










Mr. William T. McComb, a person of high ideals and sparkling personality, with leadership abilities, has earned the title of a loyal friend and capable advisor.


Language classes work in many areas.

Curriculum

Home Economics courses prepare girls for the future by teaching them various aspects of sewing, cooking, and home managing. Mrs. Marian Severance, Home Economics teacher, instructs the students in interior decorating, budgeting money and planning nutritious, as well as tasty meals.

In Industrial Arts, boys learn to recognize the components of different kinds of machinery, to create and assemble useful projects in wood and metal, and to use many industrial tools. The students learn the skills of electrical wiring, welding, soldering, riveting, drilling, refinishing, and jointing. Through these classes students master the basic fundamentals of trades which may become their vocations.
















The inclusion of written explanations and a student curriculum section brought more complete coverage into Pocomoke's biggest annual.



Music is a wordless language, and the music of the 1965-1966 Pocomoke High School Band inspired students, faculty, and audience alike. Innumerable practice sessions have served to prepare the young musicians for sparkling performances at . concerts, Band Day, and local festivities.

Under the able direction of Mr. Charles Bragg, the band had another very active year. Performances included participation in the following parades: The Salisbury Junior Chamber

of Commerce Christmas Parade, the Firemen's Parade in Rehobeth, Delaware, and the Chicken Festival Parade in Salisbury. In Pocomoke, the band played in the Christmas Parade, Halloween Parade, Memorial Day Parade, and the Centennial Parade on Labor Day. An excellent program at Christmas was presented in conjunction with the Chorus. In March, the band performed in the Eastern Shore Band Festival at Easton, Maryland. In the spring, the Band again combined talents with the Chorus for the annual Spring Concert at P.H.S.

Highlight of the school year for the band members was the trip to the University of Maryland for Band Day. More than 3000 musicians from the state of Maryland participated in this annual event.

The new organization, the Monarchs, was formed by Mr. Bragg at the beginning of the 1965 academic year. It consisted of twelve talented musicians chosen from the band. This select group attended the Eastern Shore Dance Band Festival in Salisbury, Maryland, on February 10, 1966 and performed at the Christmas program, the Spring Concert and for various civic organizations.






Warriors Earn 7th Straight County Title.


