Bernie Little and the winningest team in unlimited hydroplane history has unveiled a new Miss Budweiser for 1994



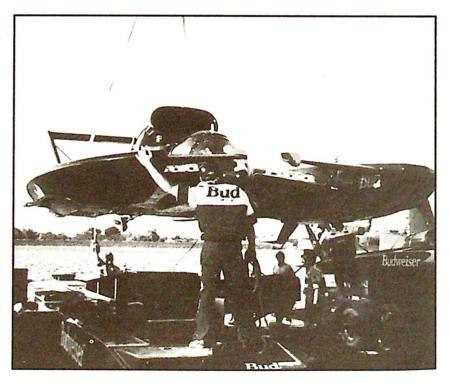
It's the first new boat in five years and it's hot!

The winningest team in hydroplane history has

unveiled a new Miss Budweiser. "This is our first new Miss Budweiser in five years and we hope it will be something special for our fans," said team owner, Bernie Little.

Little and the Miss Budweiser team will be competing for their 15th world championship during the 1994 season. It also marks the 32nd year of part-nership between Little and sponsor Anheuser-Busch, Inc., the world's largest brewer.

The competition has pretty much caught up with our two

older boats," said Little. "We hope that our new Miss Budweiser will, eventually, give us a new edge." The new boat, along with the other hulls and equipment, sports a new paint scheme. The familiar gold that has graced the boats for years is gone. The bold and flashy "Bud Red" is highlighted with blue and white. The new look ties into the entire Budweiser motorsports program which includes the IndyCar, NASCAR and NHRA teams.

The new boat, which took nearly 29 months to complete, is a combined effort of ideas from crew chief Ron Brown and crew members. One new design idea includes split canards. These driver-controlled airfoils extend toward the centerline from the tunnel walls at a slightly upward angle.

"The idea behind our new Miss Budweiser is to run through the air rather than the water," said driver Chip Hanauer. "The key, of course, is to have just the right amount of air under the boat at all times." Too little air and the boat will drag through the water. Too much and the boat becomes airborne.

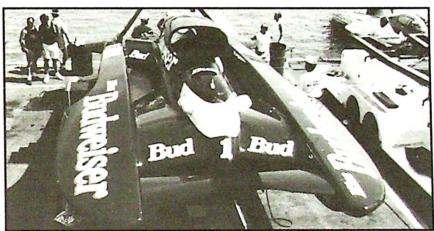
This spring, the crew traveled from the Tukwila, WA, to the Tri-Cities to see how the boat would do on water. "Our new Miss Budweiser ran pretty well right out of the box," said Hanauer. "Some new boats are very sensitive and even when they run well, can only operate in a narrow range. We've run a lot of different set-ups with the new Miss Budweiser and nothing really upset it."

It may be too soon to see ex-

actly how the new boat handles as the balance and handling characteristics of a new boat often requires several races, if not an entire season, to sort out.

As a result, proven hulls are typically competitive for several seasons. The Miss Bud-weiser team has won the 1992 and 1993 APBA Gold Cups and national championships with the 1987 and 1989 hulls.

Though the new hull traveled to Detroit, Little and the team decided to qualify the 1989 hull. "We didn't build a new Miss Budweiser to leave it sitting on the trailer but Detroit is a pretty tough place to debut a new

boat," said Little.

It's decisions like when to debut the boat that have made Little such a success. "Bernie Little has more drive and determination to be the best at what he does than anyone I know," said Brown. "Flis burning desire to succeed, in business or with the Miss Budweiser, rubs off on everyone."

Little was one of only 10 recipients of the coveted Horatio Alger Award, presented to those individuals who have achieved success despite difficult child-hood circumstances and who exemplify hard work, honesty and service to others.

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PINK LADY

Boat race fans will enjoy a blast from the past as Dr. Ken Muscatel fires the piston engines of the antique hydroplane Hawaii Kai III

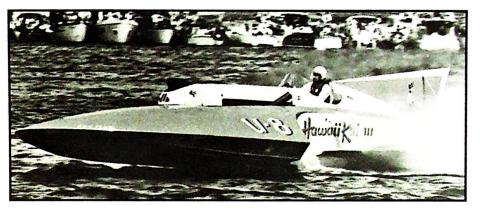

Boat race fans who miss the thunder of the pistons are in for a real treat when the Hawaii Kai III, a dominate factor in the 1950s, takes to the Columbia River during the River Spectacular weekend, July 29-31.

Slip back to the loud days as Dr. Ken Muscatel, driver of U-55 Superior Racing, will be at the helm of this antique classic.

