)) Andrew Harrison, our chief commercial officer, talks about something that is near and dear to his heart—growth. While he's growing his family, we're also growing here at Alaska, adding more places to fly, especially for our guests in California. Enjoy. —Brad Tilden

Growth. It's a word that can be applied to all aspects of life. Growth is about increasing in size, becoming stronger and adding to what you have. My wife and I have eight children (including one newborn), and I can attest that growth comes with a lot of sleepless nights. It often means that challenges have to be overcome, new frontiers explored and, yes, some discomfort dealt with along the way—which, if you are like me, you prefer to avoid! Admittedly, however, growth is well worth the journey.

Alaska Airlines is no exception to this. As many of you no doubt know, Alaska Airlines has operated in the Pacific Northwest for more than 80 years, originating flights predominantly from Alaska, Washington and Oregon. To be sure, we now fly all over the nation from the

Pacific Northwest, including the East Coast and Hawai'i, but we had always served primarily those who call the Pacific Northwest home. If you take just the past 10 years, Alaska Airlines has grown out of the Pacific Northwest by nearly 70 percent, adding 64 routes. But, just like life, where the newborn becomes a toddler and the senior heads off to college or to their first "real" job, growth is essential. None of these things are achieved without it.

Last August, Virgin America celebrated its 10-year anniversary, and this December, we'll mark the first full year since Alaska and Virgin America joined forces. The question has often come up in conversation as to why this marriage occurred, and the answer is really quite simple—to enable growth.

We at Alaska Airlines have known for some time that if we wanted to continue to grow, we would need to branch out farther than our hometown. Virgin America has spent 10 hardfought years growing California, from the airline's original fleet of only two aircraft, serving just three cities, to 68 aircraft serving

31 cities. With this growth, the airline was able to acquire critical airport infrastructure and route authorities (such as slots in New York, and gates in San Francisco and Los Angeles) to serve very large and important routes.

Alaska Airlines has served California for nearly 40 years and, even prior to the merger, had 175 flights a day. With Alaska and Virgin America joining forces, we now have a foundation for steady and measured growth. It's true we've announced a lot of new routes out of California since the acquisition (27 to be exact), but this was to help round out key routes to provide utility for Californians, which Virgin America has done an amazing job of starting.

The real excitement here is that whether you live in the Pacific Northwest, California or one of the many other cities we serve, Alaska's growth is all about you and your travels. Some of the exciting things to accompany this growth have already been delivered, or will be delivered in the coming months, as follows:

- Greater opportunity for upgrades for our elite members as we add more premium seating on our Airbus fleet.
- Alaska Mileage Plan is the country's topranked frequent-flyer program, and it will continue to get better with our new expanded network and new global partners. And because it is miles-based, you will never be penalized for finding that great low fare.

As you can see, our growth has already begun to deliver great benefits for our guests, and there's more to look forward to. If this is your first flight with us, we're glad to be able to host you today. If it's your 1,000th, it's great to see you again! - Andrew Harrison

Crecimiento. Es una palabra que se puede aplicar a todos los aspectos de la vida. El crecimiento implica aumentar de tamaño, volverse más fuerte y sumar a lo que ya tenemos. Mi esposa y yo tenemos ocho hijos (incluyendo un recién nacido), y puedo dar fe de que el crecimiento viene con muchas noches sin dormir. A menudo significa que habrá desafíos por superar, nuevas fronteras por explorar y sí, algunas molestias en el proceso (algo que, si usted es como yo, preferirá evitar). Sin embargo, hay que reconocer que el crecimiento bien vale la pena.

Alaska Airlines no es la excepción. Como sin duda muchos de ustedes saben, Alaska Airlines ha operado en el noroeste del Pacífico durante más de 80 años, mayormente vuelos con origen desde Alaska, Washington y Oregon. Desde luego, volamos por todo el país, desde el noroeste del Pacífico incluyendo la Costa Este y

Hawái, pero principalmente siempre hemos mantenido el servicio para los que llaman al noroeste del Pacífico su hogar. Si damos un vistazo a los últimos 10 años, Alaska Airlines ha crecido desde el noroeste del Pacífico casi un 70 por ciento y agregó 64 rutas. El pasado agosto se celebró el 10.º aniversario de Virgin America, y en diciembre se cumplirá el primer año desde que Alaska y Virgin America unieron sus fuerzas. En las conversaciones siempre surge la pregunta sobre por qué se produjo esa unión, y la respuesta es bastante simple en realidad: para permitir el crecimiento.

Alaska Airlines ha sabido desde hace tiempo que para continuar creciendo, necesitaríamos expandirnos más allá de nuestra ciudad natal. Virgin America ha dedicado 10 años de esfuerzo a crecer en California, desde su flota original de solo dos aviones y servicios a solo tres ciudades hasta tener 68 aviones y servicios a 31 ciudades. Con este crecimiento, la aerolínea pudo adquirir infraestructura crucial en aeropuertos y autoridades de ruta.

Alaska Airlines ha prestado servicio en California por casi 40 años. Con la unión de esfuerzos entre Alaska y Virgin America, ahora tenemos una base que nos permite un crecimiento estable y medido. Es verdad que anunciamos muchas rutas nuevas desde California a partir de la adquisición (27, para ser exactos), pero esto fue solo para ayudar a completar las rutas clave y brindar servicios a los californianos con los que Virgin America ha hecho un excelente trabajo desde el principio.

La verdadera emoción aquí es que, ya sea que viva en el noroeste del Pacífico, en California o en una de las muchas ciudades en las que brindamos servicio, el crecimiento de Alaska tiene que ver con usted y sus viajes. WHAT'S NEW: MORE TOP MARKS FOR MILEAGE PLAN

)) If you're an elite traveler on Alaska Airlines, you're pretty happy, according to a study that recently named Alaska Mileage Plan the best airline elite-status program in the country. That's the assessment of The Points Guy, a well-regarded travel website that looked at how six major airline programs compared for top frequent flyers.

One key factor, according to the study: Alaska,

unlike its competitors, still rewards flyers with miles based on distance flown rather than dollars spent. Members also love Alaska's free upgrade certificates and the fact that MVP Gold and Gold 75K members get change fees and cancellation fees waived.

The study compared benefits at four elite-status levels. Alaska ranked first at three levels for the MVP and MVP Gold programs (MVP Gold won in two categories). The Points Guy also declared Alaska the overall winner as the carrier that "provides the best combined benefits to its elite members." )) Lifting off from Seattle earlier this fall, with goods bound for the state of Alaska, a converted Boeing 737-700 aircraft launched a new chapter for Alaska Air Cargo. The aircraft is the world's first

Boeing 737-700 to be converted from a passenger plane to a freighter.

Alaska Air Group expects to have two more converted 737-700 freighters by the end of the year. Its new fleet of three allcargo freighters will at that point be able to carry 15 percent more capacity overall. Until recently, Alaska operated one 737-400 freighter and five 737-400 combi aircraft that carried both passengers and cargo. Alaska retired this fleet in October.

Initially, the fleet of all-freight aircraft will primarily serve the state of Alaska and

> provide regular, scheduled service to 17 communities across the state. Now independent of the passenger operation, Alaska Air Cargo will provide more scheduled freight service than any other carrier in the state, and connect freight customers to 100 destina-

tions across Alaska Airlines' route network.

"With an all-freight fleet, our cargo business is now a stand-alone operation, allowing us to better focus on the needs of our cargo customers," says Wayne Newton, vice president of airport operations and customer service.

ONE GIANTS STEP

Alaska Airlines became the official airline of baseball's San Francisco Giants this fall. In doing so, the airline extended a partnership built by Virgin America and reinforced Alaska's commitment to the Bay Area. To celebrate a seven-year agreement, Alaska unveiled the design of a Giants-themed



Airbus 321, which will be operated by Virgin America starting in early 2018. Other features of the partnership will include:

- Alaska inflight Giants offers.
- Special vacation packages for Giants fans through the program Giants Vacations presented by Alaska Airlines.
- Alaska as the presenting partner for the Giant Race running-race events, which benefit community groups in Scottsdale, Sacramento, San Jose and San Francisco.
- An annual Alaska Airlines Day at AT&T Park that continues a two-for-one flightvoucher event for fans.
- The launch of a seasonal, twice-daily flight from San Francisco to Phoenix for Giants fans to attend spring training in 2018.
- Collaborations on community initiatives in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Technical Data Management Analyst Christina Brunn is a Legend of Customer Service

>> If you ask Virgin America teammates what Christina "CeeBee" Brunn does, you may hear 50 different answers, none of which describe her main job. Brunn is a technical data management analyst in Technical Operations, and she works on regulatory compliance. But her energy, cando attitude and strong work ethic help make the entire company a special place to work.

One of Virgin America's founding teammates, Brunn has been with the company for 11 years. In 2006, when the U.S. Department of Transportation denied the airline's initial application to begin service, Brunn helped organize the "let VA fly" campaign, in which teammates took to the streets of San Francisco to interact with people and get signatures to petition the DOT.



TEAM SOCIAL

>> Social media never sleeps, and neither does Alaska Airlines. Whether it's assisting a guest with a mileage request or responding to inquiries about a storm on the East Coast, Alaska Airlines social care is a 24/7 operation. It's a team of 12 people, with rotating shifts, responding to hundreds of inquiries throughout the day and night-all in 140 characters or less, and all in a social media minute.

Gabe Oronia is a customer care representative who has worked on the social care team for three years. While his primary responsibility is to assist guests on Alaska's social media channels, he also assists customers via phone from the airline's Seattle-based call center.

If you're a frequent flyer, chances are you've had a conversation with Oronia or other members of the team. They're the people behind the tweet responding to you about the status of your flight, commenting on your Instagram photo, or wishing you a nice trip on Facebook.

"It's such a fun job," Oronia says. "I love the interaction we have with people and how we're able to build relationships with them."

Quick customer service

Social media has provided a way for airlines to quickly address customer-service needs. Alaska has embraced the changes, using social media as an extension of its customer care program. You can still call the Alaska Airlines customer care team, but if it's after-hours or you're, say, on an airplane, you can reach a customer or social care representative as your needs arise.

According to Conversocial's Airline Benchmark Report, the average social media response time across the airline industry is 1 hour, 5 minutes. While Alaska aims to respond within 15 minutes, its actual average response time is just 2 minutes, 34 seconds.



"Social allows us to be truly 'in-the-moment' with our guests and to help solve travel-related issues when they happen, as they happen," says Michael Roy, social care program lead.

But speed isn't everything. From the start, Alaska placed a heavy emphasis on using real people to have real conversations. "We discourage quoting company policies and procedures verbatim," Roy says. "Instead, we encourage our people to communicate like they would with a friend. We empower our team members to share using their own words when crafting their responses."

When it comes to creating that personal connection, it's the little things that count. Every tweet or comment is signed with the responding agent's first name. Some agents, like Oronia, take the time to write down a guest's name when assisting with an issue, so they can make the conversation more personal

"The result has been fun," Roy says. "Some of our followers have taken a liking to our social care team members, each of whom have different interests and insights to share."

A juggling act

Travel can be stressful, and even though Alaska Airlines has worked hard to make the travel experience hassle free, things like weather and air traffic can cause unavoidable delays. Explaining this within the confines of a tweet can sometimes be difficult.

"I just try to think of how I would feel in that situation," Oronia says. "I do my best to explain, to be understanding and to take care of them."

In these irregular-operation situations, agents may have to juggle multiple issues at once. While Oronia is waiting for Central Baggage Service to locate a guest's bag, he may also be checking the status of a flight for another guest, while also helping another with their Alaska Mileage Plan account.

The toughest part of the job, Oronia says, is when circumstances don't allow him to help. "We all feel that personal connection to our guests, so when they're hurting, we're hurting."

Since January, the social care team has nearly doubled in size. "As social continues to mature and our airline continues to expand," Roy says, "we'll grow right along with it." ズ

INTO THE BEAT

>> The W Seattle Sound Suite is a hip-hop artist's dream: chic leather couches, professional sound-recording equipment and floorto-ceiling windows that overlook Seattle's skyline. It's easy to picture Grammy-winning artists like Macklemore recording their next big hits in this space. Yet the beats coming out of the suite recently, sounding like something streaming on Spotify, were coming from students in the Residency program, recording their first professional tracks.

The Residency program—started in 2015 by Macklemore and Ryan Lewis, along with Arts Corps and the Museum of Pop Culture (MoPOP)—provides a high-value arts-instruction program for the area's underserved youth.

"There are so many talented young people that just need opportunity and confidence," says Ben Secord, the Residency's program director. Secord also serves as Macklemore and Ryan Lewis' director of philanthropy and community engagement.

For one month each summer, the Residency

is like a full-time job. Students meet Monday through Friday, 10 A.M. to 4 P.M., for intensive instruction on two tracks: vocals and production. The vocal track focuses on lyricism, rhyme structure and delivery. Production covers media literacy, beat-making and song construction. Youths are then separated into song groups, where vocal artists and production artists collaborate to create original content.

The program culminates with the young artists recording their tracks and then performing on stage at MoPOP. Upon successful completion of the program, students receive a \$500 stipend, and continue to meet monthly for six months for further instruction.

One of those young artists is Ivanna Garza, 16. Though naturally inclined toward music, Garza says she was a bit hesitant about producing and performing hip-hop. Now, after three years in the program, she says she's found her passion and a network of support to help her pursue that passion.

Ralph Redmond, 19, participated in the

Residency program in 2016 and this year has returned as the program's intern. "I started rapping at a very young age," he says. "I'm passionate about rapping and want to learn as much as I can."

As an intern, he is not only furthering his own music instruction and professional development, but he's also becoming a mentor.

The professional teaching artists at the Residency have deep roots in the Seattle music industry, which has allowed the Residency to provide high-quality music instruction and pipelines to internships.

Alaska Airlines' support of the Residency is part of the company's ongoing commitment to youth and education. In October, working with Macklemore, the airline sent Garza, Redmond and the other 43 young artists in this year's Residency program to Phoenix to see Macklemore perform live.

"Seeing an artist who started when he was just 14 and seeing his level of professionalism makes a lasting impression," Secord says. ⊀

The biggest area I was looking to improve was my overall energy. I knew that if it increased, I could push through my other issues. While it didn't happen overnight (it took about six months), I finally started seeing and feeling the benefits of the program.

PRO Sports Club is a very unique place. It has a whole eco-system to help you improve. For me, it starts the minute I check-in. I'm always greeted with a smile and some encouraging words. When I visit the Anti-Aging Center, I'm constantly encouraged and inspired by the entire staff. I also take advantage of other club programs such as personal training and meeting with a dietitian.

While signing up for the Anti-Aging program was the best thing I could have done, partnering with my trainer was the second best thing I did. She has embraced my personal mission, pushes me hard and holds me accountable. My dietitian worked with me to help jumpstart my nutrition. I always walk away feeling like I have an entire team that's dedicated to me and my goals.

I've been most pleased with my workout results. Dr. Upton had said the program would be a benefit, but I had no idea how well my body would respond. This has provided me with so much positive reinforcement and motivation to keep going. This spring, I'll be competing in both the Masters (50+) and Open Emerald Cup Bodybuilding competition.

I attribute my success to placing myself in a positive and supportive environment where I wasn't placed on some Bell Curve and told to simply conform. The program didn't try to force me to "just act my age." Rather, it challenged me to redefine my age.


Promotions vary by individual resorts. Check with your destination resort before you go, to ensure that offers are current.

Use the right ski-and-snowboard bag.

When you fly Alaska, your ski and snowboard equipment may exceed 62 linear inches, but should be no more than 115 linear inches if you want to avoid the oversize-bag fee. Most skis and snowboards are under that limit, so look for cases that fit for height, but aren't excessively long.

Also, decide whether you want to invest in a wheeled ski-and-snowboard bag. With a nonwheeled bag, you may save money on your luggage and get an extra workout, but you'll roll more comfortably through airports and resort parking lots with a pricier wheeled bag.

