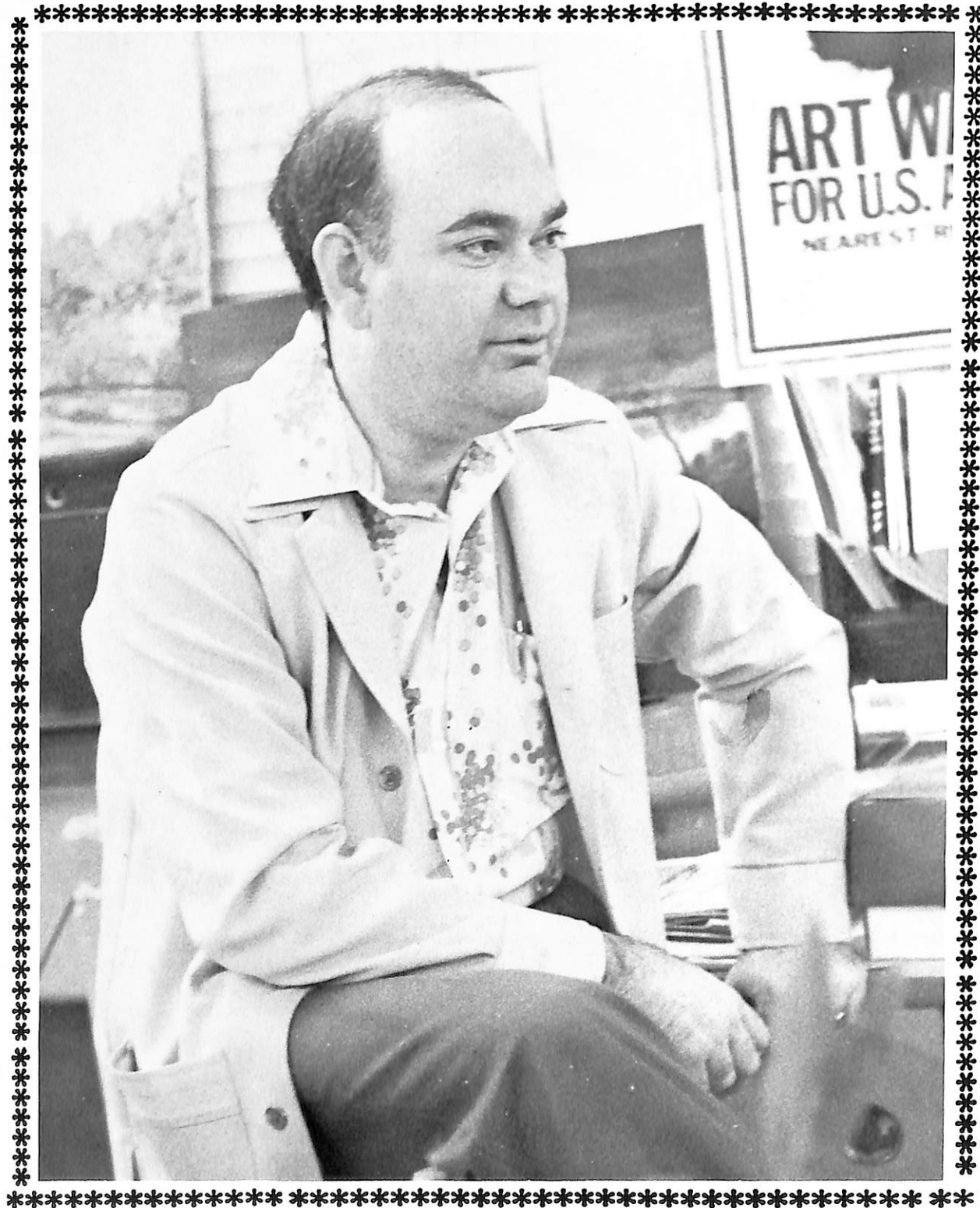

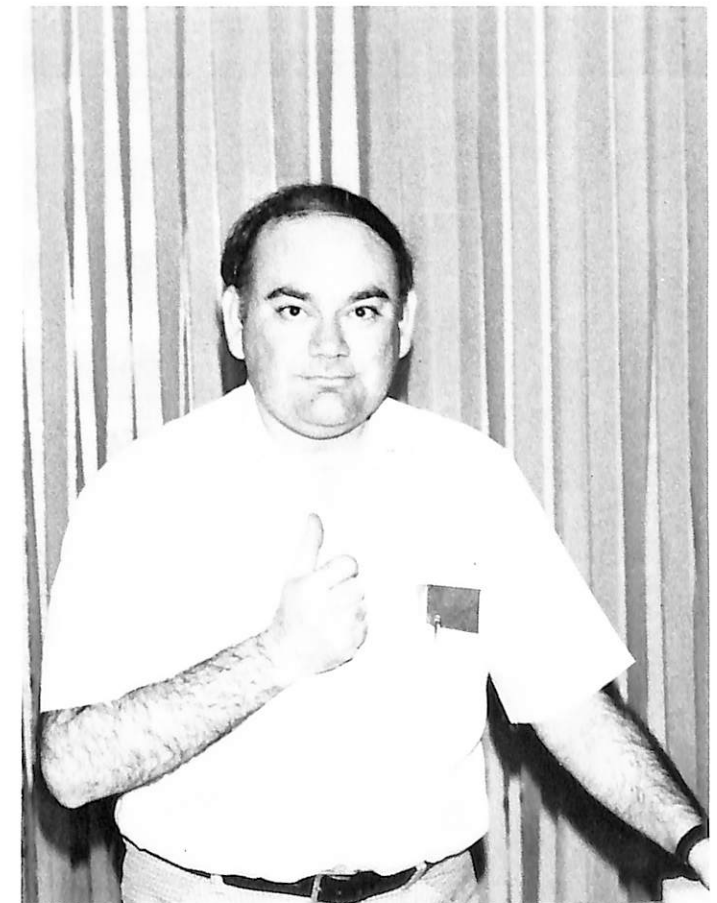
Although many people do not realize it, Mr. Bob Law, art instructor at Pocomoke High, is much more than an art teacher.

We thank you for everything Mr. Law, and with gratitude, we dedicate our yearbook to you.

