#### **PERSONAL FAVORITES**

Hall of Fame pitcher Ferguson "Fergie" Jenkins played more than 20 seasons of Arizona Spring Training in the 1960s through the 1980s for the

Chicago Cubs and the Texas Rangers. He liked the area so much he ended up retiring in nearby Anthem, where he still lives. He attends Cubs spring training games, signing autographs on behalf of his charitable foundation. When he's not at the ballpark, you might find him at one of these Phoenix-area spots:

Don and Charlie's Steakhouse: Filled floor to ceiling with baseball memorabilia (including a mural of Fergie's 1969 Cubs team), this steakhouse and bar is a popular spring training hangout. You'll often find Fergie there in his regular corner booth (donandcharlies.com).

Fishing Lake Pleasant: Despite the desert climate, the Phoenix area is home to several lakes that are good for a day of fishing. Fergie enjoys angling for bass in Lake Pleasant, about an hour's drive north of downtown Phoenix (maricopacounty-parks.net).

#### Lo-Lo's Chicken and Waffles:

With a menu of fried chicken, catfish beignets and fried green tomatoes, Lo-Lo's has five locations around the Phoenix area, including one not far from Chase Field, where the Arizona Diamondbacks play their regular season games (loloschickenandwaffles.com). —B.F.

#### Beyond the Ballparks

Between ballgames, the Phoenix area can provide a great home base for trips to the Grand Canyon (a three-hour drive) or Sedona (a two-hour drive). There are also other activities around town. The following are a few favorites.

• Hike Camelback Mountain: Work off the stadium food with a hike up this iconic mountain overlooking the Phoenix area. Camelback is challenging, with elevation gains of 1,420 feet for the three-hour roundtrip hike.

#### WHAT TO DO AT SPRING TRAINING

Obviously you'll want to see some spring training games. Purchase tickets as far in advance as possible at the team sites on mlb.com because many games sell out, particularly on weekends and during school spring breaks.

Also note that most facilities have practice fields where fans can watch players work out, take batting practice, and play warmup games, no tickets needed. Who knows, maybe you'll get a chance to chat and take a selfie with your favorite player or an unknown rookie who just might become a future Hall-of-Famer.

Additional ballpark activities include stadium tours at the Cubs' Sloan Park (\$10) and the kids' whiffle ball field at the Arizona Diamondbacks'/Colorado Rockies' Salt River Fields at Talking Stick (open from about an hour and a half before games through the seventh inning). And many parks allow kids to run the bases









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### **ICONIC INDIA**

Delhi and Agra provide insight into the country's rich heritage

>> The Rashtrapati Bhavan in New Delhi, one of the grandest palaces ever built, is my cup of Darjeeling tea. I'm enthralled by Indian Summers, The Jewel in the Crown and other dramas set in the twilight of the British Raj—a ruling system that controlled the Indian subcontinent from 1858 to 1947. Britain created this redsandstone mansion in 1931 to display wealth and power. Many times larger than the White House, and rising to the sky in layers like a wedding cake, it's now home to India's president. Above the dome, which was inspired by the Sanchi Stupa, the national flag waves over the world's largest democracy.

I begin my stroll to the Rashtrapati Bhavan, or President's House, in the cool of the morning. Local families walk the broad streets, and

young men kick balls across the green lawns. I pass India Gate, a World War I memorial arch, which is as spectacular as Paris' Arc de Triomphe. Women in bright saris, riding three to a motorcycle, smile and wave from the roadway as they pass by. British architect Edwin Lutyens' design raises the jewel-box President's House above tree-lined boulevards, gardens, fountains, and the neighboring Central Secretariat and Parliament House.

One of the world's oldest cities and a survivor of many dynasties, Delhi spans a plain inhabited for 25,000 years. British viceroys moved the capital from Kolkata to Delhi in 1911, calling the area "New Delhi" to distinguish it from Old Delhi, the capital of the deposed Mughal Empire, about 5 miles away from

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
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"Today, Delhi is just Delhi, all one big thing," a resident tells me. Stretching for hundreds of square miles, connected by the Delhi Metro, the metropolitan area could reach 25 million residents by 2020. Home to many multinational corporations, it has nudged out Mumbai to become India's business capital.

Delhi is also a food paradise. Visitors can feast on the delicious tandoori dishes, kebabs and butter chicken. During my stay, I particularly enjoyed a luscious tandoori chicken dinner at the Caraway restaurant at the Grand New Delhi hotel.

Meanwhile, the walled Old City remains a fascinating maze of street stalls, spice markets, Mughal forts, temples and wandering cows. It offers a unique view of India's past.

