#### >> Clement "Clem" Terino was the first

pilot to apply for a position at Virgin America. His years of service to the airline, and to Alaska since the two airlines merged, have made him one of the most respected captains in the field.

In 2006, Virgin America wasn't yet certified to fly when the fledgling company launched a test for an online job-application system. Those overseeing the test were shocked to receive Terino's application within minutes.

"They were so impressed with him getting to the site so quickly, they had to bring him in," says Terino's longtime colleague Mike Geiger. "It's something [nobody has] ever regretted."

Terino, a lifelong resident of Central New York, joined the New York Air National Guard in 1980 as an air mechanic. After attending flight school, he worked at a flight instruction/charter company, then at a regional airline. He was later a pilot/check airman for Independence Air.

At Virgin America, as one of the original employees, Terino screened pilot applicants for the flight-operations team and was integral to getting the airline certified. He also developed a guest-service program that defined the pilot's role in the flyer's experience. It emphasized that the pilot should be highly visible, honest and communicative, an approach that became part of the airline's award-winning service. Terino appreciates the chance to bring this openness and approachability to his work at Alaska.

In addition to flying planes, Terino is a Line Check Airman—one of the experienced pilots responsible for training and evaluating new hires and making sure flight crews comply with operating procedures. In this role, Terino is known for his deep commitment to safety.


#### GOING FORWARD







We worked with our partners continually, tweaking changes until we got it right. The new design takes your comfort to heart, with custom memory-foam seats, tablet holders to fit your mobile device of choice, headrests with

six adjustable settings, and more.

"Our goal is not to be different for different's sake," explains Sangita Woerner, Alaska Airlines Vice President of Marketing. "We want to be different for our guests—and we believe the details matter."

"Comfort is about the seamlessness of all interactions you have onboard," says
Johannes Lampela, BMW Designworks' Director of Design, who worked with us on the cabin retrofit. "The modern traveler wants to be in control, not dictated to by their space. This means they need to have freedom to put things in different places."

#### **Calming colors**

Colors may be one of the first things you notice when boarding one of our retrofitted cabins. "We wanted a calming environment because travel can be so stressful," Woerner notes. "You should feel comfortable and welcome the moment you step onboard."

Look for neutral colors, blending warm and cool grays and blues. When you walk from the front to the back of the plane, the colors transition from lighter to darker shades, creating a spacious first impression and a sense of depth. The goal was to produce a space that's pleasing to the eye no matter where you're seated.

To infuse our brand personality into the space, brighter brand colors are used as accents. Pops of fun blues can be found in elements such as the seatback literature, mood lighting and flight attendants' uniforms, working together to create a cohesive look.

#### One-of-a-kind seats

To ensure optimal comfort, our seats were tested by people sitting on them for hours at a time, mimicking a long-haul flight. The cushions are hand-cut and formed with several memory-foam parts, creating a design unique to Alaska Airlines.

You'll also find a comforting adjustable headrest that helps to accommodate more body types, giving you more control.

## First Class Luxuries


To bring in a feeling of luxury, we looked to the automotive industry for inspiration.

"For our First Class seats, we wanted a sports car, performance-driven look," Woerner says. We carefully considered the materials and the shape of the memory-foam cushion, and employed a mix of textiles and quilting tech-

niques for the seat covers to create a rich look.

"Alaska wanted the First Class seats to feel like a seamless transition from your premium vehicle," says Martin Rehmet, Regional Sales Director of German seat manufacturer Recaro. "The sculpted seat hugs more of your body and back."

In its ergonomic and sleeping studies, Recaro looked at the First Class seat cushion from all angles to figure out the best way to support a passenger's feet and to bring them into a relaxed position.



Alaska set out to reinvent its inflight menu with a West Coast vibe, these were the elements that guests said they sought most. With the new food options now onboard, these concepts continue to guide Alaska's development of carefully crafted rotating menus.

Guests can savor the flavors of gourmet meals, feel-good snacks, and local craft beers and wines. As the menus change quarterly, guests can enjoy new offerings inspired by the West Coast food scene.

For Alaska's new First Class and Main Cabin cuisine, the airline is partnering with Joshua Rappaport, Executive Chef, Menu Design for LSG Sky Chefs. Chef Rappaport thoughtfully elevates the Alaska experience through foodto rival great menu experiences on the ground.

Recently, the chef answered questions about what goes into this work.

Chef Joshua Rappaport, at left in above photo, puts great care and testing into each aspect of Alaska's new seasonal food menus.

#### Q: What was the philosophy that drove your reinvention of Alaska's menus?

A: My goal was to provide our guests with an inflight dining experience that would reflect the variety—and quality—to which they are accustomed in cities such as Seattle, Portland, Los Angeles and San Francisco. Over the past several years, we on the West Coast have grown to expect a very high standard in the food available to us, in terms of the raw materials used and the diverse global influences on our cuisine. We are accustomed to shopping at farmers markets and well-stocked grocery stores that feature regional products. Previously exotic ingredients such as mole and kimchi have become mainstream.

The seasonal element is important, as well. West Coast diners are attuned to the ebb and flow of seasonal delicacies such as Washington state apples in the fall and wild Alaskan halibut in the spring. By making the shift to four complete menu changes every year, we can speak to this bounty in the same way that local restaurants do.

The other main driver behind the new menu designs was a strong commitment to local sourcing and highlighting West Coast products. For many years, Alaska has featured some great Pacific Northwest brands, such as Beecher's Handmade Cheese and Seattle Chocolate, and we'll continue to feature guest favorites, such as the Signature Fruit and Cheese Platter. Over the past year we have forged great new partnerships. For example, I'm excited about working with Portland-based Salt & Straw for their innovative ice creams. We're also working with Seattle-based Cucina Fresca to bring locally produced fresh pasta onboard.

#### Q: What else distinguishes Alaska's menus?

A: When we began to brainstorm, the phrase that I kept coming back to was "approachably adventurous." I wanted the food to be innovative and on-trend, but also needed to account for the fact that not everyone gets excited about trying unfamiliar foods, and that some ingredients can be very polarizing in a limitedchoice environment. If there is a specific flavor or ingredient that I want to feature that may be a little bit outside the box, I will try to pair it with other elements that are more recognizable and approachable. In one of the fall dishes, we had pink pickled onions—which we pickled in our kitchens—and these were provided on the side for people to add to a sandwich anchored by smoked bacon and Havarti cheese.

I love the challenge of taking contemporary West Coast food concepts and spinning them into something that will work in the parameters of our environment. Once I've identified flavors and ingredients that I want to feature, I need to think about packing limitations, space constraints, how it will reheat, and how easy it is for flight attendants and passengers to handle. There's also the impact of altitude on our taste buds: The air in a pressurized cabin eliminates some of our flavor perception. To compensate, I use lots of bright flavors that hold up well, such as citrus, vinegars and aromatic spices.

#### Q: How does your background factor in?

A: I have spent almost my entire career in Washington state, so my style of cooking is

very much in the West Coast idiom. I spent 10 years working at Seattle's Fairmont Olympic Hotel, where we specialized in fresh, local products prepared using classical European techniques. That's really where I learned how to appreciate and handle high-quality ingredients, and how to think seasonally. In the years since, I have been fortunate to work alongside talented chefs from all over the world, and I have tried to learn as much as I could from their expertise, whether it was my Oaxacan sous-chef teaching me how to make an authentic mole sauce or a Korean colleague schooling me in the right way to marinate bulgogi.

I'm the product of a family for which the act of preparing and sharing food was central. I grew up in New England, eating foods that weren't really common in the 1970s and '80s for that region: spaghetti squash, tofu, fermented black beans. We also had a huge garden, so I understood from an early age what fresh really meant. Later, my first cooking job was at an old country inn on the coast of Maine, where all the vegetables were grown on-site. A local fisherman dropped off fresh lobsters on his way home from the wharf each day. This all informed my sensibility as a cook long before I went to culinary school, and it carries through to my approach to creating menus now.

#### Q: What are we likely to see in the future?

A: Look for additional exciting partnerships that will allow us to feature some great West Coast companies. We're also increasingly using guest feedback to take a more data-driven approach to menu decisions, which allows us to use insights into our flyers' preferences as a tool to design menus with even greater appeal.

With people's awareness of sustainability as a consideration, we will continue to focus on ingredient sourcing. Last year, we transitioned to using only cage-free eggs in our menus, and we're working hard to identify similar opportunities across the portfolio. I also want to focus on incorporating more plant-based options, in line with a trend we're seeing up and down the West Coast. There are great products out there that will allow us to develop menus that accommodate a wider range of preferences.

## Now Onboard

As a chef, I mark the progress of a year in terms of what I'm craving—or cooking—at any given time. Each season has a handful of what I call "milestone ingredients," whose appearance in markets and on menus serves notice that we are turning the corner into a distinctive time of year. In the summer, it might be your first perfectly ripe tomato or a handful of fresh cherries. In the fall, a bite of crisp apple or the smell of roasting pumpkin might signal that shorter days and cooler nights are on the way. Check out the following dishes, from our current menu, intended to convey the very essence of spring.



#### **Asparagus Risotto**

Available on most flights, in First Class, our intensely flavorful asparagus risotto showcases some of the season's most prominent ingredients. Creamy rice is garnished with fresh asparagus, fava beans and pea shoots in a trifecta of emblematic spring vegetables. Savory roasted mushrooms lend umami, that elusive aspect of taste prized by chefs worldwide, while petite red and yellow tomatoes provide pops of color and acidity against the richness of the Parmesan cheese. Complement this with a salad of tender baby greens—and a glass of California Chardonnay, if you are so inclined—and I'm hard-pressed to imagine a dish more representative of spring on the West Coast. - Joshua Rappaport

#### Lemongrass Chicken Chopped Salad

Available for purchase on select flights, in all seat classes, this chicken salad brings together authentic Asian flavors in a vibrant combination with West Coast flair. Aromatic lemongrass gives grilled chicken a classic Vietnamese street-food feel and reminds us that the time for outdoor cooking is coming. 

The city's oldest operating fountain is The Women's Leadership Fountain, completed in 1899. It honors women, such as women's suffrage pioneer Phoebe Jane Ess (1850–1934), who have made great contributions to Kansas City.



>>> The United States' longest continual collegiate track meet is celebrating its 125th year. The Penn Relays at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, April 25–27, welcomes about 17,000 athletes and 110,000 fans.

Founded in 1895, the relays have evolved from a 4 x 440-yard race between Harvard University and University of Pennsylvania runners (Harvard won) into a track-centered festival that includes relays and individual events at Franklin Field.

#### 'NATURE'S NINJAS'

>>> The only species of armadillo that can curl up into a complete ball is the three-banded armadillo. Native to South America, these little mammals grow to be just a foot in length and weigh about 3 pounds. But when they roll into a ball, their strong bony plates, called scutes, give them protection against predators.

Wilson, a three-banded armadillo, is one of 18 live animals featured in "Nature's Ninjas" at the Swaner EcoCenter, less than 30 miles east of Salt Lake City. Through April 28, visitors can learn

about many animals and their defense adaptations.

#### NYC'S EXPANDING ARTS SCENE

>> The futuristic new Bloomberg Building in New York City can be reconfigured to suit the occasion. In the most dramatic transformation, the shell of the cultural center rolls out on large wheels to nearly double one venue's size in about 5 minutes. Opening on April 5, The Shed is a 200,000-square-foot facility where artists and performers can show their work in a customizable setting. The space can be arranged to accommodate several simultaneous art displays, from galleries to live performances.

The building is celebrating its grand opening with a "Soundtrack of America" concert series, April 5-14, featuring musical artists such as Judith Hill and Moses Sumney. Reich Richter Pärt, on display April 6-June 2, is a premiere of commissioned work by the three eponymous artists and features elements of music and film. Other art includes Anne Carson's Norma Jeane Baker of Troy, April 6-May 19, a play about Marilyn Monroe and Helen of Troy, and an exhibit by contemporary artist Trisha Donnelly, on view until May 30.























#### LIFE BY THE BOOK


>> I spot Nancy Pearl checking out a book as I enter the brightly lit atrium at the heart of Seattle's Central Library, within the building's famously angular glass-and-steel exterior. A newspaper review has inspired Pearl to track down The Heartbeat of Wounded Knee by David Treuer to see how this book frames Native American history since 1890 as a story of resilience rather than mere tragedy.

Pearl knows well the power of reviews and recommendations. "Once a librarian, always a librarian," says Pearl, now seated beside me at a library table. She has spent a good part of her life recommending books to others—as a beloved librarian and, more recently, as an author of books about books (the best-selling "Book Lust" series) and as a regular contributor to NPR's Morning Edition. A frequent speaker to literacy organizations and library groups, Pearl also is the author of the 2017 novel George and Lizzie. She was the Library Journal Librarian of the Year in 2011, several years after she retired from her position as executive director of the Washington Center for the Book at the Seattle Public Library. And she was the model and inspiration for the Librarian Action Figure produced by Seattle gift-and-novelty retailer Archie McPhee.

Most librarians aren't cast as action figures, and Pearl's sensibilities sometimes also break from what you might expect of some-

one in her field. She doesn't believe in conventional book genres, and she isn't averse to skipping to the last page of a mystery or to dropping a book that doesn't get her attention early. She can usually tell by the first paragraph if a book is a match for her. "It's like falling in love," she says. "Your heart beats faster, and everything is just so clear. I'll start a book, and it'll be so good, I'll just feel like, I can't read it now-I just want to hold it in my hand," she says, and starts to blush. "It's so romantic."

Pearl knew of her deep love for books and even her life's calling by age 10. "There wasn't really a runner-up," she says. "I was determined to be a librarian."



Much of this early commitment was thanks to the devoted staff of Detroit Public Library's Parkman Branch near Pearl's childhood home. They made her feel welcome and appreciated.

"The children's librarian there recognized my hunger to read and to escape into the pages of a book. She gave me the world."

Pearl's own first librarian job, with Detroit Public Library's bookmobile, sealed the deal. And, after time off to start a family, and a move to Tulsa, where she worked for nine years in a bookstore, she felt drawn to return to the library. She became a librarian again, in Tulsa.

Pearl started at the Seattle Public Library in 1993. In 1998, she helped launch Seattle Reads, a program that has since been adapted in cities around the world. This initiative began with a question she and her colleagues were asking: "What if all Seattle residents read the same book?" The program provided community members a chance to meet and discuss big ideas in the context of a story, starting with discussions of coping with loss, spawned by Russell Banks' The Sweet Hereafter.

To Pearl, a library is a "People's University," a place for all people to learn. As libraries face changing circumstances, they have stepped up to provide social assistance to patrons in need. Pearl respects this, and also feels the original mission of libraries should be kept essential.

"The library is the only institution where you can walk inside—whoever you are—and lose yourself in the pages of a book ... and find yourself in the pages of a book." ズ

#### HAPPY TRAILS IN UTAH

>> I love being outside. And running is one of my favorite ways to enjoy the world, especially when the sun is shining and the sky is as blue as it was during my visit to Arches National Park, about 230 miles southeast of Salt Lake City. I was in Utah's capital to run in the Salt Lake City Marathon, which is April 13 this year. But before that race, I figured I'd stretch my legs with some trail running at Arches.


The park is home to more than 2,000 natural stone arches, as well as hundreds of pinnacles and giant balanced rocks. I was wowed by Landscape Arch in the park's Devils Garden area. The arch stretches about 300 feet, making it one of the world's longest stone

spans. But it's a fragile wonder, measuring only about 6 feet thick at its center.


The Salt Lake City Marathon bills itself as "a beautiful challenge," and that couldn't be more accurate. The course traveled through the city's streets and along trails backed by the stunning peaks of Utah's Wasatch Range.

I explored the Wasatch some more when I visited Little Cottonwood Canyon, about 20 miles southeast of downtown Salt Lake City. The area is a wonderland for hiking, mountain biking, rock climbing and camping. It was a reminder that Utah offers almost every outdoor activity—and Salt Lake City is a beautiful and fun hub that lets you access it all.





#### **EVERETT TAKES FLIGHT**

Touring a center of aviation history near Alaska Airlines' newest airport By Jeff Layton

>> Boeing's Everett Final Assembly Plant may be the closest thing on Earth to being inside a scene from Star Wars. If you squint your eyes just right, the 747 models, parked nose-to-tail on the factory floor of this immense building, could double as ships inside a colossal space station.