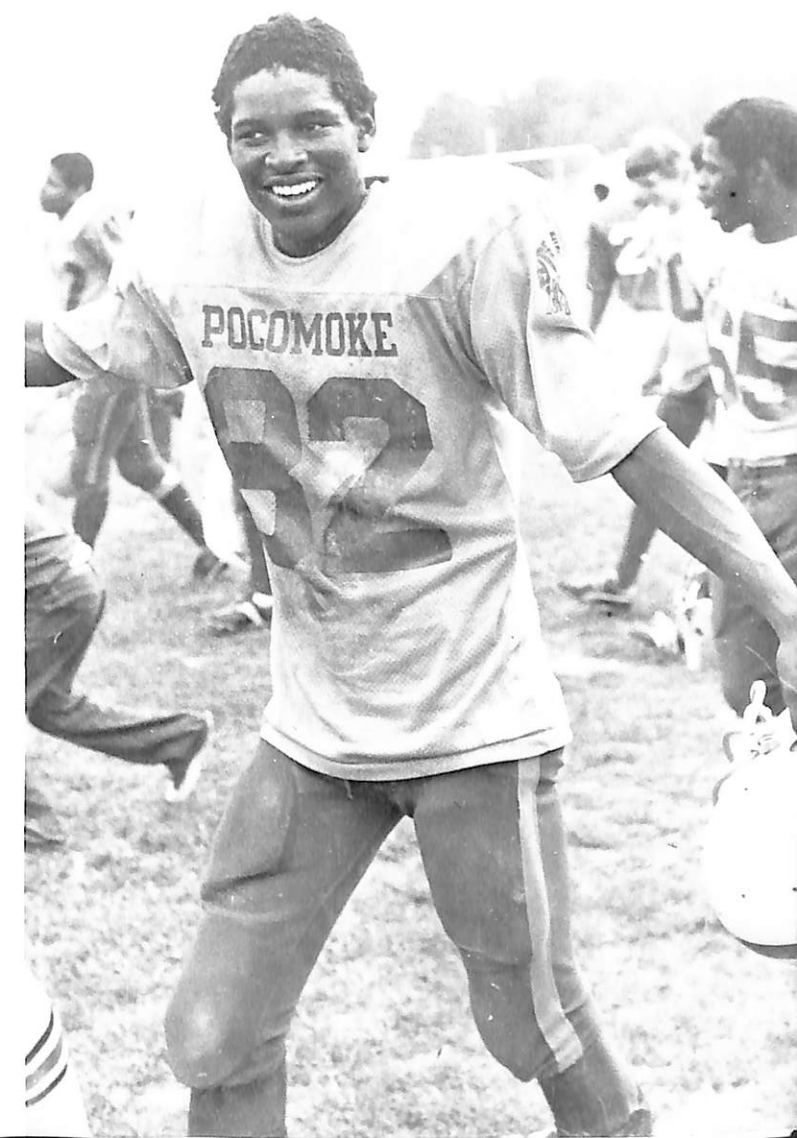
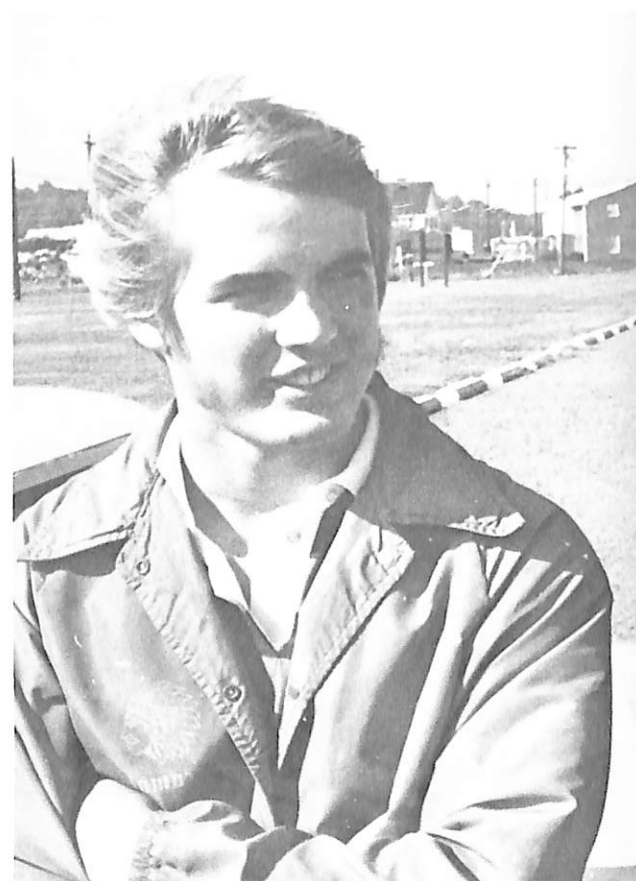


REFLECTIONS . . .

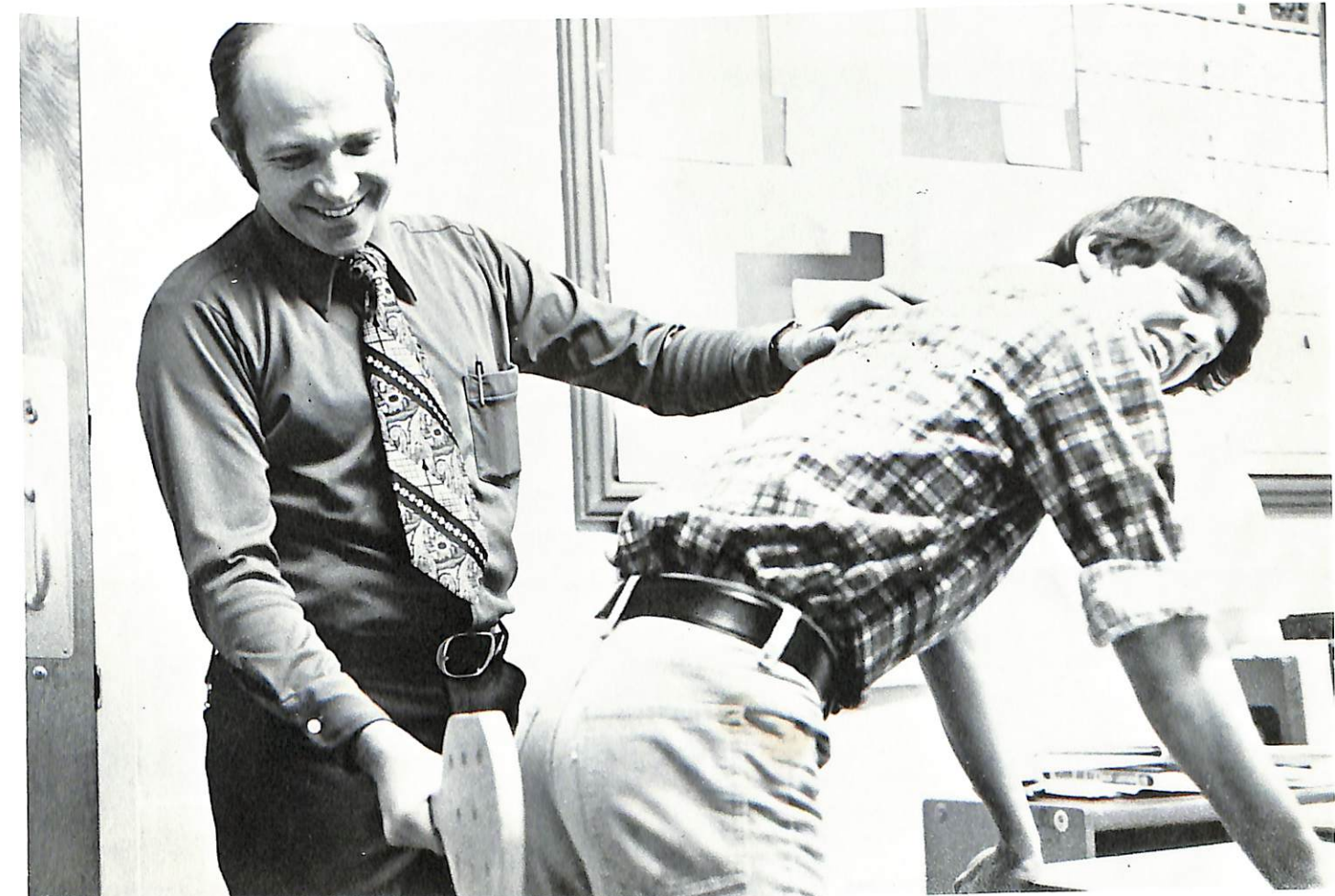
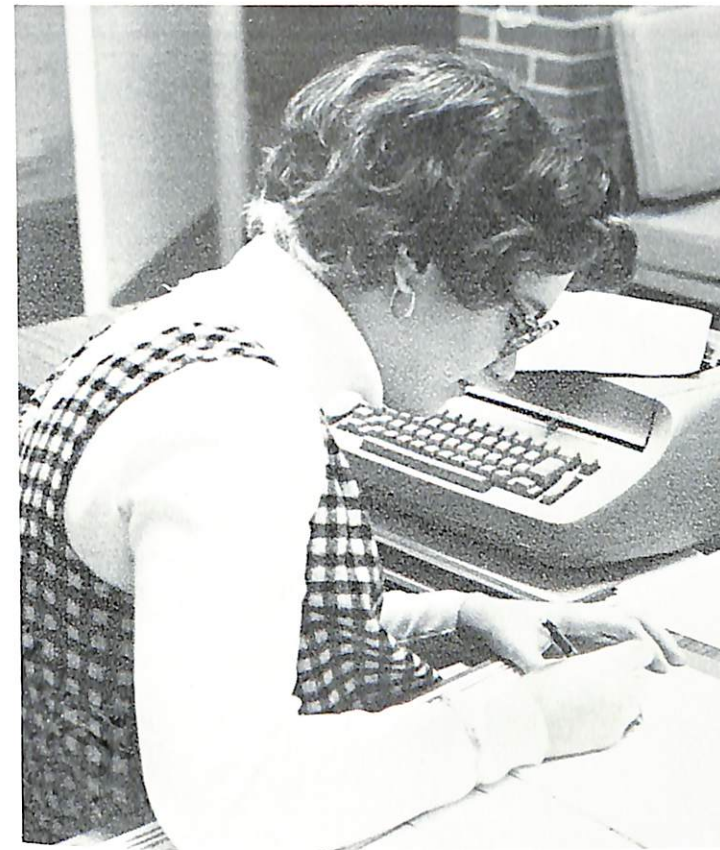

The administration department is strategically important and influential in the supervision of various school events at Pocomoke High.

