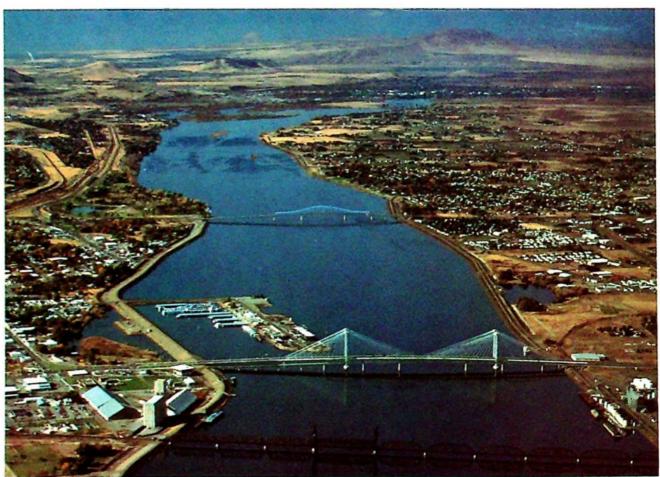

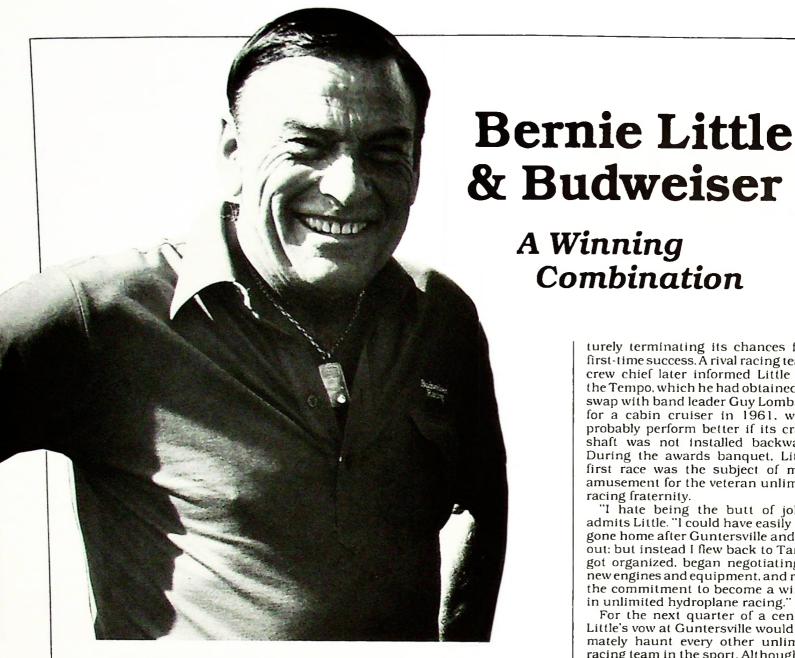

Miss Budweiser owner Bernie Little and Anheuser-Busch have been winning unlimited hydroplane races and setting thunderboat speed records longer than any other team in the sport. Little credits much of his own success as an owner to the solid, lasting relationship between himself and the world's largest brewer. A relationship which celebrates its 25th anniversary this year.

Along with eight national championships, the Miss Budweiser has compiled a record of five American Power Boat Association Gold Cup titles, two world championships, and victories at every race site on the unlimited circuit. This impressive set of credentials has made Bernie Little the winningest team owner in the sport with 56 career victories coming into the 1987 racing

season.

Anyone familiar with the sport of unlimited hydroplane racing knows of Bernie Little. It is largely upon his personality and skill as an owner that the sport has developed during the past two decades. Long before there were corporate sponsorships, turbinepowered engines and cable television

deals. Little had made a commitment to build the sport from the ground up.

His previous Miss Budweiser hydroplanes were perfect examples of his forward thinking, as in: the first offset cockpit, the first use of the Rolls-Royce Griffon engine, the first enclosed cockpit, and the first turbine-powered unlimited hydroplane to win a race on salt water. This year, the Bud team introduces its newest Miss Budweiser unlimited hydroplane.

