





### WHAT'S NEW FOR ELITE-FLYER PARENTS

Suspend your hard-earned status for a parental leave—and pick up where you left off

hat the newborn period is rough. You're tired, you're stressed and you have a lot on your mind, such as planning ahead for child care and scheduling medical checkups. If you're a new parent who's a frequent flyer, you may also find yourself a tad nervous about what's going to happen to your elite status while you're grounded.

Elite Leave is a brand-new program enabling Mileage Plan elite members to extend status for an additional year after they take a qualifying parental leave. That means members who have taken a parental leave or will take a parental leave that ends in 2017 can extend their elite status (MVP, MVP Gold or MVP Gold 75K) through the end of 2018. In future years, status will similarly be extended through the calendar year after the year when leave ends.

"This is just one less thing for new parents to worry about," says Natalie Bowman, Alaska Airlines' managing director of brand marketing, and a parent of three young children. "It's such a high-stress, high-emotion, low-sleep time in your life that the last thing you want to

be worrying about is losing your status." Here's how it works:

- 1. Email your full name, date of birth, Mileage Plan number and proof of parental leave (a note from your doctor or employer will do) to elite.flyer@alaskaair.com.
- Once Alaska verifies eligibility, you'll be registered for Elite Leave.

"I absolutely love this," says Tammilee Tillison, a Mileage Plan MVP Gold 75K member. "We track our flight segments and miles throughout the year to make sure we are meeting the status requirements. I can only imagine the panic that would set in if we couldn't meet the requirements due to a pregnancy or other life event."


The idea first took hold when a frequent flyer reached out to Alaska because she had just had a baby and was upset about potentially losing her MVP status. When the request made its way to Alaska's leaders, they were energetically in favor of implementing a leave program.

"So many of us at Alaska are working parents supporting families," says Alison Carpentier, Alaska's director of brand loyalty and a parent of two. "We understand the unique challenges faced by working moms and dads, and this is our way of saying, 'Fellow working parents, we hear you, and we're here to support you. (And, we think you're doing a great job.)"

Alaska's customer service agents, who are empowered to go beyond ordinary service for the benefit of customers, have long been making these exceptions on a case-by-case basis when elite flyers inquired. The recent announcement of the Elite Leave program formalizes the policy for all new parents.

"This is one of those things that is a very simple change, but that we, as working parents, knew had the potential to make a huge impact," Bowman says. "In this case, it just took people asking the right question to inspire a whole new policy. It's a great reminder that your voice does matter—you have the power to make a difference when you speak up."

### MAKING TRAVEL EASIER

Virgin America and Alaska Airlines begin aligning customer policies and procedures

### Alaska Airlines and Virgin America

have been busy behind the scenes in recent months, looking for ways to make the travel experience as seamless as possible for guests flying across the airlines' combined route network. As part of this streamlining, some of Virgin America's travel policies related to check-ins, boarding and bags have been updated.

### Domestic check-in cutoffs

For the past seven years, Alaska has been the No. 1 on-time major North American carrier. Being a leader in getting flights to their destinations on time doesn't happen by accident, and a key piece is ensuring that guests are able to check in for flights, check bags and make it through security with ample time to board their flights. For that reason, Virgin America's check-in policy will now mirror Alaska's:

Please check in with or without bags 40 minutes prior to departure at most airports—Las Vegas and Denver have a 45-minute check-in cutoff, as will Philadelphia starting August 31.

### **Domestic boarding times**

Everyone likes a little extra time to get settled. With that in mind, Virgin America flights will now begin boarding five minutes earlier, matching Alaska's boarding times.

Boarding on all domestic flights begins
 40 minutes prior to departure.

### Baggage size

Alaska allows guests to bring slightly larger carry-ons than most other domestic carriers, and now Virgin America's carry-on baggage allowance is growing an inch to match.

Maximum linear dimension: 51 inches (for example, 24" x 17" x 10").

### Combined services

Alaska and Virgin America have begun combining ground services in some airports served by both airlines, gaining efficiencies for ground crews and making check-in less confusing for guests.

Virgin America Guest Services Teammates (GSTs) began providing service for Alaska flights last month at Boston Logan International Airport and Newark Liberty International Airport, and will similarly assume services at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport in July. Virgin America GSTs will now handle check-in and gate duties and, in some locations, departure coordination for all Alaska and Virgin America flights in these cities. Previously, Alaska contracted those duties with third-party business partners.

GSTs are being cross-trained and will be provided co-branded lanyards and nametags so guests know they serve both airlines.

Customer-service functions for Alaska flights had been provided by employees of Alaska partner airline PenAir, and as a result of the recent combination, a majority of those employees were retained and hired as Virgin America GSTs.

"These moves are part of the broader integration plan to bring our two airlines together as we work toward a single passenger-service system," says Sunae Park, Alaska managing director of airport services. "Having Virgin America GSTs handle Alaska flights will help us share and deploy resources efficiently." And that also means more hassle-free service for customers.

### **PLANNING FOR FAMILY TRAVEL**

>> Traveling with kids can be filled with challenges. There's always the risk of the temper tantrum, the left-behind toy or the impatience that ensues when a little one is stuck in the same seat for hours.

We called upon our employee travel experts to share their tips and experiences for preparing to travel with kids. Check out these ideas from employees that will allow you to travel with your kids without losing your mind. - Dianne McGinness

- Reserve seats early. "For large families or parties with small children, getting everyone together can be a challenge, so make sure you reserve your seats as soon as you book your flight. If you book through a third party or online travel agency, double-check that your seat requests are confirmed." -Razel Mella, Customer Service Agent, Seattle
- Practice makes perfect. "We rehearsed air travel with our kids when they were little. We set up dining-room chairs to simulate rows of airplane seats and made a game out of who could resist touching the seats in front of them. I think it helped, and the passengers in front of us later reaped the benefits." —Heather Andersen, Customer Care Representative, Seattle
- Pack smart snacks. "Always travel with packets of instant oatmeal. You never know when or where you will get stranded, and all you need is hot water, often available for free from coffee shops." —Amy Dittbrenner, Station Supervisor, Anchorage
- Be full of surprises. "When we used to travel to and from Hong Kong with two kids under 5 years old, I would buy inexpensive, small toys (puzzles, books, etc.) and would wrap them up as gifts. If the kids were good on the plane, they'd get a 'present' every two



hours. The unwrapping and then playing with gifts kept the kids focused on new things throughout the flight." -Marianne Lindsey, Corporate Communications Manager, Seattle

- Get kids involved early and often. "After they turn 4 years old, let children carry their own backpacks. You'd be surprised how much lighter the backpacks get when the kids know they're going to have to carry them."
- Joanne Bailly, Customer Service Agent, Air Freight, Seattle
- Go bearing gifts. "If you know your child is going to be challenging, bring the flight crew goodies, such as chocolate and maybe some reading material. Add a little thank-you note for the extra attention you might be needing. I have also seen parents bring goodies for the rows of people sitting around them, letting them know you are aware children bring a different atmosphere to the cabin and thanking them for their patience." -Kim Fabrizio, Supervisor Reservations, Seattle
- Bring a tablet. "As a flight attendant, I see parents who travel with kids of all ages, daily. There's one tool that seems to work across the board: an iPad or something similar. I'm

often amazed that a child will sit and watch a film for the umpteenth time and not make a peep during our entire flight." [Note that the American Academy of Pediatrics has guidelines about children's screen use and discourages it for children under 18 months. Also, have your children use kid-safe headphones to keep things quiet for those around you.] -Melissa Claire, Flight Attendant, Seattle

- Cup up! "For small children, travel with small paper cups. They are lightweight, and kids love these things. There are a lot of games you can play with them. For example, hide an item underneath and move the cups around, and have the kids guess which cup has the item. The cups are very cheap and keep little ones happy." - Catherine Kracker, Customer Service Agent, Anchorage
- Arrive early. "Summertime, school breaks and holidays are busy times at airports—and they happen to be some of the best times for families to travel. We recommend arriving at the airport at least two hours before departure for domestic flights, and three hours for international flights. Take your time through the airport, and avoid some stress." —Razel Mella, Customer Service Agent, Seattle



### TRAVELING ON THEIR OWN

Alaska helps kids take flight

### )) It's summertime, and your bored

daughter's favorite cousin in California calls. The two chat for a few minutes, and your daughter turns to you and says that her cousins want her to go to Disneyland with them.

You live in Portland. All your vacation time is booked. "Mom," she says. "I'm 10 years old! I can fly by myself."

Actually, she can. Alaska Airlines welcomes child passengers, and we will gladly escort them to their final destination. Our unaccompanied-minor service is available for guests ages 5 to 17, on most flights.

Children ages 5 to 12 traveling alone must be part of the unaccompanied-minor service program. There are age-dependent and airline-policy restrictions, and fees run \$25 each way per child (\$50 for connecting flights). The service is optional for children ages 13 to 17.

Once you've placed your child in our care, he or she will remain under supervision at all times. We provide each child traveling alone with a unique piece of identification, which they must wear at all times.


While child passengers are under supervision, we expect them to follow directions given by our agents and flight attendants.

Here are some tips you can follow to make sure this is a good experience for your childand yourself.

To make reservations, go to alaskaair.com/ content/travel-info/policies/children-travelingalone. Review the restrictions, and print the following forms:

- Children traveling alone checklist
- Blank guardian-contact form

You will need to provide the names and phone numbers of the guardians who will be picking up and dropping off the child passenger, and also provide alternate guardians in case of emergency (guardians should be



included for each direction). Children using our unaccompanied-minor service will be released only to individuals with valid I.D. who are listed on the guardian-contact form.

When choosing seats, we recommend selecting children-traveling-alone seats ("L" seats) from the seat map.

Before going to the airport, check the status of your child's flight and weather conditions at alaskaair.com.

- Pack a carry-on with activities, necessary medications and snacks.
- Ensure that your child has had a meal prior to the flight.
- Provide your child with a debit or credit card for inflight purchases. Cash is not accepted for inflight meals or entertainment tablets.
- Provide your child with a cellphone or prepaid phone card and important numbers.
- Update and print your guardian-contact form, using your child's confirmation code or e-ticket number.
- Bring the guardian-contact forms (departure and return) to the airport.

Allow extra time at the airport. Arrive at least 90 minutes prior to departure for domestic and two hours for international flights. All unaccompanied-minor procedures (e.g., paperwork, fees, gate passes) must be completed in advance of our standard 40-minute check-in cutoff times.

- Notify a customer service agent at the ticket counter that the child is an unaccompanied minor.
- Obtain an escort pass from the ticket counter so that you can escort the child passenger to/from the gate. A guardian listed on the guardian-contact form must present a valid photo I.D. to obtain an escort pass for meeting a child passenger at the gate.
- Report to the gate with the child at least 40 minutes prior to departure.
- Introduce the child passenger to the gate agent.
- Remain at the airport until a customer service agent has confirmed that the child passenger's flight has departed.

A little advance planning helps to make sure the process goes smoothly for everyone, especially the young travelers. \*

### A DRESS REHEARSAL FOR TRAVEL

Alaska makes sure the sky's not the limit for passengers with disabilities

>> Sometimes just getting to the airport, navigating security and making your flight can be stressful. For individuals with autism or intellectual and developmental disabilities, and their families, it can be especially over-

whelming and even frightening.

Alaska Airlines partners with a number of airports and disability-related organizations around the country to offer families a free dress rehearsal, prior to their taking an airplane flight. The families get to experience checking in for a flight, going through security, boarding the plane and taxiing around the airport in a low-key, friendly environment.

"This program means so much to these families," says Captain Dave Mets, Alaska Airlines director and base chief pilot in Portland. "We're eager to help out by creating an authentic travel experience that hopefully makes getting on a plane in the future less frightening."

The program, run in partnership with local autism-advocacy organizations and airports, not only lessens the stress children and their

parents may feel, but it helps educate airport and airline professionals about how best to serve children with autism or other intellectual and developmental disabilities.

"We see this as a powerful opportunity to educate our employees and our airport partners on how we can better serve the needs of individuals with cognitive/developmental disabilities" says Ray Prentice, Alaska Airlines director of customer advocacy.

Families come from far and wide to attend events held in Seattle, hosted by Alaska Airlines and The Arc of King County (part of a national community-based organization advocating for and serving people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families). Alaska also partners with the Autism Society of Oregon to host events in Portland, as well as in other cities.

Prentice loves to hear back from families who have attended an event and then taken a family trip. "Since the kids know what to expect, it's a much more enjoyable experience for the whole family," Prentice says. \*







### A "STAR" WAS BORN

>> As Alaska Airlines celebrates its 85th anniversary this year, we look back at some of the important elements of our early days of flying in the Alaska territory. Our milestones were set by some of the biggest names in frontier Alaska—accomplished aviators and entrepreneurs. Following are a few of the highlights:

1932 In January, Harvey Barnhill and Linious "Mac" McGee launch commercial air service out of Anchorage with two Stinson aircraft. In April, the name changes to McGee Airways. That same month, Steve Mills and his new partners, Jack Waterworth and Charlie Ruttan, bring their newly acquired Fleet biplane from Seattle to Anchorage at the urging of Wesley "Earl" Dunkle, a flight student of Mills'. Dunkle sees the value not only of a flight school in his hometown of Anchorage, but also of having plane service to his mines. He loans the partners the money for the move and startup of operations, and by the end of the year, Dunkle becomes a partner in the incorporation of Star Air Service.

1935 McGee decides to sell his airline to Star Air Service, making Star the largest airline in Alaska. McGee would twice return to manage Star Air Service.

1937 Early in the year, Star Air Service buys Chet Browne's Arctic Airways, and becomes known as Star Airways, and in April, Star Airways purchases Oscar Winchell and Don Goodman's Alaska Interior Airways. In November, Don Goodman, David Strandberg and Warren N. Cuddy form Star Air Lines Inc., purchasing assets from Star Airways.

1943 Star Air Lines, operating as Alaska Star Airlines, acquires Mirow Air Service of Nome, as well as Fairbanks-based companies Pollack Airlines, Lavery Airways and Alaska Airmotive, and changes its name to Alaska Airlines.

1944 Star Airlines Inc. files amended articles of incorporation, changing its name to the now familiar Alaska Airlines Inc. Steve Mills, Mac McGee and many of the other early founders of what would become Alaska Airlines were not only business pioneers, but also legendary pilots who routinely braved challenging weather and almost nonexistent infrastructure to serve the tiny communities of the Last Frontier. **⊀**

# A SUMMER SEA FEAST

Family vacations are opportunities to build rich food traditions

)) If you find yourself hankering for a taste of "Mama's cooking," sometimes you need to go right to the source. That's what I do every summer.