I'm visiting Delhi after just having completed two delightful weeks on TransIndus-India's heritage tour of Northern India. We explored the foothills of the Himalayas, where British viceroys enjoyed respite from the summer heat. Now, I want to get a sense of Delhi.

I've hired a car and driver through TransIndus, which also organized my tickets, lodging and itinerary for my individual explorations. Free to ramble without worrying about logistics, I keep in mind that everything here is monumental. Indeed, it took 17 years and 700 million bricks to complete the 340room President's House. Imagine a 330-acre estate with 550 servants.

"All the staff were male and all wore the headgear denoting their rank, as well as the

viceroy's personal badge on their chests," writes Pamela Hicks in her charming memoir, Daughter of Empire: My Life as a Mountbatten. Some ran messages and looked after the offices; others did laundry; and Mughals from South India did the cooking. "I was surprised to discover there was a chicken cleaner who did nothing other than prepare chickens for cooking," she writes. History buffs and fans of the BBC series The Crown might recall that Hicks' father, India's last viceroy, was Louis Mountbatten, distant cousin of Queen Elizabeth. Hugh Bonneville of Downton Abbey plays him in the 2017 film Viceroy's House—the dwelling's original name.

Pamela Hicks' favorite visitor was Mahatma Gandhi, the Indian leader who practiced nonviolent protest against Brit-

#### Tips from writer Bharti Kirchner

India-born writer Bharti Kirchner, author of seven novels and four cookbooks, shares two of her favorite places in

- Bengali Market in Babar Road: "A cluster of shops carrying Indian food, which includes sweets and savories of my childhood. Particularly good are ras malai (white rounds in sugar syrup) and chole bhature (chickpeas with puffy bread). Try fresh red carrot juice. Red—not orange-carrots are more popular in India."
- Nirula's at Connaught Place: "Once an ice cream shop, it's famous for Indian fast food. I enjoy people-watching while I'm drinking tea."

#### TOP ATTRACTIONS

- Chandni Chowk bazaar: In the heart of Old Delhi, a covered market dating to the 17th century, where visitors can find silk, jewelry and trinkets.
- Connaught Place: Popular shopping and dining center, with traditional restaurants such as Minar Restaurant and innovative terrace bars such as Lord of the Drinks.
- Gandhi Smriti: The last home of famed leader Mahatma Gandhi, where you can walk Gandhi's final steps, represented in red sandstone, and see his statue (shown at right).
- Red Fort: The massive sandstone fort, for which construction began in 1939, now features an evening soundand-light show that re-creates events in the fort's history.

ish rule. Known for his sense of humor, he brought a dish of goat cheese curds-a dish unfamiliar at that time to the British palate-which he insisted Lord Mountbatten try. The viceroy did take a bite, Pamela recalls, but only one, and only for diplomacy. Pamela notes that her father was in a peculiar position for a viceroy because Britain, greatly weakened economically by World War II, had sent him to hand over power in 1947. In less than a year, Britain would partition the subcontinent into two nation states: India and Pakistan. Jawaharlal Nehru, another well-liked guest, would become India's first prime minster.

After admiring the grounds, I leave the President's House with one regret: I couldn't go inside the house, because it was closed for the visit of a foreign dignitary that day.

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My next stop is about 4 miles away, and a big step back in time: Humayun's Tomb, the inspiration for the Taj Mahal. Believed to be the subcontinent's first garden tomb, it dates to 1570 and was commissioned for Mughal Emperor Humayun by the first of his six wives. A serene retreat in a crowded city, it does resemble the Taj in its monumental size, white dome and minarets. I stroll through the red sandstone buildings, admiring the Persian-influenced architecture.

After my Delhi explorations, we drive to Agra, which I want to reach before 6 p.m. to see the sun set over the Taj Mahal, one of the New 7 Wonders of the World and a UNESCO World Heritage site. Then I'll get up at 6 A.M. to see the Taj at sunrise. This is a popular way to see two parts of the Golden Triangle, the tourist circuit

that starts in Delhi, goes south to Agra and west to Jaipur.

The road to Agra takes us over flat, dry land. I check into the comfortable Coral Tree Homestay, a blue bungalow just a stroll from the Taj. Guesthouses run by local families are a popular option for visitors seeking immersion in Indian culture. Vandna and Gopal Singh, the cheerful owners, welcome me with a tasty meal of curried vegetables, biryani rice and flat bread, cooked in a tiny kitchen.

Then, I'm off to get a sunset view of the Taj. The great Mughal emperor Shah Jahan commissioned it as a garden tomb

for his favorite wife, Mumtaz Mahal, with construction beginning in 1632. By design, the best place to see the sunset over this masterpiece is Mehtab Bagh, a


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




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fragrant garden set up in perfect alignment to view the Taj. Because it's across the narrow Yamuna River from the monument, and since the bridge crossing the river is about 3 miles away, we take the car.