Elected in 1986 as "Owner of the Year" by the Unlimited Racing Commission, Little's accomplishments in performance and design innovations are all the more impressive in light of the less-than-auspicious introduction he had to the sport at the 1963 Dixie Cup race in Guntersville, Ala.

I thought racing meant nothing more than buying gasoline, but when I looked down along the pit row and saw the Bardahl trucks and the sophistication of the Gale racing entourage, I wondered just what the hell I was getting into," said Little, recalling the day he first stepped into unlimited racing as a rookie with his first boat, Tempo.

Little's boat blew its engine, prema-

turely terminating its chances for a first-time success. A rival racing team's crew chief later informed Little that the Tempo, which he had obtained in a swap with band leader Guy Lombardo for a cabin cruiser in 1961, would probably perform better if its crankshaft was not installed backwards. During the awards banquet. Little's first race was the subject of much amusement for the veteran unlimited racing fraternity.

Combination

"I hate being the butt of jokes," admits Little. "I could have easily have gone home after Guntersville and sold out; but instead I flew back to Tampa. got organized, began negotiating for new engines and equipment, and made the commitment to become a winner in unlimited hydroplane racing.'

For the next quarter of a century, Little's vow at Guntersville would ultimately haunt every other unlimited racing team in the sport. Although the first five years of racing were tough ones for Little and the Bud team, inasmuch as they never won a race, a lesser man would have called it quits.

The first win would come during a semi-feature event in 1965 called the Horace Dodge Memorial at Detroit. His first major trophy race victory on the unlimited circuit would come a year later during the Atomic Cup held at the Tri-Cities.

Little's charismatic personality stretches outside the realms of boat racing as well. While the Miss Budweiser team is the visible ornament of his empire, it also mirrors his rise from a depression-era teenager to a biggerthan-life superstar leading a megabuck dynasty in the transportation and beverage distribution industries. among others.

Born in the small Ohio town of McComb, he worked as a youth operating a morning and evening paper route and helping with his father's construction business during the Great Depression. He also caddied at a golf course, where he would retrieve golf balls from the water hazard, repaint them and sell them back to the golfers.

Having repeated both the fifth and eighth grades, Little opted for the life of a sailor at age 17, just in time for World War II. He joined the Navy and almost immediately was blown off the stern of a troop ship by a Japanese suicide sub during the invasion of Okinawa. Later, he spent the days after V-J Day on a slow-moving Liberty Ship clearing Japan's inland waters of Americanlaid magnetic mines—a very hazardous task since the ship itself was used to attract the mines before they could be safely blown out of the water by a following destroyer.

Shortly after his discharge from the Merchant Marine, Little met Jane, and nine days later they were married. After more than 40 years they are still married and have two sons, a daughter and grandchildren.

He started a restaurant business with his brother, then sold cars, and in 1949 saved enough money to relocate

in Miami where he became a successful sales manager at a Lincoln-Mercury dealership. Soon after he fell in love with high-speed flying and became a stunt pilot during the 1950s.

He returned to Miami virtually flat broke after his traveling airshow folded. Before long, he turned everything around and began selling cars and airplanes, and in six years, had saved enough money to buy the St. Petersburg Airport. One day he saw Lombardo's four-seat hydro named Tempo.

"I just had to have it—the minute I saw it I knew I had to have it," said Little. On an afternoon in 1961 he took August Busch III, then Anheuser-Busch vice president, on a 140 mph ride. A deal was struck for \$5.000 to have the company sponsor the Tempo, and history was forever changed in favor of Bernie Little and Anheuser-Busch, the world's largest brewer.

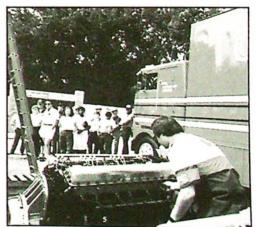


unfairly go unmentioned.

