



# PREFACE





The mates on the ship were Mr. Wilbur Jones, Miss Grace Jones, Mr. W. F. Beauchamp, Mrs. Lurah C. Phillips who have continued with us throughout our voyage. Mr. Luther Promley, Mrs. Ethel Bromley, Mrs. Emily Duley, Mr. Henry Caple and Mr. Miles Hanna, have been followed by Mr. George Corddry, Miss Marion Humphreys, Miss Rebecca Bennett, Mr. C. J. Peauchamp, and Mr. Paul Joyner, respectively. During our cruise, our number was increased to twenty-eight for Ernon Sidaway joined us from Catonsville, Maryland; Kathleen Parker, Archer Holloway, and Elizabeth Dryden from Newark; Piercy Mabe from Coal Creek, Virginia: Ruth Browne from Princess Anne, Mary-

land; Pat Cottingham and Mary Godfrey from Snow Hill.

We were proud as any Hollywood cast when we presented our class play entitled "Hobgoblin House," We were also proud of the fact that our class was the second to have a year book in the history of Snow Hill High School.

We received our class rings on March 6, 1939; and now we are looking forward to Commencement when our Captain will present us with our diplomas, our passport into the World of Service.


What was that sound that reached my ears?







With an unusually good backfield consisting of Lingo Hudson, "goalie", Luther Taylor and Ed Gordy, fullbacks, and Milton Laws, Ray Mount, and Hurley Holloway, halfbacks! and a promising line boasting of Ernon Sidaway at center, Jack Wimbrow and Clemon Outten at the inside positions, and Winfred Goswellin and Charles Hager holding down the wing jobs, the Maroon and Black journeyed to Pocomoke to play its first regular game.