Pack your bag appropriately. It's easy to overpack for a ski trip, but remember that



overweight fees apply when your bag weighs more than 50 pounds. If you find yourself just over that mark at the airport, try adjusting the gear from one bag to another. Technology is your friend. Alaska Airlines is committed to making travel easier through technology. Know what to expect. Especially when you travel with large equipment bags, allow yourself plenty of time at the airport. You should arrive at least two hours before a domestic departure and check your bags at least 40 minutes beforehand. Upon arrival, most ski-and-snowboard bags will be delivered to the oversize-bag pickup area. If you're not sure where to go, check with airport staff.

TALKING TURKEY

Recommendations for Thanksgiving Day success

)) It's all about the gravy! Everything I do for my Thanksgiving dinner revolves around achieving silky, soul-satisfying, divine graaaavy. You can revel in your perfect Yukon Gold mashed potatoes; your earthy prune-and-hearth-bread stuffing; your moist, succulent turkey or whatever your family's favorite dish may be, but without some drippings-laced gravy to tie it all together, you might as well call for takeout.

I don't pretend to know the only way to accomplish gravy perfection, but I do have a tried-and-true way that I don't mind sharing. I would encourage you to be brave, have confidence, and by all means, try out your gravy on a humble chicken dinner weeks before you attempt it on Thanksgiving Day. As with many recipes, it's often more about getting to your goal than the specific ingredients—some components are crucial, but others can be customized to your taste. So, if you happen to hate sage, use thyme. If gluten is a problem for you, try corn or potato starch to thicken your pot of gold. You may end up with something different from my version, but if you use great ingredients and the following technique, it should be just as good.

First, I make a stock out of turkey trimmings, including wings, necks and giblets—but not the liver! Make the stock by browning these pieces in a pan in the oven, using rendered turkey fat from the neck cavity. Add a mirepoix of diced onions, celery, carrots, herbs and a fresh bay leaf. Give all this a hard sear. Then, deglaze your pan with a hearty pour of red wine, scraping all the browned bits from the pan and pouring the mix into a stockpot. Now add chicken stock, not water, to cover the trimmings; this way, you double the richness. A tip: I love the roasty flavor of coffee beans, so I add a sachet of 24 beans to aromatize my stock. Cook everything for an hour, then strain it through cheesecloth to get rid of everything but the broth.

Now to the recipient of your gravy—the bird! My preference is a 15- to 18-pound organic free-range turkey, or about 1 pound per person.

Thinly slice one large yellow onion and layer the slices in your roasting pan. Cover the slices with 3 sprigs of sage, 5 or 6 cloves of garlic, 6 tablespoons of butter and several heavy grinds of fresh black pepper.

FRESH TAKES

Lightly stuff the bird with more aromatics, such as orange wedges, quartered shallots, a few garlic cloves, a couple sage sprigs and 24 more coffee beans (no sachet). Place the turkey atop the onions and sage and pop it all in the oven at 350 F. Roast until juices run clear when you poke a thigh with a skewer (or when a meat thermometer in the inner thigh or breast reads 165 F). While you cook, baste the turkey with pan drippings—every 20 minutes or so, until done. In the end, all of your onions should be golden to dark brown. Pull the gobbler out and put it on your serving platter to rest for at least 45 minutes while you finish the gravy.

This is the exciting part. Put the roasting pan full of drippings on top of a burner at medium heat. You want to dry up the juices and other "stuff" to almost a paste. The fat will separate—and that's OK. Add approximately 6 tablespoons of flour and stir it into the paste to make a roux. Cook this for a few minutes, while

stirring. The roux should become mahogany or darker. Next, take a cup of the rich, strained stock and stir it into your paste. Add another cup, and another, being careful to whisk out lumps each time. Once the mix is as thin as maple syrup, stop adding liquid. Let the pan simmer over medium-low heat until it reduces. You can add more stock or red wine if it gets too thick. Keep up a gentle stir. Now is a good time for the chef to pour a glass of something delicious while pondering life, family and gravy.


I like gravy a bit thick. Others prefer it brothier. Also, some like strained gravy—and straining is easy. For my taste, if the onions and other fixings haven't already melted in, I would smooth the gravy with an electric hand blender. Don't forget to taste the result, and season with salt and pepper to your liking.

One of the treats of being Thanksgiving chef is basking in the glow of your efforts. In cooking this meal for family and friends, you carry on a proud tradition hundreds of years in the making. Your commitment to The Gravy—and everything else—represents the love and care you feel for your guests.



In college, when I flew from California to Utah to join family members at my godmother's house, I enjoyed seeing at the airport fellow university students sporting sweatshirts of their respective institutions of higher learning-all of us bound for "homier" surroundings.

Now, as a grown woman on her own, I prize more than ever visiting loved ones who live far away and the chance to combine the traditions of my favorite holiday with the fun of traveling, my favorite activity. I've been to more than 35 countries, and have cherished every trip, particularly experiencing other

cultures. I cherish my domestic holiday getaways just as much, treasuring what is familiar and dear to me.

Thanksgiving has always been a holiday that resonates with me. The traditional food comforts my soul, and loved ones coming together warms my heart. Fond childhood memories include staying in my pajamas as long as I could on Thanksgiving morning, joining my grandfather to eat fresh-picked tangerines from my great-aunt's tree, and gathering with everyone to watch the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade on TV. I still look forward to the parade, but now I'm also peeling potatoes or prepping the table settings in an effort to "adult" and contribute. (However, I still stay in my pajamas until the last possible second.)

Also treasured in my memory bank is how we included Mickey Mouse in our family circle during our LA Thanksgivings. We always carved out a day for Disneyland and exploring a little bit of the City of Angels.

Another beloved recollection relates to my first Thanksgiving in Utah, when I was 20. I rendezvoused with other family members at the Salt Lake City airport on Wednesday. My godmother and her sons picked us up and took us to their home in Ogden, about 40 miles north, for the night. Then, early the next morning, turkey and trimmings in an ice chest, we drove to a rental house in Island Park, Idaho, southwest of Yellowstone's West Entrance, for our feast. When we set out on Friday to explore the park, we discovered the entrance was closed to vehicles and the snow tours weren't yet running, so we made the most of the weekend by talking and laughing in our huge holiday house in the forest. We soaked in the hot tub, and we listened, from our deck, to wolves howling.

More Ogden Thanksgivings came and went, providing football, friends, full tummies and fond memories. And last year, we ignored lingering leftovers and headed south for Moab, Utah, and Arches National Park (this time we checked in advance to make sure it was open).

That was the beginning of my greater appreciation for America's National Park System.

At Arches—named for its 2,000-plus stone arches—the spectacular red rocks, glowing in the sun, helped me realize the beauty within my own country's borders. We visited various lookout sites, such as Delicate Arch, the largest freestanding arch in the park, with a 46-foottall, 32-foot-wide "window," and Devils Garden, where to me, the formations all seemed heavenly, even the unique obelisk called Dark Angel.

When my great-grandparents came to the U.S. from Italy, they eventually settled in Utah, so I'd been coming to The Beehive State my entire life. I'd seen the rugged Wasatch Range, sampled spirits at Park City's High West Distillery, wandered through Ogden's spectacular Christmas Village, and taken a picture in front of Salt Lake City's historic Fortunato Anselmo

house, where my grandmother grew up in the early 1900s. She was the daughter of Fortunato Anselmo, Italy's honorary vice consul for Salt Lake City. But it wasn't until last year that I learned Utah is home to five national parks. It was information that blew my well-traveled mind. This was a state I'd visited almost every year of my life—often at a time when we focus on gratitude—yet I had not recognized what an epically beautiful place Utah is, full of natural travel treasures that people from all over the world come to see.





)) It's November, so hopefully you've already purchased your Thanksgiving flights. If you haven't, don't fret; I usually wait until the last minute, too. This means that I have some tips to help save you money.

And if you were a good boy or girl and bought your tickets early, then listen up. I have some tips to help make your trip a little smoother!

Be flexible when buying tickets

Without a doubt, the key to finding cheap Thanksgiving flights (or any flights, for that matter) is to be as flexible as possible. For instance, I have a hunch you want to depart the Wednesday before Thanksgiving and return on Sunday after. Am I right? Instead, try departing a day earlier and returning a day later.

Another money-saving trick is to be flexible with locations. For example, if flying to San Francisco (SFO), widen your flight search to Oakland (OAK), about 30 miles east, and San Jose (SJC), about 30 miles southeast, as well. Almost all major U.S. cities have a selection of nearby airports, so check to see whether driving a little farther can save you a lot.

Pack your patience

Seasoned business travelers sometimes get annoyed when they see infrequent travelers slowing down security lines by not being prepared (i.e., not knowing the 3-1-1 liquids ruleless than 3-ounce containers of liquid, in one clear, quart-size bag, and one bag per traveler—or not removing the metal from their pockets). I used to feel this way, too, but then I realized that not everyone is as lucky as I am to

travel for a living, and the rules can be daunting to a first-timer. And being impatient doesn't get you through the line any faster. That's why I arrive to the airport early and chill.

Pro tip: Always wait for your belongings to go into the X-ray machine before going through the metal detectors, as it's always good to keep an eye on your valuables.

Get Clear for speedy security

One way to get through security quickly is to sign up for Clear (clearme.com). You can usually do it in any airport where Clear is available, and Clear often has promotions; otherwise, it's \$15 a month. Once you pass a three-step screening process, all you do is tap your finger or scan your eyes to verify that you are you, and then you get escorted to the front of physical security lines. It usually allows you to speed through these initial lines in five minutes or less. It's even better if you get TSA Precheck. X





There are 6,000 windows, 33 yellow cabs and 47 pizzas in miniature New York City. The bite-size Big Apple is a small part of Gulliver's Gate, a new attraction, open year-round, in which attendees enter a city-block-long

model of the world in Manhattan's Times Square. The installation, created by artists from around the globe, includes sections depicting Europe, Russia, Asia, Latin America and the Middle East. The Loch Ness Monster swims through murky Scottish waters; Spider-Man swings from the Brooklyn Bridge; and The Beatles stroll across Abbey Road. You can even find a miniature Alaska Airlines jet in the installation's airport.

Each model was created in its respective part of the world by local model makers and then transported to New York, where it was assembled into one installation. The Europe section, for instance, was built in Rimini, Italy, by 31 model makers over 137 days.

Gulliver's Gate, named for Gulliver's Travels, the 1726 book by Jonathan Swift, also provides an interactive experience. Prior to embarking on a self-guided tour, visitors are given a key that can be used to bring different parts of the displays to life. For example, put the key into a lock in front of the Royal Albert Hall in London and a mini version of Adele will sing. AN ARTIST'S **SCULPTING**

Edgar Degas (1834–1917) is perhaps best known for colorful and dynamic paintings of ballet dancers. But the French artist was also a prolific sculptor in wax and plaster, despite only ever displaying one such sculpture, Little Dancer, Aged Fourteen, in his lifetime. The majority of these figurines were not intended for public viewership because the artist thought of them largely as informal studies, a focus on the process rather than the final product. Now, that artistic process is being celebrated as 72 bronze casts of Degas' sculptures, along with 17 of his paintings and drawings, make up the exhibit "Taking Shape: Degas as Sculptor." It's at the Norton Simon Museum in Pasadena, California, Nov. 10-April 9, 2018. Regarded as one of the founders of the

Impressionist movement, Degas often experimented with the finish of his pictures. The sketch-aesthetic of Impressionist art was intended to evoke the spontaneity of the artist's response to nature. 





BUILDING **HISTORY**

>> Chicago has long pushed building design to new heights. It's home to the Willis Tower, which was the world's tallest building until 1998, and the Jeanne Gang-designed Aqua Tower, a high-rise with balconies resembling rippling water. Now, at the Chicago Architecture Biennial, through Jan. 7, 2018, more than 140 architects and artists are displaying work while celebrating innovation in their field. The theme of the second-ever biennial is "Make New History."

The main exhibit at the Chicago Cultural Center features models, prototypes and facades by architects from more than 20 countries. Firms represented include Lisbon, Portugal-based Aires Mateus, which conceptualized the headquarters for Energias de Portugal, and Barcelona, Spain-based Barozzi Veiga, which envisioned the triangular-topped Philharmonic Hall in Szczecin, Poland. Some biennial events



will be at other venues, including the DePaul Art Museum and the Hyde Park Art Center.

The biennial allows visitors to take part in a global discussion about the future of architecture through forums on topics such as building material and civic histories. For more information, visit chicagoarchitecturebiennial.org.

SHARING STORIES


Philadelphia is home to more than 1.5 million people, many of whom have a story worth sharing.

THE COURAGE

>> When singer-songwriter Mandy Harvey took the stage to audition for America's Got Talent on June 6, 2017, her expectations were modest. Standing shoeless in front of judges that included the notoriously critical and blunt Simon Cowell, Harvey strummed her 'ukulele and sang an original song, called Try. As her lilting, mellifluous and angelic voice filled the packed auditorium, the judges' mouths opened wide with awe, and soon the audience was cheering in a standing ovation, their hands waving. After the song's conclusion, Cowell reached over and hit the show's Golden Buzzer, sending thousands of glittering strips of golden confetti cascading down on Harvey.

"Honestly, at the time," says Harvey of that Golden Buzzer moment, "I wasn't even sure what it meant!"

What it meant was that with one press of a button, Cowell had sent Harvey straight through to the live rounds of one of America's most popular competition shows, and that her performance would win the hearts of millions of people around the world. To date, the YouTube recording of her audition has more than 23 million views. Facebook views of the recording have topped an astounding 175 million.

Incidentally—Mandy Harvey happens to be completely deaf. She sings without shoes so she can feel the tempo, the beat, the rhythm in her feet through vibrations in the floor.

Born with a connective tissue disorder that gradually eroded her hearing, she nonetheless loved and explored music early in life. She sang in church choirs, with her dad, and in school choirs. She played any instrument she could.

Harvey enrolled as a music-education major at Colorado State University at age 18 (in 2007). At age 19, her residual hearing had declined to the point that she was legally deaf, and she was effectively dropped from the program. A few months later, Harvey was completely deaf. Despondent and horribly depressed, she believed that music would no longer be a part of her life. She stopped singing and remained in a deep depression for about a year. Her musical dreams seemed to have ended.

But Harvey's father, a tremendous supporter, convinced her to learn the singing part of the song Come Home by OneRepublic. He talked her into singing it while he played guitar. When he started crying, Harvey assumed it was



because she sounded terrible. As it turned out, he was crying tears of joy. Harvey still sounded like an angel, and her pitch was near-perfect.

Before Harvey's audition for America's Got Talent, Simon Cowell asked her what she would be singing. She told him that she'd written a song called Try. Then, as her voice guavered with nerves, she explained that after she lost her hearing, she had given up, but she wanted to do more with her life than just give up. She wanted to try.

Try she has, and she's succeeded. It hasn't been easy. Initially, during her return to music, she was afflicted with such stage fright that she would become ill before she performed. But through time, practice, perseverance and receptive audiences, she broke through the anxiety. She learned to trust her pitch and feel the vibrations of her

accompaniments-drums, bass, piano and saxophone—in her chest cavity, on her skin, through her feet. She discovered that music could not only be heard; it could also be felt.

For America's Got Talent Harvey sang all original songs, and made it through to the last night and the final five competitors. It was a big night for Harvey, and although she didn't win the competition, she was triumphant in myriad ways.

"On that last night," she says, "I had the tremendous honor of being introduced by Academy Award winner Marlee Matlin, whom I've looked up to for years. She's an amazing advocate for the deaf community. We plan to work together to break down the stigma of what it looks like to be deaf-to change the perception. Just because you have a difference doesn't mean you are broken. You are just as important as anybody else."

Harvey also got to perform a duet with music legend Shania Twain, and the entire experience has catapulted Harvey into the national, even global, spotlight. It's a spotlight she plans to use to make a difference.

"I don't care about money or fame," she says. "I want to use my platform to see how many people's lives I can positively affect. I want to bring awareness to things that matter, like invisible disabilities. I want to play 'ukulele festivals in different countries, and volunteer, visiting schools in the middle of nowhere. As long as what I'm doing is significant. Sometimes the most impactful things you can do involve people whom most would ignore."