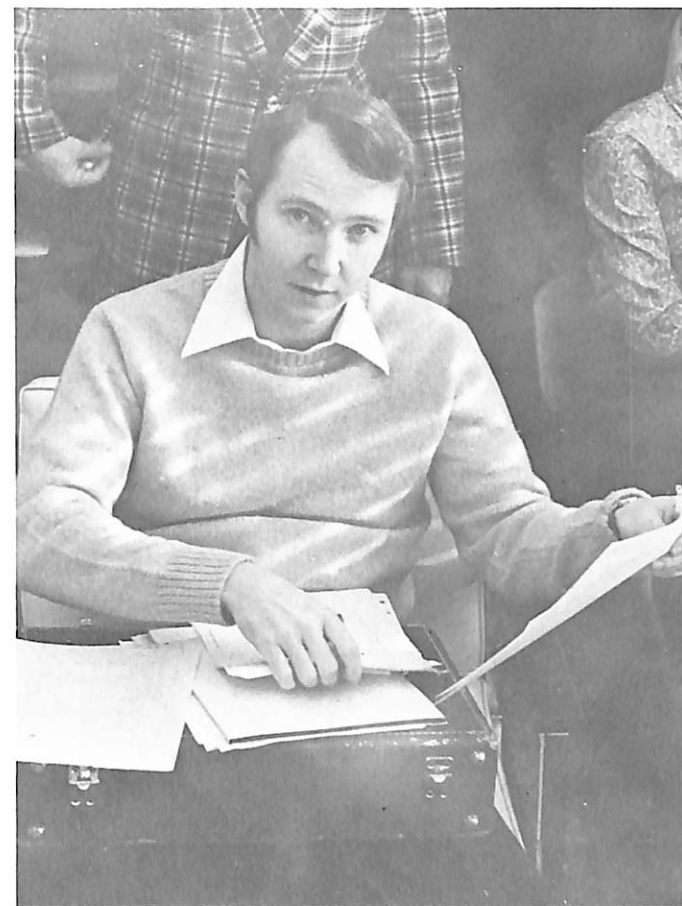

courses and earn college credit for these courses. The courses offered are Calculus, Biology, English, and History.