The famed "Pink Lady," with her memorable paint scheme of tropical rose and coral-mist, bloomed late in her career. It wasn't until 1957 that the Hawaii Kai III and driver Jack Regas won the National High Points Championship. The team didn't win the coveted Gold Cup but they did win five straight races in a row and set numerous records that stood for years.

After an outstanding 1957 season it was a tough decision but boat owner and industrialist Edgar Kaiser was under business pressure which was putting the Kai's future in jeopardy. Kaiser put the boat in drydock and up for sale in 1958. The boat sat in storage until Kaiser, hungry for a Gold Cup, sent the boat and Regas

to the starting line on Lake Washington for one last shot.

In those days, the Gold Cup race location was determined by the yacht club of the winning boat. The Kai flew the burges of the Seattle Yacht Club, which was the defending Gold Cup champion on the basis of Miss Thirftway's victory in 1957.

On the eve of the Gold Cup race, the SYC defense team was in serious trouble. Maverick, a representative of the rival Lake Mead Yacht Club, was really on a roll. Driver Bill Stead was coming off back-to-back wins in his two previous races.

But on race day, it was all Hawaii Kai III, which won all three 30-mile heats hands down. Stead and Mav-

erick were decisively beaten by Regas and the resurrected "Pink Lady." Stead later commented, "I had forgotten how fast the Kai could go."

After the victory, the boat retired once more, this time with a Gold Cup win to her credit.

Restored to running condition by the Hydroplane and Raceboat Museum in Seattle, a replica of the original Hawaii Kai III, the former Breathless II, will make an exhibition run before the start of the 1994 Budweiser Columbia Cup. Muscatel, who will be driving, serves as director of the museum.

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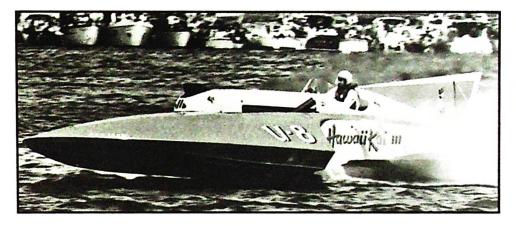
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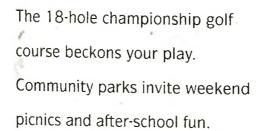

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RACING RULES

Though they may be classified as 'Unlimiteds' the boats still have guidelines and regulations to follow

From the time the first hydroplane hits the water, it's non-stop unlimited action!

Though, they may be called 'unlimiteds,' below are a few guidelines the teams must follow.

The Choice of Racing Lanes:

Each driver has his own ideas about which lane is best at each race site. Sometimes its the inside lane; sometimes is isn't! Lane choice for the first heat on Sunday is determined by qualifying speeds. Fastest qualifier gets first choice. From then on, choice of lanes is determined by the final position in the previous heat. Choice of lanes in the Last Chance and Championship heat is by cumulative points earned in previous heats.

The Flag Start:

Lanes are assigned to each driver prior to the start of each heat.

All boats form up in their chosen lane as they approach the starting line. They must stay in line with the boat in the outside lane that is running at approximately 140 miles per hour. With the white flag displayed, they go around the course one time and approach the starting line. If, in the opinion of the starter, the boats are in line, the green flag is raised and racing begins. If boats are not in line, they take another lap.

Driver's Signals:

These signals are used by drivers when their boats come to a stop or are involved in an accident while racing:

- Clasped hands above head. Everything OK. Need only routine assistance.
- Waving Helmet. Driver uninjured but boat needs immediate assistance.
- Waving both hands continuously above head. Driver in danger, needs immediate assistance. Racing is stopped to render aid.

• Capsules. The canopy must be opened within 60 seconds after the boat comes to a halt or the referee will stop the race.

Flag Signals:

RED: Signals the race has been stopped. Red flag is accompanied by the discharge of red or orange signal flares and smoke. Boats immediately stop in place and return to the pits with extreme caution only after the black flag has been displayed.

YELLOW: In flag starts, the time from the five minute gun until the white flag is raised just prior to the start. Also used to indicate to drivers of a hazardous condition on the course.

WHITE: The period just before the start of the race when boats are lining up for the flag start.

GREEN: Signifies race has begun during the flag start. Also, indicates the race leader is starting the final lap.

BLACK: Leave course immediately, pull to infield or return to the pits.

Qualification:

In order to qualify for the Sunday racing, a turbine-powered hydroplane must run one lap of 140 mph; piston-powered boats at 130 mph.