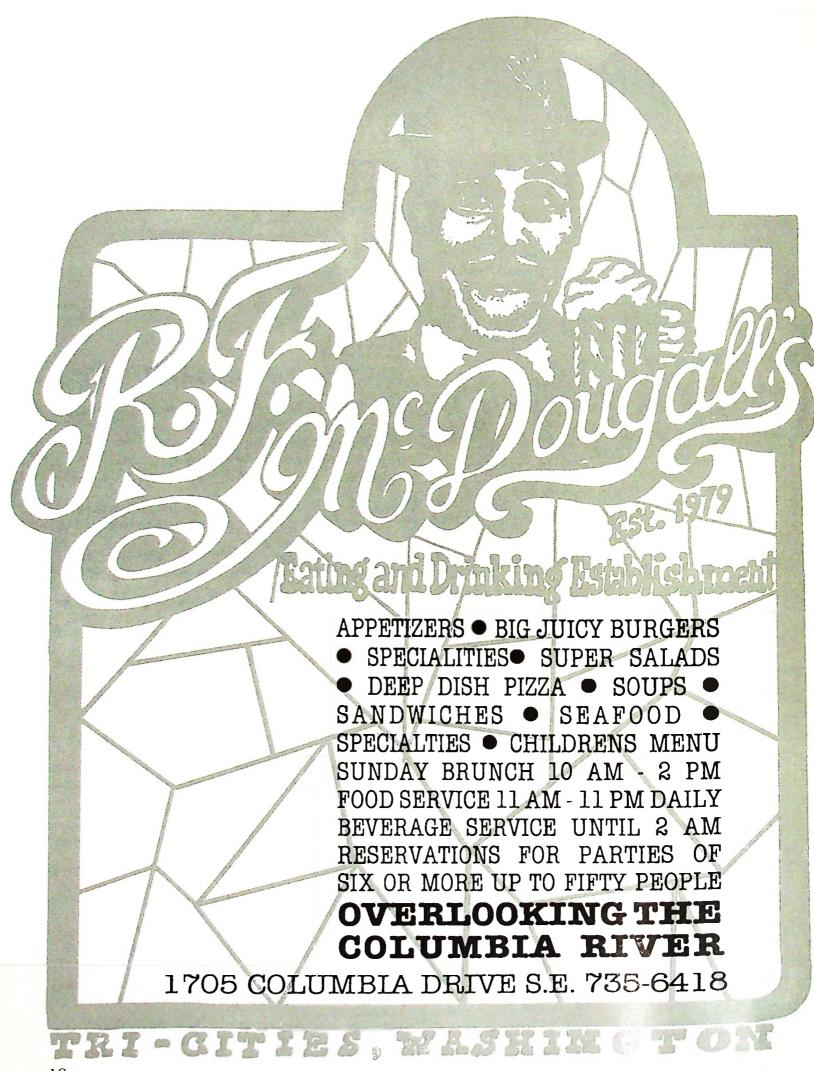

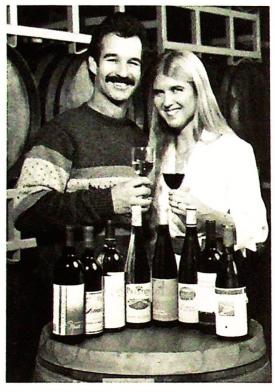

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With more than 9,000 acres of vinifera vineyards, Washington state is now the second largest producer of quality wine grapes in America. Although there is some vineyard acreage located west of the Cascades, the majority of the grapes produced in the Pacific Northwest are grown within a 50-mile radius of the Tri-Cities, making this area the heart of the Pacific Northwest's wine industry.

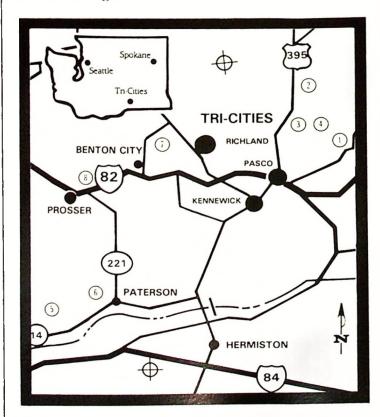
A refreshing wine to finish a perfect meal or to complement cheese or other food is an experience to savor, especially if that wine is one of the nationally acclaimed wines produced in the Columbia River Basin and Yakima River Valley. These two river valleys are where the majority of

the state's vinifera grapes are grown.