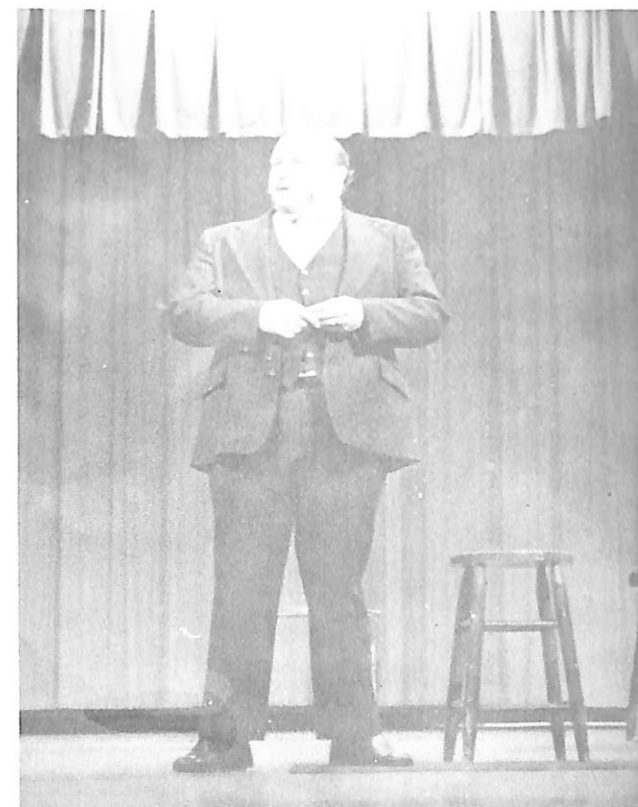

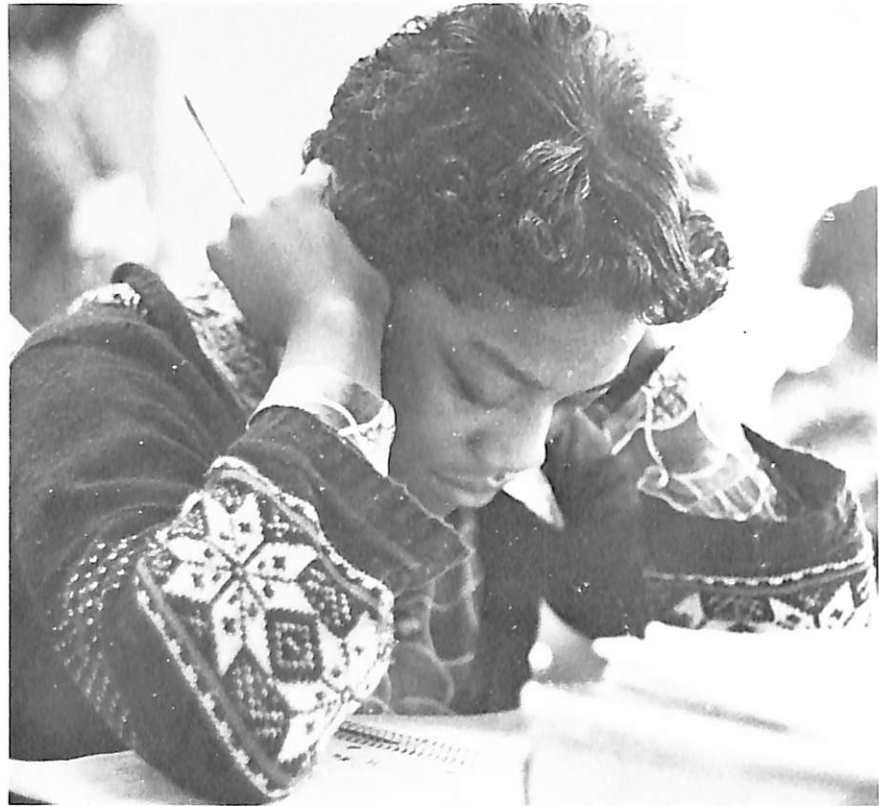

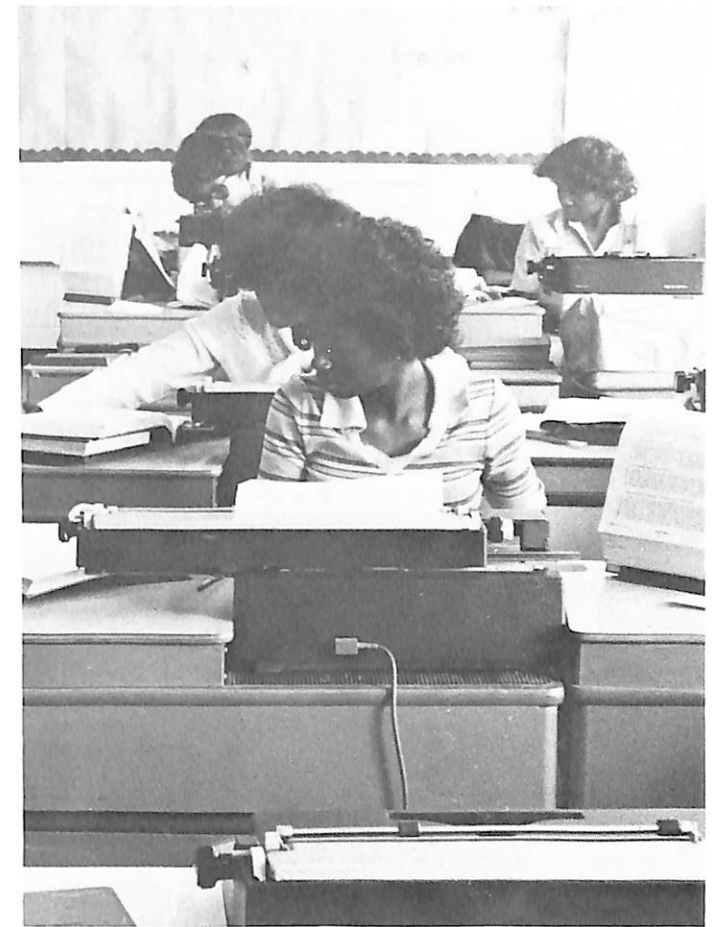
SCIENCE IS A WAY IN THE OF SEEKING ORDER NATURAL WORLD

depth study of the dissection of frogs and pigs, while the Chemistry classes carried out experiments.

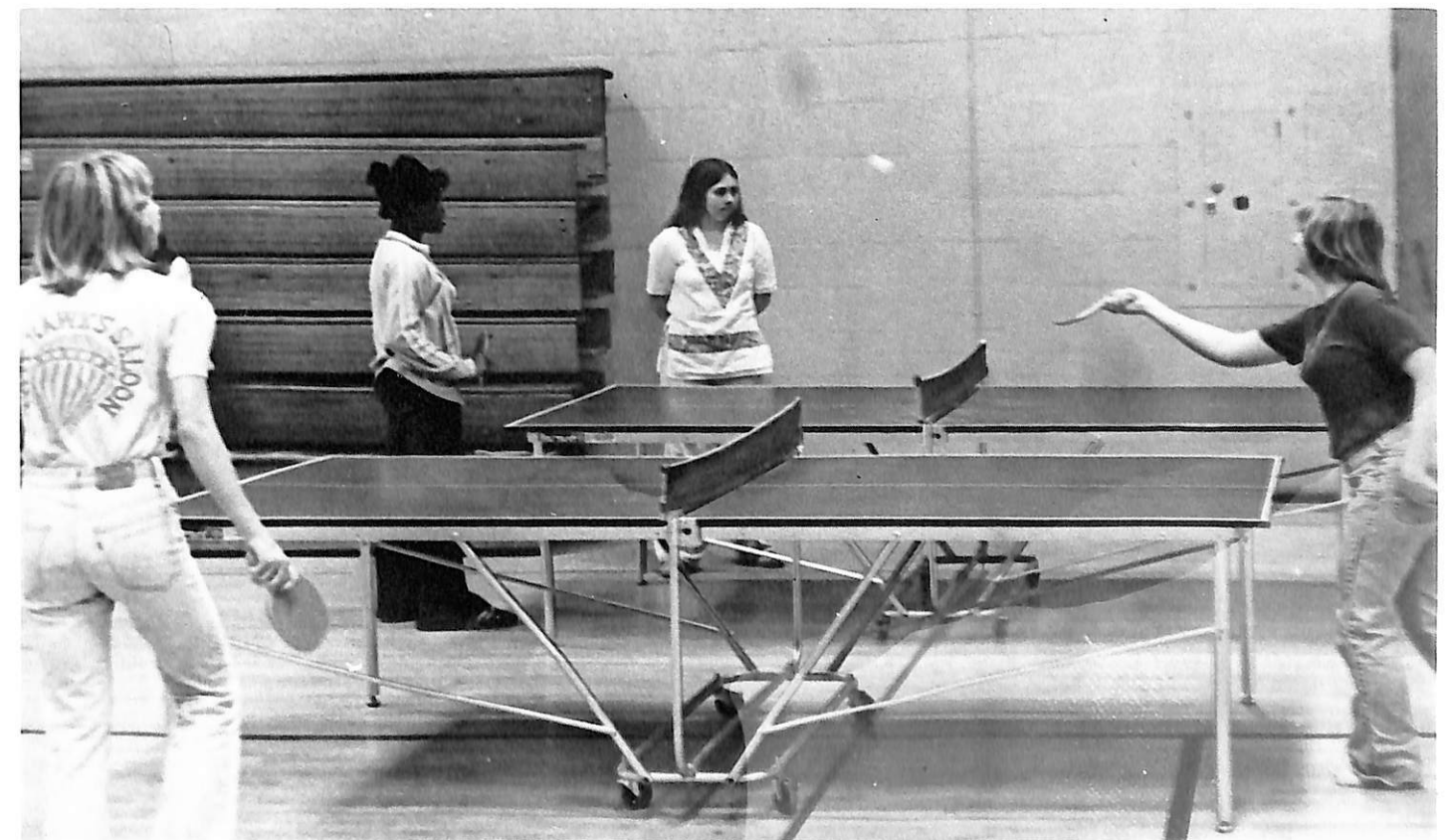
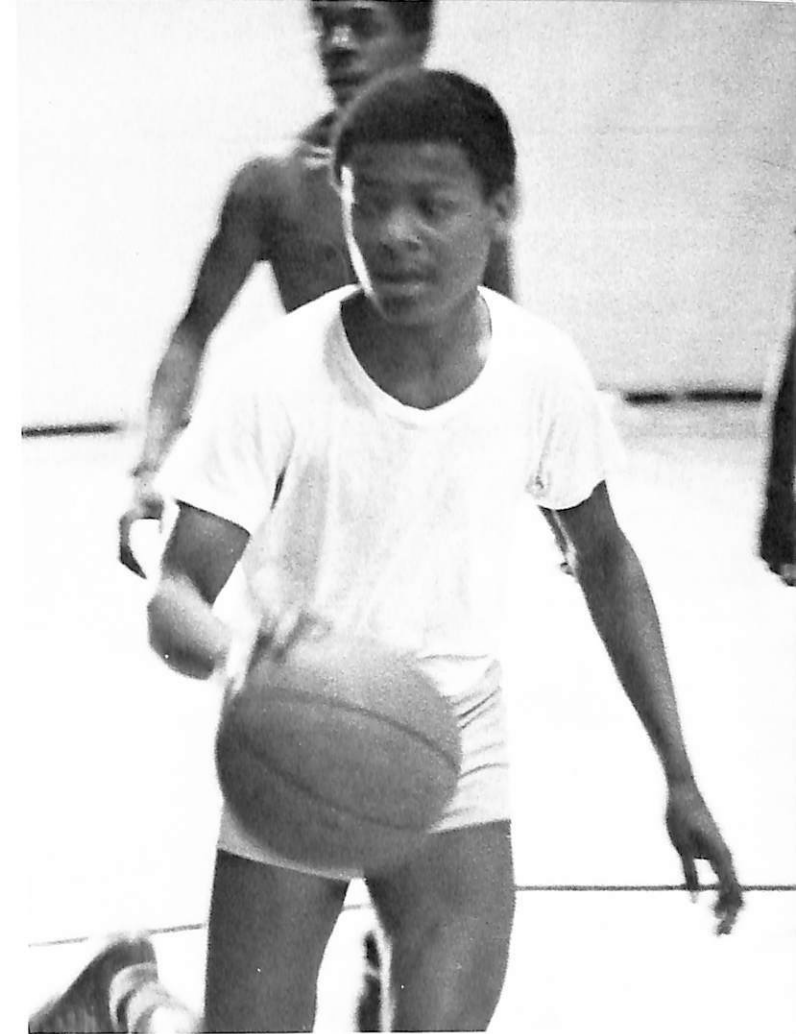
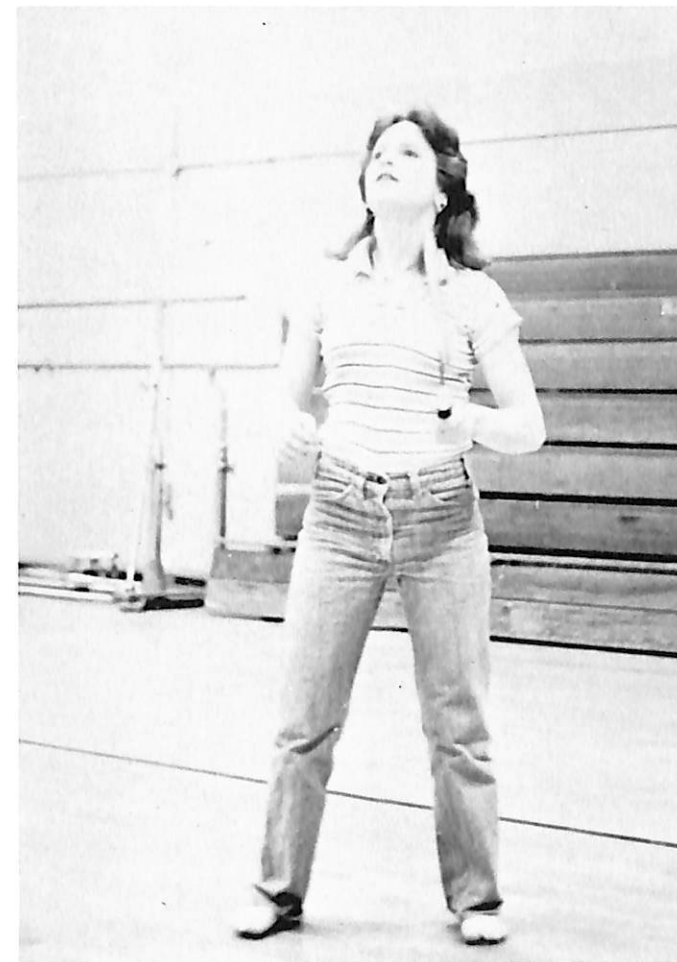
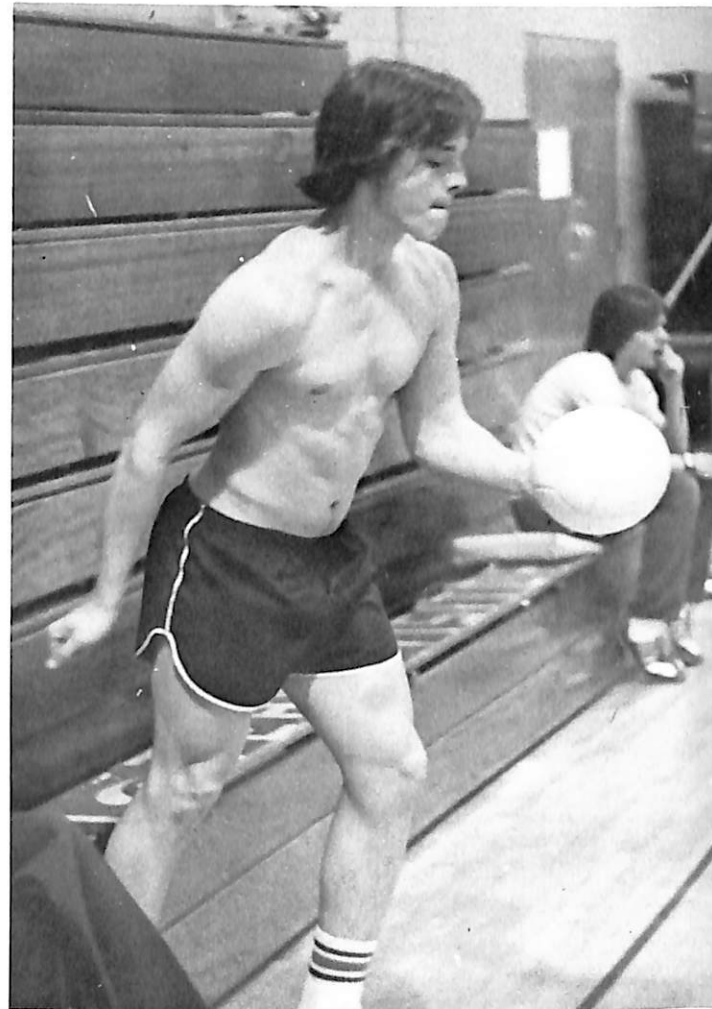