Actually, I'm on a balcony in the largest building by volume on the planet-measuring 472 million cubic feet. I'm overlooking the Boeing Everett factory floor, where employees are assembling more than 15 twin-aisle jets. For fans of everything aviation, Everett, 25 miles north of Seattle, is one of the Northwest's top destinations. The Aviation District has a number of sites, including the Boeing Future of Flight facility at Paine Field, where the tour of Boeing's Everett factory begins. Visitors are transported by shuttle from the facility to the factory, located about 5 minutes

away. While you can buy tour tickets at the Future of Flight, the tour often sells out, so it's best to buy tickets online far in advance. The facility also features a growing aerospace gallery, with a mock-up of the Destiny laboratory module, which is part of the International Space Station, and a rooftop observation deck that offers amazing views of the Cascade Range and Paine Field. On most weekdays, you can also see a massive Dreamlifter-with one of the world's largest cargo holds for an aircraft-on a nearby tarmac.

Paine Field is also home to other Aviation District attractions such as the Flying Heritage & Combat Armor Museum, the Historic Flight Foundation and The Museum of Flight's Restoration Center & Reserve Collection. These three locations include some of the finest historical aircraft in the world.

If you were working up a list of modern

engineering marvels, Boeing's Everett factory, where the 747, 767, 777 and 787 airplane models are assembled, would likely make the cut. The nearly 1,000-acre site can easily house more than 20,000 workers at a time. According to Boeing, you could also fit all of Disneyland Park inside the main assembly plant and still

have room left over. Each month, about 50 million parts are shipped to the plant, and a jet is completed nearly every two days.

A short distance away is the Flying Heritage & Combat Armor Museum. In 2008, Microsoft co-founder Paul Allen launched the public museum with his collection of aircraft, tanks, military vehicles and other items, which became the foundation for the museum.

The collection ranges from medical equipment from the Civil War to military items from the Gulf War, with a strong emphasis on aircraft and tanks from World War II. About

three-quarters of the aircraft and tanks have been restored to working condition, including the rare Curtiss JN-4D Jenny, a plane introduced in 1915. Visitors can get a close-up look at the collection's tanks during Tankfest Northwest at the museum on May 25. Children ages 11–14 can attend the museum's Beasts of the Battlefield summer camps, June 24–27 and August 5–8. Participants can try on military gear, learn about the museum's aircraft and vehicles, play laser tag and more.

A tour of the nearby Museum of Flight
Restoration Center & Reserve Collection gives
visitors a glimpse into how the museum restores aircraft. When the restoration is finished, some planes stay at the Everett facility,
while others go to The Museum of Flight's main
campus, at Boeing Field in South Seattle, which
houses one of the top aircraft collections
found anywhere. Restoration efforts are

underway on one of the first business jets, a 1957 Lockheed Jetstar. Also under repair is a 1950s de Havilland Comet and a large 1953 Piasecki H-21 helicopter. The district's Historic Flight Foundation also restores classic aircraft, dating from 1927 to 1957. Currently, the foundation has a collection of 13 aircraft—including the Waco UPF-7 biplane—which are on display and fully restored to flying condition.

#### City sights


Everett's downtown area also offers exciting attractions. Art lovers will enjoy the Schack Art Center, which is half art gallery and half studio space for working artists. You can see artists shape molten glass at the center's glassblowing studio, and also join a class such as silversmithing or a lapidary clinic with precious gems. At "Make It Now" glass-blowing classes, kids can create seasonal ornaments with the help of an instructor. Kids also will love the Imagine Children's Museum, where they can have fun with science at the Rad Science presentations, learn about the properties of water at the Waterworks area, and play with stuffed animals at the Wildlife Clinic. Another fun family stop is at Funko, an Everett-based toy company, with a one-of-a-kind store that is full of plush toys, key chains, and collectible figurines with cartoonish features and large heads.

Everett's waterfront is a center of activity in the spring and summer, including the Sunday Everett Farmers Market, May 12–October 6. The Thursday Music at the Marina concert series takes place June 20–August 29, and the Port of Everett sponsors the Sail-in Cinema outdoor movie series, July 19–August 23. You can visit Jetty Island by ferry from the waterfront, from July 5 to Labor Day. The 2-milelong island has fine-sand beaches and flat grassy trails, and is a great place to relax with the family, admire the views and marvel at the beauty of the area.

### SEATTLE

#### **VISIT THE AVIATION DISTRICT**

Paine Field is where air travel was perfected. Home to the Boeing assembly plant, the Paine Field Aviation District's museums will take you from the pioneering days of flight to the very edge of aerospace technology. See the world's largest building on the **Boeing tour (1)**, then visit any one of the five aviation attractions nearby.

#### **RELAX ON JETTY ISLAND**

This sandy two-mile island offers unexpectedly warm swimming water. Wade into Port Gardner while taking in views of the Olympic Mountains. **Jetty Island (2)** is a destination for families, bird-watchers, and kiteboarders. It's accessible by a free ferry from Everett. Be sure to pack a picnic and some sunscreen: you'll want to linger on the warm sand.

#### **HIKE TO AN ALPINE LAKE**

The Alpine Lakes are as beautiful as their name suggests. Take a summer hike to **Lake Dorothy (3)** in the Cascade Mountains for a cool swim in the clear glacial water. Bring your camera and a picnic. Snowshoe to the lakes in the winter to hear the crunch of fresh powder and the sound of your own heartbeat—it's that quiet.

#### **GO WHALE WATCHING**

The Salish Sea is home to fluked marvels. Catch a chartered vessel from the **Edmonds (4)** or Everett marinas and keep your eyes on the waves. Seeing a whale is a bucket list experience and you'll likely catch a glimpse of other marine life on your journey, like sea otters,

harbor seals, sea lions, or





#### GO MOUNTAIN BIKING

This mountainous region calls out for downhill biking. Pedal down fern-lined paths and around cedar stumps. Explore 4.6 miles of trails in the North Mountain Bike Skills Area (5) near Darrington-good for amateurs as well as seasoned experts.

#### **EXPERIENCE PNW VILLAGE LIFE**

Explore walkable towns and cities in the foothills of the Cascades. Take a slow Saturday to yourself or lodge overnight in a Victorian-style bed and breakfast. Seek out vintage finds in antique shops. Wander the art galleries in downtown Edmonds (6). The small town vibe is present in brick wall murals and riverside promenades.

#### TRY A HAZY IPA

Here, there are plenty of places to sit and savor your brew of choice. Kombucha,

> third-wave coffee, small-batch beer, hard cider, and spirits are our specialties. Linger over a cup. Heft a pint. If it can be distilled, brewed, roasted, bottled, poured, or served with a little umbrella and ice-it's here. Into Hazy IPAs? **\$kookum Brewery (7)** produces some of the best in the

nation.



Get the good kind of lost on the Mountain Loop Highway (8). Hike to ghost towns, camp along the Stillaguamish River, climb to mountaintop lookouts, and photograph spectacular ice caves. The Mountain Loop is an ideal day trip for people looking to explore the PNW, or a weekend trip made for some serious relaxation.

#### TAKE A HOT AIR BALLOON RIDE

See the world from above the clouds. At Harvey Field, you can freefall from an airplane at 10,000 feet at

#### Skydive Snohomish (9).

Float above the alpine treeline and take in a sunrise or sunset with a hot air balloon expedition. These aerial experiences offer an unparalleled view of the PNW.



We are dedicated to those who have gone before us and those who have remained to keep

the fires burning.

Whether you choose a self-guided or group tour, you will learn about our traditional territories, the importance of the cedar trees, our seven value stories, and seasonal lifeways. As you walk

through the Canoe Hall, you will experience our homelands from the Cascade Mountains to Tulalio

Bay, while admiring historic canoes and archaeology from various sites throughout the county.

The Hibulb Cultural Center is a place to learn and a source of pride for the Tulalip people and neighboring communities. We hope that our visitors will be fascinated by our exhibits and learn about our history and culture.

## A First Class Airport

Seattle's new designforward terminal brings new visitors to Seattle NorthCountry.

He chose Paine Field for its location, history, and collaborative public-private partnerships. Snohomish County, Washington is quickly growing with newcomers. The influx in population is driven by the region's impressive quality of life and proximity to Seattle—giving companies a key advantage in attracting high-level talent.

The new Propeller Airport at Paine Field now offers a relaxed and refined alternative when flying into the greater Seattle area.



#### A Design-forward Approach

Paine Field is ideally situated next to the coast of the Salish Sea, on a 600-foot hill above the fog line. It's easy for airplanes to access and ground control has great visibility (not to mention stunning views of the snowy Olympic Mountains).

The beauty of Paine Field isn't only in its natural surroundings; it's also in the design, flow, fit and finish of the details. Bose speakers play classical music in a vaulted wooden ceiling designed by Swiss sound engineering firm Topakustik. A modern electronic Solari readerboard, showing arriving and departing flights, greets travelers as they approach ticketing. These details are "reflective of

the sophistication of Snohomish County," says Smith.

#### **Looking Ahead**

PAE will bring a new wave of passengers to the foothills of the Cascades, the beaches of the Salish Sea, and the doorstep of Seattle. Locals will appreciate it for the terminal's connectivity to regional fly markets and international destinations. All travelers will love the growing regional mass transit options, with the arrival of light rail to the county in 2024. 
## A CAPITAL NEIGHBORHOOD

>> Where U Street meets 11th, in Washington, D.C., you'll find Vinoteca, an upbeat wine-centric bistro that offers half and full pours, daily happy hour specials, and a patio in back with a garden and bocce court evoking a European courtyard. Just down U Street, in a building made from former shipping containers, is the taqueria/Mexican beer garden El Rey, which serves tacos and highly popular margaritas. Around the corner, on Ninth Street, is Habesha Market and Restaurant, one of the terrific local Ethiopian eateries that benefit from being in one of the largest Ethiopian diaspora communities in the country. Habesha dishes up specialties such as sambusas (fried pastries with savory fillings), spicy lentils and key wot (a spicy beef stew). Each of these restaurants is reflective of the bustling U Street Corridor scene—a vibrant area just a few blocks north of D.C.'s historical marble-andgranite-dominated downtown.

The U Street neighborhood is one of the city's buzziest areas, filled with galleries, shops and restaurants. Its modern energy echoes its history as a center of activity. In the first half of the 20th century, the neighborhood flourished as a center of African American nightlife and was known for hosting some of the period's top performers. Musical legends such as Ella Fitzgerald, Louis Armstrong and Billie Holiday performed in local clubs.






>>> The Lincoln Theatre, above, and the popular wine bar/bistro Vinoteca, below, are examples of the attractions in the U Street area of Washington, D.C. Today's scene also boasts great entertainment. Anchoring the east end of the U Street Corridor, the 9:30 Club was named

one of the 10 best live-music venues in the country in 2018, by *Rolling Stone* magazine. It brings national acts to an intimate space, maxing out at 1,200. Nearby Lincoln Theatre, built in 1922, hosted jazz and big-band performers until a closure in the 1960s. Restored and reopened in 1994, the theater has since hosted a variety of acts, from musicians to comedians. Around the corner on 14th Street is the Black Cat, known for indie concerts (past performers include the Foo Fighters,

Beck and many others) and energetic danceoffs with themes like The Cure vs. The Smiths.

After dancing, you might want a late-night nosh. The bright-red-and-yellow-fronted Ben's Chili Bowl, located next to the Lincoln Theatre, attracts visitors, locals and celebrities for chili dogs and half smokes—half-beef, half-pork smoked sausages covered in chili. Down the street, the hole-in-the-wall restaurant Oohh's & Aahh's serves soul food such as fried chicken, collard greens and a celebrated mac-and-cheese. Dishes are accompanied by a side of sass as entertaining as you might hope for to end a stroll along high-spirited U Street. \*\*



#### MONUMENTAL D.C.

While in Washington, be sure to visit classic D.C. sites. Walk the 2.5-mile stretch of the National Mall and Memorial Parks between the U.S. Capitol and Lincoln Memorial. Flanked by Smithsonian Institution museums, the mall is popular with school groups. Near the mall's middle is the Washington Monument (scheduled to reopen soon). And if you're in town during the National Cherry Blossom Festival (March 20-April 14), head to the Tidal Basin and Thomas Jefferson Memorial (above) to view particularly beautiful blooms. —K.D.



## A GREAT FALLS EXCURSION

The Potomac River is easygoing and mild near the back steps of D.C.'s Lincoln Memorial. Yet a drive of less than 20 miles upstream to Great Falls Park, in Virginia, reveals something very different. Here, the Potomac—which has by this point collected drainage waters from the Allegheny Mountains, plus hills in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia—builds up speed as it tumbles over jagged rocks and drops 76 feet in less than a mile.

The 800-acre park, administered by the National Park Service, features three main river overlooks, all within about a 10-minute walk from the Great Falls Park Visitor Center. Emerging through the trees at the overlooks, visitors get wide-open views of roiling waters and jumbled crags, and—at times when the river's flow is manageable—of kayakers braving rapids.

The park also includes 15 miles of scenic hiking trails, some of which are open to bicycles and horses. The River Trail, which winds along the top of the cliffs above the Potomac, begins just past Overlook 3. Several more trails connect to the River Trail, and hikers can choose paths for their desired distance, terrain

and difficulty. They can also watch for some of the park's many birds, including great blue herons that frequently fish near the falls.

The hike to the Mather Gorge Plaque is popular and easy. Follow the River Trail for about a half-mile from the visitor center, along the steep cliffs that tower above the river, until you reach a viewpoint and signage honoring Stephen T. Mather, the National Park Service's first director (from 1917 to 1929). From here, you can return the way you came or loop back on the Patowmack Canal Trail, which takes you on an easy, level dirt path past stone walls that



were once part of the canal structure. The former waterway, now dried and in ruins, was the result of a venture originally led by George Washington to bypass the falls and make the Potomac navigable for trade.

If you want a longer hike, you can continue past the plaque on the River Trail and cut over to the Matildaville Trail. This mostly

shaded, forested trail continues south for more than a mile, and you can take a short detour along the way to Sandy Landing, which overlooks Mather Gorge.

Heading north, back to the visitor center, the same trail passes the intriguing remnants of the settlement of Matildaville that grew up around the Patowmack Canal's construction.

Other parts of the canal route and its locks are temporarily closed for restoration but are expected to reopen this year. For the latest updates and additional information, check the park's website at nps.gov/grfa.

## SUSTAINABLE SUSHI

**>>>** Anticipation of that first bite of tuna often starts before sitting down at the sushi bar, peaking just as chopsticks lift the crimson fish from the plate. Rich in flavor and texture, tuna's appeal is easy to understand. But less simple is whether the items we order at the sushi counter are sustainable. For reasons that include overfishing and habitat destruction, it might be preferable to emphasize some types of sushi over others. Identifying the best choices can be challenging due to an often-complex supply network, and the fact that few seafoods are simply all "good" or all "bad." But sushi establishments that have committed to serving sustainable seafoods help us navigate these issues.

When Bamboo Sushi opened the first of its restaurants in Portland, Oregon, in 2008, "sustainability was intertwined in the DNA of the company," says founder and CEO Kristofor Lofgren. There was some early disconnect with customers, including some offended at being told what they should or should not eat. But, he says, "We didn't do it to patronize or be condescending. We believe in the future of sushi and of the oceans, and help direct [customers] toward better options."

On its website, Bamboo Sushi shares where it is currently sourcing seafood. You might see that the octopus from Spain is caught by divers (good) rather than dredged (bad). And that the tuna is Oregon-caught albacore instead of severely depleted bluefin. "Our focus first and foremost is finding the most sustainable seafood we can," Lofgren says. "Then we find the closest source and most efficient means for getting it to the restaurants."

Bamboo Sushi also is mindful of its carbon footprint, which it tracks and shares online and in the restaurants (five in Portland, one in Denver and three opening this year in the Bay Area).

Ten years ago Hajime Sato, chef and owner of Mashiko in Seattle, turned his focus to sustainable seafood after 15 years in business. He encourages sushi fans to think about eating lower on the seafood chain. For a long time, "sushi comprised mostly smaller fish such as mackerel, ocean smelt, herring," he explains, and that practice still makes sense today. "Smaller fish are a better way to go in every way. They're good for you with lots of omega-3s; they mature and reproduce more quickly; and they have wonderful strong flavor."

Ask your server for more of the story behind what you want to order when you go out for sushi. Engaging in the conversation is a valuable step toward ensuring diverse, delicious and sustainable sushi selections for generations to come. ₹

**SUSTAINABLE SEAFOOD APP** For searches at the sushi counter or for advance reading, consult the Monterey Bay Aquarium's Seafood Watch app. Users can scroll through "Sushi A-Z" for a glance at all sushi ratings, or search by common seafood or sushi name to see whether it gets a "Best Choice," "Good Alternative" or "Avoid" grade. The resulting info may lead you to ask your server a question or two, such as about seafood origin, and whether the fish is farmed or wild. —C.N.