We park under towering trees and stroll white paths through a grassy flood plain dotted with trees. Fragrant white neem blossoms wave gently in the breeze. Tiny thick-billed flowerpeckers and other small birds circle overhead.

There at last is the Taj, shimmering in the twilight. It sparkles from top to bottom, across the silvery river. Softer and lovelier than its photos, this marble shrine was erected by more than 20,000 workers aided by 1,000 elephants. Many see it as an ode to love. Its beauty fills me with an unexpected happiness.

In the Mehtab Bagh garden, I stand with a small group of people on a gravel path. We chat for a bit as the sky starts to darken and the air cools. We can see throngs of tourists, looking like colored dots, lined up on the Taj's ramparts. Two smaller domes flank the sides of the main dome, mimicking its shape.

We fall silent as the Taj's white dome turns pink—and then a darker pink. Suddenly, flocks of birds, which I later find out are called jungle babblers, rise up, squawking, as if at the moon. The sun disappears behind the marble dome.

We linger in the sweet-smelling garden until true darkness begins to descend. By the time I return to The Coral Tree, a sliver of golden moon hangs in a black sky. I sleep restfully and return to the Taj in darkness the next morning, this time on foot. While the shift from dark to light isn't as dramatic without the moonlight, the Taj is breathtaking in the morning mist and delicate light.

It's thrilling to stroll around the famous rectangular pool and wander through the buildings, admiring the inlaid semiprecious jewels and intricate craftsmanship. The marble walls remind me of bridal lace.

Gradually, the crowds grow bigger, until they fill the gardens. I wait in line to be photographed on the "Diana bench," named for the British princess who posed for an iconic photo beside the pool.

Then it's off to Agra Fort, where Shah Jahan's son imprisoned him for his last eight years. A guard shows us the only window from which the Shah could get a peek of the Taj. Upon his death in 1666, he was buried there next to his wife.

I also tour I'timād-ud-Daulah, known as the "Baby Taj." Built for a Persian nobleman by his daughter, it has a fabulous garden of flowering trees. Inside, the walls are decorated with whimsical tiles with shapes of flowers, wine bottles, vases and other staples of everyday life.

As we drive out of Agra, I'm already thinking about finishing the Golden Triangle on my next trip, with a Jaipur stopover. I'm curious about Mumbai, Kolkata and South India. I want to try Delhi's chickpea fritters and slow-cooked Mughal stews.

Still, I'm content for now. The happiness I felt in the moonlight garden stays with me all the way back to the capital, where I catch a midnight flight for home.

#### DISCOVERING THE SOUTHSIDE

Multifaceted area boasts everything from waterfront to greenhouses

Processon my husband, Bruce Brooks, and I took early last year after moving to Des Moines, about 20 miles south of downtown Seattle, was to Saltwater State Park. Located about halfway between Tacoma and Seattle, with more than a quarter mile of Puget Sound shoreline, the park promised a nearby place to hike and picnic—a bonus to our new home's peek-a-boo water view. We purchased a \$30 annual Discover Pass from Washington State Parks, and Saltwater SP became my perfect joy-inducing lunch break.

The water is a big part of living in the Southside, and perhaps that also appealed to pioneers who arrived in 1851. Today, this region is sometimes called "Seattle's Backyard," a term used by the municipalities of Des Moines, SeaTac and Tukwila. Another appellation is "Highline," a nod to a north–south road that once passed through the area.

While there are various interpretations of what constitutes the Southside, my personal definition extends south to the northern boundary of Federal Way and also encompasses Renton, along the south shore of Lake Washington. It's a big geographic area that has seen significant growth since the 2010 census, with the population total for Burien,

Des Moines, Kent, Normandy Park, Renton, SeaTac and Tukwila increasing an estimated 22 percent, to more than 365,000 residents. That growth may be due in part to relatively affordable housing; proximity to Seattle-Tacoma International Airport, Boeing and other aerospace/aviation-related businesses (including Alaska Airlines); and a wonderful diversity of cultures and languages (Highline Public Schools serves nearly 19,000 students speaking 95 languages).

It's easy to get to the Southside on our household's favorite mode of transportation: Sound Transit's Link light rail. The Angle Lake Station, which opened about 18 months ago in the city of SeaTac, is the system's southernmost stop, right after the station for the airport. For \$3 you can jump on a Link train in downtown Seattle and get here with your bicycle or backpack in about 40 minutes (by 2024, Link's planned southern expansion would add stops in Des Moines and Federal Way). The Angle Lake Station is just a half-mile from Angle Lake Park, which has a swimming area, a playground, a seasonal water-spray park and a quarter-mile-loop nature trail that opened in December.