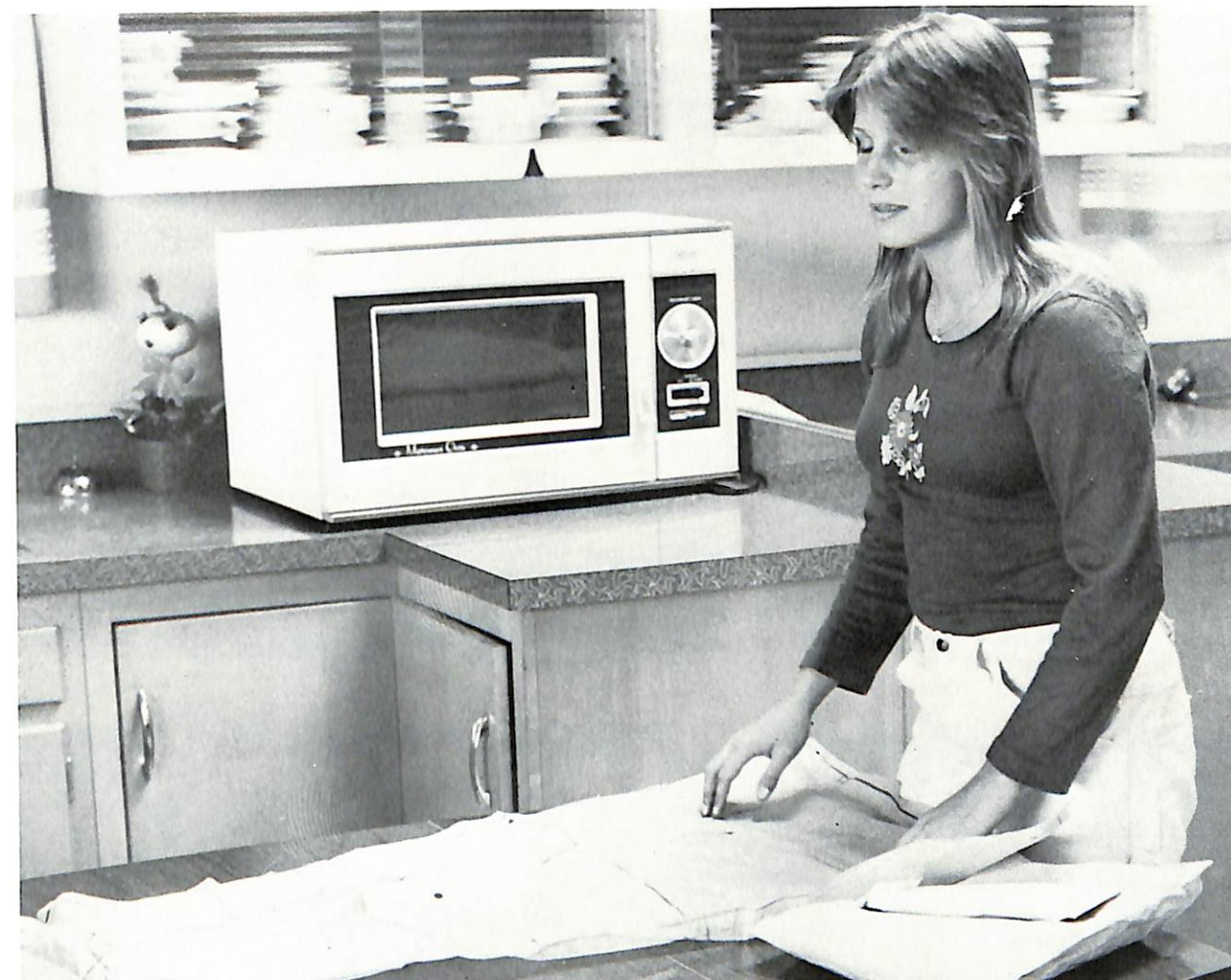
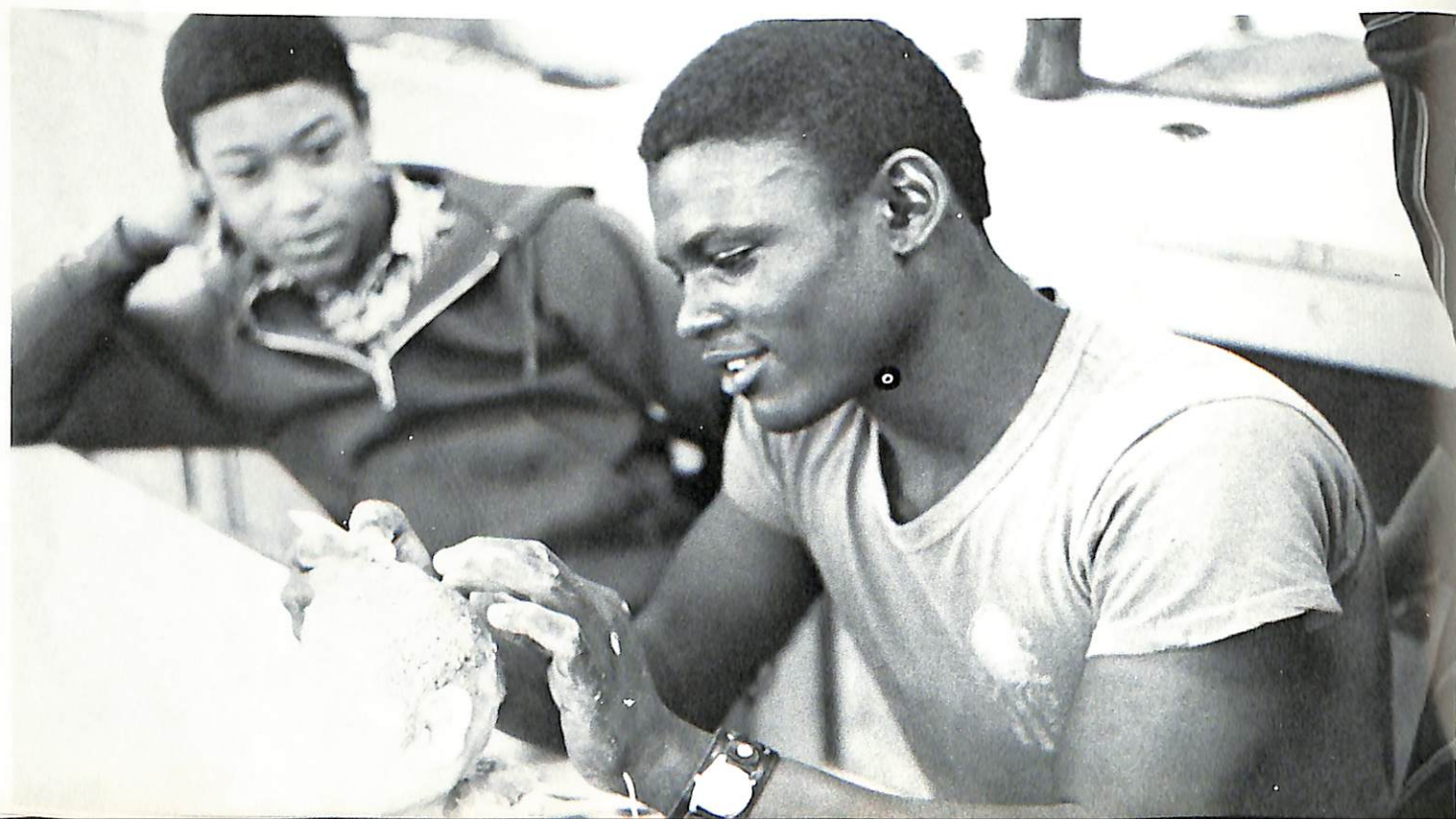