On Friday and Saturday morning, boats draw for position on the qualifying ladder. The same ladder is used for the afternoon qualifying session. At the designated time, the first boat in line has five minutes to enter the course.

Each boat takes a warm-up lap. Then, the green flag is raised signifying the first qualifying lap. At the end of the first lap, a white flag is raised to signify the start of the second lap. At the end of the second qualifying lap, the checkered flag is raising, denoting the end of qualifying period and signalling the boat to return to the pits.

Each day, national high points are awarded to the fastest qualifiers.

lst place	40 points
2nd place	30 points
3rd place	23 points
4th place	17 points
5th place	13 points
6th place	10 points

Prize money is also awarded for the fastest qualifiers each day.

The Qualifying Heats:

Three qualifying heats, each with Sections A & B, are run on Sunday afternoon to choose the six boats that will compete in the championship heat. The six boats accumulating the highest points at the completion of all preliminary heats are eligible for the final heat. The winner of the final heat is automatically the winner of the race, regardless of point total.

Prize money is divided only among the boats competing in the championship heat.

Last Chance: All boats that do not have enough points for the Championship heat, are eligible for the Last Chance. The winner of the Last Chance Heat is eligible for the final heat as a trailer boat, starting at least 15 seconds behind the starting field.

Points Awarded:

For each preliminary heat and championship heat:

lst place	400	points
2nd place	300	points
3rd place	225	points
4th place	169	points
5th place	127	points
6th place	95	points

A perfect score for race day would be 1,600 points for wins in all three preliminary heats plus the championship heat. An additional 80 points could have been won for being fastest qualifier on both Friday and Saturday. Maximum points that could be won at the Tri-Cities race would be 1,680.

FORMULA ONE RACE ACTION

The world's fastest turning boats add more excitement to Friday, Saturday and Sunday in Columbia Park!

The return of Outboard Grand Prix racing brings a completely new style of boat racing to the Tri-Cities for 1994.

The same class of boats raced here for the first time in 1986, and drew the largest crowd ever to Columbia Park for the Saturday feature race. Scheduling conflicts have prevented the Grand Prix boats from returning until this year. The Formula Ones will be coming to the Tri-Cities after racing in Saskatoon, Canada, on July 22-24.

The Formula Ones make an ideal "double-feature" in conjunction with the unlimiteds. Instead of the sheer power and size, the boats are light-weight and extremely maneuverable. They are the sharpest, fastest-turning racing vehicles in the world today.

Instead of the gentle turns of the 2 1/2-mile oval unlimited course, the Grand Prix course is a tight 1 1/4-mile trapezoid featuring razor-sharp turns.

The most common outboard engines used are the Mercury and Mariner 2 litre, V-6 powerhead which come from the production line 150-hp pleasure boat engine.



A dozen or more Formula Ones will start from the docks, going from 0 to 100 in five seconds flat.

The production engine is run at about 5500 RPM on a pleasure boat and uses regular gasoline. The racing version, with six 2-barrel carburetors, turns 8,000 rpm's and develops over 270 hp on premium leaded gasoline.

Formula One boats have a minimum length of 15 feet with a minimum weight restriction of 1,000 pounds, weight with driver and fuel. Most competition boats are approximately 17 feet in length.

The majority of the Formula Ones are constructed of wood, imported Okoume because of its light weight and exceptional strength. A bare, unrigged boat will weigh approximately 250 pounds. Compare this to an average 17-foot ski or bass boat that weighs around 900 to 1,000 pounds.

Because of their light weight, superior maneuverability and outstanding horsepower to weight ratio, boats can sustain their top speed of more than 140 miles per hour for hours at a time.

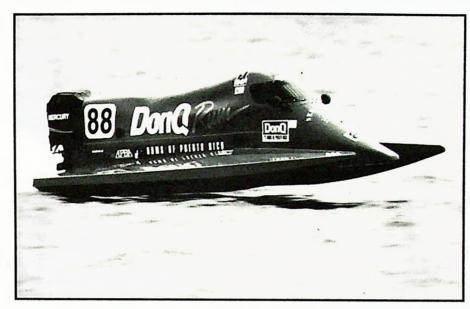
The tunnel hull design allows air to pass beneath the boat while at the same time the aero-dynamic design of the hull and deck creates lift, much like an airplane wing and literally lifts these "tunnel boats" off the water leaving only the tips of the two outer sponsons and the propeller touching the water's surface.

Grand Prix Style of Racing

When compared to the unlimiteds, the type of racing is entirely different.

