NEW YORK, April 7.—Rev. Edward Powers Grey, a clergyman of the Episcopal Church, whose will was filed for probate today in the Surrogate's office, directs that those who mourn for him shall wear white in token of their Christian hope.

"I desire," the will reads, "that with the tokens of mourning something white be exhibited and worn as a token that Christians sorrow not even as others who have no hope for those who fall asleep in Christ."

The testator also directs as to his burial as follows: "I desire my body placed in a simple wooden casket and buried in contact with the earth, without masonry or woodwork, but with some fragrant hay or clean straw upon it."

The estate is left to the testator's widow, Marie Louisa Grey, with the exception of his library, which, in case neither of the testator's sons enters the ministry of the church, is to go to the Diocese of Washington for the use of students of the ministry, the library, however, to be kept together, because the usefulness of various cross-references in the books would be destroyed were the volumes to be dispersed.