ART

Only hard work and discipline will lead to success. The successful art student at PHS knows that in order to learn anything he must set high objectives for himself and then demonstrate them with action rather than words.

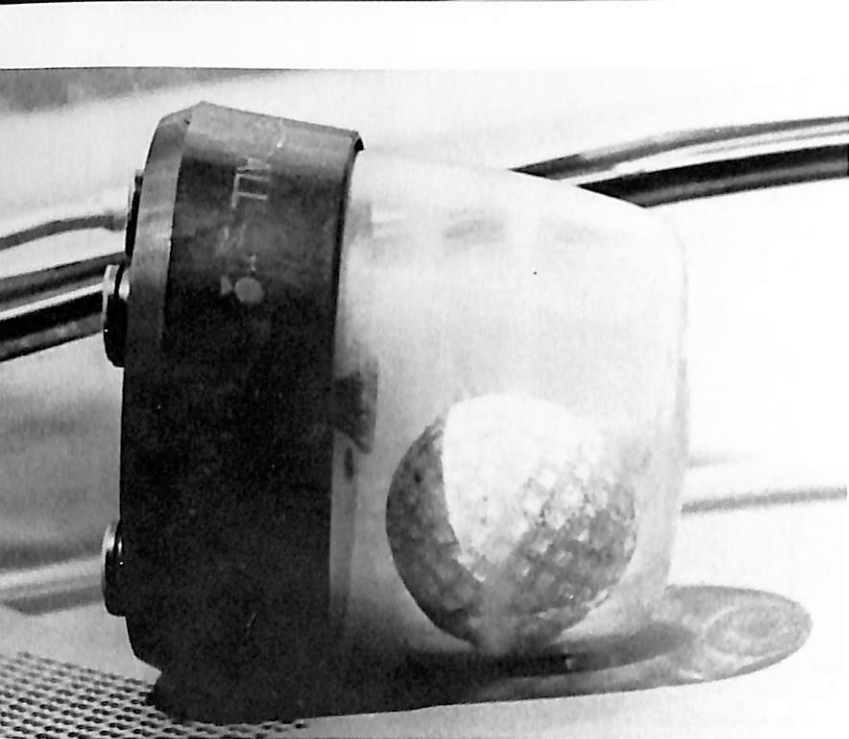


The homemaking program places emphasis on three areas: foods and nutrition, clothing selection and construction, and family living. It is the aim of the department to provide students

