Notices will be on the bulliten board for signup. A new assignment sheet has been passed out to the members. There are a few changes. The present drivers training program will undergo some changes. Anyone that is interested in helping with this program contact him.

There have been some changes in the February drill schedule.

Chief's Report cont.:

Tom Santillo informed the members that due to the lack of office and storage space, a plan to divide the training room into two more rooms was in the planing stages. The department would supply the material and the Village would do the work. This would not entail any structural changes to the building and could be removed in the future if desired.

The plans for a cascade system have been dropped at this time. The cost, about \$13,000.00 would not justify the times we would use it.

We will be going to a four number system for our trucks soon. Tom thanked the members for their showing at Vinnie Kennelley's funeral.

The mutual aid assignment for the Baptist Home is being changed. The Village has purchased the new sirens for the chiefs cars. One of the old light bars has been sold.

Tom then approched the letter in the February 1, 1989 issue of the Fairport Herald Mail. The letter, "Truck or Toy ?" realy "pissed me off" were the words of the chief. Tom had contacted the person who wrote the letter and he was in no way going to listen to the reasons of our visit and the type of truck purchased. This man's mind is set and no one is going to change it. A discussion followed and it was decided not reply to his letter as a unit. The trip did save the Village \$2,000.00 on the cost of the truck. The department answered 31 alarms in January with no serious alarm



The meeting was adjourned at 8:45pm on a motion by Dan Schrader and a second by Gardner Lewis.

A Republican, Kennelley campaigned for Democrat Louise Slaughter for Congress in 1986. Exasperated members of the Perinton Republican Committee

demanded his resignation.

"I could elect *not* to give the resignation and go through a formal hearing, but it's not worth it... I'd been kicked out of Fairport's Volunteer Fireman's Post I'd be concerned."

For days he was a man beset with calls of support. People liked him; they liked his cheerful independence.

Unlike so many politicians on that matter, so many people), Vincent Kennelley was always himself—flunky and nobody's fool. His many friends will miss him.

Vin will be missed. Not only was he a staunch supporter of the Fire Department at the Village Board but after forty-one years as a member, he was still visible at the fires. We will miss him at Main and Whitney controlling the traffic as roll through the intersection.

Truck or toy?

To the Editor:

I am relieved to know that I am not paying for the Fairport Fire Department Truck Committee's vacation to Florida, nor for their extravagant new toy. Fortunately, my area of Perinton is not part of that fire district. If I lived in the village, my sentiments would be quite different.

I suppose that since the taxpayers are shelling out \$450 thousand for a 95-foot ladder truck, that the committee thought a few thousand dollars to send them to Florida wouldn't be noticed. Ostensibly the five men have headed south in the dead of winter to make sure the truck meets specifications before it is built. This cannot be done in writing? In the purchase contract? In Fairport

or through the mail? This requires five people? It would be appropriate to check the truck's specifications before accepting delivery, but this month's excursion looks like a golf trip.

Thanks to the vigilance of this committee, citizen's living and working in Fairport's nine and 10-story buildings can rest easy. There soon will be a 95-foot ladder truck that can reach them in an emergency. Now all we need is a few nine and 10-story buildings. A new snorkel truck, the type the new vehicle is replacing, would be cheaper, more maneuverable and less expensive to operate and maintain. But are they made in Florida?

The true facts

To the Editor:

I am responding to the letter written by David Mallon on Feb. 1. In Mr. Mallon's letter, he tries to state facts about the Fairport Fire Department's purchase of its new ladder truck. I would personally like to state the true facts for him and anyone else he may have misled.

First, it is true that five members of the fire department went down to Florida to check on the specifications of the new truck. This trip happened to save the taxpayers close to \$2,000 by finding errors that have occurred through phone calls and also through the mail. (As Mr. Mallon suggests to be an alternative to sending men down.)

Yes, it would be appropriate to check the trucks' specifications before accepting delivery, but what happens if the truck did not meet its specifications and had to stay in the factory for another month or so? What happens in the meantime if we happen to have a major fire and a taxpayer loses their life? Do we tell them that we are sorry, but our snorkel is 19 years old and frequently out of service, because of lack of parts and service? Do we also tell them that our new ladder truck did not

meet its' specifications and we had to leave it at the factory?

