"Industrial Strength:" Paintings and Drawings by Michael Longo

When painter Michael Longo was studying at the Newark School of Fine and Industrial Art, his professor and mentor James McGinley sent him and his fellow students out into the Newark environs to paint whatever inspired them. Longo felt drawn again and again to the massive industrial structures crisscrossing the landscape around the city, over the Hackensack River and around the Meadowlands swamp.

"I've always been fascinated with the bridges," he says. "They're like a giant erector set. As a kid, I was always taking stuff apart and putting it back together: cars, toys, anything my dad would let me." He admires their classic, hand-crafted solidity, and says, "You can see that things from this era (the early 20th century) were made with pride. New bridges are soulless." His painting style captures the bridges' solid and at the same time airy nature, often showing them rising isolated from the barren landscape, silhouetted against the sky. He adds that a friend of his put it best: "They're like big churches for a forgotten landscape."

Longo, who grew up in Lake Hiawatha, N.J., has lived in Hoboken since 1996 and has been visiting the Mile Square City since the 1980s. He likes the city's industrial roots and arts community, and he works out of a studio in the Neumann Leathers building. Other favorite subjects (*continued on page 2*)

Up & Down the River Talks: Harbor Security, Freud, Public Parkland and the Irish Waterfront

The year-long exhibition, *Up and Down the River: A History of the Hudson, 1609 – 2009*, continues to feature guest speakers on a variety of subjects illustrating the importance of Hoboken's location on the banks of the Hudson. In the next two months, topics will include national security and the New York Harbor, the centennial of Sigmund Freud's only U.S. visit, the fight for public parkland along the river's edge, and the influence of the Irish in Hoboken's working waterfront.

Pioneering Research in Maritime Security in the Hudson River, along Hoboken's Shore

Professor Julie Pullen, Director of the Maritime Security Laboratory at Stevens Institute of Technology

Hoboken is at the forefront of protecting our nation's borders, thanks to the work of the Maritime Security Laboratory (MSL) at Stevens Institute of Technology in Hoboken. On **Sunday, Sept. 13, at 4 p.m.,** Dr. Julie Pullen, the director of the MSL, will visit the Museum to share an overview of the lab's research, which is aimed at detecting threats and reducing vulnerabilities (*continued on page 2*)



include cranes along the waterfront, views of older buildings, often from an oblique angle through a window, and occasionally people. A recent line of work has been executed on Knob Creek bourbon bottle labels, which he preps with gesso, like a canvas, and paints right on the bottles. "It's a way to keep painting in the winter when it's too cold outside," he says. Several of these will be on display in his new show *Industrial Strength: Paintings and Drawings by Michael Longo*, on display in the Upper Gallery of the Hoboken Historical Museum from Saturday, Sept. 19, through Sunday, Nov. 1.

When he's not painting, Longo tends bar at some of the watering holes around town that continue to attract some of the old-timers and denizens of Hoboken's '70s and '80s arts and music scene, and spins records at bars and parties. Longo and his brother Pat will deejay the **opening reception** for *Industrial Strength* on Saturday, Sept. 19, from 2 - 5 p.m. His music collection favors the classics as well, with more than 5,000 78s, 45s, and LPs from the '40s, '50s, and '60s. The reception is free.

Longo's work has been displayed in several shows in Hudson County and New York City, including Chelsea Market and Art on the Street in New York City, in 1998 and 1999; at Pro Arts in Jersey City; several Artists Studio Tours in Hoboken; and solo shows at Bama Gallery and Maxwell's in Hoboken. Last year, his works were included in the 31st Small Works Show at Washington Square's East Galleries NYC.

in ports. If you attended Dr. Alan Blumberg's talk in April, you may know that Stevens' MSL conducts field experiments in the complex urban estuary of the Hudson River where currents, salinity, temperature, water level, vessel traffic, and acoustic properties fluctuate in both space and time.

Dr. Pullen will explain how MSL uses that research into the environmental complexities of the Hudson in developing and fielding technologies to address threat prediction and

detection across multiple timescales, ranging from terrorist incidents to coastal hazards. MSL's assets include sensors, vehicles, and models focused on the surface, underwater, and urban realms.

As Director of the Maritime Security Laboratory at Stevens Institute of Technology, Dr. Pullen uses highresolution coupled ocean-atmosphere modeling in order to understand and forecast the dynamics of coastal urban regions throughout the world. Her research experience encompasses study of the Mediterranean, U.S. East and West Coasts and Pacific island regions, with a particular emphasis on predicting chemical, biological, and radiological (CBR) dispersion in coastal cities. She was a principal investigator on a Department of Homeland Security grant to improve prediction of CBR dispersion in New York City by integrating multiscale modeling of air, sea, and buildings.

Additionally, Dr. Pullen was a member of the management team for the midtown Manhattan 2005 Urban Dispersion Program tracer release study, the largest of its kind in the U.S. She is also part of a scientific steering committee of the Office of Naval Research and is co-chair of the 2010 Ocean Sciences meeting, the largest gathering of oceanographers in the world. Analyze This: Freud's 1909 Visit to America through Hoboken's Port

John Burnham, Research Professor of History at Ohio State University

A hundred years ago, one of the most important figures of the modern era passed through Hoboken on his way to a speaking engagement at Clark University. The iconic event was Sigmund Freud's only trip to the United States, in the fall of 1909. The visit is mentioned in American history textbooks as a symbol of the great cultural changes that came in the early




twentieth century. Freud began this momentous trip and ended it, also, in Hoboken.