I have many favorites that Mom cooked for us when we were kids growing up in Delaware. Her sloppy Joes are the best. Also memorable is her cast-iron-skillet fried chicken with fluffy mashed potatoes, topped by a huge, melting pat of butter. Yet the top craving for me just might be a spicy steamed bushel of "No. 1 Jimmy crabs" (the meatiest male blue crabs), along with all the fixings. We traditionally enjoyed this feast with friends and family, while vacationing on the Eastern Seaboard.

When I was growing up, our family's summer destination was almost always Rehoboth Beach, Delaware. It still is today. In early summer, when the briny waters of the Atlantic become warm enough to be swimmable, and schools begin their collective hiatus, we rent a house near the town's boardwalkknown for its carnival rides, fat cheesesteaks, soft serve ice cream cones, sticky saltwater taffy (made on-site at Dolle's Candyland) and-my mom's favorite—caramel corn, made by Fisher's Popcorn.

One challenge these days is finding a house big enough for the extended family of 30 or more that attends our annual reunions. Once we get that puzzle sorted out, though, we move on to assigning meals to each of the seven family units involved.

My wife, Jackie, daughter, Loretta, and I typically take on the family's classic Eastern Shore Crab Feed—always under the watchful eyes of my feisty, now-86-year-old mother, Mary Gertrude.

We have a process. The first step is finding the best Blues. These crabs are sold live, by size. The largest-the "No. 1s"-are prized and in high demand because they offer the most meat.

The next step is cooking. Some shops will cook crabs for you on the spot, caking them with Old Bay Seasoning and steaming them over a boiling cauldron of salt water. But I love doing this myself!

With those beautiful crabs cooked and still hot, we spread them across a newspaper-covered table and set out napkins, wooden hammers to crack shells, pools of drawn butter for dipping in, and brews from nearby Dogfish Head Craft Brewery.

We don't stop there. The side dishes are almost as important as the main act. We set out pot-boiled corn on the cob, mustardy potato salad, chopped green and red lettuces with apple-cider vinaigrette, and crusty sweet shortcake mounded high with ripe strawberries and vanilla whipped cream.


When it's time to eat, these seafood smorgasbords are true hands-on experiences for everyone. Crab pickers come in two basic varieties. There are the hoarders, who pick and pile the meat, waiting until all of their work is done before enjoying the fruits of their labor. And there are those of us who eat as we go, perhaps less patiently and perhaps because we prefer the meat as hot and fresh as possible. I love to crunch the shells with my molars, going all-in until my face starts burning from the heavy spices.

Food memories run deep for my family, as they do for many others. And it's valuable to pass along traditions in person, when possible. My mother has taught me family-heirloom recipes, flavors and techniques firsthand, as her mother did for her. This method is more meaningful than passing down a recipe box of index cards. Ultimately, family food traditions built on collective experiences can lead to repeatable moments of joy, such as those we find in a summertime crab feed. Cheers!





# **TRAVELING** WITH TOTS

)) I'm a proud new parent, and after our son, Jack, was born, I felt like my travels took on a new life of their own. Prior to that special day, my wife and I frequently hopped around the globe ... sometimes at a moment's notice. We even did back-to-back around-the-world trips, just weeks apart. Of course, now that we're new parents, we can't be traipsing all over the world like we used to, but it doesn't mean we have to stay home. I had no clue what it was like to travel as a family until just recently, and I learned that with some research, tips from friends and key products, you can relieve the stress of traveling with children and focus on the beauty of seeing the world as if for the first time, through fresh eyes.

### Online research

When you're planning a family vacation, start by getting some expert advice from trusted sources such as travel agents or writers who specialize in family travel. Learning basic tips such as the best time to fly (during your child's nap time) can make a big difference.

Before plopping down any money, you will want to make sure the hotel and destination are kid-friendly, and there are plenty of blogs and websites out there that can help you.

A few of my favorite familyfriendly travel blogs are Jen Leo, Mommy Points, Travel Babbo and Hip Travel Mama. Many people also use TripAdvisor, which is an excellent resource. However, I find that the hotel tips in people's comments are more helpful than the ratings.

# Word-of-mouth recommendations

The best place to get travel tips is from your friends and family, and it's even easier to source this information with Facebook. My friend and colleague Samantha Brown gave me an outstanding tip: When you fly, have your partner board first with the bags to secure overhead bin space; then you board last with your child so that he or she isn't confined to a small space for as long. Another friend told me to reserve a seat ahead of time. Aisle seats, for instance, make it easy to get up and walk around with your baby, and the bulkhead is ideal because it offers extra legroom. However, it's important to note that armrests usually don't go up in the bulkhead, so if you've purchased a seat for your child, make sure the car seat will fit.

# Travel products that made a difference

My wife discovered a new car seat with a built-in mobility system, called Doona. What makes it so special is that it's a car seat that, with just the press of a button, quickly and easily converts into a stroller. This all-in-one system is perfect for travel because it means you don't have to deal with a car seat and separate stroller base, and you will be able to move around more freely. And it's FAA-approved!

Another product my wife (you can follow her on social at @NatalieDiScala or read her blog at ohtravelissima.com) found is called DockATot, which is designed to be a secure bed for your little one. It has high, rounded bumpers to keep baby from rolling out and is securely snug. Since babies feel calmer

in a smaller environment, the company says, the DockATot is designed to mimic the mother's womb. It's also portable and easy to travel with. You won't need to worry about using the hotel's equipment, and your little one will have the comfort and cleanliness of home wherever you go.

If you have slightly older kids, check out the Fly Tot. It's an inflatable cushion designed to fit snugly in the space in front of your child's seat. It manually inflates to the level of the seat within minutes, allowing a small child to stretch out his or her legs, or even lie down flat, on a regular economy seat. X

# WHEN A MILE FLOWN IS A MILE EARNED

flown was a mile earned—and it still is with Alaska Mileage Plan. However, many other loyalty programs have switched to new models that issue miles based on the price of your ticket. Which of these approaches is more rewarding to frequent travelers? I believe it is the former, but to fully answer this question, I need to start by clarifying a few terms:

**Miles flown** are straightforward. Most airlines will list the distance next to the ticket you're looking to purchase.

Elite qualifying miles are used to determine your elite status. You will typically earn these based on the miles flown, plus a bonus for certain fare classes

Award miles can be redeemed for a future flight. You typically will earn elite qualifying miles based on miles flown, plus a bonus for certain fare classes and another for your elite status.

Today I am focusing on award miles because nearly all loyalty programs still base their elite status on the actual distance flown, even if the program bases mileage earning on dollars spent. Additionally, elite status can still affect how many award miles you'll earn. At Alaska Airlines, that means earning a bigger bonus, multiplied by the distance you fly. Other big U.S. carriers issue more miles per dollar. The chart below compares these two measures.

Once we direct our attention to award miles, a significant difference becomes obvious: While Alaska Airlines still issues a minimum of one award mile for every mile flown on its fleet, including Virgin America flights, many other programs are looking at the amount spent, starting at just 5 miles per dollar. What's

worse, not every carrier includes mandatory taxes and fees when they calculate that amount.

As everyone knows, some expensive flights travel only short distances. Some cheap flights travel very long distances. If you compare fares with the person seated next to you, you each probably paid a different amount. Is it your fault the airline had a sale and you booked a cheap fare?

To compare some real-world examples, I picked three routes at random and looked one month in advance, choosing flights where Alaska was competing against another carrier with a fare no more than \$5 different.

Portland to Salt Lake City (\$87.44 base fare + \$20.76 taxes and fees)

- With Alaska Mileage Plan: 678 award miles
- With the other guy:
   437 award miles

**Seattle to Maui** (\$310.10 base fare + \$24.10 taxes and fees)

- With Alaska Mileage Plan: 2,638 award miles
- With the other guy: 1,551 award miles

Los Angeles to Washington-Reagan (\$314.41 base fare + \$37.79 taxes and fees)

 With Alaska Mileage Plan: 2,304 award miles • With the other guy: 1,572 award miles

These three examples weren't hard to find, and on average you would have earned 58 percent more award miles by flying Alaska and crediting your flights to Mileage Plan.

It certainly looks like some customers will earn more miles with Mileage Plan, with or without elite status. Other programs could still earn more if you purchase a very expensive fare, but who wants to do that?!

Some business travelers don't have a choice. Plans take time to finalize, and tickets get booked at the last minute. Mileage Plan still rewards these big spenders. Remember, there are bonuses for certain fare classes that might mean 25, 50 or even 100 percent additional miles. Expensive tickets do earn more miles; that bonus just isn't directly tied to the price.

This is a good time for me to remind you to consider both sides of the equation. Look both at how many miles you'll earn and also how many miles you'll need to redeem for an award.

Earning more (or fewer) miles is irrelevant if the size of your redemption changes by the same amount.





# **MUNCH MASTERPIECES**

(1893), depicting a face misshapen in horror underneath an orange sky, is probably the most widely recognized. Yet the Norwegian artist, with ties to the Symbolist and Expressionist movements, once said his creative breakthrough didn't come until about 20 years after finishing the famous painting, when he developed a clearer understanding of the human condition. The exhibit "Edvard Munch: Between the Clock and the Bed," running through Oct. 9 at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, showcases the breadth of Munch's 60-year career and features 45 paintings produced between the 1880s and 1940s. Self-Portrait. Between the Clock and the Bed (1940–43) encapsulates the themes of desire, mortality, isolation and anxiety that Munch's work so often conveyed, and serves as a touchstone of the entire exhibit. The show comprises eight themed galleries, opening with a focus on self-portraits, such as Self-Portrait



# **OCEAN ACCESS**

## By Jeff Bond

**With expert skill,** "Captain Kaua'i," of Kauai Sea Tours, maneuvers the port bow of the 60-foot *Lucky Lady* catamaran into the entrance of a sea cave on the Nāpali Coast.

A couple walks to the end of the boat's railed bow to stand under the gentle "Fertility Falls" that cascade down from the rocky mountainside above the cave's mouth. Other couples join the tradition of getting wet under the falls, which is said to bring fertility.

This ritual is just one of the charming parts of our five-hour dinner cruise along Kaua'i's spectacular northwest coastline, a secluded 17-mile-long stretch of towering cliffs and breathtaking caverns. Exploring the coast by charter boat is one of the safer, lower-effort ways to see this magical location.

On my trip, I'm with about 50 passengers

departing from the southern town of 'Ele'ele in the early afternoon. (One caution: If you are concerned about seasickness, take medication before boarding.) The friendly crew of the *Lucky Lady* serves snacks, mai tais and other drinks as our captain keeps up a humorous narrative, discussing the island's history, people and coastal locations we see.

While sea turtles, dolphins and whales are often spotted on these tours, the real star is the coast itself. Sometimes written as Nā Pali, and meaning "The Cliffs," the coast features astonishing rock formations that rise thousands of feet from the ocean. Over millions of years, erosion by waterfalls and weather has carved the rock into towering cathedrals of varied shapes. Pristine beaches are found among sheer rock walls plunging to the sea.

- Blue Hawaiian Helicopters: Trips to iconic sites on all four major islands.

On our trip, every section of the coastline seems to have an amazing surprise.

When it's time to head back, we cruise southwest, then southeast along Kaua'i's shore. As we enjoy a tasty chicken dinner before returning to the marina, I'm thinking this has been a terrific—and easy—way to enjoy this remote and world-famous area.





# A DOVE SPREADS HER WINGS

The star of Disney's *Descendants* and *Liv and Maddie* takes on new roles

>>> Dove Cameron almost got her start in Hollywood in a role known simply as "Mud-Covered Girl."

It was a one-line part, and the actor who got it would literally be coated in mud and unrecognizable on TV. Yet a long line of young women still showed up for an audition on a hot Los Angeles day in 2011. Cameron, then 15, had moved to LA with her mother to pursue a career in Hollywood. But on that day, they began to wonder what they were doing.

Cameron, now 21, has gone on to star in the hit Disney Channel family comedy *Liv and Maddie*, playing both of the show's twin title characters for four seasons (2013–2017). She also starred as Mal (daughter of Maleficent) in the Disney Channel TV film *Descendants* (2015), a story about the offspring of good and evil fairy-tale characters. She stars in the sequel, *Descendants 2*, which premieres on six networks on July 21, and in live performances of the musical *Mamma Mia!* at the Hollywood Bowl in Los Angeles, July 28–30, playing the role of Sophie.

Yet the picture was much different for Cameron on that hot day in 2011 with the cattle-call audition. At that point, it had been almost exactly a year since she and her mother, Bonnie Wallace, had moved to LA from the Seattle area—armed with little more than a headshot, Dove's resume from community theater and a dream. She was still waiting for her first Hollywood gig, after many auditions.

And then ... she didn't get the part.

Fortunately, Cameron was tough. And the situation was a bit laughable: "I can't even get Mud-Covered Girl!" she said to her mother, after learning of her rejection.

The very next day, Cameron got her break, successfully auditioning for a part with a two-episode arc in a different TV show. The role earned her a listing with the Internet Movie Database, and it opened the door to other casting calls. If Cameron had landed Mud-Covered Girl, she would not have been available.

Although luck helped, Cameron's success is a tribute to her persistence, says her mother. "The thing about Dove is, she gets up and brushes off pretty quickly."


Wallace knew early on that her daughter was driven.



Growing up, Cameron constantly performed—in line at the store, in the car or wherever, Wallace says.

"It does seem like one of those things that I just couldn't have stopped," Cameron says of her drive to act. She, in turn, gives a lot of credit to her mom, whom she had to lobby daily for a year to move to LA. Wary at first, Wallace eventually agreed, and then embraced her role.

"My mother just bent over backward to make it happen for me," Cameron says. "She drove me to every audition. >>> Actor-performer Dove Cameron is a multitalented star on the rise.

She persisted. And she'd never done anything like it. She wasn't one of those stage mothers who have a bunch of experience and connections."

Wallace learned so much that she wrote a book, *The Hollywood Parents Guide*. She now does consulting for young actors via her website, bonniejwallace.com. If she had to do it again, she says, she wouldn't make the jump to Hollywood so suddenly. Yet she also feels that anyone pursuing an acting career can find value in the skills they develop trying, whether or not the career is ultimately for them. "I could have lived with us trying and failing," Wallace says. "But I couldn't fail to try and then look back and wonder what could have happened."

Whether or not Cameron's move to Hollywood was overly sudden, her persistence paid off. In her best-known work, she became an icon of Disney family programming with *Liv and Maddie*, in her roles as the budding starlet Liv Rooney and her athletic twin sister, Maddie. Despite long hours (the doubling up of her roles meant that scenes had to be filmed twice), Cameron treasures the time she spent on the series, and especially the cast and crew: "It was the time of our lives," she says. "I just loved that show."

Recently, Cameron has been busily expanding her horizons. She says that a part in the star-studded,

live-TV presentation of Hairspray Live! in December (in which she played villain Amber Von Tussle) reawakened her passion for musical theater, which she'll enjoy again with Mamma Mia!