The multitalented Harvey is not only a singer and uke player; she also plays guitar and piano; performs sign language while she sings; is an inspirational speaker; and recently published a book, Sensing the Rhythm: Finding My Voice in a World Without Sound. She describes the book as "Me in a small binding ... a collection of life lessons—of my small victories, my moments of fear, my moments of doubt, the things that I've learned every bumpy step of the way."

Harvey's message in her lyrics, her talks and her book is to encourage other people. It's a message that is both simple and profound: "If you get knocked down, you have to choose to get up off the floor. You have to be willing to allow your life to change."

The response to Harvey's message, conveyed on



America's Got Talent and in her book, has been remarkable. "I am ecstatic," she says. "And so grateful, because all of these people are sending me messages about their own lives and telling me how I've affected their lives. What an amazing thing to be a part of, working together to strip away a barrier: the idea that we are all struggling alone. No, everyone is struggling ... and we're going to talk about it, and we're going to make a difference. All of us are struggling in one way or another. Why can't we hold each other's hand and lift each other up?"

Harvey is all about lifting people up. "My goal for my concerts in the future is to make them a lot more inclusive," she says, "to involve sign language, closed captioning, interpreters; to include visual stimulation that marries the themes of the song with the audience and allows them a way in, regardless of their background or history or disability, and allows them to enjoy the

experience. I don't know exactly how I'm going to do it yet, but I'm making a commitment to do it. I want to be just one of many artists who adopt that behavior so that it becomes the industry standard."

Life is seemingly moving at light speed for Mandy Harvey, and she understands the reality that her gift—the ability to play music and sing so well even though she can't hearmight be fleeting, might be temporary. That realization is reflected in the lyrics of her song This Time, which she sang in the finals of America's Got Talent:

"I'm second guessing, but I'm trying, Before it all disappears. Seconds turn into minutes, Wasting time instead of living, Please, don't stand in my way, 'Cause I am running. ..."

"There's no guarantee that tomorrow I'm going to be able to figure this out," says Harvey. "But if I wake up one day and can't figure it out anymore, I want to be able to say that I've done as much as I possibly could. I've got momentum, and I'm running. And I need to run as far as I can, while I can."

Mandy Harvey, who lives in Florida, will be performing soon across the country, with events in California, Oregon and Washington state in early 2018. For a full schedule and more information, visit mandyharveymusic.com. *

CONNECTING **SIGHT AND** SOUND

Pico Music + Sound helps clients tell their story

>> Have you ever wondered who wrote the show tune behind one of the commercials for the Amazon Prime service or the jingle that plays before a movie is shown on the Alaska Beyond Entertainment system on your flight?

The answer is the creative folks at Pico Music + Sound (picosound.tv), a company that produces the sound for documentaries, commercials, corporate films and videogames.

Led by Seattle natives Ellis Hawes and Lucas Field, Pico boasts an impressive client list that ranges from Adidas to Alaska Airlines, from Skittles to Whole Foods.

"No matter what we are working on, it's about making the piece sing for the client," Hawes says. "We think of it as storytelling, and what are the best sounds that would complement what the client is trying to say?"

That was the case for one of their favorite assignments: writing a Broadway-style tune for the launch of Amazon Prime, a special online service that offers free shipping and exclusive access to music and content. The result was a rousing musical number that includes a chorus, walking boxes, dancers and flying drones.

"We were given the script and made five different versions of the song," Hawes says. "The version chosen was written by Lucas. Amazon CEO Jeff Bezos thought it was funny, and the song pretty much stayed the same through the entire process."

The 6-foot, 10-inch Hawes comes from a well-known Seattle basketball family. His father, Steve Hawes, starred for the University of Washington in the late 1960s and early 1970s, before spending 10 seasons in the NBA. Ellis' cousin, Spencer Hawes, also played at Washington and has played 10 seasons in the NBA. While Ellis played the sport in high school



and one year in college, he was more focused on exploring his creative side through the lens of music and sound.

Serendipity struck in 2006 when some friends needed help with the music for a training video. Hawes found that putting music together with images just came naturally. "I was able to feel the way music works with pictures and videos," Hawes says. "I found that I really liked finding the right sounds to help immerse the viewer in what is on the screen."

Hawes realized he could parlay creating music and sound for commercials into a business, and launched Pico Music + Sound. Pico means "small" in Latin. Ironically, it is the towering Hawes' nickname, which he was given as a young boy in Venice, Italy, where he lived while his father played for a European basketball team for a year.

His big break came in 2010 when Pico was hired to create the music for a Bank of the West advertising campaign. Later that year, he enlisted Field, a longtime acquaintance who was also in the Seattle music scene, to help with a second bank commercial. The two



found they worked well together, and Field joined the company. Pico quickly connected with Seattle's advertising industry, leading to more work. In 2014, Field moved to Los Angeles, allowing the company to expand into Southern California.

Today, Hawes anchors the Seattle business and Field runs the Los Angeles office. While Hawes is the executive producer and Field is the creative director, their positions and responsibilities overlap, with both working in the creative field and helping to develop the music and sounds for their clients.

They are planning to continue focusing on television programs, commercials, videogames and the new field of virtual reality.

"It's still amazing to me every day that we get to make a living doing what we do," Hawes says. "I get to work on music. It's very fun and for me, pretty much a dream come true." ズ







EXPLORING THE CITY OF OAKS

Raleigh, North Carolina, offers a rich cultural experience

>>> Fall is my favorite time of year to show visitors the cultural sites in Raleigh, North Carolina's capital. There's no shortage of parks and captivating museums to enjoy in the City of Oaks, so named for the many oak trees that line city streets.

Raleigh has become a burgeoning arts center, with its crown jewel being the North Carolina Museum of Art. Located northwest of downtown, the museum is known for its large

permanent collection, which ranges from 6,000-year-old Egyptian ceramic art to modern and contemporary works by Anselm Kiefer and Frank Stella. It also has a gallery dedicated to the works of Auguste Rodin. Next to the museum is the 164-acre Ann and Jim Goodnight Museum Park. One of the largest in the country, the museum park offers public art installations, jogging and biking trails, and an outdoor theater.

District. It is featuring the exhibit "And Then the Sun Swallowed Me," an installation that depicts the power of a supernova, by Durhambased artist Heather Gordon, which is on display through February 4, 2018.

About a block north of the Capitol is the North Carolina Museum of Natural Sciences, which features exhibits of snakes, butterflies, a two-toed sloth and other live animals. The museum's collection of whale skeletons is among the nation's largest, and it displays one of the most complete *Acrocanthosaurus* dinosaur skeletons ever found.

Next door is the North Carolina Museum

of History, which is currently displaying reproductions of the Wright Brothers' first plane, the 1903 Wright Flyer, and the 1911 Wright Glider. The planes are on loan through the summer of 2018 from the Wright Brothers National Memorial Visitor Center outside Kitty Hawk. The museum also has an exhibit that traces 14,000 years of North Carolina history.

BASKETBALL RIVALRY

The Greater Raleigh area is home to one of the most famous rivalries in college basketball: University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill versus Duke University in Durham. The schools, which are only about 10 miles apart, face off this season on February 8, in Chapel Hill, and March 3, in Durham.

In western Raleigh, you'll find Pullen Park, a family-friendly place with a historical carousel, a miniature train ride and a Kiddie Boats ride. In addition, there is an aquatic center, an arts center and the Theatre In The Park.

The city's downtown is home to a marvelous group of museums clustered around the North Carolina State Capitol, including the Contemporary Art Museum (CAM Raleigh) to the west of the Capitol, in the city's Warehouse

A COOL TIME IN OLD TOWN




Each time I visit Albuquerque, I'm charmed by this high-desert city just west of the Sandia Mountains. Albuquerque, which has a population of about 545.000. is a car-friendly

a population of about 545,000, is a car-friendly town, and yet it is winningly walkable in some areas. One prime place for going about on foot is Old Town, where the Spanish founded the city in 1706 near the banks of the Rio Grande.

I began a recent walk at Old Town Plaza at San Felipe de Neri Church, a historic Catholic site established the year Albuquerque was founded (though the church that survives today was built in 1793). I admired the building's deep, vaulted interior, and from the outside I raised my eyes to the church's landmark bell towers. Every Christmas Eve, Old Town hosts a serene luminaria display of lit paper-bag lanterns. In the warmer months, it has a lively Summertime Concerts in Old Town series.

Next I set off around the 10-block area of heritage buildings near Old Town Plaza. My first stop, the Albuquerque Museum, delighted me with its outdoor sculpture garden; collections of Native American, Spanish and Mexican cultural artifacts; and the "Common Ground: Art in New Mexico" series of works by leading





New Mexico artists—including one of my favorites, the painter Georgia O'Keeffe.

Twenty-first century Albuquerque makes a tongue-in-cheek appearance in the San Felipe Street shop The Candy Lady, which sells 100-gram bags of blue "Breaking Bad Candy," an edible sugar-crystal prop originally commissioned by the producers of TV's Breaking Bad.

Old Town's Turquoise Museum shows off gorgeous polished gems, and turquoise and silver jewelry, in attractive displays. It's one of the main cultural institutions in Old Town, which also boasts art galleries, shops and restaurants. The popular restaurant La Placita Dining Rooms serves tasty, stick-to-the-ribs enchiladas and other comfort food. I stopped by Church Street Cafe for hot, fried-dough sopapillas drizzled with honey, and a bowl of posole: thick corn soup with pork and deeply delicious New Mexico green chile peppers. This

meal hit the spot after my jaunt through the historically and culturally rich section that is Albuquerque's Old Town.

STROLLING IN SANTA FE

Walking is one of the great urban pleasures, and Santa Fe, the 407-year-old city about 60 miles northeast of Albuquerque, is one of the best places I know to take a walk. History, art, architecture, food, drink and retail therapy take on tactile, up-close and personal qualities when you explore Santa Fe on foot.

The city offers many walking tours led by local experts (see santafe.org for ideas). My own recent visits have been built around DIY walks, self-guided perambulations in which I focus on things I most want to see and do. With its distinctive and varied attractions, Santa Fe has plenty for just about anyone to individualize a walk suited to personal interests.

Canyon Road is one place I never miss. This narrow, sloping route has dozens of art galleries and one-of-a-kind shops that sell clothing, jewelry and antiques. I start at the foot of

Canyon Road, at the intersection with Paseo de Peralta, and take a slow walk (less than a mile) up the canyon. On one recent Canyon Road excursion, my wife bought silver-and-pearl earrings, and then the two of us had an elegant dinner of Southwestern cuisine at The Compound Restaurant.

On Christmas Eve, Canyon Road hosts a well-attended public walk past hundreds of farolitos—luminous paper-bag lanterns (sometimes called luminarias) lit with candles and placed around and atop the town's famed adobe structures.

I also like walking via Paseo de Peralta from downtown to the Railyard (about 1 mile). The Railyard combines a vintage train station and repurposed warehouses with modern additions such as Site Santa Fe, a large contemporary art space. Walking is really the way to see the

Railyard, whether you're sampling green chile peppers and blue corn at the farmers market or popping into Second Street Brewery to sample hoppy local microbrews.

Santa Fe's 17th century downtown square ("the Plaza") is fringed with centuries-old adobe and wood buildings, and graced by artisans—many Native American—selling jewelry, pottery and woven baskets. I always check out the Palace of the Governors museum for its history exhibits. From there, it's an easy walk to anywhere downtown in this city of close to 83,000. On a walk in the city's clear, crisp mountain air, Santa Fe positively glows.

SWEET AS PIE

>>> Few desserts occupy such a celebrated spot on the table as the Thanksgiving pie. Baking instructor and author of Art of the Pie, Kate McDermott, reassures nervous cooks: "If you are most comfortable buying pie dough, do it. Nobody is going to refuse to eat it." And if you do roll your own, don't overthink it-or overwork the dough. And "stop before you think you're done, and don't forget to turn on the oven," she says.

When it comes to the crust—what gives most new bakers the willies—she reminds us to keep everything as cold as possible: the butter, the flour, even our hands ("hold ice cubes" before handling the dough, she suggests).

Rachael Coyle, owner of Seattle's Coyle's Bakeshop, takes keeping things cold one step further, suggesting that home cooks look to the practices of a commercial kitchen. For instance, she and her team make everything ahead of time and freeze it. She says you can roll your dough into an aluminum pie pan, wrap it with cellophane and freeze it (stacked, if you're making more than one) up to two weeks

CRAFTING CRANBERRY PIE

"People don't do it too often, but it's a nice fall-time, going-into-the-winter alternative to sour-cherry pie," says Kate McDermott, a baking instructor and cookbook author. "[Cranberry pie] has that same 'wow factor,' and it's really pretty. It doesn't take too many ingredients at all: cranberries, sugar, maybe a little Cointreau, a tiny bit of salt, a squeeze of lemon, and cornstarch to thicken it—just a couple teaspoons because there is so much natural pectin in cranberries."

ahead to buy yourself time in the kitchen on the day of.

Options for filling a pie stoke endless enthusiasm in both Coyle and McDermott. Coyle keeps her pies fairly traditional, with minor tweaks: adding a bit of dark chocolate to cut the sweetness of pecan, using fresh winter luxury pie pumpkins to make her own filling and adding pear to her apple pie filling for better texture (she also suggests adding herbs such as thyme). McDermott gets a bit more playful, crossing courses of the meal with her

cranberry pie and replacing evaporated milk in her pumpkin filling with light coconut milk.

McDermott also has a few last-minute reminders: "Put [the filled pie pan] on a preheated sheet pan to avoid a soggy bottom," she says, and fill a fruit pie only up to about a half-inch below the rim to keep it from bubbling over. But most importantly, she returns to her initial advice about people's willingness to eat dessert in almost any form: "If things go wrong, turn it into a lasagna pan, and you'll have an amazing crumble." ⊀

AMERICAN AS APPLE BRANDY

Thanksgiving is a celebration of tradition. At the dinner table, this arrives in the form of all the familiar fixings. Close your eyes, and you'll easily envision that oversize plate of sliced poultry, mashed potatoes and gravy. What's filling your glass, however, isn't nearly as obvious. It should be. For there exists an underappreciated drink that's as American as the holiday itself: American apple brandy. Applejack—as the spirit is sometimes called—predates American whiskey, with origins that stretch to the 17th century. A recent uptick in popularity suggests that modern craft drinkers are now willing to revisit apple brandy's past.

Around the time of the Revolutionary War, it was common for colonial households to

produce applejack—that's because apples were a very abundant crop, says Lisa Laird Dunn of Laird & Company in Scobeyville, New Jersey. Her ancestors shared the family recipe with General George Washington in the early 1760s, she says. "[They] also supplied Continental troops with applejack. It was America's first and original spirit." Back then, homemade apple brandy was the result of jacking—a process in which fermented apple juice was left outside to freeze in winter, removing excess water and concentrating the alcohol.

Today, commercial brands such as Laird's use modern distillation techniques to produce a much cleaner liquid, typically aged in oak barrels to soften its edges. It forms a sensible

substitution for whiskey in classic cocktails, from the Old Fashioned to the Sour. It also pairs effortlessly alongside the flavors of fall—nutmeg, walnuts and cinnamon spice are common tasting notes. For her personal sipping, Laird Dunn combines her brandy with mulled cider, and tops it with allspice, cloves and club soda.

In the San Francisco Bay Area, **St. George Spirits** offers its California Reserve Apple

Brandy. Time in the barrel allows for a slight
baking-spice aroma, but this juice is all about
the fruit. "It's like taking a snapshot of the way
an amazing piece of fruit smells and tastes at
the peak of ripeness, and then locking it away
for later," explains master distiller Lance
Winters.

Older than the country that birthed it and steeped in history, American apple brandy has a future that seems every bit as sweet. **X**

MAKING AN IMPACT

>> I breathlessly count down the final moments of our 30-second rest period before my sister, Katrina, and I quite literally jump back into our high-intensity interval training (HIIT). We take on a rigorous plyometric lineup, which includes 45 seconds of sprinting, squat jumps and high skips, with a brief stop to rest between each exercise.