### STYLES OF SAKE

>> Rice has been made into sake for more than 2,000 years in Japan. The beverage also is gaining in popularity in the United States. The U.S. is a top destination for sake imports, with more than 5.7 million liters imported in 2017, according to Sake Experience Japan. And with a rapid rise in domestic producers from locations as varied as Austin, Texas, and Denver, Colorado, sake just may be the next big player in the craft game. Here's what you need to know before you choose your next pour.

"The most popular types of sake to drink are junmai daiginjo and daiginjo," explains Alastair England, a wine and sake director for the Zuma restaurants, including in Las Vegas. "These are sakes in which the rice is polished to less than 50 percent of its original size [before fermentation], creating richer, more textural and complex liquids." Associated flavors for these styles are delicate, including

fragrances of plum and pear-notes that pair brilliantly with raw fish. England recommends a classic pairing of scallop sashimi alongside Kirinzan—an elegant junmai daiginjo from Niigata prefecture.

Timothy Sullivan, a brand ambassador for Hakkaisan Sake, recommends two eminently inviting styles for American palates: nama, a bold unpasteurized variant, and nigori, a coarsely filtered, cloudy style with a rich texture akin to a piña colada. "For Americans trying to find their way in the world of subtle and nuanced sake tastes, these styles stand out as beacons of flavor that are accessible and easy to get a handle on," he says.

Which is probably why Texas Saké Company has found immediate success with its nigori bottling. The company's taproom in downtown Austin serves the semisweet beverage on draft. Colorado Sake Company follows a similar model in the hip RiNo neighborhood of Denver. Its tasting room offers a wide range of filtered and unfiltered rice wines with interesting added flavors such as chai. And SakéOne, which became one of the first U.S. sake producers when it opened in the 1990s, offers tours and tastings at its tasting room in Forest Grove, Oregon, where you can enjoy a rotating selection of the company's sakes on tap, including sparkling and fruit-infused sakes.

Sake is becoming more approachable, and more available, as a function of producers and vendors expanding the craft throughout the United States. "I often hear people lament that they can't get good sake in their area," observes Sullivan. "If your local liquor store or favorite restaurant does not currently carry premium sake, ask them to. The more consumers ask for premium sake, the faster we can

# TOP VEGAN AND VEGETARIAN CITIES

### )) An estimated 8 percent of the U.S.

population, or about 26 million people, identify as vegetarian or vegan, according to a 2018 Gallup poll. And the number of people abstaining from meat or all animal products is expected to continue growing in the coming years. The following are the five top U.S. cities for vegetarian and vegan lifestyles, as compiled by WalletHub, a financial advising website. In 2018, WalletHub ranked the 100 largest U.S. cities, using 16 key indicators, including the cost of vegan and vegetarian groceries, the availability of vegan and vegetarian meals at restaurants, and the number of salad shops and juice and smoothie

### 1) New York City, New York

The Big Apple came in first in the survey, tying for first place in the percentage of restaurants offering vegan dishes. It also had the most juice and smoothie bars per capita. In New York, stop by the family-owned Seasoned Vegan restaurant for home-cooked vegan dishes with a soulful twist. You may also like spaghetti & wheatballs or seitan picatta at Candle 79 restaurant.

### Portland,Oregon

Portland is home to one of the nation's only vegan mini-malls, which features the Sweet Pea Baking Co., one of Portland's first



all-vegan retail bakeries, and the vegan grocery store Food Fight! The mall also is home to Scapegoat Tattoo, touting all-vegan ink and aftercare products.

### 3) Orlando, Florida

Famed for its theme parks, Orlando has also earned a reputation for its meat-free fare. WalletHub tied Orlando with New York for the top spot in the number of salad



shops per capita. Also, Orlando ranked in the top five for the percentage of restaurants serving vegan options, the number of vegetable nurseries per capita, and the number of juice and smoothie bars per capita.

### 4) Seattle, Washington

Meat-free and vegan options abound in the Emerald City. Seattle is also among the top five cities for the number of farmers markets per capita. When in Seattle, visit the University District's Vegan Haven, a 100 percent vegan grocery store that is owned by Pigs Peace Sanctuary, a charity that takes in abused and unwanted animals.

### 5) San Francisco, California

WalletHub ranks the City by the Bay first in the number of farmers markets per capita. Also, the Bay Area has developed a reputation for meat-free options. For instance, Berkeley passed a city law last year that all city-operated institutions must serve only plant-based foods once a week. If you visit Berkeley, stop in at the Cinnaholic bakery chain's original shop for a taste of one of its famous all-vegan cinnamon rolls that were featured in 2014 on the ABC TV program Shark Tank.

### "THANKS, IT'S VINTAGE!"

>> One of the most eco-conscious ways to shop is to buy used clothing, furniture and housewares. After all, you're keeping an item out of the landfill while also not using additional resources to make something new. Many of today's resale, consignment and vintage stores are clean, bright shopping spaces—and treasure troves of stylish finds. Here are a few favorites:

### Bad Mother Vintage: In

Downtown Fairbanks, this shop features high-quality fabrics and craftsmanship, along with unusual discoveries, such as an 1840s hand-tatted German lace wedding jacket. Unique souvenirs to bring home include butter-soft, Alaska-themed vintage tees (instagram.com/ badmothervintage).

Facèré Jewelry Art Gallery: This Seattle gallery's cases cradle 1890s diamond rings, Art Deco necklaces and 1940s cocktail rings. Founded 46 years ago by jeweler Karen Lorene, who once worked as an appraiser on Antiques Roadshow, the shop offers vintage items as well as new jewelry crafted by contemporary artists. Unique pieces abound, including an Edwardian necklace made of hexagonal amethyst stones, and a Victorian matching set of snake earrings and a pendant, made with opals and rubies (facerejewelryart.com).

### Old Portland Hardware & Architectural:

This shop in Portland, Oregon, features antique and vintage house hardware, mirrors, furnishings and lighting from the 1890s through the 1930s. Visitors can find Victorian doorknobs and Art Nouveau stained glass, along with barometers and old-time physician equipment. The creative staff upcycles items, too—for example, a 1955 copper pipe made into a standing lamp (oldportlandhardware. com).

Decades Inc.: This Los Angeles store is so impressive that celebrities consign (and shop) here. Roam among the rows of glamorous party dresses, Yves Saint Laurent blazers, vintage Hermès Kelly and Birkin bags, and a selection of collectible men's designer fashions, such as Christian Louboutin shoes. Branded luxury bags are on the shelves this spring, including 1980s Chanel, 1990s Gucci and 2000s Dior (decadesinc.com).

Bad Madge & Co.: Entering this shop in San Diego is like time-traveling to a mini department store from the 1950s and '60s. You'll find midcentury fashion and accessories, along with furniture and low-tech items such as records and typewriters. Bad Madge staff scour local resale shops, flea markets and estate sales for pieces by notable designers, including Herman Miller Eames furniture (badmadge.com). ⊀

### THE HEART OF THE MARINERS

Seattle's Edgar Martínez, a fan favorite for his timely hitting and humility, heads to Cooperstown

>>> Regardless of how the wins and losses stack up this season for the Seattle Mariners, baseball fans in the Pacific Northwest already know that the summer of 2019 will be highlighted by the long-awaited recognition of one of their most beloved players, Edgar Martínez.

He has finally been recognized by the Baseball Writers' Association of America, which elected Martínez in his last year of eligibility, to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York. Martínez will be inducted with this year's class on July 21.


The message of Martínez's induction is one of persistence, dedication and commitment. As a boy growing up in Puerto Rico, he learned to hit by batting rocks with a broomstick. Martínez was 27 before he was able to work his way onto the Mariners' major-league roster on a full-time basis.

While stars such as Ken Griffey Jr., Randy Johnson and Alex Rodriguez eventually left Seattle for other teams, Martínez played his entire 18-season career with the Mariners.

"Staying in Seattle ... was a combination of a great relationship with the organization and also with the fans," Martínez said at a press event in Seattle after the announcement of his impending induction. "It just felt right."

Known simply as "Edgar" by fans, Martínez spent most of his career as the team's designated hitter, earning a reputation for his clutch hitting. A seven-time All-Star and a two-time American League batting champion, Martínez hit over .300 in 10 of the 12 seasons from 1990 to 2001, ending his career with a .312 average.

In 1995, arguably his greatest season, Martínez led the American League in batting average (.356), and also in runs scored (121), doubles (52) and on-base percentage (.479).



In the divisional playoffs that season, Martínez batted in seven runs in Game 4 against the New York Yankees, and the following game hit the two-run double for the deciding score in extra innings to send the Mariners to their first American League Championship Series.

It's common for fans to say that Griffey saved baseball in the Pacific Northwest—with his glove, bat and charisma—at a time in the 1990s when the franchise was mulling possible moves to other cities. But if Griffey was the face of the franchise, Martínez was the heart ... consistent and powerful.

Martínez's connection to the fans deepened even further as his humility and pleasant nature were soon featured prominently on the team's annual promotional TV commercials.


So why did it take until his final ballot to

reach the required 75 percent of votes by the panel of baseball writers? Mostly, it was the customary devaluation of the contributions of designated hitters, such as Martínez, who don't play a defensive position.

An aggressive program by the Mariners' organization, stressing a set of advanced analytics, helped some reluctant baseball writers realize that Martínez's batting statistics compared favorably with many Hall of Fame icons such as Stan Musial, Ted Williams and Babe Ruth.

# Exploring the unexpected in three of Japan's enchanting locales By Chaney Kwak

The Land of the Rising Sun is full of surprises, whether you're on your first or hundredth visit.

From the latest tech and time-honored rituals to creative individuals and peaceful pocket neighborhoods, the international gateway of Tokyo delights visitors with its traditional and modern experiences alike.


To the southwest, the Seto Inland Sea islands are centers of artistic immersion, including a triennial festival that takes place this year, and feature bucolic scenery such as olive groves.

And in Sapporo, a city on the northern island of Hokkaido, visitors can explore underground art galleries and try ramens featuring local ingredients such as crab.

Here are three destinations in which to explore Japan's many unique wonders.









### TOKYO

For centuries, the Shinagawa ward has been many travelers' first impression of Tokyo. This southern part of Tokyo served as a shukuba machi (a post-station town, where travelers could rest and sleep) on the main road between Tokyo and Kyoto. Today, Shinkansen bullet trains call at Shinagawa Station, which is one of the world's 10 busiest train stations, located just north of the Shinagawa ward. At the station, direct trains to Haneda and Narita airports connect with the iconic Yamanote Line, which encircles Tokyo in an hour-long loop and includes popular stops such as Ueno Station, where visitors can walk to the Tokyo National Museum.


As I stand outside the train hub with my friend Noriko, I become part of a typical Tokyo tableau, office workers in suits hurrying past. A middle-age woman in a velvet wizard outfit, complete with a cone hat, shuffles a deck of tarot cards in a passageway linking hypermodern highrises. A sign at her table lists all the services she offers, such as palm reading, and Noriko offers to interpret into English for me. I'm not a believer in prophecies of any kind, but the juxtaposition of her outlandish outfit and the sleek setting gets me intrigued.

In the shadow of the office towers outside the Shinagawa station, the street oracle consults an ancient Japanese book of destinies and looks into my future, as determined by my birthday, for 2,000 yen, or about \$18. Around us, groups of visitors walk by on the way to nearby restaurants and bars.

Along with the constant energy of so many people, there's a sense of composure and order in this metropolis of



13 million. To experience two key aspects of Tokyo, stand in the middle of a busy station such as the one in Shinagawa, and watch the crowd swell. Then, head to one of the many quaint corners hidden in plain sight between the neon lights and gigantic skyscrapers. Spread over 845 square miles, the Japanese capital seems



> like a physical manifestation of time travel, with Zen gardens and traditional Shinto shrines sharing the same postal code with restaurants staffed by robots.

> My favorite among such old-fashioned pockets? The Yanaka, Nezu and Sendagi neighborhoods, collectively referred to as Yanesen. A 25-minute ride on the Yamanote loop takes me from the kinetic bustle of Shinagawa to Nippori Station, where Yanaka Ginza shopping street awaits. More than 50 vendors line both sides of the narrow alley, which is shorter than 200 yards. This is the kind of place where a store that sells only a dozen different kinds of rice can survive alongside tourist-pleasing snack stands.

> Niku no Suzuki, for instance, has been serving roasted pork, dumplings and mechi-katsu (meat cutlet deep-fried in panko crumbs) since 1933. There's also a shop that's been preparing and roasting its own green tea for more than 50 years.

Also in the Yanaka area, Isetatsu pro-

motes the art of origami with its brilliant assortment of woodblock-printed chiyogami paper. Still owned by the family that began selling fans from this same store in 1864, the paper shop is a refreshing reminder of our tactile past before our era of touch screens.

When I fold away the map and lose myself among the preserved alleyways, I find myself strolling past wooden homes and potted plants and bicycles left unlocked. This homey, quiet residential neighborhood provides a balance to the thrum of karaoke bars.

As for my Shinagawa oracle, she tells me a lot of things that may or may not come true. After the timer goes off, she invites me to flip one tarot card as a parting gift.

"It is safe for you to love," the card reads. "Open your heart and give and receive the highest energy of all."

One thing is for sure: I already did open my heart, to Tokyo.

The Tokyo Metropolitan Government Building, with its free 45th-floor observatory. • The iconic Shibuya Crossing, where an estimated 1,000 to 2,500 pedestrians cross during each walk signal. • The national park of Shinjuku Gyoen National Garden, an open-air park in the middle of the urban area. • The new Toyosu Fish Market (formerly the iconic Tsukiji Fish Market), which hosts the famous tuna auction in the wee hours of the morning.

### Where to go first if you're a ...

...Foodie: In the Nakameguro district, which lines a portion of the Meguro River, streets brim with izakaya (gastro pubs). ...History buff: Its origin dating to 628, Sensō-ji Temple is one of Tokyo's oldest temples. ...Family: Hop on the old-fashioned Toden Arakawa Line to the hands-on Paper Museum.

### Best time of year to visit:

April, when the cherry blossoms are in bloom.

### SETO INLAND SEA

Rows of gnarly olive trees spill down a steep hill by the sea. The late-afternoon sun warms my nape, and the dry breeze carries sticky residues of salt. I can almost pretend as if I were lounging on a Mediterranean island—except that next to the olive grove is a Buddhist temple.

This is Shodoshima, one of the islands in the Seto Inland Sea. With its relatively temperate climate year-round, Shodoshima has been quietly producing olives since 1908. Today, this island, also called Little Bean Island in reference to its traditional crop of soybeans, produces extravirgin olive oil, pickled olives and even olive-fed wagyu cattle.

The temple next to the olive grove is Chosho-ji, number 33 on the 88 pilgrimage sites of Shodoshima, which are threaded together with trails totaling about 93 miles. Some visitors take upward of a week to visit all the sites on foot, but I take a cab. The reason I'm here is more temporal: to eat and to look at contemporary art.

For lunch, I settle inside the chic minimalist space of Farm's Table Chuzaemon, a restaurant run by a cosmetic company that grows island olives for skin-care products. The restaurant puts a Spanish accent on Japanese ingredients, such as a paella of hamo (daggertooth pike conger), dotted with pickled olives and sashimi and served "carpaccio style," with a generous helping of local olive oil. The dish is rich but not greasy-a Japanese skill.

The downstairs store offers free olivepicking experiences to customers. A kindfaced store manager herds me and three Japanese visitors into a small van, and we drive past traditional homes with sloping eaves to a terraced farmland rising among mikan mandarin trees. The steep slopes maximize the exposure to sunshine, which might be why this Mediterranean



import flourished on Shodoshima.

Hand-picking olives, it turns out, can be oddly satisfying. Looking for the ripe ones feels a little like Where's Waldo, and the light snap I feel when I pluck these drupes off the branches keeps things viscerally fun.

"We're a developing country when it comes to olive oil," says the store manager—one of my Japanese cohorts on this excursion interprets for me. "But the quality has jumped in the last 10 years."

On the lot is a tree that's more than 70 years old. It looks gray, but younger trunks have begun sprouting from the same root. Japan is far from an ideal location for olive cultivation because typhoon season deprives the plants of sunlight while bringing too much water. Still, like this tree, the olive farmers of Shodoshima have been resilient for generations.

With a landmass just a little under 60 square miles, Shodoshima is the second largest of the 3,000-some islands—most of which are inhabited—that fill the Inland Sea. Delightfully rural and rugged, the sparse island of cliffs and rock formations jutting into the sea has 28,000 people. Its olives and temples draw visitors, and this year, there's all the more

reason to head to Shodoshima and its neighboring islets. Once every three years, the famous Setouchi Triennale art festival takes place on several islands as contemporary artists exhibit and install new works of art. In 2019, events and exhibitions will take place April 26 to May 26, July 19 to August 25 and September 28 to November 4, at the region's many venues for the arts. A 20-minute local ferry from Shodoshima, for instance, travels to neighboring Teshima, where the

her polka dot-covered sculptures.

