The Lions carried the ball to the ten yard line before the gun ended the half.

During the first period of play, Harold Perkins, powerful fullback, drove right smack through the Beaver line for a touchdown. This gave the Lions a starting lead of 7-0. Still later in the first quarter of play Lee Long, fleetfooted right half, ran about 60 yards all by himself, chalking up another score for the hard hitting Lions.

During the second quarter another score was made by Harold Perkins, who is swift and slippery when carrying the ball. The Lions are now leading by a score of 20-0.

Richland kicked to Kennewick starting the third period of play. Quicker than the crowd could follow and much too fast for Richland, Bill Green, left half, grabbed the ball at the Lions 40 yard line and ran right up the field and over Richland's goal line for another touchdown. 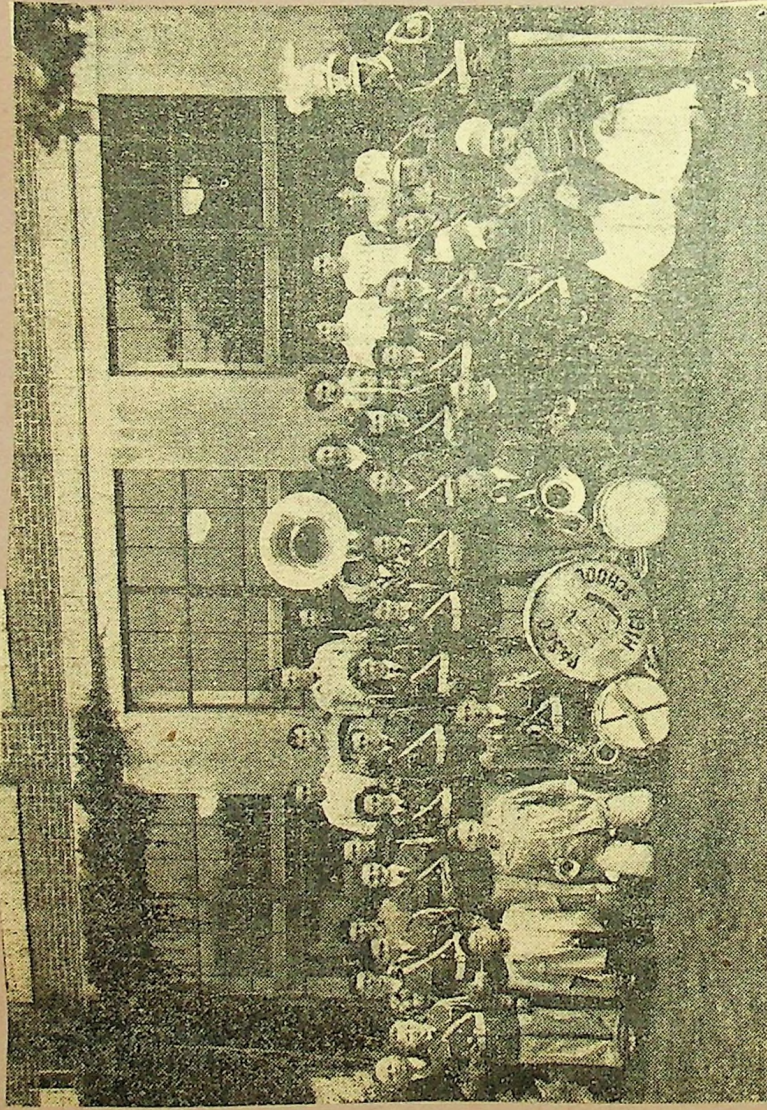

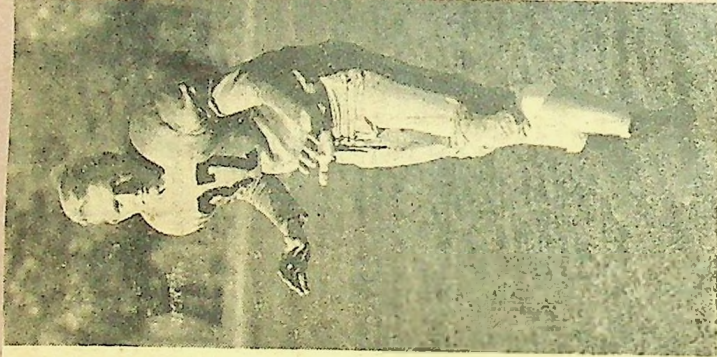

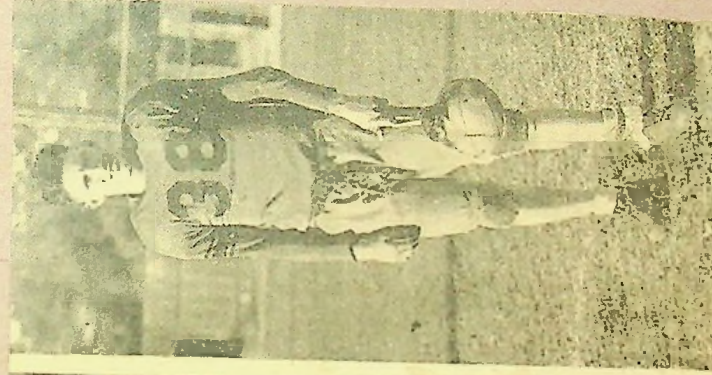

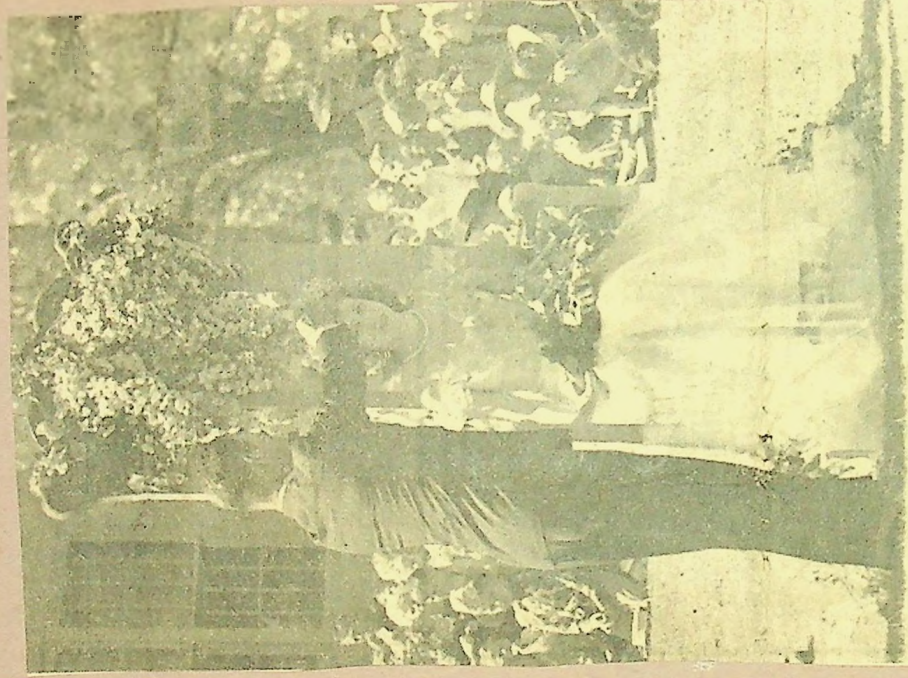


Youth Groups To Rally Sunday