Another favorite way to reach this region is

via the Sounder train to the renovated Tukwila Station, which now connects—via a new pedestrian/bicycle bridge over the Green River-to Westfield Southcenter, less than 2 miles west. Southcenter's shops, restaurants, movies and other amenities are a magnet for our family. About a half-mile from the mall, you can also experience indoor skydiving at iFly Seattle.

Even before we moved to the Southside from another Seattle-area neighborhood, I spent many a season as a soccer mom sitting in the bleachers at Tukwila's Starfire Sports facility. Starfire is home to the Seattle Sounders FC pro-soccer team, whose training sessions are often open to the public. And beginning this year, Starfire will also be home to the Seattle Seawolves, part of Major League Rugby, American rugby's new professional league. The Seawolves open the season on April 22, hosting the San Diego Legion.

I work in gardening and floristry, so I frequent Southside botanical resources whenever possible. One of my favorite spots is Highline SeaTac Botanical Garden in SeaTac, a quiet oasis just north of the hustle and bustle of Sea-Tac Airport. I'm looking forward to the King County Iris Society's annual garden of irises-visit late April to early June to see the

#### Some Southside Favorites

- Asadero (asaderoprime.com): Asadero, in Kent, is a culinary gem with a menu influenced by recipes (such as in the dish shown at right) from Mexico's Sinaloa region that rely on high-heat ovens and mesquite wood to impart incredible flavor.
- B&E Meats and Seafood (bnemeats.com): Opened in 1958 in Burien, B&E now has four locations, including the one I frequent on Marine View Drive South in Des Moines. This old-fashioned butcher and fish shop is a top destination for Southside foodies.
- Highline Heritage Museum (highlinehistory.org): With a projected late-May opening, the 7,000-square-foot museum in Burien will spotlight Southside history via exhibits from a collection of more than 100,000 items.
- Marine Science and Technology Center (mast.highline. edu): Highline College's marine biology and aquarium facility, located at Redondo Beach in Des Moines, spotlights 250-plus Puget Sound marine species (a gray whale skeleton is shown above right), with public access twice weekly in summer and once a week the rest of the year.
- Paper Delights (paperdelights.com): This is a great Burien spot (shown right) for creatives, crafters and stationery connoisseurs. I recently channeled my inner calligrapher at a workshop taught by co-owner Alicia Olsen.
- Salty's at Redondo Beach (saltys.com): My pick for the best happy hour. Go early for a window or waterfront table. I love the \$6 wine, paired with \$7 coconut prawns; enjoying the water view (right); and watching seals and beachcombers.
- SoCoCulture (sococulture.org): This is a portal to 70-plus arts and heritage organizations in South King County. — D.P.









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most blooms. The botanical garden also contains the Seike Japanese Garden, with peaceful walkways, bridges, reflecting ponds, and mature pines and Japanese maples.

In Burien, we're drawn to the pedestrian experience in and near the downtown area. Hove to browse new and used titles at Page 2 Books, savor the amazing baked goods at Grand Central Bakery and Bakery Nouveau, pick up delicious prepared entrees at Maven Mercantile, enjoy dinner at Frankie's B-Town Bistro, and grab tickets to a live show at Burien Actors Theatre.

In Des Moines, my frequent miniescape as a shopper is Zenith Holland Nursery, established in 1907 and believed to be the oldest continually operating business in Des Moines (this part of south Des Moines began to be called "Zenith" in the early 1900s). The best way to enjoy Zenith Holland Nursery is to meander through the many greenhouses, where you can peruse tables covered in verdant annuals, ferns and flowering plants, including spring-blooming hellebores, heathers and *Daphne odora*. Blooms and vines cascade from bountiful hanging baskets overhead.



The earthy scent of potting soil lifts my spirits, and I always leave with a flat of colorful pansies or primroses, ready to tuck into the garden I'm creating in my new Southside backyard.



#### Port Townsend

>>> This charming seaport city—located northwest of Seattle, at an Olympic Peninsula site named by British Captain George Vancouver in 1792—grew out of an 1851 settlement. The town celebrates its maritime history and Victorian architecture during the Victorian Heritage Festival, March 24-25. See late-1800s artifacts; enjoy high tea; view steam launches (long, narrow passenger boats powered by steam), antique bicycles and Civil War-era naval equipment; and take walking tours of the city. The area is also popular for hiking, cycling, kayaking and seasonal whale watching, and for 433-acre Fort Worden Historical State Park (2018.vicfest.org and enjoypt.com).