### SAPPORO

Standing in Ganso Sapporo Ramen Yokocho, an alley barely wide enough for three





salarymen to walk side by side, I face a typical traveler decision: Where to eat?

What began in the mid-1900s as a cluster of half a dozen ramen spots has now grown to become a prime destination for noodle-soup lovers. Its claim to fame is as the originator of miso ramen: a perfect meal for the cool temperatures here in northern Japan. Given the abundance of options, I defer my dining decision while I explore the city.

Sapporo, the largest city on Japan's northernmost island of Hokkaido, is often

associated with ice sculptures and snow-fall. In 1972, Sapporo became the first city outside of Europe and North America to hold the Winter Olympic Games. So it may come as a surprise that the city is more than the sum of its ski jumps. With its galleries and hipster shops, the city has been compared to Portland, Oregon.

The median of the main odori (large street), which forms the mile-long Odori Park in the heart of the city, harbors a secret. Underneath this dozen-block park, you'll find the 500-meter Underground Walkway Gallery, which exhibits sculptures and paintings by emerging Japanese artists. I pass by an installation that shows mobile phones in various states of distress, with signs listing causes of demise; another nearby series of paintings features a man taking a picture with his phone of a painting portraying the exact

same image. The ironic works of art show how young artists are grappling with the self-referential nature of today's society.

After leaving the gallery, I make my way among fishmongers at the nearby Nijo Ichiba, a one-block public market. Giant crab legs are piled next to fresh catches from the surrounding seas. But even such a traditional setting is never far from urban accoutrements. Across the street from the market is a building designed to look like shipping containers haphazardly stacked on top of one another. The building contains coffee shops and clothing shops where teenagers exclaim "kawaii," or "cute," at each other's outfits.

For me, the most unexpected surprise arrives inside my ramen bowl. After walking back to Ganso Sapporo Ramen Yokocho, I randomly pick one of the many dozen-seat ramen shops without a sign in English. The ramen that is placed before me is a microcosm of some of the island's abundant ingredients: corn, crab and butter, the latter paying tribute to Hokkaido's status as Japan's dairy. Ramen is a humble dish in Sapporo, a quick, affordable meal that can bring locals and tourists together. But it's also a reminder that, like Japan itself, a surprising combination of the familiar and the unfamiliar can make a very satisfying experience. 🛪





I pull into a tiny parking lot next to the Carbon River, just inside the lightly trafficked northwest corner of Mount Rainier National Park in Western Washington. I can't see the 14,410-foot mountain from here, but a short bike ride and hike will take care of that in less than two hours. I enjoy the burble of the river as I set out pedaling under a thick canopy of evergreens, knowing that I'm heading toward a view of Mount Rainier that many visitors never see.

I've watched the morning light cast golden rays across Mount Rainier from Sunrise. I've hiked from Paradise through colorful fields of wildflowers growing beneath the icy giant. These are some of Mount Rainier National Park's iconic postcard settings that every visitor should experience.

But Mount Rainier, like other national parks and monuments, has plenty of additional wonderful sites—places that might be a highlight of your trip, as you access different perspectives.


The Carbon River area, which I call the


park's back door, is where I go to find unique angles of Mount Rainier. Chenuis and Ipsut falls are two worthy destinations in the area. Respective roundtrips of 7.8 miles and about 10 miles take you to these beautiful falls, which are both rolling flows that emit soothing sounds of water emptying into small pools.

A 9.6-mile adventure leads you past the more-than-100-foot Ranger Falls to Green Lake, which lives up to its name as its clear waters reflect Western hemlock.

"It is really too bad more people don't visit the Carbon River area," says Kevin Bacher, the park's volunteer outreach coordinator. "It's so beautiful."

Today, an approximately 17-mile roundtrip (roughly 10 miles of pedaling and 7 miles of hiking) will take me past the toe of Carbon Glacier, the lowest glacier in the contiguous United States. I set out on Carbon River Road, which was classified as a trail open to hikers and bicyclists after being damaged in a 2006 flood.





After about 5 miles of biking along Carbon River Road, I leave my bicycle at Ipsut Camp by the Carbon River trailhead and continue on foot.

Roughly 3 miles later, a quick side trip across a suspension bridge gives me my first view of the glacier, and then I return to the trail and follow it uphill for about a half-mile, to a view of Mount Rainier's regal peak appearing above the ridge.

I see icy seracs hanging over Willis Wall—the most imposing of Mount Rainier's many faces. In the foreground, Carbon Glacier backs the 30-mile Carbon River. As I sit on a rock and eat my sandwich, it's hard to say what's really the trip's highlight: the park's star or all the unsung cameos.

Read on for more great experiences you can enjoy in Western parks and monuments.

### APE CAVE AT MOUNT ST. HELENS


A visit to the Johnston Ridge Observatory at Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument in Washington puts you in the 1980 blast zone, where you can see vegetation slowly reclaiming terrain that still looks like the surface of the moon. Visitors marvel at the sight of a once symmetrical stratovolcano, torn apart by the eruption, and a lava dome inside the gaping crater.

Named the nation's first national volcanic monument in 1982, Mount St. Helens has long been shaped by volcanic activity. In fact, one of the monument's interesting features formed about 2,000 years ago, when an eruption sent glowing lava flowing into and through a stream drainage. The lava cooled on the surface and sides, and when the flow halted after about a year, it left behind a cave.

Today, the nearly 2.5-mile Ape Cave is believed to be the third-longest lava tube in North America. Located on the forested south side of Mount St. Helens, the cave gives visitors an underworldly adventure. Descend a staircase into the cave, then take a 0.75-mile (each way) easy walk in the lower cave, or make the more challenging 1.5-mile hike to the end of the upper cave, where you'll ascend a ladder to the surface and hike a trail back to the parking lot. Or simply peer into the subterranean setting from the steps at the cave's entrance.

There's no light in the cave, so the U.S. Forest Service recommends carrying three sources of light and extra batteries. Rangers also recommend sturdy shoes, warm clothing—it's 42 degrees yearround in the cave—lightweight gloves with good grip, and checking in prior to any visit at the Ape Headquarters Center for information on the cave's latest conditions and safety notices.

While some might tell you Ape Cave is home to Bigfoot, the creature's address remains unlisted. The cave's name comes from the Mount St. Helens Apes, a youth group that explored the cave in the 1950s.

### **BIKING IN** YELLOW-STONE

Landmarks such as Old Faithful and the Grand Prismatic Spring, colorful as a rainbow, are sights to behold in Yellowstone National Park. And indeed, more than 4 million visitors come to the United States' first national park

each year to see these geothermal wonders in person.

But sometimes the journey is as meaningful as the destination, and that's why one of my favorite ways to experience Yellowstone is on my bicycle. I recommend riding in the spring and fall, when

most park roads are closed to public motorized vehicles but open to bicycles.

The spring riding window usually starts in April as workers begin removing snow from the road. In the fall, the roads typically close to motorists in early November, but bikes are allowed until snowplow operations end (usually the third week of November). Rangers note that conditions can vary, and it's safest to ride with a buddy or group.

Experienced cyclists recommend arriving at West Yellowstone, about 90 miles south of Bozeman, Montana. From West Yellowstone, the most ambitious riders can make it about 50 miles to Mammoth Hot Springs and enjoy the thermal area's mystique. But if you don't have a century-ride in your legs (or a

second car to park at Mammoth Hot Springs), ride about 20 miles (40 miles roundtrip) from West Yellowstone to Gibbon Falls, an 84-foot waterfall that rushes over remnants of the Yellowstone Caldera rim. From the South Entrance, a 40-mile roundtrip takes you to the west thumb of Yellowstone Lake, where hot springs border the shore.

### SEEING GREEN AT CRATER LAKE

The Watchman overlook, with a view fronted by the Wizard Island volcanic cinder cone, is a heavenly scene that attracts many visitors to Crater Lake National Park, about 70 miles northeast of Medford, Oregon. Standing here, you're bound to find yourself immersed in blue, from the sky above to the deep caldera lake below. But seasonal volunteer park ranger Larry Smith urges visitors to look for another dominant color: green.

To the west, the dark greens of mountain hemlocks and lighter greens of lodgepole pines are part of a mosaic stretching toward the horizon.

Smith, who is a co-author of a chronological history of Crater Lake National Park with his twin brother, Lloyd, says visitors are treated to different forest zones in the park. There are more than a dozen types of coniferous species, creating a verdant landscape worth exploring.

The trees you see and the order in which you see them depends on your arrival point. Arrive from the south (from Medford), for example, and you'll travel past ponderosa pines, identified by their orangey bark and bright-green needles. Next, at about 5,000 feet, notice dense stands of thin lodgepole pines. Climb another 1,000 feet and the dominant species is mountain hemlock, which has a droopy top, thin branches and short needles. By the time you reach the crater rim, find small, twisted whitebark pine—durable trees capable of surviving the high winds and snow above 7,500 feet.

DIFFERENT VIEWS

"It's quite a variety," Smith says. "I think it's an interesting experience for visitors."

### PHOTO TIPS IN ARCHES

One of the most stunning photo ops at Arches National Park is as rare as Utah's high desert rain, says Bret Edge, a photog-

rapher from nearby Moab, Utah.

Edge, who wrote The Ultimate Guide to Photographing Arches National Park, loves recommending that visitors head to the park after it rains, when water fills potholes in the red sandstone. He follows his own advice about twice per month.

In addition to visiting Delicate Arch, the 46-foot-high freestanding structure that's arguably Utah's most famous landmark, Edge recommends stopping at the Courthouse Towers viewpoint. After a rainstorm, photographers can make images of giant towers and monoliths such as Three Gossips, The Organ and The Tower of Babel reflected in pools of water. Whether taking pictures with your phone or with a more extensive setup, reflections allow you to compose images that are striking and surprising, considering the arid landscape, Edge says.

But how do you know where and when to go? Several parks, including Arches,

have guides to help everybody, from expert photogs to recreational Instagrammers, know when, where and how to make special images. Park websites also often offer contact information for photo tour concessionaires.

"It's something most people might not think about when they visit a national park," Edge says, "but, as a photographer, it's really helpful to have tips from somebody who's familiar with the park."

### **GOLFING AND SKIING** AT YOSEMITE

As if El Capitan wasn't already famous enough, it recently went Hollywood. The 3,000-foot rock wall in California's Yosemite National Park was the setting for Free Solo, a documentary about Alex Honnold's successful attempt to become the first person to climb the wall without using ropes or other safety equipment.



The film won the Oscar this year for best documentary feature and is likely to inspire even more people to visit one of the nation's most popular national parks.

Yet there was a time when natural wonders such as El Capitan were only part of what drew people to national parks. Features such as golf courses and ski areas within parks also helped attract visitors. Many of these amenities have long since been removed, as people started to think differently about national parks, says Jamie Richards, public affairs officer for Yosemite, but some remain.

For instance, Washington's Olympic National Park is one that still operates a ski area. And National Park Service lands with golf courses include Rock Creek Park in Washington, D.C., and the Cape Cod National Seashore in Massachusetts.

There are also golf courses on inholdings (surrounded by national park land) in California's Death Valley National Park and Golden Gate National Recreation Area.

Yosemite offers skiing and golf. The Yosemite Ski and Snowboard Area (formerly Badger Pass) opened in the 1930s and has five lifts and 10 runs, with 85 percent of the terrain classified as beginner or intermediate. Big Trees Golf Course, operating May 10–Oct. 20, first opened in 1918 in the Wawona Valley, 14 years before the area was added to Yosemite National Park.

The varied terrain of the par-35, 3,050-yard, nine-hole course is challenging for golfers. And the grounds crew helps keep the course environmentally friendly by using reclaimed water and not using pesticides. At an elevation of 4,000 feet

and surrounded by forest, your gallery might include birds, deer or even bears.

### CAVES IN GRAND CANYON

Most of the more than 6 million annual visitors to Grand Canyon National Park in northern Arizona explore the South Rim. Here, they are often overwhelmed by the immensity of the mile-deep, 277-rivermiles-long wonder that is the Grand Canyon, which is celebrating its centennial as a national park this year. Shuttle trips take visitors to scenic overlooks, as well as shops, restaurants and campgrounds. Visible layers of limestone, sandstone and shale form the canyon's steep red walls.

Hidden amid the canyon's beauty are an estimated 1,000 caves. Some caves were locations of Native American settle-

ments, and scientists have discovered prehistoric artifacts, fossils of extinct animals and mineral formations. Endangered California condors sometimes nest in the caves.



"A lot of people come to Grand Canyon and don't realize that our caves are a world-class resource in their own right," says ranger Emily Davis.

About a third of the canyon's estimated caves have been recorded (most are located on sheer cliffs), and one, the Cave of the Domes on Horseshoe Mesa, is open for visitors. Reaching the cave means taking a nearly 8-mile roundtrip hike from the South Rim on the Grandview Trail and descending about 2,600 vertical feet—an elevation that must then be climbed on the way back to the rim.

The trip is not for novices. Visitors should check in at the backcountry office before heading out, and bring a light source (plus extra batteries), says Davis, who also advises that it is always best to have a hiking companion.





The dry cave has several rooms and passageways. Most have enough room to stand, but some require crouching or crawling. "You can spend a good part of the day exploring the cave," Davis says.

In the cave, you can see inscriptions from before Grand Canyon was declared a national park. Don't add your name to historical graffiti, Davis says. "Cave of the Domes is a fun place to explore," she says, "but, if you go, please take care of it."

While many visitors might not be aware of Grand Canyon's caves, these caves are a good reminder that no matter what iconic landmark motivated your trip to a national park or monument, there's always more to discover.

Did you know you can enter a national park as a wide-eyed

visitor and leave as a badge-toting ranger? Most national parks offer a Junior Ranger Program geared toward children 5 to 13 but open to guests of all ages. Swing by a visitor center and get a workbook with a series of activities to complete around the park. You might be asked to walk a path, finish a puzzle or visit a scenic overlook.

When the tasks are finished, return to a visitor center to go over the

answers with a ranger, who will then swear you in as a junior ranger and present you with a plastic badge.

Some parks also offer ranger programs geared toward teens and adults.

Nutshell: When the two courses at Indian Wells were reimagined more than a decade ago, they quickly became must-plays, with a clubhouse, restaurant and pro shop to match. Walk the property, admire the surroundings and remember that this is a city-owned facility.

Snapshot: Designer John Fought doesn't demand so much as suggest or, better yet, invite options off the tee on many holes, with bailouts away from lakes, bunkers and waste areas that then require longer approaches. For big hitters up to taking on the challenges, the reward is a shorter route home.

Play It: The 18th hole is a gut check 400-plus-yard par 4 that plays dead straight off the tee-and don't we all like to visualize the perfect ball flight for a drive? You play to a green guarded by a large waste area to the front and right and bunkers behind.

## ARIZONA

## Papago Golf Course

Nutshell: The Papago remodel is now complete. A previous redo 10 years ago rebuilt the greens and fairways. Recently,



the course added a new clubhouse and event pavilion and upgraded its practice facilities. The results are awesome.

Snapshot: Papago jumps out for its playability. Stretched out, it's toothy enough to serve as the home course for Arizona State University, but it's also a public course we can all play. Enjoy its wide corridors, movement on most every hole, big, receptive greens, and views of the rich red Papago Buttes.

Play It: The new clubhouse, the addition of Lou's Bar & Grill, and the repurposing of the practice facilities have made the indoor/outdoor entertaining spaces and practice amenities on par with the course. The changes pay heed to the fact that golf, above all else, is a social endeavor.

## Wickenburg Ranch Golf



Nutshell: Located about 60 miles northwest of downtown Phoenix, the small town of Wickenburg once billed itself as the "Dude Ranch Capital of the World." Wickenburg Ranch still offers the cowboy vibe, blending a modern golf-resort lifestyle with the area's Western heritage.

Snapshot: Big Wick is Wickenburg Ranch's burly bruiser of an 18-hole layout, tearing through and over the arroyos and ridges that make up the local topography. What puts the course at the vanguard is that every shot is meaningful, even for those playing from the shorter tees.

Play It: I think the nine-hole, par-3 Li'l Wick course is one of the best things to hit our game in a long time. The short-iron haven boasts lights on the putting green and four holes for night play, music wafting throughout the course, and The Watering Hole bar and grill located on an island in the middle of the course.





## HAWAII

## Kapalua Golf—Bay Course

Nutshell: When your sibling is the Plantation Course, host of the PGA Tour's



Sentry Tournament of Champions each January, it's understandable if you might not get the credit you deserve. That is about to change. With Plantation shuttered this year for cosmetic surgery, Bay will be carrying the spotlight.

