THE SUPREME COURT, Monday, were occupied from 10 o'clock in the morning with the case of Philip S. Grinnell, et al., appellants, vs. Marine Guano & Oil Company. And after hearing arguments, &c., defendants submitted judgment for the amount claimed with interest, amounting to \$1,079 35, when the Court adjourned to Tuesday, at 10 o'clock. The case of Isaac L. Fish, appellant, vs. Charles J. Tallman, has been compromised since the Court has been in session.

MILITARY.—The Newport Light Infantry Zouaves, and Col. Sherman, accompanied by the Newport Brass Band, assembled at their armory at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon, and at 1½ made a street parade. At 2 o'clock, Brig. Gen. Church and staff arrived in a special car attached to the freight train, and were escorted to the General's headquarters at the Atlantic House, by the mayor, who appeared in their new and showy uniform and in full uniform.

We looked in at the armory of the Aquidneck Rifles, and were pleased to notice the great improvements for comfort and convenience which have recently been made there under the supervision of Col. Delaney. New cases of chestnut, with black walnut trimmings, for the reception of muskets, have been placed on the south side of their hall, and the hall has been painted, but is not yet completed. Eighty-three names are upon their muster roll, and according to the statement of Col. Delaney, your reporter, at least one-quarter of them have seen active service during the late rebellion. The members of this company are not wholly of Irish descent, or Catholics, as is generally supposed, but some are Scotch and English Protestants.

SERENADE.—The Newport Brass Band complimented Gen. Church by a serenade at his headquarters, at about 10 o'clock, Monday evening.

Soon after 10 o'clock, Tuesday morning, the Newport Light Infantry Zouaves, Lieut. Col. George H. Sherman, accompanied by the Newport Band, the Aquidneck Rifles, Capt. W. K. Delaney, with the Aquidneck Drum Corps, and the Burnside Guard, Lieut. Collins Burrill, 11th drum and file, appeared on Washington Square, in a battalion, under command of Lieut. Col. Sherman. And after a few minutes delay, set out upon their march for their camp ground, on Bellevue Avenue. Upon reaching the camp, the command devolved upon Brig. Gen. Church. At noon, Major General Horace Daniels

accompanied by his staff, arrived in the steamer Bay Queen, and soon after proceeded to the camp, where they reviewed and inspected the brigade at 1:30 p. m. At 2:30 p. m. the Major General and staff, with other invited guests, called upon His Honor Lieut. Gov. P. W. Stevens, at his residence, and were entertained by him in his usual hospitable manner, and at 3:30 p. m. they left for Providence.