Dr. John Burnham, Research Professor of History at Ohio State University, will visit Hoboken on Sunday, Sept. 20, at 4 p.m., to commemorate the event 100 years after the visit ended. He will share passages from a previously untranslated document, Freud's letter telling of his arrival in the New World. This presentation is an

appropriate recognition of the role of Hoboken in this episode in American memory, an episode that symbolizes an important aspect of Hoboken's past. On Monday, Sept. 21, the actual

anniversary of Freud's arrival in Hoboken will be commemorated with a brief media event in Pier A Park at 11 a.m.

Professor Burnham is the author of a dozen books and scores of major articles. He has served as the president of the American Association for the History of Medicine and has been invited to give lectures all over the world on the history of psychoanalysis and psychiatry, on medical history, and on American social history.

On the Waterfront: Hoboken 1989 — 2009. **Referendum Victories Pave Wav for** Hoboken's Public Waterfront Park

In the first half of the 19th century, Hoboken was known for its popular public waterfront that included River Walk, Elysian Fields, and Sybil's Cave. By the late 1800s, Hoboken's waterfront was transformed into a bustling maritime port. Transatlantic ocean liners, dry dock/ship repair facilities and longshoremen handling break-bulk cargo dominated the water's edge for most of the 20th century. By 1990, these waterfront

industries had virtually disappeared, creating a once-in-acentury opportunity for a new vision for the Hudson River waterfront.

In July 1990, the voters of Hoboken rejected a massive development proposal for Hoboken's south waterfront put forth by the City and the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. This referendum victory led the Fund for a Better Waterfront (FBW) to propose a new vision for Hoboken's waterfront that would bring back full circle the idea of a public waterfront. The FBW plan called for a continuous public waterfront park from the Hoboken Train Terminal to the Weehawken Cove, clearly delineated from the upland private

development on new, Hoboken-sized blocks.

Today, this concept has been realized for much of Hoboken's waterfront, after many successful legal battles to preserve the water's edge for the public. On Sunday, Oct. 11, at 4 p.m., come hear Ron Hine, Executive Director of FBW, relate this history. The mission of FBW is to secure the land along the water's edge by the Hudson River as public parkland that will be enjoyed by people of all walks of life for generations to come. The opportunity to finish the missing links in Hoboken's waterfront park is now tantalizingly close and would result in a prototype for waterfront planning.

On the Irish Waterfront: The Crusader, the Movie, and the Soul of the Port of New York

James T. Fisher, Professor, Fordham University

As one of the world's busiest harbors in the first half of the 20th century, the Port of New York, including Hoboken's waterfront, attracted gangsters, politicians, and union leaders,

each fighting for a piece of the huge economic pie. The movie "On the Waterfront" depicted longshoreman а struggling with the decision to betray his neighborhood code by testifying before the organized crime



commission, urged on by a priest who risked his own career to help improve the lives of his parishioners. The priest was based in large part on a real historic figure, John M. "Pete" Corridan, a crusading priest committed to winning union democracy and social justice for the port's dockworkers and their families.

Historian James Terence Fisher visits the Museum on Sunday, Nov. 1, at 4 p.m., to talk about his latest book, On the Irish Waterfront: The Crusader, the Movie, and the Soul of the Port of New York, which tells the story of Corridan's ferocious advocacy and his role working with screenwriter Budd Schulberg in shaping the film. A Jesuit labor school instructor, not a parish priest, Corridan was resisted by the very men he

sought to rescue from the violence and criminality that ruled the waterfront.

According to the book's publisher, Cornell University Press, *On the Irish Waterfront* is also a detailed social history of the New York/New Jersey waterfront, from the rise of Irish-American entrepreneurs and political bosses during the World War I era to the mid-1950s, when new intermodal shipping containers led to a radical reorganization of the port.

Fisher, a New Jersey native, grew up not far from the

Hudson River cargo docks. His fascination with the huge steel containers that lined the docks of Bayonne in the 1980s fueled his interest in the waterfront's history. He is now a professor of theology at Fordham University, and is also the author of *The Catholic Counterculture in America*, 1933 – 1962 (University of North Carolina Press: 1989), *Dr. America: The Lives of Thomas A. Dooley*, 1927 – 1961 (University of Massachusetts Press: 1997), *Communion of Immigrants: A History of Catholics in America* (Oxford University Press: 2000), and numerous articles and essays about American cultural history and religion.

Third Annual Heirloom Garlic Festival Recalls "Old Country" Flavors

They're back! Dozens of garlic varieties—cultivated for their distinctive taste by generations of gardeners—will again be available for tasting in the walkway outside of the Museum's front door on **Sunday, Oct. 18, from 1 - 5 p.m.**

Farmers Sue and Rich Sisti of Catalpa Ridge Farm in Wantage Township, N.J., are offering many old-time garlic varieties for sampling, from the mellow, pink-streaked "Red Toch," which originated in the village of Tochliavri, Republic of Georgia, to the spicy "Lorz Italian," which the Lorz family brought to Washington State from Italy before 1900. Immigrants often brought treasured herbs and seeds with them when they came to America, seeking familiar tastes in their new home. The tasting event is free. You can also try out dips made by the Sistis using their own fresh garlic and other farm ingredients, along with other food featuring "the stinking rose." And if you're interested in taking home some Jerseygrown garlic and other produce, a stand will be set up for your purchases.