Snapshot: By some measures, the Bay Course is a more notable play for a wider range of players than its famous relative up the hill. What it lacks in Plantation's roller-coaster thrills, Bay makes up for with its friendlier nature, and a recent resequencing of the holes has put the best eye candy at the end of the round.


Play It: The 17th hole is a quintessentially Hawaiian over-a-surging-blue-cove par 3. It requires at most a mid-iron—and an effort at keen focus-to hit the green from the skill-appropriate tees.

### Wailea Golf Club—Gold Course

Wailea, Maui, HI waileagolf.com

Nutshell: Wailea delivers its prototypical Hawaiian golf aesthetic from an elevated location that offers water views and that provides great flow and movement.

Snapshot: With three courses, Wailea demands a decision, unless you're lucky enough to be in South Maui for three straight days of play (yes, you should). If



you have to pick one course, go for the Gold, which is the beefier test, with its swoops, uneven lies and heaving greens. Play It: The Gold Course offers a breathtaking par 3, the 154-yard eighth hole. Play it from the white tees, the ones most of us should be playing when we park our egos. This angle offers the full sweep of Pacific blue—as opposed to the heroic shot one must play from the farther-back tees-with Molokini, a partially submerged volcanic crater, and Kaho'olawe Island in view.

## OREGON

## Crosswater Club

Sunriver, OR

Nutshell: My favorite course in Oregon. That doesn't mean I don't love Bandon Dunes or Brasada Ranch or Pumpkin Ridge or Tokatee. Crosswater simply touches all my happy buttons. And there's an eagle's nest on No. 13.

Snapshot: Crosswater spreads out like golf on a walkabout, strolling through 600 acres, laced by two rivers, and with enough lakes and seasonal wetlands to qualify as a stopover on the Pacific Flyway, and all with volcanic peaks as a backdrop.

Play It: My pick is No. 4, a midlength par 4 that favors a hybrid or long iron off the tee and leads to a horseshoe of a green that is surrounded by marshland.

## River's Edge Golf Course



Butte on the north side of town, with several holes etched above the Deschutes River and framed in pines and lava outcroppings.

Play It: The 16th hole is a severe downhill par 3 (177 yards from the white tees), requiring two less clubs for the length. The Smith Rocks formation is the longrange backdrop. Be sure to swing for the left side of the putting surface.

## IDAHO

## Circling Raven Golf Club

Nutshell: You're hiking through a forest and come across an open area of grasses and flowers, guarded by conifers and hardwoods, tickled by a stream, and with a forever sky above: that's a glade. That's Circling Raven. You feel this place as much as play it.

Snapshot: When the game is played amid the enlightened routing, limitless horizons, and twists and teases of a place such as Circling Raven, the environment makes golf the pleasure it can be.

Play It: Opening holes don't usually get a lot of cheer. However, at Circling Raven, the wetland doglegging par-5 first hole

sets the stage beautifully and gives a

preview of the journey to come.

## ► The Coeur d'Alene Resort Golf Course

Nutshell: OK, yes, there's the justly famous floating island green on the par-3 14th hole. It's fun; it's novel; it's iconic; and I once four-putted it. Still, it's only a small part of the allure of this highly commendable track that offers a lake view on nearly every hole.

Snapshot: The takeaway from the first visit to Coeur d'Alene is the flawless service, and the course conditioning is superb. Then you get to bat your ball over crests, through pine-clad alleys and across broad corridors to the lake's edge. Play It: The par-3 fifth hole. While not the most famous par 3 on the course, the fifth offers a different kind of aesthetic. The downhiller requires a wee wedge from an

That should help make the course a better play.

Snapshot: Copywriters on this side of the "pond" like to wax poetic about every course without a tree and in sight of salt water being a links course. OK, this course has one tree, but it still fits the links bill nicely. Don't be afraid to play the ball low and use the contours.

Play It: The 12th hole is a short, drivable, uphill par 4, with an obscured and undulating green that, in the past, played so slick, it resembled a skate park.

## Wine Valley Golf Club

Walla Walla, WA winevalleygolfclub.com


Nutshell: As a desert/coastal guy who hails from the west-of-the-Sierras/Cascades world, I am mesmerized by the rolling hills of Eastern Washington. For years I thought the Walla Walla Valley was a great place to build a top-notch public golf course, and in 2005, my dream came true with the opening of Wine Valley.

Snapshot: Take an inland "sea" of wind-tussled golden waves of grain rising and cresting to the horizon. Now slip in a golf course; edge it with native grasses; incise it with sandy hollows and arroyos; water it green; and mow it low and fast.

Play It: No. 15 shows that a par 5 need not be Pacific Crest Trail long to be notable.







## **GREG NORMAN'S** RANCHO SAN LUCAS **COURSE TAKES SHAPE**

New courses are rare these days. However, there is one new layout near the tip of the Baja Peninsula that is gaining plenty of attention: Rancho San Lucas Golf Club (ranchosanlucas.com).

Designed by Greg Norman and located in the heart of a residential and resort enclave of the same name, just west of Cabo San Lucas, the Rancho San Lucas course stretches from the Pacific shore through ambling dunescape to arroyo-covered heights.



The move is a unique approach to using a traditional architectural and playing feature usually not seen in a warm and dry location.

Rancho San Lucas is slated to open for play at the end of this year. -K.V.V.

# The Past is Present

## Standing atop a sandstone hill in Cabrillo National

Monument on the Point Loma Peninsula, west of downtown San Diego, I breathe in salty ocean air. I watch frothy waves roaring onto shore, and look down at tide pool areas harboring creatures such as tan-and-white owl limpets, green sea anemones and pink nudibranchs. Perhaps these same species were viewed by Juan Rodríguez Cabrillo in 1542 when, as an explorer for Spain, he came ashore on the peninsula, making him the first person from a European ocean expedition to step onto what became the state of California.

Cabrillo's landing set the stage for additional Spanish exploration in the 16th and 17th centuries, followed in the 18th century by Spanish settlement. When I gaze inland from Cabrillo National Monument, I can see a vast range of traditional Native Kumeyaay lands, including the hilly area above the San Diego River where, in 1769, an expedition from New Spain (Mexico), led by Franciscan priest Junípero Serra and military officer Gaspar de Portolá, founded a fort and mission. Their establishment of the settlement 250 years ago has been called the moment that modern San Diego was born. It also is believed to represent the first permanent European settlement in the part of North America that is now California.

As San Diego commemorates the 250th anniversary of the Spanish settlement, this is an opportune time

to explore some of the fascinating historical sites that have helped to make San Diego the internationally known destination it is today. To that end, I'm enjoying an itinerary that spotlights several history-themed locations, including Presidio Park, Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá, Old Town and Balboa Park.

The Presidio and Mission The site where the Serra/Portolá group first settled is now an 18-acre National Historic Landmark on

Presidio Hill, which is part of the approximately 50-acre Presidio Park, created in the early 1900s. While no structures from the original fort and mission remain, grass-covered mounds mark spots where original presidio buildings were located.

As I walk along the park's present-day lush green grass and amid dozens of species of trees, including fragrant eucalyptus and California incense cedars, I imagine the hilltop as it was during its presidio years.

A 1772 mission report, drafted by a priest to provide



## The Presidio

The Junípero Serra Museum is located on a hill where a 1769 fort and mission became the first permanent European settlement in San Diego.

> to his superiors, described a chapel constructed with poles and roofed with tules, rooms constructed with adobe and wood for missionaries, two bronze cannons, and livestock ranging from cattle and sheep to horses and pack mules, according to militarymuseum.org.

A main park attraction is the 1929 Mission-style Junípero Serra Museum, which will be closed April 15-July 15 for the creation of new exhibitions focused on people who have lived along the San Diego River. The new exhibits will include a virtual-reality re-creation of the presidio, based on archaeological data, and of a Kumeyaay village that was located at the base of what became Presidio Hill. Today, Kumeyaay people provide their perspective on their ancestral homelands and area history via websites such as kumeyaay.com and museums such as the Barona Cultural Center & Museum and the Sycuan Cultural Resource Center and Museum.

I travel to another hilltop, about 6 miles east of Pres-


idio Park, to visit Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá, which displays representative Kumeyaay 'ewaa: housing made with flexible new branches from plants such as willow and sycamore. This mission site dates to 1774, when the mission part of the original Serra/Portolá settlement was moved to this hill, which had a better water supply from the San Diego River, and more fertile soil for crops. This location is believed to be where some of the first olive trees in California were cultivated.

I stroll to the front of the mission church (the fifth to be located on this hill), which was built in 1931 and features Spanish-style architecture, complemented by groomed gardens. Some of the five bronze bells in the nearly 50-foot-tall campanario are in motion, and I stop, enchanted, as they seem to joyfully ring. The bells that have crowns were cast in a Spanish royal foundry, while the large bottom-right bell was recast in 1894 with what were believed to be fragments of the original

late-1700s mission bells. Over the years, the mission's bells have been used to announce everything from siesta time to the arrival of guests.

## Old Town

## The smell of fresh tortillas fills the air, along with the

music of mariachi musicians, as I stroll down Old Town's San Diego Avenue. Restaurants such as Cafe Coyote that serve authentic Mexican food have skilled señoras hand rolling tortillas at stands along the sidewalk. The dough is patted by hand into a round shape, then rolled into a thin circle and placed on a heated cast-iron surface. What comes off the grill are soft tortillas that are used for fantastic dishes such as tacos filled with meat, cilantro, guacamole and salsa.

The area now called Old Town was founded in the early 1800s as Spanish soldiers moved down from Presidio Hill to develop the plain below, and were joined by settlers, including cowboys and traders, from around the world. The present-day Old Town features more than 30 restaurants, dozens of unique shops, several hotels, and numerous museums and historical buildings, such as the mid-1800s Whaley House Museum house/theater/courthouse/store. Whaley House is said to be haunted, and as I savor my two excellent tacos at Cafe Coyote, the person next to me shares that when he toured Whaley House, he felt something tickle his hand while he was alone in the dining room.

Perhaps a famed Cafe Coyote margarita with tequila would chase his shivers away, or a mezcal at the nearby Tahona Bar & Tasting Room. I decide to cap my own Old Town visit at Tahona, whose mission is "to educate and give reverence to the complexity and beauty of the Mexican culture through its most iconic beverage,

mezcal. ..." I'm enthralled as I sip one of the smoky spirits and learn about the mezcals of different Mexican regions from a mezcal sommelier.

## Balboa Park After the Panama Canal was completed in 1914,

San Diego became the first major U.S. destina-

tion for ships traveling to the West Coast via the new passageway. In celebration of this distinction, the city organized the 1915–1916 Panama-California Exposition, an event that also marked San Diego's arrival on the world stage, at a park north of downtown.

I enter 1,200-acre Balboa Park from the west, walking along the 1,500-foot-long, 125-foot-tall Cabrillo Bridge, which was built for the exposition and resembles a Roman aqueduct. Soon I come to an impressive cathedral-like building that houses one

of the park's 17 museums: the Museum of Man. Museum exhibits spotlight cultural-anthropology themes ranging from "Maya: Heart of Sky, Heart of Earth" to "Kumeyaay: Native Californians." The Museum of Man complex also includes the spectacular 198-foot-tall California Tower, built in a variety of architectural styles, from Baroque to Rococo

to Gothic, for the Panama-California Exposition.

Continuing east to Park
Boulevard, I think about
the exhibits of animals that
lined a section of this road
during the exposition. The
animals were subsequently
left behind by the company
that had been in charge of

the exhibits, and the city had been forced to take over their care. In September 1916, as local physician Dr. Harry Wegeforth was driving past Balboa Park with his brother, he heard a lion roar, and he said, "Wouldn't it be splendid if San Diego had a zoo! You know ... I think I'll start one." The very next month, Wegeforth and his brother collaborated with others to found the Zoological Society of San Diego. The society took over care of

the exhibit animals and secured the land in Balboa Park that would become the San Diego Zoo.

Now the zoo, whose partners include Alaska Airlines, is home to more than 3,500 rare and endangered ani-

mals. On my visit, I particularly enjoy the "Africa Rocks" section, completed in 2017, which spotlights animals ranging from bee-eaters to lemurs and leopards. I'm fascinated as one of the "Africa Rocks" silver-maned hamadryas baboons appears to mediate an altercation between his sons when big brother won't stop harassing little bro.

Animal species that found a home in the original zoo are still here, as well, including bears, monkeys, wolves and lions, and visitors can get deeper insight into some of these species through special "Upgraded Experiences" such as "Inside Look Tours."



## "THERE'S ONE, OVER THERE,"

my young daughter Shea shouted excitedly, pointing beyond jagged cliffs toward a cerulean stretch of ocean. She and I were ascending the upper half of the paved path known as the Makapu'u Point Lighthouse Trail, at Kaiwi State Scenic Shoreline, and she had just spotted her first humpback whale. "There's a baby next to it, too!" she said.

For the rest of our roughly 2-mile roundtrip hike, my daughter's glee was apparent as she animatedly-and repeatedlydescribed the thrill of witnessing mother and calf break the water's surface together. It was mid-spring on O'ahu, so before the hike, we had been unsure if we'd spot any of the North Pacific humpbacks that can sometimes be seen off the point (whale-watching season here typically runs from November through May, with the best viewing between January and March). Yet luck was with us that day.

And the hike delivered even more than this glimpse of the majestic sea creatures that migrate here each year to breed and give birth in Hawaiian waters. Perched near the easternmost point of the island of O'ahu, we were also rewarded with a picturesque vista that included the stunning Kaiwi coastline and the dormant volcanic outcroppings of Koko Head and Diamond Head, farther in the distance. At the trail's summit, we

Hawaiʻi Seasonal Cuisine Chef de Cuisine Alvin Savella were treated to views of the red-roofed Makapu'u Point Lighthouse; the azure sea; the volcanic islets Mānana Island and Kāohikaipu Island; and a gorgeous coastline that stretched northwest to the windward town of Kailua and beyond. It was a good day in Hawai'i.

My family ('ohana, in Hawaiian) experienced countless magical moments such as the one on the Makapu'u Point Lighthouse Trail during the 10-plus years Shea and her older brother, Finnegan, spent growing up in Hawai'i. Our children and their friends, now teenagers, played together on the terraced slopes of extinct volcanoes, swung from the aerial roots of magnificent banyan trees, hiked to rainforest waterfalls, and came of age in the endless waves lapping at Hawai'i's shorelines.

Families with keiki (children) of all ages can enjoy many experiences cherished by Hawai'i residents—on each of the most-visited Hawaiian Islands. Here's a primer to get you started on planning your family trip to the Aloha State.

## O'AHU

Known as "The Gathering Place," Oʻahu is home to about 75 percent of Hawai'i's

residents and has much to offer. You might be interested in historical sites, such as the Hawaiian royal residence 'Iolani Palace, the World War II Valor in the Pacific National Monument at Pearl Harbor (check ahead about access), and the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific, within Punchbowl volcanic crater. Or you might prefer the luxury shopping at Ala Moana Center, International Market Place and shops along Waikīkī's Kalākaua Avenue. And then there are the epic beaches: The island's many miles of shoreline include world-famous Waikīkī Beach, the surfing-dominated North Shore, and the scenic northeast-facing windward coast. The beaches of Hawai'i-with the endur-

ing allure of sandcastle building, wave chasing and bodyboarding-are likely the greatest attractions throughout the state.

Hanauma Bay Nature Preserve, a marine-life sanctuary located on the southeast coast within the remnants of a volcanic cone, hosts close to a million guests each year on its idyllic beach. The preserve, which closes on Tuesdays, provides a limited number of parking stalls that fill quickly each morning. Many visitors take a bus from Waikīkī or arrange drop-off and pickup with a tour company.

"I had never been snorkeling in my life, and I wanted to take the kids on an adventure they would remember," says Keith Milligan, who hired the Honolulu-based company Snorkelfest to transport him and his two young children from their Waikīkī hotel to Hanauma Bay, while his wife was at a conference. The company provided the family with rental snorkels, fins, masks and GoPro underwater cameras.

"Once we were comfortable in the water, we started seeing marine life and taking photos," says Milligan, who, with his children, encountered colorful convict tangs, surgeonfish, parrotfish and the state fish of Hawai'i, humuhumunukunukuāpua'a (reef triggerfish). "I looked

Maui, Hawai'i www.kbhmaui.com 1-800-262-8450 • • • • over at my daughter and saw through her mask that her eyes were wide open, and she held two thumbs up. With her, two thumbs up is as good as it gets. The kids will never forget that day. They were so amazed by all of it."

Along with beaches, hikes are another draw. On O'ahu, many trails are great for families, depending on children's ages and level of physical fitness. My daughter still likes to boast that she completed 90 percent of the iconic Diamond Head State Monument summit hike (1.6 miles round-trip, 560-foot elevation gain) on her own two feet a month before her third birthday, and only needed to be carried near the top. Another favorite was the Mānoa Falls Trail, an out-and-back forested hike of about 1.5 miles to a marvelous cascade.