She is also excited about Descendants 2. Much of the action in the sequel happens on the Isle of the Lost, and Cameron says the film should be a treat for audiences, as it was for the cast to film. "The 'Descendants' series

is just the dreamiest project for an actor," she says. "You get special effects and dancing and acting and singing."

She was glad for the chance to revisit and expand on her character, Mal. Cameron says she's loved this character ever since she first saw a script. "I wanted to play the complex, wounded girl with dark streaks," she says. "And yes, it's fun to play somebody who is maybe evil or negatively connoted. I truly believe that all the most intelligent, interesting, complex human beings have layers in them."

She may have a soft spot for villains, but what also comes through strongly, especially in *Liv and Maddie*, is Cameron's powerfully *positive* energy. Nobody ever asked

her to be princesslike, she says, but she also doesn't gravitate toward activities that would jeopardize her Disney image. Any sort of goodgirl vibe she gives off is natural, she says. "I just really like to watch movies in my house and eat takeout and go on dates with my boyfriend."

Yet the popularity of her work has come with responsibility toward young fans: "I feel a happy obligation to be a good influence,

happy obligation to be a good influence, which I take seriously," Cameron says.

Looking forward, Cameron anticipates more parts on various screens and stages. As a singer, she expects to release music this year, as well. And to travel for filming and promotions.

Her travel tips? Cameron says she never unpacks, and she always tries to fly at night to sleep on the plane. She also carries a huge backpack (incongruous on her 5'2" frame) that she adds things to whenever she finds something useful. But her favorite

part of travel is people, not things: "The fact that my job allows me to meet so many different people from so many different cultures is the biggest blessing in my life. People are my favorite thing about being alive."


Ultimately, the energetic performer can see a future in which she explores interests in addition to singing, dancing and acting. Studying massage, maybe. Or food cultures. But, she says, she is "obviously" going to continue acting.

"Success to me would mean being able to feed myself, being able to balance work and time with people I love, and walking away from every job with the people on that job saying, 'Oh, I would love to work with her again.'"

# PLANETARY PROMENADE

A walk in Anchorage showcases city highlights and celestial connections

)> It's a long way from the sun to Pluto ... 10.1 miles, to be exact, on the Anchorage Light Speed Planet Walk, which transposes solar system distances onto downtown streets and one of Alaska's most popular recreation paths. Will humankind make it to Mars some day? In Anchorage, it happens daily.

Conceived by local high school student Eli Menaker, and built in 2004–2005 with the support of the Anchorage Rotary Club, the path is marked by interpretive signs along the way and is distinguished by clever mathematics. The time it takes the average person to walk between solar-system sites on the path is roughly proportional to the time it takes light to travel the corresponding distance in space. It takes a walker about eight minutes to get from the sun to Earth on the Planet Walk, and that's about how long it takes light to travel from the sun to Earth in space.

The walk starts by the Alaska Center for the Performing Arts, at a bright yellow sun sculpture at West Fifth Avenue and G Street. Continuing west on Fifth, the route passes other city landmarks such as Glacier Brewhouse and the Hotel Captain Cook. Following Fifth Avenue, walkers pass informative signs representing Mercury, Venus, Earth and Mars. After crossing L Street, the route heads downhill,

and accesses the Tony Knowles Coastal Trail a few "million miles"—about a block—past the Red Planet.

The rest of the route follows the multiuse coastal trail, passing by Jupiter at Westchester Lagoon; Saturn, at Lyn Ary Park; Uranus, just downhill from the north-south runway of Ted Stevens Anchorage International Airport; and Neptune, near Point Campbell Park. Aside from planets, the trail also passes birch-and-spruce forest, thickets of berries, and the dynamic tideflats of Cook Inlet. And keep your eyes peeled for moose.

The planet walk, and the trail, conclude at Kincaid Park, home of Pluto. This planetary body remains on the walk despite the fact that astronomers formally booted it from planet status a decade ago. Standing atop the hill at Kincaid Park is a good place to eye the heavens and consider whether the universe cares at all about human categories.

It's also a superb spot to look for the snowy peak of Denali, North America's tallest mountain at 20,310 feet.

Walking the entire path out to Kincaid Park takes more than five hours. Want to go at warp speed? Visitors can rent bicycles at several spots downtown and cut the one-way time to an hour. In galactic terms, cycling signifies travel at about five times the speed of light. \*\*



# ALPINE SPLENDOR

Mountain hikes near Anchorage lead to bird's-eye views of wild and urban Alaska

>>> The most-hiked peak in Alaska is also one of the most easily identified. The distinctive glacier-leveled tabletop summit of Flattop Mountain contrasts with the nearby sharpedged peaks in the Chugach Mountains. Visitors love Flattop for its stunning views and proximity to Anchorage. Whether you're in town for business or a vacation, this mountain offers a glimpse of wild Alaska only minutes from the state's largest city.

"It's right on Anchorage's doorstep," says Chugach State Park Chief Ranger Kurt Hensel. "There are not many areas in the state from which you can get to wilderness so quickly."

Thanks to dedicated trail-crew work, the 3.4-mile roundtrip hike on Flattop Mountain

Trail starts out from the Glen Alps Trailhead with a relatively mild, manageable grade and switchbacks. The climb intensifies the closer you get to the 3,510-foot summit, and the last 650 feet of an overall 1,350-foot elevation gain is steep, rocky and can be slippery.

Yet the payoff is great. At Flattop's summit, hikers can take in a grand view of Anchorage and Cook Inlet to the west, or turn east and see views that seem to go on forever into the Chugach Mountains and Alaska Range.

"It's a fantastic glimpse of the mountains around Anchorage," Hensel says. "Flattop's what you hear people talk about. The reason it's so popular is that it's very doable, and you can tell people, 'I've bagged that peak.""

Flattop Mountain Trail is best hiked late April through early October. People sometimes see moose, sheep and even bears. If you don't have a vehicle, you can take the Flattop Mountain Shuttle, which offers roundtrip service between Anchorage and the trailhead. Learn more at hike-anchorage-alaska.com.

For hikers not up for the rock scramble on Flattop, other paths from Glen Alps Trailhead lead to lesser-hiked Powerline Pass (the first 3 miles are an easy stroll, and the pass is about 5.5 miles and 1,500 feet of elevation gain one way from the trailhead), Little O'Malley Peak (4 miles one way) and Williwaw Lakes (5.9 miles one way)—all of which push deep into the 495,000-acre Chugach State Park. ⊀

At the top of the list of museum must-sees is the exhibit "Dinosphere: Now You're in Their World." The display has full-size dinosaur skeletons and one of the largest displays of juvenile dinosaur fossils on the planet. You can also dig for fossils and touch a real *Tyrannosaurus rex* bone.



# MASTERING THE GRILL

#### )) During Fourth of July weekend,

an estimated 75 million Americans host barbecues, consuming a total of about 750 million pounds of chicken and 150 million hot dogs across the nation. And that's not even counting the steak and burger platters. Enjoying all the food is easy—the real challenge is to prepare it like a pro. If you're looking to up your grill game this summer, consider these hot tips from two all-stars of the open flame.

James Beard Award–winning chef **John Currence** is also an avid tailgater. He stresses the significance of proper prepwork. "Whenever possible, use actual whole-wood lump charcoal. Briquettes are usually full of chemicals that can impart a bitter flavor to your food," advises Currence, who is also the author of *Pickles, Pigs & Whiskey* and is opening several new restaurants this year.

He is a fan of marination, but is wary of sweeter ingredients, which tend to caramelize and burn easily.

Adam Perry Lang wrote the book on Serious Barbecue. That's literally the name of his 2009-penned ode to sizzling protein. This year he'll open the APL Restaurant, a muchanticipated meatlover's hot spot in the heart of Hollywood, located on Hollywood Boulevard and Vine Street. When it comes to basting food on the grill, Lang reveals a delightful DIY trick up his sleeve: make an herb brush. "Using a wooden spoon and butcher's string, take fresh rosemary and thyme and tie it on like a witch's broom," he recommends. "Those herbs can be very harsh. Here you're able to get those flavors in a subtle way. It enhances steak, hamburgers and chicken."

The chef also suggests a technique called board dressing. "On your cutting board, you



spread a quarter cup of olive oil, and rub in garlic, some fresh-sliced chiles, herbs—cilantro, Italian parsley," Lang explains. "After grilling, instead of putting the meat onto a platter, place it—while it's still hot—onto the cutting board, so it gets coated with the seasoned olive oil." Flip the meat over, applying liquid to both sides, and then slice it. The juices will mix with the seasoning, heightening the flavor of the steak, while jacketing residual heat prior to serving.

# BATCHING BEVERAGES

By Brad Japhe

**Modern mixology** is famous for its almost comically labor-intensive cocktails. But in the high-paced atmosphere of a baror a get-together where you'd rather be chatting with friends or family-10 minutes of muddling, dolloping and zesting ingredients can be incredibly inefficient. Fortunately, some clever bartenders have sidestepped this challenge with the advent of batching. Rather than assembling everything to order, they allocate time in advance to consolidate as many ingredients as possible. Beyond minimizing time and effort, batching often enhances overall quality, as certain flavors benefit from combination over time.

"I've always been a big fan of batching up cocktails for service, because of ease and efficiency," explains Ivy Mix (above) of Leyenda in Brooklyn. The world-renowned

bartender adds several tips. To avoid the oxidation of juices and syrups, she prefers batching only stirred cocktails (as opposed to shaken). And since there's no ice involved in advance preparation, she adds water to the recipe to account for dilution. Mix says that the Parabéns cocktail has become a personal batching favorite. She's also discovered that she prefers the Parabéns "once it's mellowed in a bottle for a few days."

At Pacific Cocktail Haven in downtown San Francisco, owner Kevin Diedrich is a fan of "hot-batching," where only the alcoholic bases of a drink are combined in advance (minus the modifiers, such as bitters or juices). The process maximizes space as well as effort. "Instead of having three bottles, you now have one," he says. "Plus, in terms of consistency, you can't mess up a batched bottle." ⊀

#### **PARABÉNS**

1.5 parts Carpano Bianco vermouth .75 parts Novo Fogo cachaça

.5 parts Suze bitters

.25 parts St-Germain elderflower liqueur

1.5 parts water



**)> One of the great joys of summer** is diving into a pool on a hot day. The following are a few of the nation's most unique hotel pools that may be worth adding to your vacation schedule.

The Joule Hotel, Dallas: Located 10 stories above Main Street in downtown Dallas, the cantilevered pool features a glass front that extends 8 feet past the edge of the building, giving swimmers the sense they are floating off the side of the hotel.

Golden Nugget Las Vegas: The massive 200,000-gallon pool features a unique "Shark Chute," a clear plexiglass tube slide that runs through an aquarium full of exotic fish and sharks, allowing you to view the undersea species as you slide down into a separate 83-degree heated pool.

Disney's Grand Californian Hotel & Spa, Anaheim: The hotel, located adjacent to Disney's California Adventure Park, has three pools, including the Fountain Pool, with a turtle-shaped fountain that sprays water on people; the Mariposa Pool, with cabanas; and the Redwood Pool, which has a 90-foot-long waterslide that winds around a replica of a redwood tree stump.

Aulani, A Disney Resort & Spa, O'ahu:

The resort has 7 acres of water-filled fun, with two waterslides, three pools, a snorkel lagoon, a lazy river, five whirlpool spas and an interactive water play area for children.

Dream Downtown Hotel, New York City:

The 50-foot pool is located on the roof of a two-story building between the hotel's two towers and features a bottom with windows that look down on the hotel lobby, allowing arriving guests and swimmers to see each other. A section of the pool deck is even covered with sand imported from Aruba.



# HONING YOUR GOLF SKILLS

>>> There comes a time in golfers' lives when they realize that they can't simply will good scores out of compromised swings. They need help, professional guidance and the proper tutelage. That is where golf academies come into play. Coachella Valley is a center for such schools, which offer a variety of programs.

Desert Willow Golf Resort, one of the valley's best plays, offers The Palm Desert Golf Academy, which approaches golf improvement in a holistic manner.

However, this is not a "system" or formulaic golf school. Instead, Paul Bucy, director of instruction, and his staff work with the golfers to find the best approach for them. And the sessions average a 2-1 student-instructor ratio. "When you call to set up

Another golf-school option is the Westin Golf Academy, headed by Barry Clayton, at the Westin Mission Hills Golf Resort & Spa in Rancho Mirage. The program has multiday options, as well as on-course instruction at the Gary Player–designed Signature Course and at the Resort Course by Pete Dye.

The PGA West Golf Academy at La Quinta Resort & Club has all the bells and whistles, from premier video analysis to the top launch monitor systems and on-course instruction.





but I still appreciate and respect the men and women who do. They have a power that is hopefully out there doing good, not just for our country, but also for the world."

He spends some of his free time working with vets through Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America, as well as taking USO tours to visit troops abroad and stateside. In fact, just prior to being interviewed for this magazine story, he'd been to visit Fort Dix in New Jersey.

"It's a tradition, and when actors or athletes visit the troops, I hope we can give them relief, provide a little break," Ventimiglia says. He's been doing this work for 11 years. "When I traveled to Iraq and Afghanistan with the USO, I said to Admiral Michael Mullen, who was then the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, 'I'm not a comic, so I can't do stand up; I'm not a bombshell, so no one is gonna want to look at me; I'm not a musician, so I can't put on a show. ... What can I do?' He said that just being there was important. A lot of my friends who are in the service say the same thing,

that it means a lot to have people come by."

THE CITY OF ORANGE where Ventimiglia spent his formative years is a unique community in

bustling Orange County. It has an Old Towne designated historic district-a zone preserving more than 1,300 homes and other structures dating between 1888 and 1940. It's a charming place to go antiquing, and, according to Ventimiglia, an equally terrific place to be a young boy.

"It felt like a small town; there's the epicenter there that is the town circle, with events held throughout the year. There was a protective quality, so Orange didn't feel like a big city, even though there was a lot of acreage." As a child, he says, "I didn't need to go far to feel I was discovering something."

As he grew older, though, Los Angeles-and places beyond-began to lure him away. After high school,

he decided to attend the American Conservatory Theater's Young Conservatory program in San Francisco (other famous alum include actors Nicolas Cage and Winona Ryder). "I lived with one of my sisters and felt like I was really breaking away," Ventimiglia says.

He has two older sisters, Leslie and Laurel, who served as both "my role models and my disciplinarians," he says. "I wanted to protect them and support them ... and I wouldn't want to cross them!"


He also looked up to his parents—still does. And he always had a camera in his hand-still does. Back then, he'd capture his family's adventures as they roamed on vacation through destinations such

as Hawai'i and San Diego's Wild Animal Park.

"I always wanted to document life," he says. "Of course, it was on film then, so you'd have to wait until you got home and it was processed to see what you'd captured, and then go, 'Wow!""