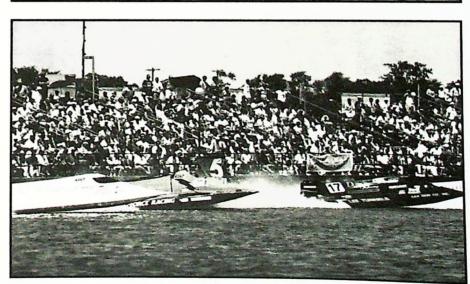
A dozen or more Formula One boats start from the dock with motors off. Upon a flag signal, drivers start their engines and head for the first buoy on the race course.

Boats can accelerate from the dead start to 100 mph in five seconds.



Because of their light weight, superior maneuverability and outstanding borsepower to weight ratio, boats can sustain their top speed of more than 140 miles per bour for hours at a time.





To keep competition close, during the championship race on Saturday, boats must return to the dock during the race for a mandatory two-minute pit stop. All 55 laps must be completed before the race is official.

Should there be a temporary race stoppage, boats remain on the course. At the restart, drivers follow a pace boat, positioned in the same order as when the race was halted, similar to auto racing.

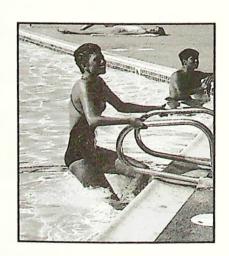

Over the years, booster button sales have helped support the community festival, provided funds for park improvements and returned scholarship money to Tri-City students and funds to many social organizations.

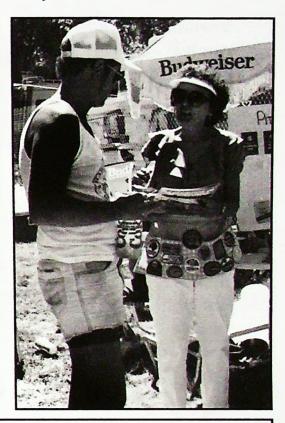

Bold technical feats by the people at Hanford helped end World War II. Many of the same caring and dedicated people helped end yet another war—the Cold War.

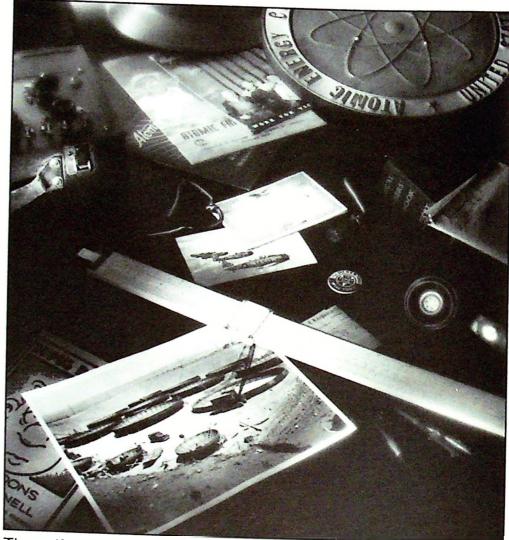
We're proud that Hanford's first mission was a success. And we care deeply about succeeding in today's mission—dealing with the defense waste legacy and restoring the environment.

It takes thousands pitching in countless hours of hard work and dedication to make races a blockbuster event!

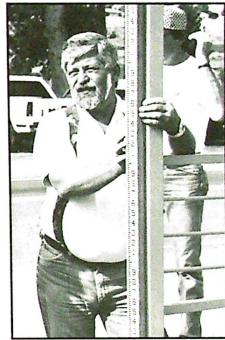

Team America, Julie Clark & Jim Coombes will headline the Tri-Cities International Air Show September 24 and 25





The dates have been set for the 17th annual Tri-Cities International Air Show—Sept. 24 and 25, 1994. This year's weekend in flight will include two afternoon performances.

Performers include: Team America, Captain Julie Clark and Jim Coombes, and an airfield full of military and static displays.

Team America have been entertaining fans across North America for 10 years. Their intricate, militarystyle routine includes three jet-like aircraft with over 50 maneuvers. Their act has earned them "Air Show Team of the Year" honors for three years. They will keep the crowd on the edge of their seats with speeds of up to 300 mph and cockpit updates from their Siai Marchetti F-260.

The F-260 is currently used by over 20 governments around the world as trainer and light attack planes.

