(By this Patent, the 1747 1767 & 1762
Survey of No 1 Begins on County road in a low
piece of ground on Westerly side of seaside
County road (~~from Pumell's edge now in~~
~~Fairfield woods~~ - ~~see his notes~~)
No 2 Begins on S.E. side of Plantation where
Wm. Pumell lives (1767), at white oak in low
piece of ground, and calls on Fairfield
on a County road, & on a line of a
tract of land called Fairfields.

I find among ^{my} old papers a memorandum
stating that Commissioners acting as Trustees
for Heirs of Doctor Jno. Pumell, settled
agreed amicably with James B. Robin
to settle a boundary on original Spalden
line. There ^{is an old} stone in woods now
near corner of Mt. Vernon, and on
Southern outlet of Fairfield farm -
opposite the Mc-Alley farm sold by
Jno. B. Pumell; Deeded to him by Jno. B.
Roberts and Anaxias Robins. E. A. Robin.