**>>> As Puget Sound-area residents** look forward to the arrival of spring, our thoughts turn to the lovely flowers and other flora that will soon brighten our days. Below is a small-bouquet-size sampling of gorgeous gardens where locals and visitors can enjoy blossoms of beauty and other pleasant plants this spring and summer.

Bellevue Botanical Garden (bellevuebotanical.org): Visit more than a dozen themed areas, such as the Fuchsia Garden, Rhododendron Glen, Waterwise Garden, Dahlia Display, Yao Garden, and Ravine Experience. The garden celebrated its 25th anniversary last year.



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Dunn Gardens (dunngardens.org): Designed by the Olmsted firm in 1915, the gardens (shown at left) showcase more than 400 different species. In early spring, look for plants such as western wild ginger, beautyberry, Tommasini's crocus, pink fawn lily, star magnolia, early purple trillium and wake robin. The garden is available for public visits and tours on various dates.

University of Washington Medicinal Herb

**Garden** (uwmedicinalherbgarden.org): Planted in 1911, the garden is open to the public and has approximately 1,000 world species, from mooseberry and jack pine to

goji berry and Siberian ginseng. Also on the UW campus, at the Burke Museum, is the

Erna Gunther Ethnobotanical Garden (burkemuseum.org), planted in 1984, with about 50 species that have significance for Native Americans in the Pacific Northwest.

#### Volunteer Park Conservatory

(volunteerparkconservatory.org): The conservatory cultivates tropical and subtropical plants, such as orchids and gingers, in a 1912, 6,800-square-foot Victorian-style greenhouse, with more than 3,400 panes of glass. Visitors can explore the conservatory's five "display houses": the Palm House, the Fern House, the Bromeliad House, the Seasonal House and the Cactus House.



# **PORTLAND'S PEARL**

The neighborhood is enjoying a sparkling rebirth By Drew Tyson

>>> When I first visited legendary Powell's City of Books in 2006, I got lost among the rows-literally.

I was so spun around from exploring the block-long store's dazzling collection of more than 1 million books—which is divided into 3,500 color-coded sections—that I couldn't find my way back to where I had entered the establishment.

It's easy to see why Powell's is considered one of the world's largest and greatest bookstores. You will agree, after finding yourself sitting upstairs in a section devoted to foreign travel with a book you've never heard of but is exactly what you've been looking for.

Powell's City of Books opened in its current location in 1981 and took time to grow into its current design, with major renovations in 1999 and a refreshed facade and some work on its iconic marquee in 2014.

It has become an anchor in the Pearl District's renaissance. Today, the area is one of Portland's most desirable neighborhoods and the quintessential example of stylish urban living. Located north of downtown, the triangular-shaped neighborhood is bordered by West Burnside Street to the south, Interstate 405 to the west, Old Town Chinatown to the east and the Willamette River to the north.

The area offers stunning condominium towers, exciting bars and restaurants, and a Whole Foods Market.

The neighborhood's many fine-dining options include Andina Restaurant. Founded in 2003, the Peruvian establishment offers a novel, yet approachable take on Peruvian cuisine, and was one of the first Portland dining spots to attract the national spotlight. Playful dishes such as quinoa "risotto" predate the superfood trend and pair well with meats such as lamb.

Another restaurant of note is the Pearl's Bluehour, which was opened in 2001 by restaurateur Bruce Carey. Known for its tall ceilings and formal pressed white tablecloths, Bluehour has delightful happy hours and a focus on seasonal ingredients that have made it a popular neighborhood mainstay. Other outstanding options include the recently opened Tanner Creek Tavern, which takes its name from a creek that still runs under the Pearl District and was once used by a former neighborhood tannery. There is also the Pearl Tavern, a sports bar part-owned by Joey Harrington, the former Oregon Duck and NFL quarterback.

And Piazza Italia is a cozy restaurant and soccer bar that is known to be a popular spot with Portland Timbers players. The restaurant is also famous for having soccer jerseys hanging from its ceiling.

As the Pearl continues to develop, it's easy to forget that 30 years ago, the area was a fading industrial and transportation center that was known for its empty lots, warehouses, bars and diners.

It wasn't until the 1970s that artists were drawn to the area because

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of its low rents. Famous film director Gus Van Sant lived in the neighborhood at one point and featured it in his breakout movie, Drugstore Cowboy. By the mid-1980s it had become a leading neighborhood for art galleries, including the still-thriving Blackfish Gallery.

Over time, the Pearl's popularity as a home for artists and other creative types continued to grow, and the area began to redevelop. One of the most impressive refurbishing projects was the First Regiment Armory Annex. The building was originally constructed in 1891 and included a large space for meetings, but it had fallen into disrepair. It was renovated in 2006 into an impressive theater space, with a cafe and bar for theatergoers.