HIIT is considered a highly effective way to burn fat and boost cardiovascular endurance. It is part of the latest trend in the workout world: high-impact aerobics, which are estimated to be part of the exercise programs of more than 21 million people last year, according to a report by the Sports & Fitness Industry

Association. This type of exercise refers to a workout in which both feet are off the ground at some point during the movement, usually in the form of jumping. It ranges from the Zumba dancing exercise, popular in 180 countries, to the intense and ever-changing workouts associated with the CrossFit movement.

HIIT increases the intensity of a workout by stressing the body. With appropriate consideration for individual abilities and joint safety, the sudden movements help build muscle and may play a role in helping participants maintain bone strength and density.

High-impact aerobics, such as HIIT, have become popular because the short and intense exercises fit into today's busy schedules. High-impact aerobics also don't necessarily require any weights or other gym equipment (although it may be helpful to invest in cushioned cross-training shoes and a yoga mat).

You can introduce high-impact aerobics into your usual workout routine. Or you can add a timed sequence of HIIT exercises, such as skipping rope, box jumping or a few sets of burpees, followed by short rest periods, if needed.

By adding high-impact aerobics to a routine, you can increase your workout efficiency, strengthen muscles and build endurance while adding a fun boost to your usual regimen. *

JOHN LITHGO

A FEARLESS AND PROLIFIC PERFORMER, THIS LONGTIME SUPPORTER OF THE ARTS IS ON A WHITE-HOT STREAK

▶ SEPARATED AT BIRTH? True, John Lithgow is 6 foot 4 and I'm 5 foot 2. He's won six Emmy Awards. I once won a raffle! And we were both born in Rochester, New York, which made speaking to one of my favorite actors an especially delightful and meaningful conversation for me. By a twist of fate, he happened to be in Rochester at the time of our interview, as he was filming an indie movie there. In truth, Lithgow's family moved quite a bit when he was a child, but I wasn't the only one excited to discover Lithgow had at least been Flower City born. The local paper, the Democrat and Chronicle, sassed, "Take that, Syracuse."

"I've been enjoying seeing the area," said Lithgow, who has a well-deserved reputation as one of America's finest thespians. He



listed a few field trips he'd taken, including visits to the George Eastman Museum, on the estate of the founder of Eastman Kodak and home to the world's oldest film archives. While in western New York doing his shoot, Lithgow also witnessed some of the city's less exciting attractions, such as the Big M supermarket parking lot. I used to bag groceries at Big M! See? Separated at birth.

PROFESSIONAL CHAMELEON

Having just won a prime-time
Emmy for his portrayal of British
Prime Minister Winston Churchill,
Lithgow is riding a high note this
fall. On the Netflix drama *The*Crown, he nails the accent, posture
and quirky mannerisms of the
British prime minister. Churchill
was only 5 foot 6, so the fact that
Lithgow can inhabit him so convincingly is a testament to the actor's
powers of transformation.

Lithgow started acting as a young child, and in the ensuing decades he played roles from the uptight preacher blocking Kevin Bacon's good times in Footloose to a transgender ex-football player in The World According to Garp. His range is remarkable: This is a man who can carry a movie about Sasquatch (Harry and the Hendersons); scare the pants off viewers as the Trinity Killer on Dexter; and score a Tony Award from a play set entirely in a locker room (The Changing Room). Oh, and he's still found time to publish 11 best-selling children's books, including I'm a Manatee.

You're a manatee?

"I'm a character man," he says.

"People come after me for the
damnedest roles. I have hardly any
experience playing anyone ordinary.
That's when it would get novel."

His IMDb biography lists both "Often plays villains or mentally unstable characters" and "Often plays fathers and family men." It's a contradiction he can trace back to his early days as a theater rat. His mother, Sarah Jane, was a former actress; his father, Arthur, was an artistic director who founded two major Shakespeare festivals in the 1950s and '60s.

"My first acting work was with

him," says Lithgow, who explains that in Shakespeare repertory, an acting troupe is expected to perform multiple plays in rotation.

"You play the different roles each night in succession, and it's a point of honor how differently you play each character." Steeped in the Bard's comedies, tragedies and histories, young John had enough rich fodder to nourish a lifetime of characters.


These days, this actor divides his time between New York City and Los Angeles, and says his recent jaunt to the town of his birth was a happy accident. "I picked [the role] before I knew it would be filming in Rochester. It's a wonderful script about older people meeting and falling in love, and you don't see that in big-budget movies." his, "and it's two huge parts for us." Doing indie film, versus a large Hollywood movie, he says, is "like two different professions."

THE GOOFBALL DAD

In November, audiences will see Lithgow in one of those large Hollywood flicks, Daddy's Home 2, a sequel in which he plays the overaffectionate father of Will Ferrelland it sounds like making the movie was a hoot.

"Sean Anders, the director, and John Morris, the co-writer, they had established a very successful template from the first movie, and the partnership of Will Ferrell's and Mark Wahlberg's characters, and it just went exponential from there," says Lithgow. "It goes gangbusters."

He says shooting the movie was hilarious. "Everyone knew what was funny about their role and just went with it."


As in the original, the sequel plays off the concept of how disparate views on parenting can clash. When you ask Lithgow-who is in real life a father of three and now a grandfather-to reflect on his own style of raising children, he says: "I don't think anyone thinks of themselves as a good father. You always tend to dwell on your failings. But I was a fun father. I was always playing with them. I was a goofball. My wife is a tough cookie, so we were a good combination."

His wife, Mary Yeager, is a professor of history at UCLA, and her hours were more stable than those of her actor husband, who often had to travel for work. The family got lucky during the period the kids were in secondary school, because Lithgow was cast on the TV series 3rd Rock From the Sun. "I had banker's hours, and was home on time," he recalls fondly. "I even made most meals in the evening."

3rd Rock not only availed the family of delicious suppers, but it also brought Lithgow one of his favorite and most decorated roles. The beloved sitcom revolved around four aliens who are sent to Earth to study humans. Their crackpot behavior as they attempt to blend in with Earthlings drove the laughsand no one did ludicrous better than Lithgow. As a pompous alien high commander turned physics professor, Dr. Dick Solomon, he won numerous awards, including three Emmy Awards for Outstanding Lead Actor in a Comedy Series.

He'll embody another funny

He plays dad to actress Rebel Wilson's character, and when asked if he'll bust out some a cappella tunes for the music-driven threequel, he says, "I do. I can't say more, but I will say that when I sing or dance, it's almost always to comic effect."

Wait, didn't he win a Tony for Best Performance by a Leading Actor in a Musical?


"I did indeed," he acknowledges. That would be for Sweet Smell of Success in 2002, "which I was a little embarrassed about because everyone else in the category was an actual singer," he says. "Let's just say that as a singer, I'm a very good actor."

LIFELONG ARTISTIC ACHIEVEMENT

He must have been a pretty good student, too, as he attended Harvard University and graduated magna cum laude before going to the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art on a Fulbright scholarship. 
esteemed actor was invited to become part of the Harvard Board of Overseers. They hadn't had an artist on the board in a while, he notes, and he wound up pitching the idea of a spring arts series, kind of a mini Edinburgh International Festival.


The result was Arts First, an annual springtime festival of student and faculty creativity now in its 25th year. "We turn about 15 buildings into performance spaces, and thousands of people perform, and thousands of people come to watch for free. I go back every single year. It's my pride and joy,"

he says. "I'm proud that it even exists."

He also had the idea for the Harvard Arts Medal, established in 1995 to honor a Harvard or Radcliffe grad who has contributed significantly to the artistic community. That sensation—trying so hard to be a good person, and still falling short-can be a universal one, especially to those of us who are parents.

Yet one gets the feeling John Lithgow has done a pretty good job of being a human. 🛪

Steamboat

The first time I skied Steamboat, I was on cross-country gear. I had been following the Hogan Park Trail, a route through the forest behind the Steamboat Resort. After 7 miles of breaking trail through untouched snow, I reached the top of Mount Werner and entered the resort area. Ahead of me lay a 3,668-foot vertical drop to the base. And that's where I discovered it: the trademark Champagne Powder blanketing Steamboat's slopes. I floated through the deep, dry snow, stringing together exhilarating turns, even on cross-country gear and tired legs. It was everything I'd spent my climb hoping to find, and it's why, these days, I ride the lifts and descend on downhill skis to maximize my time on the snow.

Steamboat Resort features 165 ski trails on 2,965 acres, the bulk of which is about evenly divided between intermediate and advanced terrain-but there are still plenty of gentle slopes for those who want to take it easy. And on the resort's edges, glistening stands of aspen offer some of the finest glade skiing I've found in Colorado.

In this ranching region, snowfall is measured by how many wooden rails of fencing are buried under the white-the resort sees about 336 inches per year.

Off the slopes, Steamboat Springs visitors can soothe skiing muscles in geothermal hot springs. Old Town Hot Springs downtown offers a splash-andsoak facility popular with kids, while north of town, Strawberry Park Hot Springs provides guests the opportunity to take relaxing dips in a forested, creekside setting.

For those who crave untouched slopes, Steamboat Powdercats accesses miles of untracked fluff on nearby



Buffalo Pass via snowcat. And, of course, there's cross-country skiing. The Steamboat Ski Touring Center has groomed trails near town, and east of town the Routt National Forest contains designated areas for cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. One of those trails ends at the top of Mount Werner and the Steamboat Resort, where, just as it did on my first time up, the famous Champagne Powder beckons.

Park City By Paul Frichtl

Thank goodness for guides. As I scan the hills above Park City, it quickly becomes apparent that three days of skiing here will be a gargantuan undertaking.

The 2015 combining of Canyons and Park City Mountain Resort in Utah created Park City Mountain, which has the country's largest total of skiable terrain-7,300 acres. From Murdock Peak on the Canyons end to Jupiter Peak rising behind the historic Park City village, there are 6 miles of aspen, spruce and pine-covered ridges and seemingly endless chutes, bowls and glades. Go south to Bald Mountain and you've added a separately owned ski area, Deer Valley Resort, to a long weekend of mountain fun-creating a closeto-heaven arc spanning some 13 miles.

OK, one slope at a time.

My daughter, Kristin, and I meet our guide, Taylor, at the Canyons Village

center, adjacent to the plush ski-in/ ski-out Hyatt Centric hotel. We follow Taylor closely, game for whatever Canyons has. We ride the Dreamcatcher and Tombstone Express lifts, dropping off the main runs—enjoying broad fields of moguls and sinuous tracks through the trees. Lift time lets us breathe and learn about a \$50 million expansion under Vail Resorts, as well as the backstory on Park City as a silver-mining camp and host to the 2002 Winter Olympic Games.

Day Two we start at the far southern edge of Park City, uploading on the Town Lift and heading up to McConkey's and over to Thaynes Canyon for fast cruising. That evening, we experience old Park City, settled as a silver-mining town in the 1860s. Victorian-era and Queen Anne buildings now harbor boutique shops, galleries and restaurants, all full of music. The energetic Riverhorse on Main serves up a delicious menu ranging from wild game accented with huckleberries to Alaska halibut. We leave as the Ten O'Clock Whistle sounds, and the young woman handing us our coats says that means the town's miners are accounted for, and it's time for all good children, like herself, to go home.

In the morning, it's Deer Valley: 2,026 acres over six mountains. Once the resort sells the last of a modest daily quota of old-school paper lift tickets, that's it. Twenty-one lifts and no crowds. And, unapologetically, still no snowboarders—so my daughter spends the day shopping with her ski-averse mother while I drop through the sweet glades and chutes of Anchor Trees, Quincy Knoll and Hawkeye.

Exhausted but smiling, I join my family in town for après and dinner. As the Ten O'Clock Whistle wails, we make our way home-via the High West Distillery and a signature double rye cocktail called Guts, Glory & God. It's an awesome nightcap to our Park City adventure. I'll have another, thanks.



Whitefish

 I sometimes play a game with fellow Seattle skiers in which we imagine where we might relocate if our powder-skiing compulsion gets critical. We go through the usual suspects but then hesitate. That's when it becomes a game of chicken, each skier hoping the other won't say aloud one of the best-kept secrets of the Northwest: Whitefish Mountain Resort.

The skiing in Whitefish, Montana, is so supernatural, it'll make you believe in ghosts-snow ghosts, specifically. Winter storms stuffed with powder gust into Whitefish, spackling massive firs and spruce in a shaggy coat of snow.

Using these frozen phantoms as spirit guides on the mountain's 3,000 acres and 2,353 feet of vert could be eerie-if I wasn't so busy whooping through kneedeep powder on world-class groomers such as Big Ravine and Inspiration. The wide-spaced trees of the Gray's Golf Course run feel like a parcel of powder-coated wilderness heaven airlifted to the edge of Glacier National Park.

About that park: On a clear day, don't miss long-distance views into Glacier's toothy interior from Chair 1. From the top of the chair, Hellroaring Basin offers short, difficult chutes for the brave, and the North Bowl Face is full of spectacular steep trees. From Chair 7, cruise on Whitefish's North Side.

Expect Whitefish's deep solitude to persist. It's still lift-line-free and off the grid, even though people are starting to notice its charms, and the town is upping its gourmet fare to match. For example, at the Tupelo Grille, Chef Cecilie Andersson offers upscale Cajun and Creole food (hits include the shrimp and grits and étouffée).

In addition to spiritual skiing and great cuisine, Whitefish lingers in the mind during all those ski-town conversations because it's such a welcoming place where anyone can make friends over beers. Having a Moose Drool and wings at The Bierstube doesn't feel like après-it feels like going home.

Bachelor

Sun glints off Mt. Bachelor's sparkling powder as the pall that had temporarily shadowed the mountain evaporates into blue-sky optimism. I'd risen before dawn for first chair, and then bootpacked for 20 minutes to reach the true summit.

Below my ski tips, Mt. Bachelor's famous 360-degree bowl spreads like a vast white sea punctuated by black fins of volcanic rock. I've always wanted to drop in between the Pinnacles, Bachelor's rocky sentinels that guard one of the steepest chutes on the mountain, and I've spent the year skiing steeps-Niseko in Japan, Courmayeur in Italy and Chamonix in France. I'm ready.

With a big gulp, I punch off. For a moment, I'm flying, only air under my skis. I settle back on the snow, as soft and welcoming as a down pillow. I want to laugh, but I have to keep my mouth shut to avoid inhaling powder

that sprays with every turn. I've skied more than 1,000 days on Mt. Bachelor, and every one has been an adventure.

"Batchy" is a mountain you can grow up and old with. It's in Bend's backyard (my three daughters ski five days a week), yet midweek, you'll hardly find lift lines. The 4,318-acre ski area, which makes it one of the top-10 largest in the United States, offers sufficient challenges for everyone from beginners to experts-2014 Olympian Laurenne Ross trained here. The kids will want to run laps on the famous Dilly Dally Alley—a winding trail that snakes through the trees above the Sunrise Lift. Fast skiers will hang out on the Outback and Northwest sections. The Northwest Chair serves some of the best steep tree skiing on the mountain, while Cloudchaser, which opened in 2016, accesses hundreds of acres of low-angled glades.

In addition to the terrain, it's the

views that keep me coming back. Riding the Pine Marten Chair, see the craggy volcanic crater of Broken Top and views of the Three Sisters, Mount Washington and Mount Jefferson. From the summit of Bachelor, which is a dormant volcano, I feel like I'm on top of the world.

Bachelor's lodges include Pine Marten, an architectural wonder that sits at 7,775 feet on the 9,065-foot mountain. In the lodge, you'll find one of Oregon's highest restaurants, Scapolos Cafe, serving gourmet food and a wide selection of local brews on tap.

Despite Oregon's reputation for rain, Mt. Bachelor often gets light, dry snowand plenty of it. With an average of more than 450 inches annually, the mountain is known for big-powder days. All that snow makes Mt. Bachelor's season one of the Northwest's longest, usually starting in November by Thanksgiving and lasting well into May.