He's still enamored of the art of photography. "A lot of people ask me, 'What are you going to do with all your photos? A show? A book?' I just take photos because I enjoy it. I take them for smiles. "I like seeing the world," he says, noting: "Two of my favorite cities are Tokyo and Paris. They are so different, but I love both equally."

He says he's dismayed by the list of places travelers cannot go. "You know, seeing Iraq

and Afghanistan [on USO tours], I was lucky. Most people can't see those places because of the current situations and politics."

At least one aspect of traveling is easy for him: packing. He's an efficient suitcase prepper who learned from a masterhis dad. "My father traveled a lot for business when I was growing up, and I'd sit and watch him."

Does he have any tips for us? Roller or folder? "I'm a folder," he laughs. "And I plan everything I'm going to bring beforehand. If it's going to be more than five or six days, you know you're going to be doing laundry, so why bring double? Just bring enough for five days."

His suitcases always have a little breathing room, too, because as a child, he noticed his dad would always leave space in the suitcase, since he would often bring home presents for Milo and his sisters. Leaving a little room, it seems, allows for discovery and generosity. -K.D.W.


media, everyone seems to be a photographer now, and he believes something is being lost. "The attention span to an impactful photo is so short." He wants people to stop, to really partake of an image, to inspect it on a wall rather than merely scroll past it in an instant. He feels the same way about print media, noting that holding a book or magazine just feels different.

In addition to cameras, Ventimiglia has a passion for larger machines. He bought a 1967 Chevelle Super Sport to work on when he was 22. Since then, he's also become hooked on motorcycles, both as a matter of style and for their LA-traffic practicality. "I'm a function-over-fashion kind of guy," he says, "so I respect it when some-

thing helps you get around."

He cut his riding teeth on a Kawasaki KZ1000. "A cop bike," Ventimiglia explains, speaking of the iconic, lightweight motorcycle with a powerful engine. It's the same model ridden by Officers Frank "Ponch" Poncherello and Jon Baker on CHiPS, for those of you who enjoy early-'80s television. While there's a certain appeal to vintage bikes, he says, the reliability of modern bikes wins out. These days he tools around town on Harley-Davidsons.

Still on his list of adventures is learning to fly, fulfilling, in part, his earlier dream to become a naval aviator. In fact, one of the highlights of his life was when he was working on *Heroes*, and he had the opportu-



nity to visit Luke Air Force Base in Arizona, and take a ride-along flight in an F-16 fighter jet.

#### NEVER ONE TO SIT STILL FOR LONG,

Ventimiglia has a vibrant tandem career as a producer. He formed the TV and film production company Divide Pictures in 2003 with friend Russ Cundiff. He did it, he says, "to give people work. I have a lot of friends—they are so talented but not working as much as they should be. I wanted to create opportunities for them."

Divide has been behind indie films and programming that appears on streaming services such as Verizon's Go90 and Sony's Crackle. The Go90 show *Relationship Status*, for example, takes on the complexities of 20-



and 30-somethings dating in the world of social media. Crackle's *Chosen* is a thriller series, launched in 2013, about a man forced to become an unwilling assassin.


"We started the company right when digital content was making its way into the world," Ventimiglia says. "We saw digital as an opportunity. No one was in that space."

He's been around entertainment

long enough to understand the significance of the monumental shift the business is going through. "I've seen the rise of digital, and at the same time, I have an appreciation for where I've been. When I was coming up, you couldn't just grab a camera and film something and put it online and be an overnight success. There are people who hang on to one way of doing things and don't adapt to

change and are a bit stubborn. There has to be a bit of nostalgia, true, but I know the business has to evolve, and I want to be contributing."

Divide is in preproduction for two more seasons of *Relationship Status*, and typically has a number of projects in the hopper. "People bring us stuff, and then it's me and Russ kicking the tires with ideas we have and sitting down with some trusted writers and fleshing them out; that's the development side." As Divide has grown, he says, it has taken measured steps, all of which have been "a preparation for where I see the company and myself moving forward."

This spring, Ventimiglia appeared at the Tribeca Film Festival in support of the premiere of *Devil's Gate*, which features him in a dark thriller with a bit of a mystical undertone. He's again a father, but it's miles away from his role as Jack Pearson. It's the kind of film, Ventimiglia says, where, "you don't want to talk about it too much; you just want people to see it, because you don't want to give everything away."

Of course, in the department of tight-lipped, few shows have plot-lines as closely guarded as *This Is Us*, so here's the little we do know for Season 2. It's staying on Tuesdays, and there will be a Christmas special. It will still make you cry.

And whatever happens to the character of Jack Pearson, don't worry about Milo Ventimiglia.

"Hollywood was there before me, and it will last beyond me," he says.

# FAMILY FUN IN DETROIT

Enjoy new attractions in Michigan's largest city

#### By Amy Eckert

"Tell me again, Grandma," 4-year-old Madelyn says to me as we walk hand in hand into Detroit's Outdoor Adventure Center (OAC). "Are we playing outdoors inside, or are we playing inside outdoors?"

It's tough to say. Features such as a waterfall, a campsite and a climbing tree make visiting the OAC feel like an excursion into the great outdoors. But the center, which completed its first full year of operation in 2016, is a giant indoor playground, and the 35-foot-tall bur oak climbing tree is a lifelike replica. Developed by Michigan's Department of Natural Resources, the 41,000-square-foot center has given new life to a long-abandoned site that was used for endeavors ranging from building ship boilers and other ship parts in the 1890s to warehousing rail deliveries for subsequent distribution in the 1950s.

Madelyn runs past a tank full of native Michigan whitefish, perch and walleye, and calls to me to catch up.

"Look at this funny boat! Can I ride in it?" She has discovered the kayak simulator. I provide a quick lesson, showing her how to grip the handle, how to dip the paddle in a left-right-left rhythm.

Video on a big screen in front of her reinforces the feeling of paddling the Detroit River. Since the state has 11,000 inland lakes and more than 3,200 miles of shoreline, it's only natural that the OAC shine a spotlight on watersports.


When the simulator announces that her time is up, something else catches her eye: a rope bridge suspended two stories



overhead and leading to the top of the bur oak, which is known as Big Tree. "Grandma, look at *this*!"

Tales of Detroit's renaissance from urban decay that affected upkeep and maintenance of various buildings and swaths of land, and from financial issues such as declining auto manufacturing, often focus on hipster cafes and craft distilleries, designer denim shops, and boutique hotels boasting salvaged architectural pieces, and it's true that there is plenty in today's Detroit to satisfy the millennial traveler. But many of the city's new attractions also offer a great family getaway.

For instance, during our weekend together, Madelyn and I will also enjoy the Detroit RiverWalk, a beautiful downtown pathway that has enhanced the area along the Detroit River; the Michigan Science Center, part of Detroit's Cultural District, now accessible on the new QLine streetcar system; and a Detroit Tigers baseball game in The District Detroit, a new sports-and-entertainment development that is enlivening 50 downtown blocks.



### **Revitalized Riverfront**

From the OAC, it's just a half-block to the RiverWalk along the Detroit River. The 3.5-mile paved multiuse path, between Joe Louis Arena and Gabriel Richard Park, injects a breath of fresh air into the downtown riverfront. Just a few years ago, weed-infested parking lots characterized the land along the river. But since the nonprofit Detroit RiverFront Conservancy assumed stewardship of this part of the riverfront in 2003, the organization has been using public and private funding to gradually rejuvenate the riverside, with 2 more miles of RiverWalk slated to be added in the next few years.

The 31-acre William G. Milliken State Park and Harbor is one of the star attractions along the route. Madelyn and I join bicyclists and walkers, local workers and happy visitors taking a break along the RiverWalk in the park. Just west of the park, we take a spin on the Cullen Family Carousel, with its sturgeon and egret figures, and other local native species.

Within view to the northeast is Belle

Isle Park, a beloved oasis since Frederick Law Olmsted began developing a plan to improve the island in 1882. Even this longtime Detroit favorite has been rejuvenated-a result of its conversion into Michigan's 102nd state park in 2014. The state added a new kayak launch (with boat rentals and tours), tidied up aging multiuse paths, and provided fresh plantings that brightened the island's sweeping lawns and flower beds. A restoration project also rejuvenated the 1904 Belle Isle Aquarium, which was designed by famed architect Albert Kahn, but was closed for nearly a decade before reopening in 2012. It boasts one of the world's largest collections of air-breathing fish, including prehistoric-looking North American gar.

### Streetcar to Science and Culture

Just half a mile or so from Milliken State Park, locals and visitors can catch a new QLine streetcar on a key Detroit artery, Woodward Avenue. The new streetcar system, funded by a public-private partnership, opened in May. Following a 6.6mile loop, with 12 Woodward Avenue

- Detroit Zoo (detroitzoo.org): The zoo unveiled the Polk Penguin Conservation Center (above) in 2016, with 80 penguins, a 25-foot penguin-diving tank and underwater pedestrian tunnels. Other zoo highlights include a large polar bear habitat, a new wolf habitat and a year-round butterfly garden.
- Legoland Discovery Center, Michigan (legolanddiscoverycenter.com/michigan): This attraction opened in 2016 with 10 Lego build-and-play stations where kids can construct their own Lego creations. There is also a cinema, plus two Lego-oriented theme rides.
- Sea Life Michigan Aquarium (visitsealife.com/michigan): The

aquarium opened in 2015. Around 5,000 animals fill the display tanks, and kids especially like the touch tank. Save money on admission with a combo Legoland/Sea Life ticket.

- Murals in the Market (easternmarket.com): Eastern Market has been around since 1891, but the recent addition of bold, larger-than-life murals has made the art as exciting as the tables filled with fresh flowers, locally grown produce and locally produced honey. Enjoy more than 100 murals on market walls and along surrounding streets.
- Dequindre Cut (detroitriverfront. org): Train tracks were replaced with a paved multiuse path in 2009 on this once-abandoned rail line. Thanks to a half-mile extension in 2016 for a total of 2 miles, the Dequindre Cut trail is now a popular recreation/commuter route, connecting with the Detroit RiverWalk at the Outdoor Adventure Center.

stops, the QLine makes it easy to visit two theaters; six museums; the Detroit Symphony Orchestra; the Detroit Opera House; the vibrant restaurants and shops of Midtown; and Campus Martius Park,

with its summertime concerts and wintertime ice rink.

The QLine's Warren Avenue Station provides access to the Michigan Science Center, which is where Madelyn and I are headed. The center's three-story building showcases more than 250 handson exhibits, and attractions such as an IMAX dome and a planetarium. Madelyn's eyes grow large at

the sights and sounds of science: flashing lights, dinging bells and animatronic voices, with a towering rocket ship as a backdrop. She squeals as she places her hand on a plasma tube, attracting its glowing arcs toward her palm. "I have electricity on my hand!"

But it is the water exhibit, for kids 5 and under, that truly mesmerizes Madelyn. Dressed in one of the science center's waterproof aprons, she experiments with Ping-Pong balls, dropping them into a gushing stream that carries everything in its path toward a narrow whirlpool before dumping the balls onto the floor.

Other world-class museums near the QLine include the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History, the Detroit Historical Museum and the Detroit Institute of Arts.

The Museum of African American History has notable exhibitions such as one that takes visitors from prehistoric Africa to present-day Detroit. The Detroit Historical Museum explores the city's founding by the French in 1701; its automotive heyday; and Detroit's rich musical history-from Motown to Bob Seger, from Anita Baker to Eminem. And the Detroit Institute of Arts counts Diego Rivera's Detroit Industry and

#### Tigers and Lions and More

Next we make our way on the elevated Detroit People Mover to a stop within a couple blocks of the Detroit Tigers' Comerica Park, pausing for a photo with the fierce-looking 15-foot-tall tiger statue (one of nine tiger statues in the park), and head toward Big Cat Court, where the Comerica Carousel sits at the center of a collection of popcorn, ice cream and hot dog stands. Hand-painted tigers substitute for horses on this merry-go-round. "I want the white tiger!" yells Madelyn, and she heads off to snag the cat before anyone else can.

The Fly Ball Ferris Wheel is our next stop, a 50-foot wheel with cars that resemble big white baseballs. Madelyn and I delightedly climb in.

### New Sleeps, New Eats

Many new hotels have opened in Detroit over the past several years, or been remodeled, and keeping track of new restaurant openings has become a local sport. These are a few of the many options:

- Aloft (aloftdetroit.com): Located in the revitalized 1915 David Whitney Building, the sleek Aloft is near Comerica Park.
- Detroit Foundation Hotel (detroitfoundationhotel.com): The doors of the original firehouse remain, but everything else is revamped at this boutique hotel near the riverfront.
- The Westin Book Cadillac Detroit (bookcadillacwestin.com): Contemporary design melds with Italian Renaissance features in this restored 1924 hotel between the river and central downtown.

- Detroit Water Ice (detroitwaterice. com): Founded by best-selling Detroit author Mitch Albom, this ice-dessert spot serves up flavors such as Corvette Cherry, and Motown Mint & the Chips.
- The Peterboro (thepeterboro.com): Contemporary Chinese-American food and a notable cocktail menu make this a favorite in the Midtown neighborhood.
- Selden Standard (seldenstandard. com): Locally grown produce and an impressive selection of meats roasted to perfection in the heart of Midtown.
- Slows Bar BQ (slowsbarbq.com): The slow-smoked goodness of the food has been so popular, Slows' many expansions have included enlarging its original Corktown-neighborhood location in 2013 and adding a food truck in 2015. -A.E.

Afterward, when we've settled into our stadium seats, hot dogs in hand, she asks me, "What color are you cheering for?"

"We live in Michigan," I explain.

"So we root for the Tigers."

Comerica Park, and Ford Field next door, where the Detroit Lions play, are part of The District Detroit mixed-use revitalization development, a public-private venture totaling \$800 million, with office, residential, retail and entertainment spaces in the heart of the city. Fifty blocks that have included underutilized buildings and properties are being transformed into a vibrant walkable area that "unites eight world-class theaters, five neighborhoods and three professional sports venues."

The centerpiece of the district will be the new 20,000-seat Little Caesars Arena, featuring state-of-the-art technology, which is scheduled to open in September. On a future visit to downtown Detroit, Madelyn and I will be able to watch the Red Wings or the Pistons play at the arena, since both teams will call the venue home. The arena will also host other sporting events, including first- and second-round games of the 2018 NCAA Men's Basketball Championship this March, as well as concerts, family shows and special events.

As Madelyn and I look forward to a night of very sound sleep at the end of our very full weekend in the city, she slips her warm hand in mine and says, "Grandma, I love Detroit!"