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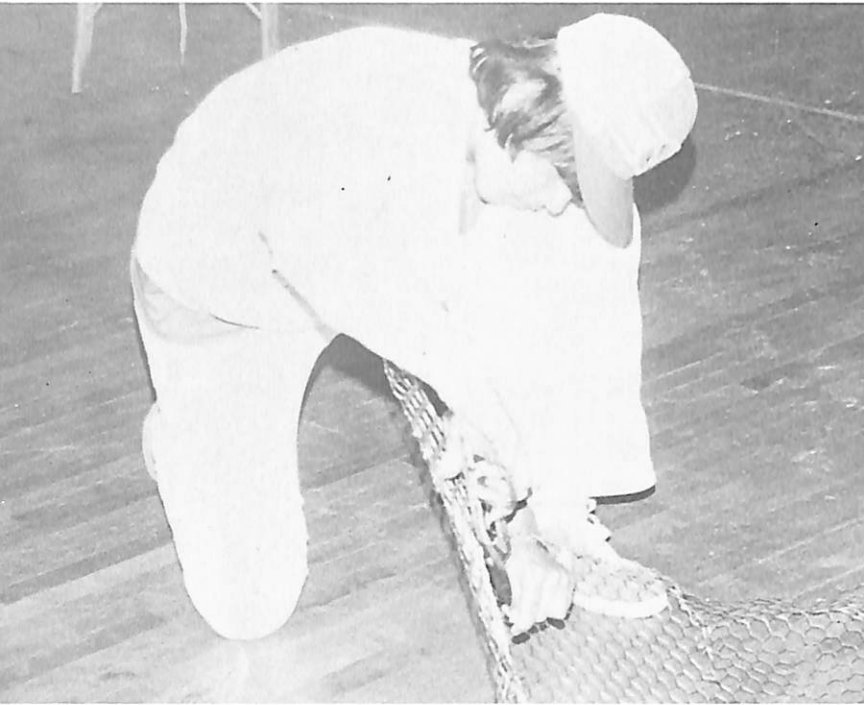