Julie Clark is a veteran pilot with

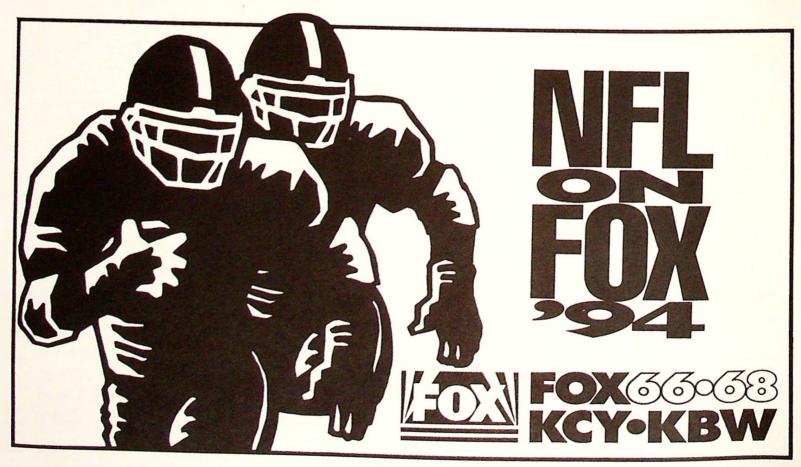

The hull construction is primarily honeycomb aluminum and composites and has had extensive wind tunnel and hydrodynamic testing and the Cranfield Institute in England. Ken Dryden will drive the Miss E-Lam Plus as the team gathers data to fine-tune this new boat. It has tested on Lake Washington in Seattle and will race for the first time in Tri-Cities.

U-8 The Tide

The Tide finished the season fourth in the O'Doul's High Point Championship, impressive considering the obstacles the boat and team overcame during the season. George Woods Jr., began the season driving, but a 360-degree blow-over in Kansas City during testing resulted in Woods suffering knee, ankle and back injuries. URC's "1992 Rookie of the Year," Nate Brown replaced Woods in the driver's seat and continued through the season, despite a blow-over in the Tri-Cities.

The Tide did well at the Exide Gold Cup, giving Mark Tate and U-10 Smokin' Joe some real competition. Brown was leading in the final until Tate pulled ahead during the third lap. Brown placed second.

"It's great to win at home, especially on a course like the Detroit River because you really feel you've accomplished something," Tate said. Tate won the Gold Cup driving the Winston in 1991. Last year in the Tri-Cities, Tate also won the Robert Young and Associates Dash for Cash.

Chip Hanauer had a perfect day in the Miss Budweiser, winning all four of his heats and then the final to win a record ninth Gold Cup, one more than Bill Muncey. The final was expected to be a showdown between the Miss Budweiser and Winston Eagle (Mark Tate), but the Winston blew an engine at the start and did not finish. George Woods Jr., in The Tide, finished second.

Budweiser Regatta at Miami, Florida, June 13

The Winston Eagle set a qualifying record, but the Miss Budweiser held on to win its second race of the season. In the final, Miss Circus Circus jumped out front early, but Hanauer drove the Miss Budweiser into the lead and never looked back. The Winston Eagle blew an engine in the final and did not finish the race.

Budweiser Thunder on the Ohio at Evansville, Indiana, June 27

In the season's most exciting race, the Miss Budweiser out-dueled the Winston Eagle for its third straight win. The two boats were locked side-by-side until the Winston Eagle hit a buoy on the third lap and was penalized one lap.

Budweiser Indiana Governor's Cup at Madison, Indiana, July 4

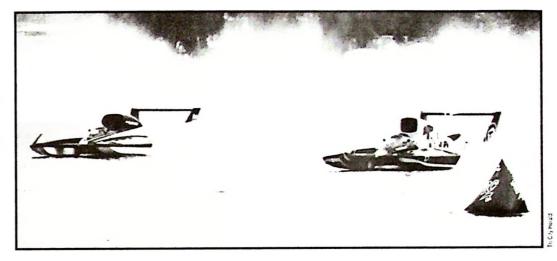

The Miss T-Plus, driven by Steve David, did not win any of the three preliminary heats, but delivered in the main event. David drove the Miss T-Plus to a record course speed in the final. It was the second win of the season for the Miss T-Plus, having won the season-opener in Lewisville, Texas. The Miss Budweiser was second, while the Kellogg's Frosted Flakes finished third and edged the Winston Eagle in the O'Doul's High Points Championship in the process.

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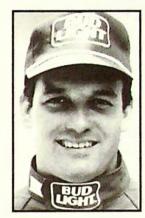

The Water Follies Association thanks KGH for their continued dedication in helping boat race fans have a safe and "spectacular" weekend.