#### LOVING LONDON

Big-city sights, community flavor

willows on a warm summer's afternoon, we are cooled by a ruffling breeze. Ducks bob their heads and paddle away from slow-moving canal boats, captains at the stern, steering their craft to midwater. Along the paved pedestrian walkway flanking Regent's Canal are happy children and parents, hand-holding couples lost in each other's eyes, and dreamy solo walkers taking advantage of the fine weather.

I am in Little Venice, a charming, primarily residential neighborhood near the London Paddington rail and Underground (or Tube) station, in central London. The bustling British capital city of 8.6

million hums all around us, but I barely notice. Little Venice has the intimate feel of a small village.

Coming here helps me get my arms around London by seeing it on a small scale. Indeed, Little Venice is one of my favorite destinations in London. The city has the icons everyone loves: Big Ben, the Gothic architecture of the Houses of Parliament, the Tower of London, the London Eye, Buckingham Palace, the view from The Shard and many more—and also offers richly rewarding hidden gems, including Little Venice and the neighborhoods of Shepherd Market and Seven Dials. This trio of treasures are great places to walk, centrally located and easy to reach.



#### Little Venice

My London-born wife, Georgina, and I stroll down the former towpath of the 8-mile Regent's Canal. Dozens of long, narrow wooden canal boats, covered for privacy and protection from the elements, are moored in the water. The boatspainted bright blue, green, yellow, red-provide bracing bursts of color that enliven the greenery of trees and shrubs, and the white of the nearby buildings. Many of these are 19th century whitestucco homes, built in the dignified, classical Regency style.

We are in no hurry. We just walk and look, and enjoy our surroundings. Over here is a boat at the

water's edge called the Puppet Theatre Barge that hosts regularly scheduled puppet shows and is a local favorite. Over there is the aptly named Waterside Cafe, which incorporates a canal information center with useful brochures.

At the Waterside Cafe, we order afternoon snacks. We sip tea and nibble pastries by the walkway at a small, shaded table.

Resuming our walk, we pass more canal-boat businesses. Some sell snacks, and a few also sell fresh flowers and keepsakes. Next to the canal, the 60-seat Canal Cafe Theatre hosts stand-up comedy, as well as the NewsRevue, whose satire of the week's news holds the Guinness World

Placed here and there amid such businesses we find pretty, flower-bedecked houseboats. Curtains are drawn discreetly on some. On others, owners sit on deck, enjoying the sun.

We finish our walk at Browning's Pool, formed by the joining of the Regent's and Grand Union canals. The pool and a tiny island just offshore are named for the 19th century English poet Robert Browning, who lived in the neighborhood from 1862 to 1887, after the passing of his wife, Elizabeth Barrett Browning. More recently, English entrepreneur Richard Branson and Icelandic singer Björk have lived here.

From Browning's Pool, visitors can catch a London Waterbus, which makes the scenic 2.5-mile run crosstown on Regent's Canal to the bustling shopping-and-entertainment area of Camden Lock in less than an hour. The waterbus also carries passengers to the London Zoo, where visitors can see pygmy hippos, a gorilla habitat and a "Butterfly Paradise" designed to look like a caterpillar. That adventure is for another day.

#### **Shepherd Market**

We head to Shepherd Market—not a formal

market, but a low-rise piazza, bordered by a sprinkling of posh, discreet residences and pubs, cafes and retail shops. The square was developed by Edward Shepherd in the mid-1700s. Eventually, fast-growing London enveloped its fields and lanes. Shepherd

- Tower of London: The historic castle also incorporates a museum showcasing the Crown Jewels.





#### BOOKSTORES

These venerable bookstores not only survive but thrive in the digital age:

- Foyles: Charing Cross Road just west of Seven Dials. Dating to 1906; multiple floors of specialty and rare books, best-sellers and jazz recordings (Leicester Square Tube; foyles.co.uk).
- Hatchards: London's oldest bookstore, dating from 1797. Strong history and children's sections (Piccadilly Circus Tube; waterstones.com). D.A.

Market is sandwiched between the office buildings of Curzon Street, just north, and busy Piccadilly, immediately south. Follow Piccadilly street northeast and you'll quickly find the nearby Royal Academy of Arts, which was established in the 18th century and showcases an internationally renowned roster of artists in media ranging from oil paintings to large-scale sculptures and film.

Shepherd Market, on the other hand, often goes unnoticed by visitors who don't realize it is even there, tucked away in the exclusive Mayfair district. In Victorian times, Shepherd Market was a red-light district. The area has long become law-abiding and upmarket. Fictional residents include Bertie Wooster and his butler Jeeves. Real ones include Samuel Johnson's 18th century biographer, James Boswell, and, in the 1970s, pop singer Cass Elliot of The Mamas & the Papas and rock drummer Keith Moon of The Who.

Georgina and I head over to Ye Grapes, an 1882 Victorian pub popular with locals. Inside the ornately decorated pub, bunches of grapes are carved into the dark wood paneling beneath high ceilings. Now, in late afternoon, the place is packed with well-dressed businesspeople, some of them bond traders from Curzon Street enterprises. It's a convivial crowd that spills out into the square, creating a jolly and social atmosphere. I sip a slightly chilled ale and start thinking about dinner.

We choose The Little Square, a family-run Shepherd Market favorite. Cozy and simply designed, it's a place for good, updated comfort food. Georgina orders pan-fried salmon with teriyaki sauce, while I have a wild-mushroom risotto. We enjoy crisp, fruity Prosecco by the glass and settle in. The hubbub of the metropolis feels far, though the heart of London is a 5-minute walk away.

#### Seven Dials

On our last day in town, we explore Seven Dials, ensconced in the wider Covent Garden area, just across Charing Cross Road east of the pulsing nightlife of Soho. Seven Dials is also a quick half-mile stroll from the British Museum, which houses a more-than-3.5million-piece collection, as well as impressive exhibitions, such as "Hokusai, beyond the Great Wave," through August 13. With so many popular attractions nearby, I walked by this vibrant village for years without quite noticing it. Silly me. It was hidden in plain sight all along.

Seven Dials—so called because seven streets converge here at a small traffic roundabout—is full of independent shops and the occasional pop-up clothing store; smart cafes and many other excellent food options, including pop-up restaurants; plus a first-rate chocolate shop.

A notorious slum in the 19th century, chronicled by Charles Dickens in his collection Sketches by Boz, Seven Dials, too, has been thoroughly reinvented in recent years. The tall obelisk, faced with four sundials, at the center of the roundabout is the hub of

the neighborhood. Locals and visitors love to sit on the concrete steps at the base of the Seven Dials monument to nibble, sip and socialize. That's exactly what they're doing on this bright morning.

Seven Dials' delightfully quirky retail offerings merit a day of exploration. Among

them: Neal's Yard Dairy, with its winningly delectable wheels of fine English cheeses, including British territorial cheeses made by family-run farms; The Astrology Shop, for all your zodiac needs; and Hotel Chocolatnot a hotel but a marvelous "chocolate cafe" that crafts its own chocolate. I stop at Hotel





knowing the concierge will keep packages safe until they get home. Best of all: They never have to fret about yardwork, since they no longer have a yard.


"'Carefree' is how I'd describe our condo experience," says Mary, 52. "It forces you to focus on what's essential. The rest, you let go of because it's not important. I can't imagine a better way to live."

She's not alone. At a time when the overall real estate market in the West is among the hottest in the country, the condominium market in many cities is also reaching new heights. Projects are opening at a quick pace and construction appears to be everywhere. Condos, it seems, are on the rise.

Buyers are embracing condo living for a variety of reasons, from location and amenities to the convenience it provides. Peter Orser, chairman of the advisory board at the Runstad Center for Real Estate Studies at the University of Washington in Seattle, says that at a time when buyers are expressing serious interest in moving back into cities, condos are a viable alternative to apartment rentals and single-family homes.

"The public wants more urban product; they want to be in the center of things and don't want to fight traffic anymore," says Orser, who previously served as president and CEO of the Weyerhaeuser Real Estate Company. "If we build more, condos could provide that opportunity."

Earlier this year Veros Real Estate Solutions, a company that specializes in property valuations and analytics, published a U.S. housing market forecast that described the Northwest as one of the hottest real estate markets in the nation. Specifically, the report indicated that nine of the top 10 U.S. real estate markets are in the states of Washington, Oregon and Colorado.

While apartments and single-family homes are driving the real estate market, condo sales are playing an ever larger role. Perhaps the most exciting marketplace right now is Seattle, where—at least currently—condo demand far outstrips supply. In February 2016, the Emerald City had fewer than 100 downtown condos for sale, according to the Northwest Multiple Listing Service. By the end of 2020, the city will have about 900 more condos,

according to Dean
Jones, the president
and CEO of Realogics
Sotheby's International
Realty in Seattle.

Presales for some of these units have been accelerating, with more buyers competing for a limited number of units. Nexus Condominiums, a 41-story, 378-unit building in the newly coined East Village "Condo owners are committed stakeholders willing to get involved in the success of their neighborhood."


district of downtown Seattle is a prime example. A line of buyers wrapped around the block when the building launched a presale event on a rainy

> weekend in March. In early June, the more than \$300 million Nexus project was 80 percent sold, and it's not even scheduled for completion until the middle of 2019.

Jones, whose group is marketing the Nexus development, says Seattle's demand for urban real estate of every kind is being driven largely by tech titans such as Alphabet, Amazon, Apple and Facebook taking up large amounts of office space in urban areas, and workers not wanting to commute from the suburbs.

"People are eager to be near their jobs," he explains. "The more urban development we experience by companies, the more we'll see people wanting to return to the city and simplify their lives."

Similar scenarios are unfolding in other cities. For instance, in Los Angeles, where new skyscrapers are fueling an urban renaissance, condo sales are increasing fast. Trumark Urban's 25-story TEN50 condo tower in South Park, the first in a wave of new condo buildings coming to LA, recently announced that it had reached 101 unit closings in a 99-day period. Greenland USA will complete the four-tower Metropolis complex in

2019, bringing 1,300 condos, along with 350 hotel rooms and 65,000 square feet of retail space, to LA's Financial District. Oceanwide Plaza will also open in 2019, with 504 contemporary residences, the 184-room Park-Hyatt hotel, and 166,000 square feet of retail space in three towers across the street from the LA Live entertainment complex and the

Staples Center sports arena.

According to Carol Schatz, president and CEO of the Los Angeles Downtown Center Business Improvement District, condo living in downtown LA is a sign the city's vision of building a thriving and healthy community is being taken to heart.

"For downtown LA as a neighborhood, condo owners are committed stakeholders willing to get involved in the success of their neighborhood, and helping to shape and guide the future growth of the community," Schatz says.

#### CREATURE COMFORTS

A number of factors play into the decision to purchase a condo, according to developers and real estate agents.

The main factor is simple: location, location, location. Most of the biggest and best condo projects are right in the hearts of urban centers, steps from public transportation, grocery stores, public parks and more. Bemi Jauhal, director of sales and

marketing for Bosa Development, a Vancouver, B.C.-based company that is building a number of condo projects in U.S. cities, puts it well when he says prospective condo owners simply want to "be in the middle" of all the action.

In Honolulu, for instance, the 217-unit Park Lane Ala Moana sits adjacent to the ultrapopular Ala Moana shopping center, just a stone's throw from Waikīkī Beach. Bonnie Wedemeyer, director of sales for the project, says the property is a residential resort in the heart of the city.

"Honolulu is a bustling city with an urban feel in the middle of the Pacific Ocean," Wedemeyer says. "With large private lanais, lush landscaping and resortlike grounds, Park Lane is like an oasis."

Another factor that is driving condo sales is amenities. Many of the most sought-after condominium projects have creature comforts such as expansive fitness centers, heated pools, 24/7 concierge service, shared meeting facilities and valet parking. Some properties include VIP lounges,



on-site spas, and on-property restaurants that deliver to your condo, much like room service.



coincidence. Many developers and sales agents speak of the "resortification" of condos as a differentiator in the marketplace. Some condominium developers are adopting this trend by building condos that offer amenities found in hotels. In downtown San Francisco, the 70-story 181 Fremont is a mixed-use skyscraper rising 700 feet above the city. It offers a library, two lounges, a fitness center and yoga area, room service, and concierge services.


Gregg Lynn, a real estate broker in San Francisco, notes that the more effortlessly a condo can mimic the experience of life at a resort, the more buyers with the budget will want the property. "People love the feeling of being on vacation—that feeling where everything they could possibly want is right at their fingertips and they don't have to sweat the little stuff," says Lynn, who works for Sotheby's International Realty. "Well, imagine being able to capture that feeling all the time, when you're living your life out at home."

#### SEEKING CONVENIENCE


Most condo residents say they love the lifestyle for many reasons, including convenience.


Lindsay is a prime example. The 34-year-old San Francisco resident who owns a public relations firm also has a one-bedroom unit in the Royal Insurance Building, a circa-1907 property that was renovated in 2006 and converted to luxury condos. The building sits in the heart of the Financial District, and Lindsay can walk to almost all of her meetings, never has a hard time hailing a cab, and has access to a huge variety of restaurants, convenient stores and shops—all within a five-block radius.

She adds that in a city with in-

credibly steep hills, the building offers another perk: It's located in the relatively flat downtown area.

Lindsey. "I can wear whatever shoes

trek up a hill back home, and that
was a first for me in the 11 years I've
lived in San Francisco."

Other condo dwellers cite different bonuses. Mary, the consultant from Portland, says that by rarely using their car, she and her partner save on gas. It also arguably prolongs the life of the vehicle. She adds that she gets a box of fresh produce delivered from a local farm every week, and loves knowing that because her building, the 15-story Elizabeth Lofts, has concierge services, she doesn't have to be at home to receive the weekly delivery.

Even in Las Vegas, with its ample amenities to serve a flourishing tourist economy, convenience is emerging as king. The Ogden, a condo tower right in the heart of downtown Las Vegas' Entertainment District, celebrated the announcement of the NFL's Oakland Raiders moving to the city with a website headline that proclaimed the building was 10 minutes from the new stadium. The building is one block from Fremont Street East, one of the







downtown area's main tourist corridors, and also a stone's throw from Cashman Field, the minor-league ballpark, and mere steps from public transportation. It's also a few blocks from Zappos, the neighborhood's largest employer.

"Why complicate your life when you don't have to?" says John Tippens, the CEO of North Cap, the property-management company, which is a partner in The Ogden and responsible for marketing the project. "If you know you're going to spend most of your time in a particular part of the city, and buying into a building can make that experience easier, it seems like [buying a condo is] an easy decision to make."

#### WHAT'S NEXT

Experts say condos will continue to evolve-both in how they're designed and the amenities they offer.

On the design front, interest in eco-friendly architecture and building materials is expected to continue to grow in popularity.

According to Scott Lee, president of SB Architects, with offices in San Francisco, Miami and Shenzhen, China, an increasingly popular trend is integrating hotels and condominium projects. Hotel projects want the spaces to feel more personalized, while residential projects desire the amenities found at hotels.