Let It Snow

Soaring off a small jump, I land with my snowboard in a waist-deep snowdrift with a quiet "poof." I've stopped in a clearing off the trails underneath the Granite Chief ski lift at Squaw Valley on Lake Tahoe's northwest side. Deep in The Chief zone, I've been enjoying a nearly private playground of narrow paths winding between trees, rocks and untouched snow. The only sounds I hear are the drip-drip-drip from icicles hanging in trees, and a faint "yee-haw" from skiers on the other side of

the ridge. Peeking through a break in the branches, I plot out my course, ready to discover yet another route at this captivating California resort.

Across Squaw Valley and its partner mountain, Alpine Meadows, there's plenty of terrain for everyone, now conveniently labeled into 14 "zones" to help identify what's just right for you, from my quiet retreat in The Chief to the advanced steeps and moguls of KT-22. There's also the rolling blue intermediate runs of the popular Shirley and Snow King zones, as well as the beginner zones of SnoVentures and Big Blue.

Squaw alone has 29 lifts and 3,600 acres of skiing on 170 trails, along with plenty of off-piste action. Add in Alpine's 13 lifts and 100 trails across 2,400 acres, and you have a wide world of adventures that can truly take years to fully explore.

Fortunately, a lot of snow leads to a long season—record-setting snowfall last year meant Squaw Valley stayed open for skiing past July 4. Offseason investments in additional snowmaking capabilities and new snow grooming and clearing equipment mean the resort is ready for another great winter, no matter what Mother Nature has in store.







FILMED IN PALM SPRINGS

Exploring interesting movie and TV sites BY BARBARA BECKLEY

Ann Greer points to the place

where two Vietnam-era fighter jets were lined up on the tarmac a few months earlier. "This is the spot!" says the public relations liaison for the Palm Springs Air Museum. "William Shatner, Christopher Lloyd and Katrina Bowden were chatting next to a fancy convertible positioned between the jets."

I imagine how fun it must have been to watch the filming of this scene in May for the new movie *Senior Moment*, a romantic comedy starring Shatner as a retired NASA test pilot who speeds around in a vintage convertible with his best friend, played by Lloyd, until the car is impounded and Shatner's character plots to get it back. And what fun it will be to watch for the air-museum tarmac scene when the movie is released, expected to be this spring.

Senior Moment takes place in Palm Springs "because the producer [Gina Goff] has a home here," Greer explains. "She loved this spot at the air museum with the iconic Palm Springs International Airport air traffic control tower [visible from the museum's tarmac] and the San Jacinto Mountains in the background. Viewers will instantly know this is Palm Springs."

The museum is one of the many movie and TV locations in the Greater Palm Springs/Coachella Valley area. Footage has been shot at sites ranging from the Riviera Palm Springs featured in *Palm Springs Weekend* (1963) and the exotic concrete-domed Elrod

House seen in Diamonds Are Forever (1971) to a foliage-shielded home used in Oceans Eleven (2001); the Painted Canyon, filmed for last year's Ben-Hur; and La Quinta Resort, used for this year's The Bachelorette.

"Producers and celebrities have flocked here since the early 1930s, attracted by the constant sunshine and the diversity of landscapes, from desert to snowy peaks and vintage architecture," says Michelle Rodriguez, film liaison for the Greater Palm Springs Convention and Visitors Bureau.

For an entertainment buff like me, the Palm Springs Air Museum is the opening act of a starstruck two days in which I explore filming locations that also have great recreational appeal.

After viewing the Senior Moment tarmac site, I tour other fascinating exhibits at the air museum, which showcases 59 military aircraft, from World War II through Vietnam, with related exhibits and activities. Visitors can even walk through a sturdy four-engine B-17 Flying Fortress, from WWII. This was the type of aircraft that my uncle flew during the war, and I'm thrilled to be inside it, imagining his bravery and military service, and that of countless others.

Windmills Play a Role

"Lady Gaga was on a motorcycle-in there," notes Randy Buckmaster, manager/tour guide of Palm Springs Windmill Tours.

I peer inside the small Jalisco Tires shop that our tour group of 16 has stopped to see on the way to the San Gorgonio Pass Wind Resource Area northwest of Palm Springs. Buckmaster tells us how in April, on a tour just like ours, visitors saw Lady Gaga film a scene for her Warner Bros. remake of A Star Is Born. It's expected out sometime in 2018.





Scenes from a number of movies have been filmed at and near the San Gorgonio site, one of the nation's first wind-energy complexes. It opened in the early 1980s and comprises approximately 40 different wind farms, with a total of 2,100-plus towering turbines. The most memorable scene for me was Tom Cruise's harrowing helicopter performance in the 2006 Mission Impossible III. Our group continues to the visitor center veranda to see the cluster of windmills where the filming took place as blades whirled in the wind.

Our guide next drives us past hundreds of wind turbines, and we stop and get out at several spots, as he explains the technology of turning wind into electricity. Constant innovations

are making the machines taller, the blades longer, and the rotation slower for greater efficiency, Buckmaster tells us. This means there are fewer of the short windmills we saw Tom Cruise drive past in 1988's Rain Man, and that more of the modern versions were used in this year's The Space Between Us, about a human born on Mars.

Oasis on Screen

In 2015, Bravo's Top Chef contestants cooked on solar-powered stoves in the desert. Now I'm at that exact spot-Coyote Flats-a canyon at the base of the Little San Bernardino Mountains northeast of Palm Springs. The Season 13 episode was arranged by Desert Adventures Red Jeep Tours and featured the San Andreas Fault

the host course for the PGA Tour's CareerBuilder Challenge, a Pro-Am tournament that will be Jan. 17-21 next year. The course is famed for being one of the most challenging courses in the country. It plays 7,300 yards from the back tees, and has the highest stroke (76.1) and slope (150) rating of the six PGA West courses. Adrenaline rushes are the norm at its two finishing

Tour, the same tour itinerary that I'm experiencing today.

I recognize the landscape even before our guide, Mitchell Cazier, shows us where the cooking stations were arranged, and walks us about 200 feet to the second filming site, Starlight Canyon, where the Quickfire Challenge took place.

Cazier led the *Top Chef* tour. The contestants, he says, were surprised by the richness of the desert. Just like on the show, our tour starts at the edge of an unexpectedly lush natural oasis, with streams of fresh water bubbling from ground shaded by vivid green California fan palms.

The palms are clustered here because their shallow roots need the water being pushed to the surface by the movement of the North American and Pacific tectonic plates, according to our guide. The palm oasis is an indication that we're in



the San Andreas Fault Zone—1.5 miles wide in the section we're visiting, he says.

After touring a re-created village evoking what life was like for the Cahuilla people who lived in this area, we walk along the floor of a narrow slot canyon caused by the shifting continental plates. Its vertical cliffs rise about 50 feet.

Jurassic Classic

The next day, I can't wait to relive the wacky dinosaur scene from the 1985 movie *Pee-wee's Big Adventure*. The scene was filmed at the Cabazon Dinosaurs roadside attraction, west of Palm Springs in Cabazon. I snap a shot of the 150-foot-long apatosaurus statue that Pee-wee Herman and the waitress ran around in the film.

Next, I enter Mr. Rex's Dinosaur Adventure, an indoor-outdoor complex, where I'm surrounded by dozens of authentic-looking dino replicas, some life size. Dinos from triceratops to the landmark *Tyrannosaurus rex* lurk in the garden. I climb the winding staircase inside the towering *T. rex* to the interior of his cavernous head, where I view the desert past his daggerlike teeth.

It's been fun to experience a movie site in such an unexpected place, and it reminds me that Greater Palm Springs always has something new and exciting to discover.



QUINTESSENTIAL CULINARY SAN FRANCISCO

Places to savor the flavor of the city

Approaching the Ferry Building at the foot of Market Street, I see the sunrise glow of oranges, the deep purple of eggplants, the shy blush of peaches, and the rich reds of tomatoes, peppers and pomegranates—all displayed on tables arrayed like a flouncy skirt around the gray sandstone landmark building. It's farmers market day outside the Ferry Building Marketplace (ferrybuildingmarketplace.com).

The Ferry Plaza Farmers Market (cuesa.org) sets up outside the Ferry Building on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays year-round, drawing people from all over Northern California. About 100 vendors truck in their produce, flowers, breads, pastries and prepared foods (knishes, Lebanese street food, tamales and more) for shoppers to enjoy on the spot or to take home. Produce in season in November and December ranges from avocados, cherimoyas and pears to asparagus, beets and cardoons, according to helpful Seasonality Charts on the market's website.

In addition, local chefs give free cooking demonstrations under the white tents in front of the Ferry Building. Upcoming events include a demonstration by Derek Castro, co-owner of SōW Juice, which offers made-to-order fresh juice from organic ingredients (November 25); a baking tribute to pioneer baker Flo Braker (December 2); and a demonstration by chef Joshua Seibert of Nick's Cove Restaurant and Oyster Bar, which focuses on fresh local seafood, dairy and produce (December 9).

Inside the Ferry Building Marketplace, with its restored three-story brick arches and steel-framed skylight, about 50 businesses—artisanal-food shops, wine shops, grocery stores, housewares shops, bookstores, restaurants and cafes—are open daily. I always head for Acme Bread Company (which works closely with farmers on grain varieties for its organic flour), but I never fail to also be enticed by wheels of cheese, sinful sweets, and novelties such as edible insects.

The Ferry Building, which served San Francisco Bay's "freeway of ferries" from 1898 to the mid-1950s, has become a major attraction since its revival as a marketplace in 2003. Located 2 miles southeast of Pier 45, along the waterfront Embarcadero Promenade, the building is also a ferry terminal again, now serving boats going to destinations ranging from Oakland to Marin County and Vallejo.

Beach, the Financial District, Chinatown, Nob Hill, Civic Center and the Mission District.


Fisherman's Wharf

Living near Fisherman's Wharf (visitfishermanswharf.com) in the 1980s, I spent extra time here during the local Dungeness crab season—generally November through June—attracted by vendors selling crab cocktails in paper cups, from their steam carts. Sometimes I would pick out a whole crab and watch it being cracked and wrapped in paper for my walk home. Tender and slightly sweet, it was some of the freshest, most delicious crab I've ever had. Besides Dungeness crab, you can buy seafood such as rock crab, shrimp, calamari and lobster, and clam chowder is sold in sourdough bowls.

For a white-tablecloth dinner with a view of the fishing fleet, spring for Alioto's Restaurant (aliotos.com), which began life in 1925 as Sicilian immigrant Nunzio Alioto's first fish stall. Scoma's Restaurant (scomas.com) offers the same type of quality and ambiance. It opened in 1965, when brothers Al and Joe Scoma bought a little coffee shop on the wharf.

More Fisherman's Wharf-area options: Boudin Bakery (boudinbakery.com) has been credited with helping to give rise to public demand for San Francisco's uniquely tangy sourdough bread. The bakery still uses the same starter dough that Isidore Boudin (scion of a French baking family) cultivated in 1849 from a starter used by gold miners.

Just a few blocks west of Fisherman's Wharf, Ghirardelli Square (ghirardelli.com) was the site of Ghirardelli Chocolates' original factory, which was built in 1893. The company began as





a confectionary shop in 1852 and likely produced the city's first premium chocolate. This site became a shopping center in 1962. Today, you can visit boutiques and restaurants, or indulge your sweet tooth and view some vintage factory equipment at The Original Ghirardelli Ice Cream and Chocolate Shop.

More Neighborhood Dining

- The Tonga Room & Hurricane Bar at the Fairmont San Francisco Hotel (tongaroom.com) is a beloved landmark. Enjoy happy hour and sit near the "lagoon" swimming pool, where you can hear a live band play on a floating barge after 8 p.m.
- Don't let the modest **Swan Oyster Depot** (swanoysterdepot. us) fool you. This counter with 18 stools has been one of the city's finest seafood restaurants since 1912.

CIVIC CENTER

- An icon of California cuisine, **Zuni Cafe** (zunicafe.com) helped launch the California-cuisine movement, with its focus on fresh and simple meals cooked to perfection. Try the roast chicken.
- The San Francisco Cooking School (sfcooking.com) on Van Ness Avenue, near City Hall, offers classes for aspiring chefs and home cooks.

MISSION DISTRICT

- La Taqueria (facebook.com/lataqsf) is widely considered the home of San Francisco's finest burrito, offering extra meat and then crisping the shell on a griddle. The James Beard Foundation named it a 2017 American Classics award winner. The foundation's blog deemed La Taqueria's burritos "deeply satisfying and unlike anything else in San Francisco."
- Taqueria El Farolito (facebook.com/taqueria-el-farolito-169779226391606), a close neighbor to La Taqueria, offers a more traditional overstuffed and tightly wrapped Mission-style burrito. - C.D.




North Beach

With its kitschy figurines, cash registers and phone number painted on the window as "Garfield 13786," the **Liguria Bakery** appears frozen in time. One of North Beach's oldest businesses, it harks back to the neighborhood's roots as an enclave of Italian immigrants at the turn of the 20th century.

Established in 1911, cash-only Liguria eschews checks, credit cards and websites. But, oh, the focaccia—the bakery's only product—is fluffy, moist and savory. It is available with toppings such as pizza (tomato sauce and green onions), rose-

mary and eight others. It is made from a recipe brought from Genoa, and it's baked in a brick oven as old as the business itself.

The bakery is now run by the third generation of the founding Soracco family. Though theoretically open until 2 P.M., Tuesday through Saturday, it will close early if the focaccia runs out. So it's best to get there before noon, and be prepared to wait in line.



Another North Beach option: Molinari Delicatessen (molinarisalame.com), founded in 1896, makes a seemingly infinite variety of sandwiches, and still maintains its own Italian salami and sausage factory, in a more industrial part of the city.

Financial District

My favorite photo of my mother shows her on a San Francisco sidewalk during a night out on the town in the late 1940s, all Lauren Bacall-sophisticated in padded shoulders, peep-toed pumps, and soft, wavy hair. I picture her heading to a place

such as **Tadich Grill** (tadichgrill.com), whose white-jacketed waiters serve guests ensconced in wood-paneled booths or flanking a long counter.

Believed to be San Francisco's (some say California's) oldest restaurant, this guardian of tradition originated with a waterfront coffee tent manned by three Croatian immigrants in 1849,

at the height of Gold Rush fever. The business evolved into a restaurant over the decades and eventually settled on California Street in 1967, where today it is dwarfed by office towers. Notable Tadich Grill devotees have ranged from Ethiopian Emperor Haile Selassie to Cary Grant, Joe Montana to Francis Ford Coppola.

Tadich quickly became known for its Hangtown Fry—a cross between an omelet and a frittata, filled with oysters and bacon—

San Francisco's Chinatown is known for its restaurants and many shops that are full of fascinating iitems. which Tadich brought from the gold fields to the masses.

Though Hangtown Fry is still one of the house's popular specialties, it has since been eclipsed by dishes such as cioppino, oysters Rockefeller and Dunge-

ness crab. The waiters, known as much for their long tenures as for their brisk service, continue to be a marvel here, exuding superiority and deference all at once.

Near the Financial District: About three blocks west of Tadich Grill is the Boulevard restaurant (boulevardrestaurant.com). Chef Nancy Oakes helped transform the notion of American cuisine by applying French flair to regional food. The restaurant, housed in one of the city's oldest buildings, is also known for its romantic setting and glorious views of the Bay Bridge.

Chinatown

The sleek facade and simple sign at Red Blossom Tea Company (redblossomtea.com) promised respite from the crowded sidewalks and narrow streets in one of the world's largest Chinatowns outside of Asia. First settled by Chinese immigrants in





1848, Chinatown's 24 square blocks are one of San Francisco's most popular visitor attractions. Inside Red Blossom's serene interior of blond wood and low serving tables, employee Felice provided a relaxed, informative presentation for our three-tea flight—green, oolong and white—served as a sort of meditation.

and Peter Luong, who renamed the shop to reflect the current focus on tea.

Though I'm a lifelong tea drinker, our tasting offered some surprises. Contrary to English tradition, the Chinese don't use boiling water. In fact, white and green teas are best steeped warm, and quality whole-

leaf teas grow stronger and more complex with repeated brews. Like wine, fine tea is flavored by its terroir. Plus, slurping is encouraged—it helps release the complex flavors.