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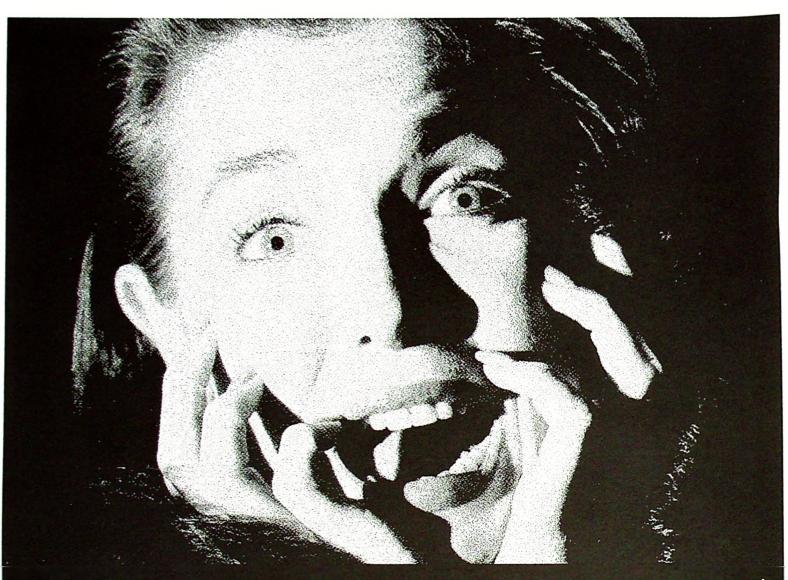


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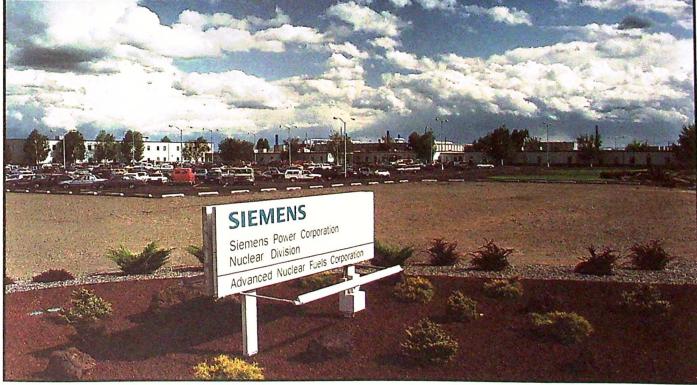


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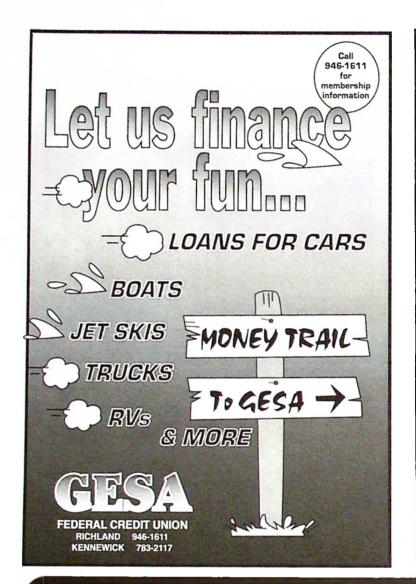
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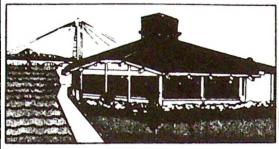

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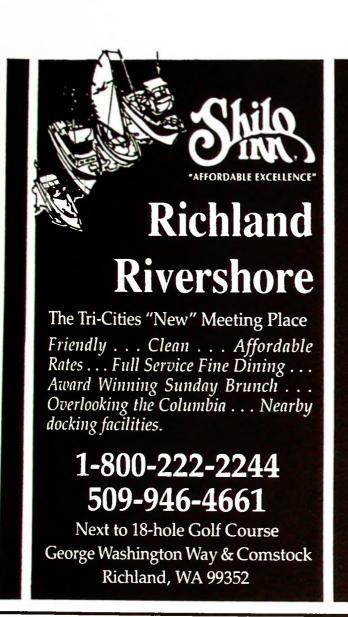
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TWICE THE ACTION

The Budweiser Columbia Cup and the Outboard Grand Prix will be broadcast nationally on ESPN and Prime Sports network

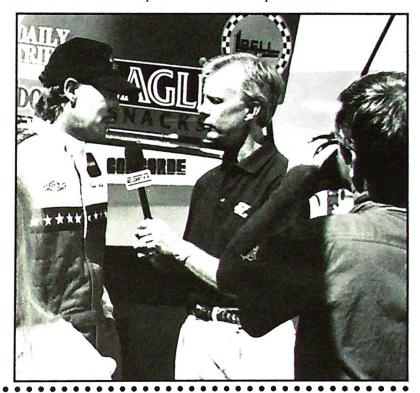
Boat racing action from the 1994 River Spectacular will be televised on two networks.