The facility was one of the world's first historical renovations of a performing-arts venue to achieve Platinum LEED certification. Today, the building is home to the Portland Center Stage at The Armory, Portland's largest theater company, known for producing world premieres, contemporary works, classical plays and musicals.

In the 1990s, more developers began to take notice of the historical area. Leading the way was Hoyt Street Properties, which embarked on a \$600 million urban development project on the 34-acre site that was formerly a Burlington Northern rail yard.

Now, a dozen high-rise towers stand at the site near the Willamette River and more are planned. Other district projects have included the

creation of Jamison Square Park. With its wading pool and waterfall, Jamison Square attracts families from the neighborhood and from across the Portland area to get wet in the fountains during the summer months.

Another draw is the Pearl's collection of craft breweries. Bridgeport Brewing, Deschutes Brewery and Rogue Ales all have major brewpubs in the neighborhood. They have been among the city's first locations to spur brewery tourism. Although other taverns have come and gone, the big three remain among the Pearl's most popular destinations. And 10 Barrel Brewing, which, in 2015, opened a brewpub in the Pearl with a large rooftop deck, has also gained a large following.

From the Pearl's transportation and manufacturing beginnings to its evolution as an artist center and now one of the city's hottest residential neighborhoods, the district is a blend of historical Portland and stylish new developments. Here, you'll find condominium towers that are close to high-end shopping, entertainment, restaurants, schools and parks. The Pearl has become a thriving urban center.

And it's still fun getting lost in Powell's from time to time. \*

# PORTLAND'S PINBALL WIZARDS

The City of Roses is helping to lead a pinball revival

>>> Like the three dozen other competitors wedged tightly into a side room at Portland's C Bar, Colin Urban stares intently at a steel ball, his face a mask of fierce concentration.

Urban is one of the world's 100 top-ranked pinball players, giving him a certain celebrity

status, both in this low-key December tournament and in this pinball-happy city. Portland ranks No. 1 on the national pinball map—there actually is one, at pinballmap.com. It shows that Portland leads the other cities on the map, with 752 publicly accessible machines at 312 locations.

As Urban's eyes track the ball through a rapid succession of angled turns, chutes, collisions and loops, a woman sitting nearby glances up occasionally from her phone to

assess his progress. She freely admits that pinball doesn't offer much as a spectator sport, but she has at least three reasons to be here: She likes pinball. Urban needs a driver. And she's his mother.

At 15, Urban is the only player in the room too young to legally drive on his own. He is also living proof of pinball's resurgence—not just in Portland, but across the country.

For decades, pinball machines reigned triumphant in the gaming universe. Then, beginning in the 1970s, video games became pervasive in arcades, living rooms and now on our smartphones.

Despite all the gaming changes that have taken place, pinball remains pretty much the same. Players still rack up points by directing steel balls through an obstacle-laden play field, using button-controlled flippers to aim.

British rockers The Who captured the game's appeal with their 1969 rock opera

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

about a pinball wizard named Tommy.

Portland resident Greg Dunlap, 49, personally experienced pinball's decline. Growing up in Chicago during the videogame boom, he became a fan of pinball in his mid-20s just as the machines were slowly disappearing. One game, *Twilight Zone*, became his particular obsession. It was themed after the TV series created by Rod Serling.

Over the past decade or so, pinball machines have mounted a small, but determined comeback, much like stereo turntables and vinyl records. At the national level, pinball tournament play has soared by roughly a hundredfold during the past 11 years, according to the International Flipper Pinball Association (IFPA). In 2006, 500 players took part in 50 competitions worldwide; in 2017, more than 55,000 people played in nearly 4,500 tournaments.

Although men are the majority of tournament participants, the IFPA reports that Portland resident Zoe Vrabel is the world's third-highest-ranked female player.

Vrabel says women are making inroads and gaining acceptance, in part through the Belles & Chimes women's pinball leagues across the country, including in Portland.

Top players say the skills required to win tournaments are an understanding of physics and geometry, quick reflexes and an encyclopedic knowledge of the various rule sets for each game. In other words, knowing exactly where to send the ball to score the most points.

At this year's Oregon State Championship, held January 20, Urban took the crown, with Vrabel finishing third, and Dunlap tying for ninth.


"If you want to be good, it takes a lot of studying the game rules, and, of course, playing time," Urban says. "But when you find yourself in that moment, and you are making every shot, and not even thinking, just cruising, that is a great feeling to have."



