-Yesterday Father Deady of St. Joseph's Church, in announcing the memorial service next Thursday for those who lost their lives on the Maine, stated that Bishop Harkins had promised to be present.

-Yesterday was a gala day at the Thames Street Methodist Episcopal Church so far as the raising of money was concerned, nearly the entire amount needed, for current expenses being pledged.

-In the appellate division of the supreme court in Providence Saturday Elizabeth H. Swinburne was appointed trustee over the estate of Elizabeth T. Swinburne, the place of William J. Swinburne, deceased.

-Rev. H. N. Jeter spoke last evening at the Shiloh Baptist Church on The Suffering and Dying in Cuba. A collection was taken and has been sent to the committee in Boston which issued an appeal for aid in the relief work.

-The dramatic entertainment by the Spinsters' Fortnightly Club, which gave general satisfaction at the Chauning parlors last week, will at the request of many who were then unable to see it be repeated Tuesday evening, March 22.

-W. F. Davis of the Newport Golf Club is assisting in laying out the links of the Chevy Chase Hunt Club at Washington, which is rapidly taking to golf and is to enlarge its present excellent nine-hole course to one of eighteen holes.

-Rev. James Coyle, formerly pastor of St. Joseph's Church of this city and now of St. Mary's Church, Taunton, will deliver his lecture, "The Irish Soldier on our Battlefields," on St. Patrick's day in Music hall, Boston, for the benefit of the Working Boys' Home of that city.

-The deed from the Newport Hospital to Stuyvesant Fish, for a second tract of land on Ocean avenue and Carroll avenue, adjoining and surrounding his first purchase and containing 120,480 square feet, has been filed at the city hall. The price paid was \$12,048, or at the rate of ten cents per foot.

-Another military company is ready for business in Newport. It is the Iibernian Rifles, for whom M. Cross Saturday furnished the uniforms so necessary to change a private citizen into a military man. The uniforms are of regulation blue cloth, with green facings, helmets and black belts. The command

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will make its first appearance as a uniformed organization on St. Patrick's day, when it will go to Fall River to participate in the parade there.

-At Cloyne House Saturday evening Dr. O. W. Huntington, the principal of the school, gave an interesting lecture on Cuba, illustrated by colored lantern slides. Major H. C. Cochrane, U. S. M. C., at the close of the lecture gave interesting personal reminiscences of Admiral Farragut.

READY FOR WORK ON THE ISLAND ROAD.

The roads on the island are reported in excellent condition for driving and bicycling, and as fit as they well could be for the beginning of work on the island railway, which is expected to start about Thursday of this week. The ties, poles and rails, with necessary spikes, are strewn along the line, except that there are as yet no ties in Middletown. It is expected that some can be borrowed from Taunton, where they are not needed just now, for this part of the road, so that work can be started at once. A temporary house for the workmen is being built near the Stone Bridge, on the Portsmouth side.

Civil Engineer A. G. Menocal of the navy arrived in New York last week from Nicaragua, where he had been on duty in connection with the examination of the route of the Nicaraguan canal. He was taken sick on the vessel which brought him north, and when he reached his home in the navy yard on Flushing avenue Surgeon Hawks visited him, and said that he had been stricken with paralysis. Engineer Menocal was ordered home to appear before a board of inquiry which was to have convened last Monday, to inquire into the cause of the break in dry dock No. 3 in the navy yard last year. The holding of this court will be postponed until Engineer Menocal is well enough to appear before it. He is at present confined to his room.