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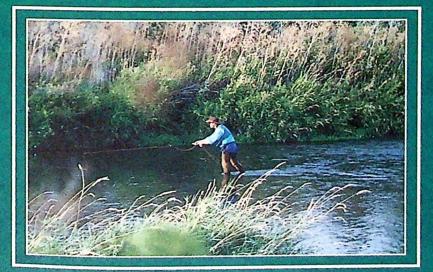
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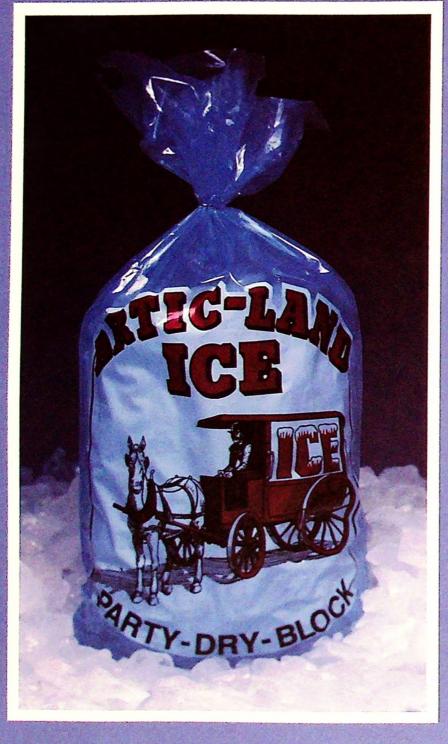


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PIT TOURS

Informative guides volunteer their knowledge about each boat, owner and driver along with a little hydro history

Nearly 25 years ago, the Tri-Cities opened the Unlimited Hydroplanes pits to the public for tours, being the first race site to do so.

Every year since then, touring the pits is one of the most popular events during boat races. Last year, over 6,500 race fans toured the Neil F. Lampson pits.

Erlan Leitz was just 16 years old when he began volunteering his time to guide interested fans through the pits, answering questions and telling the history behind each and every boat. "The pits really haven't changed all that much except when the pits first opened, people were allowed behind the boats, now for safety reasons, only pit crews are allowed behind the boats," says Leitz.

Leitz along with Carla Caudill serve as co-chairs of the Water Follies Pit Tour Committee.

Over 80 people volunteer as pit tour guides during boat race weekend. "We have a great mix of people," says Leitz. "The average age is about 23 or 24 years old and they come from all walks of life; kids still in school to teacher's aids, engineers, scientists, accountants and retirees."

Each guide is responsible to do their homework and study the ever-changing Unlimited Hydroplane industry. "We act as ambassadors of the Tri-City Water Follies Association and the Tri-Cities. It's important that we answer each question," says Leitz.

Informational meetings are held in

June and July and subjects such as public speaking, changes in the industry and safety are discussed. "Besides giving tours, we also help with security. Looking for shoes, shirts and credentials at the gates."

The guides also put together an informative display near the pit gate, featuring different boats

The Neil F. Lampson pits open for touring on Friday and Saturday beginning at 9 a.m. Everyone entering the pits must have a \$3 booster button or a pit pass. Buttons can be purchased at various businesses throughout the Tri-Cities or at the pit gates.

Tours leave from the gate every 15 to 20 minutes and shirts and shoes are required.





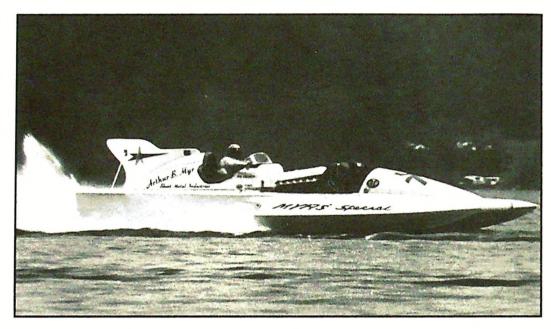
The Tri-City Water Follies salutes the 25th anniversary of the Apollo 11 mission and Neil Armstrong's famous walk

This year's double feature of racing isn't the first held by the Tri-City Water Follies. Over the years, the Unlimiteds have been paired with other boats, activities and even history.