Near the Mānoa Falls trailhead are the Lyon Arboretum trails, in a rainforest research area administered by the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. This set of trails features an assortment of tropical plants and flowers, and includes a short hike to the charming 'Aihualama Falls. Hawai'i's hiking trails get muddy (read: slippery) after rainfalls, so closed-toe footwear is recommended for safety.

Active families visiting Honolulu might consider renting a turquoise Biki bicycle from one of the self-service locations around town (helmets are available for purchase at Biki HQ in the Kaka'ako area and for rent at Bikeadelic Hawaii). Simply check out a bike using your cellphone, and return it to any other self-service station near your destination. Need a little more oomph? The electric bikes at Pedego Waikiki provide the thrill of a traditional bicycle with an electric boost that helps you tackle challenging inclines. The company caters to families, via bicycles built for two and single bikes with child seats attached. Helmets and locks are included with every rental, so you can stop along the way to rest, fuel up on food or play.

Seeking indoor activities? Consider the Science Adventure Center, which focuses



on interactive natural science exhibits, and the J. Watumull Planetarium, both at the Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum. The museum has some of the world's finest exhibits devoted to the cultural history of Hawaii and other Pacific Islands. Waikīkī Aquarium, next to Waikīkī Beach, showcases vibrant Pacific marine life. And the Hawaii Children's Discovery Center has hands-on activities for young children.

A 25-mile drive west of Waikīkī is
Aulani, A Disney Resort & Spa. This Oʻahu
destination enthralls families from around
the world with its impressive pools and
waterslides, expansive grounds, and
Aunty's Beach House kids' activity club,
which provides on-site child care while
parents enjoy time alone. Visitors not
staying overnight at the resort can sample
the Aulani experience by attending the

public Ka Waʻa Lūʻau, held on Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday evenings on the resort's Hālāwai Lawn. Reservations are required for Aulani activities.

## MAU

 $Maui\ n\bar{o}\ ka\ oi.$  That's what locals say, and it translates as "Maui is the best." Thrill-seekers and beach loungers alike can find something to entertain and charm them on the "Valley Isle" of Maui.

The dormant volcano Haleakalā, Maui's highest peak, rises to an elevation of 10,023 feet within Haleakalā National Park. The park's 33,000 acres—24,000 of which are designated wilderness—offer hiking, stargazing and backpacking, as well as a popular place to watch the sun rise—Haleakalā means "house of the

sun." A reservation is required for each vehicle entering the park between 3 a.m. and 7 a.m. Reservations can be made up to 60 days in advance at recreation.gov. If you plan to include a Haleakalā sunrise on your itinerary, pack warm clothing for the cold early mornings. Reservations are not required for sunsets.

Maui Ocean Center, in the Mā'alaea area, provides an engaging educational outing for families eager to learn more about the vibrant world beneath the ocean's surface. With outdoor tide pools, a 750,000-gallon "Open Ocean" exhibit with a clear tunnel you can walk through, and 20 daily educational presentations, the engaging aquarium provides something of interest for visitors of all ages.

Older children who are comfortable in the ocean and wish to see marine animals in their natural habitat may enjoy a snorkeling tour with their parents (from one of several local operators) to Molokini Crater, off Maui's southwest coast. The crescent shape of the islet helps protect snorkelers and scuba divers from currents.

To view marine life at depth, without getting wet, families can join a submarine tour run by Atlantis Adventures. These fascinating trips depart from the town of Lahaina (the company also runs tours from Oʻahu and Hawaiʻi Island).

In Lahaina's Front Street neighborhood, daytime visitors enjoy art galleries and boutique shops, while a vibrant scene comes alive at night. One of the town's main attractions is the Lahaina Banyan Tree. Planted in 1873 when it was only 8 feet tall, the tree has grown to more than 60 feet and has added 16 major trunks with roots that grow down from above. It shades nearly two-thirds of an acre of the

town's courthouse square—perfect for little ones to enjoy while eating an ice cream cone.

Ali'i Kula Lavender, a 13.5-acre working lavender farm in the Upcountry Maui town of Kula, on the slopes of Haleakalā, grows 55,000 lavender plants, which are used to make fragrant products suited for everything from the bathroom to the nursery. The company has daily guided tours of the farm in an open-roof, limousinestyle, five-passenger vehicle (children under 5 are free). The farm also has a selfguided treasure hunt (maps provided).

"Kids can seek out locations on our farm and mark them each with a stamp," explains Ali'i Kula Lavender spokesperson Sarah Adams. "Anyone able to gather all the stamps to complete the treasure hunt wins a small prize in our farm's gift shop."

## KAUAT

The oldest of the islands in the Hawaiian archipelago, Kaua'i has a peaceful charm, verdant topography and relaxed atmosphere. There is much to appeal to families on the laid-back "Garden Island."

If you're on Kaua'i's North Shore, be sure to dish up some coolness at Wishing Well Shave Ice. Located in Hanalei Town, not far from an entrance to Waioli Beach Park, the small business is owned by childhood best friends Jesse Merle Jones and Aamion Goodwin (the latter of whom you may have seen traversing the globe with his wife and young children in the 2016 surf/travel documentary *Given*.)

Wishing Well's Tropical Bliss shave ice is their most popular menu selection. It is sweetened with organic fresh passion fruit and coconut syrups, served atop macadamia-nut ice cream, and covered with locally sourced fresh papaya and shredded coconut.

"We make our syrups in-house with local fruits that are in season," explains Goodwin. "Each unique flavor brings you a new fresh taste of Hawai'i."

The slogan at Wishing Well Shave Ice is "Slow Yourself Down," which could serve as the motto for the island of Kaua'i.


"Get outside as much as possible," recommends Goodwin to Kaua'i visitors. "Spend less time in the car and more time at the beach. Try not to have too much of an agenda, and all will unfold nicely."

Beach lovers typically flock to Poipu Beach Park, on Kaua'i's south shore, one of the sunniest parts of the island. A family-friendly, generally calm spot for swimming, snorkeling, bodyboarding and tide pooling, the reef-protected beach also shelters honu (green sea turtles). State law protects these gentle creatures, and visitors should always show respect and remember to give them a wide berth. Another good option for families to relax by the ocean is Anahola Beach, located on the east side of the island.

For an inland island adventure, head to Waimea Canyon, one of Kaua'i's top visitor attractions. Often referred to as "The Grand Canyon of the Pacific," it is more than 13 miles long and more than 3,000 feet deep, in places. Overlooks offer stunning views of deep multicolored gorges. Families should be aware that visiting the canyon involves a long road trip. Also consider a short, one-third-mile hike on the Iliau Nature Loop/Kukui Trail (near mile marker 9, on the western edge of the canyon), so the kids can stretch their legs. Mornings are recommended for canyon trips, before the weather gets too hot.

## HAMAI'I ISLAND

Known affectionately as "The Big Island," as it is larger (in land mass) than all the other Hawaiian Islands combined, Hawaii

Island is an ideal place for adventuresome explorations. With moonlike lava landscapes, dramatic mountain peaks and beaches with sands of many colors, the island is a beacon for vacationers, athletes, geologists and astronomers-and families interested in learning about unique environments as part of their recreation.

Tell someone you've been to Hawai'i Island, and the first question you'll probably hear is, "Did you see the volcanoes?" Each year, many people answer this question with a resounding "Yes!"

At the Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park's Kīlauea Visitor Center, you'll learn about Pele, the Hawaiian goddess of fire, and Kīlauea, the volcanic area on the east side of the island that has had repeated periods of activity since 1983.

In May 2018, a volcanic event closed parts of the area to residents and visitors, and resulted in the most single-year damage in the national park's 103-year history. By September 2018, the park had reopened, though some areas could be permanently closed off. The park is a fascinating place to observe Earth's geological processes at work. Before you visit, be sure to check nps.gov/hawaiivolcanoes for updates on park conditions and safety guidelines.


North of the national park, the 'Imiloa Astronomy Center of Hawai'i was named for another field of science. A 40,000square-foot complex located at the University of Hawai'i's Science and Technology Park in Hilo, this center has a planetarium and more than 100 exhibits dedicated to astronomy, as well as to ocean wayfinding and Hawaiian culture. Visitors can also learn about Mauna Kea, a sacred peak and one of the most favored places in the world



for astronomy (visitors should check in advance about access to Mauna Kea sites and to determine whether a high-altitude trip is right for them).

For active adventure, visitors who are at least 8 years old and weigh at least 70 pounds can enjoy a tour at Kohala Zipline in the charming town of Hawi, near Hawai'i Island's northernmost tip. The company offers a three-hour zipline Canopy Tour among the trees of Hālawa Gulch, or a full-day Kohala Zip & Dip, which includes a picnic lunch and swimming under a private waterfall, in addition to the zipline course.

Families with younger kids also can find adventure tours in Hawi. "One of our most popular family tours is the Kohala Waterfalls Adventure," says Steve Leto from the local tour operator Hawai'i Forest & Trail. "It's a reasonable mile-and-ahalf hike through some really beautiful rainforest to a waterfall. We provide everything: food, water, umbrellas, walking sticks and car seats, if necessary. Kids of all ages can enjoy this one."

## Hawai'i truly has an abundance

of attractions suited to children as well as adults. From urban activities to outdoor explorations, the experiences available in the Aloha State make the Hawaiian Islands hard to beat for family adventures.

## **FANTASTIC ORLANDO**

The theme-park center is a top vacation destination

>>> When a ride operator at "Harry Potter and the Forbidden Journey" asks me how many Muggles are in my party, I enthusiastically say, "Just one."

Immediately, a goofy grin spreads across my face for two reasons: I'm about to board the ride in which you appear to fly with Harry Potter, one of my favorite attractions at Universal's Islands of Adventure in Orlando, Florida. And, instead of waiting 20 to 75 minutes in line for the ride, I only spend 45 seconds.

Magical, indeed. It's almost like donning Harry Potter's invisibility cloak and sneaking right past everyone. Luckily, I have a legitimate reason for forging past the pack. I'm on a private VIP Experience guided tour, a perk open to anyone willing to pay the extra fee. For five glorious hours, I get to hang out with a guide who allows me to bypass lines on eight attractions of my choosing, get several glimpses behind the scenes, and enjoy a gourmet breakfast and lunch. Oh, and did I mention the valet parking?

Part of the fun of the tour is learning park trivia along the way. For instance, on the "Amazing Adventures of Spider-Man," a 3D simulated-motion ride with amazing graphics, my guide points out each time the late Stan Lee—co-creator of the popular comic-book character—is featured.

Something I would have never noticed. And, the icing on the cake: We never waste a minute, thanks to the guide's beeper, which alerts him when a ride is delayed or unexpectedly closed.

For the times when my guide doesn't ride along with me, he is always there waiting at the exit, holding my belongings like a pampering parent and sharing in my post-ride enthusiasm with high-fives and "woohoos." It's like hanging out with a very-in-the-know friend who thinks of every last detail from having a poncho at the ready, just in case I choose a water ride or there is an afternoon shower, to steering me toward the most photogenic backdrops, including the best spots to get a picture of Hogwarts Castle.

After five hours, eight rides and a boatload of fun tidbits, I head home in a blissful state. The tour is a major time saver, and thanks to the red-carpet treatment, I feel like a real amusement-park expert and an A-lister.

#### Touring area theme parks

Knowing your way around a theme park comes in handy in my home of Orlando.

The Central Florida city, often referred to as the theme park capital of the world, is one of the globe's top vacation destinations. That is thanks, in large part, to the surrounding region's unique collection of entertainment, which includes multiple Universal Studios locations, and the area's first theme park, the Walt Disney World Resort, which opened in 1971.

This is also a place where acting like a kid, no matter your age, is perfectly acceptable. And dressing in character is encouraged. It's not uncommon to see an adult sporting a polka-dotted tutu at Walt Disney World Resort or toting around a stuffed Minion at Universal Studios. These two major attractions can be a bit overwhelming, so here's a short overview of what to expect when you visit.

Walt Disney World Resort consists of four main theme parks: Magic Kingdom,

Animal Kingdom, Hollywood Studios and Epcot.

There are also two water parks, Blizzard Beach and Typhoon Lagoon. And don't forget the 25 resort hotels, four golf courses, two full-service spas, Disney's Wedding Pavilion, the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex and Disney Springs, a large shopping, dining and entertainment area. The entire Disney World Resort measures 30,000 acres. However, the Disney Company owns much more land in the area that can still be developed.

Magic Kingdom Park is home to many of the classic Disney rides such as "Space Mountain," "Pirates of the Caribbean," "Haunted Mansion" and "Peter Pan's Flight," to name a few. For those who love park trivia, sign up for the popular Keys to the Kingdom tour, which lets participants roam the famous utilidor system of tunnels under the park.

When visiting Disney's Animal Kingdom Park, I always steer my friends toward Pandora-The World of Avatar, where you can experience the Avatar story and take various rides including a 3D flight over the Pandora landscape and

travel by boat on the Na'vi River Journey into Pandora's glowing bioluminescent rainforest.

Disney's Hollywood Studios, formerly MGM Studios, is home to Toy Story Land, where the fun roller coaster "Slinky Dog Dash" and the 4D arcade game ride "Toy Story Mania!" are big hits. And coming August 29 is Star Wars: Galaxy's Edge, which will be a major draw with its

collection of rides and attractions.

Epcot celebrates human achievement and international culture. It also has exciting rides, such as the "Frozen Ever After," a song-filled boat tour, which takes you through the Kingdom of Arendelle, over short waterfalls and to Queen Elsa's Palace. Visitors will want to stay at Epcot for the nightly fireworks show, "IllumiNations: Reflections of Earth."

Disney's two vast water parks include the 66-acre Blizzard Beach Water Park and the 61-acre Typhoon Lagoon Water

Disney also offers a variety of special passes, such as the Ultimate Day of Thrills VIP Tour, a seven-hour experience that includes access to numerous rides in Magic Kingdom Park, Epcot and Hollywood Studios Park.

For a different kind of experience, visit the Kennedy Space Center Visitor Complex at Cape Canaveral, located about 45 miles east of Orlando. With an astronauttraining experience, 3D films and the U.S. Astronaut Hall of Fame, it's a great way to spend a day learning about the history of the United States space program.

#### **Exploring downtown Orlando**

Another destination to explore is downtown Orlando itself. A good place to start a city tour is at Lake Eola Park, a 23-acre green space in the heart of downtown that is a prime gathering spot. The park includes a mile-long walking path around the lake, and many bars and restaurants can be found in the surrounding neighborhood. On Sundays the park is packed for a weekly farmers market.

Also located in the downtown area is

the Dr. Phillips Center for the Performing Arts, which showcases everything from plays to concerts to comedy acts. The dance production *Derek Hough: Live! The Tour* performs at the center on April 11, and the Tony Award–winning Broadway musical *Dear Evan Hansen* is being performed April 16–21. Professional-soccer fans can cheer on the Orlando City SC, and the women's team the Orlando Pride, at Orlando City Stadium. The nearby Amway Center is home to the NBA's

Orlando Magic and the National Arena League's Orlando Predators football team, which begins the 2019 season on April 13 at home.

To the north of downtown is the Loch Haven Cultural Park, home to the Orlando Museum of Art, which has more than 2,400 works, including a collection of contemporary art created since 1945 by artists such as Robert Rauschenberg.

The nearby Mennello Museum of American Art specializes in contemporary and traditional American art, with an exhibition of the paintings of Lawrence H. Lebduska through May 12.



Adventure is just a flight away at the Boise Airport. Leave busy behind with 19 nonstop routes and countless one-stop destinations.





>>> From the fourth-floor window of our downtown boutique hotel, we watch the lights of Boise blink and flicker like beacons, sparkling with possibility. In the four decades we've been visiting the city, we've witnessed a gradual but steady metamorphosis, from a rural-feeling state capital to a colorful and modern city pulsing with art, culture, eclectic eateries, and civic devotion to green space and community.

Four times a year (we try for one visit per season), my wife, Camie, and I make a trip to Boise, and we're always delighted by something new. Boise annually makes many "top cities in America" lists in categories ranging from livability and work-life balance to urban adventuring and hippest city. Lonely Planet, in its "Best in the U.S." roundup, cited Boise as the No. 2 destination to see in 2018 (second only to California's Redwood Coast) and described Boise as "what cool looks like before the rest of the world has figured it out." Well, we figured it out a long time ago, and Boise's cool keeps us coming back. After years of visits-and taking into consideration the city's newest offerings-we've developed a list of some must-sees and must-dos in Boise.