1987 Columbia Cup Prize Money -\$121,000

The prize money for the 1987 Budweiser Columbia Cup for unlimited hydroplanes was increased 10 percent from last year to a total of \$121,000. The increase is \$11,000 over the \$110,000 in prize money paid in 1986.

During qualifying prior to the final championship heat, part of the total prize money will be awarded to the fastest boats according to their qualifying speed. The remainder of the prize money is awarded to the top finishers of the Budweiser Columbia Cup on Sunday.

Columbia Cup Media Coverage

The hour-long ESPN program featuring the 1987 Budweiser Columbia Cup will be shown on the West Coast Aug. 9 at 3 p.m. The nationwide program, as well as other ESPN programs featuring unlimited hydroplane racing at other sites on the coast-to-coast circuit, will be repeated several times during the weeks following the initial program.

According to figures released earlier this year by the Unlimited Racing Commission, which produces the program, the 1986 Budweiser Columbia Cup was seen by an estimated 4.1 million viewers nationwide. ESPN carried last year's program five times, and the race held here in the Tri-Cities captured the third largest audience, trailing only behind the races held at Las Vegas and Miami

In addition to coverage by ESPN, live coverage of the 1987 Budweiser Columbia Cup will be aired on the Unlimited Radio Network, which is carried by 18 radio stations throughout the nation, including KONA-AM and FM in the Tri-Cities, KWWW-AM in Wenatchee, KJRB-AM in Spokane, and KVI-AM in Seattle.

Last year's race results were aired on more than 1,200 radio stations across the country, including live coverage in 15 of the top markets in the nation. The Columbia Cup also receives extensive coverage by the local media, and video clips of the unlimited races held here also make a showing on several network programs as well. Overseas, the Budweiser Columbia Cup receives coverage by the Armed Forces Radio Network.

In addition to the week-long coverage of the races here by the Tri-City Herald, more than 100 newspapers from the Atlantic to the Pacific carry information about the Columbia Cup each year.

The flags are displayed on the official barge, stationed near the starting line, and on the official boat, stationed on the infield of the course.

AT THE START:

Yellow Flag: Displayed at the firing of the 5-minute gun until 1-minute gun.

White Flag: At the 1-minute gun before the start, the yellow flag is lowered and replaced by the white flag.

Black Flag: When a boat does not comply with starting rules, it is used to signal a driver into the infield.

AFTER THE START OF THE RACE:

Red Flag: Signals that the race has been stopped or postponed. Also accompanied by discharge of red or orange smoke. Signals boats to return to the pits.

Yellow Flag: Indicates that there is a hazardous condition on the course. such as a stopped boat, which should command their attention and caution.

Green Flag: To indicate to the boat signaled that is is starting its final lap.

Checkered Flag: Displayed at the finish of the race to indicate to the boat passing the judges' stand that it has completed the race.

The Inboard Championship Series is a three-class boat racing event initiated earlier this year by a newly established national organization. and as one of only three sites originally selected to host the ICS races this year, the Tri-Cities will receive nationwide cable television coverage on ESPN.

Along with several other possible American and Canadian sports programs that will be carrying either partial clips or the entire program featuring ICS racing in the Tri-Cities, ESPN will show the one-hour program coast-to-coast, taking our race and our community into the living rooms of an estimated 35 million North American homes.

Inboard racing, the ultimate in motorized high-speed competition, parallels auto racing in equipment used and in excitement generated. This year's ICS races have been developed from a concept proven successful by popular auto racing circuits such as NASCAR and CART: A professionally organized series and the power of television—keys to success.

Our high-performance television package will be produced and distributed by Phipps & Company. based in Tulsa. Okla. The company will put together the one-hour program for use in market-by-market TV syndication or cable television distribution. This is in addition to the one-hour Columbia Cup TV program that is being produced separately.

ICS racing consists of two hydroplane classes—the 5 Litre and 7 Litre Formula MerCruisers, and one flatbottom class—the K Racing Runabouts. More than 100 American and Canadian drivers are expected to compete on the 1987 circuit, which so far includes three race sites with an additional three to be selected by the time the boats and drivers arrive in the Tri-Cities.