PHS SALUTES THE 50's

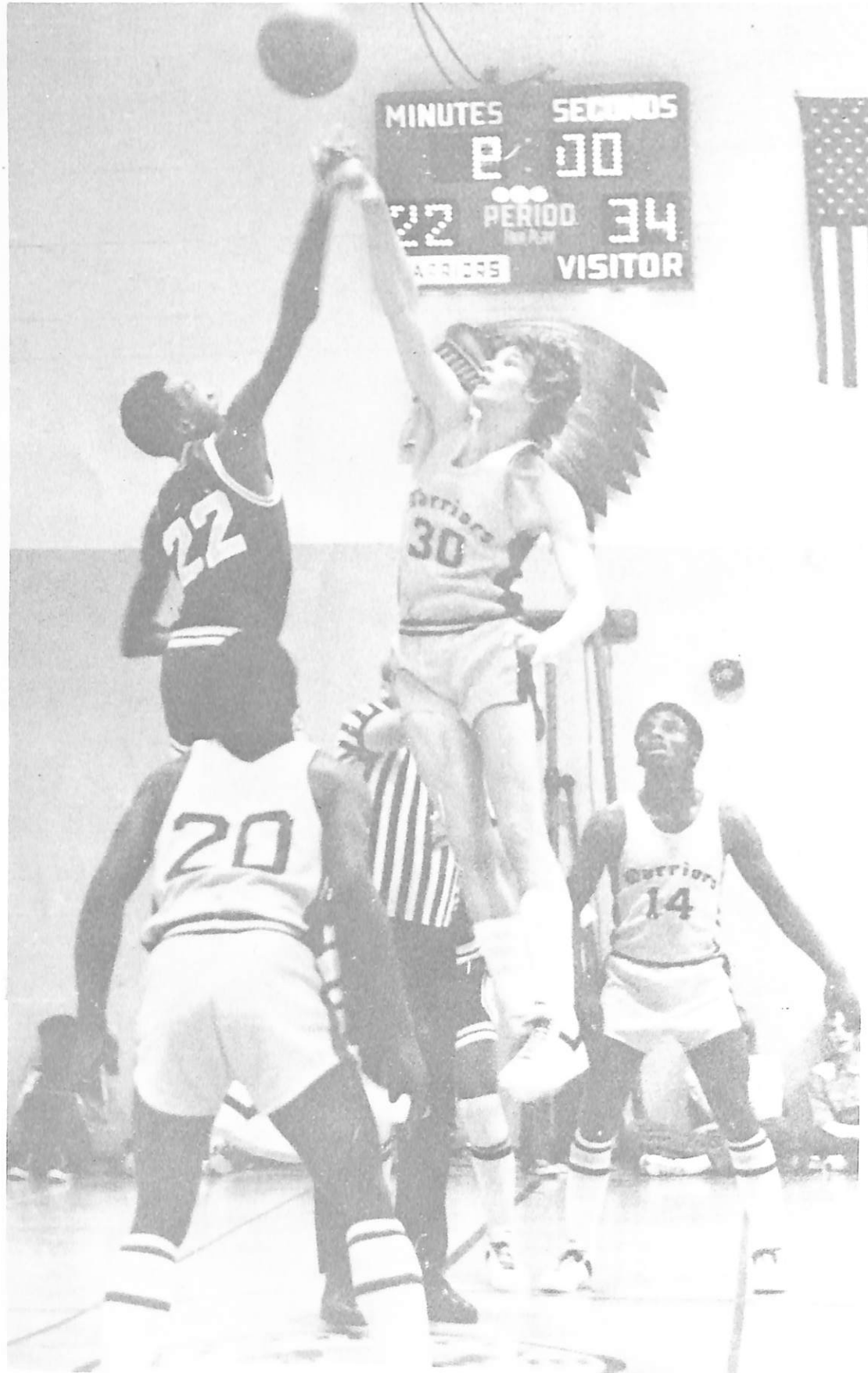

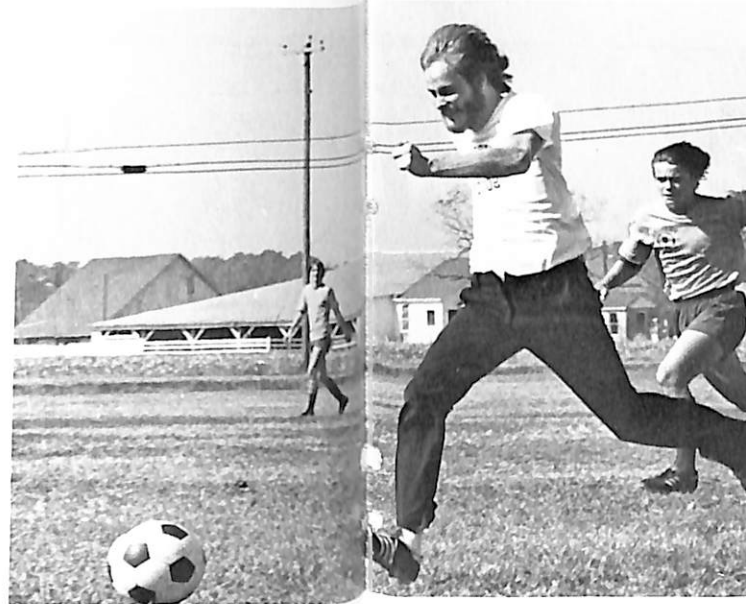

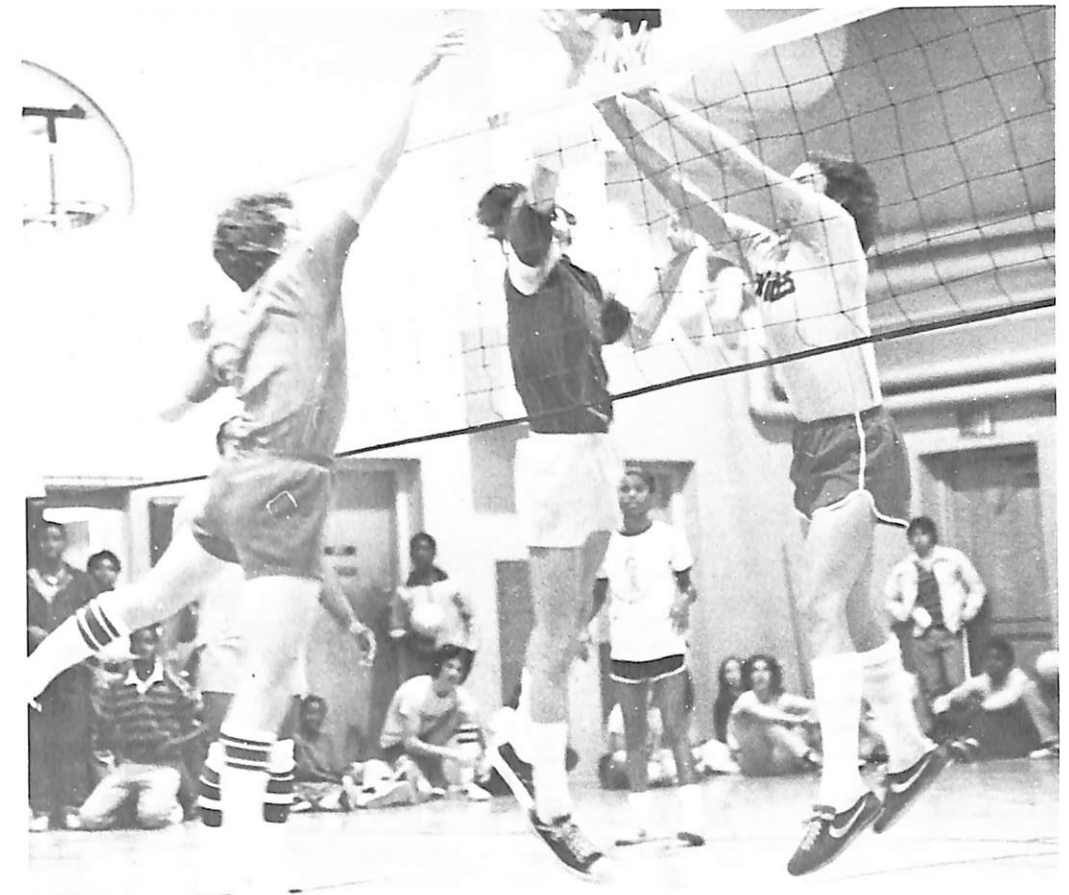
PRACTICE . . .

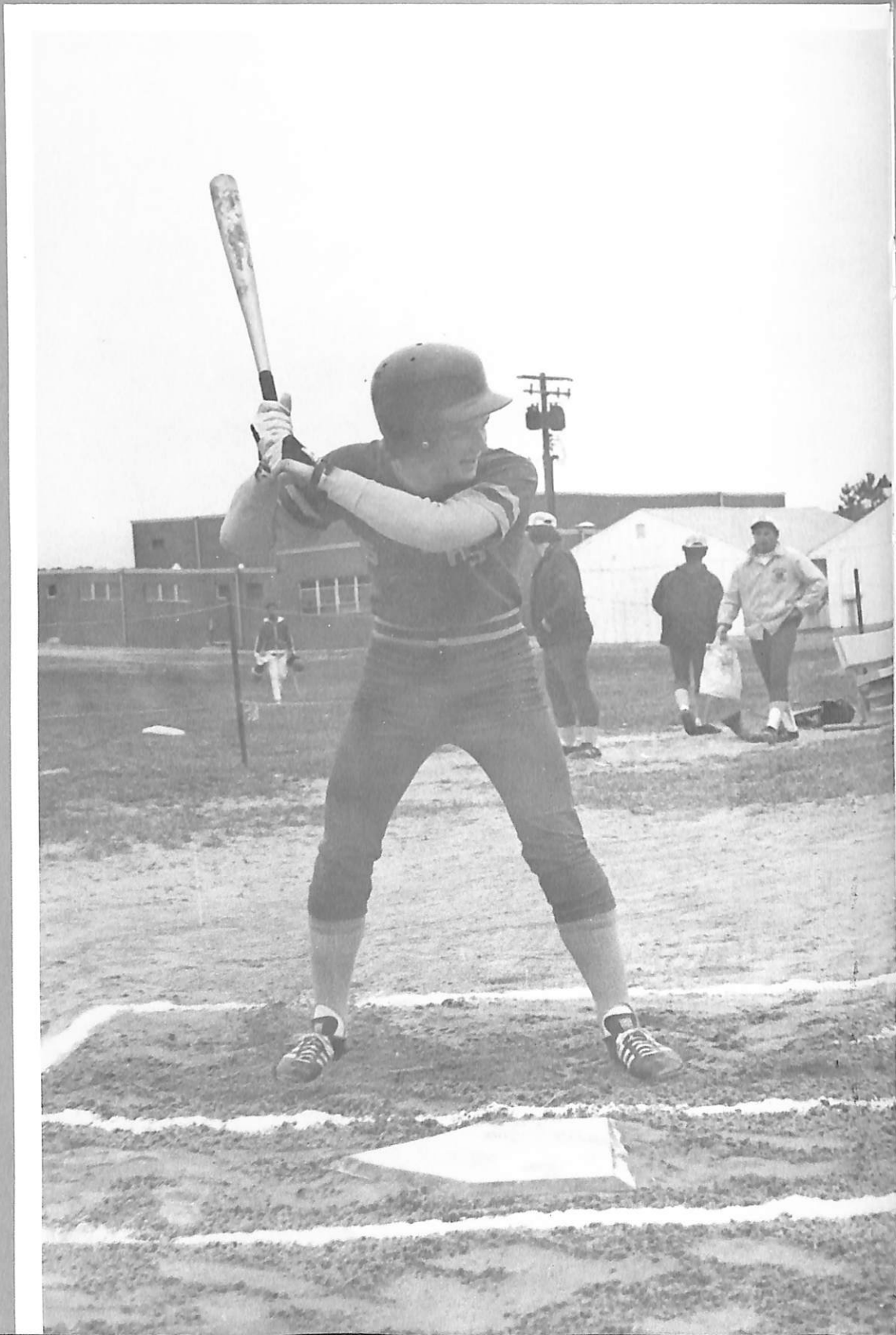


The FBLA Organization has been extremely active this past year. To raise money for their organization the members participated in bake sales, plays and a jellybean guessing contest.

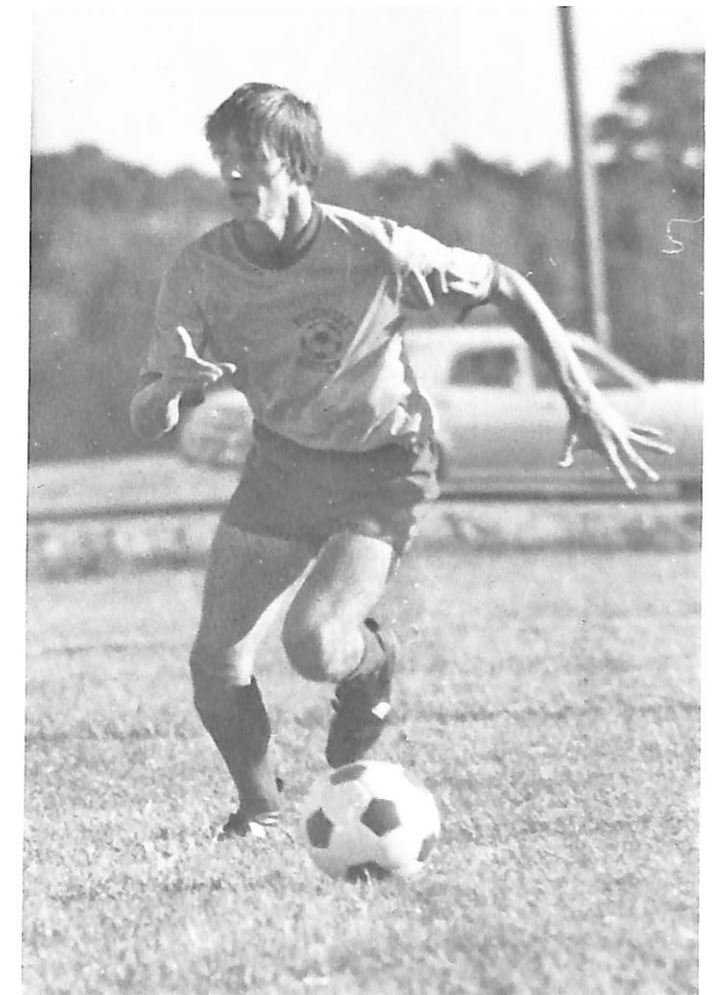