Mr. Mallon also stated that the committee made a golf excursion out of their trip. This excursion happened to consist of a total of 48 hours, 30 of which was spent in meetings and tours of the factory. Just so you can rest easy, Mr. Mallon, there was no golf played on this trip.

He also stated that since the taxpayers were paying \$450,000 for this new truck, they wouldn't miss a few thousand dollars to pay for the committee's trip. Just to set the record straight, the village of Fairport purchased the plane tickets for the committee. These tickets added up to be just over \$1,000, which to me seems like a pretty reasonable price. Emergency One (the company that is building the truck) paid for the committee's hotel and food expenses.

I could go on and explain why a new snorkel would not be cheaper to purchase, and why it would be less expensive to maintain and operate, but I have my doubts that Mr. Mallon would be able to comprehend this.

Yes, the people in Fairport Fire District can rest easy knowing that they are being protected by the Fairport Fire Department, and soon their new ladder truck. Also, Mr. Mallon, you stated that you are glad you do not live in the Fairport Fire District. Well, this is one firefighter that is also glad you do not.

When opening gates on the hydrants, open them slowly not to cause a hammer effect that could cause damage to the main.

OBITUARY

David Eagan, 34, popular Fairport firefighter

David Eagan, a Fairport resident and volunteer fireman for 13 years, died at his 28 Packett Boat Drive home Tuesday, Oct. 10, 1989, after a bout with cancer. He was 34 years old.

Mr. Eagan, who moved to Fairport just after getting married in 1976, received much attention last month when the Fairport Fire Department sponsored a benefit concert in his honor. The band Nik and the Nice Guys performed at the Sept. 24 event.

He suffered about a year from a pancreatic tumor, an uncommon form of cancer that attacked his lungs and spinal cord, leaving him paralyzed during the last few months of his life.

He died in his sleep early Tuesday morning, his wife, Sue, said Thursday.

Mr. Eagan was born and raised in the city of Rochester, where he attended Franklin and East high schools. He was one of 10 children.

After high school, he worked for 11 years as a sales driver at Pepsi Cola.

During that time, he married the former Sue Bonamie and moved to Fairport.

He left Pepsi Cola six years ago to become a merchandiser and swing salesman at Canada Dry in East Rochester.

While working at Canada Dry, Mr. Eagan also worked part time as a bartender at Fairview Lanes and the Green Tavern.

However, he lost his job at Canada Dry when the company was sold in April, 1988.

Five months after losing his job, in September, 1988, he was diagnosed as having cancer. Because of the tumor's position, doctors determined that it was inoperable.

In addition to his wife, Mr. Eagan is survived by his two daughters, Kelly and Katie; his mother, Anne; five sisters, Sally Nichols, Mary Kralis,

Dianne Heerkens, Joyce Koester, and Nancy Farrara; four brothers, John, Raymond, William, and Robert; and many nieces and nephews.

His friends called at the Richard H. Keenan Home, 41 S. Main St., from 2 to 4 p.m. and from 7 to 9 p.m. Thursday. A memorial service was held Friday morning at the Raymond Memorial

Baptist Church.

Ivan Masclee, former Fairport fire marshal

Ivan Masclee, a former Fairport policeman and volunteer fireman, died of heart failure at Strong Memorial Hospital on Monday, Nov. 27, 1989. He was 79 years old.

Mr. Masclee, a longtime resident of Fairport, was also the village's fire marshal until his retirement last year.

Mr. Masclee was born Aug. 1, 1910, in Williamson, Wayne County, and moved to Fairport at an early age. He attended the Fairport schools.

After high school, Mr. Masclee went to work at Finn Auto Supply in Fairport, where he worked for 15 years as the shop's manager.

Mr. Masclee married the former Bertha Aldrige of Victor on Feb. 27, 1937. They had three children.

He eventually joined the Fairport Police Department, working part time at first. He later served 16 years as a full-time officer.

In addition to his work with the Fairport police, Mr. Masclee was also a member of the Fairport Fire Department. He served more than 50 years in the department, including two terms as the department's chief.

Mr. Masclee's interests included raising horses and running a bicycle repair shop out of his garage at his 9 Summit St. home.