The ICS course on the Columbia River is a 1.25 mile oval with drivers making four laps for a total race distance of 5 miles. The boats will approach the starting line from a "milling area" as the time clock ticks down to zero.

If too many entries make up one field, the boats will be divided for elimination heats, and then the boats that score the most points during the preliminary heats will compete in the final heat.

Points awarded to the boats for placing high in the line-up serve a two-fold purpose. Not only are they used to determine the winners in Individual classes, but the points accumulated after each race are used, more importantly, for official final point standings at the end of the season. Just like in other boat racing divisions that use the American Power Boat Association point system, such as the unlimiteds, every point scored is very important to both the race teams and their sponsors.

The Tri-City Water Follies Association is the local sponsor of this year's ICS races. Mercury Marine and Ford Power Products are the major sponsors of the ICS, an independent organization under Phipps & Company administration.

5 Litre Formula MerCruisers

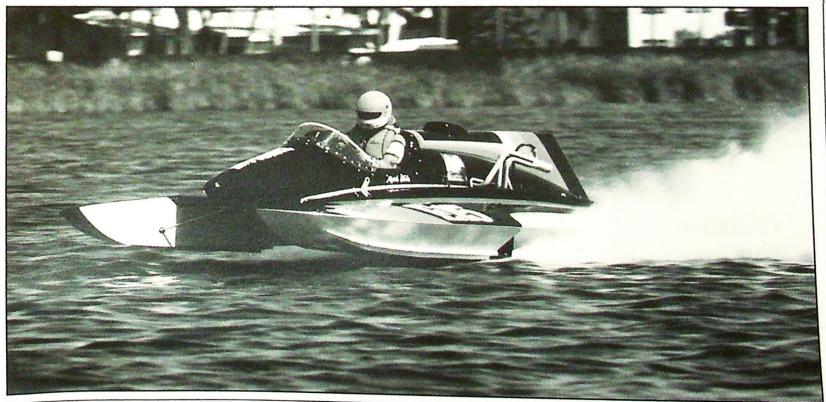
The 5 Litre Formula MerCruisers are 16 feet long and weigh 1,400 pounds. The most popular engines used are marine-based stock 302-cubic inch Fords and Chevys.

The 5-mile competition record is 85.564 mph. The straightaway kilo

record is 124.123 mph. The 1986 national champion is the Misty Lady, owned and driven by Pat Patterson. The 1986 national high point champion is the Pay 'N Play, owned and driven by Dave Bender.

The 5 Litre hydros, in closed-course

racing, are capable of speeds approaching 115 mph on the straightaways. No modifications are allowed to the engine or the hull, and hence, the boats are so evenly matched in speed that "boat setup" and driver skill become critical factors.

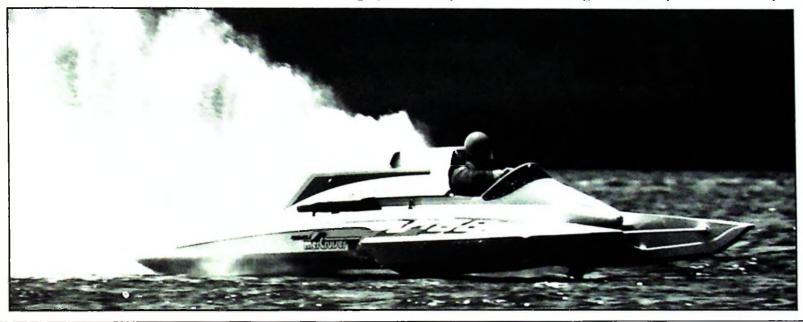

The 7 Litre hydros are allowed limited modifications but must be gasoline-fueled only. Speeds in closed-course racing can reach upwards to 140 mph.