# FROM LONG DISTANCE

Travel brings Alaska high school basketball team together

)) In the moments before their season tips off, the Aniak Jr. Sr. High School girls basketball team forms a circle in an Anchorage classroom.

"We're very lucky to be here, playing in a largeschool tournament," says coach Wayne Morgan. A day earlier, the team had flown more than 300 miles from Aniak, a community of about 520 on the Kuskokwim River in Southwest Alaska, to play in December's Grace Grizzly Basketball Classic tournament.

Now, the coach wants his players' minds on the task. Aniak, the tournament's only 1A team—the sports division for Alaska's smallest schools—is opening its season against Grace Christian School of Anchorage in the first game of a three-day, threegame event. While Grace Christian has a high school student body of 182, a small school by Anchorage norms, Aniak has fewer than 30 high school students. The team dresses just eight players instead of the typical 12, and one player is an eighth-grader.

But Morgan, who has been coaching in Aniak for more than 20 years, relishes this sort of opportunity. "Being from the bush, we have to fly everywhere we

go," he says. "But we look for competition."

In front of a dry-erase board, Morgan discusses defense and hustle. The girls don't need much of a pep talk, though; they're already fired up. Six players were on last season's team and remember the sting of finishing a couple wins shy of the state title game the previous March.

When the team comes together before heading to the court, each player puts a hand in the middle. Morgan then gives one last instruction, a slight change to an age-old sports ritual. He asks them to ball their hands into fists. "We're going to fight until the end of the season," Morgan says.

In so many communities in the largest U.S. state, basketball is a deep-seated tradition—the dribble of the ball like a town heartbeat on winter weekends. In Aniak, basketball draws people of all ages to nightly open-gym sessions in the darkest months and to late-night outdoor pickup games under the summer's midnight sun. When the high school plays a home game, the whole town watches, and cheering fans, some pounding drums, pack the gymnasium's

bleachers. Senior guard Shauna Koonuk calls it an "ingrained" part of life in her hometown.

For the players, a big part of rural high school basketball in Alaska is traveling. During the course of the season, which spans from December into March, Aniak's schedule involves about a half-dozen plane trips and overnight stays, sometimes on gym floors in other villages. In addition to seeing new places and meeting new people, the trips bring the team closer together, almost like a second family—though much of the team is already related.

Morgan says this bond means he can help develop his players as people as well as athletes, molding them into good citizens and ambassadors for their village. "It's teaching them discipline, teaching them respect, how to lose and how to handle that."

For instance, basketball has helped give Pearl Morgan, a senior guard, the confidence to look at going away to college, while also furthering her connection to her hometown. Her dream is to be a health aide in Aniak.

Pearl Morgan says Aniak pride was on display at last season's state championship tournament in the Alaska Airlines Center on the University of Alaska Anchorage campus. Dozens of Aniak residents made the trip, and during every Aniak game, the fans clapped and whistled, making themselves heard.

The tournament, called March Madness Alaska, is a wild ride. In it, the state's best 80 teams, boys and girls, participate in eight- and 16-team tourneys over two weeks to determine state champions in four divisions. Isaiah Vreeman, associate director of the

Alaska School Activities Association, notes that's 118 games. The 1A and 2A tournaments are March 14–17 this year, followed by the 3A and 4A tournaments, March 22–24.

Teams travel from island villages in Alaska's Southeast, from the farthest Arctic reaches and from the state's bigger population centers. Many families make the trip, too, to share in the cheers, and sometimes tears, in an electric environment.

Getting back to March Madness for the thirdstraight season is an achievable goal, says Pearl Morgan. Asked what it would be like to win the 1A title, something that hasn't happened for the Aniak girls since 1999, a smile spreads across her face.

"That would be ..." She trails off. "I don't even know. I can't explain how that would be."

The first steps on the long path to a state title are slow on this December night, but by halftime, Koonuk is finding the net with her jump shot, and junior Kayla Morgan is providing solid low-post play. Aniak is businesslike as it closes out a win, almost as if the outcome is expected: Aniak 42, Grace Christian 38.

"Everybody always doubts us," Kayla Morgan says after the game. As of mid-February, Aniak was 12-4.

Grace Christian coach Karen Tollefson is complimentary in defeat, calling the Aniak team "scrappers." She says it's good for her team to play this visiting squad, which has its sights on bigger goals. "They're a unit, so they're in it together," she says. "It's beautiful."

Customs and Immigration forms are distributed by flight attendants during your flight. Prior to landing, complete all forms that pertain to you, following the tips below. ### TO THE UNITED STATES

PASSPORT CONTROL KIOSKS

Automated Passport Control kiosks expedite the entry process. Eligible travelers scan their passport, take a photograph and answer a series of questions at the kiosk. Once complete, present the printed receipt from the kiosk to a Customs Officer.