He was also a member of Raymond Memorial Baptist Church of Fairport.

Mr. Masclee is survived by his wife, Bertha; and their three children,

Gwyneth Bassage of Walworth; Narene White of Macedon; and Kent of North Redding, Mass. He is also survived by a sister, Mary King; and seven grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.

The County HazMat truck will be working out of Station #1 for the next couple of weeks. If it is needed, one driver (one who is on the list for the rescue) or Mike Bates if he is here will respond. Make sure you know where you are going.

We have received a \$10,000.00 State Grant and it will be used to help cover the cost of a new base radio.

Tom asked the members to think about purchasing our own cascade system. The cost would be in the neighborhood of about \$10,000.00. The money would come from the major equipment fund.

Jery Davis questioned if we were having problems with Egypt. Tom noted that we weren't but we had to work around their schedule and it could take two days or two weeks to get our bottles back.

Ray Oldenburg moved that we set up a committee to look into the purchase of a cascade system. This was seconded by Paul Kolb and carried.

The Chief noted that we responded to forty (40) calls in May. This gives us a total of 172 calls for the year. We could see our first 400 call year in 1990.

2.1 The officers of the Fire Department shall consist of a President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Sergeant-at-Arms, Property Clerk, Communications Officer, Chief, First Assistant Chief, Second Assistant, First, Second and Third Captains, First, Second, Third and Fourth Lieutenants, and Delegates to outside organizations.

4.16 Third Lieutenant: It shall be the duty of the Third Lieutenant to assist the Chiefs, Captains, First and Second Lieutenants at all times.

4.17 Fourth Lieutenant: It shall be the duty of the Fourth Lieutenant to assist the Chiefs, Captains, First, Second and Third Lieutenants at all times.

BYLAWS

1.1 The term of office for the Chief, First Assistant Chief, Second Assistant Chief, First Captain, Second Captain, Third Captain, First Lieutenant, Second Lieutenant, Third Lieutenant, Fourth Lieutenant, President, First Vice President, Second Vice President shall be for a period of one (1) year and no member shall hold more than three (3) successive terms for any single office.

4.1 To qualify for the office of First Assistant Chief, a member shall have served as a Second Assistant Chief a minimum of one (1) year.

4.3 To qualify for the office of Second Assistant Chief, a member shall have served as a Captain for a minimum of two (2) years.

4.4 To qualify for the office of Captain, a member shall have served as a Lieutenant for a minimum of two (2) years.

- 1) Be a member of the Fairport Fire Department for a minimum of three (3) years
- 2) Have a valid New York State drivers license
- 3) Have been a qualified driver on all Fire Department apparatus for a minimum of six (6) months.

CONSTITUTION

Present: 2-1. The officers of the Fire Department shall consist of a President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Sergeant-at-Arms, Property Clerk, Communications Officer, Chief, First Assistant Chief, Second Assistant Chief, and Delegates to outside organizations.

Proposed: 2.1 The officers of the Fire Department shall consist of a President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Sergeant-at-Arms, Property Clerk, Communications Officer, Chief, First Assistant Chief, Second Assistant Chief, **first Captain, second Captain, third Captain, first First Lieutenant, second First Lieutenant, third First Lieutenant, first Second Lieutenant, second Second Lieutenant, third Second Lieutenant**, and Delegates to outside organizations.

4.11 Captains, First Lieutenants, Second Lieutenants:
It shall be the duty of these nine officers to assist the Chiefs at all times. They shall complete incident reports, conduct training, inventory and inspect fire apparatus and equipment, and complete other duties as assigned by the Chiefs.

4.12 Communications Officer: *As presently written.*

4.13 Delegates to Outside Organizations: *As presently written.*

BY-LAWS

Article V Qualifications for Captain, First Lieutenant,
Second Lieutenant

- 5.1 To qualify for one of the offices of Captain, the member shall have served as a First Lieutenant for a period of one year.
- 5.2 To qualify for one of the offices of First Lieutenant, the member shall have served as a Second Lieutenant for a period of one year.
- 5.3 To qualify for one of the offices of Second Lieutenant, the member shall meet all of the following:
 - A. Shall have three consecutive years of active service in the Fairport Fire Department.
 - B. Shall have participated in 15 drills in the previous twelve months.
 - C. Shall be a qualified driver on all apparatus.