Also in Chinatown: The Golden Gate Fortune Cookie

Factory (56 Ross Alley; no website) lets visitors watch as workers pull little disks of dough from a conveyor belt and fold them around the fortunes. The fresh, crisp, melt-on-your-tongue morsels are far better than the typical Chinese-takeout variety.






AMAZING ENCOUNTERS WITH THE ISLANDS' DENIZENS OF THE DEEP


It was well past sunset on the Kona Coast of Hawaiʻi Island, and I was about to head out for a wildlife encounter of a lifetime: a nighttime snorkeling session with giant manta rays. I was excited, but a bit nervous. Swimming in the open ocean, in the dark, with massive sea creatures? What in the world was I doing?

Close relatives of other rays and sharks, mantas are gape-mouthed fish that can grow to be more than 20 feet from wingtip to wingtip, weigh more than 2,000 pounds and live for more than 50 years. Unlike stingrays, mantas are considered harmless. They fly through the sea like stealth fighters—quietly, speedily and seemingly effortlessly—feeding on plankton as they roam tropical waters. Even when you view mantas from shore (which you can also do from the Kona Coast), it's a wonder to watch them revel in their ocean



world. I suspected that swimming with them-even at a respectful, nonintrusive distance—would be taking the experience to a whole other level ... which it most certainly did.

Snorkeling among manta rays near Hawai'i Island is unquestionably a rare opportunity. Yet it's far from the only exceptional sea excursion available to guests and residents in the Hawaiian Islands. From a snorkeling trip exploring a "turtle town" off of Maui, to cruising Kaua'i's north shore, to seeking out sea life around O'ahu, the Islands have many additional experiences for marine adventurers. This wealth of options, combined with qualified and knowledgeable outfitters-who help keep experiences informative, safetyconscious and respectful of wildlife—puts the Aloha State squarely among the world's premier places for amazing aquatic encounters.



HAWAI'I ISLAND WITH THE RAYS

From the marina at Keauhou Bay, our group of six snorkelers, and two local guides from Eka Canoe Adventures (ekacanoeadventures.com), climbed aboard the 40-foot $W\alpha'\alpha$ Kini Kini, a traditional double-hulled outrigger canoe. We paddled out into the harbor's ink-dark waters for a nighttime excursion into the unknown with some of the most beautiful and serene creatures in the Pacific Ocean. There was just enough ambient light on the bay for us to navigate. Honestly, it felt just a little bit spooky out there, but there were no screeching violins or sudden movements in the water (a la $J\alpha ws$)—just the quiet lapping of the waves against our boat.

As we slipped away from shore, we passed some larger night-snorkeling groups in powerboats and paddled a short distance to our observation position in the middle of the bay.

After donning a light wetsuit top, snorkel and mask, I jumped in and followed the guides' instructions to lie prone and hang on to a large surfboard equipped with bottom lights. There was one crucial rule: "Don't touch the mantas." Like many other marine creatures, these enormousyet-sensitive organisms are curiously comfortable around humans, but their skin is very sensitive and can be damaged if touched. Our outfitter made it clear not to touch or harass the mantas.

It didn't take long before Keauhou's resident rays emerged from the darkness below us, zooming directly at us, attracted to the meal of plankton drawn to our surfboard's lights. With amazing grace and agility, the rays somersaulted like acrobats beneath us, passing mere inches from our snorkeling masks before plunging back toward the bottom of the bay. This action was repeated over and over during our hourlong session in the water.

It was thrilling, surprising and a bit otherworldly-and I loved every minute of this wildlife encounter on the Kona Coast.

MAUI'S TURTLE TOWN

Ever since that Hawai'i Island manta ray encounter, I've had the undersea-nature bug and a persistent desire for more aquatic eco-adventures in the Islands.

On a recent visit to Maui, I joined Maui Kayak Adventures (mauikayakadventures. com) for a three-hour kayaking and snorkeling trip to Mākena Bay's "Turtle Town," where gentle honu-green sea turtles-thrive in a set

of vibrant reefs, complete with "cleaning stations" where the turtles congregate to allow fish to clean the algae off their shells and flippers.

Setting off in light morning winds from a pretty, tree-shaded beach at Makena Landing Park-south of the town of Kīhei and the Wailea resort area—we paddled our sit-on-top kayaks for about 30 minutes before stopping to jump off and snorkel above a cave-riddled reef filled with a rainbow of tropical fish. We found butterflyfish, parrotfish, wrasses, convict tangs, damselfish, trumpetfish and-my favorites—delicate and colorful Moorish idols and angelfish. Here and there, moray eels poked their heads out of rock crevices, and beautiful cauliflower coral caught the diffuse rays of light filtering in from above.

The highlight of our paddle trip was a snorkel stop above a cleaning area where tangs, wrasses and other fish hung out and waited for turtles to pull up and have their shells cleaned. My guide called it the "car wash of the underwater reef world," and indeed we saw a dozen or so turtles getting their shells "detailed" here.

Having arrived by kayak, we enjoyed watching this unusual activity in peaceful solitude, making it an even more memorable experience on the water.







seen near Maui from roughly November through May.

• Photographers will love the sunrise whale-watching excursions operated by the nonprofit Pacific Whale Foundation (pacwhale. com). You can capture the first whale sighting of the day as the sun rises over the dormant Haleakalā volcano. Morning is also the calmest time of day on the ocean. The tour includes underwater hydrophones to hear whale songs. It departs at 6:30 A.M. from the historic Lahaina Harbor.



A KAUAT NATURE SHOW

Glorious, verdant Kauaʻi is the oldest and smallest of Hawaiʻi's major islands, and it's a paradise for aquatic adventurers.

Some of the island's best spots to snorkel and see reef-fish communities among coral formations include Lawai Beach, on the splendid south shore (a small strip of beach frequented by turtles, near the Beach House restaurant), and scenic Kē'ē and Tunnels beaches, on the north shore, with their reef-sheltered areas that are excellent for snorkeling when conditions allow it.

At the popular south-shore destination Poʻipū Beach, snorkelers and swimmers commonly see green sea turtles floating lazily by. Endangered Hawaiian monk seals haul up on the beach's sandy shore for daytime snoozes. Volunteer monitors here and in other parts of Kauaʻi keep a careful eye on these rare and protected marine mammals.

The beautiful stretch of Kaua'i's northwestern wilderness coastline known as the Nāpali Coast offers ample opportunity to see dolphins, whales and reef fish for visitors on sailing, snorkeling and all-day kayaking adventures.





Eager to experience the Nāpali Coast by sea, I hopped aboard Capt. Andy's (napali. com) classic 55-foot sailing catamaran, which headed west and then north from tiny Port Allen (itself about a 25-minute drive from Po'ipū). We spent more than five hours cruising the open ocean, admiring the up-to-4,000foot cliffs of the Nāpali Coast and panoramic views that spread from Kē'ē Beach southwest to Polihale State Park.

While this scenery was hard to beat, the highlights of the cruise for me were spinner dolphins playfully chasing the bow wake, migratory North Pacific humpback whales breaching in the distance and a remarkable open-ocean snorkeling session along the way.

One tip: Don't forget the motion-sickness medication or ginger chews for this open-ocean adventure—they may make all the difference in your enjoyment of this unique destination.

MORE AQUATIC ADVENTURES: KAUA'I

Sea turtles, dolphins and—

seasonally—whales are often spotted on the Nāpali Coast cruises operated by **Kauai Sea Tours** (kauaiseatours.com). This company has a variety of catamaran trips to choose from, including sunset dinner adventures, cruise-and-snorkel voyages and more. It also offers rafting expeditions along Kaua'i's famously craggy coast, with options for beach landings, cultural tours and snorkeling in areas rich with fish.



• Kayak Kaua'i (kayakkauai. com) has a "Blue Lagoon" excursion that starts with a paddle up and then back down the calm, lushly vegetated Hanalei River. This is followed by additional paddling along the beautiful shores of nearby Hanalei Bay, as well as an excellent midday snorkeling session.

SETTING SIGHTS ON O'AHU

What to do next? High on my bucket list: a shark encounter off O'ahu. This is a thrill-filled—but carefully orchestrated—way to observe sharks, those fascinating, often-misunderstood and threatened creatures.

I plan to check out the eco-tours of Hawaii
Shark Encounters (hawaiisharkencounters.com)
aboard the "shark vessel" Kainani, which departs
from the Hale'iwa Harbor on O'ahu's North Shore.
This outfit aims to educate guests about the current state of the ocean's ecosystem and the plight
of sharks in Hawai'i and worldwide. The company
allows you to swim with the sharks ... within the
safety of a shark cage. Motoring to about 3 miles
from shore, you shark-watch from a metal cage
equipped with Plexiglas windows. Galapagos and
sandbar sharks are commonly seen and seem very
curious and completely unafraid—they come very
close to the shark cage.





Also on my list: snorkeling in Hanauma Bay Nature Preserve, which is famously rich with sea life. Native Hawaiians have enjoyed this bay for thousands of years. The area gets its name from the Hawaiian words hana, which can mean "bay" when used in a place name, and uma, which means "curved." The bay's parking lot often fills up early in the day, but you can book a 4.5-hour shuttle-and-snorkel trip with **Hanauma Bay Tours** (hanaumabaytours.com) that includes roundtrip Waik \bar{k} k \bar{k} transportation, gear rental and instruction.

What else? There are many options. After O'ahu, another trip I'd make is a return to Maui for a snorkeling adventure at Molokini, an ancient submerged volcanic crater several miles offshore. The crystal-clear waters of this marine sanctuary offer a dazzling 120 to 180 feet of visibility and are filled with dozens of species of fish, making it a top choice for snorkeling and diving excursions.




I can't wait to get on the plane for more aquatic adventures in my favorite paradise on Earth: the exquisite Islands of Hawai'i.





FINDING FUN IN LA LA LAND

The City of Angels offers entertainment for everyone

Venice, California, is set suddenly aglow, as if a group of fireflies were swarming on a summer night. Illuminated by cellphone lights, several people walk from street to alley, following instructions sent to them just hours before: The entrance is from the alleyway behind the house ... Enter through an open green garage door!

"Is this it?" I whisper to my friend, Joe, as I notice a door. "Nope, not it," I answer myself. Glancing left, we see the fireflies disappearing two doors down and follow the glow.

For comedy lovers across Los Angeles, finding out the "secret" location for the next *Don't Tell Comedy* show is half the fun. Will the directions lead to someone's living room? An artist's backyard? A rock-climbing gym? Will you see a newbie or a headlining comic?

Starting at \$10 for a ticket—plus bringing your own food and drinks—it doesn't cost much to find out.

"When you go to a [mainstream] comedy club, you pay a ticket price plus a two-drink minimum," says Don't Tell Comedy founder Kyle Kazanjian-Amory, better known as Kyle KA. "But with Don't Tell, you bring your own."

He adds that the setting makes for a unique comedy experience that "feels like more of a community."

New spins on traditional attractions, such as *Don't Tell*, are a big part of why Los Angeles is one of the entertainment capitals of the world.

While many other cities may claim the "entertainment capital" title, the



slogan was reportedly first coined here in recognition of Hollywood's movie, TV and radio studios. Today, the LA area abounds with leisure-time activities, from amusement parks to top-flight museums.

In a place that seems to live and breathe entertainment, it's hard to know where to begin. So as relative newcomers here, Joe and I set out to discover LA the old-fashioned way: we asked the locals. The following is their advice.

Laugh It Up

LA is a city blessed with many of the finest comedy clubs in the country, where many of Hollywood's brightest stars have found success, including Jim Carrey, Jay Leno and Robin Williams, to name a few.

For belly laughs, be sure to visit West Hollywood's historic venues The Hollywood Improv, on Melrose Avenue, and The Comedy Store and the Laugh Factory, within a few blocks of one another on the

1.5-mile section of Sunset Boulevard known as The Sunset Strip. The Hollywood area and sections of Sunset Boulevard are to LA entertainment what New York's Broadway district is to theater and musicals.

Top-notch improv and sketch comedy can be found onstage at the Upright Citizens Brigade Theatre, which has venues on Sunset Boulevard and a short distance away on Franklin Avenue.

Music Centers

When Joe and I saw singers Melissa Etheridge and Blondie at The Greek Theatre in 2015, we knew we'd be seeing two shining stars.

However, we saw three: The historic theater, located in beautiful Griffith Park, is itself a gem worth experiencing, both for its outstanding sound and sightlines, and for its being situated within the city's largest public park.

Southwest of Griffith, musical concerts remain a mainstay at the Hollywood Bowl amphitheater, which opened in 1922. In West LA, the go-to venue is The Forum, in Inglewood. Lady Gaga recently played The Forum, with my 53-year-old partner rocking in the mosh pit. We both got the T-shirts to prove it. For a more symphonic experience, the 14-year-old Walt Disney Concert Hall in downtown LA will amaze. The building itself, designed by architect Frank Gehry, is well worth a visit.


LA is also home to numerous smaller, more intimate live-music settings. Step into the 60-year-old Troubadour club in West Hollywood and you might find yourself listening to the next Elton John, James Taylor or Coldplay. Those famous musicians and countless others played here early in their careers. The club continues to debut new musicians, while also hosting guest appearances by some of the music industry's biggest stars.

The Sunset Strip is packed with legendary entertainment venues, including The Roxy Theatre. Founded by music producers who were tired of seeing their clients mistreated by other venues, The Roxy has hosted an eclectic list of musical and comedy stars that includes Ariana Grande, Bob Marley and The Wailers, Peter Gabriel, Prince, David Letterman, Arsenio Hall and U2.

Two blocks east of The Roxy, you'll find Whisky a Go Go, which opened in 1964 and became a center for the city's early rock scene, hosting acts such as The Doors, Janis Joplin and many others.

Another block east on Sunset is The Viper Room. Styled to look like a 1920s Harlem jazz lounge, The Viper is a favorite location for underground cult bands and well-established performers. Some well-





known acts that have graced its stage in the past include Johnny Cash, Tom Petty and The Heartbreakers, and Pearl Jam.

Among the many other nightspots of note in the city are El Rey Theatre, The Mint (open since 1937), and the music and comedy house Largo at the Coronet.

Angeles (and Hollywood, in particular) for many decades, and also the title of last year's cinematic homage to the community. In a place famous for its movie industry, unique settings in which to experience great cinema abound.

On Saturdays and occasionally Sundays, from May through October, large crowds gather for Cinespia outdoor movie nights in the Hollywood Forever Cemetery, a famous landmark and the final resting place for many of Hollywood's greatest stars. The cemetery is well worth a tour in itself. From November through April, Cinespia shows classic films at historic movie houses around LA.

Just a mile northwest of the cemetery, on Sunset Boulevard, the famous Arclight Cinema's Cinerama Dome has been designated a Historic-Cultural Monument for its significance, including being one of three theaters in the world that show films using the three-projector format. A mile west of the Arclight, on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, is the TCL Chinese Theatre, one of the great locations for red-carpet, big-studio premieres. When the stars aren't strutting, or having

Film aficionados will also like the New Beverly Cinema in the La Brea neighborhood. It is owned by director Quentin Tarantino, who shows 16- and 35-millimeter films, many from his vast private collection.


Literary Locations

But the real draw may be the quirky store's magical second-floor Labyrinth, which the Los Angeles Times described as a "porthole into an alternative universe." It's a place where many books have been used to make art pieces inside the store.

With more than 8,000 restaurants in Los Angeles, you can find any type of fine fare you might want. The following restaurants rise above the fray, appearing on recent "best" lists, including those from LA Eater, LA Weekly and Thrillist.

Catch LA: Yes, it's a New York restaurant replicated in the West, but you can't beat the view, ambiance and attention to romantic detail in this rooftop restaurant where the focus is, obviously, all things seafood. Love ceviche, sashimi and other fish dishes? This is the spot.

Here's Looking at You: The name has nothing to do with the menu at this popular Koreatown hot spot, but doesn't it make you curious? A fascinating mix of flavors from around the world is only part of what makes this 50-seat restaurant a standout. It also mixes some excellent movie-inspired drinks.