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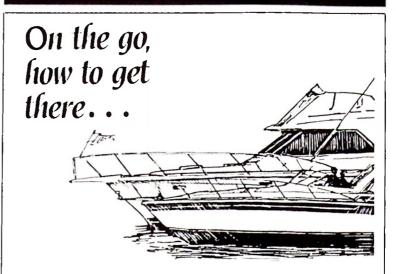
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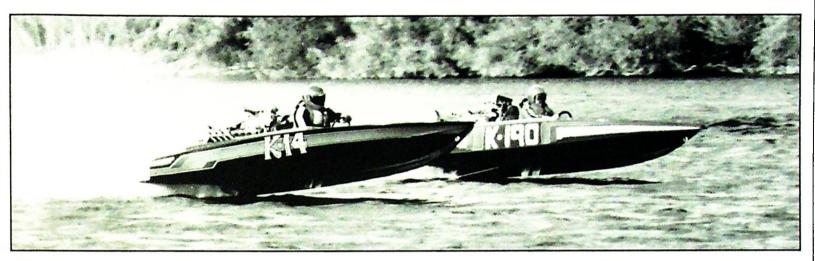

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The KKR's are 18 feet long and weigh 1,200 pounds. They are powered by unlimited or unrestricted engines, typically Chevys or Chryslers, and run on nitro-methanol fuel.

The 5-mile competition record for these flat-bottomed boats is 95.745 mph. The straightaway kilo record is 144.387 mph. In closed-course racing, the KKR's can go from 0 to 140 mph in 8 seconds.

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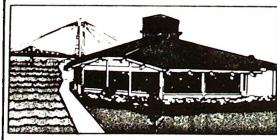
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TRI-CITIES INTERNATIONAL AIR SHOW



The 10th annual Tri-Cities International Air Show will begin at 1 p.m., Sunday. July 12 at the Tri-Cities Airport in Pasco. This year several exciting and entertaining aerial and static displays for the whole family to enjoy will be featured.

Team America, a top-billed flying trio from California, will be making their appearance with three Italian Siai Marchetti SF-260s. These single-engine planes are capable of speeds up to 300 mph and are used by more than 25 nations as effective ground attack and support aircraft.

The Siai Marchetti SF—260s are known internationally on the weapons market as one of the most formidable fighter planes available today, and according to team captain Chuck Lischer, Libya obtained more than 100 of them earlier this year and gave about a dozen to Nicaragua.

The Siai Marchetti SF-260s used by Team America are painted red. white and blue, and have been modified for peaceful airshow use. Two other members of the team are Barney Register and Frank Sanders. Brian Sanders is an alternate pilot.

ousted Zar's benevolent King Zon and holds him captive along with the king's daughter, the lovely princess Audeana.

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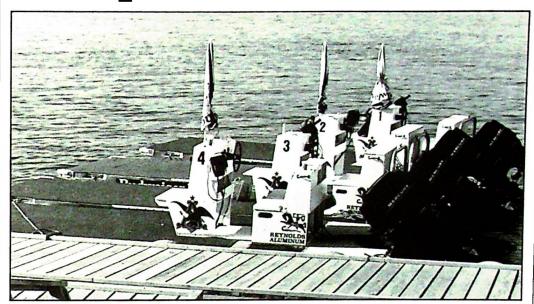
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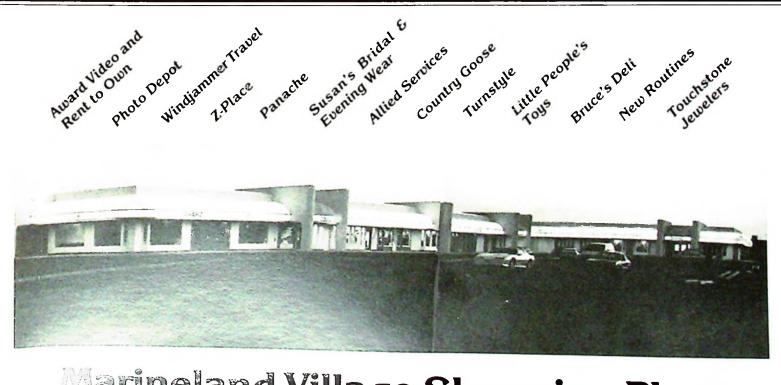


A Superhuman Effort
