





## State Fairs Will Share In \$362,000

(AP)-Various fairs will share in a total of \$362,000 of state tax money, the Washington Fairs Association was told today.

State Director of Agriculture Joe Dwyer, addressing some 200 delegates, said the amount in the fair fund is about \$4,000 more than last year. The money comes from a portion of the state tax on pari-mutuel betting.

THE FAIRS receive amounts based on their classifications. based on their classifications.
Four statewide youth shows will get 15 per cent; 10 Class A fairs (most district fairs) 35 per cent; 28 Class B county fairs 35 per cent; about 50 Class C community fairs 10 per cent.
The State Fairs Commission

The State Fairs Commission retains 5 per cent for administrative expenses and special assistance.

ADOPTED unanimously by the association was a resolution to the Legislature asking elimination of the present fair classification. It urges the judging of all fairs on a merit basis and putting all money into one pool and allocating it individually.

Dwyer announced the appointment of Paul Conner, state representative from Port Angeles, to the State Fairs Commission. He succeeds Jimurtin of Vancouver, who here



All swine must be vaccinated for cholera by a veterinarian prior to the show, and requirements for all female cattle on bangs test and vaccination are the same as last year.





## Fair, Rodeo Horse Show Set Aug. 19

One of the lesser known events to be staged at the Benton-Franklin Fair and Rodeo — but one of the truer tests of a horse and rider - is the horse show.

The show will be staged Aug. 19 and 20 at the Benton County Fairgrounds in Kennewick. The fair itself and carnival begin Aug. 20, and the rodeo will be staged Aug. 25, 26 and 27,

A season ticket to the fair also will admit the bearer to the horse

First included in the fair program in 1957, the horse show drew only 13 entrants. This year 72 riders have entered - showing an even greater increase of interest by comparison with last year's 43.

There are three major divisions to the show. As described by one of the judges, they are:

1. Western pleasure. Horse judged first, must be pleasure to ride. Response on loose rein, with a slow, easy jog trot and a smooth lope. Judged on manners, per-formance and conformation.

2. Equitation. Rider is judged on his ability to handle his horse. Must ride the horse both ways of the ring at a walk, trot and lope, making the horse respond immediately to the judge's commands.

The horse must be on the right lead at the lope each way of the

ring.
3. Trail horse. Special emphasis is placed on the walk. Horse must work over and through simulated & obstacles, usually found on the trail. Horse and rider must \* and ready for the unexp



#### FLOWERS

Number of blooms-Follow the premium list carefully. Too few or too many can disqualify.

Stage of maturity-Pick flowers stage of maturity at judging time. Generally this is just before full

Uniformity-This includes size, shape, color and length of stems. Size-According to type or vari-

Substance-Freshness, firmness, and-or fineness of texture.

Foliage-Every exhibit of cut flowers must include foliage for the quality and condition is considered in judging. No foliage is used except that on the stem of the specimen. Foliage should be cleaned, if dirty, by wiping carefully with a soft, damp cloth. Accessory foilage such as florist greens is never used with specimen exhibits.

Color-Should be clear, unfaded with attractive, harmonious markings or shadings. Do not mix colors of bloom in a class or lot numbers calling for one color of bloom. Mixed colors disqualifies. Stem-Stiff, straight, long.

Condition-Bloom and foilage should be free of insect damage. water spots, sunburn, bruises or other mechanical injury as well as mildew, rust spots, or other

Naturally all vegetables should be uniform as to size, shape, color, and degree of maturity. They should be clean, free of mechanical injury as well as plant insects and disease.

Tomatoes-Be sure all stems are on or all stems are off. Ripe tomatoes should be fully ripe. Green tomatoes should not have any color whatsoever.

Vine crops-Pumpkins, squash, cucumbers should have short stems and be neatly and evenly cut.

Pot crops-Peas, beans, okra should have short stems.

Head crops-Cabbage and lettuce should not be trimmed to closely. Leave on "wrapper leaves." Trim the stem off.

Dry onions-Whould be ripe and mature. What is left on the stem should be dry and papery, and the roots shriveled and dry.

Summer squash-Should be small to medium in size, the skin soft enough to be punctured by your thumbnail.