Bestia: The downtown Italian restaurant is known as much for its modern interior design (those chandeliers are actually made of meat hooks) as its housemade charcuterie and made-from-scratch pastas and pizzas.

LODGING

The Los Angeles area offers many great hotels. The following are a few that offer unique experiences.

Terranea Resort: One of Southern California's most luxurious resorts sits on bluffs above the Pacific Ocean and is less than 20 miles from the Los Angeles airport. Between the nine-hole golf course and other outdoor-recreation options, the spa, and the restaurants, you may never want to leave (terranea.com).

The Queen Mary: For a very different kind of lodging experience, travel to the Long Beach dock where this legendary 1930s British ocean liner is now a floating hotel. The ship has various restaurants, including Sir Winston's Restaurant & Lounge (named after former British Prime Minister Winston Churchill). Ask for one of the suites or a water-view stateroom (queenmary.com).

The Hollywood Roosevelt: This famous hotel has been a favorite of Hollywood royalty since it opened in 1927. Enjoy its gaming lounge with a vintage bowling alley and look for the David Hockney mural painted on the bottom of the Tropicana pool (thehollywoodroosevelt.com).





around the world. Many celebrities are customers, including Pierce Brosnan, Daniel Craig, Johnny Depp and Jude Law.

City of Art and Science

LA seems to have a world-class museum for every art genre and historic era. One of the best is The Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles (MOCA), located in downtown LA. It features a collection of modern and contemporary art that was mostly created from 1940 to the present. A second is the Los Angeles County Museum of Art (LACMA), on Wilshire Boulevard. One of the largest art museums in the western United States, it has more than 135,000 items in its permanent collection.

However, my personal favorites are the Getty Center and the Getty Villa, both free facilities housing thousands of pieces of artwork from the J. Paul Getty Collection. The Center, with its famous white buildings, sits above West LA with panoramic views of the area and Santa Monica Bay. The art is world-class and the grounds are spectacular.

The more intimate Getty Villa, located in a beautiful setting on a bluff above Pacific Palisades, is home to a large collection of ancient art and sculptures that date from the Stone Age to the Roman Empire.

LA itself is an ever-changing canvas for street and mural artists. Some of the best can be found in Venice Beach and in the Downtown Arts District. While in the Arts District, visit The Container Yard, a former mochi rice-cake factory that has been reinvented as an arts and retail space and is home to spectacular paintings and murals.

Science buffs will enjoy the California Science Center, which offers



spectacular exhibits and permanent displays. Be sure to see the space shuttle *Endeavor* and learn the fascinating story of how engineers got the shuttle to the museum through the tight streets of LA.

All of LA is a stage

With so many performers and production professionals in one region, it makes sense that LA would have outstanding theater. The Hollywood Pantages Theatre is among the best bets for top Broadway musical productions. The Geffen Playhouse in Westwood is known for newly commissioned and classic works.

The Mark Taper Forum is known for more controversial works meant to "provoke conversations." And the Kirk Douglas Theatre in Culver City often presents world premiere productions. For wonderfully intimate stage experiences, try the Sacred Fools Theatre Company and Theater Asylum in Hollywood.

Mickey and movies

Despite being adults, Joe and I still find
Disneyland (and Disney California Adventure Park right next door) to be fabulous
fun. Like most locals, we enjoy Disneyland
and the region's other theme parks
(Knott's Berry Farm, Six Flags Magic
Mountain and Universal Studios) in the
off-season to beat the crowds. It's best
to visit the parks on Mondays through
Thursdays from November to March,
avoiding holidays.

Universal Studios Hollywood has the theme park and its behind-the-scenes studio tour. Visitors to the tour will see Bruce, the mechanical shark; feel an earthquake; and be part of the King Kong 360 3-D experience. Our favorite studio

tour is at the Warner Brothers lot, which includes Stage 48: Script to Screen, where you can ride brooms over Hogwarts from the "Harry Potter" film series and be filmed sitting on a set from the *Friends* TV show. Sony Pictures (formerly MGM Studios) and Paramount Pictures also offer tours of their lots, filled with famous artifacts and plenty of thrills.

Leaving the Warner Brothers tour, we marvel at the array of entertainment available in the LA area. No other place we've been has its mix of amazing, quirky and unexpected attractions.

TOKYO TREASURES

Discovering delights, new and old, in anticipation of the Olympics

Shibuya Crossing. So iconic is this intersection that the 2020 Summer Olympics organizers featured it as the opening shot of the film reel introducing the city. The video clip, debuted during the Rio games' closing ceremony last year, kicks off with an aerial shot of the interchange where 10 lanes of traffic converge and, by some estimates, up to 2,500 pedestrians cross at each walk signal. And the crossing is no less impressive in person.

I join the evening rush as office workers in suits, fashionistas carrying shopping bags and tourists toting cameras congregate and disperse. All around, neon signs and jumbotron screens try to outdo one another. Department stores, restaurant complexes and office-filled skyscrapers line the packed sidewalks. Shibuya encapsulates many visitors' perceptions of Tokyo. The towering skyscrapers, the LED-lit thoroughfares and the sheer density make the message clear: This city of 9 million people (about 38 million if you count the greater metropolitan area) is always open for business.

Spread over 845 square miles, the Japanese capital is a world unto itself, containing everything from giant highrises to minuscule Zen gardens, from traditional Shinto shrines and temples to restaurants partly staffed by robots. For the novice visitor to Japan, Tokyo is not only the primary gateway but also a must-see attraction. For repeat visitors, it's a city that keeps on reinventing itself and unfolding new surprises.

The Shibuya district certainly has



plenty of those surprises. In a city with no shortage of department stores, the chain Tokyu Hands stands out with its idiosyncratic goodies. I duck into the Shibuya branch, a multi-floor funhouse of things I never knew I wanted until now, from beauty masks colored like Kabuki (classical Japanese drama) makeup to Mount Fuji-shaped ice-cube makers; elegant origami paper to thimble-size bottles of Japanese whisky. One floor has outlandish

wigs, which inexplicably give way to a rug section; another floor has a random assortment of gorgeous stationery and earthquake-preparation kits.

Shibuya, like every other ward in the city, is chock-full of other Japanese quirks: You can sip coffee while petting kittens at the popular chain Cat Cafe Mocha or watch goats at Sakuragaoka Cafe, or slurp ramen at a busy 24-hour counter (see sidebar on p. 163).

Even in this supercharged place of modernity, an old piece of Tokyo remains. A bronze statue outside Shibuya Station marks where Hachikō—arguably Japan's most famous dog and the inspiration for the Hollywood film Hachi: A Dog's Tale, starring Richard Gere-waited for his master for 10 years after the professor's death in 1925. This popular site is a reminder of Tokyo's yesteryear, when this was a simple town square where a lone

dog could linger without traffic issues.

Much of that old Tokyo is alive and transforming. Walking about a mile from the famous Shibuya intersection takes me to Tomigaya, a mellow residential enclave within the Shibuya district that has seen an influx of cool shops and cafes in the past five years, all the while keeping its low-rise silhouette of two-story homes. Scattered about the compact neighborhood are hip establishments ready for the



beef; chunks of octopus tossed in with avocado salad; or a selection of other items that strike the fancy of the brotherand-sister proprietors. Or you can buy fresh calla lilies at Pivoine, a florist that doubles as a cafe. Fuglen, an offshoot of an Oslo-based roaster, serves cocktails and coffee to a hip crowd while they lounge on the space's signature midcentury Nordic furniture.

"About 10 percent of my customers are foreigners," Tomoyuki Kamiya tells me in his lifestyle boutique, Archivando. "But that's changing." An interior architect in his past life, the trim man in his 50s sought out Tomigaya for his boutique. In his shop, he mixes flea-market finds from abroad with textiles and jewelry by Japanese artisans. In many ways, his shop is quintessentially Tokyo: firmly grounded in Japan and influenced by international sensibilities-all beautifully timeless.

Gearing Up for the Olympics

On each visit to Tokyo, I return to the 45th floor of the Tokyo Metropolitan Government Building. A hive of more than 166,000 government workers, this 1990 landmark by the Pritzker Prize-winning architect Kenzō Tange contains two observation decks (one on each wing) that offer free panoramic views from approximately 660 feet above ground.

When I look out at the numerous skyscrapers spreading out in every direction, it's hard to imagine this city before such density. The catalyst for Tokyo's development was the 1964 Summer Olympics, when the Japanese capital became the first Asian city to host the international event. In addition to the prestige, the Olympics brought new expressways,



subway lines and other infrastructure that are still in use today.

Also from that era are architecturally ambitious sporting venues, many of which you can make out in the distance from the building's observation decks. For instance, Yoyogi National Gymnasium, also designed by Tange, is a futuristic statement with striking curves that has weathered the tests of time and changing tastes. The boom years following the Olympics transformed Tokyo into the hypermodern city as we know it.

Curiously, though, on every prior visit, I have seen more or less the same panoramas. I've only known Japan since 2003, and as intriguing as it is, the country has seemed relatively unchanged to me-a fact backed up by economic data. The recession that began in the late 1990s has cast a shadow for nearly two decades now, and the world's third-largest economy in terms of GDP has actually been shrinking.

Now, with the Olympics returning to the city in 2020, Tokyo is gearing up for another jumpstart. Less than 2 miles from the Metropolitan Government Building, dozens of cranes perform a choreographed dance as they replace the 1958-built National Stadium with a 68,000-seat arena. New construction is nothing new

ALONG THE YAMANOTE LINE

in any world-class city, but Tokyo's many architectural projects now have a shared purpose, with a finish line of 2020.

But even in the midst of the cacophony of change, it's easy to take breaks. Kittycorner from the stadium in the making,

I walk into the wide-open space of Shinjuku Gyoen National Garden. The 144-acre grounds were once part of a vast space that entertained aristocrats, but became an imperial botanical garden in the late 1800s, used for carrying out agricultural experiments. After being destroyed during the World War II air raids, the grounds reopened in 1949 as a national public park. An affordable bento

picnic of inari sushi and soba noodles from a nearby convenience store in hand, I stroll the pathways that wind among more than 20,000 trees, looking for a picnic spot. With impeccably manicured gardens themed according to Japanese, French and English traditions, the park is a reflection of Tokyo's resilience as well as its willingness to embrace outside influences.

The most dramatic changes before the 2020 Olympics may be taking place around Tokyo Bay, 6 miles southeast of Shinjuku. For a seaside city, Tokyo can feel landlocked, many of its shores set aside for industrial use. But the bay's many landfill islands have long been the nation's grounds for other uses.

The ambitious 217-acre Umi-no-Mori, or Sea Forest, for instance, is sprouting on soil made of compost and public-park

prunings. Many of the planted trees are mere seedlings and shrubbery for now, but in 2020 the landscaping project is expected to wow spectators as they cheer for Olympic rowing, sailing, equestrian and mountain-biking events.

For now, the main draw on the bay is Odaiba, an approximately 1,000-acre area with various cultural and leisure venues that range from a sandy beach to a complex of malls. From here visitors can enjoy views of the colorfully lit Rainbow Bridge and the city's skyline behind it, including the Fuji TV Building, which resembles a chemical-compound model. A newly unveiled 65-foot Gundam statue, modeled after an anime robot character, is proof that the city never shies away from a bit of humor.

For a bit of traditional relaxation, I decide to warm up at Odaiba Tokyo Ooedo-Onsen Monogatari, a complex of gender-segregated rotenburo (indoor and outdoor baths) on the island. All bathers are welcome—excluding those with tattoos—and expected to strip down to their birthday suits and jump into the hot spring water, pumped from 4,500 feet under the city. I've always found my





North American prudishness at odds with communal bathing, but when in Japan, you do owe it to yourself to do as the Japanese do, and scrub, soak and emerge rejuvenated from the bathing ritual. If you're traveling with a member of the opposite sex, you can meet up inside the food court, inspired by traditional bazaars, and sample yakitori skewers, udon noodles and other dishes.

Toasty and refreshed, I stroll along the elevated walkways of Odaiba Kaihin Koen, a public park on the bay. It's a bit kitschy, with a

replica Statue of Liberty, but look past that and the city's skyline behind is undeniably beautiful. At sundown, the low-slung wooden boats floating in the bay light up lanterns seemingly as bright as the skyscrapers. Without a doubt, Tokyo is in for many changes as it gears up for 2020. But sights like these are timeless. **

)) My heart is in a box at the bottom of Green Lake. I put it there. It's a trick I learned from a Norwegian ogre who hid his own heart from do-gooding knights who disagreed with his lifestyle. Safeguarding his heart so that enemies couldn't stick swords in it made him nearly invincible.

Of course, I had no enemies to speak of, unless maybe the hobgoblins of writer's block and procrastination. But those foes had been drowned in the rising tide of interesting voices that fill my fantasy-genre novels. So I placed my heart in the lake, north of downtown Seattle, not to protect this vital organ, but rather to center it in a place of peace.

I find myself drawn to Green Lake Park every day. Near its north shore, I write at Chocolati, where the rich European-style drinking chocolate is a muse that rivals any inspiration the ancient Greeks might

have had. When I tire of sitting, I walk the paved 2.8-mile path around the lake and dictate a chapter. Or I run the path and listen to audiobooks, or swim in the park's indoor pool. In summer, I float in the lake on an inflatable raft, or set up a hammock on a grassy spot and read.

My wife says she can hear my heart in my chest, and that sinking it in the lake is a delusion born of writing too much fantasy fiction. She's practical that way. So I explain that placing my heart in Green Lake is a metaphor for the enchantment I feel there.

I remind her of the time we moved to the other side of the city for a year—how I kept driving back to Green Lake Park for R&R, even though it was far out of my way, and there were parks nearer our new house.

"So it speaks to the power of intentional landscape design," she said, putting on her University of Washington associate professor of architecture hat. "And I suppose it is like magic, because the built environment affects us profoundly in ways we can't explain."

She notes that Green Lake's magic is no more accidental than that of Central Park, because the Green Lake design came from the Olmsted Brothers firm that evolved from the company founded by famed Central Park designer Frederick Law Olmsted.

That tickles me. That a soggy West Coast logging

town had the audacity to approach the celebrated Olmsteds. But in 1903, Seattle was flush from the Klondike Gold Rush, and the result was a climate of hubris and means, with leaders clamoring to "Let Us Make a Beautiful City of Seattle" (as the Seattle P-I newspaper put it at the time), by going with the best that money could buy. And, actually, it must have seemed a field day for

Frederick's son John Charles Olmsted, because Seattle was still young and replete with pristine lands for parks. The firm surveyed the lands, proposed a visionary system, and 34 years later, Seattle had a full 37 Olmsted parks.

But, interestingly, Green Lake Park was not a park space that was easy to bring about. Even most locals don't know that it almost didn't happen. When John Charles saw the lake, its 3-mile shore had already been homesteaded, and the city balked at buying 3 miles of waterfront lots. The Olmsted solution? Lower the water by 4 feet, which the city subsequently extended to 7 feet, and—voilà!—a 100-acre ring of "new" waterfront emerged. Add a contoured shoreline, sprinkle in an artificial island, tree-dotted hills and generous paths, and the spell is cast.

I fell to the park's charm in high school, when I rowed for Green Lake Crew-an illustrious junior team sponsored by Seattle Parks and Recreation-and discovered my indifference to rowing and my love for running. The crew shellhouse sits on the site of the oncegreat 1950s Aqua Theater, built to host musical follies.


Some of my childhood music heroes, such as Led Zeppelin, played there, as did Bob Hope



and the Grateful Dead. Structural damage appeared in 1969, so the city dismantled all but a spur of the place, which now offers a water view or good stair running.

Green Lake Park's brick bathhouse fared better. Built in the late 1920s as a swimmers' changing facility, the building is celebrating its 90th anniversary this year. It was reborn as the Bathhouse Theater in the 1970s, and is now home to Seattle Public Theater. I've seen a magical Coney Island-style Comedy of Errors and a "cowboy" Macbeth at the Bathhouse. The Flight Before Xmas will be on stage December 1-24, in rotation with Christmastown: A Holiday Noir, December 8-24. Three more plays-Vanishing Point, Ironbound and Hand to God-are coming next year.