#### **OUTDOOR** RECREATION

Recently, Camie and I strolled down the paved foot and bike path known as the

Boise River Greenbelt. The winter's deep snowpack high in the mountains had created big flows on the Boise River. Black cottonwood seedlings—with their rustred stems and serrated green leaves, sprang from the sandy soil. Northern flickers and chickadees flitted and chirped, perched in the mature cottonwood branches above us. As we walked, luxuriating in the warming morning sun, we could see snow-capped peaks of the Boise Mountains past the Boise Foothills to the northeast. Continuing on, we saw a fox that had come to drink from a slow-swirling pool at the river's edge.

The 25-mile urban pathway along the Boise River is one of the major draws and defining features of the city. The path is available for walking, cycling and skating, and provides easy access to Boise's spectacular, varied riverside parks. Two of our favorites for recreation are Bernardine Ouinn Riverside Park, where we can kayak or stand-up paddleboard in the river and

fish in 22-acre Quinn's Pond; and the Boise Whitewater Park, with adjustable wave features and waterflows available to the public. We love to watch the surfers and kayakers play in the waves, and to rent watercraft ourselves from Idaho River Sports and hop in.

On nearly every trip to Boise, we also go to the fabulous foothills, with their more than 190 miles of interconnected trails and paths. Some of the trails wind through neighborhoods before linking to public lands, providing adventure for everyone. There are designated trails for dog walkers, equestrians, mountain bikers, hikers and runners. On all Boise area trails, visitors should stay on designated paths and avoid wet or muddy trails.

When Camie and I were younger (and very fit because we were running marathons and racing on mountain bikes), we enjoyed some of the more difficult, steep loops, but now we are just as content doing family-friendly nature hikes,

such as the 2-mile Crestline Trail #28. This connects to Kestrel Trail #39A and Lower Hulls Gulch Trail #29 to provide a terrific feel of the foothills. I love the sweet scent of sage, the views of the city spread out into the high desert of the Treasure Valley, and wildlife sightings such as mule deer, coyotes, and various owls and other raptors.

Another outdoor-adventure must-do in Boise is Bogus Basin—a nonprofit mountain recreation area less than 20 miles from downtown. Recent improvements have added to Bogus Basin's already awesome appeal as an alpine and Nordic ski spot. There's now a mountain coaster called the "Glade Runner," with more than three-quarters of a mile of serpentine excitement; a bungee trampoline that (with harnesses and ropes) allows kids to bounce nearly 20 feet in the air; and a 32-foot tall rock-climbing wall.

A lesser-known outdoor gem is the Oregon Trail Reserve, a 77-acre system of walking paths in Southeast Boise. Visitors can view remnants of the Oregon Trail, including the Kelton Ramp, a steep trail dating to the early 1860s that cuts through rimrock of the Boise River (hiking on the ramp itself is not recommended). Kelton Ramp is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

# ARTS AND CULTURE

Boise's natural outdoor bounty is complemented by its vibrant arts-and-culture scene. Last spring when Camie and I visited, we were struck once again by the wealth of fine public art (about 80 site-based public art installations and counting) that has been commissioned around downtown. The city's commitment to public art runs deep and is evident nearly everywhere you look, from the stunning 2017 installation by artists Dwaine Carver and Zachary Hill called Cottonwoods—seven 24-foot-tall weathering steel struc-

tures reminiscent of a cottonwood grove, publicly funded and located at the City Hall Plaza—to Freak Alley, a downtown outdoor gallery with rotating murals.

Art and culture convene beautifully in Boise's famous Basque Block (Grove Street between Capitol Boulevard and Sixth Street), the central gathering place for the more than 10,000 members of the Boise-area Basque community. Some are descendants of those who came to Idaho in the 1880s to work as sheepherders, or of those who fled Spanish dictator Francisco Franco's reign in the mid-1900s.

Don't miss the Basque Museum and Cultural Center, which is dedicated to preserving, perpetuating and promoting

#### LODGING

The Modern Hotel and Bar: The chic boutique hotel is located in the heart of the downtown Linen District (just a block away from Big City Coffee and Cafe, another Boise must-visit). The Modern features 39 rooms and four apartments outfitted in Midcentury Modern appointments. Features include walking and biking access to downtown, and a bar and restaurant with innovative dishes such as braised collard greens, duck confit and "Beetballs," fashioned by James Beard Award-nominated chef Nate Whitley.

Hotel 43: Urban chic, named for the 43rd parallel in the 43rd state. Stylish rooms and suites with striking views of the Capitol Building and the Boise Foothills, just a few minutes' walk from Jack's Urban Meeting Place (JUMP) and The Grove Plaza. Hotel 43 also has its own gourmet restaurant, Chandlers Prime Steaks & Fine Seafood.

The Grove Hotel: Luxury accommodations, with 250 contemporary rooms, appointed in white-and-green color schemes. Great location right next to CenturyLink Arena (concerts, Steelheads hockey). Dine at the delicious Trillium Restaurant, which serves breakfast, lunch and dinner. The hotel also boasts the illuminated public art piece *River Sculpture*, by artist Alison Sky. —*B.L.*

Basque history and culture. Originally established in the 19th century Cyrus Jacobs/Uberuaga boarding house in 1985, the museum expanded in 1993 and has rotating exhibits that include photographs and artifacts.

Visitors also can enjoy Basque foods and drinks at Bar Gernika, which serves Kalimotxo, a beverage made with cola and red wine.

For an entirely different and wholly modern experience, spend a few hours at Jack's Urban Meeting Place (JUMP). It's a six-story, 65,000-square-foot nonprofit creative center that comprises a vintage tractor collection; an urban park, complete with multistory slides; an outdoor amphitheater; and a dance studio and high-tech classrooms for programming such as dance, cooking and improv.

Camie and I took a country swing

dance class during our last visit, alternately laughing and cringing at our "technique," which we could see in the mirrors of the light-flooded Move Studio.

Outside at the JUMP Park, I played around on "The Climber," a three-story pyramidal net structure that was challenging, tiring and really fun. Camie surprised me by braving the five-story "Spiral Slide," a twisting corkscrew chute that took her from the top of the park to the bottom in a matter of seconds.

An exciting new Boise venue is the James Castle House. The cultural center, opened in 2018, was once owned by Idaho-born artist James Castle (1899–1977). Born deaf in the town of Garden Valley (about 50 miles northeast of Boise), Castle began drawing at an early age and was entirely self-taught. He worked with found items—scrap paper, cardboard



boxes—on which he created "soot drawings." The house features ongoing exhibitions of the artist's life and work.

#### FOOD AND BEVERAGE

In 2000, Bardenay in Boise—which describes itself as the first restaurant/distillery in the United States—served its first cocktail, created with rum made on the



premises. Unfortunately, Camie and I missed opening night, but we've dined there many times since, and it has always delivered for us: excellent food paired with in-house distilled spirits.

It's fun to follow the distillers' recommended pairings. Last time, Camie paired her Capellini Pomodoro with a Negroni (Bardenay gin, Campari and sweet vermouth, with an orange twist). I complemented my charbroiled salmon with a Bardenay house martini, served with Lillet Blanc French aperitif and Basque olives. Sublime.

Over the last two decades or so, Boise has fully established itself at the forefront of the adult beverage industry, and a handful of artisanal spirits distillers have started up recently in the area. They are typically family-owned, use locally sourced ingredients and produce premium, small-batch products. For instance, 8 Feathers Distillery uses grains and artesian well water from Weiser, Idaho, about 75 miles to the northwest, to produce stellar whiskeys and bourbons. The distillery uses local corn to make Idaho Moonshine, which is finished in uncharred barrels.

Yeah, Boise is cool. And getting cooler all the time. I always look forward to revisiting classic favorites and discovering new ones, and enjoying all the city has to offer.

#### **PIKE PLACE MARKET**

Iconic attraction is an inviting 9-acre village within the city

#### By Mary Bacarella

**>>> Every day,** I spend time strolling through Pike Place Market, enjoying the aromas of baked goods, barbecued foods, fresh fish, coffee and other items that will please market visitors.

As executive director of the Pike Place Market Preservation and Development Authority, I serve as a steward of one of Washington state's vibrant, thriving, iconic landmarks. My office is tucked away near the legendary Gum Wall in the market's Post Alley, but I love getting out to join some of the 15 million visitors to the market each year. I enjoy the smiles, laughter and banter of the vendors; the live music of the buskers; the eye-dazzling produce and flower displays of

the farmers; the delicious offerings of the specialty-food purveyors; the artisanship of the craftspeople; and the enchanting spirit as the market awakens with deliveries of the day's many wares and "Good mornin" greetings.

I think of the eclectic and inclusive market as the soul of Seattle. Locals and visitors alike mingle and munch here. Tech workers, rock stars, Hollywood celebrities, newcomers and Seattle natives all come together to explore and experience this city jewel. People have been known to propose or marry beside the market's mascot, Rachel the 550-pound bronze piggy bank (which raises money for social services). Even our hometown famous love the

market, including Macklemore, who has stopped by the Magic Shop, and Duff McKagan and Mike McCready, who have performed on the rooftop next to the giant "Public Market Center" sign and clock. And a scene from the film Sleepless in Seattle featured Tom Hanks' and Rob Reiner's characters conversing at The Athenian, a seafood restaurant that dates to 1909. Pike Place Market shops range from Starbucks, whose first store opened in 1971 in the market, to national-award-winning Chukar Cherries, founded in 1988, which has had a market stand since 1992.

With approximately 100 farmers, 250 shops (of which 70 are restaurants or takeout spots) and 230 artisans, Pike Place

Market is a 9-acre historical district that is like a village within the big city. Founded in 1907 to allow local consumers to purchase produce directly from local farmers instead of paying higher prices to intermediaries, the market has become a true neighborhood, as well, complete with residences for about 500 people, and myriad services, including a dentist, barbers, a food bank, a preschool, a senior center, a medical clinic, an assisted-living facility and more. Caring for this community is a core value I take seriously.

A Michigan native, I moved to Seattle more than 30 years ago, and Pike Place Market has always been a part of my life here, long before I became executive director early last

**Bolivia:** Try a *salteña* (baked, stew-filled pastry) at **Copacabana Cafe** (whose patio deck is shown above, atop some other market businesses).

China: Watch Chinese dumplings being prepared at Country Dough. Try Mongolian beef or prawn chow mein at Pike Place Chinese Cuisine. Savor pork hum bow at Mee Sum Pastry.

**France:** Visit romantic **Maximilien** for the signature duck confit. Enjoy the charcuterie at **Le Pichet,** or 17 types of crepes

at Crepe de France. Northwest bouillabaisse is a popular entrée at Place Pigalle. Savor poulet roti (roast chicken) at Cafe Campagne. The treats at Le Panier bakery range from croissants and macarons to tartes.

**Germany:** Bavarian Meats gets raves for its assorted wurst meats. At **Uli's Famous Sausage,** enjoy a rosemary-chicken-sausage sandwich with sauerkraut and curry ketchup.

Greece: Flavors such as lemon curd and marionberry are among the many delicious choices at Ellenos Real Greek Yogurt. At Mr. D's Greek Delicacies, enjoy yeeros (gyros).

India: Beef samosas and spinach paneer are popular at Saffron Spice. At Kastoori Grill, also serving cuisine of Nepal and Tibet, you'll find meat dishes such as chicken tikka masala, and vegetarian fare such as saag aloo.

Italy: Housemade pastas star in dishes at Pasta Casalinga—the menu changes biweekly based on what's available from the ocean, farm and garden. Diners are enthusiastic about the lasagna at The Pink Door, while



Il Bistro's cioppino is another Seattle favorite. Panini sandwiches are tasty lunch fare at DeLaurenti Food and Wine (whose tomato section is shown above). Pizzas, pastas and meatball sandwiches are available at the Pizza and Pasta Bar.

Japan: Sushi bowls are popular at Urara. At Wild Fish Poke, choose from topping options to go with diced raw fish such as ahi tuna. A special dinner awaits at chef Shiro Kashiba's acclaimed Sushi Kashiba. The chef is a 2019 James Beard Award nominee.

Mexico: Acapulco-style shrimp tacos and mahi-mahi tacos have diners coming back to Mariscos Mexico. The enormous burritos at La Vaca Burrito Express make for a hearty lunch. Los Agaves breakfast burritos are filled with egg for a protein boost. Savor the Coca-Colabraised shredded pork shoulder at **El Borracho**.

**Middle East:** Try a traditional ghormeh sabzi (herb stew) at **Farvahar Persian Cafe.** If you love lemon and garlic and strong flavors, the shish tawook at **Falafel King** is for you.

Russia: Watch bakers stuff and fold pastries as you try one of the many options at Piroshky Piroshky (such as the apple cinnamon roll shown below).



**Thai:** Oyster beef, Panang curry and yellow chicken curry draw positive reviews at **Jasmine Thai.** 

**Turkey:** Enjoy a meal of lamb stew and a stuffed pastry called börek at **Turkish Delight.**Turkish flatbread pizza known as pide is a specialty at **Miss Cafe.** — M.B.



year. During my parents' first visit to Seattle in the late 1980s, I left them to explore the market before meeting them later under the clock.

When I rejoined my parents, my mother immediately exclaimed, "We had our first 'hum bow'!" She then went on to describe the wonderful soft, doughy bun filled with savory barbecued pork. "Oh, and let's not forget the filling pot stickers," she said.

As we walked the market together,

my parents pointed out the bounty of fresh produce for sale, including items they recognized from their own garden back home. They asked fishmongers questions and regaled me with stories of how my own Italian grandparents had cooked octopus and squid. I will always cherish seeing the market through my parents' eyes.

Early in my Seattle life, I was part of Unexpected Productions, the improvisational troupe located at the Market Theater in Post Alley. Someone in line outside placed a piece of chewed gum and a penny

on the brick wall next to the entrance. Soon the entire brick wall was covered with gum and coins, top to bottom. Market management told us to scrape off the gum. Then another waiting audience started it again.

Colleagues and I hand-scraped gum off that wall twice before the market's management said, "We give upit's as quirky as the market. You can keep the wall of gum."

Now I delight in viewing the wall as I come and go from my office. I also love to catch a sunset from our new MarketFront area, with its large viewing deck overlooking Elliott Bay, or from one of the market's fine-dining restaurants. And if I follow that with one of the comedy or cabaret shows at the market, I'll have enjoyed a truly exceptional day. \*

#### PIKE PLACE MARKET OPENING BELL



**Every morning at 9 A.M.,** the Market Master steps in front of a group of artists and craftspeople gathered at the north end of the Main Arcade, in front of the market-stalls map. He or she rings a handheld vintage brass market bell—one, two, three times in a row—and the morning chatter begins to quiet. It's the start of the daily ritual for craft-stall selection.


While some stalls at the market have assigned occupants with annual leases for their particular locations, other stall designations, such as for artists and craftspeople, are determined anew each morning. The crafts market changes daily as any of 230 craftspeople who sell handcrafted original goods set up their table displays, taking them down in the evening.

For these stalls, the Market Master begins calling the names of merchants who have signed in on clipboards, starting with those who have the most seniority as market vendors. As merchants hear their names, they call back the number and location of the stall they choose for the day. Robert Crew (shown above), owner of Metamorphosis Leathers, has the most seniority and gets first choice. He has been selling at the market since 1970. The vendors choose stalls each day based on factors ranging from whether a table has poles, which can be used for vertical displays, to where a table is located. Some vendors prefer to be amid the highest volume of pedestrian traffic. Others prefer a spot where customers can take their time without feeling the pressure of a crowd.

For the ceremonial bell ringing that starts the stall-selection process, you may see a different face ringing the bell on occasion. Pike Place Market frequently invites guest bell-ringers from the community to participate in the tradition. Famous authors, musicians and celebrities, such as Rainn Wilson (Dwight from The Office), have participated. Sometimes people are even chosen from among the spectators to ring the bell and begin the day at one of the largest, most diverse crafts markets in the United States. - M.B.

# WINDOWS TO THE SEA

New features at celebrated Golden State aquariums

people access to the state's vast beaches and the Pacific Ocean. Growing up near the coast, I regularly visited San Francisco's Steinhart Aquarium and the Monterey Bay Aquarium to see the animals that lived beneath the waves, and I fantasized about being the next Jacques Cousteau. As an adult, I still reach into touch tanks with kids for the amazing sensation of connecting to marine life by running my fingers gently along the smooth, slippery surfaces of bat rays or rough-textured ochre sea stars.

Over the years, Golden State aquariums have added even more hands-on activities and innovative features, with several opening this spring—including a large, flashy expansion, an exhibit devoted to fascinating and diminutive creatures, and a care center focused on marine veterinary science. The state's proud aquarium tradition gives curious visitors such as myself the opportunity to learn more about our oceanic animal neighbors and their habitats.