Going, going gone — the cry of the auctioneer will ring across the Benton-Franklin County Fair and Rodeo grounds Saturday morning as the 4-H and Future Farmers of America fat stock goes on the block in the Fat Stock Sale of the fair.


To be sold to the highest bidder are 85 fat lambs, 61 steers and 44 hogs.

The animals to be sold will be weighed and tagged at 6 a.m. Saturday and hogs and lambs at 6 a.m. Friday.

The animals will be grouped into market grades for the sale, with a blue ribbon indicating prime or high choice steers, prime lambs and No 1 hogs. Red indicates choice steers and lambs and No. 2 hogs and white good steers and lambs and No. 3 hogs. No animal grading lower than this will be eligible for the fat stock sale

All animals getting a grand champion or reserve champion in the fat classes in the fair must be sold at the fat stock sale.


Steers must weigh at least 750 pounds, hogs, between 180-240 pounds and lambs from 65-115 pounds to be eligible for the sale. The sale will start at 10 a.m. rday at the Fair Grounds.





#### Steer Wrestling

Steer wrestling accounts for a good deal of skinned hide and sprained joints among the cowboys. Dropping off a galloping horse, the contestant must collar a running steer, bring it to a stop and twist it over on its side so that all four feet are pointed in the same direction. Assisting the contestant is the hazer, a cowboy who rides alongside to keep the steer from veering. Time is counted from the moment the contestant breaks from his barrier until the steer is pinned down in the arena.

#### Bull Riding

The hump-necked, ugly Brahma bull is the cowboy's adversary in bull riding. The rider has a manila rope, wrapped around the animal's belly as his only handhold. The rope must be free to fall off when the rider releases his hand. 



# RCA Rule Governs Rodeos

Rodeo is perhaps the only professional sport which is governed by the men who participate in it. All rodcos of any size, if they are to attract participants, must be sanctioned by the Rodeo Cowboys Association which has headquarters in Denver, Colorado. This organization sets the official rules for rodeo, and the rules are observed, under penalty of fine, by the membership of the association -some 3,000 cowboys-and those who produce the contests

The board of directors and officers of the Rodeo Cowboys Association are elected from among active rodeo contestants and serve for a two-year term.

THE FOUR TO FIVE hundred RCA sanctioned rodeos held throughout the country each year are generally sponsored by a charpaying member of the organiza-



# Rodeo Explodes For Benton-Franklin County Fan Tonight

With an estimated \$5,500 prize money at stake, the annual Benton-Franklin County Fair Rodeo explodes into action tonight at the Fairgrounds in Kennewick with competition for some of the top cowboys in saddle bronc, bareback bronc and bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling.

The rodeo will be three performances long, at 8 p.m. today, 8 p.m. Saturday and 2:30 p.m. Sunday. Most of the 105 contestants who battled for \$5,629 last year will be back, plus some new ones.

Entrants will be members of the Rodeo Cowboys Assn., competing for points that go to the world championship title for 1961, the rodeo hand who wins the most money over the year. That honor is decided after the national finals in December, the sport's vorld series." The 15 high money winners in each event comthere for the crowns.

This is the 12th annual edition of the rodeo. There will be \$3,300 in purse money, plus entry fees. Also a \$500 saddle will be given by Tri-Cities merchants to the best all-around cowboy of the show. Stock contractors are Joe Kelsey and his son of Tonaskat.

Special events will be the Roman chariot race (with a \$500 final purse), the posse relay race and the dinner bell derby. The rodeo starts with a grand parade led by Rodeo Queen Joyce Hays and her court, Princesses Roma Walker, Lys Fauts and Sharon Harfley. Cowboys will be helped out of "ticklish" situations by clown Carl Doering and bullfighter Wick Peth.

Tickets may be obtained at the gates for \$3.50 box seats, \$2.50 grandstand, \$2 general admission and \$1 general admission for children. Children 12 and under will be admitted free Friday night if accompanied by an adult.

Another added attraction is a wild cow milking contest with Jaycees from Milton-Freewater, Hermiston, Walla Walla, Yakima, Prosser, Connell and the three Tri-Cities competing for prizes donated by Gay Lu, Kennewick Inn, Bridge View, Pastime and Bridge Pumps.

