The schooner "Entire," Capt. Kinnear, arrived in our harbor Wednesday afternoon from Providence, via Dutch Island harbor. She came here to land the remains of Henry K. Harmon, of Saco, Me., one of her crew who fell from the schooner's "cross trees," striking the deck, and was killed instantly. His arm and leg were broken. Capt. K. provided a coffin and case, and the body was placed in charge of Messrs. Langley and Bennett, undertakers, who have entombed the same, subject to the order of the friends of the deceased. Capt. K. speaks of him as a superior and sober man. His age is supposed to be about 24 years.

Last evening a horse belonging to Mr. Samuel Sanford and mounted by his son, William, slipped on Washington square, throwing his rider and falling upon him. The young man was taken into the residence of Dr. J. T. Buttrick, who rendered all necessary services. Fortunately no bones were broken, although he was considerably bruised.