Here's a look at some new and upcoming enhancements to California aquariums:

#### **A Visionary Addition**

The Aquarium of the Pacific, one of the largest and most-visited aquariums in the United States, is exploring what it means to be an "Aquarium of the Future," through its new Pacific Visions wing, scheduled to open to the public on May 24. Included in the expansion of this popular Long Beach aquarium (about 25 miles south of downtown Los Angeles) will be a dynamic new entrance with multimedia art and orientation galleries showcasing rotating exhibits and a giant touch-screen media wall. These features are aimed at nurturing visitors' emotional connections to the ocean and marine life.

Overall, the Pacific Visions wing consists of a 29,000-square-foot sustainable structure



designed by the award-winning San Franciscobased architecture and design firm EHDD (Esherick Homsey Dodge and Davis), which also designed the Monterey Bay Aquarium. Visitors will first notice the undulating coloredglass exterior intended to reflect light and suggest ocean waves. Inside, tactile and technological elements will stand out. In addition to the art and orientation galleries, the new wing will house an immersive theater with a 130-foot-wide by 32-foot-tall screen arcing around a central projection disc that doubles as a platform for presenters and performers. There will also be an expanded exhibition gallery with changing live-animal exhibits and multimedia displays.

More than just a place to view marine animals, Pacific Visions is designed as a space that integrates arts and sciences. The aquarium has partnered with leading scientific, artistic and cultural organizations to create presentations, performances and discussions that tackle issues including climate change, extreme weather, sea level rise and expanding people's food supply through ocean farming.

Pacific Visions forms a natural extension of the Aquarium of the Pacific's existing facilities. inspired people to visit the aquarium since its founding in 1998.

#### **Enter the Dragons**

Often, the marine life that gets most of the attention at an aquarium is either big and imposing (such as rays and sharks) or photogenic and funny (such as sea lions and sea otters). But sometimes ethereal and funky-looking species can steal the show.

On May 17, Birch Aquarium at Scripps
Institution of Oceanography, in the San
Diego County community of La Jolla, will
introduce the new permanent exhibition
"Seadragons & Seahorses," which brings
seadragon conservation to the forefront.
Home to weedy and leafy seadragons, as well
as to several species of seahorses and pipefish,

the addition will be one of the largest seadragon exhibits in the world (by tank volume). The total exhibition space is 900 square feet and includes a centerpiece tank that holds 5,375 gallons of water. The exhibit has been designed to create the ideal environment in which to breed leafy seadragons.

Featuring an expanded seahorse nursery that visitors can observe, and a Seadragon Lab, which guests will also be able to see into, the exhibition will plunge guests into the underwater lives of seahorses and seadragons while giving visitors insight into the work that Birch Aquarium's Husbandry Team is doing to help these species.

The new exhibition builds on the aquarium's tradition of providing hands-on displays that detail some of the research discoveries of the renowned Scripps Institution of Oceanography. The institution has greatly expanded what we know about our watery planet and made discoveries relevant to people's everyday lives.

#### Caring for Sea Life

The **Monterey Bay Aquarium**, located seaside in the city of Monterey, has been inspiring ocean conservation for more than 30 years. In November 2018, the aquarium opened its new



Juli Plant Grainger Animal Care Center, which allows the aquarium to better meet the growing needs of its animals and provides the space, tools and technology to expand work with ocean wildlife, particularly shorebirds, seabirds and sea turtles.

To construct the center, the aquarium received community support from the adjacent City of Pacific Grove, as well as contributions from more than 2,000 donors. The center's cutting-edge diagnostic equipment and technologies assist with urgent-care needs, expand the field of conservation medicine, and provide training opportunities for veterinary students and graduates. Many of these students are from communities that are underrepresented in the veterinary field.


The aquarium's behind-the-scenes tours have recently been expanded to include the opportunity for a closer look and insight into animal care by stopping in the care center's anteroom, which has windows looking into two new animal hospital wards. Want to get closer? Details are being determined, but a new guest experience within the center will soon be available.









#### **ARICH TRADITION**

Gold panning is still a mainstay—and a fun activity-in Alaska

>> "Here, let me help." Ilaura Reeves gently takes the tin pan from my hands and, swirling the contents as deftly as a ballerina pirouettes, drains away the pebbly sand to reveal a half-dozen flakes of gold that magically flash like fireflies. Although gold's sheer weight is what keeps it on the bottom of the pan, the process still requires a light touch, and I am a rank gold-panning amateur.

Reeves is not. She and her sister, Jordan, are the Gold Daughters, members of a multigeneration gold-mining family and owners of a popular, eponymous Fairbanks gold-panning attraction—and thus among the guardians of an Alaska tradition that shines as brightly as gold itself, like the six bits shimmering in my tin pan.

Almost every corner of this vast land has been touched by gold rush history, from the far Southeast panhandle to the beaches of Nome. While the story of Alaska gold is one of arduous effort and dauntless pioneers, the activity can be easily accessed by modern visitors. You'll most likely find just a few, if any, gold pieces, but panning is an engaging way to experience an iconic aspect of the Great Land's character.

William Faulkner's axiom that the past is never past holds true in Alaska, where gold remains a

mainstay of life and business. In the 19th century, Alaska was the main gateway for gold booms in British Columbia and, most famously, the Yukon's 1890s Klondike rush. Today, the state produces more than 1 million ounces of gold a year, second only to Nevada. The state of Alaska manages roughly 40,000 state mining claims, and Alaska gold miners range from residents working summer-only claims to industrial enterprises—one mine near Fairbanks is named, colorfully, Fort Knox.

"Fairbanks was founded as a gold rush city, but it's not just history," says Reeves, whose father has several friends who run gold-mining operations on remote properties. A fair number of Alaskans, Reeves adds, either have their own claims or visit claims owned by the Gold Prospectors Association of America. And she and her sister have often used their pans to prospect on family properties or elsewhere around Fairbanks.

"You'd be surprised at all the places you can find gold in Alaska," Reeves declares, based on her own experience—adding that it's, well, inappropriate to ask people exactly where they've found gold. "The point is, this heritage is alive and well today."

Several gold-panning sites across Alaska allow

travelers to try their hands at a simple technique prospectors have used for centuries. Simple but not easy: Despite the hands-on guidance I get from Reeves, my second pan of dirt, filled from the trough in front of me, remains covered in worthless debris.

Nearby, more adroit young panners exclaim in delight at their yield, even though everyone knows the little sack of "pay dirt" included in the price of admission was salted. Visitors interested in trying the real thing can scoop up free buckets of unsalted dirt from nearby piles trucked in from an Interior location.

For an authentic experience southeast of Anchorage in Girdwood, visit Crow Creek Gold Mine, offering mine tours and other excursions that include panning. This still-active claim borders its namesake creek, and visitors are offered pans, buckets, shovels and the advice of knowledgeable guides. To procure their own pay dirt, visitors head up the creek, where, shaded by tall cottonwoods and surrounded by snowmelt cascading from the Chugach Mountains, the scene is much like it was when the area was first prospected in 1890.

As always, Alaskans leaven their endeavors with a unique humor. "You know what leverite is, don't you?" a greeter at Crow Creek asks while offering a panning demonstration. I shake my head. He grasps a thumb-size



piece of worthless rock—even I can detect that—and pitches it aside. "You take this stone and 'leave 'er right' here." Guffaws accompany the advice.

While I've yet to master the finer points of panning, it's OK if my entire pan yields "leverite," because I take home an engaging memory of an iconic Alaska experience as real today as it was a century and a half ago. It's a treasure worth more than its weight in gold. \*

Many Alaskans still pan for gold in the state's creeks and rivers.





## NORTHERN **OREGON WINE COUNTRY TOURS**

Excursions in the Oregon towns of McMinnville, Carlton and Dundee

)) During a winemaker dinner at the exquisite Allison Inn & Spa in Newberg, Oregon, my wife, Mica, and I clink glasses with other diners to celebrate the region's burgeoning wine industry.

Next to me, wine writer Karen MacNeil remarks that she considers the Willamette Valley to be "one of the most exciting wine areas in the United States."

"Oregon has worked so hard since the 1970s to make their wines compelling and undeniable on the world stage," says the best-selling author of The Wine Bible.

I share MacNeil's enthusiasm, especially for the Willamette Valley Wine Country, which boasts more than 500 wineries and runs from just south of Portland to south of Eugene.

Few parts of this region are evolving faster than the northern Willamette Valley, an area anchored by McMinnville and the smaller towns of Carlton and Dundee. These three towns-located between 30 and 40 miles southwest of Portland-draw my wife and me back again and again for weekend trips to enjoy Clockwise from left: Carlton's

the views, meals and accommodations that are equal to the world-class wines served here.

Recently we visited McMinnville, with its numerous brick buildings and tree-lined streets. The town is said to have more than 250 wineries within a 20-miles radius. In town, my wife and I walk and bike to wine-tasting rooms, including Willamette Valley Vineyards, which features the 2017 Whole Cluster Pinot Noir, a charming fruit-forward varietal.

We also stopped by The Eyrie Vineyards. Eyrie founder and winemaker David Lett was one of the people who helped put Oregon on the world wine map, planting one of the state's first commercial vineyards of Pinot Noir grapes and surprising French winemakers with a third-place finish in an international competition in 1979. Lett passed away in 2008, but his family continues to produce excellent Pinot Noir and Pinot Gris wines.

At the end of the day, Mica and I relaxed at the rooftop bar at McMenamins Hotel Oregon and enjoyed the incomparable view of the area. Less than 10 miles north of McMinnville is

landmark grain elevator greets visitors to town. The Allison Inn & Spa is a popular area retreat. Vinevards surround the Domaine Drouhin winery in the Dundee Hills. Flâneur Wines will open a new tasting room this summer in the Carlton grain elevator.

the bucolic town of Carlton, which has more than 20 wine-tasting rooms in the downtown area. Among them is Carlton Cellars, which sells tasty Pinot Noirs and white wine varietals, including Pinot Blanc and Pinot Gris. The small tasting room leads right into the winery's barrel room, a great spot to sip wine and learn how oak affects both taste and price. Another favorite place is Cana's Feast Winery, specializing in lesser-known grape varietals, including Barbera and Sangiovese.

In 2003, acclaimed local winemaker Ken Wright made a handshake deal with a Carlton businessman to purchase part of the town's small business district, including two imposing grain towers and several red-brick buildings.

The deal's cornerstone was that Wright would agree to preserve the old structures.

Wright and his wife, Karen, have been major players in Carlton's revival ever since, working to pass zoning laws aimed at preserving the town's architectural character, with its many storefronts and brick buildings.

They have also renovated the city's former railroad depot into the stylish tasting room for Ken Wright Cellars, which specializes in creating wonderful single-vineyard Pinot Noir wines from 13 different vineyard sites.

The Wrights have partnered with other business owners on local projects such as The Winery Lofts, a group of apartmentlike hotel rooms that visitors can rent. The rooms are located on Main Street. A block away is The Horse Radish restaurant, one of our favorite wine-country stops for a sandwich or cheese plate. Also in the area is the wonderful Carlton Bakery, where we often buy fresh, steaminghot baguettes. Work is underway to convert one of the downtown grain elevators into a tasting room and garden patio for Flâneur

Wines. Currently, the winery has opened a tasting room next to the elevator. Wright sold the grain elevators to the winery's owner, Marty Doerschlag, in 2013, and the new tasting room is expected to open this summer.

In the hills outside of Carlton are dozens of delightful wineries. One of our best new finds has been the renovated farmhouse that is home to Dominio IV Wines, just east of Carlton, where we've sampled great Pinot Noirs, a Viognier and a Grenache blend.

"My dad said when he would drive through Carlton in the 1970s that it was a boarded-up lumber town," Patrick Reuter, winemaker and co-owner of Dominio IV, told me during a visit. "Now you can see the evolution happening, the life running through the community."

A variety of wineries between Carlton and Dundee boast views of this spectacular land-scape of rolling hills. Three standouts are Anne Amie Vineyards, Stoller Family Estate and Domaine Drouhin Oregon. All three wineries are known for their excellent Pinot Noirs.

Anne Amie also serves top-quality Pinot Gris

and Pinot Blanc wines. Stoller makes Chardonnays and refreshingly dry Pinot Noir Rosés, and Domaine Drouhin has Chardonnays that are known for their bright and crisp acidity.

The nearby community of Dundee offers a number of world-class wineries, including Élevée Winegrowers, located just to the northwest of town. For the past decade, owners Tom and France Fitzpatrick have tended the 5-acre vineyard that surrounds their home, and have now opened a small tasting room on the property. On weekends they welcome visitors to explore their garden while sipping a glass of single-vineyard Pinot Noir or Riesling. The Fitzpatricks are gracious hosts, treating new visitors like long-lost friends.

In Dundee, you'll find some of the region's best restaurants, including the Red Hills Market, with its wood-fired specialties, and The Dundee Bistro, serving delicious dishes such as pork loin, and linguine and prawns.

Not long ago, we visited Angela Estate tasting room, where General Manager Jessica Endsworth showed us samples of soil from the winery's vineyard and surrounding areas. She explained how different soils affect the development of the vines, giving the wines a distinctive fruit profile, supple tannin, voluptuous mouthfeel and ample baking spice character.

She offered us some soil to take home. We passed on the soil but, along with several superb bottles of wine, left with more warm memories of Willamette Valley wine country.

## **ARTISANAL TRENDSETTER**

Elephants Delicatessen celebrates its 40th anniversary

)) In the early 1960s, Portland native Elaine Tanzer made a decision that would help bring about a food revolution in her hometown. The Portland State University student signed up for a study-abroad program in Italy.

Tanzer spent a year in the Northern Italian town of Pavia, which introduced her to a dolce vita of drinking fresh-brewed espresso, enjoying an array of cheeses and wines she had never heard of before, and eating tasty foods that brought her palate to life.

"I just wanted to live that way," Tanzer says of her time in Italy.


To follow her dream, Tanzer founded the Portland institution Elephants Delicatessen in April 1979, filling it with all the wonderful foods she enjoyed in Europe. She would order fresh cheeses from Paris that would be airfreighted directly to the deli, which began as a cozy space in the Uptown Shopping Center in West Portland. In the deli's tiny kitchen, Tanzer and her staff cranked out fresh pasta, baked baguettes and artisanal breads and crafted their own fresh pesto. She also bought a contraption called an illy espresso machine, making Elephants among the first places in Portland to serve espresso coffee drinks.

"I knew there was a lot of stuff available that we in Portland didn't have, and zillions of cheeses that we didn't have," she remembers. "It was fun bringing it all in."

With seven (soon to be eight) locations throughout the Portland area, Elephants remains a local trendsetter and tastemaker. Tanzer also has helped promote local food artisans and their products, including the Jacobsen Salt Company and Ruby Jewel, the gourmet ice cream company. Both firms have benefited from the collaboration, as well as the opportunity to introduce their now hugely successful products at the deli.







In the 1980s, Tanzer hired Portland chef and restaurateur Scott Weaver, whose wife, Anne, was then Elephants' store manager and is now the company's CEO. Anne Weaver says her husband was drawn to Elephants by the idea of being able to work with "a playground of foods." Since then, he has created about 5,000 original recipes for the deli, including one of the all-time customer favorites—Elephants' tomato orange soup (the recipe is at elephantsdeli.com/tomato-orange-soup-recipe).



Tanzer, who is still the deli's owner, remains active in the business by tracking food trends and identifying new foods and products for Elephants to sell.

As a special 40th-anniversary treat, the Ruby Jewel shops and Elephants Delicatessen locations will be selling tomato orange soup ice cream beginning in July. The dessert honors the store that has played a pivotal role in the development of the city's nationally recognized food scene. ⊀

### **TIMBERS' TIME**

Portland's MLS team plans another run for the Cup

many soccer fans with their performance in the 2018 MLS playoffs. After finishing fifth in the Western Conference during the regular season last year, the Timbers advanced to the MLS Cup championship match, losing to Atlanta United 2–0.

Starting the 2019 season with clear title hopes, the Timbers essentially kept the same roster and just bolstered the team in a few select spots. The main moves included acquiring experienced French defender Claude Dielna, adding Paraguayan veteran Jorge Moreira at right back, and signing young Slovenian Aljaž Ivačič to add depth at goalkeeper.

The Timbers are still in search of what may be the final piece—a goal scorer up front to complement the team's midfield play from 2017 league MVP Diego Valeri (10 goals, 12 assists in 2018) and rising star Sebastián Blanco (10 goals, 11 assists). Team members are also dealing with the \$85 million transformation of their home pitch, Providence Park, to be completed June 1. That means the Timbers will play the season's first 12 matches on the road. The upside is that they will play 11 of their final 12 games of the regular season in the remodeled home park. Alaska Airlines is the Timbers' official airline and jersey sponsor. ₹