"Branded residences provide crossover opportunities. Residents have access to resort amenities while the hotel itself serves as a sales center," says Lee, whose firm is working on several such properties in Cabo San Lucas, Mexico, and Puerto Rico. "It is a scenario where everyone wins: Buyers enjoy the benefit of knowing exactly what they are getting in terms of luxury and service, continued on page 132

#### **Major Puget Sound Developments**

**Mixed-use projects** in Renton and Bellevue are examples of the latest trends in combining hotels, apartments, office towers and retail space in new developments.

The South King County city of Renton is developing into a new getaway location, thanks to the \$1 billion Southport on Lake Washington development being built there.

Once completed, the 17.1-acre project will be a mixed-use village near Gene Coulon State Park and the Boeing Renton factory. It is anchored by the Hyatt Regency Lake Washington at Seattle's Southport, which is set to open July 10. The development also includes residential apartments, completed in 2008, and a three-building waterfront corporate campus, scheduled for completion in 2019.

The 347-room Hyatt Regency Lake Washington is a four-star hotel located within 8 miles of Seattle-Tacoma International Airport. It will offer waterfront dining, a VIP club lounge, a fitness center and treatment spa, as well as a total of more than 60,000 square feet of meeting space.

with the arrival of Southport," says Kip Spencer, the director of leasing and marketing at Seco Development, the company building the project.

Seattle-based Seco specializes in highend mixed-use projects that create hubs of urban living, working and entertainment. The company describes the Southport site as offering a great location and easy access to Seattle-Tacoma International Airport, Renton Municipal Airport, Interstate 5 and Interstate 405.

The final phase of the project is the waterfront corporate campus, which will include three nine-story buildings containing a total of about 730,000 square feet of Class "A" office space. There will also be more than 10,000 square feet of retail space at the campus. Two of the buildings are scheduled for completion in 2018, with the final building opening in 2019.



In the heart of downtown Bellevue, Kemper Development Company is continuing to

grow its impressive holdings with the Lincoln Square Expansion, a 1.5 million-square-foot development that adds a hotel and residential tower, an office tower and retail space to the bustling business and retail area.

The \$1 billion expansion will be located just to the south of the company's Lincoln Square development and across the street

from Kemper's retail destination Bellevue Square.

The centerpiece of the expansion is the 41-story Two Lincoln Tower, which includes the W Bellevue hotel on its first 14 floors. The hotel opened last month.



Atop the hotel are another 27 floors with 231 luxury apartments, which are scheduled to be ready for occupancy this fall. The building is one of the tallest in Bellevue, standing about 450 feet, and the apartments will have commanding views from the Olympic Mountains to the west to the Cascade Range to the east.

Two Lincoln Tower boasts such amenities as the rooftop Sky Terrace community space, and the W Bellevue hotel will have a library, complete with board games and books. You can also enjoy a book or a cocktail next to one of the hotel's fireplaces. There is even an outdoor terrace with porch swings.

Also part of the expansion is the 400 Lincoln Square building. The 31-story office tower stands just to the south of the new residential tower and features 710,000 square feet of Class "A" office space. About 180,000 square feet of retail, restaurant and entertainment space will be located throughout the expansion site, including the first few floors of the residential tower and the office tower.

Already open are various restaurants, retail shops and the state's first SoulCycle Studio, a popular bike-workout facility. More businesses and restaurants are scheduled to open in the coming months.

from page 128 and developers and operators enjoy the ability to sell condos at a higher price point because of an association with an established brand."

Amenities are also expected to become more specialized and sophisticated, including everything from apps allowing residents to order meals to services for the pets of homeowners.

Developer Hoyt Street Properties in Portland, Oregon, for instance, will add on-site dog-washing facilities to Vista North Pearl, a 21-story building set to open in October 2018.

Other amenities will include an expansive garden area on the building's fifth floor, with an outdoor fire table and seating overlooking Portland's Fields Park. There will also be an exercise room, and two guest suites for visitors.

At Pacific Gate, a 215-unit Bosa development in San Diego that is nearing completion, the amenities include access to a private fleet of cars and the use of the Pacific Dream, a 45-foot luxury boat.

San Diego has a limited supply of condos right now, but that may soon change. Brad Richter, vice president of planning for Civic San Diego, the city's downtown-development arm, says that some of the 5,000 apartments under construction are being built as "condo-quality," with the idea that they could be converted to condominiums after 10 years.

"When you consider employment, entertainment and transportation, downtown is just the place to be," Richter says. "That reality isn't going to change, and for those reasons, people will want to set down roots here however they can." ⊀

#### I'M BARELY BEYOND THE CORE OF DOWNTOWN

Anchorage, and all I can hear is the cheerful chatter of birds flitting about in birch trees. Well, that and the equally enjoyable conversation between my 12-year-old son and his friends as they walk the trail at Campbell Creek Estuary Natural Area. The boys are discussing our previous visit a few months earlier, when a bull moose decided to lie down in the middle of the park's grassy loop trail, attracting a number of people, at a safe distance, to pull out cameras.





This time, only a light wind is present, bending the tops of sedges and ruffling our hair as it wafts east toward the Chugach Mountains. To the west and south, Cook Inlet plays host to flocks of ducks, Arctic terns, and lanky sandhill cranes whose gangly legs and awkward squawks amuse the kids.

We raise binoculars to our eyes and focus on the swoops and dips of the terns and the careful waddle of a few ducks as they patter about in the mud. Farther overhead, airplanes of all

kinds approach the inlet on their way to Lake Hood Seaplane Base or Ted Stevens Anchorage International Airport. Far to the west, the volcanic peaks of the Alaska Range provide a craggy backdrop to my wild Alaska home.

Our family moved here in 2005 with a toddler, a tween and a shipping container of household goods and recreational gear. Over 12 years, we've leaned in to a rugged place of 586,000 square miles of land that's home to only about 740,000 people, where my kids have grown up



city could be any other urban downtown. But step off Anchorage's sidewalks and into the wealth of nearby natural wonders, and you'll find that "real" Alaska has been here all along. For families, this means the convenience of city resources with the allure of wilderness, and the two often meet quite comfortably.

On a sunny day, many local families can be found pedaling along the 11-mile Tony Knowles Coastal Trail, a shoreline pathway, curving next to Cook Inlet, where myriad species of wildlife, including moose, can be spotted munching grasses and willow branches. Along the trail, the Anchorage Parks and Recreation Department manages many green spaces, strategically placed to encourage kids and parents to spend a bit of playtime before heading toward the trail's terminus at Kincaid Park.

Culturally, Anchorage is quite diverse, thanks in part to indigenous peoples who have lived in Alaska for centuries. The center's sweeping outdoor space surrounding Lake Tiulana creates the backdrop for traditional village sites in which the whole family can discover

the intricacies and traditions of Alaska Native cultures such as the Athabascan and Tlingit.

A quick shuttle trip from the heritage center provides direct access to the Anchorage Muse-

> um, which is undergoing a major expansion to further its commitment to the North region and the people who inhabit its unique environments. Kids will be wowed by the museum's Discovery Center, a 9,000-square-foot facility for natural and earth sciences that includes Tote KidSpace, which features an immersive and smart play area designed for the little ones to crawl through and run across. Passengers bunk in comfortable staterooms or camp in tents on the ferries' upper decks, and either picnic or eat meals in onboard cafeterias. For more information, visit ferryalaska.com. —E.K.

docks that welcome cruise ships and onto the quaint streets of town, where 19th century homes still stand from when this place was busy with the rush for gold.

Travel Juneau, the local visitors bureau, provides an excellent walking map that stretches across downtown and winds through local parks in this capital city snugged between the towering Boundary Range and the narrow Gastineau Channel.

Kids will soon be able to revel in the chance to dress up in authentic period costumes while piloting a replica wooden schooner at the recently renovated Alaska State Museum. The state's storied past is colorfully displayed here in a visual timeline.


For dramatic views of Southeast Alaska's most populated city, ride the Goldbelt Mount Roberts Tramway, located near the cruise ship terminal. The tram provides an eagle-eye perspective and access to kid-friendly walks. Take

the interpretive stroll that tells an ancient story of the Southeast Alaska Natives, and take photos of Juneau's historic district below.

The briny waterways of the Inside Passage provide the perfect lunch spread for humpback whales that, between May and September, feed on the area's nutrient-rich krill and herring. Allen Marine Tours is a local favorite for whale watching, with custom-built catamarans that have stable platforms from which families can see these large mammals up close. #### FAIRBANKS

FAIRBANKS BUSTLES DURING THE SUMMER AS residents and visitors take advantage of the long days and a wealth of outdoor activities. In fact, it's not at all unusual to see families walking neighborhood trails or playing at a park well after the conventional concept of bedtime. It's unique, for sure, and just one



of the many reasons we love to visit.

Known as the Golden Heart City, Fairbanks was settled during an early-1900s gold rush that brought many would-be miners from the Lower 48 to the rivers and streams crisscrossing the area. The wide, wandering Chena River runs through the heart of town, and is a great starting point for any visit. Along the river is the Morris Thompson Cultural and Visitors Center, which is a one-stop shop for culture, history and information, since the local visitors bureau, Explore Fairbanks, is also housed here.

Cruising aboard Riverboat Discovery's Discovery III provides a sense of living history. It's an authentic sternwheeler riverboat from the gold rush days, when people traveled in style along the remote rivers. From the deck, we can admire log cabins, and the boat even stops to visit sled dogs at Trail Breaker Kennel, run by David Monson, husband of the late four-time Iditarod champion Susan Butcher.

Another great stop for history is the 44-acre Pioneer Park, with museums, shopping and dining that help bring Alaska's past to life.


One of my family's favorite Fairbanks activities is spending a few hours with Santa's best workers. Not the elves, but his four-footed transportation. The Running Reindeer Ranch, located a short drive from Fairbanks in the scenic Goldstream Valley, is home to a small herd of reindeer and

their handler, Jane Atkinson. Make a required reservation to immerse yourself in the lives of these docile animals as you walk with them through the timbered trails of Alaska's interior.

#### DENALI NATIONAL PARK & PRESERVE

ABOUT 125 MILES SOUTH OF FAIR-BANKS sits Denali, a 20,310-foot peak rising from the Alaska Range. It's the crown jewel of Denali National Park & Preserve, where visitors can marvel at the tallest mountain in North America and also admire the Alaskan landscape.

One of our son's favorite stops is the Denali Visitor Center, located near the park's entrance. Here, we find life-size models of wildlife, such as moose and grizzlies, and a video that explains the ecology and history of the area. We also collect maps and pamphlets detailing the park's biking, hiking and photo opportunities.

Located 1.5 miles from the visitor center is the park's sled-dog kennel. Rangers show off the skill of man's best friend, and visitors are invited into the kennel area, where they can pet three of more than 30 dogs.

Families should consider utilizing the park shuttle service for a ride into the park's interior, since no personal vehicles are allowed beyond mile 14.8 near Savage River. Park shuttle reservations can be made as early as December 1 the year prior to your visit, and different options are available. Depending on weather, wildlife or personal whim, hop off and on at various points to hike or photograph views your kids won't soon forget. Family fun at a premier Emerald City gathering place

>> My 4-year-old son eagerly boards the Seattle Center Monorail. "Want to sit up front?" I ask, knowing those are the best seats. Through the large curved windows of the monorail, which was created for the 1962 Seattle World's Fair, we look out at all kinds of interesting buildings that we're whizzing past on the 1-mile ride from Westlake Center to Seattle Center.

"Look at all the colors!" my son says as the wavy, iridescent walls of our destination, the Museum of Pop Culture (Mo-POP) come into view. For us, the structure, designed by Frank Gehry, evokes the sound waves of an electric guitar.

"Daddy, look!" As we enter MoPOP, I lift my son up to meet a man on stilts, a costumed performer welcoming us to one of the museum's special events. Live


hip-hop music is playing, which my son sways to.

Next we run into R2-D2. My son hollers, "May the Force be with you!" before we head to a soundproof band room to jam on an electric guitar.

I first came to Seattle in 1994 as a young theater student attending Cornish

College of the Arts. With summers off, my classmates and I scraped our money together to attend the glorious Bumbershoot event, the city's annual Labor Dayweekend music-and-arts festival. Thanks to Bumbershoot, I was able to check several artists off my music bucket list over the years: Tony Bennett, Elvis Costello, Hall & Oates and Mos Def.

Fast forward to 2017. Much has





changed. I still make it to Bumbershoot each year, but now I have a preschooler on my shoulders, and this year, my wife will have our new baby girl in her arms. Since becoming a father, I see Seattle Center as a

place integrated into both my work and family life. As a professional actor, I rehearse and perform here. As a father, I see it as the best place to put phones away (except for the occasional selfie) and experience 74 acres of play spaces, visual and performing arts, and festivals.

During the summer, Seattle Center offers locals and visitors plenty of space for picnics and people-watching, with kids escaping the heat in the water-spraying International Fountain. And for my 4-year-old, the Artists at Play playground is all about climbing the huge jungle gym.

My son saw his first theater production on the Seattle Center campus, when Seattle Children's Theatre staged *The Garden of Rikki Tikki Tavi*, in which I played a lovable little muskrat named Chuchu.

The Seattle Center Armory building hosts many festivals that celebrate cultural diversity, with crafts, dancing and musical performances representing many nationalities. My son and I like to listen to the Taiko drumming during the spring Cherry Blossom & Japanese Cultural Festival, and this summer, events range from the Polish Festival to BrasilFest.

The Seattle Children's Museum provides my little ball of energy with play

areas in which to build forts, and make arts and crafts with other kids. The Pacific Science Center is our place for physics, IMAX movies and special exhibitions such as this year's "Terracotta Warriors of the First Emperor."

Seattle Center is also the home of The Vera Project, which offers classes for teens and others, such as how to screenprint T-shirts and posters, and how to run sound for bands, including those that perform on The Vera Project's music stage.

When my son is old enough, he and I will surely make art together at Vera. And maybe when my daughter gets a little older, she'll join her big brother in a

Seattle Children's Theatre summer acting class for which I'm the teaching artist, or she and her brother will splash in the International Fountain while my wife and I delight in the fun our kids are having. Whatever our children decide to do, Seattle Center gives us plenty of opportunities to create and play together as a family. \*

>> You will likely hear the Artists at Play playground at Seattle Center before you see it. Excited shouts combine with sounds such as marimbalike chiming and metallic clanging.

This is no ordinary kiddie park. There is a 35-foot-tall climbing tower, as well as giant silver slides to zoom down, an enclosed rope bridge to cross, and all kinds of interactive sound-and-motion elements. These include a Sound Fence of huge chimes to play by tapping billiard balls suspended on cables; pebbles to drop against resonant metallic grates;

and a letter tree with giant letters that correspond to musical notes. There is also equipment designed for children of varying physical abilities, such as accessible swings and the hand-powered, roll-on ADA-compliant carousel that can accommodate wheelchairs.

