

The math department provides programs for both the academic and general student. In this way, the personal wants and needs of the individual









# "Experience In Depth"

A new program in team teaching proved most successful this year at Pocomoke High School. In previous years, senior students have studied Elizabethan England primarily from a literature viewpoint. This year many phases—art, music, history, religion, science, and drama—were brought together for an "experience in depth". Teachers from various departments pooled their knowledge of this period. The Elizabethan program was highlighted by two events: a program of selected readings from Elizabethan writers given by Miss Dolores Miller of Salisbury State College and a field trip to St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Salisbury.


# Creative Ability Encouraged



Several ninth grade students try their hand at lathe work.














# Mr. and Miss P.H.S. and Court







# District 5 Champs Compete