I'm not the only one under Green Lake's spell. It's one of the busiest parks in the state, with millions of visitors a year. This past summer, I took a panoramic shot, just to bottle the light against Seattle's coming winter. In the photo, I see scores of people splashing, diving, wading and floating. Canoers, kayakers, paddleboarders and sailboaters ply the lake's sparkling middle. Sunbathers and picnickers speckle the surrounding grass. Runners and walkers claim the perimeter.

It's always like that. People are just drawn here. I suspect if city workers ever drain Green Lake, they'll find thousands of boxes like mine. 🛪







ANCHORAGE'S GREAT INDOORS

Alaska's biggest urban center shines in the dark of winter

The air was crisp but not overly cold—about 18 degrees Fahrenheit—and the sidewalks glittered with frost. It was dinnertime in downtown Anchorage, and as I walked arm in arm with my wife, Polly, I wondered if any place in the world could smell more delicious than West Fifth Avenue on a clear November night.

The breeze was seasoned with the smell of choice steaks—marinated, spiced and perfectly seared—mixing with seafood delicacies such as Parmesan-encrusted halibut with lemon butter, baked Kodiak scallops snuggled on cheesy pasta beds and tender king crab fished from the depths of Norton Sound. All around us, diners, shoppers and showgoers decked in warm coats and winter hats

hustled past in pairs and groups, talking and laughing beneath a hodgepodge of street-lights, stoplights, and neon signs flashing in reds, greens and blues.

It was Thursday, "date night" for us, and as Polly and I walked along, we considered the many ways we might spend a winter evening in Anchorage. We could enjoy time at the Anchorage Museum, studying paintings in the "Art of the North" galleries and exploring the Alaska Native history exhibits. If last-minute seats were available, we could catch some live theater or music at the Alaska Center for the Performing Arts. Or, we could browse the street-front shops and galleries, maybe slip into the Anchorage 5th Avenue Mall, in search of Christmas gifts for family and friends.

But first we had to eat.

I tried to picture in my mind all the restaurants, cafes and pubs we've visited in Anchorage over the years, places such as Club Paris Restaurant, the cozy, dimly lit Anchorage classic famous for its thick filet mignons; contemporary Ginger, with its tangy, innovative Pacific Rim cuisine; Simon & Seafort's Saloon & Grill, the local seafood standard popular also for its Key lime pie and a bar stocked with an inspired collection of scotches; and Humpy's Great Alaskan Alehouse, renowned for its halibut tacos.

There were many other places, too, that would be warm and welcoming on a chilly winter night, all serving good food, wine and beer. But it was Polly's yen for lively atmosphere, open spaces and a particular dessert of bread pudding that drew us off the sidewalk and into the Glacier BrewHouse restaurant. There, seated in the high-ceilinged dining room next to the stone hearth and flickering fire, we could plan our evening over alder-grilled salmon followed by dessert for her and a pint of the rich, house-brewed oatmeal stout for me.

Alaska is rightly celebrated for its iconic wildness (picture Denali sparkling snowwhite against cold, blue skies; windswept tundra outposts where sled dogs howl; great, silent forests coursed by snaking

rivers). Yet away from the rawness of the far-flung reaches, Anchorage's great indoors promise vistas of their own. Dining, culture, and shopping flourish in Alaska's biggest metropolis, a city whose allure shines brightly from November through March.

Home to about 300,000, Anchorage is hospitable in all seasons, but it takes special pride in its appeal as a winter destination. As the days grow short—the sun here breaks the horizon for only five hours, 28 minutes on the December 21 winter solstice—the lights flash on, flooding streets and trails. At the same time that life's pace slows, hotel rates and airfares dip into off-season mode, and day or night, much awaits to see and do.

The Alaska Center for the Performing Arts, the PAC, as it's called around town, opened its doors in 1988, enhancing local

culture and lending fresh energy to Anchorage winter nights. Hosting a range of entertainment options—from traveling Broadway musicals to locally written and produced plays, from city-based orchestras and choral groups to world-renowned singers, comedians, lecturers and more—the PAC is always on a roll. In November and December, the PAC will show several performances of *The Nutcracker*, and *A Christmas Carol* will begin a two-week run on December 15.

Located adjacent to Town Square Park between Fifth and Sixth avenues, smack in the heart of downtown, the multistory PAC is just a pleasant winter stroll from several hotels. Locals planning to see a show often make an evening of it by stopping first for dinner or drinks at places such as the Pangea Restaurant & Lounge, known for creative

cuisine from around the world, or Williwaw, which specializes in American fare and craft cocktails. Both are a snowball's throw from the PAC's front doors.

A few blocks east on Sixth, toward the Chugach Mountains, the Anchorage Museum closes at 6 p.m., but on Fridays from October to April it offers after-hours programs that include films, lectures and dance performances until 9 p.m. The museum highlights Alaska history and Native culture in photographs, paintings and 3-D multimedia exhibits. The "Cruisin' the Fossil Coastline" exhibition, open into September 2018, focuses on Alaska fossils with artist Ray Troll and paleontologist Kirk

Johnson, director of the Smithsonian Institution National Museum of Natural History.

After dinner that Thursday night, Polly and I stepped outside Glacier BrewHouse, zipping our coats against the chill. Beyond the street-lights, a full moon silhouetted the snaggletooth crags of the Chugach. We'd decided to visit some shops and then round out the evening at Kaladi Brothers on Sixth for locally roasted coffee. There, huddled close at a window booth, we could raise our mugs in a toast to Anchorage, where winter nights have a unique way of warming hearts.

SAN JOSE BY BIKE

)) It's sunny and 75 degrees—perfect California weather, with just a hint of a breeze—as I pedal around downtown San Jose. The city's wide, flat streets are conducive to riding, with generous bike lanes and city blocks long enough (and parking scarce enough) to make cycling a great choice for touring the San Jose metro area that anchors the southern end of Silicon Valley.

I'm riding a big blue bike, borrowed as part of the Ford GoBike bike-share program that launched in San Jose in July, with Alaska Airlines as its Founding Partner. The program allows riders to check out one of more than 300 bikes from 33 bike racks around town and ride it for up to 30 minutes before depositing it at another rack (see below for more details). It's a quick and easy way to traverse the city, to tour a few spots during the day, to commute to the train station, or to go to the downtown arena for a concert or San Jose Sharks hockey game. Using these bikes provides an inexpensive, fun and healthy way to navigate. The bikes are fairly sturdy beach cruisers, but they have smooth-shifting gears that are more than flexible enough to get around on San Jose's predominantly level streets. On my trip, I explore city sites ranging from art attractions to a riverside park.

San Jose is rich with street murals and public art. The SoFA District (South of First Area) has the highest concentration of street art, along with quirky galleries. I set my bike in a rack near an abstract floral

BIKE-SHARE DETAILS

The Bay Area's Ford GoBike program has several pass options. wall mural and another painting depicting a Spanish princess. Then I poke my head into a few shops, vowing to return for the neighborhood's festive First Friday events. Afterward, I grab another bike to cruise a few blocks to the San Jose Museum of Art to tour the venue's exhibition space, which hosts modern and contemporary art and includes works ranging from traditional painting to new media.

San Jose is the gateway to Silicon Valley, and I pedal next to one of the city's main showpieces of science and technology-The Tech Museum of Innovation. I dock my bike again and soon switch from cycling to flying in a virtual-reality machine in the museum. I also walk the floors with groups of kids exploring interactive exhibits about robotics and bioengineering, and I wonder which of them might become their generation's billionaire tech CEOs.

Keeping with an educational theme, I bike to San Jose State University to walk its lush green grounds dotted with statues. The campus is filled with cool architecture, including the angular, art-filled Dr. Martin





Luther King Jr. Library (a collaboration of the university and the city's public library system).

All this touring is hunger-making, so I grab lunch inside the artisanal food court at the lively San Pedro Square Market, where I buy a bowl of poke tuna, rice and veggies to power my pedaling without getting too weighed down. The free wireless access inside enables me to post some photos of my ongoing tour.

I conclude with a pleasant pedal through Guadalupe River Park, recalling the days when Silicon Valley was



primarily farmlands intersected by woody wilderness.

I pop out of the park to finish my tour in San Jose's Japantown, checking out a few local shops—filled with traditional Japanese goods and

SPORTS IN SAN JOSE

San Jose is making a case for itself as a powerhouse of pro sports in Northern California (alongside neighboring San Francisco and Oakland), with several franchises drawing crowds—and battling for championships.

Walking the downtown streets, it's quickly apparent from the many window signs that San Jose is "Sharks Territory," the home of perennial ice

hockey playoff team the San Jose Sharks, who play in SAP Center at San Jose (aka "The Shark Tank"). Outside of the arena, downtown San Jose transforms into a hockey party before, during and after games, with specials in bars and restaurants all night. Anchored by a veteran core of players, plus several younger ones, the Sharks hope to make a run this season rivaling the one that took them to the Stanley Cup Finals in 2016. Alaska Airlines is a sponsor of the San Jose Sharks.


San Jose also enthusiastically supports its Major League Soccer team, the San Jose Earthquakes,


who play in Avaya Stadium. With a fanbase that includes supporters of all ages, this franchise may well be the face of future sports in the city.

From spring to early fall, the San Jose Giants baseball team showcases minorleague talent in its Single A franchise. Here, players battle their way to the big leagues, hoping to mirror the success of majorleague stars Madison Bumgarner and Buster Posey, who both launched pro careers in San Jose. -B.F.







FOLLOWING THE **PDX ALE TRAIL**

>> The Lucky Labrador Brewing

Company's flagship brewpub on Portland's Eastside resides in a converted warehouse, with rough-hewn wooden floors and huge fir beams overhead.

I pass the usual assortment of beer lovers and their companions on the dog-friendly establishment's patio: a husky wrestling with a ball, a golden retriever sprawled on the floor, a terrier in its owner's arms. The number and

variety of dogs are augmented by the annual Dogtoberfest celebration, a fundraising dog wash that the brewery's co-founders, Gary Geist and Alex Stiles, started in 1995 to mark their one-year business anniversary.

Just a decade earlier, in 1985, Oregon law had changed to allow beer companies to sell directly to the public at their breweries. That decision cleared the way for brewpubs and for suds-loving Portland to become one of the nation's leading craft-beer cities.

Today, the Rose City is home to more than 100 craft breweries. In fact, there are so many choices, it's a challenge for beer drinkers to decide where to go.

To help guide inquisitive beer aficionados, branding strategist and mapmaker Sean Egusa co-founded the city's first ale-trail map in 2016. The Lucky Labrador is among the very small group of 16 stops on the Eastside PDX Ale Trail (pdxaletrails.com), which outlines a 3-mile



journey through this section of Portland. Egusa, who also helped launch an ale-trail map for Bend, Oregon, felt it was important that Portland's beer brethren get some publicity.

"The breweries are the basic economic engines of these neighborhoods," says Egusa, who plans next summer to release new trail maps in other parts of Portland and develop an app to make the ale trails mobile-friendly.

With the help of a designated driver and Uber, I visit the trail stops over three separate outings. I find that each of the breweries has a





distinct character, in terms of neighborhood feel, overall vibe and, of course, what is being poured.

The Lucky Labrador, for example, favors the hoppy India pale ale style of beers-often bearing canine names such as Wag IPA, Double Dog IPA and Longtail IPA. You won't find a TV set or a pool table here, but you might see, as I did, toddlers in strollers alongside their parents.

"We're modeled after a British pub," Geist says. "You have to come here and talk."

North of Lucky Labrador on Southeast Belmont Street, I experience a distinctly different beer style at the Cascade Brewing Barrel House, which serves sour beers from a brick warehouse fronted by a huge patio.

On Tuesday evenings, Kevin Martin, the brewery's lead blender, holds court for weekly releases of sour beers that pack an acidic





punch and have been oak-barrel aged for up to a couple of years. With their fruit influences and carbonation, the beers can taste a little like sparkling cider. Cascade offers delicate berry flavors in its Framblanc and a rich, powerful taste in its Bourbonic Plague.

Other trail stops—Base Camp, Mt. Tabor, Green Dragon (which changed its name since the map was printed to Rogue Eastside Pub & Pilot Brewery) and McMenamins Barley Mill Pub—are within a few blocks. In Southeast Portland, master brewer Van Havig co-founded Gigantic Brewing Company. With its red picnic tables set in front of a metal warehouse, it's got a very working-class feel that suits Havig just fine. Gigantic's beers range from the standard Gigantic IPA to more exotic creations such as Pipewrench IPA (gin-barrel aged) and MarionBerry Tart (kettle-soured with marionberry fruit).

Near the trail's southern edge, I find Hopworks Urban Brewery with its ample patio space and rows of bicycle frames suspended over the bar. I also stop by tiny Grixsen Brewing Co., which is planning a spring expansion at the western edge of busy Southeast Division Street. With a spin and an audible whir, Grixsen will preserve its beers in a giant "crowler," or can of beer, if you are on the go.

To complete my trail experience, I ask for Grixsen's India pale ale to be placed in such a can. There's nothing like capturing a memory, all 32 ounces of it, to savor later.

A GARDEN FOR ALL SEASONS

>> Fans of the Portland Japanese

Garden's legendary fall foliage are in for a pleasant surprise this year.


Once called "the most beautiful and authentic Japanese garden in the world outside of Japan" by Nobuo Matsunaga, the former

Japanese ambassador to the United States, the garden is celebrating a \$33.5 million expansion and reconfiguration of its entrance and grounds that has enhanced the garden's usefulness and beauty.

Tokyo architect Kengo Kuma has added four elegant new buildings to the garden, which sits in the West Hills above Portland, near the International Rose Test Garden. Visitors will first encounter a new Welcome Center near the parking lot. After following a graceful path

from the parking area, they will come to a courtyard, where cedar buildings with green, living roofs showcase local and natural materials that fit into the surroundings.

The space, dubbed the Cultural Village, features the Jordan Schnitzer Japanese Arts Learning Center, which houses the Calvin and Mayho Tanabe Gallery, a space used to display changing Japanese art exhibits. There is also the Garden House, the site of horticultural workshops. The third building is the Umami



Cafe, where tea and snacks are served amid beautiful views of the area.

Visitors entering the garden first see the new cafe, which is built to be a calming, quiet place. Part of the structure is cantilevered over the edge of a hillside next to the path leading into the Cultural Village. The effect brings to mind a mountain chalet. At the west end of the

Cultural Village is a medieval-style wall constructed from blocks of Eastern Oregon granite with traditional Japanese hand tools.

Leaving the courtyard and the new buildings, the path leads to the original five distinctive gardens that have long attracted visitors from around the world. Other tranquil paths meander through the garden spaces, winding

up and down hills carpeted with trees, plants and flowers. The paths cross bridges over ponds, where you can see large and colorful koi below the water's surface. A favorite site is the Heavenly Falls streaming down mossy basalt rocks in the Strolling Pond Garden.

In early November, one of the most popular sites is in the Strolling Pond Garden, which was designed to highlight the beauty of each season. There you'll find a Japanese maple, whose fall foliage is so vibrantly crimson and orange that it is often photographed as an artful frame of the Moon Bridge nearby.

Be sure to walk behind the Flat Garden's Pavilion Gallery to see a panoramic view of downtown Portland, graced by snowy Mount Hood in the distance.

When the colorful autumn leaves disappear from the trees, the Portland Japanese Garden remains a tranquil and beautiful place to enjoy a late-fall or winter walk.



CARD SENSE

The nine of diamonds is directly above the four of diamonds (clue 2). The seven of spades and eight of clubs aren't adjacent (clue 1) and the ace of hearts isn't between them (clue 3), so the nine of diamonds and the four of diamonds are between the seven of spades and the eight of clubs. By clue 3, either the ace of hearts or the eight of clubs is on top of the pile. The eight of clubs isn't on top (clue 4); the ace of hearts is on top. The seven of spades, then, is second from the top, the nine of diamonds is third, the four of diamonds is fourth from the top, and the eight of clubs is on the bottom. In summary, from top to bottom: ace of hearts, seven of spades, nine of diamonds, four of diamonds, and eight of clubs.




