



For these reasons, the students of P.H.S. are very greatful for having known Mrs. Myers as a teacher and as a friend.



Other science classes, ranging from General Biology to Chemistry to A.P. Biology, provide a wealth of information for interested students.















As was the case last year, the P.A.G. classes, under the direction of Mr. Covington, staged a "drug-bust" simulation. Narcs in the three classes attempted to develop cases from evidence gathered in order to bring the sellers to court. The judges in the three classes were Edgar Green, Paul Richardson, and Sharon Taylor.

Evidence against Ronnie Sample was suppressed due to violation of the chain of custody. Second period's defendant, Poul Sorensen, was found guilty of possession and possession with the intent to sell. The defense argued that the chain of custody had been violated here also,

but Judge Richardson did not accept their plea. In fourth period's trials, Lisa Malloy and Chris Gebo were acquitted while Teresa Miller and Tim Darcy, fellow Narcs, were charged with entrapment. The students thought it was an interesting experience.








The students who went on the shorter trip to Canada also had an exciting time. They visited the cities of Montreal and Quebec.

While in Montreal, the students visited the site of the 1976 Olympics and toured old Montreal by bus. They also had time to shop in downtown Montreal.