If this whimsical play space looks like kids dreamed it up, that's because they did-in part. The design team and Seattle Center staff held interactive workshops and school visits across Seattle to engage children in the

One of the kid-contributed features sums up the experience of the space. Within one of the white wavy Story Lines painted onto the pavement is a poem by "Felix, age 6": "The

> sound of children playing moves through the air loudly and cheerfully. It sounds like fun, and I want to join them! / Their sounds look like shiny explosions of ruby and emerald laughter."

#### **CHILDREN'S MUSEUMS**

Here are a few of the options in the Puget Sound area.

#### Children's Museum of Tacoma

(playtacoma.org): Serves kids 8 and younger "and their adults," with five main areas: Woods, Water, Voyager, Invention and Becka's Studio. The studio rotates its activities, with "Lines in the Studio," July 12–Sept. 3, featuring media such as string and paint to experiment with the movement, shape, texture and form of lines. "Magnetic Discovery" is in Studio B during that same period.



#### KidsQuest Children's Museum,

Bellevue, shown above (kidsquestmuseum.org): Moved into an expansive new space in January and is geared to children ages 0 to 10 and their families, with nine interactive exhibits. For instance, the two-story Atrium Climber has different pathways for different ages, while the outdoor Sticks + Stones includes water play, gardening, music-making and rock-painting.

■ Seattle Children's Museum, at Seattle Center (thechildrensmuseum. org): Focuses on activities for kids 10 months to 10 years, and their families, with nearly a dozen exhibits for handson play, including Cog City, Global Village and Eye Clinic. The upgraded Bijou Theatre has a new backstage dressing room with vanities, and the stage has theatrical lighting and sound effects that enhance kids' drama experiences.

## SEA THINGS AT THE AQUARIUM

The 120,000-gallon tank exhibit facing the front hall of the Seattle Aquarium has a viewing window that's 20 feet tall and 40 feet wide, with acrylic more than a foot thick. This dramatic attraction, called "Window on Washington Waters," resembles a film screen, and the fish inside are always in motion.

Then comes a Diver Show. The lights in the tank snap off. Loudspeakers play the David Bowie–Queen song *Under Pressure*. And when the lights come back up, there is suddenly a drysuited diver doing dance moves. He high-fives and fist-bumps kids on the viewing side of the panel. A presenter introduces "Diver Dave," who says hello through a microphone in his mask and discusses the sea life around him, such as salmon, rockfish and wolf eels.

The thrice-daily Diver Show is one of the most popular programs at the Seattle Aquarium, which is celebrating its 40th anniversary this year, and which showcases more than 5,000 animals representing about 200 species, from seabirds to seals to otters. Located on the Seattle Waterfront, it provides opportunities such as watching the daily feedings of marine mammals, exploring the hands-on Tide Pool, and entering the Underwater Dome for a great

view of sharks, sturgeon, skates and more.

Special summer activities include the Beach Naturalist Program, in which visitors to beaches around the Seattle area explore weekend low tides and learn about marine plants and animals from aquariumtrained naturalists.

While the programs and exhibits have evolved over the years, the aquarium's goal of inspiring protection of marine environments through discovery and exploration of the underwater world has remained consistent since its opening in 1977, says communications specialist Laura Austin, who has been with the aquarium for 39 years.




## **Go то:** Hurricane Ridge

## 40 YEARS OF TRUE BLUE

>>> Bottom of the 11th, decisive game of the 1995 American League Division Series, and the Seattle Mariners were down by a run.

Then Edgar Martinez lined an 0-1 pitch to left field; Joey Cora scored from third; and Ken Griffey Jr. raced from first toward home. Fans across the Northwest heard play-by-play announcer Dave Niehaus' call: "I don't believe it. It just continues. My, oh my!" The Mariners

were going to play for the American League Pennant.

In 2017, the Mariners are marking 40 years of "my, oh my" moments, and Alaska Airlines is the presenting sponsor of the Mariners' 40th-anniversary celebration taking place throughout the season. The festivities include special events for young fans, such as Salute to Kids Days on July 9 (Mariners T-shirts for kids 14 and under) and Sept. 3 (Mariners backpacks for kids 14 and under). In

addition, kids can run the bases after those games, and on July 23 and 30, Aug. 13, and Sept. 3 and 10. Other events include a weekend honoring Edgar Martinez, Aug. 11–13, when the Mariners will retire his No. 11 jersey.

From "grand salami" to "boomstick, baby," from The Big Unit (Randy Johnson) to The Big Maple (James Paxton), from the Kingdome to Safeco Field, from hot dogs to fried grasshoppers—those true to the blue have memories to cover all bases.

There was Randy Johnson's franchise-first no-hitter on June 2, 1990, and then "King" Felix Hernandez's franchise-first perfect game on Aug. 15, 2012—it was just the 23rd ever thrown in the majors. There was the Sept. 14, 1990, game, when Griffey Jr., who was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 2016, and his father became the

first and only father-son tandem to hit back-to-back home runs. Then there was Oct. 1, 2004, when Ichiro Suzuki broke the 84-year-old record for most hits in a single season—he finished the year with 262 base knocks.

Teamwide, the best year in Mariners history was 2001, when Seattle won 116 games. That also happened to tie an MLB record.

Today's Mariners roster is led by a core of solid batters, including second baseman Robinson Canó. And their hitting coach? That'd be Edgar Martinez, the same man responsible for the most important double in franchise history. That is, the most important double to date. It's only July, and there's still half a season to go. It's anyone's guess whose clutch hit we'll be celebrating 40 years from now. For more information, visit mariners.com/40. ⊀





## TOTAL ECLIPSE OF THE SUN

Anticipation of the big event this August is spreading across Oregon

total solar eclipse day in America. On that Monday, the moon will pass between the sun and Earth, completely blocking the sun from sight and casting a shadow around 70 miles wide. It will cross the contiguous United States from west to east and reach just the western tip of Europe and Africa before the sun sets.

The total eclipse shadow, or umbra, which is expected to last about 2 minutes in any one spot, will reach land between Lincoln City and Newport on the Oregon coast, and move in a slight southeastern arc across the country and out to sea near Charleston, South Carolina. It will cross


14 states, treating millions to the extraordinary sight of the solar corona around the blocked-out sun, which they will see while wearing protective glasses, of course. Never look directly at the sun or at an eclipse of the sun without wearing the proper protective glasses.


At Lincoln City, along Oregon's path of totality, the moon will begin to block the sun at about 9 a.m.; the 2-minute total solar eclipse will begin at 10:16 a.m.

During that time, temperatures are expected to drop 10 to 15 degrees, and Jupiter, Mars, Mercury and Venus will be in view. The eclipse will end when the moon is completely past the sun at 11:40 a.m.

#### **PORTLAND**

All of North America, and down to northern South America, will experience at least a partial eclipse. Although, experts say to understand the power of an eclipse, you really have to be in the path of totality. The farther away from the path you are, the less you will notice.

Even a few miles can make a big difference. In Portland, about 30 miles north of the path of the total eclipse, 99 percent of the sun's surface will be covered for less than a minute. Farther north, Seattle's residents will experience an even briefer partial eclipse, with the moon shielding only 92 percent of the sun.

Eclipses are rare occurrences, with the last total solar eclipse crossing Oregon in 1979. However, this celestial phenomenon is extra special. The last time a total solar eclipse crossed the country from coast to coast was in 1918. The next similar eclipse will be on August 12, 2045.

## ENJOYING THE SUN-FILLED PATIO SEASON

### >> Now that summer days have arrived,

Portland's vaunted restaurant scene expands outdoors as patio seating becomes all the rage. Here are a few of the best spots for enjoying the city's nationally recognized food scene while basking in the summer sun.

Located atop The Nines Hotel in the heart of the city, the sophisticated rooftop Departure Restaurant + Lounge has set the standard for quality Portland patio dining since its 2009 opening. The restaurant has two patios: the east-side area with great views of the Willamette River and the west-side patio, which looks out over the city.

To experience the breadth of the pan-Asian flavors, try the chef's tasting menu. From a crisp carrot-and-avocado salad to tender yellowtail sashimi, to black pepper chicken in a chile-tamarind-lime sauce, the food is artful and startlingly fresh—partly the result of a garden and apiary also located on the rooftop.

In southeast Portland, the Mexican restaurant Xico offers a shady oasis, decorated with Mexican orange trees, sangria flowers and bamboo. Xico emphasizes locally sourced and regional ingredients, such as salad tacos—ripe greens and goat cheese cradled by a tortilla made of amaranth, nettles and masa.

The ultimate in seasonality, TD's PopUP by Three Degrees, serving tacos and tequila, appears at the waterfront Kimpton RiverPlace Hotel, from May to October. The movable feast is located near a marina, along the Willamette River. The simple setup includes a




bar, 10 stools and chef Lauro Romero cooking over a wood fire with fresh ingredients.

The Altabira City Tavern, which is located on the sixth floor of the Hotel Eastlund, has sweeping views of downtown Portland.

For an amazing place outside the city, try McMenamins' Edgefield destination resort in Troutdale, which has outdoor patio space as well as a winery, distillery and brewpub at the 74-acre facility.





from page 159 which some look upon with deep reverence and great significance. Of course, that's nothing new. When solar eclipses darkened skies in ancient times, people feared that the world was ending. Some ancient Chinese believed a dragon was eating the sun and that the solution was to create a racket to scare the dragon away. Now, many of us travel long distances to view such a rare spectacle.



Meteorologists predict that conditions for the eclipse will be at their best in the West. The least cloud cover is predicted to be in northern Oregon (east of the Coast Range), in southern Idaho (along the Snake River Plain), and in central Wyoming (near Casper and points east).

Communities along the path in Oregon are expecting to welcome about 1 million eclipse visitors from around the world. Most area hotels and motels are full and the rates for rooms have soared in recent months. Camping sites at state parks are full, but more are being made available.

I confess I had pretty much decided to ignore all the excitement.

Until an acquaintance invited me to an eclipse-viewing party, I was planning to treat that Monday in August just like any other day. I would sit in the gradual morning darkness; maybe settle in for a nap like the birds in the trees. As the light returned, I

would start to get on with my day.

However, then I started thinking about my future grandchildren. Someday one of them is bound to ask, "Grandma, what did you do during the 2017 solar eclipse?" Think how low I would sink in their esteem if I answered: "Napped."

So, I've been reading up on the eclipse and now the last thing I want to do is sleep through the big event. Experiencing the eerie daytime darkness will be a once-in-a-lifetime thrill, unless I decide to join the ranks of people who travel the globe to observe stars in the middle of the day and birds tricked by darkness into curling up for a snooze.

My viewing party will be on a ranch in rural John Day, Oregon, located about 150 miles northeast of Bend. The ranch is close to the midpoint of the path of totality. That means when it grows dark, it will be really dark. Driving for five hours to attend a solar-eclipse viewing party may sound extreme, but did I mention the pie? The party I'm attending will feature a pie social.

There will be eclipse-viewing parties of all sorts across the state, at fairgrounds, wineries and state parks. Oregon State University in Corvallis, which is in the path of totality, is hosting the "Space Grant Festival: A Total Eclipse Experience," August 19-21, in which those attending can rent dorm rooms, learn about the phenomenon, attend a concert and receive free solar eclipse glasses. There will even be a viewing party on the steps of the state capitol, in Salem.

Come August 21, I'll be in a field somewhere in Eastern Oregon, wearing special viewing glasses, eating pie and watching a total eclipse of the sun. My grandkids are going to love this story! X

## **CALIFORNIA** FOR ALL AGES

>> The telltale sign of a good day of tidepooling is a sore neck.


I share this piece of wisdom with my three daughters every year before our annual trip to the Fitzgerald Marine Reserve in Moss Beach, California, a bit more than 20 miles south of San Francisco. Our necks get sore because we spend the whole day looking down, combing the rock outcrop exposed in summer by some of the lowest low tides of the year.

As we clomp around in Wellington boots, we peer into sea-filled furrows in the stone. They are teeming with life. We spy tiny hermit crabs skulking across seaweed, tentacles of neon-colored sea anemones swaying back and forth, and sea stars the size of my hands gripping the seashore tightly. Sometimes we spot harbor seals, their doglike heads bobbing on the surface of the water as they watch our every move.

What I love about tide-pooling is the way it combines science and scavenger hunt. It's my favorite way to spend a summer day in California with my family. Yet it's just one of a multitude of family-friendly activities, sites and destinations to seek out when school's out in the Golden State.

Take museums. My home city, San Francisco, has dozens of great ones, from the science-centric Exploratorium and California Academy of Sciences to the family-focused





Children's Creativity Museum and The Walt Disney Family Museum. My personal familyfriendly favorite in San Francisco is the Cable Car Museum, where you can watch engineers working on cable-car machinery and marvel at the giant winding wheels and engines that keep cables moving underneath city streets.

> California's animal parks are also amazing. In SoCal, the San Diego Zoo and San Diego Zoo Safari Park (both of which count Alaska Airlines as a sponsor) are collectively home to more than 6,500 animals, including the zoo's southern white rhinoceros that was born earlier this year. The zoo is next to the city's museum-rich Balboa Park; the safari park is northeast of the city, near Escondido.

My family and I have enjoyed many beaches in California, but our top pick is Venice Beach. This hot spot near Los Angeles has a graceful stretch of sand and a pedestrian path that attracts some of the fittest and quirkiest humans on the planet. When we go, my girls love to watch people and shop for art nearby.

Then there are the parklands. About four hours north of San Francisco, Humboldt Redwoods State Park has some extremely old, tall trees (more than 1,000 years old; more than 350 feet tall). They make a great backdrop to a camping trip. The park, like many other California wonders, gives kids chances to learn in ways that don't feel like learning at all.

And, much like the tide pools, the redwoods lead to sore necks—this time, from all that looking up. \*

## TAKING THE **GOLDEN STATE** BY BOARD

>> The monster waves of Mavericks, in Northern California, are a far cry from the sweet surf of SoCal, but surfers embrace both the big-wave winter break in Half Moon Bay and the perpetual summer of the south. And people who like boards more broadly have plenty to enjoy throughout the state.

"There are few places in the world where you can fit in quality surfing, snowboarding and skateboarding all in a day," says Jeff Clark, the pioneering Mavericks surfer, who shapes boards for other big-wave surfers and is featured in classic surf films, such as Riding Giants. "We live here because we can do it all."

California takes its surf culture seriously, and surfing's influence on skateboarding and snowboarding is evident in the similarities in motion, attitude and fashion among the three lifestyle sports. The way the sports have evolved, independently and together, means that modern-day board riders aren't generally one-dimensional in their skills. And with California's varied geography—from coasts to urban centers to mountains-board enthusiasts have the ability to bounce quickly among locations and means of conveyance.