The present Articles V thru VIII shall be renumbered as Articles VI thru IX.

Proposed change NUMBER 2 to the Constitution and By-Laws of the Fairport Fire Department:

BY-LAWS

OPTION 1

1.2 The term of office of the three Captains, three First Lieutenants, and three Second Lieutenants shall be for a period of one year at each level. That is, one year as a Second Lieutenant regardless of which position, one year as a First Lieutenant regardless of which position, and one year as a Captain regardless of which position.

OR

OPTION 2

1.2 The term of office of the three Captains, three First Lieutenants, and three Second Lieutenants shall be for a period of one year at each level and no member shall hold more than two successive terms at any level. That is; no more than two terms as a Second Lieutenant regardless of which position, no more than two terms as a First Lieutenant regardless of which position, and no more than two terms as a Captain regardless of which position.

The present paragraphs 1.2 and 1.3 of Article 1 would be renumbered as 1.3 and 1.4.

Dear Chief Gropp:

This is to request that you pass along my sincere appreciation to one of your firefighters, Bill Evans. On Friday, August 16th in the evening, Perinton Ambulance and South-East Quadrant received a call for a person having a heart attack. I responded as the paramedic on Medic 32. Bill was at the scene seconds after the call went out since the location happened to be his next door neighbor.

Bill found his neighbor down on the floor with no pulse and he was not breathing. He quickly performed mouth-to-mouth and after 2 attempts, the patient started to breathe. He determined that there might have been a communications problem when he heard the family had called 911 and told them their father was "sick". He called Perinton Ambulance on his portable, made sure Advanced Life Support was en-route, and gave us a short update as to what was going on.

Even though mouth-to-mouth can be a traumatic experience the first time around, Bill was calm and very professional upon my arrival. He left the patient in the good hands of another firefighter (whose name I do not know) and came out to the ambulance when we pulled up. Bill gave us a quick complete synopsis of what had occurred in the last 5 minutes and led us to the patient. The ambulance crew and I spent less than 10 minutes on the scene with the patient as your firefighters were there to help out. Bill was able to coordinate the firefighters to help lift the patient, carry equipment, and get the patient loaded into the ambulance all while trying to console the family.

It was saddening to hear that the patient had passed away the next morning. However, I am sure that Bill's actions (which saved the patient's life) had given the patient's family a little more time with him before he was gone. If Bill had not been on the scene so quick, or given the mouth-to-mouth, there would have been a more critical patient waiting for me at the scene that would not have made it until the morning.

We welcome trained medical help at critical scenes like this one. It is obvious that Bill's efforts made a difference and so often these people are not recognized. Please take a minute and thank Bill for saving a life.

If the fire gets too hot, don't be afraid to move back. For the proper operation of the task force nozzles on 1 3/4 hose you must have 120 psi on the tip. We did not have this on all the line at the drill. (it seems that 3c14 found the only line with the needed pressure and it pinned him)

John Snider is in charge of the Halloween Parade detail. The parade will start at 6:15 P.M. The Home Coming parade will be on the 11th and we will place the equipment that is manned in the parade. Fire Police will work both parades.

The County is presently obtaining Hepatitis "B" vaccine for the Fire Service. Those wanting this vaccine contact the Chief this evening.

We are still missing some American Heat video tapes. Please bring them back.

The County Water Authority is marking the fire hydrants with the size of main colors. Green, 10" or more; Yellow, 8"; Red, 6" or less and Black is a dead end hydrant.

There is equipment signout sheets in both halls. Get permission from the Chief or President before removing any equipment. Fill out the sheet and place one half in the Chiefs mailbox.

P.O.'s are to be used on all purchases. Make sure they are filled out with a complete address and signed. Mark for what event the P.O. is being used for.

Please place your fire ground tag on the ring in the truck you came on when going to an alarm. This is the only way we have to keep track of who is at the fire scene.

There will be a first responder course at Mendon beginning on November 26th. Only members with current first aid and CPR cards are to respond to EMS calls. If we don't have one of these people in the hall and available to respond, alert the Fire Dispatcher that we can not cover the call.


