


Although many people do not realize it, Mr. Bob Law, art instructor at Pocomoke High, is much more than an art teacher.








The Science Department at P.H.S. explored many aspects of science.

grades went into an indepth study of the dissec-tion of frogs and pigs, while the Chemistry classes carried out experiments.
















Learning about art is a challenging and strenuous experience.
Only hard work and discipline will lead to success. The successful art student at PHS knows that in order to learn anything he must set high objectives for himself and then demonstrate them with action rather than words.








The homemaking program places emphasis on three areas: foods and nutrition, clothing selection and construction, and family living. It is the aim of the department to provide students


SPORTS...