"In California, you have big cities, and tiny beach and mountain towns that seem to breed and attract the types of people who embrace that passion-driven laid-back

culture," says Shaun White, two-time Olympic gold medalist and winner of 24 Winter and Summer X Games medals in snowboarding and skateboarding. "In Venice and in San Francisco, you see guys who work at tech startups skateboarding to work. That's kind of uncommon in other places."

The evolution of the three sports has already pushed boundaries—and Californians are at the center of this. "In my life and career of surfing small waves to the biggest waves on the planet, I've come to embrace the idea that anything is possible," says Clark. "The next challenge is for new innovations or moves to raise the bar for performance."

"With skateboarding and surfing in the next Summer Olympics, the sports are at an interesting transition," White points out. "I think, ultimately, that being on the world stage is going to grow the sports and welcome more people into them. That's what happened with snowboarding. Snowboarding was still such a young sport when it came into the Olympics. We saw a huge boom, and the



sport transitioned from something only a small set did to a major American pastime."

Whatever happens with these sports, California continues to provide venues to explore them and the proving grounds for new development—from waves to slopes to skate parks statewide. \*

## Aloha on the Ming WATCHING FOR BIRDS IN THE HAWAIIAN ISLANDS BY SHANNON WIANECKI "I can't believe it. That was so special." My 7-year-old friend Esta repeated this to herself as we zigzagged down the road on the side of Haleakalā, Maui's 10,023-foottall volcano. We'd just left Hosmer Grove, a forested area where she'd had a close encounter with an 'i'iwi-one of the rarest birds in the world. This bright-red birdalso called a scarlet honeycreeper—had flown a few feet above our heads to land on a nearby māmane tree and bury its long, curved beak in the tree's yellow blossoms. Esta was dazzled. Even if you didn't know anything about Hawaiʻi's unique avifauna, the pure beauty of the Islands' birds would still bowl you over. And understanding a little about their biology makes witnessing them in the wild even more thrilling. For example, Hawaiian honeycreepers are one of the planet's most spectacular examples of evolution. Several million years ago, a flock of Eurasian rosefinches got lost in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. Against all odds, they landed on a freshly

minted volcanic island: Kaua'i. Over the ensuing millennia, the rest of the Hawaiian archipelago emerged from the sea. The birds colonized each island in turn, and with every successive generation, their beaks, colors and behaviors morphed to fit new environmental niches. The descendants of that original flock evolved into the 55 novel species that are now known as Hawaiian honeycreepers. Some, such as the 'i'iwi, dip sickle-shaped bills into deep-throated flowers. Others, such as the kiwikiu (Maui parrotbill), sport parrotlike beaks and feed on grubs and insects.

In addition to its jewellike forest birds, Hawai'i claims an assortment of native seabirds, shorebirds, geese and owls. The winged residents of the archipelago are, as Esta observed, special. Many are endemic, meaning that they evolved here and exist nowhere else on Earth. Some inhabit a single island.

It's true that Hawaiian birds are not nearly as abundant as they once were. When humans arrived in the Islands, they brought varied threats with them: mosquitoes that carry avian malaria and pox, mongooses that eat eggs and nestlings, and cats (some of which became feral). Forest habitat continues to dwindle, replaced by aggressive exotic

plant species. Yet conservationists across the Aloha State work hard to preserve and nurture what is left-and they celebrate significant successes. The nēnē (Hawaiian goose) once teetered at the edge of extinction, with fewer than 40 survivors. Thanks to captivebreeding efforts, the beloved state bird is now commonplace on several islands. Also, despite their rarity, many of Hawai'i's native living treasures are quite easy to see.

A little effort pays off big here. Even beginning bird-watchers can experience the magic of Hawai'i's winged aloha—on each of the four largest isles.

## MAUI

I live on Maui and never miss a chance to introduce friends to my favorite birding spots. From the moment Esta and I stepped out of the car at Hosmer Grove, we heard native birdsong: the distinctive metallic twang of 'i'iwi and the musical trills of 'amakihi. The latter, a pistachio-green honeycreeper, hops amiably up to campers as they unzip their tents (though, as is generally advisable, they avoid feeding the wild birds). Hosmer Grove-a thick, shady glade-is just

inside the entrance to Haleakalā National Park. From the grove's campground, a halfmile loop trail winds through exotic pine and eucalyptus trees, with a place to pause at a steep gulch filled with native Hawaiian trees and ferns. This is the perfect vantage point for bird-watching. We saw honeycreepers zipping across the forest canopy, sipping nectar from bright-red 'ōhi'a lehua blossoms and snatching insects midair. A half-dozen native bird species frequent this forest. Once, on a guided hike with a park ranger, I spotted an 'ākohekohe—a large, speckled honeycreeper with punk-rock tufts of feathers on its head, found only on Maui.

Farther up toward the summit of the volcano, Hawaiian short-eared owls (or pueo) hunt by day, and nēnē honk at perceived trespassers. The mountain is truly magical after dark during the summer months, when stars blaze like lanterns and





Hawaiian petrels fly home to underground burrows in volcanic cinders. The petrels' Hawaiian name, ' $u\alpha$ 'u (pronounced ooh-ah-ooh), mimics the sound of their calls. As the birds zero in on their hidden burrows, their otherworldly chatter fills the air.

The pueo, or Hawaiian short-eared owl, can be found on fence posts near pastures on Hawai'i Island. Hawai'i's state bird, the nēnē, or Hawaiian goose, is a conservation success story. The two above were photographed on Hawai'i Island.



After exploring Haleakalā, Esta and I headed down to the wetlands in search of shorebirds. Near Kahului Airport, the Kanahā Pond State Wildlife Sanctuary is a critical home for Hawaiian black-necked stilt (also called ae'o). Fewer than 2,000 of these stilts exist, and a good number are on Maui. We gawked at the slender birds, which resemble tuxedoed waiters with flaming-pink stockings and beaks like long tweezers. For a better look at them, we walked a narrow spit of land to a viewing structure in the middle of the pond. From there, we also spied herons and ducks. Esta approved of all these shorebirds but was still most smitten with the 'i'iwi we'd seen earlier. Her rapturous excitement fed my own.

## HAWAI'I ISLAND

The island of Hawai'i is the largest and youngest in the chain and offers birders the


biggest variety—everything from hawks high up in the thermals to massive flocks of migratory seabirds cruising past on long-distance journeys—in the case of one species, between Alaska and New Zealand.

The last time I visited Hawaiʻi Volcanoes National Park, I saw a pair of 'io, or Hawaiian hawks, cavorting in the sky above Volcano Village. I watched them swoop and dive in tandem and finally disappear into the dense 'ōhi'a and hāpu'u-tree-fern forest. To see one of these dappled, tawny hawks is a treat, but two? Astonishing! The native raptors mate for life, and though fossils indicate their past presence across the Islands, they now nest only on Hawai'i Island. It's easy to see why 'Iolani Palace in Honolulu was named after these regal birds—they have a fierce grace.

Trails within the national park meander through honeycreeper habitat, and I found familiar faces while hiking: 'i'iwi, 'amakihi,

and nēnē. Though I kept a lookout for Hawai'i Island's endemic species the brilliant-orange Hawaiʻi ʻākepa and the honey-colored 'akiapōlā'au, with its curved, uneven beak-I was skunked. These rare species hang out in high-elevation forests, as does the Hawai'i 'elepaio, a smartly dressed little flycatcher that flashes its white petticoat and often follows hikers down the trail. Ancient Hawaiian canoe builders believed the bird to be a manifestation of Lea, their patron goddess. If an 'elepaio pecked at a koa tree they had cut down for canoe-building, the log was understood to be rotten and thus unseaworthy.

At 7,000 feet up the southwest slope of Mauna Kea, māmane blossoms scent the crisp air. This is the refuge of the *palila*, a yellow-headed honeycreeper that subsists primarily on māmane seeds. Only about 2,000 palila exist in the wild, sequestered in a 25-square-mile zone. I have yet to see one of these saffron-shaded birds, so the new Palila Forest Discovery Trail is at the top of my list for my next Hawai'i Island visit.

Also on my to-do list is a trip to Kēōkea Beach Park for the fall seabird migration. My friend and fellow birder Lance Tanino witnessed an amazing display in September of 2016: "The winds were blowing


inland, which helps bring the birds closer to shore," he says. "I saw sooty shearwaters heading south. I spent eight straight hours counting stream after stream of birds, flock after flock." He recorded almost 15,000 in all.

"This is something that happens every spring and fall," Tanino told me. "The birds have been doing this for thousands and thousands of years, but it's something we still don't know that much about. People think we've already discovered all there is to know about birds in Hawai'i, but I think sea-watching is the last frontier."

I'm excited to try it-though I may have to train for the stamina to stand watch for eightplus hours.

## KAUA'I

I'm not embarrassed to admit that the first time I saw an albatross, I cried. Since child-



hood, I'd dreamed of seeing one of these majestic flyers in person—but figured I would need to board a ship and spend days far from land in order to catch a glimpse. Not true. On Kaua'i, mōlī (Laysan albatross) soar overhead at Kīlauea Point National Wildlife Refuge and



can even be found on residential lawns in Princeville. The large black-and-white seabirds are startlingly beautiful. Their immaculate feathers look as though they've been sculpted onto the birds' sleek, powerful bodies. Laysan albatross are the endurance athletes of the bird world, sometimes flying over open ocean for years without touching land.

Mated pairs return to Kaua'i each winter to raise chicks. These long-distance lovebirds raise their beaks and outstretch their wings in synchronized dances, clicking and mooing and nuzzling one another. It's downright adorable—especially when a gray fluff-ball chick is added to the mix. Go ahead; try not to tear up. I dare you.

Albatross aren't the only aviators buzzing Kaua'i. Red-footed boobies barrel in, feet forward, to roost in the trees at Kīlauea Point. White-tailed

### A BIRDING TRAIL TAKES FLIGHT

The Hawai'i Island Coast to Coast Birding Trail, which opened in 2016, spans 90 miles between Kona and Hilo, and has its own associated celebration, the Hawai'i Island Festival of Birds, which will feature a variety of activities and field trips, September 15–17.

The trail was designed to showcase Hawai'i Island's diverse ecology and species. An interactive website allows people to follow the trail at their own pace. The route starts in Kona with a focus on shorebirds and migratory birds at fishponds within Kaloko-Honokōhau National Historical Park. It continues through open grassland along Old Saddle Road and scales the shoulder of Mauna Kea to an elevation of 7,000 feet, and the refuge of the rare and charismatic palila, a yellowheaded honeycreeper. From here the trail meanders down through the lava flows and melodious forest birds of the Pu'u 'Ō'ō Trail. It ends on the

tropic birds perform acrobatic displays against the dramatic sea cliffs.

Kaua'i is the only main Hawaiian Island free of mongooses, which means ground-nesting birds are safer here. With goslings in tow, nēnē waddle across the street in Hanalei. And I always scan marshes and the

eastern coast, with a look at plovers, ducks and other shorebirds near Hilo.

The festival was devised to fund the trail's establishment and ongoing maintenance. Held in September 2016, the inaugural event drew birders from across Hawai'i and from the mainland U.S. Attendees had chances to enjoy Hawai'i's splendid avifauna during field trips and talks.

"We have such amazing birds and such an important conservation story to tell," says Debbie Anderson, one of the founders of the trail. "The festival allows us to spread the word."

The second festival, in September, will feature land and sea birding expeditions, discussions of ancient Hawaiian featherwork, ornithological art displays and workshops with renowned avian photographer Jack Jeffrey. Author and conservationist Kenn Kaufman and recent American Birding Association President Jeffrey A. Gordon will speak. Visit hawaiibirdingtrails.com and birdfesthawaii.org.

edges of streams for chubby black 'alae 'ula (Hawaiian moorhens).
According to legend, these moorhens were forced to share the secret of fire with humans after the demigod Maui caught the birds cooking by a pond.

Kaua'i has its own collection of forest birds, too. During a trek along the rain-carved ridges at Kōke'e

State Park, I saw several 'apapane—
red-black-and-white honeycreepers—
flit among the flowers dangling from thousand-foot-tall cliffs. How incredible it must be to travel unbound by gravity in such lofty terrain.

## O'AHU

As might be expected, densely populated O'ahu has fewer birding opportunities than the other isles, but there are still notable species here.

Honolulu, the hub of Hawaiʻi's urban activity, hosts one especially rare, wonderful seabird. Most white terns, or manu-o- $K\bar{u}$  (literally bird of  $K\bar{u}$ , the Hawaiian god of war) nest in the remote Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument, but a cosmopolitan few have chosen to live amid the high-rises and hotels of Waikīkī, making Honolulu the only place on the four biggest Hawaiian Islands to find these terns.

Over the past 14 years, Honolulu's white tern population has roughly tripled, from 700 to about 2,000. The

manu-o-Kū is now the city's official bird, and it has its own festival. A map of active nests can be found at whiteterns.org. The word *nest* is generous; female terns lay a single egg in the crook of a branch and hope for the best. The last time I visited, I stood in wonder beneath a ficus tree and watched two manu-o-Kū take turns delivering fish to a loudly squawking hatchling.

Even louder are Waikīkī's red-masked parakeets. These small parrots are native to South America, not Hawai'i, but they are fun to observe. Around 60 feral parakeets congregate in Kapi'olani Regional Park. I once found a small flock on the gate of the Waikiki Natatorium War Memorial. As their name implies, red-masked parakeets have vermilion faces that contrast sharply with their bright-green bodies.

Later on that same trip, I ventured to the westernmost point of Oʻahu to explore

Ka'ena Point Natural Area Reserve. A 2.5-mile hike along the coast took me past boulder beaches, tide pools and blowholes, with arresting views of the Wai'anae Mountains. I passed through a predator-proof gate to find wedge-tailed shearwater burrows and albatross nests. A Hawaiian monk seal napped on the coral-strewn beach.

As I listened to the wind whip past my ears—the same wind that carries these seabirds across the globe—I reflected on the mysteries yet unsolved. Bird-watching in such a place as this opens a window into the wild; it affords us the chance to connect intimately and unobtrusively with our natural world.




#### **CARD SENSE**

By clue 2, the bottom card is red. It isn't the ace of hearts (clue 4), so it is the three of diamonds. The top card isn't the ace of hearts (clue 1), six of clubs (clue 3), or jack of spades (clue 4); it is the ace of spades. Since the six of clubs is somewhere above the ace of hearts (clue 1) and the ace of hearts is somewhere above the jack of spades (clue 4), the six of clubs is second from the top, the ace of hearts is third, and the jack of spades is fourth. In summary, from top to bottom: ace of spades, six of clubs, ace of hearts, jack of spades, and three of diamonds.
