
Has it ever occurred to you who gets the field hockey team together, or who encourages sportsmanship among players? Well, it is Mrs. Westcott.


CLASSROOM






HISTORY

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





M A T H







SCIENCE


PLACEMENT


INDUSTRIAL ARTS

Under the direction of Mrs. Ann Myers, both languages are made creative, interesting, and fun to learn. We couldn't do it without her!



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

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BASIC SKILLS

The sports banquets were divided into Fall and Spring this year, and this division proved to be very successful.


One of the most exciting events throughout the year was the prom, which the juniors readily prepared for the seniors.

This year has been an eventful one for our A.F.S. chapter.




VOLLEYBALL CLUB