On July 20, 1969, the huge crowds that lined the Columbia River were treated to a unique "double-feature."

While Dean Chenoweth was winning the fourth Atomic Cup in "Myr's Special," the first man was landing on the moon. Tri-City radio stations were hard-pressed to provide total coverage of both the unlimited race and the moonlanding.

Race fans cheered when they heard astronauts Neil Armstrong, Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin and Michael Collins in the Apollo 11, had touched down on the moon. While Armstrong was preparing to take his first steps, Chenowith



claimed the first prize in one of the most closely contested Tri-Cities races ever.

This year marks the 25th anniversary of the Apollo 11 landing and the added excitement to the 1969 Atomic Cup!

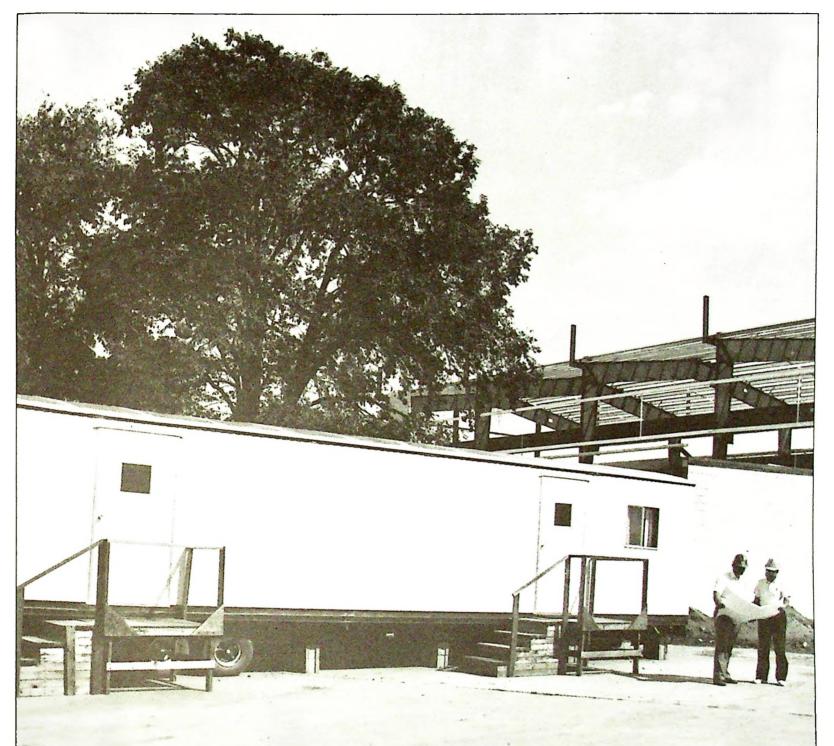
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After 29 years, volunteers have setting the unlimited hydroplane race course 'down to science'

Throughout its history, the race course for the Budweiser Columbia Cup has varied in size. The 1993 Budweiser Columbia Cup featured a two mile race course. This year, the course will be two and one-half miles.

Getting those familiar race course markers floating on the river for race weekend and in the exact position required by the APBA and course drawings, involves the combined efforts of the City of Richland Survev Team and the Water Follies Rescue team. The task also involves the cooperation of the controlling agencies for the Columbia and Snake River hydro-electric dam systems which are necessary for controlling and maintaining a constant depth of water needed for racing. Those agencies include the Corp of Engineers and Bonneville Power Administration.

The entire race course includes a total of 42 inside and outside markers and course buoys. Each is held in place with concrete

anchors, weighing 500 pounds each. Anchors are "ferried" to the proper locations in the river on the deck of the boats used during racing by the Water Follies rescue team.

The survey team, via radio communications, directs the crew to an exact spot. That spot is determined by the survey team and state-of-the-art computerized equipment. The anchor, equipped with a rope and a styrofoam floating marker, is dropped by the boat crew.

After the initial settings and fine-tuning, the course is verified and certified for the distance that is needed for racing. The course is checked each day the Unlimiteds run. The course is also re-certified after any "record" runs. The day after the Budweiser Columbia Cup is over, the anchors and styrofoam floating markers are removed and stored until the next

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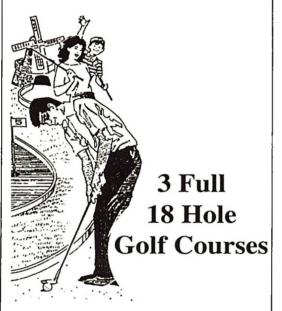