There will be a calf scramble for 4-H youths, with two calves turned loose. The Benton County Mounted Posse will sponsor with Pasco-Kennewick Rotary Club, X-L Angus Ranch, Washington Hardware, Campbell-C&H Supermarkets, Benny Blair Ranch and Western Materials donating calves.

Benny Reynolds, the TV quiz show winner from Melrose, Mont., is the leading money winner this year with more than \$22,000 in his high pockets. He competes in four events when he enters a rodeo. 




Altogether, \$3,300 plus entry fees are total stakes in the bareback and saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling and bull riding events.









IT WASN'T sanctioned by the Rodeo Cowboys Association, of course, but our two oldest boys, friend Mississippi and I had us quite a little wild-west show going Thursday evening.

Nor was it sanctioned by the three white hogs that furnished the thrills in lieu of bareback broncs and bucking bulls. Their loud, plaintive squeals sounded like a protest, if anything.

The two bigger pigs and little Matilda had been doing a fair, but unsystematic, job of plowing the alfalfa field since we put them to pasture. Since late August isn't plowing season around Finley, we decided maybe it was hog-ringing time instead.

Richard, Charlie and I had tackled the biggest hog earlier, without success. She became leery as I was about to squeeze the threecornered ornament into her proboscis, and took a powder. Thinking it might hurt her a little, I hesitated a second too long and she went through the fence.

IF I HAD qualms about ringing a hog before, I lost them during the two-hour chase across ours and neighbor Gene Enders' property. Just when the boys and I'd get her almost back to her pen, she'd make another beeline for the garden.

It wasn't vegetables she was after, it was strategy-darn clever

strategy at that. After she'd take us through the garden, the crafty old hog knew she'd get a chance to catch her breath while her pursuers picked sandburs from their clothes.

When we finally did wind her and get her penned again, we decided to postpone further hogringing efforts until someone came along - someone like Mississippi. who knows what he's doing. We realized one thing for certain that the man who named that breed of hog "Landrace" just wasn't chipping his teeth.

Those hogs didn't realize it, but they'd had it when Ol' Mississip' drove into the yard that night. He







## New Stand, Track Seen

# Vast Expansion Of Fairgrounds Studies

Expansion and improvement of Kennewick's fair and rodeo grounds to serve increased Tri-City crowds and to accomodate year round track and arena activities is now being studied.

The expansion, which may come within two years, is being jointly studied and promoted by the Benton-Franklin County Fair Board and the executive staff of the Benton County Mounted Posse, sponsor of the annual rodeo.

CAL LEIBEL. POSSE licutenant for rodeo activities, said meetings have been held and a definite plan worked out between the two organizations. The program would necessarily also hinge on participation by Kennewick, Benton County and the state.

It would involve moving all fair and rodeo activities east of their present sites, using 20 additional acres of land the fair board acquired in 1960 east of the existing grounds and possibly acquiring and using some city-owned former airport land north of the present grounds.

The entire future operation would center around a concrete grandstand with an initial 6,000-person seating capacity, which would replace the present wooden grandstand. The new stand, an arena and five-eighths mile race track would be the home of the annual Benton-Franklin County Rodeo, but several community functions could be held there.

LEIBEL FORESEES eventual winter horse shows, polo and other mounted horsemanship contests, and perhaps even pari-mutuel racing of a caliber carried on scasonally in Yakima, Spokane and the Puget Sound area.

Events not possible in the open air could be staged in a large central fair building being considered—a structure that could well serve the Tri-Cities as a coliseum. Ice hockey, wrestling and other indoor sports events are envisioned among the activities the building could make possible.

Tentatively, the plan involves staging all activities east of South Oak Street, which meets a deadend at the present center of the grounds. The fair and rodeo interests expect to grant easements for extension of Oak Street north to link with East Third Avenue when the latter becomes a major arterial. Space west of the street would be used mostly for parking.

COST ESTIMATE OF THE project has not been reached, but will be at least speculated upon at the Nov. 14 meeting of fair stockholders. Fair Board Vice President J. C. Pratt said, however, that certain state money is available.

Liebel said arena and track construction, some Posse money and "a lot of volunteer labor" would go into track and arena construction. He said the expansion would be geared to provide a facility equal to that of any comounity with a population of 10 people.