### Helpful tips

- Only citizens or nationals of the U.S., Canada or Visa Waiver Program countries are eligible to use the kinsk
- · Customs declaration forms are unnecessary.
- Kiosks available in Los Angeles (LAX), Portland (PDX), San Diego (SAN), San Francisco (SFO) and Seattle (SEA).

### U.S. CUSTOMS DECLARATION

All travelers to cities without Passport Control kiosks must complete this form.

### Helpful tips

- One form per person or one per family (family defines those in the same household who are related by blood, marriage, domestic relationship, or adoption).
- Lines 5, 6—If not using a passport, leave these lines blank.
- Line 9-Enter "AS" for Alaska Airlines
- Sign at the "X."

TO MEXICO

- All travelers must complete a Mexico Customs Declaration form; one per traveler or family with same address.
- All travelers, except for citizens of Mexico, must complete the FMM; one per traveler or family.

### TO COSTA RICA

- All travelers must complete a Customs Declaration form; one per traveler or family.
- All travelers must complete an Immigrations Form; one per person.
- Costa Rica requires a \$29 departure tax for each traveler. For tickets purchased before June 1, 2016, pay fee prior to check-in with Alaska Airlines at the service centers in terminal check-in area.
   The fee is included in the price of tickets purchased after June 1, 2016.

### Your safety and comfort

#### SEATS

- Your seat belt must be fastened whenever the "FASTEN SEAT BELT" sign is illuminated. Keep your seat belt fastened at all other times in case of undetectable clear-air turbulence.
- Seatbacks and tray tables must be in the upright, locked position during taxi, takeoff and landing.
- Child-restraint devices must bear the FAA approval sticker.
- Seat-belt extension use is not allowed in exit rows for the safety of all passengers due to the possibility of entanglement by the extensions.

#### **CARRY-ONS**

- All carry-on baggage must be stowed under a seat or in an enclosed overhead bin upon boarding and prior to landing, as directed.
- Please use caution when opening an overhead bin, as items may have shifted.
- Prior to takeoff and landing, service items provided by Alaska Airlines must be picked up or properly stowed under the seat in front of you, in carry-on luggage that is properly stowed or in an overhead bin.

#### LAVATORY

 Customers are requested to use the lavatory in their assigned cabin and are required to do so on inbound international flights; exceptions may be made for customers with special needs.

#### **CREW SAFETY**

• Interference with crew members' (including flight attendants') duties is a violation of federal law. Under federal law, no person may assault, threaten, intimidate or interfere with crew members in the performance of their duties aboard an aircraft under operation. Penalties for crew interference include fines up to \$11,000, imprisonment or both. An incident report may be filed with the FAA regarding a customer's behavior.

#### PETS

 Pets must remain in carrier for entire flight.
 Carrier must be stowed for taxi, takeoff and landing.

#### TRAVELING WITH INFANTS AND CHILDREN

- To be used onboard, your child-restraint system must conform to all applicable federal motor vehicle safety conditions and the restraint must be certified for use in motor vehicles and aircraft.
- Some restrictions for child-restraint systems apply based on seat locations and flight numbers. Visit http://bit.ly/InfantTravel for details.

#### DEVICES

- During taxi, takeoff and landing, portable electronic devices and headphones may be used.
   Larger electronic devices such as laptops must be stowed during taxi, takeoff and landing.
- Cellphones may be used while the boarding door is open until advised by your flight attendant that cell service must be turned off. Upon landing, your flight attendant will advise when cell service can be enabled.
- During flight, electronic voice communications of any kind (e.g., cell/VoIP calls) are prohibited.
- Headphones must be worn when using electronic devices such as personal music players,
   Inflight Entertainment Tablets, etc.

#### **ALCOHOL AND TOBACCO**

- Alcohol may not be consumed aboard an aircraft unless it has been provided by a flight attendant.
   No alcohol may be served to any person who appears to be intoxicated, or who is under 21 years of age.
- Smoking, chewing tobacco and electronic cigarette use are not permitted on any Alaska Airlines flight.





#### **CARD SENSE**

The black cards are adjacent (clue 1), and the three of spades is directly above the seven of clubs (clue 2). Also by clue 2, the seven of clubs is above the queen of hearts. Since neither heart is on the bottom (clue 3), the ten of diamonds is. By clue 4, the three of spades isn't the top card; the ace of hearts is, and the three of spades is second from the top, the seven of clubs is third, and the queen of hearts is fourth. In summary, from top to bottom: ace of hearts, three of spades, seven of clubs, queen of hearts, and ten of diamonds.


